LAURIER: ONE OF OUR FEW HEROES

Brilliant statesman, skilled politician, courageous idealist—this was Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Prime Minister from 1896 to 1911. An inspiring drama about this great historical figure is presented Sunday, March 27th at 2:00 p.m. on THROUGH THE EYES OF TOMORROW, CBC-TV's youth-oriented program.

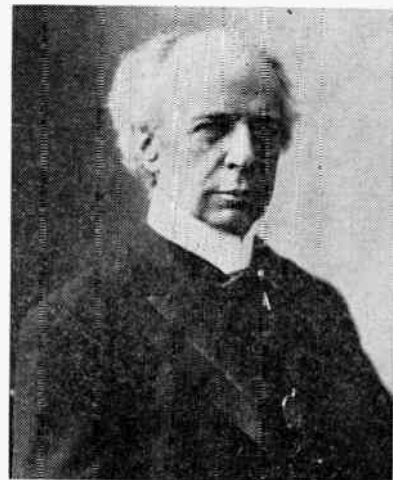

HE WAS PART plumed knight, part Machiavelli, part silver-tongued Sir Galahad, and a democrat to the hilt. Sir Wilfrid Laurier was physically frail, but he was a born leader of men, and a wise one, for he never looked for complete perfection in either men or politics, only for "the best that will work," in his long battle for a unified Canada within the framework of empire. If Canada has few heroes, he was certainly one of them, not only because of his brilliant statesmanship as politician and Prime Minister, but also because of his idealism and his courage in fighting for his beliefs against the bitterest opposition. That makes him a particularly appropriate subject for a drama for teenage viewers, such as the one *Through the Eyes of Tomorrow* presents on TV Sunday, March 27th, at 2:00 p.m. under the title of *Granite and Oak*.

Written by Edwin R. Procnier and produced by Herbert Roland, it stars Barry Morse as Laurier, with Gillie Fenwick as Henri Gagnon, a friend of Laurier's since childhood; Rex Sevenoaks as Samuel Dyer, a Liberal M.P. from Ontario; Chris Wiggins as Sir John A. Macdonald; Len Birman as a visitor; Eleanor Beecroft as Ma-

dame Laurier; and Michael Sarrazin as David Strong, Laurier's loyal secretary. The drama will be followed by a discussion of Laurier and his contribution to Canada, by Barry Morse and a panel of students.

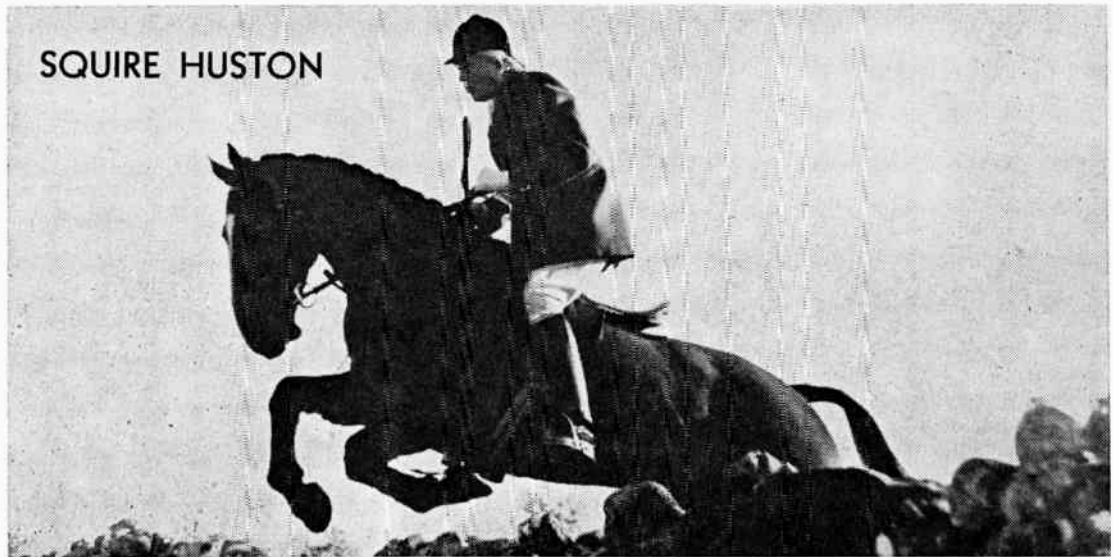
The play is set in 1891, the year the Prime Minister, Sir John A. Macdonald, only weeks away from his death, said of Laurier: "Nice chap, that. If I were 20 years younger, he'd be my colleague." Laurier, Liberal Leader of the Opposition, and his party have just been defeated in a general election by the ailing Macdonald and his Tories. Laurier is being pressured from two sides — by English-speaking Liberals who want one of their own as leader, and by some of his own French-Canadian, Roman Catholic people, who see him as a dangerous, European-style radical they can do without.

Laurier is torn by doubts. He must decide whether to seize the reins of power firmly and face the barrage of violent opposition that might bring, or step down for the good of the Party, and perhaps see his dreams for Canada collapse. He is 50 years old, "an unquestionably profound and noble human being," as dedicated

as any Canadian in our short history, but not strong physically, and he knows that to stay and fight will take a heavy toll on his health.

