# Jake Park's Stein Music

*Together for nine years, Jake's "Polka Party" boys get as much fun from their own music as their many listeners do*

WHEN Jake Park's *Polka Party* band came on the air over CBW in 1950, the response from sentimental old-timers was immediate and enthusiastic. There was something warm and earthy about the show. The band and its old-fashioned tunes made people think of days when bands used to gather at street corners for the pure fun of it, while the stout burghers of the neighbourhood sat in their doorways to listen and drink tall mugs of beer. It didn't matter whether this happened in Frankfurt or Weimar, or in Milwaukee, or even in Old Ontario—it was still good fun, and it drew all the neighbours together in common pleasure in good hearty music heard on the evening air.

This was Jake's specialty, something that caught his fancy and charmed his mind. He caught the same atmosphere again later on, when television came on the scene with a 1957 series called *Happyland*—a program taking its name from the old "Happyland Park" which was situated years ago at Portage Ave. and Sherburn St. in Winnipeg, and was a gathering place for thousands of happy frolickers.

Incidentally, the *Happyland* program will return to CBWT Octo-

ber 5 and six days later on October 11 the program will be seen on the full CBC television network.

Jake, a Manitoba boy (born in Portage la Prairie) who had spent most of his life in Killarney and

Winnipeg, didn't try to analyze the reasons for his band's success. But he had a sure instinct for the things bandsmen and their audiences enjoyed, because bands and those who listen to them had played a large role in Jake's life since he was a small boy.

Jake's father, a jeweller whose hobby was band music, formed the Killarney Ladies' Band while Jake was still a toddler; it was one of the first such organizations formed in any British country. Then, and later when his father gathered musicians from Killarney, Melita, Boissevain and elsewhere to form the band of the old 222nd Battalion in the Great War, Jake used to toddle down to the band practices. After a while, when he was about eight, he even played—on an old E Flat alto (Peck) horn—and a few months later his father got him a shrill little high-pitched E Flat cornet.

There was an interruption after that. Bandmaster Park, with Jake's two brothers and the rest of the band, sailed away in 1916 for the war, and were away for three years, seeing much active service. Jake moved to Winnipeg with his mother, and in those grim war years got himself a paper route at the old Manitoba Free Press to help out at home. But just then Mr. James Richardson Irwin formed the

# The Wreck of the Deutschland

*A radio documentary describing the origin of the poem by Gerard Manley Hopkins*

WHEN the little packet steamer Deutschland set out from Bremerhaven for New York early in December, 1875, there were five Franciscan nuns among her 200 passengers. They had been turned out of their convent in Westphalia under a new ecclesiastical law designed to disperse the wealth, property and secular power of the Roman Catholic Church, and were on their way to join their sisterhood in Canada.

In the mouth of the Thames in a blinding snowstorm the ship suddenly grounded on a sandbar in sight of land, and lay on her port side, while huge breakers roared over her, and her terrified passengers clung to her rigging. In spite of the fact that rockets were sent up directly she struck, that the following day was fairly clear, and that passing ships were distinctly seen and hailed, no help came for 30 hours. One by one women and children and many of the men lost their hold on the rigging and dropped into the angry water. Among the 74 who perished were the five nuns, who clasped hands and drowned together, while the chief sister, a gaunt woman six feet tall, called out loudly: "O Christ, come quickly!" The tug Liverpool finally took away the remaining crew and passengers.

The terror of this long siege in the teeth of a greedy sea, with its little tales of heroism, selfishness and mystery, captured the imagination of readers all over Britain. One of the most affected was the poet Gerard Manley Hopkins. On becoming a Jesuit priest seven years before he had burned all his poems and determined to write no more. The fate of the Deutschland shocked him into composing one of the longest and most important of his poems. George Whalley, professor of English at Queen's University, has prepared a radio documentary examining the events sur-

