Some Excellent Shows

• *Camera Canada*, (Monday, July 1, CBC-TV), *The Opening of the West*, was a perfectly splendid production, both as a documentary and as a technical *tour de force* — hearty congratulations to all concerned. The *Camera Canada* program of Sunday, July 7, *Last Summer*, was likewise well worth seeing and beautifully done. Preceding that show, *World of Sport's* presentation *Tribute to Fangio* was another most successful effort. . . . JAPAN In Defeat

A STUDY OF the Japanese nation in defeat, prepared for radio's CBC Wednesday Night by Doug Forrester, will be presented on August 28 at 9:00, under the title of *To Endure the Unendurable*. The title is a quotation from a speech broadcast by Emperor Hirohito on August 15, 1945. That was the first time his subjects had heard the voice of their Emperor. He was surrendering his nation to the Allied powers.

"The hardships and sufferings which our nation is to be subjected to," he said, "will certainly be great. We are keenly aware of the inmost feelings of ye, our subjects. However, it is according to the dictate of time and fate that we have resolved to pave the way for a grand peace for all the generations to come, by enduring the unendurable and suffering what is insufferable."

So incredibly naive were the people of Japan under the tight thought control of the military clique that they could not believe, even then, that Japan had lost the war. One Japanese, who was a boy at the time, recalls hearing the

A LEADING FIGURE in Winnipeg entertainment circles has returned to network television this summer. Marshall "Marsh" Phimister is playing what for him is a familiar role, as singing-host of the Friday night musical variety, *Music Stand*.

Since the early days of Canadian television Marsh has been singing host of many CBC-TV shows, including *Cabaret*, *Yesterday's Hit Parade*, *Eric Wild's Interlude* and *The Marsh Phimister Show*, displaying the same versatility and talent that have kept him in the spotlight on the Winnipeg entertainment scene for two decades.

Much of Marsh's superb showmanship was passed down to him from his father, Sandy, a Scot's Harry Lauder-type comedian who played the Keith Orpheum circuit in New York until talkies made vaudeville a thing of the past. Raised in Winnipeg, Marsh as a teenager was introduced to home-town audiences as part of an instrumental-vocal trio billed as the Hopele Hawaiians that performed frequently on CKY radio when it was operated by the Manitoba Telephone System and carried CBC programs.

As a bass player, singer and dialect comedian he continued to make many public appearances, as well as being heard on such CBC shows as *The Sunshine Society* which, as its present counterpart, came from Winnipeg once a week.

In 1947 he opened his own club, called simply Jack's, on the Pembina Highway, and for ten years was its host and operator. Many young performers on their way up found their way into the spotlight at Jack's, including Wally Koster, Ken Steele, the Van Buren Sisters, The Altones, Johnny Frosk, Del Wagner and Monte Levine.

Marsh continues to appear with his orchestra, which varies from three to twelve piece according to the job, in club engagements and at special gatherings throughout the Winnipeg area. "Although I enjoy TV and radio work, I prefer a live audience because their reaction can be ascertained, permitting better timing," he comments.

It's a safe bet that the slender, youthful-looking Marsh Phimister will be much in demand for all of his versatile talents for many years to come.

FOLKSONG enthusiasts should enjoy a one-occasion show being broadcast Friday, August 30 at 10:05 p.m. on CBC Radio. Folksinger Reg Gibson will host the program, singing a couple of solo numbers and joining singer-guitarist Jim Pirie in a duet. Both Reg and Jim will add their guitars to the instrumental trio furnishing the accompaniment, and guest vocalists will be Miriam Breitman and Henry Enns. Musical director is Neil Harris, while producer is Jack Bingham.

Spick-and-Span Community

Atop the Permafrost

MORE THAN 120 miles inside the Arctic Circle, south of the Beaufort Sea, is one of Canada's snappiest cocktail lounges — softly lit, tastefully decorated, a little oasis for the tired businessman or the harrassed official. It is only when an Eskimo in a parka slides onto the next stool at the bar and orders a martini that the visitor realizes he's not in a big city.

Inuvik (Eskimo for the Place of

the Man) may be in the back of beyond but you'd never guess it from its modern inn, its streamlined restaurant with trim, green-uniformed waitresses, its big self-service grocery, or from its boarding schools with facilities rivalling those of the most select schools back in civilization.

Everything is spanking new — this model Arctic town is only two years old. It's one of the most

astounding communities on the continent, and one of few with heated sewer lines.

Inuvik came into being as the new site for the old fur-trading community of Aklavik, N.W.T., 35 miles away. Aklavik, the Place of the Bear, lies on a piece of low land jutting into the delta of the Mackenzie River, which engineers have reported is slowly sinking into the river silt. Inuvik (pronounced In-noo-vik, with the accent on the second syllable), situated on high, dry ground, is now the headquarters of the Western Arctic, a sort of capital city housing the administrative and educational facilities for the region, as well as most of the former citizens of Aklavik.

The town has sprung straight from the wilderness in such record time that old-timers are astonished. In fact, some of them refused to move from their seemingly less desirable old homes in Aklavik to the new settlement with its ultra-modern facilities.