The title of the play, *Granite and Oak*, is taken from a speech which Sir Wilfrid made at Arichat, Nova Scotia, on August 15th, 1900, when he said: "As long as I live, as long as I have power to use in the service of my country, I shall repel the idea of changing the nature of its different elements. I want the marble to remain the marble; I want the granite to remain the granite; I want the oak to remain the oak; I want the sturdy Scotsman to remain the Scotsman; I want the brainy Englishman to remain the Englishman; I want the warm-hearted Irishman to remain the Irishman."

The first words he ever spoke from a public platform, as a raw young valedictorian at McGill University, were in the form of a pledge that became his life-long aim: "To give the whole of my life to the cause of conciliation, harmony, and concord amongst the different elements of this country of ours" — an ambition which it is hoped this drama may help to kindle in the young viewers who watch it.

John Huston on a hunt in Ireland

TELESCOPE visits film writer-director John Huston in Ireland

IN MANY OF the pictures directed by John Huston, the central character is a hard-bitten, tough-minded cynic, caught in a situation where he must battle the works of God and man to win a questionable victory. The theme runs through such films as *The Treasure of the Sierra Madre*, *Key Largo*, *The African Queen*, *Moby Dick*, *The Asphalt Jungle*—many of them classics of their kind. Humphrey Bogart created the archetype of the role, but

it was director Huston who, to a large extent, lived it out in real life.

Had Huston drifted into acting, rather than into writing and directing, it might have been he who epitomized the man-against-fate element in so many of his pictures. He would have been well prepared for it: In his 20s he led a gypsy life, broke, roaming the world with no particular sense of purpose or direction. (Please turn to page 33)

8:30 p.m.—Music Diary

Correspondents across the country review the symphony season now drawing to a close.

Barbra Streisand, with a talent as unique as the spelling of her first name, is seen Sunday, March 27th in her second TV Special.

WHEN Jerome Weidman was casting the musical *I Can Get It for You Wholesale*, a bewildered press agent brought him a scrap of paper. "Get a load of this," said the press agent. "I ask the cast to give me some stuff for the biographical notes in the program. Look what this dame gives me."

The dame was newcomer Barbra Streisand, who had a very minor part in the show, and what she had written was: "Not a member of the Actor's Studio, Miss Streisand is 19 and this is her first Broadway show. Born in Madagascar and reared in Rangoon, she attended Erasmus Hall High School in Brooklyn. She appeared off-Broadway in a one-nighter entitled *Another Evening with Harry Stoones*. She has appeared at New York's two best known supper clubs, the Bon Soir and the Blue Angel, and was on Mike Wallace's *PM East* eight times, the *Jack Paar Show* twice, the *Garry Moore Show*, the *Tonight Show* with Groucho Marx, and is being sought for many top TV entertainments this season."

Called upon to settle some doubts about the authenticity of the piece, Miss Streisand also explained away her curious first name. "I'm so sick and tired of being born in Brooklyn," she said, "I could plotz. I hapna love Brooklyn, but it's like the name Barbara. Every day with that third 'a' in the middle, you could go out of your mind. I've had 19 years Barbara with three 'a's' and all my life born in Brooklyn. Enough is enough."

Barbra had two specialty numbers in *I Can Get It for You Wholesale*, and one of them (*Miss Marmelstein*) stopped the show. It was evident that she was going to become very famous—"Not only because she has genius," wrote Weidman later, "but also because she is what lawyers call *sui generis*, or unique, which is what every star must be." What made her a star was a Broadway show called *Funny Girl*, which opened in April, 1964. She was barely 22, and as Fanny Brice, the Zeigfeld Follies star, was nothing less than great. "I hadda be great. I couldn't be medium. My mouth was too big."

The critics were divided over *Funny Girl* (though the show drew good houses, and the record album with the original cast topped all other show albums in sales for the year), but they were unanimous in their praise of Barbra. Some of the biggest names in show-business expressed their admiration for her, and, in one of those almost inexplicable phenomena of the entertainment world, a Streisand "cult" sprang up. Everyone began talking about the new star. A television special, *My Name Is Barbra*, followed, and when the industry voted its awards for the best TV shows in 1965, *My Name Is Barbra* collected five Emmys.

Her second television special, *Color Me Barbra*, will be telecast Sunday at 10:00 p.m. on CBC-TV. In three different settings—the Art Museum in Philadelphia, a circus, and a concert hall in New York—Barbra sings in her *sui generis* style and models some high fashions, some of which she designed herself.

COMMONWEALTH ARTS FESTIVAL

A 60-minute excerpt of performances at last year's festival in Britain is seen Sunday, March 27th at 4:00 p.m. on CBC-TV.

LAST YEAR Britain held the first Commonwealth Arts Festival, a three-week gala of drama, concerts, dancing, and various exhibitions. Taking part in the festival were about 1,500 artists from 23 Commonwealth countries — everything from symphony orchestras to tribal dance groups.

Highlights from the spectacles staged by some of these groups will be seen this week on CBC-TV in a special one-hour program, *Commonwealth Arts Festival*. The major part of the program will be devoted to the dance, with interpreters of many different styles being represented: the Australian Ballet, the Sierra Leone National Dance Troupe, the Royal Winnipeg Ballet, the Trinidad

Limbo Dancers, the Kandyan Dancers from Ceylon, and the National Dance Company from Jamaica. In addition, the program will feature the Legon Musicians from Ghana, the Trinidad Steel Band, and a quartet known as The Merry Men of Barbados.

