A Need for Censorship

• I wish to protest the talk given on *Speaking Personally*, Tuesday, June 25, (CBC Radio). It was given by some professor from Toronto University (Professor David Gauthier of the philosophy department of the University of Toronto) — the fact that he is a professor at one of our Canadian Universities makes it all the more deplorable. . . . He began by stating that he did not believe in God, but he didn't call himself an atheist. He asked the question, "Shall I tell my children that the myth of religion will help them?" — then he went on to say that religion is a poor moral prop, that we do not need God to teach us what is right or wrong. But he wanted his children to be familiar with the Bible so they can decide for themselves.

Canada is spending a lot of money to combat communism, to stop its infiltration into our land . . . and yet you pay such a person to go on the air with talk like that. We have a great need for more censorship of what is said on radio and TV — a committee to censor all the programs before being given on the air.

Architecture: So What's New?



AN INDIVIDUAL approach to the history of architecture and its effects on today's world will be presented in two successive programs in the *Man in a Landscape* series, on August 7 and 14 on CBC Television. The speaker on both programs will be James Acland, associate professor of architecture and a lecturer in history at the University of Toronto.

Much has been made of contemporary "innovations" in architecture, but Acland, in the programs, sets out to show that many of today's techniques are not as new as they appear. In the first program, sub-titled *Skin and Skeleton*, he deals with the frame-and-wall type of construction, tracing its development from primitive skin-covered huts, through Gothic cathedrals, half-timbered Tudor houses, such famous examples as the Crystal Palace and other well-known structures, to the steel-frame, curtain-wall aluminum and glass buildings of today.

The second program, entitled *Wall and Window*, follows the history of the other basic type of architecture still in use: the load-bearing massy wall with window openings punched into it. Acland describes the evolution of this type of building from the earthen huts of primitive peoples, through Romanesque and Baroque periods, to the pre-cast concrete structures of Le Corbusier, Yamasaki and other modern architects.

The programs will be illustrated with numerous photographs, graphic drawings and diagrams. Production is by James Murray.

IN RESPONSE TO many requests, the distinguished series *Advocate Extraordinary* will be repeated Saturdays at 8:30 p.m. on CBC Radio, beginning August 3. Many listeners already have enjoyed the six programs, documentary dramatizations of famous court cases argued by British lawyer Norman Birkett, on Tuesday mornings. The repeat at a later hour should make the series available to a wider audience, including members of the legal profession.



RT. HON. LORD BIRKETT

The late Rt. Hon. Lord Birkett, Privy Councillor, during his distinguished career was a Queen's Counsel, Judge of the King's Bench Division, High Court of Justice, and Lord Justice of Appeal. A graduate of Cambridge, where he was president of the Cambridge Union in 1910, Birkett was called to the Bar, Inner Temple, in 1913. During the 1920s and 1930s he became known as one of the ablest legal minds in England.

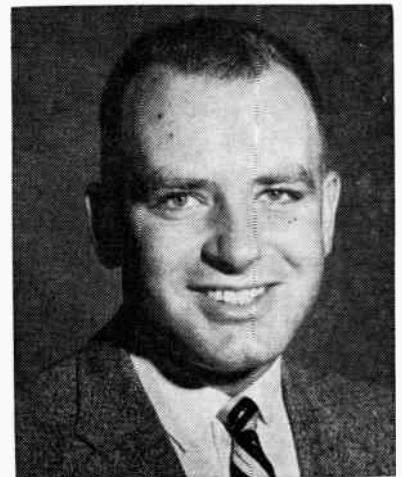
He was appointed one of the judges at the Nuremberg trials of Nazi war criminals after the Second World War, and retired in 1958 at the age of 74. He died 18 months ago in London.

The series was prepared originally for the BBC by Edgar Lustgarten.

PRAIRIE RACING FANS will be treated to two of the season's feature horse races this week, with the running of the Saskatchewan Derby Saturday, August 3, in Regina, and the running of the Manitoba Derby Monday, August 5, in Winnipeg.

Don Wittman will describe the Saskatchewan Derby for CBK listeners at 5:00 p.m., Aug. 3. Ken Reeves will be on hand with colour commentary and interviews. For this, the third annual running of the race, the purse has been boosted to \$2,500 added, the largest in Saskatchewan racing history. For three-year-olds bred in Canada, the race is over a 1 1/16 mile course.

