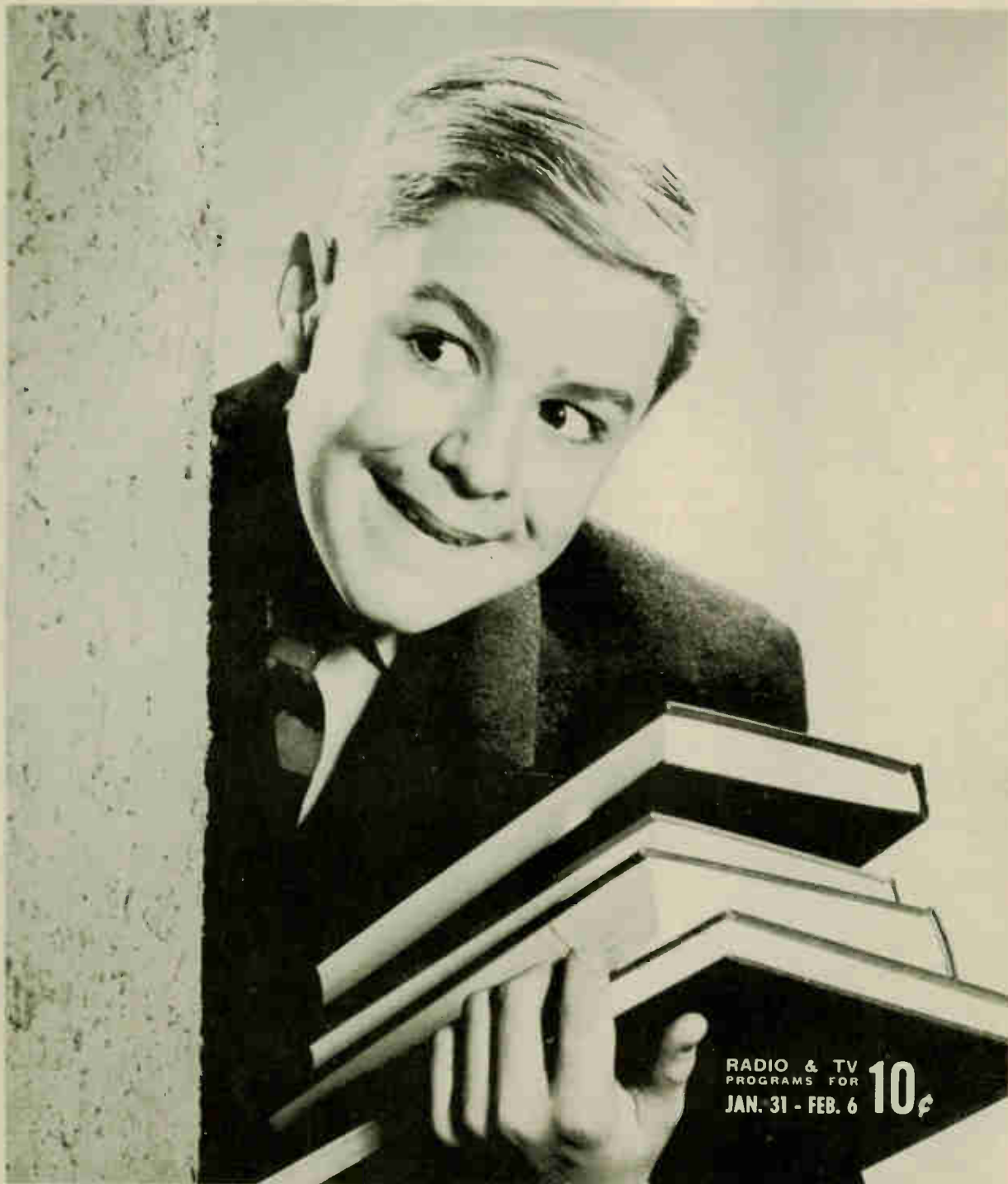

Shakespeare's "The Tempest"

SOMEHOW, Shakespeare and Bermuda just do not seem to go together. Shakespeare and England, of course; Shakespeare and Scotland, yes; Shakespeare and Rome, Shakespeare and France, Shakespeare and Verona—all of these. But not Shakespeare and Bermuda.

Yet there is a definite chain of events between the two and the first link is a violent storm that occurred off the coast of Bermuda in 1609. A British ship about 100 feet long called *Sea Venture*, got caught up in the storm while on her way to Jamestown, Virginia, with supplies. The crew of the ship "continually pumped for three days and three nights together without any intermission" (ran a contemporary account) but in vain: *Sea Venture* "fell between two rocks" and broke up. Broadcasting

— a greater challenge than ever

(Text of an address by J. ALPHONSE OUMET, President,
CBC, to the Canadian Club of Toronto)

I WAS DELIGHTED to accept your kind invitation to speak to you today about the CBC—not only because it is always a pleasure to meet fellow members of the Canadian Club, but also because, frankly, I like to talk about the CBC. But I must confess that when I get such an invitation I really wonder how people can take any more facts or opinions about the CBC.