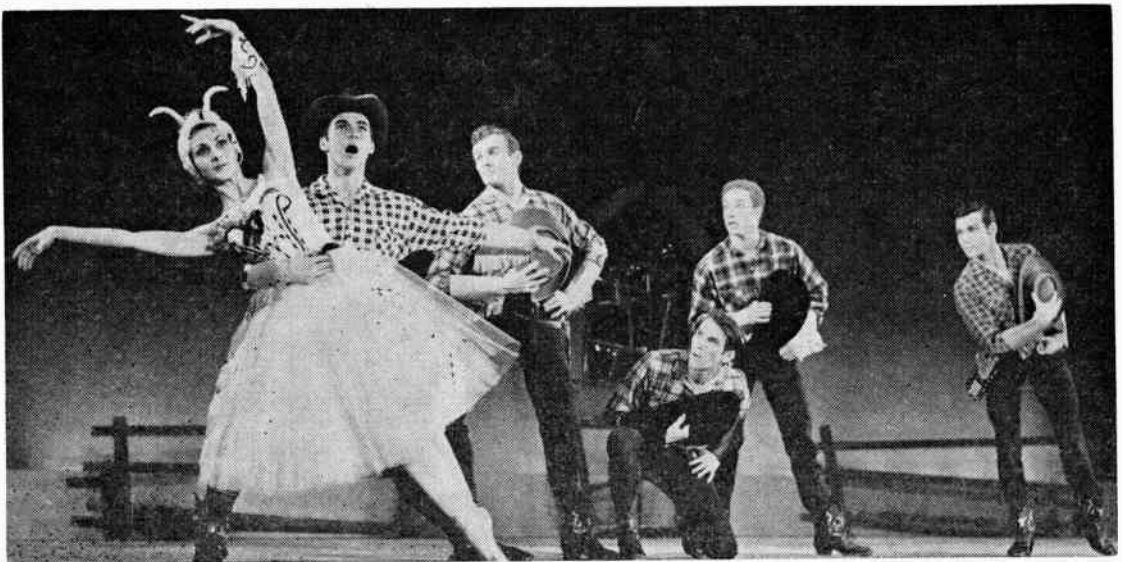
Viewers here will be especially interested in the performances of the Royal Winnipeg Ballet, which is now a quarter of a century old. It was Canada's first ballet company and is also the first "Royal" company in the Commonwealth. Unmistakably Canadian in character, the Royal Winnipeg Ballet has a strong international flavor in its personnel. Among the principal dancers and soloists, Sonia Taverner and Yemael Oved

are British, Lynette Fry is South African, Fredric Strobel and Richard Rutherford are American, and Wendy Barker is Australian.

At the festival the company presented *Pas de Dix*, choreographed by George Balanchine; *The Comedians*, by Ruthanna Boris; *The Bitter Weird*, by Agnes de Mille; *Aimez-Vous Bach?*, *While the Spider Slept*, *Pas D'Action*, and *Les Whoops-de-Doo*, by Brian Macdonald; *The Beggar's Ballet*, by Robert Moulton; and *Intermede*, by Arnold Spohr, the Saskatchewan-born director of the company.

It is hoped that the Commonwealth Arts Festival may become a regular event held every three years in a different country in the Commonwealth.

The Royal Winnipeg Ballet showed the British their Western-dress production, *Les Whoops-de-Doo*.



ONE OF THE most extraordinary dramas the CBC has ever presented, a poetic document by George Ryga about an ordinary man who refuses to compromise, and his struggle to remain an individual and alive, will be seen on *Festival* Wednesday night, March 30th. George Bloomfield, who produced and directed the play, calls it "the most exciting script in my experience. Len Birman, as a kind of Canadian Peer Gynt, gives the most outstanding male performance I have ever seen, an incredible feat of acting." Birman is a veteran of many CBC, Stratford Festival and off-Broadway productions. Ryga is a sensitive British Columbia writer who has had several outstanding dramas produced on CBC-TV, including *Indian*, *Two Soldiers*, and *For Want of Something Better to Do*. *Man Alive* is the first of a trilogy on which Ryga and Bloomfield are collaborating. The second will be a study of a woman. Ryga's latest novel, *Bal-lad of a Stone Picker*, has just been published by Macmillan of Canada.

FESTIVAL: EXTRAORDINARY DRAMA

Man Alive is an off-beat epic exploring the thoughts and experiences of Duke, a Canadian working man, as he searches for his identity and for reassurance that he will leave some impression on the world after he is dead. Because Duke is a joyous, warm, compassionate man who respects other human beings, he is revolted by the degradation he sees around him as he roams through Canadian cities and countryside, sometimes in search of a job, sometimes longing wistfully for someone to assuage his loneliness, sometimes asking: Is there anyone here who really knows me? His problem is that he laughs too loudly. He does everything too big. Consequently he feels terribly alone. The play covers his life from 1935 to 1965 in a kaleidoscope of impressions of people, places, emotions, thoughts, and actions that reveal much about him—and us.

Duke suffers because he sees those around him beginning to live mechanically, obsessed by the necessity to grub for a living. Fast-changing economic conditions leave him bewildered, not knowing where or how he fits into the scheme of things. Briefly he discovers the joy of the love of a woman, and clumsily but sincerely tries to awaken her to a wider appreciation of life. As the years brush by, Duke is more and more disillusioned by man's senseless drive for the sensational, by the relentless battering of events, by the callousness of people who take no stock in him as a person, but see him only as a thing to be pushed aside, stepped over or used as a vaulting pole. When he reaches the end of his tether, he comes face to face with the Fanatic, his lesser and negative self, who despairs of even trying to live today. This grim reality so disgusts and alarms Duke that he summons a final burst of strength and courageously re-

asserts his faith in the power of love to sustain and give adequate hope to man in his feebleness.

