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

## CRYSTAL METHOD

### **Tweekend** (Outpost–Geffen–Interscope)

After bombarding the underground dance scene with a flurry of anthemic singles in the mid '90s ("Busy Child," "Keep Hope Alive," etc.) and then crossing over into mainstream consciousness with the flashy rave 'n' roll of 1997's gold-selling *Vegas*, Ken Jordan and Scott Kirkland (a.k.a. the Crystal Method) took an unprecedented four years to compose *Tweekend*. Considering the extreme evolution dance and pop music has undergone since the L.A. pair's debut was released, the hiatus could have easily meant commercial suicide. But rather than try and retain relevancy by adopting current musical fads, *Tweekend* succeeds by simply upgrading the fashions the Method sported back in the day. Once again, sharp pop hooks, visceral rock riffs, taut breakbeats and tough techno tactics are employed to craft tweaky, freaky fair, but *Tweekend* is darker, denser and more dynamic than the band's previous output. The vocals of Scott Weiland pilot the lethal pop sensibilities of "Murder," and the production hand and axe assault of Tom Morello brings out the rage on four tracks, most notably, the technofied rap-rocker "Name Of The Game." The Method also finds highs without the help of its friends on the brooding breaks monster "Roll It Up" and the acidic trip-funk of "Over The Line." It seems the outfit's tech-rock system has only grown more devious and distinctive during the down time. — **M. Tye Comer**



## REMY ZERO

### **The Golden Hum** (Elektra–EEG)

When Remy Zero's alt-rock masterwork *Villa Elaine* was released, you couldn't get through the press clips without stumbling upon endless, tiresome references to frontman Cinjun Tate's marriage to sexpot Alyssa Milano. Eventually, Tate and Milano divorced and Remy Zero fell through the cracks in the wake of the Universal Merger. But the Los Angeles-by-way-of-Alabama quintet's new album, *The Golden Hum*, suffers no ill effects from the external turmoil and drama that has surrounded the band in recent years. The release is a collection of sprawling, almost orchestral pop songs that will inevitably elicit comparisons to Radiohead. But what pulls Remy Zero out of the impostor pack is how its grand yet accessible songs are alternately injected with epic electric and reflective acoustic guitar textures. Tender tunes like "I'm Not Afraid" are stripped down but still feel full, while Tate's elastic voice — sometimes hushed, yet always passionate and emotive — stretches impressively over his band's majestic compositions. As a result, gorgeous songs like "Glorious," "Out/In," "Impossibility," and "Save Me" are better than some bands' entire albums. — **Amy Sciarretto**





## LUPINE HOWL

### The Carnivorous Lunar Activities Of...

(Vinyl Hiss-Beggars Banquet)

When Sean Cook, Mike Mooney and Damon Reece were fired from the neo-psychadelic deity Spiritualized they managed to turn around in a matter of months and birth the savagely sublime Lupine Howl. An instant sensation in London's clubs, the trio — which brings in former-Spiritualized/ex-Spacemen 3 drummer Johnny Mattock for live shows — debuted in the States earlier this year with a seven-song collection of singles, 125. Two of those tracks ("Vaporizer" and "125") appear on the group's exhilarating first LP, *The Carnivorous Lunar Activities Of...* In tune with melodic, post-rock tendencies and looking back to the spaced-out grooviness of the '90s Manchester scene, *Lunar Activities* subsumes you with its seamless flow of epic, atmospheric melodicism, lush symphonic strings, swirling organs, mind-warping guitar squalls and rhythms with a climatic urgency to match the album's over-sexed artwork. Detonating droney, drug-induced dream bombs that often mushroom for close to 10 minutes ("Carnival"), the trio's enthralling songs are made even more lethal by Cook's quivering, monotone voice and spiraling lyrical imagery. A beguiling debut to satiate animalistic hungers. — **Enrique Lavin**

## CAKE

### Comfort Eagle (Columbia-CRG)

Based on the "quirky" tag that's hung around the California band's neck since the mid 1990s (see its infamous cover of the disco classic "I Will Survive" for details), you can't fault anyone who keeps a fresh Cake record at arm's length. But much like They Might Be Giants, or even the Beastie Boys for that matter, Cake has more than quirk in its musical quiver. The skillfully crafted *Comfort Eagle* is a smart, fun record that doesn't entirely discarded the band's ironic tics. Cake's cheeky lyrical twists are as distinctive as the trumpet lines that often punctuate its clean, brisk pop. On the title track frontman John McCrea uses a flat, alienated delivery to drop alternately deep and goofy observations ("he is in the music business...he is calling you dude!"). While it may be a stretch to put McCrea in the same class as David Byrne, his attempts to add abstraction and absurdity to radio-ready pop suggests a parallel between Cake and the Talking Heads' memorable forays into paranoid pop bliss. The lead single, "Short Skirt/Long Jacket," sticks with you, perhaps because it openly borrows its riff from "Sweet Jane," but there's nothing disingenuous about Cake's ability to make delicious pop while smirking along the way. Just as Radiohead is decriminalizing "pretentious," Cake is making the world safe again for "quirk."