Other than perhaps our Government—regardless of party—I know of no other organization that is so often talked about, written about, editorialized on, for and against, damned, slurred, supported, inquired into, ignored, blamed, upheld, detested, liked, criticized, or praised, as the CBC—and often by the same people.

The contradictory nature of the comment often floors us. On Monday we are too commercialized; on Tuesday—we should be more vigorously commercial; Wednesday—the CBC costs too much; Thursday—the CBC

should extend its services; on Friday—too much culture; Saturday—too much sport; Sunday—well, let's pretend it's a day of rest.

We are not too worried about this kind of thing because it is comment which usually balances itself out in the long run. But, in addition, there is some pretty fancy sophistry going on. The statements that evolve sound logical and believable. Yet any resemblance to the facts is not only coincidental, but miraculous.

About two weeks ago, I sat in a public meeting at Ottawa and, to my astonishment, heard it said that the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation was established to do only those things which private stations couldn't do. And I think the speaker believed it.

Within the past month, I have read or heard that the CBC is wasteful; that private enterprise can provide the same service "free"; that broadcasting is primarily a vehicle for advertising; that Canada cannot afford Canadian programming; that there is

no Canadian talent worth broadcasting; and that Canadians don't want Canadian programs.

I have never heard or read so much uninformed and negative nonsense in my life. I think it is more than high time that somebody said something positive about Canadian broadcasting as a change from this destructive and negative mythology which could, if unchecked, eventually threaten the effectiveness of our entire broadcasting system. That is what I should like to attempt today.

Canadian broadcasting is in a period of change—the first major changes in a quarter-century. These changes may well have a marked effect on how we use broadcasting, or allow broadcasting to use us, over the next twenty-five years. Within the past year we have had a new broadcasting act, and the appointment of two new broadcasting boards—one, a new regulatory body, the Board of Broadcast Governors; and the second, a new Board of Directors for the CBC. There has been a new division of broadcasting responsibilities. Both of these new boards have been busy taking positive action about Canadian broadcasting. I know you have read about the B.B.G.'s new regulations for television, so I won't repeat them. Meanwhile the CBC's Board of Directors has been taking a long, hard look at the foundations of the CBC. Within recent weeks our Board has issued public statements reaffirming the broad policies which are the very basis of the Corporation.

The CBC was first established by Parliament to operate a national broadcasting system. That was about twenty-five years ago. How many people remember what a national broadcasting system is—what it means to Canada?

I am going to restate the principles of national broadcasting, principles in which I believe, and try to explain what they mean to Canadians, and to the directors, management and staff of CBC.

There are four basic principles for a Canadian broadcasting service, each essential to anything we can truly call a national broadcasting service. These principles have been inherent in every study of Canadian broadcasting since the Aird Commission made its report in 1930. They have been restated in some form by every royal commission and every parliamentary broadcasting committee since then. And yet, despite these affirmations and reaffirmations, they are in great danger of

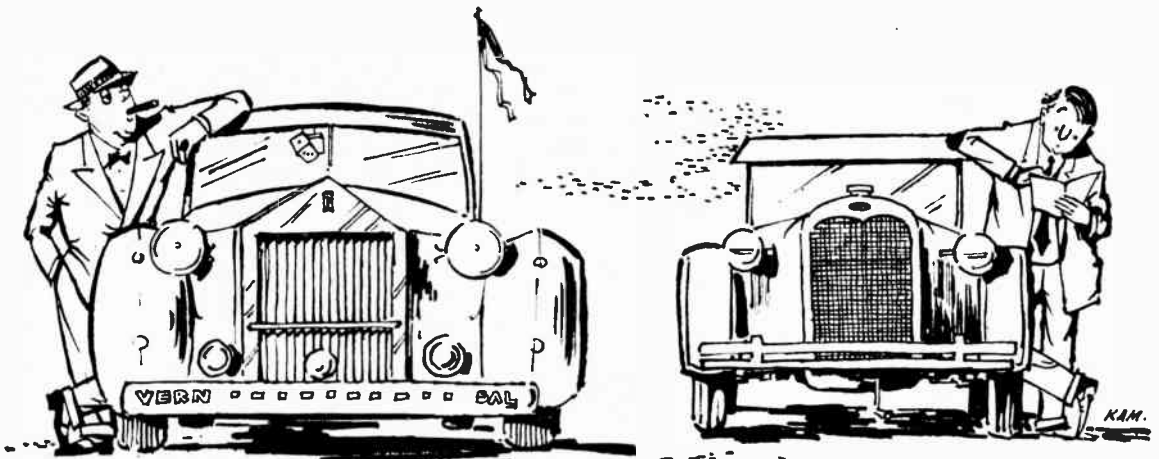

How "U" Are You?