Every plank and nail used in constructing the town had to be shipped by river or air for hundreds of miles. Most of the houses are clapboard with steeply-pitched roofs to slough off the heavy Arctic snow in winter, and are painted in cheerful colours like those in the Norwegian Arctic, where the populace finds that gay reds, yell-

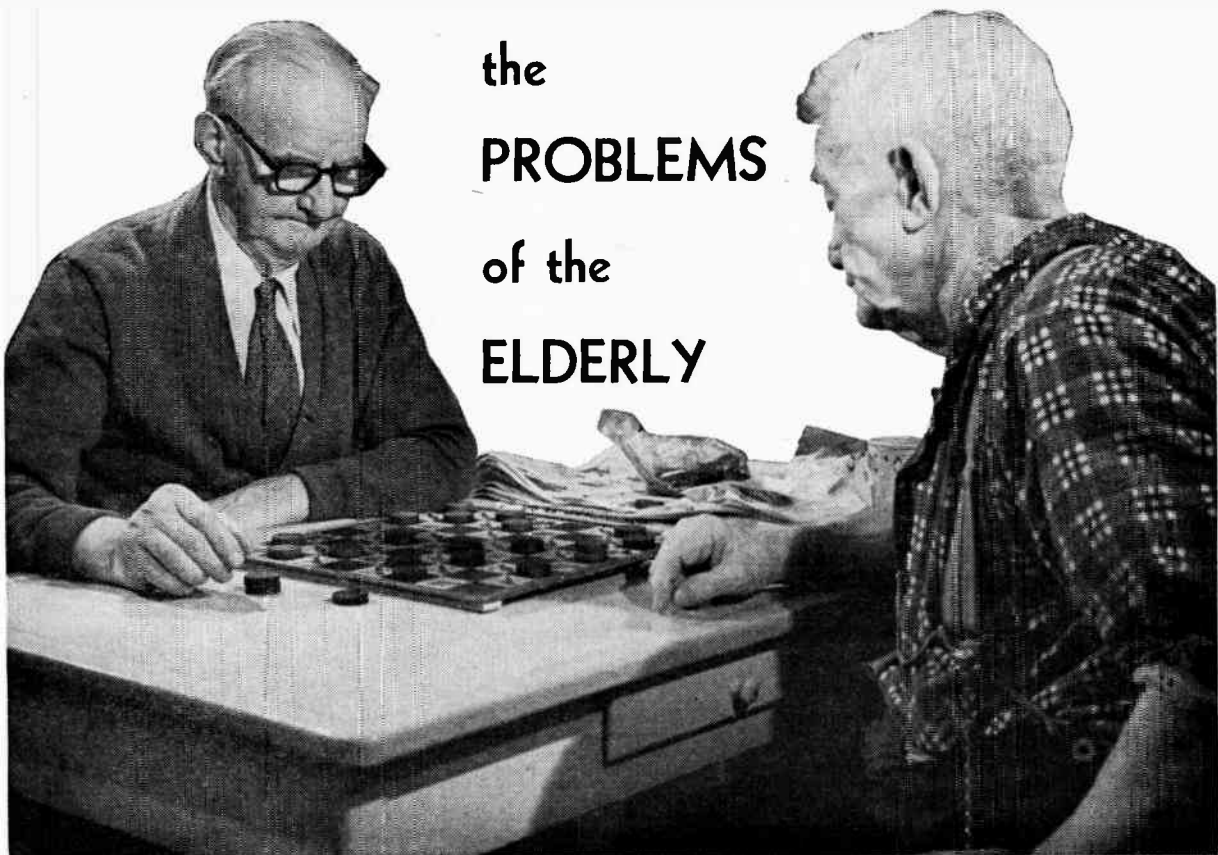

How Doctors Handle

the PROBLEMS of the ELDERLY

GERIATRICS, THE BRANCH of medicine concerned with old age, will be the subject of the Monday, August 26, edition of *Check-Up*, CBC-TV's 12-part factual medical series. Dr. C. B. Solorsh, consultant to the department of general practice New Mount Sinai Hospital, Toronto, will discuss some of the problems and illnesses of old age and their solutions and treatments, and will answer questions from the studio audience. Appearing as a patient of Dr. Solorsh will be Alfred Gallagher as 75-year-old Harvey Mason, with Aileen Seaton as Laura Carmichael, his daughter, and Anthony Parr as her husband.

Harvey Mason is a cheerful, healthy widower, who has always enjoyed life enormously. Two years ago he had a stroke. Following hospital treatment he went to live with Laura and Ken and made an excellent recovery. Recently, getting up to go to the bathroom one night, he fell and broke his hip. He has made a good recovery from that too, and is ready for release from hospital with a new metal hip-joint.

But the situation at home is complicated—not by anyone being difficult, but simply because of circumstances. Laura, 38, is devoted to her father, and family pride prevents her from agreeing to his going to an old folks' home. Her two sisters, Millie and Dorothy, and her brother, Jim, all of whom live out of town, have long found excuses for not having Mr. Mason live with them, although they willingly contribute to his upkeep in the Carmichael home.