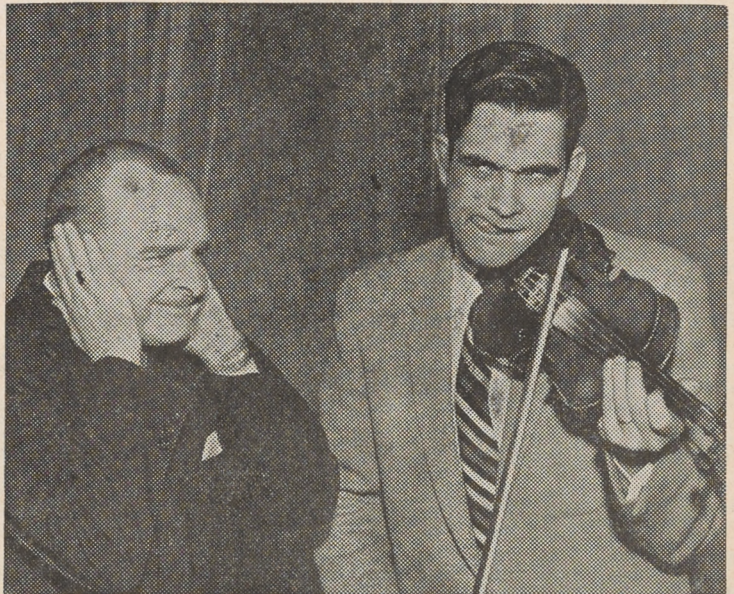
rounding the wreck in their relationship to the poem, the documents being interwoven with the poetic passages which they illuminate. The hour-long program will be heard on CBC Wednesday Night, with Leo Leyden in the role of Hopkins, and production by John Reeves. Reporters, shipping officials, crew members, and other survivors are all heard interpreting the grim story.

Gerard Manley Hopkins was one of the most original poets of the last century, and that partly explains why his works were not published until 30 years after his death. He was also a talented painter and musician, and his poems have a musical dissonance that was strange to the ears of his century. He insisted that they were written to be read aloud. Because, as a Jesuit, he had vowed to serve God, he refused to fight for fame, and so his mag-

nificent, vivid writing, breathlessly dashing from image to image, had to wait until the public had caught up with it. "No doubt my poetry errs on the side of oddness," Hopkins once wrote. "I hope in time to have a more balanced and Miltonic style. But as air, melody is what strikes me most of all in music, and design in painting, so design, pattern or what I am in the habit of calling *inscape* is what above all I aim at in poetry. Now it is the virtue of design, pattern, or in-escape to be distinctive, and it is the vice of distinctiveness to become queer. This vice I cannot have escaped."

Producer John Reeves points out that "*The Wreck of the Deutschland* is the first poem in which Hopkins carried out the stylistic, idiomatic and technical experiments for which he is famous. It is in the form of a long religious ode, complex in structure and meaning. Some of the difficulties in it can be elucidated by examining in detail the events which inspired it, which George Whalley has done, and this is followed by a reading of the complete poem. Mr. Whalley

## They Make the Clothes That Make the Shows

**D**OZENS of minor miracles in cloth, straw, leather, plastic and paint are performed daily in the CBC-TV costume department in Toronto . . . miracles because they're turned out in record time, often from next-to-nothing, and on short notice. This reporter expected to see confusion: perspiring seamstresses bending over racing sewing machines; scissors crumpling through material; distraught fitters dashing about with pins in their teeth and patterns flapping wildly;

stars standing knee-deep in cuttings, arguing about cleavage; and over all an aura of noisy excitement and artistic temperament battling it out in close quarters.

It's just the opposite . . . big, airy, quiet, with pale pink walls, and costumes and accessories in such quantity and order that a second-hand clothing merchant would drool beyond his wildest dreams. Without any frills or special decorations it manages to look both attractive and hospital-clean

. . . designers in their pastel-tinted cubicles, cutters at their big grey and green tables, sewers quietly buzzing their machines in a big, sunny sewing room, wardrobe attendants gliding about with foaming net skirts bouncing in their arms, a star standing patiently while a whirl of jewel-toned chiffon pinned over becomes a creation that will almost stop the show . . . all serenely competent in an atmosphere far removed from sweatshop confusion.

Over it all presides Edna Cherry, a tall, slender blonde, and her assistant, Everett Staples. They've put a complex cardex system into operation which tells them where each gown, suit, hat, umbrella or pair of long-johns is at a given moment. Every item of clothing and accessory has its proper place and number.

Dresses and suits are stored on long racks in a two-level section under either show or star titles. There are shoes . . . rows and rows of them, from space boots to Romeo slippers. Cowboy boots rub ankles with high button boots, ballet slippers sit toe-to-toe with hip-high waders, and Greek sandals look disdainfully up at bulldog-toed work boots. No one on staff ever throws away a pair of shoes they're tired of, Miss Cherry says . . . they add them to the ranks on the shoes shelves. There are umbrellas of all

kinds, and a huge rack of men's ties, from flamboyant racketeer-types to conservative greys.