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## Gorillaz Unwilling On Mercury Prize List

Much to the band's chagrin, the enigmatic and cartoonish supergroup Gorillaz was nominated for the Mercury Music Prize, an award given in the U.K. for the best British or Irish album of the year.

"No thanks man! Why don't you nominate some other poor Muppet," bass player Murdoc said in a statement. (Since when do cartoon characters issue statements?) Ironically, Super Furry Animals were also nominated.

Despite Gorillaz' displeasure at the award nomination, the band members can't take themselves off

The campaign will include a mass mailing of brochures to parents, parent-teacher organizations,

school principals, coaches, music teachers, school guidance counselors, school psychologists and local and federal officials nationwide. Hopefully, most of them will recycle the brochures rather than simply throwing them in the trash.

The RIAA will also work with the National Association of Recording Merchandisers (NARM) to update all "Parental Advisory Label" countertop displays and store posters with the web address of [parentalguide.org](http://parentalguide.org). In addition, the RIAA plans to create public service announcements for television and radio starring Quincy Jones.

## "The Man" Encroaches On NYC's Wetlands Club Once Again

According to published reports, New York City nightclub (and cherished institution) Wetlands will shut its doors in mid-September thanks to the building's new owner and local residents who would like to see it converted into apartments.

Wetlands opened in 1989 as a haven for jam bands such as Blues Traveler, Spin Doctors, Phish and the Dave Matthews Band. Over recent years, the venue expanded its roster to include hardcore, ska and hip-hop shows.

Wetlands owner Peter Shapiro told *CMJ New Music Report* that he and the current Wetlands management team are looking for a new place to call home, but chances are it wouldn't be the same. "There's something magical about an old rock 'n' roll club," Shapiro said. "I think we can take what Wetlands was about to another area, but we'll never have that kind of space again."

"We will definitely have big parties toward the end, celebrating what the place was about. Everyone's got such great memories of the place; and I think those memories will live for a long time," he said.

It's official: Island Def Jam Music Group recently acquired a 50-percent stake in Roadrunner Records for somewhere between \$33 million and \$35 million. Per the terms of the deal, IDJMG also has the option to eventually purchase the label outright. • Napster CEO Hank Barry has stepped down from the position he held since May of 2000. 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

I just got my first speeding ticket three days ago. They got me with one of those radar guns," admits Iggy Pop, telephoning from his Miami condo. "And the [cop] was nice about it." He laughs, surprised. Pop, whose self-destructive nihilism is unequalled in the annals of rock, isn't likely to be intimidated by the likes of a traffic cop. Hell, it's doubtful that *anyone* could scare the Ig at this point. Having fronted Detroit punk legends the Stooges in the early '70s and cranked out over a dozen solo albums in the three decades since, he's re-sharpened his edges with the visceral *Beat Em Up* (Virgin), and he's never sounded stronger.

A cursory back to back listen to 1999's considerably more subdued *Avenue B* and the grinding *Beat Em Up* might lead listeners to believe that the intensity of the latter is a reaction to the moodiness of the former. But it's not so according to Pop, who points out that both albums focus lyrically on themes of immortality, the ups and downs of success, and societal ills. Nevertheless, *Avenue B*, with its spoken word bits, spare orchestration and dashes of folkiness, is atypical Pop fare. *Beat Em Up* finds Iggy back on his stump, pushing sound levels into the red, reaching out to the people and basically putting the guts back into rock 'n' roll.

By virtue of his legend alone, the 54-year-old Pop stands out from the current pack of young punks working their way up the Epitaph, Vagrant or Fat Wreck Chords ranks. Matching his own legacy is a

expects him to reach new audiences, he sees some shortcomings in new music. "It's just going in the wrong direction," he says. "And I understand how all that works. But it's not what I choose to do, or probably what I'd even be good at."

Steadfastly avoiding Pro Tools production software, which has become a important part of many producers' arsenal, Pop wrote and recorded *Beat Em Up* the old fashioned way — collaborating with his players, live-to-tape, letting his band improvise on the spot, particularly his longtime touring guitarist, Whitey Kirst. "A lot of what this record is about was me just being a regular guy and saying, 'You know what? This mother-fucker [Kirst] has been supporting me for long enough, it's time I support him and let him have a voice,'" explains Pop. "At the end of the day, when the people who made me rich don't remember who I am anymore, and the people who patted me on the back are off patting somebody else on the back, the real things I'm gonna have are the three or four friends I managed to hang onto."