Ken Carmichael, 43, is easy to get along with, a normal, healthy, reasonable man with a fairly bright future as an electrical engineer. He is the sort of man who likes to take his wife with him on a business trip if it's feasible, and the fact that they can't escape from Dad Mason bothers him. Dad is pretty healthy, and, thinks Ken privately, by the time the old man dies, they are going to be too old to enjoy life.

Ken has been very good about having Laura's father live with them, but he's a strong family man and wants the best for Laura. She is conscious that often the constant

A-Sailing We Will Go . . .

aboard some of the small craft that swarm in and out of B.C.'s coastal harbours, in a special Tuesday, PACIFIC ARMADA

A MODERN ARMADA along Canada's Pacific coast has produced a tribe of hardier-than-thou sailors known as frostbiters, who go sailing from November to April in distinctive small, plastic dinghies. These boats are so light they can be stored on wharves and can be removed from the water or launched quite easily, an advantage in uncertain weather. There are many other B.C. sailors outside the tote-your-own class, and for them, with their sturdier vessels, it's a 12-month sport. The temperature is very seldom too cold or the wind too strong for going to sea. The only preventative is the fog that sometimes slips in under the Lions Gate Bridge and silently shrouds the anchorages in moist grey gauze.

Some of the fun of building, sailing and racing small craft will be described on CBC-TV this Tuesday night, August 27, in a program titled *Pacific Armada*, originally presented last fall on *World of Sport*.

The program begins with shots of several frostbiters in action in Vancouver's Coal Harbour, which is sheltered by the thickly-treed Stanley Park, backed by the city. Frostbiters are probably the most enthusiastic members of the sailing fraternity, but many Vancouver landlubbers catch the sailing bug from time to time, and the program shows how. A Vancouver businessman, played by actor Doug Haskins, out for a walk on a vibrantly sunny spring day, happens by some sailing ships moored at the quay and suddenly hankers for his own sailing vessel. As he glances over the ships tied up, viewers will learn, with him, the different kinds suitable for use in B.C. waters, and the major differences in the classes of ships.

With the use of time-laps photography (one frame shot every three minutes), viewers will see the hull of a Thunderbird sailing boat of plywood construction being built in apparently one minute. The job would take two weeks in normal time. *(Please turn to page 9)*



FRANCE

Western Europe's Agricultural Giant

*A land of widely varied crops,
farmed with methods both old-fashioned
and up to date, is subject of
COUNTRY CALENDAR, August 25*

THE FOURTH program of a five-part BBC television series about agriculture in Europe, being presented on CBC-TV's *Country Calendar* on Sunday afternoons, will be shown on August 25. Programs on farming in the Netherlands, Denmark and Germany have already been seen and the final telecast, on Italy, will be presented September 1. John Cherrington is the reporter-in-the-field for the series, and Clifford Selly is studio host. Harold Dodds introduces each program in Toronto.

This week's program deals with France, potentially the biggest producer in Western Europe. In this agricultural giant, wheat is a major crop. Last year's yield was about 200 million bushels of spring wheat, about half the normal Canadian crop.

French farms provide the settings for startling contrasts in agricultural methods. Some fields are huge, while in other places a half-acre field will be divided between two crops; bullocks may be seen toiling side-by-side with the latest-model tractors.

Broadly speaking, livestock is the basis of the agricultural economy of northwestern Europe, while in the southern areas cereals and fruit are predominant. Small family farms are quite common throughout Europe and, of the 9 or 10 million farms in the European Common Market countries, more than half have less than 12 acres. The importance which agriculture occupies in the different countries varies a good deal, but on average about one-fifth of the working

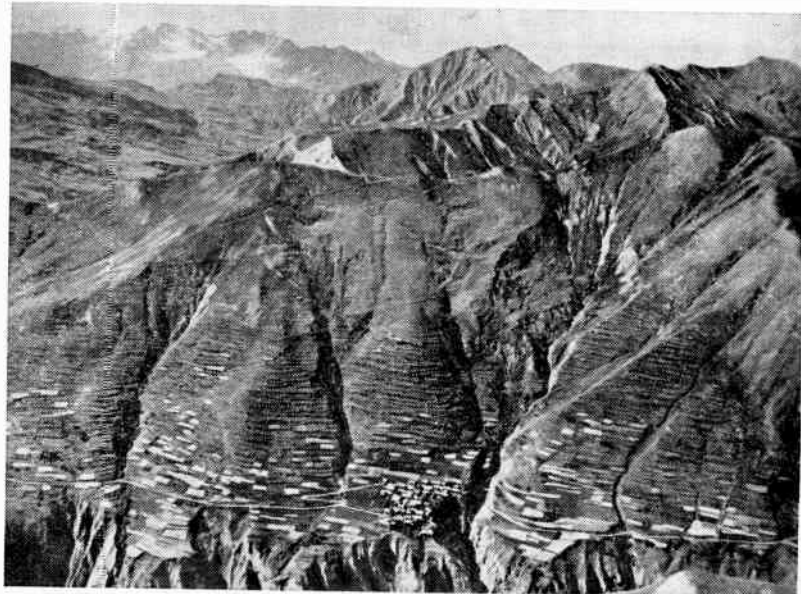
population of Common Market countries is engaged in farming, with the percentage varying from about 7 per cent in Belgium to 33 per cent in Italy. Sharper contrasts appear in the pattern and importance of agricultural trade among the countries. West Germany relies to a large extent on imports, while Denmark and the Netherlands have long been exporters of dairy and other livestock products (with the latter relying considerably on imported feed). France is relatively self-sufficient and is an exporter of certain products.