Several priceless attics have willingly disgorged their contents into the welcoming lap of the costume department. Other items have been contributed by staff and friends, some come from second-hand shops, and others have been made right there or bought new. One fascinating section contains some 400 large cardboard boxes arranged in tiers and containing anything from leotards to feather boas, bustles, animal fur, skeletons, ghost outfits and hats. Each box has been identified and decorated with humorous drawings by staff member David Greaves. A box full of padding bears a drawing of an overstuffed squaw; a hobo looks out with unkempt leer from a box of rags 'n' tatters; and another box advertises the fact that it contains "orrible fices." Close by is an open filing area for heads, looking rather like a guillotine basket. Alice in Wonderland smiles beside a surprised Mickey Mouse, and there are animal heads straight out of nursery rhymes and nightmares. The prize is a realistic-looking gorilla costume, the only one in Canada, made in collaboration with the CBC-TV special effects department. Its base is very light-weight plastic rubber, and its mouth works with springs.

Freshly laundered shirts of all types . . . calypso, Victorian, dress,

TV-blue . . . are filed in cases alongside underwear from summer-weight to red flannels. There are filing cases for buttons by the thousands, buckles, belts, cummerbunds ("We never throw away anything," Miss Cherry explained), and there is even a box labelled "falsies." A small laundry room attached to the costume department is used for tinting costumes and material, and for freshening up washable clothes and accessories needed in a hurry.

One of the qualities most necessary in every member of this department is inventiveness. And this is best illustrated in the unusual period jewelry they've created. On camera it looks impressive, sparkling and costly. And even when you examine it for the first time it appears genuinely antique. Only when

you're let in on the secret can you see that glass beads from the junk counters, velvet ribbon, dog-chains and bits of hardware have pooled their resources in a clever bit of fraud. Result: a Brinks car doesn't have to follow performers around, no one worries if a necklace is broken or lost, and besides, says Miss Cherry, the designers get a big kick out of making it.

Most feminine performers don't own their own costumes, but many of them wish they did. A few outfits, usually period costumes, are rented from costume firms, but the majority are made in the TV workrooms. They are not for sale afterwards, partly because they will be used again and again, and also because they are never finished as carefully as a street dress . . . there isn't time for fine touches, and they aren't necessary, because the inside of the costume is never on-camera. They're easier to alter later on if they aren't too permanently stitched together, but of course more attention is paid to finishing dresses that are to be seen in close-ups.

Basic wardrobes are built for stars who appear again and again. Usually a featured performer in a long series will repeat her wardrobe once, and it will be altered and changed for third and fourth appearances. After that it usually goes into stock for the use of regu-

In consequence of the carefully prepared alibi that each of the assassins is able to establish, the official examination into the cause of Ludgrove's death establishes a clear case of suicide. Cast: Elvi Hale as Susan Cunningham; George Benson as Edward Carter.

# Clark, Parkinson and Golden

They really make quite a strange group. There's Canadian Gregory Clark, newspaperman, who during the depression tried to buy a 79 cent tie with a thousand dollar note. Another time he fried an egg on a Toronto summer sidewalk. Both experiences yielded columns.

Then there's British-born C. Northcote Parkinson, Raffles Professor of History at the University of Malaya. As a naval-trained man he spent several years in the army during the war dealing mainly with aircraft. When his four superior officers left him alone he found he had no work to do; hence his famous Parkinson's Law concerning the growth of bureaucracy.

Finally, there's American essayist Harry Golden, author of the best seller, *For 2¢ Plain*. Strangest of all, his parents first immigrated from Europe to Winnipeg, found it too cold, and moved on to the United States. He considers himself a radical, a Jew and a Yankee living for the past 15 years in North Carolina — "a member of three minorities."

On Sunday these three men will appear on *Long Shot* and talk. CBC-TV studios will be sort of a temporary resting place for all three. Golden is on his way from North Carolina to Israel; Parkinson came from the Channel Islands, via Michigan University, soon to return to Singapore; and Greg Clark—well, he gave up a beloved fishing trip up Hudson Bay to come to Toronto from Go Home Bay.

The men have certain things in common. Parkinson's dislike for bureaucracy is obvious from his "scientific law": (a) Work expands to fill the time available for its

completion. (b) Subordinates multiply at a fixed rate, regardless of the amount of work produced." The implied sentiments could well appeal to Clark:

"It's all onions. As far as the eye can see as you're driving along the Texas highway, there's nothing but onions . . . This is what they call corporate farming in Texas. Where there used to be a village with a shoemaker, a tailor, a grocer, a flour-and-feed man — now there's nothing but onions or grain, or some other crop grown on a gigantic scale. The farmer is doomed as an individual. He's as out-of-date in this huge onion patch as the shoemaker."

Parkinson and Golden have something which Clark lacks: a pretty wicked ability for satiric shafts—

Golden: "If I were faced today with a decision my ancestors were faced with—become a Christian or die—I would pick a church fast. There is nothing to offend me in a modern church. The minister gives a sermon on juvenile delinquency one week, reviews a movie the next week, then everyone goes downstairs and plays bingo. The first part of a church they always build nowadays is the kitchen."

