Another TV Station for Edmonton . . .

# CBXT, Channel 5

COMING SOON! Something "X-tra" for Edmonton television viewers. CBXT, the new station with the know-how, goes on the air October 1st, on Channel 5.

The newest of Canada's 17 CBC-owned television stations will reflect experience and competence gained during the Corporation's 25 years of operation. It will be a key station in the CBC television network, bringing to Edmonton viewers a complete network service that will be basically Canadian in content and character but including the best programming from other countries as well.

Added to this will be local programming with a distinctive Edmonton flavor, for broadcast not only in Edmonton itself but to the other 16 CBC-owned stations and 48 privately-owned affiliated stations on the longest microwave system in the world.

As befits a newcomer, the station will be managed by a young and aggressive team:

The manager is Ralph L. Horley, 40, of Moose Jaw; the program director is Barry McCorquodale, 33, of Winnipeg; Peter Burgess, the technical director is 33; C. J. Barr, the commercial manager is 31; the editor-in-charge of TV news is Herbert Nixon, 32, and the chief technical producer is George Hennan, 34.

Channel 5 will have the most powerful low band transmitter in North America. Its antenna, 181 feet long, is the largest in Canada. A tower raises the antenna height to 630 feet.

CBXT's studios are to be in the new CBC building now nearing completion at 75th Street and 89th Avenue.

Equipment being installed is of the most advanced design. There are seven television cameras. Channel 5 will have its own mobile unit — a complete TV control room on wheels. It's on display at the Edmonton Exhibition.

In addition, the new CBC station will have a VTR Cruiser—a mobile videotape unit complete with camera, videotape machine and generator.

Inside the new CBC Building there will be two television studios.

**World of Sport**

• Congratulations on your Canadian Track Field telecast on Saturday, June 24. My only complaint was that it was too short and you don't have enough of such telecasts. I hope that I will be able to see more broadcasts of this calibre on your station. — *P.S., Winnipeg.*

A PRECEDENT will be set when the CBW (Manitoba) Church Service for Sunday, August 13th is taped at the Trappist Monastery in St. Norbert. Father C. M. Keenan, chairman of the Winnipeg Religious Advisory Council to the CBC, says this is the first such broadcast from the monastery. Producer is Harry Randall, and technician is Ron Pambrun.

The Trappist, or Cistercian, monks are members of the Order of Cistercians of the Strict Observance, a religious order of the Roman Catholic Church, founded in 1098. The Abbey of Our Lady of the Prairies at St. Norbert, nine miles south of Winnipeg, was founded in 1892 by monks from the monastery of Bellefontaine in France. The community presently numbers some 40 religious monks and brothers, of which about 32 are professed members.

The life of a monk, whether choir, religious or lay brother, is composed mainly of prayer, manual labor and spiritual reading. The community arises at 2:15 a.m. each day, and the first four hours are devoted to prayer and spiritual exercises. The choir monks devote from four to five hours each day to the chanting of the Divine Office, which is composed mainly of the Psalms. The brothers have a similar office, but it is said in the vernacular and shortened somewhat.

Part of the day is spent working the farm, which helps to make the monastery as self-supporting as possible. Income is derived through the sale of milk, eggs, cheese, honey and grains.

The meals of the community are simple but substantial. Vegetables and dairy products make up the diet of most, with meat, fish and eggs reserved for the sick and aged. A light breakfast of coffee, bread, butter, cheese or honey is served. Dinner, the main meal, consists usually of generous portions of thick soup, potatoes, a cooked vegetable, a salad (if available), bread, tea or milk, and a dessert of fresh or cooked fruit. Supper consists of soup or cereal, cheese or jam, bread, and tea or milk. Liberal use of cheese, beans and fresh vegetables provides sufficient nourishment for those in good health.

The periods set aside for manual labor are interspersed with times for prayer and spiritual reading. During the winter, those studying for the priesthood are occupied with classes and lectures in the mornings, and perform manual labor in the afternoons. In the summer, particularly during the harvest, almost everyone works in the fields.

The monks retire to bed at 8:00 p.m. in the summer, and are allowed an hour's rest after dinner. During the winter they retire at 7:00 p.m., but do not take the rest period after dinner.

