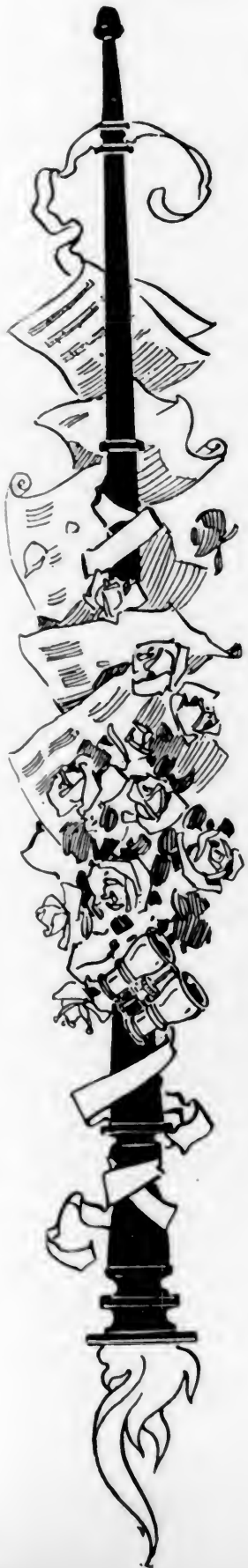

Sun Bros.' Show Scene of Gun Fight.

At New West Moreland, the last stand the Sun Bros.' Progressive Shows made in Tennessee, an old-fashioned gun fight took place during the night show. Mrs. Wiley Ferris, and her son, aged eight, were doing double traps. Without an instant warning a terrific fusillade began. Every man, woman and child in the audience were on their feet in an instant rushing madly to and fro, bang, bang went the guns. Screaming women, crying and frightened children, crazy and half-drunken men added to the uproar. Jack Benson, boss propr., threw the matting over the trap bar. Young Ferris took hold to come down. Instead of having both ends of the rope, he

both had narrow escapes, and as the show was pretty well advanced, the sidewalks were dropped, and after a count-up, it was found that but one man was shot. Some one from over the Kentucky line.

TENT BLOWN DOWN.

Twenty five People Injured. Two Fatally.

On the afternoon of June 12, while the Harris Nickel Plate Show was exhibiting at Sigourney, Ia., a tornado arose and the circus tent collapsed before the fierce wind. A panic resulted. People struggled together beneath the fallen canvas, screaming and cursing, and unwittingly each contributing to the danger.

Twenty-five people were injured, more or less seriously, of whom two will die.

EDDY FAMILY JOINS WALLACE.

The famous Eddy Family, acrobats and aerialists extraordinary, joined the Great Wallace Shows at Indianapolis, Monday, June 2, replacing the Da Comas. The latter act was badly impaired at the very beginning by an accident to Art Da Coma, by which both his legs were broken, and week before last its usefulness was entirely destroyed by an accident to another member, Jno. C. Judge, who broke one of his legs. In this emergency, Mr. Wallace immediately opened negotiations with Mr. Eddy, and finally carried them to a successful conclusion.

Nine out of every ten of the crusades against the bill boards originate in the brain of the manager of some losing or poor-paying newspaper. They are inspired by envy, nurtured by cupidty and fostered by greed.

This is a plain statement and a broad one, but it is warranted by the facts. The solid newspapers of the country never engage in the practice. Furthermore, the weaklings never make it go, thus demonstrating their weakness and lack of influence.

But now and then some person of wealth takes up the cause, and the movement then assumes a serious aspect. It is usually the son or a grandson of the man who made the money.

Now and then, though, these wealthy dawdlers are not satisfied with the publication of their protest. They imagine that the abolition of the bill boards is really essential to their happiness.

Regardless of the fact that their own chief source of income is derived—it may be from a mill whose chimneys pollute the atmosphere with smoke, a dye house or chemical works that drains into a stream and kills the fish, or long rows of badly ventilated tenements with unsanitary plumbing—they set themselves up as arbiters of what should be.

on it and frequently enables an unfortunate owner to avoid sacrificing it while he is tiding over financial reverses.

All this is nothing to the aristocracy. They care not at all for the rights of others. A bill poster ruined and his family brought to woe? What does it signify, provided they can have an idle wish gratified? Nothing at all!

THE ELEMENT OF LUCK.

To the successful man of affairs it is a difficult, not to say unpleasant, matter to recognize in successful business careers the element known as "luck." We are taught to believe that honest, hard work of ten or more hours a day is what constitutes the "luck" that brings men success and riches in business.

Again, Shelbyville has no theater or opera house, and one of the primary objects of the Shelbyville lodge of Elks in attempting to give the recent street fair was to raise funds for erecting an Elks' hall, theater and hotel combined.