Parkinson: "The (British) Colonial territories have shrunk steadily from year to year (since 1947) as successive colonies achieve self-government. But in 1935 there

were 372 Colonial Office officials while in 1954 the number had risen to 1,661."

Clark, on the other hand, expressly withdraws from satire. "I'm not a witty writer, I'm not even a humorous writer. I'm a *good*

"Sights on Safety." Mike and Jerry save the life of a wildcat trucker only to find themselves charged with criminal negligence.

**Desilu Playhouse**

Tonight—"The Untouchables," the first half of a two-part, two-hour dramatization of FBI Agent Eliot Ness' autobiographical novel about the special FBI squad selected to break up the Al Capone empire. Robert Stack stars as FBI Agent Ness. The play was adapted especially for television by Emmy-winning writer Paul Monash. Others in the starring cast include Keenan Wynn, Bill Williams, Nevill Brand (as Capone), Joe Mantell, Mary Murphy, Bruce Gordon, Barbara Nichols, Paul Picerni, Herman Ruden and Peter Mamakos. "The Untouchables" were six members of Ness special squad of agents, hand-picked from FBI offices around the country to help wreck the vast Capone bootleg racket in Chicago during Prohibition. They won their nickname from the fact that they could not be "touched" by the Capone bribe artists. This two-part production, one of the most widely-acclaimed presentations on the "Desilu Playhouse" series was originally presented on April 20 and 27.

*humoured* writer, and that's all... I've been sort of like those story tellers who wandered the world from one place to another and told, as a tale, the news of the last village they were in." (On another occasion, describing the genesis of his column *Jim and Greg* (illustrated by Jim Frise), Clark said, "Canadian newspapermen can't make fun of anyone so we make fun of ourselves.")

Clark believes that real news is apt to occur in the kitchen or streetcar. Parkinson takes the whole sweep of history as his subject. No form of government "represents any marked improvement on any other" . . . Political theories are "without exception drivel . . . a fund of slogans" . . . "No actual politician is greatly influenced by a book of political theory although many have been influenced by a book on religion."

Neither Golden nor Clark mind being laughed at. "Most Southerners think of Jews as surrogate negroes," explains Golden of his life in North Carolina. "Everybody knows where I stand but they laugh with me and at me."

"The book of Hemingway's I love best," Clark has said, "is *The Green Hills of Africa*; when I told him that was his greatest book Hemingway gagged, retched, and had to reach for the whiskey bottle and pour himself three quarters of a bottle of whiskey . . . He said, 'Greg, you always were a damn

fool. He said, 'That was a pot boiler.' But for me it's going to remain as one of his greatest pieces of writing."

The essence of Parkinson's Law is the coldness of the dissection process. Clark, for all his good humour, sometimes seems to prefer fish and birds to people. Perhaps of the three only Golden — Jew, radical and ex-convict—could have written the lines, "What is there to do in a ghetto but read books and practice the art of human dignity."

**Kane Signs  
With CBC**

Jack Kane, orchestra leader and musical director of *Music Makers '59*, has signed a three-year contract with the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation.

The contract provides for 20 hour-long shows in the first year, starting this fall and either 40 half-hour shows or 20 hour-long shows in the succeeding two years.

Under the overall title of *Music '60*, Kane will have his own show every two weeks next season, entitled *The Jack Kane Hour*, alternating with *'Cross-Canada Hit Parade*.

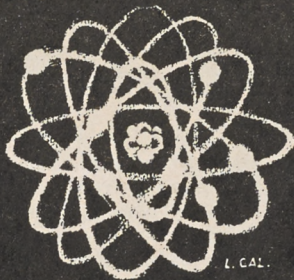

Free Press Boys' Band, and Jake and his shrill E Flat became prominent in it.

Bandmaster Park came home in 1919, and one of his first acts was to buy Jake a proper B Flat cornet, and to devote himself seriously to teaching him music. Very soon Jake, with his two brothers—one on clarinet, one on tuba—were playing with the 79th Camerons band in Winnipeg, under their father's direction.

Jake was in high school, in Grade XI, and nearly 17 years old, when the critical moment came. The phone rang one day at home. Earl Hill, conductor of the Capitol Theatre orchestra, offered Jake a job as first trumpet. What should he do? His father wanted him to go on with his schooling. It was a difficult decision, but Jake took the plunge and the job, and has never looked back nor had any regrets.

