### Question Doug digs soul

The group of the moment you could call them. From north coast to south the Questions have smashed their way to lay them in the aisles everywhere from Manly's Canopus Room to Melbourne's top discos and more to come.

Dig the Questions and you'll dig Doug Parkinson, the soulful, deep-throated grooving vocalist. He's too much! Doug has a good thing going for him, he can squeeze every drop of soul out of any old song.

He started his musical career in Sydney with a "smaltzy" group called the Strings n' Things, playing old Beatles' and Stones' stuff to a "ripe" pub audience. He was pretty noked out with the smaltzy scene and had a yearning to play GOOD music. He had been digging a group called the Questions at the Manly for quite a while. One night Bill Fleming, the drummer, offered him a gig; and the rest is history.

Doug digs the old soul boss himself, Max Merritt; he used to dig the boss and the Meteors at the Eye in Sydney. He said they were his pick of all Australian groups he'd seen.

His favorite raves include Joe Tex, the Four Tops, Marvin Gaye, the Impressions, the Temptations, and the bass player on all Tania Motown records. He digs Stevie Wonder more than anyone. He says Stevie's incredible vocal control, more so than Stevie's newer discs. He digs Hendrix too, but on a different scene. Hendrix is wild and non-conformist and is definitely very exciting... but it's not Doug's scene to play Hendrix gear, he's more a soul singer.

The Questions have knowned the whole scene out with their incredible versatility, and with their ease and cool on stage whether they're doing James Brown or Dusty Springfield stuff (truly).

"I'm knocked out by the Melbourne scene," said Doug. "This is where it's all happening. Music is going so many ways at the moment and this is the place to see it all. The people here are more hip and this makes for a better relationship between group and audience. You can relax more on stage and you can groove more as a result. The people at Sebastians and the "Turn" are my kind of audience, they accept the feeling of musical happening so much quicker. I've had a ball in Melbourne and hope to return soon. This place is gas for our music and we love it."

Doug is sure to have his wish. The swingers in Melbourne will make sure of that. Mike Browning (Mr. Sebastian) please note!

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# JAMES TAYLOR MOVE'S "MAGIC EYES" WAS FOR THE CHARTS

"Let's get one straight," said Rob Taylor, "if we have this Hendrix image, well then we accept it. We have probably gained it because we were one of the first groups on the scene to do such numbers as 'Stone Free', but believe me this image was not purposely created. At the moment we play only one Hendrix number."

The James Taylor Move hit the Melbourne scene about five months ago, with a new sound that had been unheard before in Australia. Their driving, earthy sound created excitement wherever they performed, and it was no time before they became a big name on the scene.

Their first single titled "Magic Eyes" has also hit the charts in a big way. It is currently riding in the top twenty on the Melbourne, Adelaide and Perth charts. It was number 33 in Go-Set's national chart last week.

The story on this single is as follows . . . Rob Taylor wrote "Magic Eyes" while he was high on lemonade. He originally was going to call it "You're Way Out in Front Baby, But I can See Your Behind!" But under pressure from Trevor was forced to change it to the present title.

James Taylor readily admit that they chose a more commercial-style number for their first

single, and also intend to do it for their second. This obviously has paid dividends, as the success of "Magic Eyes" speaks for itself.

Their third single, will be different. On this single they hope to explain to the public what they are trying to achieve.

The James Taylor Move are firm believers that every group should know what song they are going to record, weeks before the actual recording session. This way, it enables a group to put more personal feeling into the number they are recording.

"One thing we cannot understand," said Kevin, "is how the top forty charts are worked out in each state of Australia. 'Stone Free' for instance, made the Adelaide and Brisbane charts long before it even received airplay in Melbourne and Sydney. You must admit, it does seem a bit strange."

On the Australian pop scene, the James Taylor Move all agree that the standard in groups has risen over the past year, and it shouldn't be too long before Australian groups make a name of their own.

Kevin, Alan, Rob and Trevor who make up the James Taylor Move are reluctant to talk on their proposed overseas trip, but it is certain that they will be heading for England some time next year.

Perhaps they are another Australian group who could make the big time.

From nowhere came the American group, the 5th Dimension, to top the Go-Set National Top 40 two weeks in a row.

The 5th Dimension are an all-gender group, with five girls and three guys. Their top hit is the hippy-style "Up Up And Away", which has been a smash in every state of the country.

According to Ray Charles, the 5th Dimension rate amongst the most talented groups in the entertainment world today. They toured with "We Gonna Get That Boogie Down" for six months last year under the name of "The Vocal".

Their appearances have taken in some of the biggest clubs and concert halls in the States, as well as Shindig and 9th Street West TV shows in Hollywood.

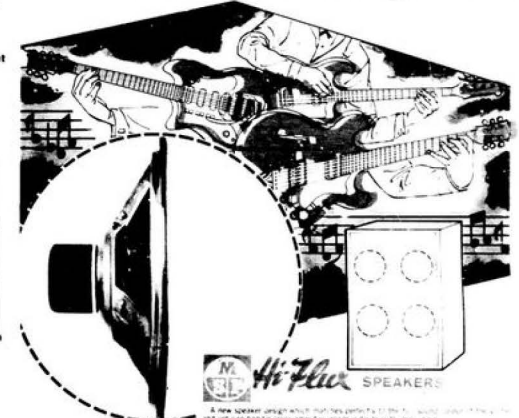