It will be the 15th running of the Manitoba Derby, with a purse of \$7,500 added awaiting the first horse around the 1 1/4 mile track. Don Wittman and Bob Moir will describe the action at 5:00 p.m., Monday, on CBW radio, CBWT Winnipeg and CKX-TV Brandon.

350 Years of Song in Britain

A series of CBC Wednesday Night programs highlights the musical history of Great Britain, commencing August 7

A SURVEY OF British vocal music through 3½ centuries will be presented by a distinguished pair of musicians on four *CBC Wednesday Nights* in August. The series, entitled *Anthology of English Song*, will be heard at 10:30 p.m. on

Wednesdays, beginning August 7, and will be given by tenor Peter Pears and pianist-composer Benjamin Britten, with Pears script-writing and commenting on the programs.

Each of the four half-hour programs will deal with a different period in British musical history—the Elizabethans, Purcell and the Restoration, modern arrangements of folk songs, and songs by Britten—and each will consist of explanatory commentary interspersed with songs performed by Britten and Pears.

The first broadcast covers the era which marked the first real flowering of English art-song, a 30-year period of intense activity which began about 1600 and was highlighted by the genius of such composers as John Dowland, Thomas Campion, Francis Pilkington and Thomas Morley.

The second program concentrates on the Restoration period, with par-

ticular emphasis on Henry Purcell (1659-1695). With the loosening of Puritan restrictions on florid music, the theatre, and various other manifestations of artistic endeavour, composers were able to

ROY THOMSON:

Canada's International Publishing and Broadcasting Magnate

The incredible tale of a man's rise from radio set salesman in Ontario to multi-millionaire giant of the communications industry is told Sunday on CBC-TV's 20/20

A STORY IS TOLD about Bing Crosby, as a golfing enthusiast, who one day remarked casually to a friend that he'd just bought a new golf club. Curious, the friend asked what type of club it was—a new putter, a driver, a six-iron perhaps? "No," replied Crosby, "It was the 18-hole club down at Pebble Beach, California."

With a slight substitution—replacing a newspaper for the golf club—the story might well apply to Roy Thomson, for when Thomson off-handedly announces that he has just bought a newspaper, one has to inquire further to find whether he means one copy of a daily journal or the total assets of some publishing company. Canadian-born Thomson, one of the world's richest publishing magnates, seemingly buys up newspaper empires with the same casualness that one might display in purchasing a candy bar. He controls about 100 newspapers on four continents, and they represent only part of his vast business domain, which includes television stations, printing and publishing companies, extensive real estate holdings, radio stations, developments like the \$2,000,000 recreation centre he built in a small Scottish town, and many other interests.

Thomson has a Midas-like touch, and his financial wizardry and enthusiasm for business make almost every venture a success. He took private television to Scotland, and subsequently controlled about 80 per cent of the TV industry there, a situation he described as "like having a license to print money." Among his acquisitions in Britain, which he invaded in 1953 after gaining a toe-hold with a weekly called *Canada Review*, are *The Scotsman*, an Edinburgh daily with an international reputation; the Illustrated Papers group, which includes the *Illustrated London News*, *The Tatler*, *Sphere* and a clutch of highly profitable little trade papers, plus a printing concern and a book publishing firm; the *Sunday Times*, to which he introduced a full-colour supplement and a famous employee, Lord Snowden; *Ambassador*, a glossy British export magazine; and a number of other newspapers, trade papers and magazines. Virtually all the news and magazine publishing in Britain is now controlled by four mammoth complexes of which Thomson's is one. The worth of the Thomson Organization Ltd., the master company, is estimated at about \$90,000,000. In addition, he controls six

newspapers in the United States, 25 in Canada, owns the entire share capital of the Mingay Publishing Company of Australia and three associated companies, has established newspapers, radio and TV stations in Nigeria, Kenya, Tanganyika and Rhodesia, and has had discussions with Ethiopia's Emperor Haile Selassie with a view to providing comprehensive communications facilities in his country. Three years ago he bought control of four newspapers in Northern Ireland.