Jake worked on with Hill and others in Winnipeg and the west, while members of his family scattered over the world. One sister, Rhea, playing euphonium, tuba, saxophone, clarinet and oboe, toured Europe as a performer. Another sister, Edith, born in Killarney, became prominent as a vocalist in the U.S.A. One brother left to play with John Philip Sousa in the States, another toured the States with Tommy Dorsey, Skitch Henderson, and other bandleaders. Jake played with the old Orpheum and Pantages shows, at hotels in Banff, Lake Louise, and Winnipeg, with Hugh Ross and the Winnipeg

Symphony Orchestra, with Pelham Richardson, Dick Seaborn, Bernard Naylor and others on the old provincial government radio station. Then he, too, took to the road, landing with Alan MacIvor in Montreal, travelling with American bands, working in Toronto with Samuel Hersenhoren, Luigi Romanelli and Howard Cable, and playing with the Toronto Symphony and Promenade Symphony Orchestras under Sir Ernest MacMillan.

The war found him in Toronto. In 1940, Jake joined the Air Force, playing in the R.C.A.F. Central Band at Ottawa. They toured the States, playing at Baltimore, Philadelphia, Washington, and elsewhere. In 1945, Jake was discharged at Winnipeg, the old home town where he had sent his family when he joined the Air Force.

It was radio from then on, and TV when it started in 1954. But it meant a transformation for Jake, too. Until this time he had played trumpet only, but when Eric Wild was forming his CBC concert orchestra, he asked Jake to take up the horn, an instrument then in very short supply.

"I was stuck with it," says Jake. "It had to be done, so I bought a horn and set to work. I've been playing it ever since."

He still did some trumpet work while playing first horn in the Winnipeg Symphony with Walter Kaufmann, but the horn grew on him. It's an odd instrument, he thinks, and you have to be a whizz at clefs and transposition to play it. Horns (French horns, as people call them) now come in B Flat and F—

that is, a double horn with a valve that transposes it to B Flat—but once there were instruments in E Flat, D, G, A, and other keys. So in some of the older musical scores, horn players encountered music in these keys and have to transpose—not the easiest operation in the world. On top of that, it's a nerve-racking job because of the horn's tendency to bubble.

Nowadays, Jake is a conductor. He speaks with pride of his *Polka Party* group—the same since he formed it nine years ago: Albert Simoens, trumpet; Emil Bernier, trombone; Art Hart and James Thomson, clarinets; Harold Hunter, drums; Paul Olynyk, tuba; Ted Komar, accordion; and Mitch Parks, piano.

"We've worked together all this time, and we like it," says Jake. "We enjoy the music just as much as we hope our listeners do. I feel very proud to know that I've been able to hold this group of fine musicians together for so long."

*Polka Party* is heard every second Saturday night on CBW radio, alternating with Dick Seaborn's *Prairie Schooner*. Vocalists on the show are Kerr Wilson and Donna Andert.

lar artists, guests and extras. Costumes for the *Joan Fairfax Show* have been gathering favorable comment lately. They're the work of designer Thelma Timmins. She attends a production staff meeting each week, when producer Don Hudson goes through the whole show with his crew, giving them a rough idea of what he wants the show to look and sound like. Sometimes he states definitely what he wants in the way of costume effects, sometimes he leaves it up to Thelma. Then she goes back to her office and creates on paper the three to five luscious gowns Joan will wear that week. "I try to give her the clothes she likes to wear and feels most comfortable in," Miss Timmins says. "She's a very versatile dresser, with a delightful figure and looks well in just about anything. She hasn't any quirks or violent dislikes in styles, is very co-operative, and it's a pleasure to design for her. We're trying to keep her costumes as light in colour and feeling as possible, because it's a relaxed summer show."

Joan is something of a quick-change artist on the set. Usually she has just a minute to zip out of, say, a slinky blue glitter sheath and into a pale pink organza dress with a full skirt. Like most stars, she has

two or three fittings for each outfit. Dancers can usually get away with one fitting, because their gowns are comparatively simple.

Once the style has been decided upon, the choice of materials must be made, in a tiny room shelved high with bolts of material in every hue. There are zippers of every length, and ribbons and trimmings of all sorts sit waiting their call to strut their stuff before the cameras.

TV designers are all highly trained, and usually specialize in one type of work, as Thelma Timmins does in light entertainment. The seamstresses, cutters and tailors who worked on custom clothes before joining the CBC usually find their feet in the new medium faster than those who came from factory work. Designs for period costumes are carefully researched beforehand.