A guide to class distinction in Canada, by A. D. Henry
of Edmonton

(Originally broadcast on "Prairie Talks")

A RECENT item in one of our national magazines pointed out that there is class distinction on Parliament Hill. Powder rooms on the Senate side are labelled "Ladies;" those on the Commons side just say "Women." This is a terrible commentary on the condition of the nation, when the decision as to who is upper class and who is lower class is left to the man who paints the labels on washroom doors. Given a free hand on the Commons side he might have gone even further and lowered the dignity of the House by adopting one of those coy subterfuges — "Lil Abner" and "Daisy Mae," "Guys" and "Dolls," or that sickener sometimes seen in tourist districts, "Braves" and "Squaws."

As a nation we are getting careless when we leave important matters like this to a sign painter. The Germans tried it once and it didn't work out at all well.

The painter may not be entirely to blame though; what with high salaries and low down payments, it's difficult to decide who is upper

class and who is lower class these days. For example, now that TV has come into our homes like a Trojan horse with its belly full of cowboys, the lower class and the upper classes have still one more thing in common. There are no exclusive channels for the upper crust, and the workman can watch *Gunsmoke* from just as good a seat as the industrialist that employs him. The workman can go one better, and have his soul uplifted by *Folio* while his boss still twitches to the roar of six-guns.

As the superficial differences between upper and lower classes become fewer, some people are going to more and more elaborate lengths to demonstrate that the situation is not as it appears to be. Although the workman and the upper income man may look alike as they pass each other in their motor boats on the lake, there are differences in their habits and attitudes which indicate their social status without the need of seeing their homes or their income tax returns.

Until recently, a great many people in the United States must

have fondly imagined that they were part of a classless society where mere acquisition of wealth was a passport to the drawing rooms and boudoirs of the upper echelons. Mr. Vance Packard, in his recent book "The Status Seekers," has shown that this is nothing but wishful thinking. There are enough barriers between classes to break the spirit of the most stout-hearted social climber. It looks as if the "log cabin to White House" routine is a thing of the past, which is interesting, because Americans are still quite smug about it.

Vance Packard has a terrifying opposite number in England by the name of Nancy Mitford. Everybody knows that there are basic differences between 'Arry 'Iggins of Clapham and the Honourable Percy Holinhead, of Superbly Manor. Miss Mitford doesn't dwell on these obvious things however, but analyzes the more subtle items which would still show 'Arry 'Iggins for his true self even if he inherited the estates and possessions of the Honourable Percy right down to the last gold cuff-link. Nancy must have done more to discourage social climbing in England than anyone since Oliver Cromwell.

She has been largely responsible for publicizing a method of label-

ling class characteristics which, by virtue of its simple terminology, very much encourages discussion. The traits which distinguish the upper classes are labelled with a capital letter "U" ("U" of course stands for upper class), and the characteristics of the middle and lower classes are labelled "non-U." We can gather that Nancy is a very "U" person indeed, and that it must be perfectly horrid to be "non-U."

A Nancy Mitford or a Vance Packard who set to work in this country to analyze the differences between the various classes of society would have a rather tricky task. We know that there is a top and a bottom to the social structure but, in between, things are so fuzzy around the edges that it's hard to tell where one class starts and another finishes. Certainly, almost any articulate Canadian could climb the social ladder if he had the desire and the opportunity. Once he had learned not to use such expressions as "I seen" and "I've went" and had learned to use a knife as well as a fork, he would be on his way.

Just now the search for the Canadian National Character is on, and if it keeps going at its present pace someone is going to come along fairly soon and present the thing plausibly enough for everyone to believe him. Somehow, in exploring the complexities of the Canadian character he's going to have to discuss the differences between people like C. D. Howe, John Fisher and Jake of *Jake and the Kid*. To do this, unless he can think up a new word, he's going to have to mention "class."

At this point, without doubt, some slumbering Nancy Mitford will arise and catalogue everything that Canadians do as either U or non-U. The standards are likely to be impossibly high, such as never burping, even when alone, or never cutting toe nails with sewing scissors. Before this happens we should head this woman off (somehow I feel sure it's going to be a woman) by setting standards of U-status which are as low as is decently possible and which are attainable by any ordinary Cana-

dian who's at all interested. In other words, if we can develop a sort of do-it-yourself status assessment kit, the social climbers among us can still float merrily to the top like champagne bubbles, unhindered by a Mitford or a Packard.

We have no aristocracy in Canada to set our U-precedents, so luckily the Mitford blue-blooded approach is out. Our society isn't yet stratified to the same extent as U.S. society, therefore an adaptation of the standards as propounded by Mr. Packard wouldn't apply to us. The best thing that we can do is to start from scratch, even though it means some of our assessments of what is U and what is non-U are bound to be rather arbitrary.