All Western European countries provide substantial measures of support and protection for farmers, but the individual national programs vary widely, not only as to method but also in the degree of

protection offered to individual products.

During the past decade, agricultural production in Western Europe has increased by about 35 per cent, which is somewhat greater than the rise in North American farm output in this period but substantially less than the remarkable expansion achieved in European industry. In the early 1950s the per capita volume of farm output was just regaining the pre-war European level, but by 1960-61 production had moved significantly ahead of the growth in population. The increase has been basically the result of improved yields, since there has been practically no change in the size of the area under cultivation and only a moderate rise in livestock numbers.

Also shown under construction is a private 36-foot Trimoran sailboat with three hulls, the largest of its type ever built in B.C. waters. As the camera moves in on it, the fibreglass cover is being applied to the hull. Its launching is unusual: it's not dropped or slid into the water, but is strapped to the wharf at low tide, and the rising tide floats it. This is illustrated in single-framing — the five-hour tide seeming to rise in 30 seconds.

A third style of sailboat displayed on the program is the S-25, a 35-foot fibreglass boat, seen being moulded. The hull and superstructures are moulded separately and then joined.

Modern sailboat masts are made of aluminum instead of wood—the metal is lighter and stronger; and the traditional sailcloth is replaced by more durable and more easily-handled new fabrics. But tradition of the sea is still intact in the art of sailmaking, for it is as exacting and specialized art as it has always been, although the machine is a vague threat to hand-work.

The cameras look in on the Royal Vancouver Yacht Club to see a sailing class for school-age children. Also shown and discussed are sailboat racing of past and present. For the smaller sailboat owner there are local races tailored to individual craft, such as six-meter races and the dragoons. For larger, deep-sea craft there is the annual Swiftsure race, a time trial and a highlight of the boating season. One of the annual participants is the RCN vessel *Oriole*, 110 feet long, the largest sailing ship in the B.C. waters. Naval personnel are shown in sailing drill, which is contrasted with the more casual civilian sailing habits.

Canadian Firm Leads Continent In Organ Building

THE ORGAN came into ecclesiastical use in 757, when an instrument was installed in the Church of St. Corneille in Compiègne, north-east of Paris, a town also famous as the one Joan of Arc was defending when she was captured in 1430, and where the armistice was signed which ended the First World War. The arrival of the organ in Compiègne was a great event in the town's history, for it was mentioned importantly by all the chroniclers of the time. But, proud as the townspeople were of their acquisition, the organ did not catch on in popularity or attain its majestic form until the middle of the 15th century.

A milestone in organ-making was reached in the mid-19th century when a French-Canadian blacksmith named Joseph Casavant taught himself to build organs and opened a workshop in St. Hyacinthe, Que. By 1860 he was making two instruments a year. After his

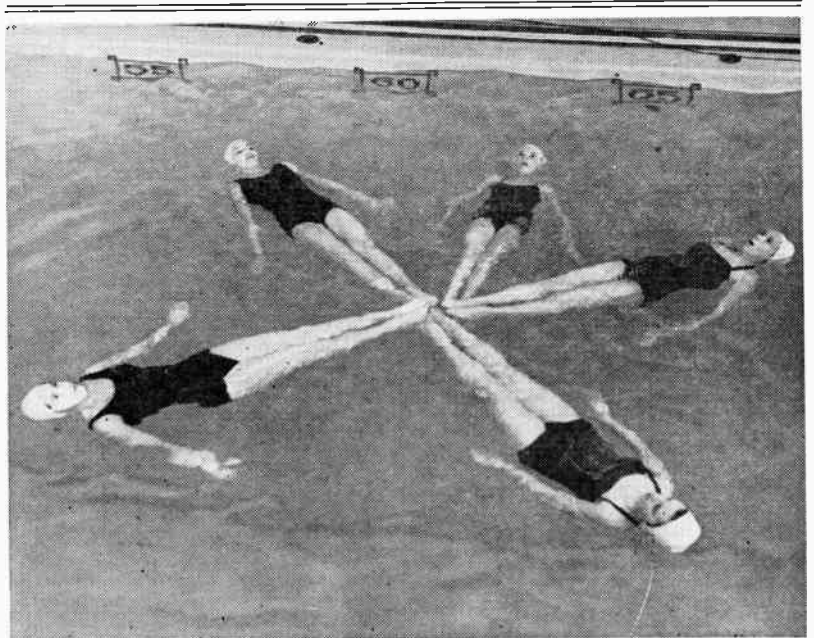

A Visit to The Most Romantic Town

MORE THAN 10 million people visit Niagara Falls, Ontario, each year, and at least 7,000 of them are honeymooners. Ever since the first white man laid eyes on the grandeur of the falls centuries ago, the gorge and its drapery of frothy, pounding water has been attracting admirers from all over the world.