Besides Len Birman, *Man Alive* features Gwen Thomas in her first television appearance, as Julia; Peter Peer, also new to TV, as the Fanatic; Gerard Parkes as First Bum; Bernard Behrens as Second Bum; Ken James as the Policeman; Ralph Endersby as the Boy; Sydney Brown as Jonathan; and Chief Wilmer Nadijwon as the Indian. Bloomfield points out that "Len Birman has usually been cast as a hostile, angry character or as a dandy. But Duke is neither of these. His role calls for a personality of great giving. He is a man who is the essence of man, who has great virility, strong father instincts, gentleness, and the sensitivity of a poet embodied in a powerful physical frame capable of greater physical feats than all those around him. Duke lacks what

seems to be the going thing for men of our generation—ability to step on anybody, compromise or ignore. Duke tries to live by the positive values we all hear about in church, and ends up appearing (to those who don't have them but talk a lot about them) to be something of a bum, like the guy, not too well dressed, who comes up to you on the street, and you turn away, thinking he'll ask for a dime. Duke's that guy, but he doesn't ask for a dime. He just wants to talk."

To emphasize the feeling of reality in the play, Bloomfield produced it without what he calls "the phoniness of studio sets and flats," with a bare minimum of props, and shot it in documentary style, using film footage, news clips, rear-screen slide projection, and unusually creative lighting. "When I abandoned the usual idea of sets," he says, "I had to fill the screen with something, and what could be more expressive than faces? Most of the money spent on this production

went to talent, where I think it should go. And I feel that this shows in the production. There are many, many new faces in *Man Alive*, accentuating its feeling of documentary authenticity. The cast and crew's spirit of involvement and co-operation was unusually high. I had the feeling of being back in the theatre where everybody cares."

It's a poetic drama in the sense that it uses very few words to get its ideas across, and calls for a good deal of improvisation. Bloomfield has tried to express Duke's emotional conflict and thought processes through imagery. Elements of fantasy point up the feeling of man challenging something that oppresses him, yet being unable to come face to face with what his opposition really is, as it is with many of our frustrations. Bloomfield feels that every scene in the play is a love scene in the truest sense—man trying to show his love of life, in both comic and tragic situations.—June Graham.

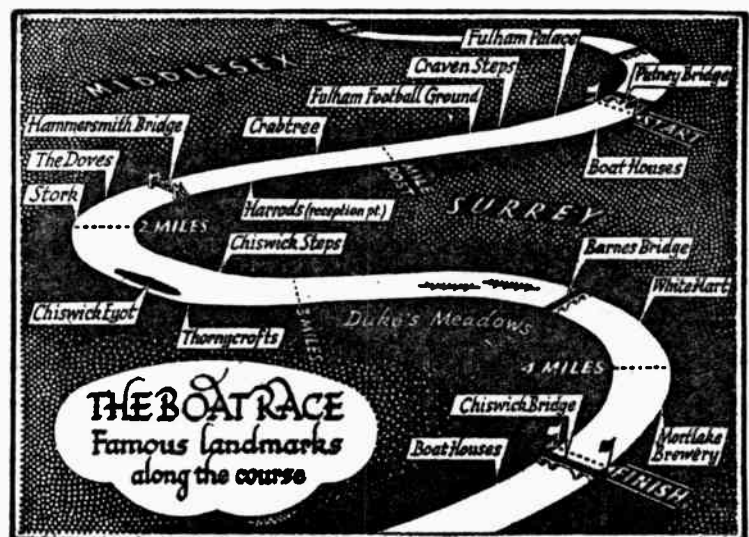

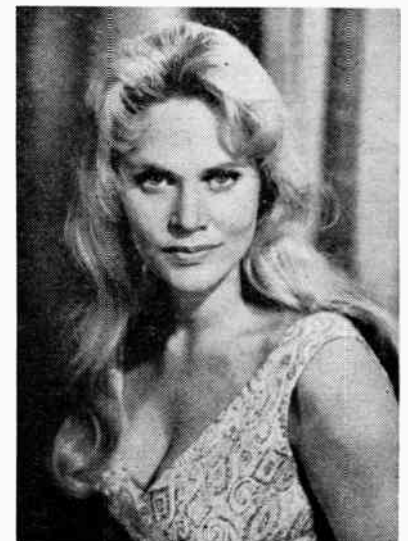

Radio and TV Report on British Elections

THE OCTOBER, 1964, general election in Britain offered the elector a choice between two principal candidates of contrasting background. On the one hand the Government was headed by the Scottish nobleman, Sir Alec Douglas-Home, K.T., who had inherited the leadership of the Conservative party from the former Prime Minister, Harold Macmillan, while the Opposition was led by a plain Yorkshireman, Harold Wilson, whose origins were, according to the stratification of British society, "lower middle class."