However, we must be careful not to measure U-status merely by the extent of a man's material possessions, because this would set a false standard. While we normally connect the upper classes with wealth, and hence wealth with U-status, wealth and U-status are far from being the same thing, even by English and U.S. standards. Mr. Vance Packard's egg-head is accepted in high society, although his salary is just peanuts compared with the rest of the people at the cocktail parties he attends. Nancy Mitford's impoverished gentlefolk are as U as they could be, but they haven't a penny to their name. The only practical way to assess a person's U-status is to observe what he does with the material possessions that he has, and to interpret the quirks of his day to day behaviour in terms of U and non-U.

Most assessments of U-status would be easy if automobiles were the true gauge of social standing that many people take them to be, but this method of assessment is out. Some very non-U persons drive what might otherwise be quite U-type cars and vice versa. Cars can provide useful clues though, because non-U drivers often betray their status in one way or another.

One sure-fire way is to plaster the trunk of the car with red

being submerged by the kind of misleading and distorted statements I have already mentioned.

1. Complete Service

The first principle is that a national service must be a complete service. A national service cannot be merely for one section of the population. It cannot be only for hockey fans, or teen-agers, or men, or women, or lowbrows, or highbrows. It can and must be for all of them.

There are people who say the CBC was created to do only those things the private stations cannot do. This, in their opinion, means the production of "cultural" programs in the narrowest sense of the word. They would relegate CBC to the status of a free program-bank from which private stations could draw what they wished when they wished.

Nowhere is there a reference in any act, or in any royal commission report, or the report of any parliamentary committee, to suggest that CBC was created solely for such a purpose.

The CBC is proud of the role it has played in providing our listeners and viewers with the best that Canadians can produce in programs of artistic and intellectual excellence. We intend to continue our attempts to please the exacting tastes of the connoisseurs, and to offer new and even more challenging fare from time to time.

But we see our responsibilities as something much broader than this. It is the responsibility of the CBC to produce the best programs possible over a very wide range of program fare. A national broadcasting service must have something for everyone. Canadian culture embrace everything from sled-dog races to symphony orchestras, from comedy to opera, from good talks to jazz. A national broadcasting service must recognize this.

Any narrower view of a national broadcasting service would destroy the purpose of CBC as a unifying force in Canada. If CBC were to direct its programs only to arbitrarily selected social and economic groups, excluding others, we would no longer be a unifying force, but a divisive force—a force dividing the nation and doing irreparable harm to our aspirations as a people and as a nation.

As individuals there is little or no limit to the speed or extent of our

The CKX-TV Story . . . Five Years on Channel 5

CKX-TV in Brandon, Manitoba, began operations January 28, 1955. At this time the staff was made up completely of local talent, none of whom had any previous experience in television. Management can well remember the fine co-operation given to CKX-TV by CBC Winnipeg. CKX-TV became the first private station in the west to have a two-camera operation and boasts the largest studio in this part of Canada.

In 1955 programs were telecast only four hours a night, and local shows numbered three. Now, five years later, viewers can watch their sets twelve hours a day and Brandon-produced programs have tripled in number.

CKX-TV will celebrate its fifth anniversary on Channel 5 with a special ninety-minute production (8:00-9:30 p.m.) featuring western

and central Manitoba talent discovered and developed by CKX-TV. J. B. Craig, president and general manager of Western Manitoba Broadcasters Limited, will open the program; Mayor James Creighton and Tom Ryles, CKX-TV's first sponsor, will also take part in the opening ceremonies. The history of CKX-TV will be presented on film, and segments of the nine "live" shows presented regularly on Channel 5 will be shown.

During Anniversary Month CKX-TV is sponsoring a "Fifth Anniversary Card Contest." A 21-inch and a 17-inch TV set will be given as prizes. The major prize will be awarded to the person who submits "the most original" anniversary card. A number of special movies and features will be presented during CKX-TV's Fifth Anniversary Week to thank viewers for their support.

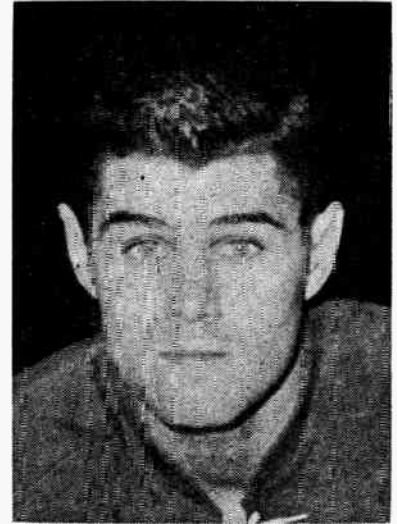

12 and as a goal-tender. His first love was baseball and he was determined to make the major leagues in the U.S. He still plays the game in and around Dauphin, Manitoba and in fact, batted .422 in 1958 and .316 last year.

He started as a goalie in the Pee Wee league because only goalies were furnished with all the equipment they needed. The other players had to buy their own.