A reference library of these styles is gradually being built up, and the Toronto Art Gallery and private collectors are helpful. Most of the designers have their own collections, too, which they share around. As for contemporary styles . . . *haute couture* is modified for most TV appearances. Miss Cherry says: "We go very carefully where boxy jacks and sack dresses are concerned . . . with anything extreme, in fact. You'd be shocked at what the camera can do to an otherwise

good figure in these styles! We've learned to concentrate on collars . . . they can frame a face beautifully. As for colour, only flat white is out, because it creates a foggy effect, but we've used it occasionally for special effects.

Men usually wear their own business suits. But if a singer is to appear weekly in a tuxedo, it is usually supplied by the costume department, or any other unusual outfit, such as special jackets to be worn by a group of singers, period outfits, etc.

And if a performer forgets the rule about white and arrives in a spanking white shirt, then a pale blue one (which photographs as white) is whipped out of stock for him.

The day of the show, when the costumes are done to the last stitch, they're hung on racks and taken by truck to the studio for the dress rehearsal, where dressers make any last-minute adjustments. Then it's showtime and they float onstage for their big moment. It doesn't really matter that they're cotton masquerading as the silk of Marie Antoinette, that they're a long basket crinoline in front and an airy nothing over shorts behind, or that they're Parisian-chic outside and their interior finishing might make Jean Patou shudder. Like all showbusiness, they're partly make-believe, and if they fool the customer, that's part of the game.

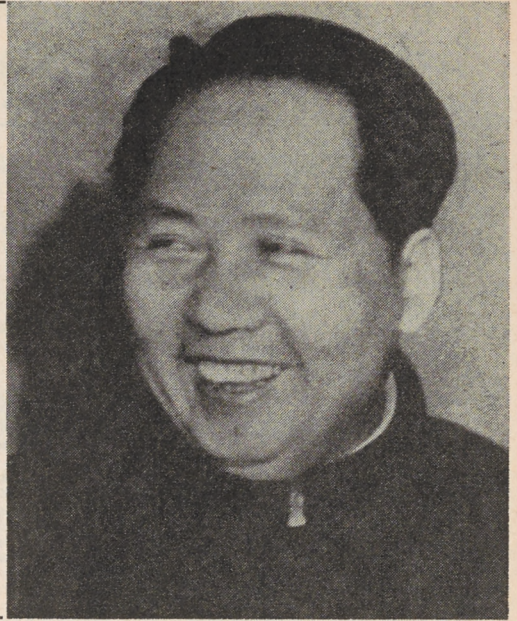

has prepared a number of literary programs for the CBC. For a CBC Wednesday Night broadcast last year he dramatized Helen Waddell's novel *Peter Abelard*, and translated and arranged for voices the surviving letters and documents pertaining to the Abelard story."

While *The Wreck of the Deutschland* describes the genesis of a poem, the second dramatic feature of the evening, *A Boy Growing Up*, describes the genesis of a poet, Dylan Thomas. "And," says John Reeves, "the connection doesn't end there, for Thomas is not alone among modern poets in owing a stylistic debt to Hopkins. *A Boy Growing Up* is the title of an entertainment arranged from the works of Dylan Thomas by the distinguished Welsh playwright and actor Emyln Williams. It's a piece of one-man theatre and Williams has taken it on a successful tour of Britain and North America. The Wednesday Night program is the soundtrack from the highly successful *Folio* production on CBC-TV last May. It consists of readings from Thomas' reminiscences of his childhood and adolescence, which are scattered through his writings, and the script and performance, as

a unity, constitute a *tour de force* not so much of impersonation (as in Williams' approach to Dickens) as of evocation. There is no attempt to represent Thomas either vocally or visually, but the words are simply allowed to speak for themselves, which they do with great effectiveness and sincerity. It is this quality, above all, which makes the material and Williams' approach to it very well suited to radio, and the performance to be broadcast is exactly the same as that given in the theatre, except that it was shortened to an hour."

You'll meet a group of old men off on a drunken outing, two boys dreaming by the sea, a schoolmaster analyzing the varied characters of his squirming pupils, two youths sniggering over the mannerisms of the minister's wife, and you'll visit the grimy lobbies and humming workrooms of factories.

The evening's musical programs are also Welsh-flavoured. Stravinsky's *In Memoriam*, Dylan Thomas will be performed by Canadian tenor Jean-Paul Jeannotte, the Montreal String Quartet, and the Montreal Trombone Ensemble. Later in the evening there will be a BBC-transcribed concert of Welsh music by the Morriston Orpheus Male Choir, the Treorchy Male Voice Choir, tenor Rowland Jones, and the BBC Welsh Orchestra.