The election being held this week presents a slightly different picture in this respect. Mr. Wilson's chief opponent, Conservative party leader Edward Heath, has a very

similar background of birth and education, although he is from the South rather than the North and does not fit as readily as Mr. Wilson into the kind of social pigeonholes to which the British automatically assign people. Both men are Oxford educated (Wilson, Jesus College; Heath, Balliol), where they studied Economics. Wilson, who was awarded a Gladstone Memorial Prize and obtained a first in Modern Greats (Philosophy, Politics, and Economics), became, at 21, Lecturer in Economics at New College, Oxford, and Research Assistant to Lord Beveridge. Heath financed his academic career by winning an organ scholarship, and on coming down planned to begin

Views of A White Rhodesian

PROJECT '66 gives insight into the feelings of a member of Rhodesia's white minority.

A STUDY in depth of a white Rhodesian tobacco farmer, John Walmsley, his stake in the country he has come to love more than the England he left over 20 years ago, and how he regards the future of his children in Rhodesia, will be presented on radio's *Project '66* at 10:30 p.m. Sunday, March 27th. It was prepared by freelance broadcaster Kerry Ellard, who spent several days with the Walmsleys last month on their 2,787-acre farm at Raffingore, northwest of Salisbury.

Walmsley is a shrewd, intelligent, warm-hearted person, and his wife personifies the sort of hospitality we associate with Western Canada. Their eldest son, Robert, 18, leaves soon to study agriculture in England, but plans to return to assist his father on the farm.

The Walmsleys and Ellard had never met until he drove up to their long, thatched house and told them that a chap in Salisbury had suggested they might be willing to record some of their hopes and fears about life in Rhodesia, for Canadian listeners. The Walmsleys took to him at once. His sincere, engaging manner elicited some unusually revealing comments on Rhodesian problems. Of course, their remarks do not purport to represent the general feeling of white Rhodesians, but merely to show how one intelligent, articulate white farmer and his family see the situation there.

"When we came here after the war," says Mrs. Walmsley, "we were young and terribly hopeful. Just think of a grateful government giving you a piece of land! And all your dreams, when you're in your 20s, of what you're going to make of it! We had very scruffy houses, but everyone was scruffy together. We all lived in mud huts. Nobody had begun then to ac-

Act 1. The Venusberg. Tannhauser slumbers while the creatures of Venus revel in an orgy. The Three Graces appear and there are visions of Leda and the Swan and Europa and the Bull. Tannhauser has been held a captive through his love for Venus but his desires are satiated, and he longs for freedom. Waking, he grasps his harp and pays homage to the goddess with a love song. He ends it with a plea to depart. When Venus again tries to charm him he declares: "My salvation rests in Mary, the mother of God." These words break the unholy spell. Venus and her attendants disappear and he finds himself below the Wartburg. It is springtime; a young shepherd pipes an ode to Spring. Pilgrims in procession pass Tannhauser, and sobbingly he sinks to his knees. Thus he is found by the landgrave and his companions in the chase, Wolfram, Walter, Biterolf, Reimar and Heinrich. They welcome the singer, and he follows the landgrave and singers to the Wartburg.

Act 2. Hall of the Wartburg. Elisabeth has been living retired from the world since Tannhauser's disappearance. When she hears of his return she joyfully greets the Hall of Song. Wolfram leads Tannhauser to her; he loves her but dares not tell her the evil he has done. The landgrave and Elisabeth receive the guests who assemble for the contest. The landgrave announces the subject of the day to be Love's Awakening. Elisabeth is to bestow the award. Wolfram begins; he declares that love is like a pure stream, which should never be troubled. Tannhauser replies hotly that he finds the highest love

only in the pleasure of the senses. Biterolf upholds Wolfram. Tannhauser replies to each, and in growing excitement he answers Wolfram with the love song of Venus, and declares that if the knights wish to know love they should repair to the Venusberg. The women, with the exception of Elisabeth, leave the hall in horror, and the knights draw swords upon Tannhauser. Elisabeth protects him, and when he expresses his penitence, the landgrave allows him to join a band of pilgrims bound for Rome, where he may perhaps obtain forgiveness from the Pope.

Act 3. The valley of the Wartburg. An autumn scene. Music describes the pilgrimage of Tannhauser. Wolfram sees Elisabeth at prayer before an outdoor shrine. She asks the returning pilgrims for news of Tannhauser but in vain. She returns broken-hearted to the Wartburg. Wolfram, who loves her with faithful devotion, has a presentiment of her death. He sees before him a tottering pilgrim in torn garments. It is Tannhauser, who in despair is seeking the path to the Venusberg. In a narrative he tells that the Pope has not forgiven him, but has cursed him.

Not until a dead stick which he carries as a staff shall leaf out as a green twig may he expect pardon. Venus appears to him and bids him welcome to her cavern. Wolfram points upward to a funeral procession which now slowly descends the hill, carrying on a bier the corpse of Elisabeth. Tannhauser throws himself upon the body and dies with the words, "Holy Elisabeth, pray for me" upon his lips. The younger pilgrims enter and announce that the Pope's staff has sprouted with young leaves in sign of the forgiveness of God.

a career in law at Gray's Inn, to which he had won a scholarship. The war interrupted this plan and he served in the artillery as a Lieutenant-Colonel. Wilson had volunteered for the Army at the outbreak of war but the Government felt he would be more valuable in the Civil Service and assigned him to duties in various ministries. For his war services he was made an O.B.E. in the 1945 New Year's Honors List.