Bob says, "It took them three years to find out how lousy I was in the nets because I had such a good team in front of me. I had nine straight shut-outs and in all those games I stopped only 11 shots."

After finishing his Junior career with the Saskatoon Wesleys Kabel played a year each in the Western and Quebec leagues without any notable success. Then he moved back to Saskatoon to play for Frank Boucher's Western League Club. Kabel came into his own under Boucher scoring 23 goals in '57-58 and 28 goals last season. Together with a fast start with this year's edition of the Vancouver Canucks, Kabel's work earned him a trial when the Rangers floundered early this year. His performance so far has made him one of the season's top rookies.

Bob Kabel stands 6' 1½" and weighs a solid 183 lbs. He was born, raised and still resides in Dauphin, with his wife Joan and daughter Kathy.—D. H. O'Neill.

Members of the expedition returned to England (though Admiral Somers is supposed to have died in Bermuda in 1610 "of a surfeit of eating a pig") and several of them published accounts of the wreck. Shakespeare apparently read one of these, and got the idea for a play: *The Tempest*. This Wednesday the CBC will carry the NBC production of Shakespeare's

It is appropriate that *The Tempest* should be selected for production at this time. A wreck, largely agreed to be that of the *Sea Venture*, has been found off the coast of Bermuda, and it is hoped to raise it sometime this year.

Credit for discovering the wreck goes to Edmund Downes, a Virginian who claims descent from one of the survivors of the *Sea Venture*. Learning from an old document that the wreck occurred roughly three-quarters of a mile from shore, he looked for the "two rocks" between which the ship fell. Skin-diving, Downes found the wreck at five fathoms. P. M. Wright, a retired Canadian engineer and naval historian considered the evidence, weighed up about 15 different factors, such as line, armament, length, and so on, decided that this was indeed the *Sea Venture*.

Set designer for *The Tempest*, Rouben Ter-Arutunian, has not relied on Bermuda for his settings. The nine sets are imaginative and

fanciful rather than realistic in keeping with the play; for *The Tempest*, of course, abounds in magic, tricks, and (in Shakespeare's own phrase) other "quaint devices." One shimmering plastic hill cost \$14,000 to construct. Safety was an important factor in designing the sets. Ariel, the sprite, has to jump from rocks ranging from four to 11 feet high.

"I had to make sure the rocks were large enough to stand on," said Ter-Arutunian, "and at the same time small enough for the camera shots."

One critic has said of this play, "*The Tempest*, perhaps Shakespeare's last complete play, is his fitting epilogue. While crowning his latest phase it recalls his past work, containing tragic action political wisdom, delicate lyrics, fairy lore, low comedy, young love, cruel and bestial action. But there are unique features too. Caliban and Ariel extend the already incredible range of character, and show Shakespeare still the unexhausted creator even in the act of summing up. And to heighten the achievement he disposes all this variety in a form both exceptionally brief and which keep the unities of time place and action.

Sherwood) to be unfaithful, he discovers with horror his nickname (all the worse because he remembers the ideals with which he started teaching)—when suddenly one of his pupils, young Taplow (played by Hayward Morse), appears with a farewell gift. From this incident follows the drama of conflict between Crocker-Harris, his wife, and her lover, Frank Hunter (played by Patrick Macnee).

Terence Rattigan writes plays about people, not about ideas. "I rejoice in the death of the play of ideas," he once wrote, "and the re-emergence since the war, in Europe as in America, of the play that unashamedly says nothing—except possibly that human beings are strange creatures and worth putting on the stage."

Star of this week's TV version of *The Browning Version*, Eric Portman, has been to Canada before: in 1940 he played a German U-boat commander escaping through Canada to neutral United States in *The 49th Parallel*, some of which was shot in the Gulf of St. Lawrence in sub-zero temperatures.

Nor is Portman any stranger to the plays of Terence Rattigan. He starred in the highly successful Rattigan doublebill *The Browning Version* and *Harlequinade* in London and in the equally successful Broadway production of *Separate Tables*.

Madeleine Sherwood, the Montreal-born actress who has had considerable success on Broadway in recent years, will play Millie, Crocker-Harris's unfaithful wife. Miss Sherwood made her stage debut with the Repertory Theatre of Montreal and her Broadway debut in the Horton Foote play, *The Chase*, replacing Kim Stanley. She has also appeared on Broadway in Arthur Miller's *The Crucible* (in which she played Abigail) and Williams' *Cat on a Hot Tin Roof*. She repeated her role in the latter's filmed production.

MUSIC ON RADIO

by BOYD NEEL

GEORGE PHILIPP TELEMANN can be heard several times this week. A contemporary of Bach and Handel, he was a self-taught musician who, in his lifetime, was considered to be greater than either of the other two famous men. He wrote a vast amount of music which included over forty settings of the Passion, forty operas and 600 overtures. Of course, we must remember that in those days works of this kind did not necessarily mean that they were very long or involved compositions, but all the same, it is a pretty good record for one lifetime.