### "Manitoba Mirror" Goes to Virden

by WAYNE KINES

Whether you call it the "town character" or the "character of the town," Virden seems to have it. The townspeople will tell you that it has been there since the beginning, and has been passed on from the time of the first settlers in the 1880's. A mobile radio team from CBW is going to try and capture it for *Manitoba Mirror* listeners this week.

The mayor of Virden, Cliff Cory, says it was there long before the oil drills, and it will still be there long after the oil wells are gone. He claims it was there even before paved streets or waterworks, before the first sod was turned and the first grain planted.

He says it is what built the huge old drama theatre, the schools and the new community centre; what filled the armoury hall with 60 years of marching militia men and it's what sent them off to fight for their country.

You might call "it" the spirit of the town or the character of the people, but whatever you call it, it is the mortar that builds communities, makes them stick together, work together and build together.

Therefore, when the story of a town is to be told, nothing is more clear than the degree in which this intangible quality exists. It comes out quickly when you begin to look for the kind of activity to describe or the kind of people to interview who will be of interest, entertainment and value to people in other communities.

Virden is now known as the "Oil Capital of Manitoba." This is true," says its people, "but there is much more to Virden than this. It has

been a solid community for over 75 years."

Some of the colour and character of Virden will be reflected in this week's *Manitoba Mirror*. CBW's morning commentator, Doris Dickson, with announcer-interviewer Bill Guest and farm commentator George Price will be broadcasting nearly two hours a day direct from Virden.

CBW will carry nearly ten hours of programs from Virden during the complete week. *Manitoba*

*Mirror* producer Dan Wood, and control operator Alan Tasker, will be setting up temporary studios in the Legion Hall for the broadcast from the tea; in the Goulter School Auditorium for the Farm Club Broadcast, the *Manitoba Mirror* Quiz, the Stu Davis Show and the Dance Party; and in a vacant store just off Virden's main street for most of the regular interview shows.

The exact times for all shows will be found in the CBW listings, starting with the Sunday Church Service from Virden at 11:00 a.m. CDT, and continuing with Morning Devotions at 9:33 a.m. CDT, Monday, and five other programs each day.

### MUSIC ON RADIO

by FRANK HAWORTH of Toronto

DURING the coming week we are to hear several works for unusual combinations of instruments—or perhaps we ought to say "yet unstandardized" combinations, since it appears likely that many more groupings than those to which we have hitherto been accustomed will become established and accepted as time goes by. Until fairly recently, small ensembles were confined more or less to the stringed instruments (with or without piano), which achieved the summit of their development a long time ago, and could be relied on to produce predictable qualities of tone, intonation, blend and balance.

With wind instruments, however, the case was different. In general, their tone was coarser and more strident than that of the strings, and although acceptable in orchestras and bands, apt to be overpowering in small groups; their qualities varied widely from one maker to another, and their tone production and intonation were uncertain in less than virtuoso hands. So, although as far back as the 18th century Mozart wrote chamber works of enduring fame that included clarinet and oboe, to be followed by Weber and Brahms in the 19th, composers generally were somewhat chary of entrusting their finest inspirations to such media.

But the great improvements in methods of construction and manufacture, following on the work of Boehm, Sax and others, and stimulated by the increased demands from the newer-style dance bands of the 20th century, have changed the picture. The various instruments can now be counted on to meet all artistic requirements, and this has doubtless encouraged com-

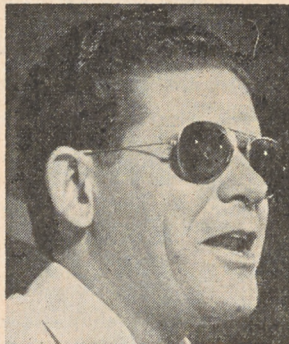

posers to more extensive use of them. It has to be said, however, that the ironing out of the asperities from their tone has not been accomplished without some sacrifice of their characteristic quality, in some cases; and this can alter the effect of passages, both solo and concerted, conceived for the older forms of the instruments—not necessarily for the better.

The change of outlook is illustrated by two works to be heard in the *Western Artists* concert on Monday (Phyllis Antagonini, soprano, Donald Brown, baritone, Henry Ohlman, clarinet, George Zukerman, bassoon and Harold Brown, piano). Schubert's song *Shepherd on the Rock* has a fine obbligato for clarinet — a solitary instance at that time, apparently, and one clearly suggested and justified by the long-standing identification of the clarinet with the

I am not acquainted with the content of Canadian composer John Beckwith's *Great Lakes Suite*; but it is reasonable to suppose that his choice of soprano, baritone, clarinet, bassoon and piano was dictated by his feeling of their rightness for his purpose, and their ability to carry it out, and not by the mere pressure of some accidental legendary association.