With Whitey's brother Alex Kirst secure on drums, Pop completed the circle by bringing in ex-Body Count bassist Mooseman, whom he describes as a "ringer." Tragically, Mooseman was shot in a random drive-by shooting in Los Angeles before *Beat Em Up* was released. Iggy brought back Pete

much bigger challenge. With *Beat Em Up* entering the CMJ Radio 200 chart as the number one debut in issue #726, Pop is apparently winning the battle. "This record is definitely closer to his hardcore punk roots than some of the others," says Tyson Haller, head of college promotion for Virgin Records. "[Because of its] hard rock edge, we're looking to introduce him to a younger audience that is into the heavier side of music, instead of just [promoting him as] the Godfather of Punk."

Pop is certainly aware of what the new generation of kids is into — from Slipknot to Limp Bizkit to Kid Rock — but while his label

Marshall, who's been a roadie and played second guitar in his touring band, to handle the bass lines.

Pop and his three "dudes" are out stumping for the new *Beat Em Up*, playing behind an album that's climbing steadfastly up the charts. Even though he has countless records under his belt, his enthusiasm remains palpable. "It's a better band [than my previous touring band]," he says. "It's more dynamic, sharper, and slightly smaller. (Lucky Dog-Sony Nashville) Rather than the sad, tear-in-

new country mavens BR5-49  
opt for something more off the  
beaten path. "Too Lazy To  
Work, Too Nervous To Steal,"  
the first track on *This Is BR5-*

*49*, falls in the "life's a bitch" category, but as the title implies, the band has a wickedly clever sense of humor that separates it from the formulaic pop that's often pumped out of Nashville. In fact, the band seems to rail against the whole sad-sack mentality on "A Little Good News," proposing the utopian concept of a day where not much bad happened, either in "the streets of Ireland" or "the lonely part of town." The band isn't above a literate character study either; "Different Drum" vividly paints a picture of a street person ridiculed by the locals. Devoid of the escapism many look for in country music, this is life music played with a soulful twang.

## NATHAN LARSON

### Jealous God (Artemis)

"It's weird to have been a punk rocker," Nathan Larson confesses in the bio accompanying his solo debut. "Now I'm 30 and I'm like some sort of postmodern yuppie." This could serve as a warning to fans expecting him to maintain the explosive guitar

sound of his former band, Shudder To Think. *Jealous God* is slickly produced and packed with top 40-friendly melancholy ballads and literate Elvis Costello-esque romantic pop. Tracks like the soulful "Hello, Flame" and the tender "Just Because A Man Expects Me To" eschew Larson's art-metal riffage, focusing instead on pensive songwriting and aching vocals that quiver and quake in all the right places. Larson livens the pace with the uptempo '80s pop vibe of "One Perfect Stranger," but still keeps the horns and keyboard arrangements subtle. Larson will keep Shudder To Think's post-punk audience at bay with lyrics like "Love, do what you want/ Cause I must learn to live alone," but *Jealous* should appeal to the modern rock/adult-contemporary crowd (i.e. "postmodern yuppies") everywhere.

## OWLS

### Owls (Jade Tree)

Cap'N Jazz. Joan Of Arc. Ghosts And Vodka. American Football. There's a lot of scene-shaping history behind the Owls, but there's a lot of personal history as well. Tim and Mike Kinsella, Victor Villarreal and Sam Zurick first started playing together back in 1989; a bunch

of kids still learning the conventions that their resulting projects would later routinely defy. Now back to that original four-piece lineup, these Owls have also resorted to the most basic of band formats, with none of the computer-aided cutting and pasting of Joan Of Arc. The result is complexity made simple. *Owls* is a rock record, but an impossibly intricate one. Villarreal is allergic to an easy melody line, while Mike Kinsella lays down drum patterns that could be random soloing if they weren't ultimately so cohesive. Meanwhile, Tim Kinsella raggedly croons his musings over the intertwining lines, more often than not coming out with something as direct and affecting as the song titles ("What Whorse You Wrote Id On") are obtuse and overwrought. — Scott Frampton

## QUASI

### The Sword Of God (Touch And Go)

The opening two tracks of Quasi's fourth full-length, *The Sword Of God*, are cinematic movements unto themselves: The simple piano plinks of "Introduction" set the mood and settle you in, then "Fuck Hollywood" swells in like the

main character's theme music, signaling with a simple crescendo that makes you snap to attention. When singer (and ex-Heatmiser member) Sam Coomes and drummer/ex-wife (and current Sleater-Kinney member) Janet Weiss finally snap the reins into the cohesive pop they're known for, it's clear that *The Sword* won't just be a soulless summer blockbuster — this is a A-list material. Coomes's voice has the same yearning quality that makes Built To Spill's Doug Martsch so endearing, and the melodies he coaxes out of his guitar and keyboard flow from sunny to ominous and back to lilting again. Weiss's beats are somehow graceful and ass-kicking at the same time, and her backing vocals deliciously intertwine with his. *Sword* sticks tightly to indie-pop, yes, but like any great narrative, it roller-coasts through every emotion, capturing them all confidently. — Nicole Keiper