After the war Wilson held a junior ministerial post at the Board of Trade. Heath, too, had joined the Civil Service following demobilization, but in 1947 left to become news editor of the *Church Times*. The year 1950 was a significant landmark in the political careers of these two men. In February of that year Wilson was re-elected to Parliament (having first been elected in the 1945 general election) as the M.P. for the new Lancashire division of Huyton, the seat he has represented ever since. Heath had been persuaded by friends and business associates to enter politics, following the 1945 defeat of the Conservative party, at Bexley in Kent, where he replaced the former Tory candidate. "HE LACKED neither the talent nor the ability nor the *métier* nor the integrity of the true artist — but what he most shamefully and tragically lacked was an audience. 'Why do you write so much — which no one ever sees?' his friends asked. And we can only echo, 'Why, indeed?' and admire the courage and perseverance of the man and the artist." That was Aaron Copland talking about his fellow American composer, Charles Ives, the successful New England businessman (1875-1954) who waited many years for recognition as the first really outstanding

American composer of this century, and one of the most original artists of his time.

On Sunday, March 27th, at 3.00 p.m. (9.00 p.m. on CBX and CBR), *Concerts From Two Worlds* on radio presents Ives' *Fourth Symphony*, performed by the Toronto Symphony Orchestra, conducted by Seiji Ozawa. The *Symphony* was written between 1910 and 1916; this will be its Canadian première. And on Sunday at 11:00 a.m. the CBC Vancouver Chamber Orchestra presents *A Set of Pieces* by Ives, conducted by John Avison.

1950 election he won Bexley for the Tories by 133 votes (unwittingly helped by the Communist candidate, who took 433 votes away from the Labour man). A short time later he became an unpaid whip, then a year later joined Churchill's government. In 1956 he became chief whip following the Suez split. On the international scene Heath made his name as the negotiator at Brussels for Britain's proposed entry into the European Common Market. Although the British mission failed, Heath acquitted himself with honor and distinction and was widely praised for his diplomacy. He is the first man to be elected to the leadership of the Conservative party by the voting procedure introduced in February, 1965. Previously, when the party leader's post fell vacant, the new leader was chosen by common consent among the leading members of the party inside Parliament, prospective parliamentary candidates, and the Executive Committee of the National Union. More often than not the choice of the outgoing leader decided the matter. Now, the vacancy is filled by an election conducted among Conservative members of the House of Commons, if necessary in a succession of three ballots.

Wilson's Government had only a slight lead over the Conservatives in the 1964 elections. Seventy-seven per cent of the electorate

went to the polls then and voted in 317 Labour candidates against 303 Conservatives and Associates, and nine Liberals. The political climate of Britain now, Wilson feels, is such that Labour stands a good chance of increasing its lead. However, chief among the issues is the situation in Rhodesia, which could count against Wilson at the polls.

Throughout this week CBC radio and television will be reporting on the British election on regularly scheduled programs and on special programs. On radio *Sunday Morning Magazine* (March 27th at 9:00 a.m.) will originate in London, live, and will be devoted entirely to the elections. The same program will also be broadcast direct from London the following week (April 3rd) and will be a post-election survey of Britain. On Wednesday, March 30th, the series *Between Ourselves* will be pre-empted for a direct, eve-of-elections report from London at 8:00 p.m. The following day, March 31st, when polling begins, there will be direct reports from London on the hour and the half-hour from 4:00 p.m. CST/3:00 p.m. MST, for 2½ hours. At 7:00 p.m. CST/6:00 p.m. MST on the 31st there will be a special election round-up. Contributing to these programs will be Angus McLelland, editor/producer, John

quire cash or possessions, and I think life was tremendous fun."

Now they have established themselves in comfort, but with success came responsibilities. Their farm recalls the more benevolent feudal domains of medieval Europe. Walmsley employs 40 workers, for whom (and their families) he provides housing, food, health care, a small salary (about \$15 a month), and a primary school for their 32 children. For many years he has been giving all of them a hot meal at noon. But he doesn't pat himself on the back for it. "I've told the boys themselves that I've done it for my good, not just theirs," he says, "but it happens to benefit them, too. I'm a businessman, not a missionary. My biggest mission is to make enough money to be able to pay them more and to give them decent housing and conditions."

Ellard recorded some of these Africans' views about their future in Rhodesia, and also their feelings about the white man and his place in the country's new scheme of things. Micah Badze, the farm teacher, spoke for most of them when he said: "Most Europeans are kind. Most of the bosses are good, now, and talk to the workers nicely. We have no hate against them. We live together, play together, so why should we chase them out after we have a government? We are all Rhodesians. We want them to stay and help build the country."

How does the white man feel about it? "Basically we cannot fear or dislike the African as such," says Walmsley. "All we fear for is the welfare and economy of the country. It's what the black people do when they take over a country that spells ruin and no future for European young people. But that doesn't mean to say you couldn't live in a country you love with them, and like them. It's just that we don't want to come back down to the standard they're at. We want to bring them up to ours."

Revolt on the Campus

Marjorie McEnaney visited major universities in Canada
to find what students are thinking.