Thomson is a chubby bundle of energy who looks like everyone's favourite uncle. His ambitions seem limitless, and it has been said that he has probably pulled off more shrewd deals than anyone since

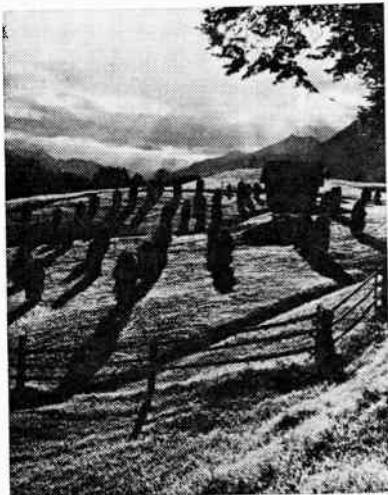

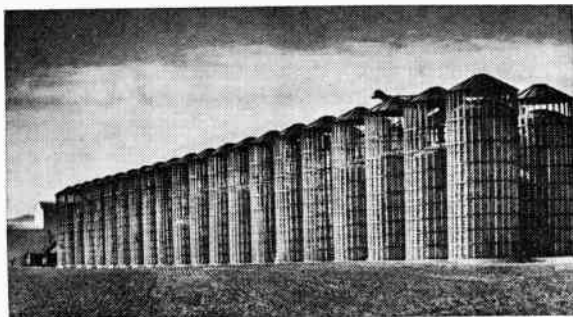
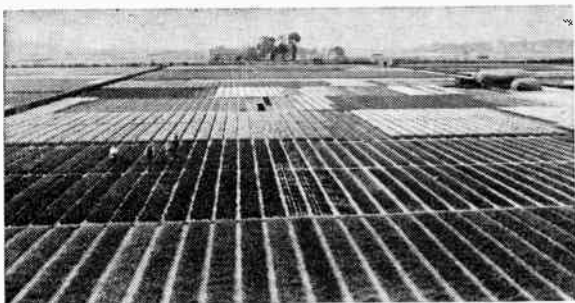
Can Canada expect to hold its markets competing with European farming?

CBC-TV's COUNTRY CALENDAR examines agriculture on the Continent
in a five-week series starting August 4

CANADIAN FARMERS are eyeing European farms and farm products with renewed interest this year because some European crops are competing for Canadian markets. In some cases the Continental costs are lower. The production of wheat is up in Europe, so Europeans will be buying some 110 to 128 million bushels less from foreign markets, and meat production there is increasing rapidly, particularly beef and veal, but experts say that it is unlikely that import requirements in Western Europe will diminish in the near future. There is a surplus of dairy products, so Canadian farmers can-

not expect to export large quantities to those areas, but eggs will likely be in short supply this year in the Netherlands, Denmark, England and Wales.

CBC-TV's *Country Calendar* is presenting a five-part BBC series about agriculture in Europe, to be seen each Sunday starting August 4. Filmed visits will be paid to farms in The Netherlands, Denmark, France, Germany and Italy, examining the particular problems faced in those countries, and the methods of production. John Cherrington is reporter in the field, and Clifford Selly is studio host.

In The Netherlands, visited in the first program, a resourceful people have built up an industry with a production, in 1960, of \$1.7 billion, on land much of which was reclaimed from the sea. Land prices are high—as much as \$600-\$800 an acre for the best—meaning that intensive farming of small acreages is necessary. The government, however, is making an effort to eliminate holdings under 10 acres, and these have decreased by half in the past decade.

In Denmark 40 per cent of the farms are under 75 acres each. Until recently Danish farming was unsubsidized, but now the agricultural output of this little country is large, and will be making itself felt in the export market in the future—already Denmark has established markets in over 100 countries. Co-operatives are thriving, and sometimes a farmer will belong to two or three. But once he signs with one, he must stick with it for five years. Visits will be paid to dairy farms and to farms specializing in the production of pig meat, in the August 11 program.

German farms will be visited in the August 18 program. Farms there are small compared with those in Canada, but not in relation to farms in Holland and Denmark. German farms are often broken down into many small plots, adding to the problems of working the land efficiently, but this tradition has been handed down from generation to generation, so split farms are not considered such a difficulty as they might be in Canada.

Germany is expanding at such a rate that wheat fields and new apartment houses are often seen side by side, and farmers realize that they must organize

Stump the Stars

*The longest-lived show in North American television
comes to CBC-TV for an eight-week summer run*

STUMP THE STARS, a popular U.S. television charade game which has been running for 13 years, will be seen on CBC-TV for eight weeks, beginning Monday night, August 5. Each week showbusiness personalities from Broadway, stage, films and television join series "regulars" to form two teams which compete in a no-holds-barred version of the well-known parlour game. While one team performs a "stumper" sent in by viewers, the other team is placed in an isolation booth offstage. Neither team knows how it or its opponents stand in the competition until the final scores are revealed.