## ROLLINS BAND

**Nice** (Sanctuary)

Henry Rollins has made no secret of his love for Thin Lizzy, Ted Nugent and music that just plain rocks. So when Rollins Band "Mach II" (the lineup that recorded 1994's *Weight* and '97's *Come In And Burn*) veered too close to jazz-

rock, it came as no surprise when Henry brought in fresh, stripped-down blood for 2000's *Get Some Go Again*. On *Nice*, the band (guitarist Jim Wilson, bassist Marcus Blake and drummer Jason Mackenroth, also known as L.A.'s Mother Superior) delivers a tighter version of *Get Some*'s straightforward, ass-kicking garage-metal. This time around, though, they've added some new sounds to its arsenal, most notably the James Brown groove of "Up For It" (complete with female backing singers) and the sax-inflected "I Want So Much More." Lyrically, Henry's concerns haven't changed (get out there and do it, rejection, keeping pure) but the fresh sound of the band is update enough.

## VARIOUS ARTISTS

**This Is Next Year: A Brooklyn-Based Compilation** (Arena Rock Recording Co.) Arena Rock's two discs of local Brooklyn rock (and country and folk) is a testament both to the scene's vitality and its diversity. In 42 tracks, there's not a single moment of filler,

and not a single band actual hip-as-hell Brooklyners haven't championed. The songs fit together roughly, less like a smooth DJ set than a good, eclectic mix tape. The Tom Waits-meets-Southside Johnny antics of Rev. Vince Anderson back up against the somnambulant Leonard Cohen/bossa nova stylings of Hub, the insane recorded-live art-punk approach of Les Savy Fav meet the ardent pop-rock of Rainer Maria, and the sweet subtlety of Mascott offsets the hand-wringing lo-fidelity of Timesbold. Even Brooklyn forefathers They Might Be Giants, residents long before NYC's largest borough was the place to be, are represented with the amazing new deadpan treatise, "I've Got A Fang." It's not only a perfect introduction to a thriving musical community (and a donation to a good cause, the local animal shelter), it's an archival document of a moment in musical time.

### Change Is A Sound

(Jade Tree)

These days, most punk rock consists of a few guys in baggy jeans and backwards baseball caps, three familiar chords, and a range of attitudes that vary from extremely leftist political stances to sophomoric masturbatory

locker room fantasies. Richmond, VA quartet Strike Anywhere proves it mastery of three-chord, semi-melodic punk on *Change Is A Sound*, and the guys definitely have a passionate, semi-political fire burning under their butts. But *Change Is A Sound* is laced with plenty of refreshing "Woah oh oh" choruses, "Oi! Oi! Oi" pump-yer-fist-in-the-air chants, and fast circle-pit breakdowns, all of which make it one of the most fun sing-and-dance-along to punk albums to come out this year. *Change Is A Sound* also espouses a crisp, raw energy devoid of the polished over-production of some major label pop-punk. 

## UTAH SAINTS

### Two (Nettwerk America)

The album art accompanying Utah Saints' *Two* is a hodge-podge of both urban and natural images ranging from taxi cabs and skyscrapers to polar bears and manatees. And, the design serves to foreshadow the overall effect of the disc's music, proving that "synthetic" and "organ-

ic" are not mutually exclusive adjectives. The first release from the British rave pioneers since their 1992 eponymous debut, *Two* beckons with the call of the wild as xylophones, didgeridoos and world beat percussion (or at least believable digital recreations of such) initially dominate the album's sound. But the Metallica and Stooges samples are only a few of the reminders that this jungleland lies just around the corner from the next city block. The album's intent is plain: To make you dance, whoever or wherever you are.

With guest vocalists as varied as Michael Stipe, Chuck D and Edwin Starr adding additional diversity to the proceedings, this point is driven home as strongly as its pounding rhythms.

**C**radle Of Filth made a triumphant return to New York City on July 18 with God Forbid and Nile in tow. Local fave Vision Of Disorder jumped on the bill for the evening. The Hammerstein Ballroom was nearly filled before the first band, the mighty, formidable Forbids, went on. Definitely a nice indicator of the power of M-E-T-A-L. I thought it was one of the New Jersey quintet's best performances in ages (As if it ever gives a bad performance. Um, no.). The closing with "Broken Promise" was very moshy. I was anxious to see how Nile would fair without Chief Spires, the band's songwriting centerpiece, who recently left the band. But it was a long-haired, bang-your-head good time. You can tell the band is still easing into the transition post-Spires. V.O.D. was the odd band on the bill, playing hardcore and sludge metal in front of death and black metal kids. But it was