For many decades the community thrived on fur-trading. Then practicality gave way to romance, and the town became famous as a holiday resort for newlyweds. Lately, Niagara Falls has grown into a thriving industrial centre, but it's still best known as the spot where the honeymoon lasts forever, and tourism is the fattest single industry, keeping its cash registers clinking steadily, to the delight of the

thousands of local citizens who depend on romance for their bread and butter.

Last month director Gerry Richardson of CBC-TV's *Telescope* visited Niagara Falls with a film crew, to take a sentimental look at the area through the eyes of Canadian and American newlyweds and those who cater to the honeymoon industry. The film he made, titled *Honeymoon Town*, will be seen on *Telescope* Monday night, August 26.

"Unfortunately, we picked the worst week of the season," he says. "It was hot and humid for five days, then poured for two. Most people stayed in the comfort of their air-conditioned hotels or motels, which made it difficult for us to find suitable honeymooners for the 'leads' of our show."

Combing the town for attractive couples with poise and the ability to express themselves verbally was a chore, because there are over 100 motels and

Emperor's speech and his father's reaction to it: "My father said: 'No, Japan couldn't be defeated, and so the Emperor must be trying to encourage us to continue the war.'"

The program is narrated by Robert Clothier and Bob Switzer, but the story is told by the Japanese people themselves in interviews recorded in Japan by Doug Forrester. The program was produced by Fred Laight in Vancouver.

Forrester talked to the ordinary men and women of Japan who, as their quiet voices reminisce about the horror of those days, create a powerful impression of the unpreparedness of their nation for defeat. The war was lost to Japan at least as early as 1942, when 300 American aircraft dropped bombs on Tokyo. The shock of this violation of their soil was almost more than they could bear.

They say: "I was awfully shocked to see lovely faces of dead children," and "I thought hell must be like this." But still they could not face the reality of defeat. "We didn't imagine that American armies or other countries' armies should come to our land," they recall.

The program traces the complicated and desperate negotiations that led to ultimate surrender, and the last-ditch attempt of the Japanese military group to reverse the decision of the Emperor. At its conclusion there is an engaging picture of a young Japanese girl seeing American soldiers for the first time. "I was very afraid, but I'd like to see very much, so among the curtain I peeked outside. Then those men noticed me, looking at our window, and just smiled, simply and very friendly."

The difficult days of the occupation were still ahead, but the fighting was over, and most people breathed a sigh of utter relief. "Anymore our loved ones need not go to battle, and we can have an ordinary life, according to our wishes and hopes."

hotels in the area, and many gift shops, as well as other places that attract visitors. Richardson and his crew found the American couple they wanted in about three hours of looking. It was pouring rain, and the newlyweds were on their way to Buffalo, but said they'd be back at 7:00 o'clock that evening. At 6:00 p.m. the rain suddenly stopped, and Richardson felt that the Fates were being kind to them at last.

Meanwhile he had been busy finding and equipping a car to carry the camera, etc. A dealer provided a convertible with the lid of the luggage compartment removed so that a camera could be mounted there. Then Richardson had to get clearance from the Canadian and American customs, Immigration and Bridge officials for filming on and around the Bridge. The honeymooners turned up on schedule, and were filmed crossing the Bridge and wending their way into town. Their dialogue was all natural and spontaneous. "Wow! What a

honeymoon!" said the groom as they ambled along the Bridge, and then spoiled the effect by telling his bride that he preferred her mother's cooking to hers. They're from Binghamton, New York, but the bride came from Buffalo originally.

'Vacation Time' Explores Space

TWO FAMED American Air Force astronauts, Major Robert A. Rushworth, principal X-15 pilot at Edwards Air Force Base, California, and Col. Charles E. Yeager, first man to break the sound barrier, will describe their dramatic roles in man's recent ventures into space on CBC-TV's *Vacation Time* on Thursday, August 29, in a program titled *The Giant Step*.

Presented in terms which a teenage audience will understand and appreciate, the entire 60-minute program is devoted to a comprehensive report on efforts to conquer space and look at some of the orbital shots planned for tomorrow.

For over 5,000 years, man has been aware that the planets and stars moved in a regular and predictable manner. One of the first attempts to understand these natural phenomena was based on the discovery of the relationship between the phases of the moon and the flooding of the Nile River. As-

tronomy can be considered the father of mathematics and the modern physical sciences.

Just a little over two years ago the first man went into space, and now as each year goes by, the list of cosmonauts and astronauts grows.

The Giant Step opens with scenes of the launching of Walter Shirra in a Mercury capsule, and covers the highlights of the X-15 and X-20 programs, Project Gemini (the two-man capsule) and Project Apollo (a lunar mission). Included is film footage only recently declassified by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, and never before shown on television.

The X-15 program is described in detail by Major Robert A. Rushworth, who has flown the experimental rocket plane 14 times and reached an altitude of 223,000 feet in space thrusts. Col. Charles E. Yeager discusses the USAF Aerospace Research Pilot School at Edwards Air Force Base, California, of which he is commandant, and the X-20 Dyna-Soar program.