# Can You FORETELL THE FUTURE?

*CBC Trans-Canada Radio's Friday evening show E.S.P. is embarking on a mass experiment to test the ability of the readers of a national magazine to foretell the future*

OF ALL THE known phenomena of this world of ours, none is more difficult to believe than that of precognition. Familiarly known as prophecy, throughout time men have held in great esteem those considered successful practitioners of the art. But however they have been regarded, prophets have been held to possess powers, not of this world, but divine or supernatural.

Phophecy is hardly less mysterious today than ever before. Whether regarded from the viewpoint of common-sense or of theoretical science, the ability to predict events that have as yet no existence and to do so beyond the range of rational inference appears uncanny and unreal. On the face of things, any such knowledge of future events seems a reversal of the principle of causation, getting the cart before the horse, the effect before the cause.

And yet, of all the thousands of cases related to Henry Comor, writer and narrator of the radio series E.S.P. (Fridays) nearly half concern instances of what appears to be precognition. Some of them appear to be well on the way to becoming classics of their kind.

Take, for example, the story of the Hungarian lady, now living in Montreal. When her son was three years old, she dreamt of a graveyard and the burial of a small coffin, which somehow appeared to her to contain the body of a boy 11 years old. When she woke up she wondered whether the dream signified that her son would die at age 11. Of course, she brushed

the thought aside as impossible. Some years later, the Russians were advancing on Hungary and the lady and her son left Budapest for the sake of safety. After several weeks the mother began having the same nightmare night after night. In it she saw her son standing in his winter coat in the living room of the house in Budapest. Suddenly, the little boy would bring his hands to cover his face, and run out of the living room into the garden and fall face first into a wading pool. For three weeks she had the same dream, every night. Then, thinking the Russians were still a long way from the city, she and her son went back to their house to fetch some things they had left behind. As they were standing in the living room, a shell struck the house and shrapnel hit the boy in the face. He was standing in his winter coat and, screaming with pain, his hands over his face, he ran wildly into the garden and fell, face first into the wading pool—dead. He was three days short of his eleventh birthday.

Of course, stories like that one, however impressive, cannot be called proof that precognition exists. Proof requires scientifically controlled experiments, repeated over and over again. That is what parapsychologists, like Dr. Rhine at Duke University, have been attempting to do for the past 30 years. Slowly but surely, refining his techniques, overcoming the difficulties as they arose, Dr. Rhine has produced conclusive evidence that precognition does exist, so that

now it can be regarded as scientifically proven fact.

But how widespread is this power to foretell the future? Do men possess it more than women? Or women more than men? Does age make any difference? Or geographical location? These are largely unknowns and when Comor asked Dr. Rhine if there was any way in which he could test the listeners in the series E.S.P., Rhine saw immediately the possibility of finding some of the answers. He suggested that listeners be asked to forecast a series of ten numbers (any digit from zero to nine) that would be printed on a card that they would be given. He pointed out that each listener must have a different target number to aim for, to overcome the possibility that popularity of certain numbers (three or nine for example) would obscure the result. This, of course, had been the stumbling block which had pre-

vented the experiment being attempted before.

However, back in Toronto, a national magazine has expressed willingness to collaborate with the CBC and the parapsychology laboratory at Duke University (under Dr. Rhine) and facilitate the first mass E.S.P. experiment in history.

In a forthcoming issue of the magazine there is to be inserted a card on which readers can make an entry in the experiment. They fill in the ten spaces on the card with any ten digits that they think will be printed on the card at some time in the future. The cards will be processed by computing machines that record the number of correct guesses made.

By chance, participants can expect to have one correct out of ten. For those whose score is three or more, the supposition will be that they are showing a possible pre-cognitive ability and they will be asked to participate in further similar tests to discover those Canadian men and women who most likely are able to predict the future. Overall the experiment will answer those questions mentioned before.

What will the results of the experiment be? Nobody knows, unless he is one of those Canadian prophets we are out to find. Whatever the results are, positive or negative, they will be made the basis of a special one hour program to be heard on October 1.