All these facts have been put before Shelbyville merchants by the B. P. O. E. of that city, but they will not change their position regarding street fairs.

MORRIS S. SCHLESINGER.

Mr. Morris S. Schlesinger, whose photograph adorns our front page this week, was born in Philadelphia, Pa., on April 1, 1874. Having passed through the primary and intermediate grades of the Philadelphia public schools, he spent one year at Hughes High School in Cincinnati, and then returned to Philadelphia, where he graduated from Rugby Academy, at the age of seventeen.

He then went to Wilkesbarre, Pa., and accepted the position of associate city editor on the News Dealer, which situation he held for two years, when he resigned to take an engagement as press agent and confidential man with Mr. Max C. Anderson, who ran the "Wonderland" in Wilkesbarre.

After a season and a half in that capacity he accompanied Mr. Anderson to Cincinnati, when the latter took the management of the Fountain Square Theater, and Mr. Schlesinger was made treasurer and chief assistant, which position he held for four years. Following this engagement he was press agent of the Walnut Street Theater, Cincinnati, under the Rainforth & Havlin

regime, for one year, when he went on the road with the Passion Play pictures, of which enterprise he was half owner.

Mr. Schlesinger then accepted the position of manager and general representative of the G. A. Weggefahrt enterprises, which included the Court Street, Bijou and Washington Theaters, in Buffalo, N. Y., and after two years he was given the management of the Empire Theater (formerly the Bijou), in Washington, D. C., where he has been ever since, gaining in success and popularity.

During his ten years of theatrical experience Mr. Schlesinger has always been known as an ardent advocate of bill board advertising. During the run of "The Devil's Daughter," at the Court Street Theater, in Buffalo, which was under his management, contemporary with the Pan-American Exposition, it was said that an attraction was never given more attention by bill posters and newspapers.

Since the closing of the season on May 2 last, Mr. J. T. Backman, sole owner and proprietor of the Backman Comedy Company, has been frantically busy reading and selecting new plays for next season.

OBITUARY.

Blanche Warren, a well known soubrette, was asphyxiated by escaping gas while she was asleep at her boarding house in San Francisco, last week.

James Crank, an attache of the Reed's Trained Animal Show, during a dispute with a fellow employee, was struck on the head with a club, and died later from the blow.

Robert Jefferson Farrell, an actor, committed suicide by swallowing poison recently in New York. Friends say that Farrell had been dependent for some time he was 25 years old.

James Stage, one of the force on Car No. 2 of the Walter L. Main Shows, died recently of asthma at New Brunswick, N. J. The body was sent home to Conneville, Pa., for burial, where a mother survives him.

Odell Williams, the comedian, died recently in New York of heart failure. During the run of "The Auctioneer," at the Bijou, in which he played an important part, he had to leave on account of his illness. He accompanied Mrs. Leslie Carter on her first trip to England, in "The Heart of Maryland." He leaves a wife, who is now on the stage. Williams was also the original "Smile in 'Way Down East," a character that made him famous wherever that piece was presented.

Mrs. Spencer, of the Walter L. Main Shows, who appeared under the name of "Little Farnsworth," while performing on the cycle whirl at Conneville, O., ran over the top and was injured. When the circus train reached Salamanca the woman was taken to the hospital, and peritonitis developed, her death resulting. During her life Mrs. Spencer had been famous as a bicycle rider and held the highest female record for speed. Her home was in Minneapolis, and her husband is a traveling man. He was with his wife at the time of her death.

Fairs & STREET FAIRS AND EXPOSITIONS

BUSY PREPARATIONS.

Grounds at Aylmer Being Put in Shape for Coming Fair.

Busy preparations are now in progress for the fair which will be held at Aylmer, Ont., Canada, Sept. 25-27. Workmen are already remodeling the beautiful and extensive grounds, and flower-beds are being artistically arranged throughout the site. Another fountain is being erected, making a total of three such accessories to the aesthetic properties connected with the exhibition, besides the five water fountains whose overflow forms the beautiful white miniature lake. The lake will be filled with sturgeon, none of which shall be less than 7 feet long, and which in the crystal water can be seen easily from all points on the circumference.

The track of the association is a half mile around, and is being put in ideal shape.

The purses for this year races will amount to about \$1,000.

The association owns its own electric light plant, and the night exhibitions promise to be far above the ordinary.

The Aylmer Fair is in the circuit with Toronto and London.

FAIR NOTES.

No fair at Farmville, Va., this year. Thirty-seven new fairs in our list this week.

Automobile races will be featured quite generally this season.

From present indications there will be no county fair at Lancaster, Pa., this year.

The premiums which will be awarded by the Aylmer (Ont.) Fair Association will aggregate \$3,000.