definitely appreciated as they filmed a video for "Southbound," *From Bliss To Devastation*'s current single, which will not relinquish its grip on the No. 1 position on Crucial Spins. V.O.D. mixed material from all its albums. Thank you. Introducing themselves as the scumbags of the universe, Cradle Of Filth knows how to put on metal theatre to the max. A portly, female back-up singer with opera-worthy pipes and a woman-Satan propped up on her hands and feet with towering stilts, were part of the circus freak sideshow. Dani Filth was a sexy bitch that night, announcing that the next song would be, "Oops! I Did It Again." When COF played "From The Cradle To Enslave," its big "hit," all the kids jumped up and down and dancing. That was the only "mall metal" moment of an otherwise thoroughly true metal show • Nothingface headlined a nearly sold-out Irving Plaza two nights later,

with Dog Fashion Disco and Click as support. Well, Click didn't make any friends with the rambunctious NYC crowd, but that's not a slam on the band. It would better serve an Orgy audience. The almighty DFD, however, stepped things up a notch. Not only did the band come out in costumes – lead singer Todd Smith was garbed in full nun's regalia, transporting me back to my Catholic school daze — but it had kids singing along to every word. Impressive for such a baby band in a tough NYC crowd who was starving for a full Nothingface set. Still, DFD's whacked out, metallic Mr. Bungle-style rock extravaganza was a sensation.

Nothingface has played NYC four times this year, with five-song mini sets before lesser quality, but bigger album selling bands. "The Sick," the band pet name for fans, were certainly ready for a 13-song, full hour of the band's melodic hard rock. For me, the show's most intense moment came not only when the crowd chanted the band's name and sang words from "One Thing," off the band's impossible-to-find *Pacifier* disc,

but when it performed the mellowly striking tune "Sleeper" from *Everyday Atrocity*. This band mastered the power of dynamics, both deafening and beautiful.


## SLIPKNOT




## KARMA TO BURN

## CHEMS GET BACK TO THEIR ROOTS WITH "AFRIKA"

If you've caught a recent set by Pete Tong, Danny Tenaglia, Francios K, Fatboy Slim, Roger Sanchez, Darren Emerson or Paul Oakenfold, chances are you've been knocked off your feet by a pounding, tribal-techno monster full of furious drum loops, ear-bleeding acid lines and an ominous vocal sample that mutters "It began in Afrika-ka-ka-ka-ka!"

Those on top of their shit immediately recognized the signature sonic intensity

of the Chemical Brothers behind this stormer, but few have actually been able to acquire the slab of wax that began making the rounds in superstar DJ circles since late spring. On Sept. 11, you too will be able to get your paws on "...Afrika," which will see a very limited commercial run on Freestyle Dust/Astralwerks Records.

The commercial pressing comes after the phenomenal reaction the tracks

received after its initial white-label pressing (issued as "Electronic Battle Weapon 5"). The single will feature another new Chems gem, the electro-rasta-flavored "Hot Acid Rhythm 1," on the B-side. But Astralwerks warns you to act fast; "It Began In Afrika" will only see one run before it's deleted from the label's catalog. After that, you'll have to wait until the Chemical Brothers emerge with their new full-length album in early 2002.

## Q & A



### DJ HARRY

**Colorado's DJ Harry isn't ashamed of his hippie roots. In fact, the experience he gained during his jam bands years is directly responsible for *The String Cheese Remix Project*, an album that finds the formally-trained musician slicing and dicing samples from the popular jam band, and injecting its live instrumentation with energetic house grooves. We caught up with Harry to discuss the inspirations of this unique project.**

#### You started out as a Deadhead. When and how did you discover house?

I got into the Dead around 1990; I originally got into them because I liked to dance and I liked that party atmosphere. I was really into them until I moved to California in '92 and went to a couple raves in San Francisco. That was pretty much it for me; I knew house

was my music. I started spinning in '93 and I never really saw the Dead again. It's been house music ever since, even though I did play mandolin in a couple bluegrass bands between '94 and '98. I grew up playing music. I've played guitar since I was 12; and I went to school for music, so I am definitely a musician before I am a DJ — which is unusual because there's too many people buying turntables and not knowing anything about music theory.

#### Why is that a problem?

You can speak well, even if you don't know how to read. But if you can read, you're going to learn a lot more about the composition of language and you'll be able to speak more eloquently. It's the same with music. DJs that don't know music theory simply aren't going to be as developed. Of course, there are a lot of people with no musical training who have been DJing for 20 years, but it's a less educated process if you don't understand how music works on a technical level.

#### And what distinguishes your album is the real musical element that's involved.

Yeah. John Acquaviva sent me an email saying he loved the record for its musicality, and that's a big deal from a 15-year house veteran. You're also seeing that now with bands like the New Deal, Lake Trout and the Disco

Biscuits. What they're doing is playing their music live and people are freakin'; but all they're doing is playing house music. They're going to help bring live instrumentation back into people's consciousness because it's so much more fun to watch five guys interacting on stage than it is to watch one guy spinning records and twisting knobs.