He seems to have spent most of his life at Hamburg, like so many other famous musicians of the day. Handel is supposed to have said that Telemann "could write a motet in eight parts as easily as anyone else could write a letter." Telemann, himself, is supposed to have said that a proper composer should be able to "set a placard to music," and this gives some idea of his attitude to composition.

The flute was one of his favourite instruments and he has written some charming music for it. Telemann's stock today is not very high, and posterity has certainly not agreed with the opinion of his contemporaries, but all the same, he is worth hearing now and then, even if only to make us recognize the fact that there was more going on during the lives of Bach and Handel than we usually realize.

At the Toronto Symphony concert on Tuesday (Dominion and French networks) something of a historical event will take place. The first work ever to be commissioned by the orchestra for its symphony series will be heard. It is a symphony by Oskar Morawetz, the well known Toronto composer, and it was commissioned a year ago.

The work is in two movements which are connected together, the music being continuous throughout. Dr. Morawetz tells me that it is of straightforward construction and written for a normal orchestra. It is indeed good to see large new Canadian compositions being played at important concerts such as these.

In 1919 Diaghilev commissioned a ballet from Hindemith, and it was to be on a mystical subject. Hindemith does not seem to have done anything about it for many years, and it was not until 1937, long after Diaghilev's death, that he produced the commissioned work. It was on the life of St. Francis of Assisi, and had its first performance in London in 1938. For a few years after that it was known in America as "St. Francis" but it appears to have dropped out of the repertory since the war.

Soon after the ballet was written Hindemith made a concert piece from the original score, taking five parts of the ballet and making them into a three-movement suite. I see that we are to hear this splendid work on the CBC Symphony concert Friday night. The various episodes which Hindemith took to make the suite are from the Introduction, which shows St. Francis in prayer and meditation; the scene representing "the mystic union of the saint with Mistress Poverty;" the military episode in which a troop of medieval soldiers march across the stage; the appearance of the three women—Chastity, Submissiveness, and Poverty; and the magnificent passacaglia called The Hymn to the Sun.

This is one of the most splendid ballet scores written in our time and it seems a great pity that the work is never danced to nowadays. Perhaps with this sudden revival of the music in Toronto (the TSO played it recently, too), the National Ballet will be stimulated to put it on the stage.

Mr. Graham Steed of Windsor has taken me to task over my remarks on Christmas music. He seems very upset that I do not consider Menotti's *Amahl*, the *Christmas Cantata* of Vaughan Williams, or the *Ceremony of Carols* of Benjamin Britten to be great music. I am very sorry, Mr. Steed, but I do not think that if I live to be 100 I will ever consider these works to be great music, and I am sure the worthy composers of these pieces would be the first to agree with me. Each of these works is excellent entertainment in its own way, and some of it is extremely beautiful, but I would never have thought it possible that anybody could rank them among the great masterpieces of this world.

Mr. Steed seems to imagine that I have overlooked the three works he mentions. I do not know why he should think this, because the whole point of my article was that there is not—with one single exception — ANY great musical composition which concerns itself *entirely* with Christmas, and I am afraid I must maintain my views on the subject.

development toward full maturity. We can largely proceed at our own self-chosen pace, ignoring, if we choose, our contemporaries. But as a nation, our growth is governed by the sum total of our development as individuals. Until the advent of mass communications, starting with the printing press, national development as we know it today was unknown. Today our communications allow us to share many things, whether we are white-collar workers, blue-collar, artists, scholars, or what have you. Rich and poor alike can share according to their taste. Mass communications can continually expose us to new experiences in entertainment and in ideas. The scholar can be drawn from his books by Wayne and Shuster or even wrestling, while the wrestling fan can find himself watching—and listening—to "Fighting Words" or "Close-up" or an interview with Vincent Massey. Both grow a little in the process, and as a nation we are that much richer in terms of our people's maturity.

Culture is no one-way street. Good comedy is for everyone, and so are good music, good variety, good drama, impartial news, and stimulating talk. Why should we use the greatest impact media we have yet discovered to divide our people culturally? I do not believe Canadians want cultural segregation. The CBC has never catered exclusively to a particular segment of our population. Consequently, CBC radio and television have already broadened the fields of interest and enjoyment of all groups.

Those of you who have watched the development of broadcasting know—as was testified before the Massey and Fowler commissions—that CBC radio introduced good music and drama to thousands who had never theretofore been exposed to it. CBC television has perhaps gone deeper into the mass audience to interest people in drama, opera, ballet, talks, personalities, and national and international matters. At the same time, perhaps our minorities have learned something of the interest and tastes of other people. Most everyone is in some manner richer, and there is a far wider and greater community of interest today than there was in pre-television or pre-radio days.

