WHY ELVIS MAY NEVER VISIT HIS BRITISH FANS

A SECRET fear that haunts Elvis Presley is almost certainly the real reason for his non-appearance in Britain.

While promoters have haggled with cash-strapped financial backers of the star, they seem to have overlooked the fact that his horror of flying is almost certainly the main reason he turns down all offers.

Presley was due to appear in the Royal Variety Show in London last October—few artists in the world would say no to the chance of appearing there—but travel here by sea would take El upwards of three weeks and he just doesn't have that amount of free time.

In fact, there isn't a three-week gap in his busy schedule right about the next two years! However, his manager, the Royal Showman, and his subsequent "consolation" gift of £900 to the Variety Fund, may have been a factor.

During his service with the American Army, Elvis had to fly. But, an unfortunate experience with a flight attendant seems to have left the plane carrying him made a forced landing in Scotland, and he has never again strayed from planes.

So if ever he comes it will certainly be by sea. This involves

**What is it that makes
Ray Charles so great?**

LAST week I promised to examine what it is that makes Ray Charles such a fan-tastic attraction that he can pack out almost any auditorium without any bidding bid. One thing is for sure—however much Ray deserves his success, and no one is more deserving—success has never been known to follow automatically in proportion to talent.

Ray's popularity goes far beyond the bounds of mere appreciation of his abilities, or even love of his music. Ray Charles is the centre of a cult of fan-worship quite illogical and incomprehensible to the stars of the silent screen or as that which still surrounds Elvis.

Ask the average man in either Britain or America who Ray Charles is, and you will get the sort of answer that is only a hazy idea. "He's some sort of rock 'n' roll singer, isn't he?" will probably be the reply.

That Ray Charles is a Negro will be rejected completely by the fan; but if he fairly describes the basic of Ray Charles' fame, He did not sing rock 'n' roll, he sang to just well-known, or accepted—when he cut "What'd I Say?" And to the average man's ear (and you can count me in) "What'd I Say?" is rock 'n' roll.

So here we have the only big name in Negro singing that is not merely tolerated by the jazzmen but revered by them; who is not just a songwriter but also a composer (of his own standards); who not only had vocal hits in every conceivable edition, but who has had instrumental hits too; who writes his own leads and arranges for his own big bands.

Ray Charles has done for popular rhythm and blues what Rolls Royce did for the motor car—taken it from being regarded as a flashy form of transport and given it respectability. Ray Charles is the Negro symbol for the American Negro.

He is really the first Negro artist to achieve a star status with a completely and exclusively Negro form of art... a kind of singing that has been condemned to make "commercial."

Handicapped

In a world where it is regrettably a handicap to be born a Negro, Ray Charles has created an atmosphere at least made it possible for him to have been born white, and to therefore, adulated as a hero of his race.

More than that—he is loved by prophet, and like the archetypal prophet, Ray is blind.

More than that, he is not necessarily relevant to his work because it certainly makes a difference to his public's attitude. It sets him off from the rest of us, it creates a gulf between him

and his public that can only be bridged by his artistry and by those aspects of his life.

And it is this "apartness" that is the fundamental quality of every artist who draws huge audiences to his shows, and otherwise try to develop this "apartness." Ray's "apartness" is an affliction; he can't escape.

Come on Helen Shapiro—let's have your version of the National Anthem, or some other well-known song.

Nice to see that songs with that sort of British flavour are still popular. Why, in Australia I see some more of one Buster Noble's first career success with "The Pommy Jack."

Splendid! Splendid! I know "Pommy" is an affectionate Australian expression for "British". Quite what it means makes an important difference to his public's attitude.

It's not sure; but I expect it's quite what it means.

BRITAIN'S ENTRY FOR EUROVISION SONG CONTEST HITS SNAG

THERE has been a dramatic setback in the BBC TV's Song for Europe, the British heat for this year's Eurovision Song Contest—one place is still not filled although the official closing date was Monday of last week.

With interest this year mounting higher than ever because of the number of hit parades who will be competing, nobody had been contracted to sing Johnny Worth's song by Tuesday.

Last weekend Karl Denver was signed to sing the fourth competition record he recorded last month, "Goodbye And Bless You." Had it been approved the record would have given the competition its most startling development.

Denver, 21, is a singer and he would have been competing again against last winter's winner, Phil Everly, who, as was recently revealed at last week's DISC, had been entered to sing Norman Newell's "Say Wonder of Things."

Turned down

But Karl's current pantomime engagement would have meant him having to telecast his spot on the radio, and that was not acceptable to the BBC.

An extremely exciting and heart-warming day for Cliff as smiling and waving, he made his way through the crowd. He had defied the afternoon heat to turn out and welcome him.

For thousands and thousands of South African teenagers it was a dream come true. They had squads of policemen to prevent them from crushing him in their enthusiasm.

EVERYTHING ARRANGED

Last night (Wednesday) he was due to open his tour at the Empire Hall, Cape Town, but he was unable to get into the hall because of a strike. Mr. Stodel, the manager, had organized the tour on behalf of Mr. Conrad. Therefore, Mr. Stodel told me: "Everything has been arranged so that he can't be stopped from performing here. If he goes to Cape Town he will stay there."

"He will have until Wednesday evening to swim, sunbathe and generally enjoy himself. At Capetown he will be staying in a hotel where he has arranged some tennis fishing. He did a 3 m. race—one and a half hours—and he will take him out to Cape Point for that."

From Capetown Cliff and The Shadows travel to Port Elizabeth on Sunday and from there he moves on to Durban, the southern town of East London, to Durban.

"Durban is semi-tropical—like Rio," Mr. Stodel told me. "We expect him to be able to get into the sun in Capetown, maybe finding him a place to stay there. But remember—he'll be back next month ready to embark on some more tours."