#### People have always talked about the correlation between the rave scene and the jam band scene. Why hasn't anyone brought the two musics together before?

I don't know; I always thought it used the same basic principles. You see a jam band play, and they go into these 10-minute jam sessions; you dance, freak out, get high, then the lyrics bring you back down to Earth. House music is the same, except it's more of a continuous jam. The big reason there's such a separation is that hippie music is looked-down upon by people who go to clubs. The last people clubbers want to associate with are hippies, because they're soft and seem too flighty. And the jam band culture doesn't really like clubbers because they think it's sterile and synthetic.


#### You've succeeded in bringing the jam band element to house. But will the hippies begin accepting house music as well?

Sure. I've been accepted by the

jam band culture, but I'm the first person house music-wise who can really say that. Of course, I think that the fact that I come from hippie culture and have dreadlocks help. You have artists like Sector 9 who has a DJ that opens for him. I'm doing stuff with Dr. Didg from Outback, who's been doing live electronica since the late '90s; I'm spinning between his sets and will start incorporating DJ-type elements into his show. I think this album is going to be what builds the bridge between those two worlds. I think you're going to see a lot more jam-band-type groups and rock bands doing house remixes of their songs.

#### Obviously, you can't have an entire career remixing jam bands. Where do you go from here?

I'll be releasing 12-inch vinyl versions of every song on the album, but those are going to be more dancefloor oriented. Instinct has hired Gavin Hardkiss, John Acquaviva and Onionz to do remixes. On the live end, I'll be doing a live PA and having one or two musicians sit-in with me. It's going to be a hybrid that will showcase the live element, but I'll probably do a couple more albums in the next couple of years that will probably be more house music oriented. At the end of the day, I'm a DJ way before I am a jam band fan.

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



Alt's a great move considering that last year's *Watcha* compilation went largely unnoticed when it came out months after the tour ended. The Watcha Tour 2001 hits 20 cities starting in Denver on Aug. 15 and ending in San Jose, California on Sept. 9.

Compared to the first attempt, *Watcha 2001* is packed with the heavy hitters from the tour's three installments, making it an outstanding primer to learn about Latin alternative.



The album features material from the latest releases by Aterciopelados, Juanes, Puya and Bersuit, while Molotov, Resorte and Zurdok appear with music from their 2000 releases. Also included are excellent tracks from Ilya Kuryaki, Control Machete and Enanitos Verdes, including CM's "Amores Perros" with Ely Guerra. The executive producers also added Maldita Vecindad's "El Coco-drilo," Todos Tus Muertos' "Andate" and Cafe Tacuba's "Reves."

Aterciopelados

Chapa take a strolling, irresistible *cumbia* beat and work in Blanquito's warped dancehall toasts on the throbbing single "Cumbia Sobre El Rio." "Sólo Quiero Un Xodo," a classic bossa nova made famous by Gilberto Gil, gets Celso's accordion treatment and an arrangement by Quem (a group formed by Resorte's bassist Queso Bronfman and Brazilian singer Eder Da Rosa Alves) for a soaring Tom Zé-like, twisted pop jangle. Tacuba's bassist Enrique Rangel and singer Ruben Albaran (currently known as Rita Cantalagua) contribute on the languid *bolero* "Aunque No Sea Conmigo," and Piña's rock disciples El Gran Silencio rollick on "Cumbia Power," sounding much more like an EGS track than a Piña song. Part of a trend of rock/alternative tributes and collaborations with groundbreaking traditional music artists — including the ultra-hip Spanish equivalent *Peret: Rey De La Rumba* — Celso Piña's *Barrio Bravo* links one of the past's musical rebels with the present's alternative minds to show that it doesn't matter if it's rock or *vallenato* as long as it moves the soul.

**S**RCA Victor will reactivate its Bluebird imprint to serve as the home of jazz for the label. Many will remember Bluebird as the label that released classic recordings from Glenn Miller, Fats Waller, Artie Shaw, Benny Goodman and Duke Ellington. Originally launched

in 1933, the label will again bring that great music to light with six different reissues, scheduled for release throughout 2001 and 2002. Taken from the vaults of RCA Victor, Bluebird, Flying Dutchman, Novus, these reissues will include audio remastering, extra tracks, new packaging with detailed liner notes, and rare archival photos.