And so, to repeat the first basic principle, CBC believes a national broadcasting service must be a complete service, covering in fair propor-

tion the whole range of programming; bringing things of interest, value, and entertainment to people of all tastes, ages, and interests.

2. A Vital Link

The second principle is that a national broadcasting service must link all parts of the country. It must do this in two ways. I have already mentioned the first—the inclusion of a wide variety of national and common interests in its program services. This linking of Canada also means the use of our physical broadcast resources to bring the national program service to as many Canadians as finances allow. Because of this basic principle there are relatively few places in Canada which do not have broadcasting links with the rest of the country.

Some 98 per cent of Canadians are linked by radio. Within the past year this service has been further extended into the far north. Nine new CBC stations have been established at Dawson, Whitehorse, Yellowknife, Hay River, Fort Smith, Churchill, Goose Bay, Fort Nelson, and Watson Lake—and more are to follow eventually. In television, over 80 per cent of our population is within range of Canadian service—and we'd like that percentage increased.

This is what we mean by linking all parts of the country. Through the co-operation of public and private enterprise the job is being done. A national service should be available on an equitable basis to listeners and viewers in city, town, village, rural and remote areas alike. Where this cannot be achieved immediately, it should become a long-range project.

Television has practically made itself essential to modern living. Every day—like Perry Como—we get letters. These letters come from the many parts of Canada still without tele-

vision. They come from areas of small or scattered population, and from the frontier areas of Canada. They are written in clear, unmistakable English—or French. These people want television, and demand television. They consider it essential. And the more isolated the community, the greater it sees its need for television.

Canadians look to a national broadcasting service to provide common bonds of interest and to be an intangible but vital link between our people and our communities.

3. Predominantly Canadian

The third requisite of a national broadcasting service is that it must be predominantly Canadian in content and character. While Canadians are entitled to receive, and do receive, some of the best broadcasting fare obtainable from other countries, the national service must place a priority on Canadian needs, thus contributing to the development and preservation of a sense of national unity.

Straight entertainment must always be part of our service. It is wanted

and needed. But there are unlimited opportunities for all types of interesting programming with its own excitement, variety, and strength. You may recall CBC's election coverage, the royal visits, and the opening of the Seaway. Then there are educational broadcasts, forums, debates, talks and interviews on national events, and so on. I firmly believe that in television we have only begun to tap these and other possibilities.

But it is not enough for a broadcaster in this country to carry out only the responsibility of developing Canadian programs. He must also produce programs which are Canadian—and good. The national service must and does accept that responsibility.

4. Bi-cultural and Regional Needs

The fourth principle is that a national broadcasting system must serve equitably the two main language groups and cultures, and the special needs of Canada's various geographical regions. We are officially a two-language country, by law and by tradition. Approximately one-third of Canadians are French-speaking. This is reflected in the CBC operation—in its networks (because we operate separate English and French networks in radio and television), its staffs, its effort, and its expenditures. This is done not in any arbitrary way, but in a way which we sincerely believe to be equitable. As a national broadcasting service, the CBC has the responsibility of contributing to the parallel development of our two main cultures and of bringing these cultures closer to mutual understanding and appreciation.

With the exception of Parliament itself, I am not certain what other Canadian institutions can claim to be this national in scope. Certainly not many, and I know of none the size or significance of CBC.

While Canada is big nationally, it is also big regionally. And, as you know, many of our geographic divisions are large enough to swallow entire nations in terms of size. This means a responsibility for the national

TRANS-CANADA MATINEE

Our Shortage of Women Scientists. Women are always being criticized about something, according to Ottawa free-lance broadcaster Janet Clendenan. Most recently, they've been taken to task because not enough of them in Canada have taken up careers in science. Mrs. Clendenan thinks it's because Canadian women don't want careers—of any kind.

Indonesia. Felix Greene, an English journalist who lives in California, has recently completed a trip to the Far East. Last week, he gave Matinee listeners an up-to-date glimpse of Hong Kong; today, he describes Indonesia. This talk was heard originally on Post-News Talks.

Balancing the Budget. Betty Shapiro, a Montreal broadcaster who is heard frequently on Trans-Canada Matinee, today begins a new series about family budgeting. Mrs. Shapiro has visited a number of families in and around Montreal—families whose annual income does not exceed \$4,000.00 - and has asked them frankly how they spend their money. She's talked to a milkman, a farmer, a family in a small town, a university teacher and a family in the suburbs. In today's broadcast, Mrs. Shapiro visits a French-Canadian milkman, his wife and their four children - three daughters and an adopted son. He pays \$35 a month rent, owns a car and a cottage. The family has sacrificed housing conditions for their cottage. He gives all but \$10 of his weekly wage to his wife; the \$10 he puts in the bank. He's absolutely opposed to credit buying and he's been able to give his daughters secretarial courses so that they may have white-collar jobs.

system to devote part of each day, in radio and in television, to programming for the specific needs of British Columbia, The Prairies, Ontario, Quebec, the Maritimes, and Newfoundland. And as I mentioned earlier, this year we are starting to improve our service in our north country. Add these seven regional needs to the four national services operated by CBC and it provides a good idea of the widespread service which any truly national broadcasting service must maintain.