A truly remarkable example of an unusual combination is afforded by Stravinsky's *In Memoriam, Dylan Thomas* to be performed on Wednesday evening by Jean-Paul Jeannotte, tenor, the Montreal String Quartet and the Montreal Trombone Ensemble; a work that reminds us, incidentally, of Stravinsky's association with modern poetry and poets in his capacity as a professor of poetry at Harvard University—an unusual post for a musician to hold. It also marks a new departure for the composer—his use of the twelve-note serial system, albeit in a somewhat modified form. The employment of a quartet of trombones in music of a funerary character is not without precedent, however short pieces for that combination under the title of "Equal" were in use in the 18th and early 19th centuries, and Beethoven wrote a once-famous set of three.

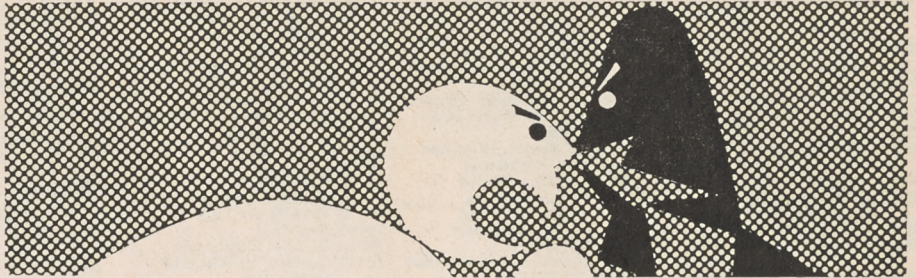

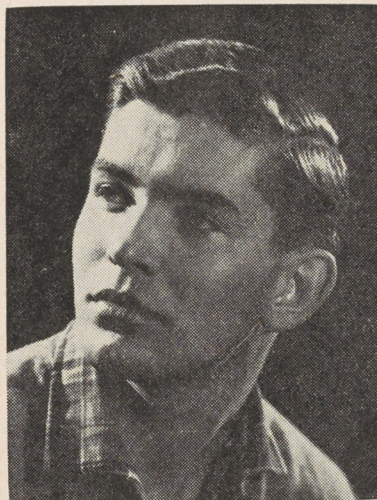

### TRANS-CANADA MATINEE

New York Cats. **Footloose in Salzburg**

For 46 weeks of the year, Salzburg, Austria, is a charming but quiet provincial town, sleepily mulling over her colourful history. Then, in the last week of July, she suddenly wakes up and becomes a gay, exciting centre of culture and good cheer. Until the end of August music and drama lovers from all over the world gather there for the annual Festival held to the glory of her most celebrated native son, Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart, born 203 years ago. But not all of the thousands of visitors come to hear the distinguished artists featured in its plays and concerts (who, this year, include three Canadians: pianist Glen Gould and singers Pierrette Alarie and Leopold Simoneau).

Many pilgrims to Salzburg are there with cameras in tow to enjoy their first glimpse of the medieval castle-fortress of Hohensalzburg, dominating the city from its granite height plumb in the middle; the cool courtyards of the old patrician houses; the tree-shaded esplanades along both banks of the winding Salzach River; and the impressive cathedral, one of the largest and most perfect specimens of Italian Renaissance style north of the Alps, modelled on St. Peter's in Rome, and bounded on three sides by open squares.

The Romans founded Salzburg, the Barbarians destroyed her, a saint restored the city more than 1,200 years ago, and for a thousand years the castle was the seat of

autocratic archbishops. Two of them had considerable influence on Mozart's life. The good one encouraged him in his young days, and the bad one treated him with such ignorant arrogance that the composer was provoked into writing that he hated Salzburg and everybody in it.

But today everybody in Salzburg is extremely proud of Mozart, as Charles Wassermann discovered when he visited the city with his tape-recorder recently. Wandering through its festival halls, winding back streets, and sipping local beer in its friendly inns, he recorded the festival mood of Salzburg. CBC Trans-Canada network listeners will share it on Thursday night in the *Footloose* series.

The program begins with the fanfare especially composed for the Festival, which opens all performances. Among the other features recorded at the Festival is an excerpt from a Mozart symphony played by the Vienna Philharmonic Orchestra, a conversation with theatrical producer Ernst Lothar, and extracts from Hofmannsthal's morality play *Everyman*, which has been performed on a stage before the great portals of the cathedral in each of the Festival's 39 seasons. Listeners will visit the great open air theatre hewn out of a rock wall in the centre of the city, and some of the ripe old inns, where folk song, music and dance are part of every evening's entertainment.

Charles Wassermann is a Canadian writer who has spent the last few years in his native Austria and travelling around the Continent.