Host and executive producer of the show is Mike Stokey, who is preparing a book of the 1,000 best stumpers used on the show in the past 13 years. He says the two stumpers sent in most frequently by viewers (each has been received at least 10,000 times) are: "Run for the roundhouse. Nellie, the brakeman can't corner you there," and "She was only the stableman's daughter but all the horse-men knew her."

Regular charaders on the show are versatile and explosive Beverly Garland; actor and Shakespeare scholar Hans Conreid; Ross Martin, who plays an asthmatic killer in the recent film *Experiment in Terror*, appears with Lawrence Harvey in *The Ceremony*, and is filming *Josyane* in Madrid and Paris this summer; and gourmet Sebastian Cabot, who is preparing a cook book including recipes and helpful hints from chefs at all the world-famous restaurants where he has dined.

They are aided by Ruta Lee, seen in two new films, *The Gun Hawk*, with Rory Calhoun, and *Robin and the Three Hoods*, with Frank Sinatra; Stubby Kaye, famed for his Nicely-Nicely role in Broadway and film versions of the musical *Guys and Dolls*; Richard Long, dubbed the "glamour boy of the panel, who is starring in a summer stock run of *Under the Yum Yum Tree*, after headlining the comedy in its Hollywood production for eight months; and Tommy Noonan, who co-stars in and produces the new film *Promises, Promises*, with Jayne Mansfield and Marie MacDonald.

Challenging charaders, who vary from week to week, have recently included such well-known stars as Sir Cedric Hardwicke, David Wayne, MacDonald Carey, Gretchen Wyler, Glynis Johns, Hermione Gingold, Robert Preston, Eileen Heckart, Jackie Coogan, Marilyn Maxwell, Giselle MacKenzie, Jeanne Grain, Ed Begley and Diana Dors.

When host Mike Stokey was asked to dream up an idea for a program for an experimental television station in Los Angeles, he remembered the fun he and his college (Please turn to page 17)

explore new avenues of expression. Purcell's career took him into both the church and the theatre, for he was not only a much-in-demand composer of secular songs and masques but was also organist at Westminster Abbey and wrote a good deal of music for the services there.

Program three, on August 21, covers a later development in the history of English song: the resurgence of interest in folk music which was stimulated by Vaughan Williams, Butterworth, Percy Grainger and others in the early years of the present century. The folk song movement resulted not only in the investigation and collection of traditional melodies but in the use of

old tunes as the basis for a new school of art-song in Britain, in which some of the country's finest composers devoted themselves to writing arrangements of folk songs. Among the most interesting of all British folk songs accompaniments are those of Britten himself, and a half-dozen of his 30-odd arrangements will be heard during the program.

The final broadcast in the series will consist entirely of original songs by Britten, the man who has done perhaps more than any other English composer to bring fresh vitality to British vocal music. The program will include *Look, Stranger, at This Island Now*, a setting of a poem by W. H. Auden; one of the set of *Michaelangelo Sonnets*; two excerpts from *The Holy Sonnets of John Donne*; two songs from the cycle entitled

Winter Words, to poems of Thomas Hardy; and a complete performance of Britten's most recent set of songs, *Six Fragments from Poems of Holderlin*.

The names of Britten and Pears have been inseparably linked in the musical world for the past 25 years, since they first began to give vocal-piano recitals in England. They have appeared together in many different parts of the world, and Pears has taken leading roles in most of Britten's operas and other major vocal works. In addition to his world-renowned abilities as a composer, Britten is also an accomplished conductor and pianist.

One of Britten's orchestral works, the *Four Sea Interludes* from his opera *Peter Grimes*, will be played on the *Winnipeg Pops Concert*, Sunday, August 4, at 10:30 p.m. on CBC radio.

to survive. A visit is made to the 150-acre farm in Schleswig-Holstein of Gerd Schmidt, who owns 35 cows but is thinking of selling them. He has only one helper and casual labour, and is terribly overworked, like many others. Some German farmers think men in industry are much better off; more than a million have left the farm to take factory jobs. A Bavarian farm is visited, 250 acres in an attractive mountain setting. The farmer there has turned the farm over to his son and retired to the role of supervisor. Some farmers live in consolidated villages. One of them describes his life and the benefits of consolidation.