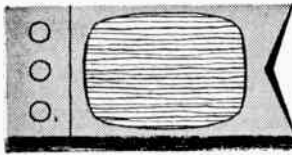

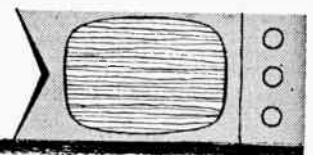

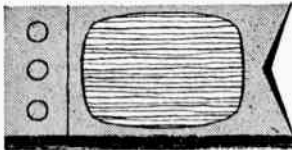

# Study in Suspense

IN BRITAIN playwright Jacques Gillies has a reputation for great inventiveness and a knack for creating and maintaining suspense. TV producer Quentin Lawrence has translated these qualities tautly to the British screen on several occasions with outstanding success. The two have collaborated again in *The Takers*, an ingenious mystery to be seen Sunday night on CBC-TV's *General Motors Presents*.

Well-known British film, stage and TV actor Donald Houston stars as the master-mind behind the mystery. He still sports the beard he needed for his recent Old Vic portrayals.

The subject of the play is kidnapping, with a ransom running into thousands of pounds, to be paid in jewelry owned by the fifth richest man in the world, Baron Van der Zost. The Baron, played by Guy Degby, with his wife (Mary

Barclay) and their attractive blonde daughter, Inga (Joy Webster), are staying in a penthouse at one of London's poshest hotels. Also along are the Baron's private secretary, Alain (Peter Allenby), and his French detective, Boucard (Patrick Wymark), who ultimately spots the all-important flaw in the otherwise perfect crime.

While the Baron, a cripple who walks with two canes, is holding a lighthearted press conference in the hotel, Boucard and a team of detectives are finalizing plans for safeguarding the Baron, his family and their huge fortune in jewelry which they have brought along with them.

In a seamier part of London, other plans are afoot to relieve the Baron of his treasure. The master-mind behind the plot is Hartley Downing, played by Houston. Downing is an introspective Irish-

man with little time for the blarney and little sense of humor. But he has a brilliant, ice-cold brain that is ideal for working out fine detail, and, strangely, a liking for roses. He has chosen Wilkie, a fellow Irishman, for his chief aide in executing his ingenious kidnap plot. Wilkie is his exact opposite. He hates 'them'—the rich, and authority. He wants to use violence to ensure the success of the plot.

Vital to the plan is Charmain Scott, played by Dorothy White. At the right moment she must be ready to don a blonde wig and impersonate the ultra-fashionable Inga. Then, and only then, can the cunningly prepared scheme (which includes a split-second time-table and an intimate knowledge of the hotel staff and of the building itself) be put into action.

Donald Houston had to acquire a slight Irish accent for this videotaped ATV production. He was born in Tonypany, Wales, in 1923. He made his stage debut at 14 on a tour with *Journey's End*. Later he joined the Pilgrim Players and toured until he was 18. He served in the RAF for two years, and then joined the Oxford Repertory Company. He made his London debut in 1947, and a year later made a film, *The Blue Lagoon*, the first of many. One of his latest was *Room at the Top*. He starred in London and on the Broadway stage in Dylan Thomas' *Under Milk Wood*, and played Peter Quilpe in T. S. Eliot's *The Cocktail Party* at the Edinburgh Festival and at the New Theatre in London in 1950. His career keeps him busy on both sides of the Atlantic. Between performances he relaxes far from the theatrical crowd. His favourite recreations are listening to his large collection of records, watching cricket and football games, and "just pottering about."

## A 14th Century

# Life of Christ

*The Life of Christ, as told by Medieval scriptures, is to be presented Saturday, July 22, by CBC Trans-Canada Radio on Four's Company. Here, producer John Reeves explains how the program was put together*

by JOHN REEVES, Producer, Four's Company

THIS PROGRAM grew from small beginnings scattered over the last two years. During the week before Christmas in 1959 I was asked by the CBC Wednesday Night committee to plan a short seasonal program which would eschew the common yule clichés. It seemed to me that 14th-century sources would provide plenty of material that was fresh and glad. So I took the story of the Nativity from the Wyclif translation of the four gospels, interspersed it with contemporaneous lyrics for the personae of Christ, the Blessed Virgin, St. Joseph, and the human soul, and invited the Toronto Drama Quartet to speak the text. There were also interpolated into the text some appropriate passages of plainsong, which were sung by Peter Dimuantés.