THE CREDOS of Thoreau, Bertrand Russell, Gandhi and Martin Luther King have been simmering on Canadian campuses for some time. Now they're beginning to boil. More and more university students are becoming socially and politically involved, convinced that they must try to change the world for the better — soon. They are perturbed by what they call the dehumanization and alienation of society. There are rules for the masses, they say, and individualism

is discriminated against. They envision a "participatory democracy" in which governments and parliaments would become progressively unnecessary, as people learned to work together and make decisions themselves about things affecting them. An impossible Utopia, perhaps, considering the vagaries of human nature. But these young people are convinced that changes for the better can come if they organize themselves and work together toward a closer sharing of ideas and ideals, on community, national and international levels.

of university tuition fees. They told Mrs. McEnaney they wanted to participate in the government of their universities. A girl asked: Why should decisions be made by men who succeeded in commerce or industry but are remote from our interests? In her university's charter, she said, students were mentioned only once, and that in connection with a disciplinary matter. Students are far more critical of their professors than ever before — are even conducting surveys to assess professors' teaching ability, and say they are not prepared to put up with dull or unsatisfactory lecturers.

They are not altogether wide-eyed. They appreciate the size of such a project. They have a quiet self-confidence and awareness of the roots of current economic, political and social dissension and dissatisfaction. And they seem determined not to let their enthusiasm suffocate in the responsibilities they will assume soon as householders and parents.

Freelance broadcaster Marjorie McEnaney discovered all this recently when she talked to some of them on campuses in Vancouver, Edmonton, Winnipeg, Toronto and Montreal. She recorded a wide variety of their views about university and general problems, and their comments on the kind of action they are taking to implement them, and she attended some of their demonstrations. This week she presents a candid and informative documentary about *The Revolving Campus on CBC Tuesday Night*, March 29th at 8:05 p.m. Production is by Dita Vadron.

The program begins with an edited actuality report of a demonstration in Vancouver last fall, organized by the Canadian Union of Students, and duplicated on other Canadian campuses, in which 3,000 students asked for elimination

The program also includes sounds of another demonstration — this time against the war in Viet Nam — in front of the American Consulate in Toronto, organized by the Student Union of Peace Action. These students talked a lot about love. One of the underlying principles of SUPA is that affection and respect will ease the tensions of modern living. Mrs. McEnaney says she found that some students had given up their studies for a year or two, and were working for SUPA for \$25 a week, sharing expenses for food and rent, to try to figure out how to make the best use of their university education. They told her that what they had been studying was not really relevant to a changing world.

"The improvement projects which appeal most to these students are not those figured out in Ottawa or other branches of government, but are the ones they've thought of themselves and want to see through on their own, such as their work with the Metis and Indians. An expression they wouldn't let me use was 'world leader'. They want to have *everyone* involved in decisions."

tion. While living in London, he slept on the Embankment, sang cowboy songs in the streets for what it would bring. He managed to get a few stories published, and dabbled at screenwriting.

His film career began in earnest in 1938, when he tired of bumming around Europe and returned to Hollywood to work as a writer. He collaborated on the writing of a number of films, and hit paydirt with the Bogart picture, *High Sierra*. On the strength of its

success he got his first assignment as a director — at age 34 — and created the classic *The Maltese Falcon*, using his own adaptation of Dashiell Hammett's tough detective story. Since then he has always played a major part in the writing of all his films.

Considering his past works, it seemed odd that Huston would have accepted the job of directing *Genesis: The Bible*, the recently completed epic due to be released next September. But Huston saw the Biblical tales of Creation and Eden "as stories of adventure and human experience" rather than as

didactic preaching. Even more surprising was his debut as an opera director, in Richard Rodney Bennett's *The Mines of Sulphur* at La Scala, Milan. But the opera was a compelling piece of drama, and its central character was a cynical, tough young drifter.

When he is not directing, Huston lives the life of a country squire at the Manor of St. Clerans, County Galway, Ireland. Roger Graef recently interviewed him there for CBC-TV's *Telescope*. The program will be seen this Thursday, March 31st, at 9.30 p.m.

THIS WEEK'S PERSONALITY: *Cosette Lee*

A Canadian who is said to be "too sensible to be an actress" nevertheless is very much in demand for character roles.

A 'Character' and Her Career

"I'VE ALWAYS been a 'character,' even as a young person," says Cosette Lee. "Those are the roles that have always appealed to me. Every show is a new challenge."

Miss Lee, who appears frequent in CBC-TV dramas, is that rare creature: a Canadian actress who started her career as an actress and has never been anything but an actress.

"My first professional appearance was with the Von Glazer Players, a Toronto stock company, in *Peter Pan*," she recalls. "I was Toodles, the leader of the gang of

children, and it was at the Uptown Theatre."

Toronto-born, Cosette LeGas-sicke ("My ancestors were Normandy French") is known to her friends and showbusiness associates as Cosy.

Having been launched as an actress at an early age, Cosy Lee took a secretarial course, "just in case," but she has never used it. Graduating from business school one afternoon, she went to the theatre that night to open in a season with the Empire Stock Company. She later worked in Jack Arthur's shows on the stage of the old Shea's.

"I've always said I would stay in Canada until the work ran out," Miss Lee points out. "During the depression, there was nothing doing in theatre, so I became a puppeteer, with Joan and Gordon Forsythe. We toured Ontario, and it kept us going until radio started in a big way."

"She worked for \$2.56 a week on station CKCL. "When I hear the kids today complaining about money, it bugs me. We did *True Detective* stories, playing all the parts and doing all the sound effects."