The first major salvos come in the form of three boxed sets. For many, jazz starts with Louis Armstrong and Bluebird apparently agrees. The label will release a four-CD box of Armstrong's *Complete RCA Victor Recordings* on Sept. 25, a re-release of the critically acclaimed, out-of-print set. There will also be a career-spanning look at clarinetist Artie

Shaw with *Anthology*, a five-CD box set scheduled for release on Oct. 9. It will feature music from his Brunswick, Decca and MusicCraft sides, as well as unreleased music from Shaw's personal collection. Glenn Miller's *Complete Army Air Force Band Recordings* is a four-CD box set for release on Oct. 9. The label will also reissue single CD samplers of each of these projects aimed at the jazz novice.

Bluebird will also go after hardcore fans with non-box CD reissues. Scheduled for release on Sept. 25 are *Bing Crosby And Rosemary Clooney's Fancy Meeting You Here*, Coleman Hawkins's *The Hawk*, Carmen McRae's *Carmen Sings Monk*, Charles Mingus's *Tijuana Moods*, and Gil Scott-Heron's *Free Will*.

The imprint will also serve as the home for current RCA

**How do you keep building an audience? Can jazz reach a broad audience?**


This audience is built over the long term. Growth will occur only through a combination constant radio, press and touring. I don't believe there is a wide market, just a steadily expanding one.

Hot on the trail of Greg Osby's string-laden *Symbols Of Light* is Russell Malone's own jazz-with-strings effort, *Heartstrings*. Featuring arrangements by the legendary Johnny Mandel, L.A.-based pianist Alan Broadbent and Brazilian great Dori Caymmi, the

music here is extremely romantic and sentimental. That said, the inclusion of bassist Christian McBride, drummer Jeff "Tain" Watts and pianist Kenny Barron insures that the tunes never get saccharine. Russell's classic jazz guitar tone actually belies a well rounded choice of material that goes from the cabaret standard "Wind In The Willow" to "Handful Of Stars" (recorded by Nat King Cole among others) to gospel standard "What A Friend We Have In Jesus" to Malone original "Loved One." As gentle as a tender kiss, this is a beautiful album that reveals all the strengths of the jazz with strings cross-pollination.



## INDIGENOUS PEOPLE

### Unite (Jazzateria)

Indigenous Peoples' 1999 release *Captured Live In Brazil* presented a noteworthy fusion of different North and South American musics birthed out of African music traditions, with jazz being the glue. The less ethnic and more electric music on *Unite* is more groove-oriented than that of *Brazil*, though the electric filigree pushes the sound toward smooth jazz territory when the Nasheet Waits's bass groove isn't cranked up. Marc Cary's typical piano flair fairs well here, translating nicely on Fender Rhodes and Moog synthesizers. Proving that this group is constantly on the move, *Unite* is an out of the rainforest and into the lounge affair that will delight as much as it surprises.

## ROKIA TRAORÉ

**Mouneissa** (Indigo)

To coincide with Traoré's second U.S. tour, her 1998 debut is finally seeing domestic release. While not as assured as the triumphant *Wanita*, it's still an excellent piece of work — sinuous and rooted in its use of Malian instruments and rhythms, but also carrying the individual stamp of her voice and songwriting.

This disc originally appeared a year after she'd won the Radio France International Discoveries Award, and helped establish her in the forefront of young African singers, with a knack for beautiful melodies, as on "Tchiwara" or the title cut. The liquid sounds of the xylophone-like *balafon* provide a cushion for her voice, while the *n'goni* lute offers some spiky interjections to the music. As a snapshot of a developing artist, it's invaluable. As music, it glows.



**Gifted** (Real World)

Although perfume manufacturer Parfums Cacharel funds it, this compilation of female singers avoids the obviously commercial route to deliver a parcel of unreleased goods. Of the three established names — Sheila Chandra, Yungchen Lhamo and Susana Baca — all offer unreleased material, Chandra's floating version of

Tim Buckley's "Song To The Siren" is a particularly perfect opener. But the meat lies in such lesser known chanteuses as India's Shruti Sadolikar (her song "Sri Jagadamba" is hypnotic) and Greece's Eleftheria Arvanitaki (who brings a sensuous urgency to her take on the underclass music of *rembetika*), and Assitan Mama Keita (who is a new addition to the growing list of Malian divas). The whole thing meshes together like a global Lilith Fair with substance.



## SAM PHILLIPS

**Fan Dance** (Nonesuch)

*Fan Dance* marks Sam Phillips' first studio album in five years and the singer/songwriter's Nonesuch debut. Produced by longtime collaborator (and husband) T-Bone Burnett, the album features contributions by Gillian Welch (vocals), Marc Ribot (guitar) and Carla Azar (drums).