The series visits an agricultural giant—France—on August 25. France is potentially the biggest pro-

ducer in Western Europe and wheat is a major crop —last year the country grew 200 million bushels of spring wheat, about half our normal Canadian crop, but this year backward planting weather may reduce that figure. Sometimes in France you'll see a half-acre field with two crops on it, and two owners, or bullocks and tractors working side by side. Several types of farms are visited, and farmers old and young express their views on the outlook for the French farmer.

In Italy, to be visited on September 1, labour is cheaper than machinery, so mechanization has not advanced very much on the farm. But Italy is taking major steps to establish proper farm units, and sometimes men will lose their property for misusing it, or for not working it

THE NEW YORK Yankee Express, seemingly pennant-bound in spite of the prolonged absence of sluggers Mickey Mantle and Roger Maris, will be on review on CBC Television this Saturday, when the "Bronx Bombers" host the Baltimore Orioles. As far as the Yanks are concerned, they still appear to have much too much depth for the rest of the American League since, at the time of this writing, they've opened up a full seven-game lead over second-place Chicago.

This tremendous bench strength of New York's has been just too much for the rest of the field over

the past 15 years or so, and when the teams head into the "dog days" of August and September in the pennant chase, the Yankees seem to stay fresh while the others wilt. This, of course, is directly attributable to bench strength. Money helps some; that is, when a good player becomes available, the Yankees certainly don't have to pinch pennies. Their usually fine pitching went sour and their better-than-average hitting also slipped. However, on any given day, they can be an awesome ball club and Saturday could, easily as not, be their day.

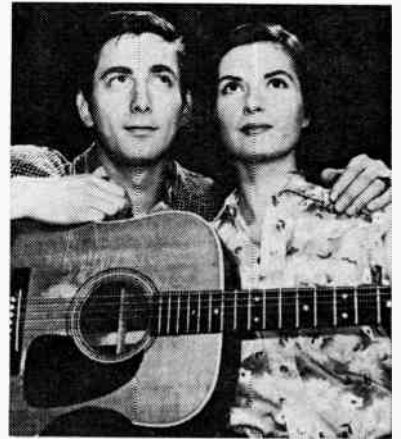
Feature Folksingers On 'Front and Centre'

ONE OF THE most dramatic phenomena of showbusiness in the last five years has been the enormous revival of interest in folk music, an art form that has swept to heights of popularity it never attained before. Riding the crest of the wave are a couple of dozen folk singers and groups who a few years ago might have struggled for a living in out-of-the-way coffee houses but who are now in demand for night clubs, concerts, television and recordings.

Among the top personalities in this highly successful group are two Canadians, Sylvia Fricker and Ian Tyson, who got their start in Toronto coffee houses, had their first big break at the Mariposa

Folk Festival at Orillia in 1961, and are now reaping handsome financial and artistic rewards on television, records, radio and the folk song circuit.

Ian and Sylvia will be the featured guests this week on CBC-TV's *Front and Centre*, Wednesday, August 7. Sharing the program with them will be a group new to network television, the Paul Weidman Trio, an unusual jazz group made up of bass, harpsichord, vibes and guitar. Not since the days of Charlie Guarnieri and Artie Shaw's Gramercy Five has the harpsichord been given much prominence in jazz, but it suits admirably the decor and spirit of the night club where the trio is currently appearing — a pseudo-Old-Englishe spot known as the Castle George.

Mephistopheles. But there is nothing sinister in his approach. He is open and frank about his aims—he is quite candidly interested in making money—and he goes about the business of acquiring his fortune with candor. He has few other interests beyond business. His only regular avocation is reading detective novels, which he methodically initials when he has finished reading them. Next to whodunits his favourite bedtime reading is company accounts. He seems to be little interested in the political or opinion-moulding potential of his publications, radio stations and television outlets. He even suggested at one point that some of his Conservative papers in Britain could switch to the Labour editorial line in locations where that action would result in increased sales. Tireless and apparently insatiable in adding to his collection of publications, he has said: "I am on the prowl all the time. If I can get hold of other newspapers I shall certainly do so."

Thomson got his start on his meteoric career in a small Ontario town in the mid-1930s, and the pattern of his success then was to be repeated over and over again as he moved up the ladder of success. He was selling radio receiving sets in Northern Ontario, and his sales pitch was hampered by the fact that very few radio stations were capable of being heard in the area. Showing the unorthodox style that was to mark his later business deals, Thomson borrowed some money and established his own radio station in North Bay. Not long after, he built two more stations, in Timmins and Kirkland Lake. Although his radio receiver sales maintained a consistently high level from then on, he soon became so engrossed in his broadcasting activities that he discarded his sales agency.

