The New York Philharmonic: 25th Year

ON Sunday afternoon, October 10, 1954, Dimitri Mitropoulos will conduct the New York Philharmonic-Symphony in Carl Maria von Weber's "Freischutz" Overture to begin the 25th anniversary season of the orchestra on the CBS Radio Network. The series is carried regularly on the CBC Trans-Canada Network (Sundays, 2:00-1:00-1:00 p.m.).

Radio has long since transformed every man's living room into an orchestra seat at Carnegie Hall. For 24 consecutive seasons, the New York Philharmonic-Symphony's concerts have been broadcast over nation-wide networks and for 24 years staying home and listening to the symphony on Sunday afternoons has been a pleasant custom throughout the nation.

On Sunday afternoon, October 5, 1930, 740 broadcasts and 24 years ago, a newly-arrived German conductor, Erich Kleiber, also opened the New York Philharmonic season with a performance

of Weber's overture to "Der Freischutz." For the first time, this concert in Carnegie Hall was heard by listeners from coast to coast, carried by 16 stations throughout the United States. Olin Downes described the program for radio listeners during the intermission and Frank Knight was the announcer. A new era had begun, in which radio was to help in making great music popular music.

The broadcasting of America's oldest orchestra, which started with this concert, was the idea of William S. Paley, who had acquired control of the Columbia Broadcasting (Please turn to page 5)

The orchestra is opening its 25th season on the air. Other conductors to perform during the new season are Bruno Walter, four programs in November and December; George Szell, four programs in December and January; Guido Cantelli, eight programs in January, February, and March. Larger works to be performed during the season include: *German Requiem* (Brahms); *Requiem* (Verdi); *Symphony No. 9, Choral* (Beethoven). In the three choral works, the assisting chorus will be the Westminster Choir, conducted by Dr. John Finley Williamson. Joseph Szigeti, violinist, will be heard with the orchestra in Christmas week, playing Mozart's *Violin Concerto in A Major*. Other works scheduled are: *Symphony No. 96* (Haydn); *Double Concerto* (Brahms), with Isaac Stern, violinist, and Leonard Rose, cellist; *Variations on a Theme by Paganini* (Boris Blacher). The Philharmonic-Symphony orchestra has given 5,300 concerts in the last 113 years.

SINGING STARS. The well-known musical competition series begins its 12th season. During the late summer, audition teams travelled throughout the Dominion, visiting principal cities. From applicants tested, 44 artists (22 men, 22 women) were selected to appear on the program. Each Sunday for 22 weeks, two of these candidates will appear before an audience in the Odeon Theatre, Toronto, where the broadcast originates. Their performances will be judged by Rhynd Jamieson, Vancouver music critic; A. A. Alldrick, Winnipeg music critic; Dr. Healey Willan, Toronto composer; Jean Beraud, Montreal music critic; and Lorna Grayston of Halifax. Listening by radio, the judges will select eight singers as semi-finalists. These will be judged by a final panel consisting of Dr. Edward Johnson of the Royal Conservatory, Toronto; Lloyd Powell, Toronto pianist; and Rex Battle, who leads the *Singing Stars* orchestra. The four prize-winners appear in the spring at a final gala performance in Massey Hall, Toronto, where presentations are made.

Domenico Cimarosa (1749-1801) scored great triumphs as a composer of opera. After the performance in Vienna of his *Secret Marriage*, the Emperor ordered supper for the whole cast and then asked for a repeat of the performance. Cimarosa helped to welcome the French republican troops to Naples in 1799, and when the Bourbon monarchy was restored was condemned to death. The sentence was commuted to banishment. His comedies are light-hearted and gay, in the Mozartian manner.