Sheridan Nelson and Syd Davison are hosts for *The Giant Step*, produced in Montreal by Bill Rice.

'Hour of Independence' for French Colonies

TEMPS PRESENT deals Friday, August 30
with the decolonization of the French Empire

THE HOUR OF INDEPENDENCE, an NFB documentary to be seen Friday night, August 30, on CBC-TV's *Temps Présent*, will consider decolonization processes in the French Empire, particularly in North Africa and Indo China, where independence movements were characterized by violence, and in Black Africa, where virtually all the countries in the French orbit achieved independence quickly and quietly—so quietly that few in the rest of the world know much about these new French-speaking territories.

The program will try to explain how the newly independent countries feel towards their one-time colonizer. It includes interviews with Prof. Stanley Hoffman, a Frenchman by birth who is now lecturing at Harvard University in

political science, speaking as an independent expert from an academic point of view; and Messali Hadj, one of the fathers of the Algerian independence movement, who has been in and out of French jails for most of his life, and, when the interview was filmed, was in exile in France because of differences of opinion with the new Algerian regime. He recalls some of the indignities suffered by the Arabs under French rule.

There will also be brief interviews with Charles Delgado of the Senegal Mission to the United Nations, and François Ebakisse of the Cameroun Mission to the U.N., who discuss, among other topics, the degree to which French culture has permeated Black Africa and whether its effects will last.

Professor Hoffman says that

French culture is fairly deeply imbedded in Black Africa. "The number of students from there in French universities has increased steadily," he says, "and very often what they do pick up in France is a certain style of argument, a certain ideology. They often go back to their country much more radical than when they came, which sometimes produces embarrassment for their governments. There are unions of African students in France who meet regularly, vote resolutions and argue exactly as if they were youth sections of French political parties, with all that that implies.

"Many people have assumed that the next generation of leaders is going to be much less influenced by France. If you look at the leadership in most of those countries at

Indians in Northern Manitoba

Lynne MacFarlane talks with residents of communities on the northern shores of Lake Winnipeg Sunday on POINTS WEST

IN THE FAR reaches of Northern Manitoba, a great land is awakening as commercial ventures and government projects probe the storehouse of natural resources accessible along the great inland waterway of Lake Winnipeg and its network of rivers.

To hear of the effects development of this land has on living conditions of the Indians there, and the opinions of its residents, both Indian and white, about how development should be managed, Winnipeg broadcaster Lynne MacFarlane and CBC producer Betty Tomlinson recently took a cruise on Lake Winnipeg. On CBC Radio's *Points West*, Sunday, August 25 at 6:00 p.m., Mrs. MacFarlane describes what she saw

and presents interviews with residents of the communities of Berens River, Norway House and Grand Rapids.

Father Albert Joboin of Berens River and Bernard Lee, principal of a day and residential school at Norway House, tell of how the Indians are educated in the north. Sister Dionne, in charge of the hospital at the Catholic Mission in Berens River tells of the care given Indian children. Jack Staunton, Indian agent at Norway House, speaks of his work there.

Mrs. MacFarlane asks if cradle-to-grave care of the treaty Indian is destroying his initiative, and Mr. Staunton gives his answer. Harry Everett, an Indian who is purser

on the passenger boat M.S. Kenora on which the CBC team took the cruise, in an interview says he feels too much government help for his people is a bad thing.

Another interviewee, young John Alixe, owns one of the three stores at Berens River. The son of a Lebanese immigrant, he feels that northern Manitoba has great opportunity for young people if they will work.

These interesting, colourful people of the north tell their story of the awakening northland on this special broadcast on *Points West*. Interviewer Lynne MacFarlane is regularly heard Tuesdays and Thursdays on CBW's *Morning Comment*.

presence and responsibility of her father is irksome to Ken. Because she understands her husband's attitude and at the same time feels incompetent to improve the situation, she is frequently irritable and takes it out on Ken. She is plainly suffering from the pressures of the situation, looks harrassed, and is quick to take offense.

Their children are three normal, healthy teenagers, all getting a little difficult as most of them do at that age, and all of them a bit bored by grandfather. They are noisy, argumentative, and resent being "shushed" because of grandfather.

Harvey Mason, too, is all too aware of the problems in the situation. In the hospital he has realized how lonely he was in his daugh-

ter's home with none of his contemporaries around. Finally the difficulty is brought out into the open and freely discussed with the doctor and all concerned, and what appears to be a satisfactory solution is arrived at.

On the program the doctor also discusses strokes and broken hips and how they are treated in elderly patients; what agencies can be called on for help by sons and daughters in looking after their parents and by elderly people who are trying to look after themselves as long as possible; what is recommended for an elderly couple who have their own house or apartment and how long they should continue there; what different types of homes are available for the aged; what mental preparations the doctor recommends to men facing retirement from work, and many other questions relative to old age.