His entrance into the newspaper field came about in a similarly unorthodox manner. There happened to be a newspaper office in the same building as his Timmins radio station, so he bought out the paper. He acquired the paper without knowing a thing about the publishing business or the workings of a newspaper, but despite his lack of experience he managed to establish the paper, the *Timmins Press*, as one of the finest of small-town dailies. From that small beginning he built the chain of newspapers and other communication outlets that made him a multi-millionaire.

Born in Toronto, he attended school there and completed his formal education when he finished high school. With his brother he started an automotive parts business, leaving that to serve as a lieutenant in the Canadian Army during the First World War. After the war he rejoined his brother and set up the radio sales enterprise that was eventually to catapult him into broadcasting.

A profile of Roy Thomson will be presented this week on CBC-TV's *20/20*, Sunday, August 4. The half-hour film will show Thomson's Toronto birthplace, and his country and town houses in England, where he now makes his permanent home. The *20/20* film crew followed him through a typical day of work in London, from breakfast through a subway ride downtown, and being picked up at the station by his chauffeur for the drive to his office. During the day, Thomson is shown attending two meetings, a luncheon, a service at Westminster Abbey, a cocktail party, dinner at the German embassy, a visit to his town house and his return to his country home, where he is interviewed, by writer Lord Francis Williams, about his business interests, his life in England, and his personal values.

NOW SEEN on CBWT each Wednesday at 6:30 p.m., for its second summer season is *Wheelspin*, a magazine-type series especially for motor sport fans. It covers the whole range of topics of interest to automobile buffs: racing, rallies, hill climbs, road tests on new cars, technical advice by experts, and overseas items. This summer producer Doug Stephen will race *Wheelspin's* own Formula Junior car in competition in Canada, and he hopes it will be equipped with a special camera so that races can be filmed from the point of view of the driver.

An item prepared in Switzerland illustrates the perils and delights of renting cars in Europe. In England Stephen filmed highlights of the three days he spent at Silverstone with the B.R.M. team of World Champion Graham Hill and the young American driver, Richie Ginther.

Wheelspin's hosts are CBC announcers Jim Chorley and Bruce Marsh, and technical expert Jack Wheeler. Chorley and Wheeler were regulars in last summer's series.

World's Fair Jitters

Beset Montrealers

THE CITY OF Montreal, which has seen an unprecedented amount of development in the past decade, is girding itself for even more construction in the next four years. The next officially recognized World's Fair is to be held in the Canadian metropolis in 1967, and a complete city-within-a-city has to be completed to meet a strict deadline.

C. F. Carsley, vice-president of the Canadian World Exhibition Corporation, the body charged with planning of the fair, pointed out recently, "Unless planning is done carefully and quickly, efficiently and honestly, Canada will wake up in 1967 to a fiasco rather than a successful exhibition . . . In the next four years, we are going to have to build facilities that might take 25 years to complete under normal circumstances. It is a little frightening, but it is also an unprecedented opportunity."

It has been shown that any city undertaking to be the site of a World's Fair becomes the centre of world-wide attention, and to a large extent Canada's image abroad hinges on the success of the 1967 Exhibition. The time available to planners is shorter than usual because of a two-year delay brought about when Russia first accepted, then turned down the Fair. Only four years now remain for officials to prepare the site, draw up plans, construct buildings and attend to the multitudinous details that go into the planning of such an undertaking.

And in the atmosphere of hectic activity that surrounds the planners, there has been a good deal of controversy over many different aspects of the preparations, ranging from the question of who will own the valuable World's Fair property after the Fair is over, to the topic of whether or not hot dogs will be sold at the Exhibition. Even bird-lovers have entered the melee, protesting the destruction of

the unique nesting place that the Fair buildings will push aside.

The 1967 Montreal International and Universal Exhibition will be the first Class "A" World's Fair to be held in North America under the rules of the 31-nation International Bureau of Expositions, an organization formed in 1928. Canada and Haiti are the only members of the Bureau in the Western Hemisphere. The 1964-65 fair to be held at New York will not receive the sanction of the I.B.E., thus member governments will be prohibited from exhibiting there.