I have outlined four basic principles for national broadcasting—a complete service, one which links all parts of the country, is predominantly Canadian in content and character, and serves our two main cultures equitably. These are the really basic considerations. And yet, you see very little of them in print these days and they are too infrequently heard in any discussion of Canadian broadcasting. It is important to remember them because they are the very foundation on which Canadians have built what I believe to be one of the best broadcasting systems in the world, and certainly the best for Canada.

The system has two component parts—the CBC and the privately-owned stations. Many of these stations are affiliated with the CBC in the distribution of the national service in many areas of Canada. I should like

fluorescent tape, indicating that Vern habitually sits on one side of the car and Sal at the other. Another good way is to have a whole array of gew-gaws festooned around the windshield. Some very non-U persons try to achieve U-status by covering the rear windows of their cars with travel strickers to show that they have really been around. Such display is in itself non-U, and thus they defeat their own purpose. They fall into the same category as those non-U persons who like to advertise their recent trip to Mexico by pointedly pronouncing it "May-Hicko." A good U-man, undaunted by this display of pedantry, can always correct the situation by swinging the talk around to Deutschland, Nederland or Espana.

Fancy table manners have long been considered a prime feature of upper class elegance, but they shouldn't be cited as a test of U-status. So long as the subject under observation doesn't slurp his soup, chew with his mouth open or make his toothpick loom too large, he gets a passing mark. If eating habits are to be studied as a stringent test of U-status, it's more rewarding to watch not how a man eats, but where he eats when he has a choice. A good U-man will, so far as is possible, studiously avoid non-U restaurants.

Since one non-U restaurant is very much like another, the student of U-status can recognize them fairly easily. The menus are printed in fuzzy, faded blue lettering. Other than potatoes, only two vegetables are recognized, these being wax beans and string beans. The waitress saunters up to the table and leans against it without uttering a word, waiting to hear what her victim wants to eat, all the time gazing at some fixed point over his head. A U-person trapped in a non-U restaurant can bring about an interesting situation at this stage by resolving not to order until the waitress asks him what he wants. The waitress looks on it as a point of honour not to speak

first, and the tension mounts. Tests show however, that the U-person invariably gives way under the strain and mumbles his order beneath the withering glance of the still silent waitress.

It's often worthwhile to study drinking habits when assessing a person's U-status, not only because these habits in themselves provide valuable information, but during the course of the session the subject is apt to drop any recently acquired U-mannerisms.

To drink beer straight from the bottle when clean glasses are available is clearly a non-U habit. If the subject is noticed to wipe germs from the mouth of the bottle with the palm of his hand between swallows it indicates that he is confirmed in the habit and is not drinking from the bottle out of mere bravado. A U-person when serving beer will pour the entire contents of the bottle into a glass or tankard large enough to take the full amount. Non-U persons rarely use a large enough glass, seeming to prefer under-sized glasses of the type commonly found in beverage rooms.

The habits of whisky drinkers do not vary so greatly between the U and the non-U, except that the non-U's normally disclaim the use of any mix more elaborate than water. They reach the zenith of their bar-tending technique when they learn to hold a finger under the tap to see if the water is cold enough to slosh into the rye. It's interesting to note that non-U whisky drinkers will refer to a bottle as a "jug" or a "crock," from which is derived the non-U passive verb "to be crocked."

While the assessment of U-status might reasonably remain at the level of an absorbing pastime,

it's possible that the relative ease with which the thing is carried through may encourage a host of minor Emily Posts to commence operations in our newspapers. If they enter into the proper spirit of the thing they'll serve a useful purpose in silencing a budding Nancy Mitford.

Here's how it might go:

Question: Can a person's U-status be determined by the number of books on his shelves?

Answer: Not entirely, but the possession of more than six books with hard covers shows strong U-inclinations. (A set of encyclopedias counts as one book).

Question: Is regular horseback riding (for exercise) evidence of U-status?

Answer: Yes, provided the rider does not feel it necessary to dress up as a cowboy.

Question: Can it be safely said that indications of U-status are standard across Canada?

Answer: Normally, yes; what is U in Halifax should be U in Victoria, though some emblems of U-status may vary in significance between locations. For example, carrying a well-rolled umbrella is a sign of normal U-status in Vancouver, whereas in Saskatoon it would represent the lunatic fringe.

There are some U-assessments which aren't too easy to make. These are the exasperating borderline cases, where the subject has both U and non-U characteristics in what seem to be equal measure. These tricky cases can often be solved though, by applying a simple rule. This rule is this: the non-U people are always below the particular social level of the observer.