Host for *Check-Up* is Lloyd Robertson. Special consultants for the program on geriatrics were Dr. C. K. Stuart, senior medical specialist, Ontario Department of Public Welfare, Streetsville, Ont.; Dr. J. B. Rockman, member of the College of General Practice (Medicine) of Canada, Toronto; and Dr. R. Ian Macdonald, chief of medical service, Sunnybrooke Hospital, Toronto. Series consultant to the CBC from the Canadian Medical Association is Dr. Norrie Swanson; scripts are by Alan King; production by Denny Spence; and the program organizer is John Livingston.

death his sons, Claver and Samuel, continued with the business. Today Casavant Frères is the leading organ-building firm on this continent, and Casavant organs are famous around the world. Some important Canadian installations include Notre Dame Church, Montreal; the Royal York Hotel and the Metropolitan Church, Toronto.

This Sunday, August 25, in a program titled *Diary of a Music Maker*, produced in Montreal by Jack Zolov, CBC-TV's 20/20 visits St. Hyacinthe to tell the story of the famed Casavant organs and the craftsmen who make them.

At Casavant Frères, organ building is a family tradition handed down from father to son. The firm's workers are immensely proud of its reputation, and feel that they are not just producing a commodity but are collaborating to create a work of art. The average organ craftsman at Casavant is more artist than journeyman, working with materials which have to be sensitive enough to give life to the music of Bach or Hindemith, yet robust enough to ring out joyfully and make the rafters throb as the congregation rises in song.

In the modern plant where several hundreds are employed, some of the techniques used are medieval, some are modern. Under skilled hands, wood, metal and leather are put through processes of shaping and refining to become creations of beauty and majesty.

CBW Afternoon Concert

Features Britten's War Requiem

THE SPECIAL summer choral programs presented on CBW's *Afternoon Concert* (3:00-4:00 p.m.) will end the week of August 26-30 with the presentation of Benjamin Britten's *War Requiem*. This lofty and deeply moving work will be presented in two parts, the first three sections on Tuesday, August 27 and the remaining three parts on Thursday, August 29.

Britten's *War Requiem* is regarded as his most profound and accomplished work to date. The structure of his large-scale setting of the *Missa pro Defunctis* has been conceived on three distinct levels or planes. In the foreground are the two male soloists, — the soldiers—and the chamber orchestra, concerned throughout with the poems of Wilfred Owen. Theirs is the world of immediacy: an intensely personal vision of man driven to the extremities of violent action. Beyond them range the large forces of the Mass itself, soprano soloist, full chorus and orchestra. They represent the formal expres-

sion of mourning—the liturgical plea for deliverance. Still more distant and separate is the boys' choir and organ: the mystery of innocence and purity conveyed by voices from afar.

The *War Requiem* was first performed in January, 1962, at the dedication of the new cathedral at Coventry. It is dedicated to four of Britten's friends who lost their lives in the Second World War. The score is prefaced by the following lines of Wilfred Owen:

"My subject is War, and the pity of War

The poetry is in the pity

All a poet can do today is warn."

Wilfred Owen was undoubtedly the outstanding English poet of the First World War and for that matter the Second World War, if that holocaust can be seen as a continuation of the First. Owen was killed at the age of 25, a week before the Armistice in 1918, attempting to lead his company (Royal Manchester Regiment) over the Sambre Canal. Only a few weeks before, he had been awarded the Military Cross for gallantry. Unlike other poets of the time, Owen did not accept any conventional attitude of blind patriotism toward the war, which appeared to him as a hellish outrage against humanity on a huge scale, and a violation of the basic tenets of Christianity.

He unfortunately shared the destiny of millions on both sides, but unlike them he had the sensibility to see what war really meant, and the power to explain it.

In this newly recorded performance the artists taking part are: Galina Vishnevskaya, soprano; Peter Pears, tenor; Dietrich Fischer-Dieskau, baritone, with the Bach Choir, L.S.O. Chorus, Highgate School Choir, Melos Ensemble and the London Symphony Orchestra conducted by the composer.

present, you find that these are men who were not only trained in French culture, but also have served in French institutions, served as members of the French parliament before they became independent, or even—Sagan is a very good case—served as members of French cabinets. Obviously the next generation of these is not going to be so deeply steeped in French traditions. However, because of the language, because of the influx of aid, of teachers, of technicians, I think the influence will continue . . . In a country like Senegal, for instance, there has been a great impact of some French thinking about planning, about economic development. And the French rate of investment, mainly public investment, in former colonial areas is the highest per capita in the world."

Professor Hoffman goes on to say that "In one respect French colonization has been like every other colonization, an exercise in discrimination. This has been the case everywhere, and particularly in North Africa. If one looks at the actual treatment of the natives, they have never been treated in the same way as the French have been, hence the rebellions. On the other hand, the theory and the ideal of French colonization have always been one of assimilation, mainly cultural assimilation. The hope that through education, at least an élite, and hopefully, the whole population, could become like the French, since the French have never doubted that their culture was civilization incarnate, has made, I think, colonial retreat much more painful than colonial retreat for England or for Holland. The French have always been convinced of the universality of their own values, and the colonies were supposed to be evidence of this. Parting from colonies becomes an exercise in vivisection, and this has been particularly the case with North Africa, because there you have the settler element, also. So

it has been painful. On the other hand, since there never was the assumption that the natives are necessarily inferior and beyond capacity of assimilation, this has left room, I think, for fairly deep cultural influence still. And for all sorts of links, personal links, a tradition of at least a beginning of a common culture, which is very important politically.