Under I.B.E. regulations, the host country must provide free space for all exhibitors, and this cost—totalling about \$40 million—is being shared by the Federal Government (\$20 million), the Province of Quebec (\$15 million) and the City of Montreal (\$5 million).

Everyone seems to have a different idea of what the Fair should represent, and how it should be handled, but only the directors of the Corporation know just what is being contemplated at this moment. This week, CBC Radio will present a special program reporting on the plans, in which broadcaster Lilly Broz conducts interviews with some of the men involved in the planning. The program is heard Sunday, August 4 at 5:30 p.m.

ON AUGUST 8 AT 8:30 p.m., CBC Radio's Soundings will present a program about the lively periodical *Cité Libre*, which, since its first publication 14 years ago, has been the centre of much controversy and discussion in French Canada. Two of its founding editors will be heard: Pierre Elliot Trudeau, writer and professor of law at the University of Montreal; and Gerard Pelletier, editor of Montreal's largest daily, *La Presse*. Others taking part in the broadcast are Charles Taylor, a political scientist at McGill University and an editor of *Cité Libre*, and Michael Oliver, also of McGill's political science department, who chairs the discussion on the broadcast. The program was produced originally for the CBC Montreal public affairs program *Let's Consider*, by Herbert Steinhouse.

Cité Libre was born, as an idea, 16 years ago in Paris, at a time when both Gerard Pelletier and Pierre Trudeau were studying there. They were searching, as Pelletier put it, "for a place to say everything most dear to us," but

they found no publication willing to support their ideas. Two years later, in 1949, the first issue of *Cité Libre* was published in Montreal.

For the first 11 years of its existence the tiny monthly magazine raked, questioned, criticized and attacked the very fibre of the social, economic, religious and cultural life of Quebec under a political regime that opposed most of the principles on which the venture was launched. *Cité Libre* dedicated itself to the pursuit of democracy, free education, economic planning, human rights and lay schools, and has been a consistent foe of overt nationalism.

With the crumbling of the Duplessis Union Nationale regime in 1960, many of the ideas, suggestions, and proposals put forward by the publication were considered and acted upon by the new government, supported by the new and changing ideas from which *Cité Libre* was conceived 16 years ago.

SATURDAY SPORTS DATE

CLAD IN THEIR rust-coloured blazers bearing a uniform CBC insignia, broadcasters Al Hamel, Andy Bathgate and producer Bob McLaughlin have become familiar personalities at major sports events this summer.

Augmented by a technical crew and a battery of mobile equipment this is the corps that each Saturday afternoon takes over the CBC radio network for a 2½-hour afternoon period on *Saturday Sports Date*.

Since the show began in April, it has originated in a normal radio studio only twice. On all other occasions it originated "on location." This multiplies the complexity of the operation since each program covers not only one major

event but includes remote reports from other events happening across Canada, in the United States or in Europe.

So far an average of nine events have received coverage each week on *Saturday Sports Date*.

As well, producer McLaughlin packs close to 40 musical selections recorded earlier in the week on four reels of tape. This music, taken from the current pops field and the hit parade gives the broadcasters time to switch in to highlights of sports events happening elsewhere.

For commentators and co-hosts Al Hamel and Andy Bathgate, *Saturday Sports Date* is a "swinging" experience. Hamel, himself an ardent sports fan, gets particular joy out of witnessing the water sports, regattas and racing. He is in fact such a water-sport enthusiast he often swims the length of a 40-foot pool 50 times, just for exercise.

Bathgate on the other hand earns his living in sport and finds broadcasting an interesting sideline. Besides being one of the NHL's top scorers he is a competition golf player, having already entered several major tournaments, among them this year's Canadian Open. Unfortunately he just missed qualifying for the final 36 holes by one stroke. He is also assistant pro at a Toronto course and has a couple of 65 rounds to his credit.

With broadcasting and golf to count on, Bathgate doesn't have to worry about his future after his hockey days are over.

Says Bathgate: "You can last much longer playing golf. Besides, it allows for more of a family life and I'd like to settle down after I'm through with hockey."

In weeks to come, *Saturday Sports Date* moves to Mooney's Bay in Ottawa, August 3 for the Canadian Canoe Championships; Quebec City, August 24 for the North American Canoe Championships; and the Canadian Amateur Golf Championship at St. John, New Brunswick, August 17.

During broadcasts from these points, there will be direct reports from the Canadian Tennis Championships, August 3; British Columbia Open, August 17; and the CPGA tournament in Edmonton, August 24.