Phillips has described *Fan Dance* as a "dry, thirsty, disconnected record that was performed rather than produced." Truer words were never spoken. Phillips' meditative (and sometimes haunting) lyrics are paired perfectly with the crisp, virgin sounds of the instruments that accompany her as in "Wasting My Time," where an intricate string arrangement courtesy of Van Dyke Parks is draped over lyrics like: "My soul's a worn-out road where you've left a trail of reminders/ The sky forgets, turns black with pain/ But the rain remembers your face and the streets know your name." *Fan Dance* transports listeners to a table in a silent and smoky lounge, where a glass of whiskey sits half-finished and a cigarette burns in the ashtray while Phillips performs mere feet away, no microphone, her voice throaty yet crystal clear in your ear. The poignantly weary "Say What You Mean" closes the bar for the night. Last call, folks... — Lisa Hageman



## FREEDY JOHNSTON

**Right Between The Promises** (Elektra-EEG)

On his last effort, 1999's *Blue Days, Black Nights*, Freedy Johnston created an album of somber, introspective folk-rock, a departure from his brand of light, storytelling-pop. *Right Between The Promises* shows that Johnston has exorcized the demons, and wants to return to

his bouncy ballads and country-tinged rock. The first single, "Love Grows (Where My Rosemary Goes)" is a charming cover of the catchy Edison Lighthouse tune that sounds like the theme song to a sunny Sunday afternoon. Johnston has the uncanny ability to write gleaming pop melodies that obscure the solemn lyrics of songs like "Broken Mirror" and "Waste Your Time," where he attacks, "You make it all into an incident/ Do you still deny?/ Shut one eye?"

*Promises* does contain some more subdued tunes, but they veer away from melancholia, content to exalt the human spirit in a sea of pedal steel. On this, Johnston's seventh album, he has proven his status as one of Americana's quintessential songwriters. — Alex Naidus

#### What's your stations wattage?

Oh God, I always forget this. We have about a 75-mile listening radius. According to the last Arbitron, we reach about 20,000 people in the central Virginia area, including Lynchburg, Charlottesville, and Harrisonburg.

#### What do you do to build your station's audience?

We currently webcast and have two fundraisers per year. We also host a lot of shows in the area. Plus, we do lots of promotion around town.

#### What was your most successful fundraiser?

This past spring: \$60,000! Wheee! We usually average about \$55,000 and give away CDs, T-shirts with the station logo, gift certificates for area businesses (mostly dinners for two at local restaurants), movie passes and also some large grand prizes like computers, kayaking trips, futons, etc.

#### Who are you most proud of bringing to the station to perform?

Frank Black, baby! Because he is a god. Pixies... need I say more?

#### Are you on the air? What kind of show do you do?

I host a modern rock show and the "new rock" specialty show, focusing on music just out that week or deeper tracks off of CDs in rotation.

#### What's the most fucked up thing that ever happened to you while you were on-air?

Well, I often get calls from prisoners. Prisoners always have the worst, most sentimental requests. They either whine to you forever if they are allowed to talk, or they request the lamest stuff in a short burst of "Play U2!" if they are only allowed collect calls (instead of saying their names, they say the name of the song they want). The worst thing was after getting rabies shots (I work

with wild animals in a vet hospital by day). After my rabies shots, I lost all sense of where the CDs were and was working in a sort of dream state. I managed to get a CD on after about five minutes of gibberish and some dead air. I really was temporarily insane and could not function at all. Luckily, it was 3 a.m. and another DJ came in and took over.

#### What's the worst line a promoter ever used on you to get you to play a record?

Well, Lenny [Lasalandra] tried to convince me that U2 still rocks. I have blocked out everything he said. He wanted me to chart U2 and promised me some CDs. Ooooh, my own copy of U2 —wowzers! I gave it to my mom. He mentioned something about the lyrics being profound and beautiful. I disagree I think they are unadulterated wank... yuck.

#### What's the best promo item you've ever received? The worst?

I got some boxing monkey puppets, and a signed Doves CD. The worst... I hate getting matchbooks.

#### Every station has that one old dude from the local town that's been doing a show since anyone can remember. Who is it at your station and what's their deal?

Our postman does a bluegrass show. He is pretty nice as far as I know, I avoid the show even more fastidiously than the Grateful Dead, show which is hosted by two smelly people — imagine that!

#### Name one CD you're embarrassed to say you own.

Judas Priest's *Best Of*. No, wait. I'm not embarrassed. I don't care what you think, it rocks.

#### Why did you go into radio?

I just love being able to torture the kids with my selections of music, and the free stuff.

#### What's your major?

It was German. I have degree in it now, yippee! Niemand versteht mich!

#### If you could see anyone live (dead or living), who would it be?

The Jam. I have a penchant for Paul Weller and his social-realist lyrics, and I think they rock. No one would make me happier if they reunited and played in my backyard. Well, unless Hefner wanted to show up and play... naked.

#### Are you interested in going into the music industry?

Yes, perhaps doing promotions or A&R stuff. Handling musicians would be just the same as handling wild animals probably. Maybe I should go into accounting instead... or make goat cheese in the Himalayas...or design exciting underwear... Who knows! I change my mind every five minutes.