Another opportunity to do the same kind of thing arose in Holy Week in 1960, when I produced a series called *The Redemption of Man*, entirely taken from medieval sources. One of these programs again used the same cast and 14th-century sources, and was based chiefly on the laments from the Cross of that period. Later in the same year, on the Eve of the Feast of the Assumption, I went to 15th-century sources and, with a slightly different cast, devoted a program

to the *Five Joys of Mary*. It was the success of these three short programs which prompted me to believe that a longer program on the life of Christ could be tackled with the same technique. However, when I came to work on the material I found that it could not be confined to our usual hour without injury; so the result is the 90-

minute radio program which will be broadcast Saturday (July 22) on *Four's Company*, starting 30 minutes earlier than usual.

The main source of the text is a document called the *Pepysian Gospel Harmony*. A gospel harmony is a combination of the four gospels which paraphrases them into one continuous narrative. This one is named as it is because the manuscript belonged, two centuries after it was written, to Samuel Pepys. There is some internal evidence that it was translated from a French original. Whether or not

## Pirates of Penzance

EVERY NIGHT the year round, somewhere in the world, the curtain rises on a Gilbert and Sullivan musical frolic that is usually as much a tonic for the cast as for the audience.

Many a contemporary composer or librettist would like to have the G and S recipe for the magic elixir that has kept these operas young through the 80 years and thousands of performances. For one thing, Gilbert's plots avoid the specific in favor of the ageless general. We laugh as hard today at the conceits of legislative bodies and courts of law, at the pretensions of military and naval officialdom

and pomposity in general, as the Victorians did. And Sullivan's music is as saucy, as devil-may-care and up-to-date as many of our modern musicals. Less jazzy it may be, but it has bounce. It dares even the most sophisticated members of the audience to keep their head and toes from beating time.

This week CBC Wednesday Night will present what has become an annual treat—a performance of Gilbert and Sullivan from the Stratford (Ontario) Festival, on CBC radio. *The Pirates of Penzance* is directed by Sir Tyrone Guthrie, distinguished British stage director

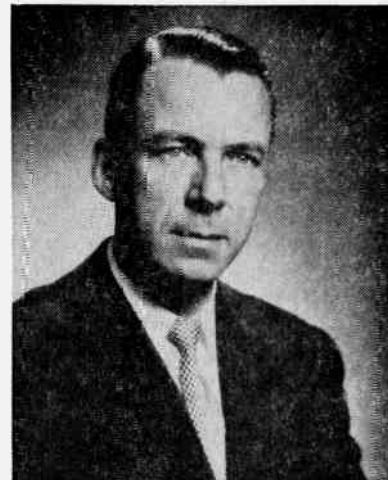

it was, it certainly antedates the Wyclif translation of the Bible. This gives it great interest, for it is thus the earliest surviving example in English of a vernacular version of the gospel story which can claim to be at all complete and close to the New Testament.

This is the text which provides nearly all of the narrative reading in the program, and the central story is told through this reading rather than through dramatization. The only exception to this technique is that certain speeches of Christ's are quoted direct in the Harmony and these, with a few others taken from Wyclif, are not read by the narrator but by the actor portraying Christ.

Various short pieces of prose and verse (or short extracts from longer pieces) are interspersed through the narrative. These are assigned to Christ and to the human soul and are lyric, contemplative, and devotional statements, inserted because of their aptness, in each case, to the point which has been reached in the story; they are taken from the works of Richard Rolle de Hampole, from the earliest English prose Psalter, from William Langland, from *Cursor Mundi*, and from numerous published and manuscript collections of 14th-century writing.

Interpolated between the main sections of the program are abridged sermons dealing with the events to which they are juxtaposed and originally written for preaching on the feasts or fasts which commemorate those events. They are all the work of a 14th century priest called Johannes Myrc and are taken from his collection, *Myrc's Festival*. Each of these sermon passages is framed by two short pieces of plain-song. Nearly all of these are antiphons, and all of them are taken from the liturgical music proper to the feasts or fasts involved. The sources used are the *Monastic Diurnal Noted* and the *Sarum Use* and, though it is true to say that

**TRANS-CANADA MATINEE**

The Nature of Neurosis. Dr. David Stafford-Clark of Guy's Hospital, London, was one of the delegates at the Third World Congress of Psychiatry held in Montreal last month. While he was there, he talked to the CBC's Morning Commentator, Marion McCormick. much of this music antedates the 14th century, nevertheless it was still all widely sung in Christendom at that time.

