








# Prue's Page

**A** APPROPRIATELY enough the Thompson Turn disc, the conchaque provided the setting for the newest and most intriguing dance sequence to be introduced to dance — mad Mambourians since Basu Brummel captured nineteenth century ballroom etiquette with a palmed square dance they called a rumba!

It's called "The Thump" and was invented by Antonio Rodriguez, a Brazilian teacher of Modern Expressive and Latin American ballet, with the assistance of girls from the "Lido" and "Windmill

Bar" who, you'll meet in the picture demonstrating the simple movements of the dance.

During a "jam session" the Melbourne group formerly known as "The Boys" (now as "The Dukes"), discovered a novel and catchy sound. They wrote it down, added lyrics and showed it to Antonio who was immediately enraptured.

Indeed, Antonio loved it to the extent that he offered to do the choreography for the new dance, and so gave birth to "The Thump", which sprang from being a Gals is bound to



become the biggest dance craze since Twist. Basically it consists of five movements, all of the moodiest being left up to the individual dancer. So move with it kids. Jump right in and have a go!

Looking at picture No. 3 from right to left we find Joan Stuart, the second mover. She lifts her leg to the position shown by Sherry, and uses it to step over into the position in which we find Jill (centre). Moving the back leg straighten yourself into a pose similar to Judy's (second from left). Then step across with your left leg to finish in the pose that Carol has struck on the right. Omitting the Zombie bit,

repeat these actions in reverse.

Do it again... and again. First — think you've got the hang of it? I certainly hope so because No. 4 is coming up.

This step is extremely simple. All one has to do is move from position A to position B with the use of three or four rhythmic cross-over steps in between. Like in "The Skip" if you remember it!

So far so good. Once again varying from right to left Carol, Joan, Sherry and Judy

will show you how to do the "Bow and Arrow" step as well as all the movements of the body involved in the left foot at the side, from a side front position (as in A) to a front position (as in C) by which time the right hand will have drawn back an imaginary bow and released the arrow, leaving the thumb protruding perfectly at the person behind.

Easy? You bet!  
Even if you weren't able to catch on from the description given here, you can always see it demonstrated with that added professional touch if you come along to the "Thumping Turn" almost any night it's open.

"The Thump" first recorded on the brand spanking new RECORD label by "The Dukes" (formerly the Boys) was composed and written by the group. Members of this talented, grooving team are: Trevor Lunn — lead guitar, Dave Lunn — drums, David Payne — singer, Ken Liddell — rhythm guitar and Bob McKay — bass. Congratulations "Dukes" on the originality and verve required in making such a step forward. But that's by the way. It may require a little practice and persistence to iron out the jerks, but whoever masters it will have a market some time leading both friends and girlfriends.

# How to buy a Second hand Sports Car

## Honda

I've always wondered how it would feel to do 10,000 revs in Collins Street, and now I've found out. The little Honda hasn't been around very long, but judging by the

number of them around, there are people around who like cruising at 8000 and to whom four carburetors and an instrument panel like a camera are like Christmas all over again. Now if it had a 1500 cc. donk.

Bigger cousin to Socho Honda's four wheeled device, the Datsun Fairlady, has gone all water, and is just plain "1/4" now. The first examples to invade these shores were a wee bit short of length, but the latest versions are beautifully made and finished, and go and stop as well as anything in their class.

Handling is particularly good, and like most Nippon-car products it comes to you with any number of useful goodies thrown in for good measure. If you feel that way inclined, you could own a '64 model for around 1900 £1000.

Similar in essentials to the Datsun is the very popular MGB. Despite such disastrous faults as comfortable suspension and wind-up windows, it has really made an impression on the Sports car market, and its relative freedom from teething faults and inherent weaknesses has put it in the enviable position of boasting a waiting list on deliveries. Resale value is very good, so don't expect to buy one for a song. Even a 1963 model will command up to £1200 in good nick, though £1100 will secure a less pampered example.

That just about wraps up

the popular models on the market. There are others, of course, such as the gorgeous little Alfa Romeo 1600 Giulia G.T., which now sells here at the very attractive price of £2295 brand new, but not many have come onto the used car market yet.

There are many other vehicles that space does not

permit mention of, such as Lotus Elana and Volvo P1800's, but these represent a very small segment of the field.