Cosy Lee was in the first radio drama ever produced in Toronto, on CFCA, with Win Barron, the voice of screen news, who also wrote the play. "We sat around a little table, with a mike in the centre." In her early radio career, she was heard regularly on *Good Morning Breakfast Club*, *Buck Rogers* and other popular shows of the thirties. She worked for drama producer Rupert Lucas at CKNC, on Toronto's Davenport Rd., "before and after it became the CBC."

She adds, nostalgically, "I wouldn't have given up all that experience for anything."

Cosette Lee's favorite stage role is one she has played in four different productions—Madame Arcati, the zany medium in Noel Coward's *Blithe Spirit*. "It's one part I could play endlessly."

From her many character roles on television, she chooses a recent one as her favorite. This is the cat-loving old lady in Eric Till's production of *A Game-Like-Only a Game*, seen on CBC-TV's *Festival* last September. "That was my most challenging TV role so far," she says. "Eric is such a fine director. You know he's giving you direction, but he never talks down to you. I'm a very shy person, and I freeze if someone starts bawling me out."

Miss Lee's face is a familiar one in the world of TV commercials, which she does periodically. "I never apologize for my commercial work; I think of them as little bits out of a play," she observes. "Last April I broke a bone in my foot, and couldn't work for three months. The commercials kept running, and kept me going all summer."

Her current regret is that television commitments have precluded stage work in recent years. "I've had to turn down invitations from the Crest Theatre and the Manitoba Theatre Centre, and I'm petrified they may never ask me again. There's nothing like the stage and the audience."

"You learn in this business not to build yourself up too high; you're liable to be disappointed," she comments. "I've been told I'm too sensible to be an actress. But I love my work, and I hope it shows."

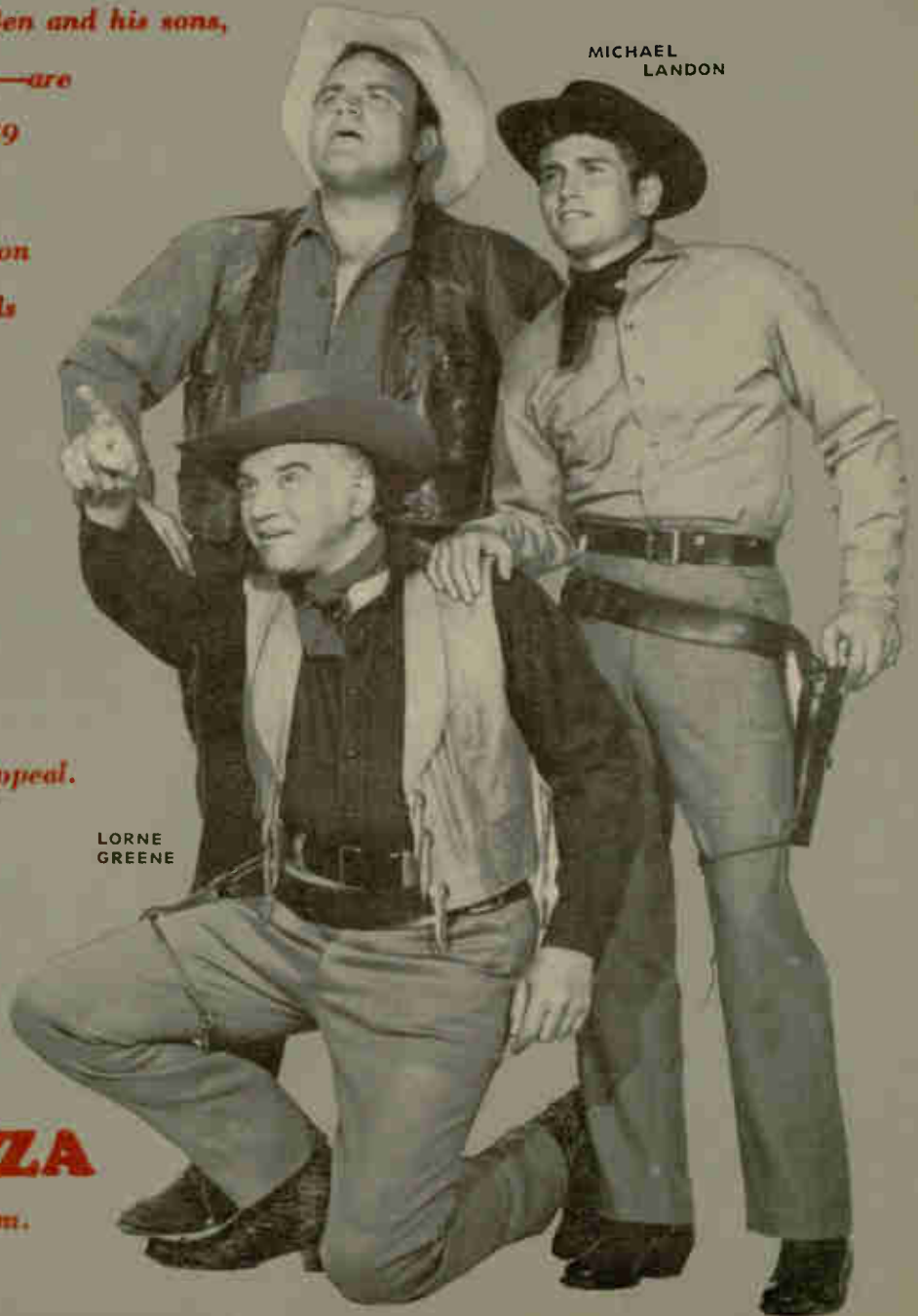