Throughout the program the text has been modernized as little as possible. Completely obsolete words or constructions have been replaced by their nearest modern equivalent; otherwise the vocabulary, the grammar, and the word-order have been left as they were written.

It's my experience that audiences find the 14th century English a lot easier to understand and to enjoy when it's lucidly read out loud in a modern accent than they do if they try to read the printed word for themselves, when the extra barrier of ancient spelling arises. Hence, the less meddling the better. My aim has been to handle the subject as worthily as can be within the limits of brevity and of period, and also to show the great power and diversity of 14th-century English writing on the subject, ranging as it does from the passionate mysticism of Rolle, through the homely but subtle teaching of Myrc, to the pure lyrics of faith and the strong wording of the scriptures themselves. It was an age when religion was a unifying factor in all parts of life, so that to speak of this material as good religion or good writing is to speak not of separates but of two inseparable aspects of the same thing. I hope I shall have the opportunity some day soon (it is mooted for CBC Wednesday Night in 1963) to rework the material on the larger and fully-dramatized scale it deserves. Meanwhile, this narrative.

Following this, *En quête de chansons*, with host-singer Marc Gélinas, each week presents a new face in the world of light entertainment, and brings back a popular artist whose success is proven. The tone of the program is quite informal, and permits the new artists to compete on the same level as their elders in a pot-pourri finale. Guests, July 27th, are Guy Roger and lovely Monique Gaube.

The opera tells the farcical tale of Frederick, raised from infancy by a pirate king and a pirate nurse who has been his "stupid nursery maid on breakers always steering, and did not catch a word aright through being hard of hearing." Frederick's father had told the maid to apprentice the boy to a pilot, but she thought he said pirate, and so Frederick ended up with cutlass and earrings.

Frederick will be free from the pirate band at the age of 21, but as he was born in leap year on February 29th, the pirates insist that he will not really be free to leave until he has 21 birthdays. To complicate matters, Frederick has fallen in love with Mabel, a daughter of "the very model of a modern major general", and versed in everything "vegetable, animal and mineral". Their romance seems hopeless, because Frederick is a slave of duty, devoted to the pirates. But one day he feels obliged to help some unhappy policemen put them out of action.

The pirates approach "with cat-like tread" and are on the verge of winning the scuffle when they are asked to yield in the name of the Queen. Being loyal fellows they desist immediately, whereupon they are granted pardons, revert to their former ranks, for of course they are all "noblemen gone wrong", and marry General Stanley's bevy of lovely daughters, with Frederick carrying off the prettiest of the bunch, his true-love Mabel.

The romantic leads, Frederick and Mabel, are sung by a husband-and-wife team. Marion Studholme, one of Britain's most popular young singers, studied at the Opera School at the Royal College of Music, where she met Edinburgh-born Andrew Downie. He has played in numerous movies (including *Tunes of Glory* with Alec Guinness and John Mills), and stage, TV and radio productions in Britain and North America. He was seen on CBC-TV recently in a production of Verdi's *Falstaff*. Both Downie and Miss Studholme have appeared in several operas directed by Sir Tyrone, including *HMS Pinafore* at Stratford last season.

The main studio, 50 feet square, has a ceiling 25 feet high, from which hangs a walkway grid — a series of narrow catwalks on which technicians can move about when setting up lighting.

A second studio, 25 feet square, is designed for productions less demanding of space and technical facilities.