It is doubtful at this time whether the Lafayette County Fair Association, at Higglesville, Mo., will hold a fair.

Valdosta (Ga.) Fair Association has decided upon the new buildings that will be erected for the next State Fair, and contracts were let.

The secretary of the Kaw Valley Fair, at Lawrence, Kan., writes that although crops are big, the society is without funds, and there will likely be no fair.

The Concord (N. H.) State Fair Association has closed contracts which insure the third annual fair, Aug. 26-29. The free show department will be a strong feature.

While the reign of the bicycle as a fad is about over, there is still nothing that will stimulate the interest of the younger generation in the fair like a series of boys' bicycle races.

At a meeting of the directors of the Southern Interstate Fair Association, held last week at Atlanta, Ga., the committee for the fair were announced. With the exception of the chairman of the horse show committee all the appointments were made by President H. H. Cabanis.

N. S. Gordon, of Crookston, Minn., reports very favorably upon the interest taken by parties who are to exhibit in the agricultural building of the State Fair.

President B. P. Nelson visited the Elks' Fair at Minneapolis, week of June 2, to size up the exhibits and the various details of the show, with a view to utilizing any good points which might be noted.

Secretary John M. True, of the State Board of Agriculture (Michigan), received a telegram to the effect that President Roosevelt has fixed Sept. 24 as the date of his visit to Milwaukee. Accordingly the State Fair date will be postponed until Sept. 24. Milwaukee expects fully 100,000 people from all parts of the State to be in attendance.

The Danbury Agricultural Society, which will hold its fair at Danbury, Conn., Oct. 6-11, writes that this year they will make a specialty of a large dog show, in connection with the fair. This department will be under the supervision of James Mortimer, who superintends the Westminster Dog Show, in New York City. There will also be a large poultry show and horse show.

The poultry show, in conjunction with the Plymouth County Fair, to be held at La Mars, Ia., Sept. 25, is going to be an unusually large exhibit, and will range from 400 to 600 birds. The premium offers aggregate \$500, there being premiums for the different varieties of chickens, ducks, geese, turkeys, rabbits, etc. The poultry department will be one of the drawing features of the fair.

Col. S. A. Hsley recently bought the fair ground property of Addison County, Ky. The buildings and track are to be put in first-class shape, and the Addison County Agricultural Society will have control and use of the grounds and buildings for a whole year, instead of paying a year's rental for using the property three days as heretofore. They are to pay 3 per cent. on the cost of the improved grounds. An exhibition will be held Sept. 3-5.

Clyde Fitch, the dramatist, who recently went abroad for his health, is suffering from appendicitis. It was hoped, after a short stay at Florence, that he had completely recovered his health, but a Roman physician who was called pronounced his illness appendicitis, and the playwright hurriedly left for Berno, Switzerland, to consult a specialist in the hope of securing relief without a surgical operation.

SPECIAL DAY

Named for Editors and Authors at Cincinnati Fall Festival.

The Directors of the Fall Festival Association have named Wednesday, Sept. 17, Editor's and Author's Day, and are preparing to entertain their friends of the writing fraternity in first-class style. The Fall Festival annually draws crowds of people to Cincinnati, and it must be conceded that all who go there are well cared for by the hospitable inhabitants of the Queen City. The committee in charge will procure representative speakers and readers, and some of the most brilliant men in charge of editorial work in this country will be heard from during the convention. At the close of the exercises the visitors will be the guests of the association for luncheon in the Swiss Chalet, where a vaudeville entertainment will be given for their pleasure. The afternoon concludes with a trolley ride in a number of private cars, to show the visitors the beautiful suburbs, and some avenues and the Zoo, of which the city is justly proud. A visit to the exposition and the Plaza Shows, where all will be the guests of the Fall Festival Association, terminates the program for the day.

ANOTHER VICTIM.

Moncrief Injured While Attempting to Loop-the-Loop.

Minneapolis, Minn., June 16.—Clarence Hamilton, known as Moncrief, a trick bicyclist, brought here from New York to "loop-the-loop" at the Elks' Fair, followed the example of his three predecessors and fell from the giant wheel on the inside of which he tried to steer a bicycle. E. Kilpatrick, John Larson and Josiah Dougherty had each been injured in attempting the feat. In his second attempt he left the rim of the big loop just as he neared the top and was riding head downward. He was hurled with terrific force among the spectators and had several ribs fractured. Besides this he received internal injuries. He is now at a hospital in a serious condition.

NEW ATTRACTION

Takes the Road—Prospects Bright for Big Success.

A new attraction called The Reed Balloon and Amusement Company, an organization financed and managed by William Maher, of Marion, Ind., is exhibiting in Zanesville, O.