Elie Siegmeister, whose *Wilderness Road* Mr. Wild will conduct this week, describes the inspiration of the work as follows: "Through the dark and ancient forest, over the silent hills, stretched the Wilderness Road—gateway to the West. Over it came great caravans—tall, cheerful men, with axes and rifles, women, children, wagons, dogs, horses—pioneers . . . They passed, leaving quietness, a hope, and a dream." Siegmeister is widely known for his interest in native American themes. His works include *Ozark Set*, *Western Suite*, *Walt Whitman Overture*, *Abraham Lincoln Walks At Midnight*, and a Theatre Guild production which he conducted himself, *Sing Out, Sweet Land*. Darius Milhaud was one of the Paris "six." He is an exponent of polytonal modernist music, and has written chamber and orchestral works, ballets, incidental music, and much else. He has been associated with Paul Claudel, French mythical poet and dramatist, in a number of works.

moniker Grace Ethel Cecile Rosalie Allen, one of four daughters of Edward Allen, song and dance man. At three and a half, Gracie could talk so well that she made her stage debut. She had to go back to school, but turned up on stage later as a hooper. After a session with Larry Reilly as an Irish colleen, she took to stenography, but a girl friend persuaded her to try vaudeville in New York. A male comedian in the act was supported by a female "straight," and the girl was leaving, so Gracie got the job. The male was George Burns, who before too long became the "straight" man in Gracie's wacky comedy act.

CBC NEWS MAGAZINE. In two years on the air, *CBC News Magazine* editors have screened 400 miles of film, of which they have used 20 miles on TV. More than 50 miles of continuous screening would be required to view all editions of the program televised so far. All film is shot specially for the series. The magazine is now divided into parts—a section called *Closeup*, featuring aspects of Canadian life, including such subjects as Immigration, Education, and Foreign Affairs; and sections on Arts, Sciences, Medicine, Off-Beat, etc. An average of five departments usually show up each week.

System shortly before. His co-directors told him he was crazy, that there was no audience for good music. Paley answered them that he would make an audience, and forthwith went to the Philharmonic board and made the deal. The first contracts stipulated that no commercial sponsorship of the programs would be allowed, and that broadcasts of the concerts must be carried as a sustaining public service. It was only later, when the Philharmonic felt pressed for money, that its directors broached the idea of selling its programs to a commercial sponsor.

A poll last winter revealed that as many as 11,800,000 different listeners in the United States heard the Philharmonic broadcasts in a single month. They are also heard by shortwave in Hawaii and Alaska, and relayed by the Voice of America to the Far East. It is a numerical fact that in a single Sunday afternoon more people hear one Philharmonic broadcast than the total of all those who have attended in person the more than 5,000 concerts which the orchestra has given in the 112 years of its existence.

This is the external picture. What is actually going on in the millions of homes of these radio listeners? For one thing, they have bought in greater quantity than ever before recordings of symphonic music as well as solo performances by the artists they have heard on the broadcasts. The parallel is more than accidental. These radio listeners have also confounded the theory that symphonic music appeals only to a class audience. Fan mail, station reports, telephone calls and surveys reveal that first class musical programs can and do appeal to the people in remote towns and communities, as much as in the large musical centers. Schools and colleges as well as local musical clubs schedule regular groups for Sunday afternoon listening, and even have an advance study session on the program to be heard. The result has been that children and their elders have some background of study for the music which they will now hear in the best contemporary rendering. Arturo Toscanini was first heard on the air with the Philharmonic; such conductors as Sir Thomas Beecham, Bruno Walter, Leopold Stokowski, Artur Rodzinski, Walter Damrosch and Dimitri Mitropoulos have been introduced to the radio audience on these broadcasts.

Listeners have strong opinions about what they are hearing. After a recent broadcast of the controversial Schoenberg Violin Concerto, the mail rained in, pro and con.

Intermission commentators have played an important part in the success of the Philharmonic broadcasts. The first was Olin Downes, who remained in that post from 1930 to 1933. Leonard Lieblich followed. He was succeeded by Lawrence Gilman, who continued until 1936, when Deems Taylor took over. James Fassett, the present intermission commentator, started his "Green Room at Carnegie

Planning, direction, and supervision of boys' and girls' club programs are in the hands of the provincial departments of agriculture. Girls between 13 and 21 years join Homecraft Clubs.