"I think the British attitude has been, on the whole, a more practical one. The British have never, I think, lost the habit of looking at the plusses and minuses of colonization, and when the losses exceeded the gains, they were reasonably left to cut their losses. When people suggested after the war in France that the losses exceeded the gains, they were treated as bad Frenchmen, because this was not supposed to be a commercial enterprise. It was supposed to be an almost mythical one, with the result that the battle of decolonization was much more fierce. But on the other hand, it has made for probably greater attention to the problems of the newly independent countries, than in England. I am struck by the way in which, among French intellectuals—and by intellectuals I mean not only the writers, the review editors, but also the top civil servants, who all come from the same intellectual training—the problems of the new countries, of development, of unity and equality in those areas, are very prominent ones. And DeGaulle has never failed in his speeches to insist on a kind of French mission of helping the newly independent states become really adult members of the international community.

"I think that on the whole, if one compares the conditions of those African countries which were colonies and those of the few African countries that were never colonies, there is no doubt that it was better for them to be colonized. From the viewpoint of economic development, of cultural influence, of modernity in general, I think they have gained a great deal. Of course they are not likely to see it that way, especially in the immediate post-colonial phase . . ."

lows, greens and blues in house-paint do a lot to offset the bleak landscape. Lawns have been seeded on the few inches of topsoil, and flowers bloom brightly. Just below the thin topsoil is the permafrost, but town planners have made use of an ingenious idea to get around the problems it presents. Aklavik had no running water in the winter or inside plumbing, because sewers and water pipes could not be buried in the perpetually frozen ground or used above ground in winter due to the extremely low temperatures in the area. Aklavik citizens melted ice for water in winter and in summer there was an above-ground water pipe with a tap in front of each house.

In contrast, Inuvik offers the ultimate in luxury. A utility, a steam-heated, galvanized iron conduit for utilities, runs along posts all over town, with an arm jutting into each building. It contains sewers, water pipes and steam pipes to serve all town residents the year-round. A central plant provides the steam which keeps the water and sewage pipes from freezing, and heats the houses.

When the town was officially opened in July, 1961, it had a population of 1,500 Indians, Eskimos and civil servants, a number which increases during the winter, when hundreds of Eskimo and Indian children from many distant areas of the Western Arctic are flown in to attend school and to live in huge, ultra-modern Anglican and Roman Catholic hostels. It's a strange life for these youngsters, who spend more than half the year in clean, bright, well-equipped surroundings, and the rest of the time in little huts and tents which are home, if sometimes squalid.

Recently Peggy MacFarlane of Edmonton visited Inuvik to prepare a program about the town and its people for CBC radio's *Soundings*. Produced by Peter Kappele, it will be heard on Thursday night, August 29, at 8:30.

Fall TV Plans Include Many New Shows

A NEW APPROACH to public affairs programming designed to give more intensive and in-depth coverage to a wide variety of subjects is planned for the fall and winter schedules at CBC-TV.

An hour-long program on alternate Sunday nights will be devoted to presentation of special documentary, contemporary and scientific subjects now carried on *Close-Up*, *Explorations* and *The Nature of Things*.

Alternating with this hour-long program on Sunday nights will be a half-hour program dealing with current events in Quebec, including the political scene, as it relates to the rest of Canada, and a half-hour public affairs program from Toronto, format of which is now being decided.

Explorations-type programs contributed by CBC centres in Halifax, Montreal, Winnipeg and Vancouver, as well as National Film Board productions, will be seen in half-hour programs scheduled on Monday nights.

CBC dramas in serial form will be seen Thursday nights leading off the season with Thomas Raddall's *The Wings of Night*, an eight-episode dramatization adapted for television by Hugh Webster. Other Canadian serials include an eight-episode mystery drama, *Strangers in Ste. Angele*, by Phyllis Lee Peterson, set in the Laurentians during the skiing season, and a 12-episode serialized drama by Lillian Andrews set in Toronto's financial district and entitled *Bay Street*.

When *Festival* returns, it will move from Monday nights to Wednesdays in the same time period. Included for presentation during the season are 17 *Festival* dramas, five music concerts, and four programs in the *Camera Canada* series.

Quest will also be back, but will be seen on Tuesday nights rather than on Sunday nights as in the past.

Hockey fans will have 30 minutes more of activity on Saturday night. Game coverage will start 30 minutes after opening face-off.

Telescope, a summer schedule program, will continue into the fall and winter on Friday nights. Fletcher Markle is writer and host of *Telescope*, a series which examines, reflects and projects the Canadian image through Canadian people and places.

New half-hour film shows are *The Lucy Show*, with Lucille Ball; and *Grindl*, starring Imogene Coca who appears each week in amusing situations, to be seen Thursday nights; and *Patty Duke*, a family situation comedy, scheduled for Tuesday nights.

The Saint, an hour-long film series based on stories by mystery writer Leslie Charteris, on Saturday nights, and *International Showtime* on Sunday nights will be seen on CBC-owned and operated stations, along with two returning shows, *Candid Camera* and *The Alfred Hitchcock Hour* which will be seen Thursday nights.