With its new, modern facilities, CBXT will bring Edmonton viewers something more than just an alternative channel on which to view entertainment. A highlight of the Channel 5 operation will be the CBC-TV news. **GEORGE HENNAN (right)**

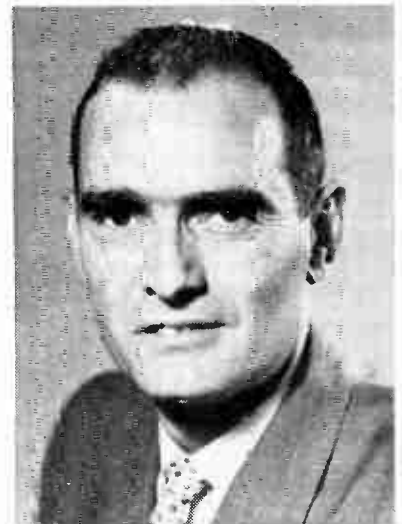

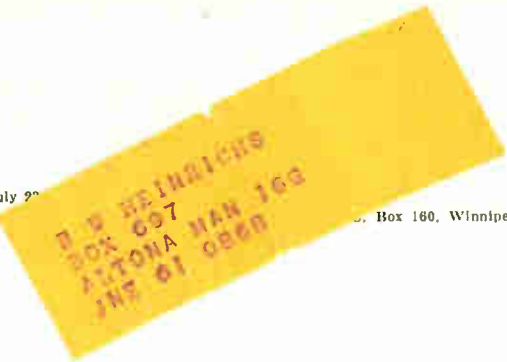

## ELEMENTS OF CHESS - PART 1

From a series earlier this year on CBWT's "Stop, Look and Listen"

by GEOFF SPURLL

CHESS is a battle. The two armies consist of 16 pieces which represented originally the various arms of the service. The pawns are the infantry or "footsloggers." Like all lower-rank soldiers, however, they carry in Napoleon's words a "Field Marshal's baton in their knapsacks." In chess terms this means that when they reach the eighth square of the board they can become Queens or minor pieces. More of this later.

The cavalry is represented by the Knights, shaped like horses. The Rooks and Bishops with their long-range attacks might be likened to the artillery. The Queen, who was originally a vizier or adviser, is the most powerful piece. The King, however, is the most important piece on the board. He is the commander of the army. If he is lost, the battle is lost too. Therefore the whole of the attack is concentrated against the King, either directly, or indirectly, by means of capturing other major pieces.

The capture of a piece is generally made when an opposing piece is, as it were, "knocked out" by your own piece when it lands, and removed from the board. (The pawns are an exception. More later.)

We shall consider this week the moves of two pieces, starting with the King. The King can move only one square at a time but in any direction. This seems simple, but there are complications. Remember, when the King cannot evade capture the game is lost. If an opposing piece is threatening the King's square the King is said to be "in check." When a piece is moved so that it makes this threat the moving

player has to say "check." The King must be moved immediately. If there is nowhere for the King to go by a legal one-square move without being captured next move, then it is "checkmate."

Similarly a King which is not in check cannot move to a square where it will be in check. This means that the two kings cannot move so that they are on neighbouring squares as both would then be in check, from each other.

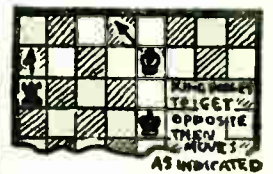
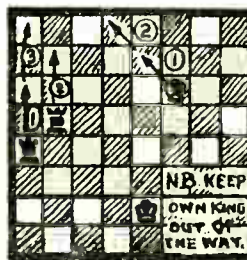
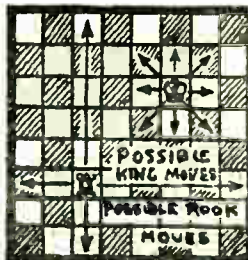

The Rook is an important piece. It moves as far as it wishes along the ranks and files of the board but not along the diagonals i.e. cornerwise. It cannot jump other pieces, either its own or the opponents. It can move along the ranks and files as long as they are clear. It will be seen, therefore, that a Rook can act like a fence to a King. If you were left with two Rooks

and a King against a King the tactics would be to "leap-frog" these fences towards the side of the board, driving the opposing King in front of you until it is held against the side of the board by one Rook and checked by the other.

The diagram shows the position to aim at when playing with one Rook and a King against a King. You may have a little trouble getting to this position—but the main idea is to keep your opposing King behind your Rook fence, then dodge up and down with the King until the two Kings are opposite. Then you advance the Rook one square to check. The defending King will have to retire, and you start over again, lining up the Kings and advancing the Rook again. Finally the King has its back to the wall, so that when you advance your Rook you have your checkmate.
