

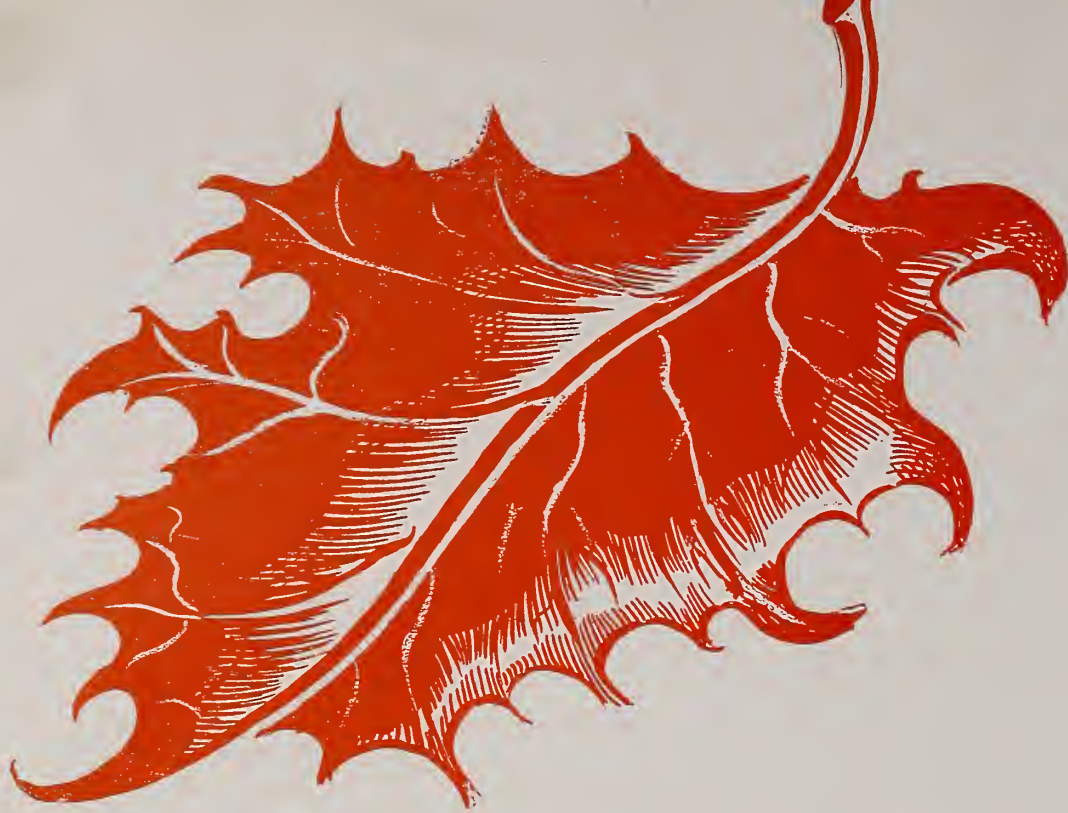

Talking It Over



The hand that deposits the coin rocks this industry. And the time has now arrived when the members of this trade must take cognizance of the fact that the hands that deposit coins aren't as active in this effort as they have formerly been.

Drastic changes are due. Music operators realize that they cannot long continue, under present overhead expense and with ever-growing competition from television and other sources, to profitably operate their businesses.

They must make drastic changes. And the most drastic change of all is for the members of the automatic music industry to SELL MUSIC.

In short, they simply must get out to every location they now have on their books and "sell" the fact that they are a service industry, serving music to locations to help these locations enjoy *better business*.

And for this great service—they must have a service fee. The national picture in the automatic music industry would change overnight were the music operators to obtain a service fee guarantee, as well as a better commission basis.

Regardless of the fact that the greater majority of the music operators are not purchasing new equipment, even tho many claim they sorely need new units, and further, regardless of how much they try to cut down on purchases of parts and supplies, as well as eliminate servicemen and collectors in an effort to curtail overhead—the answer is now, always was and always will be—*MORE BUSINESS*—or a better share of the business being done.

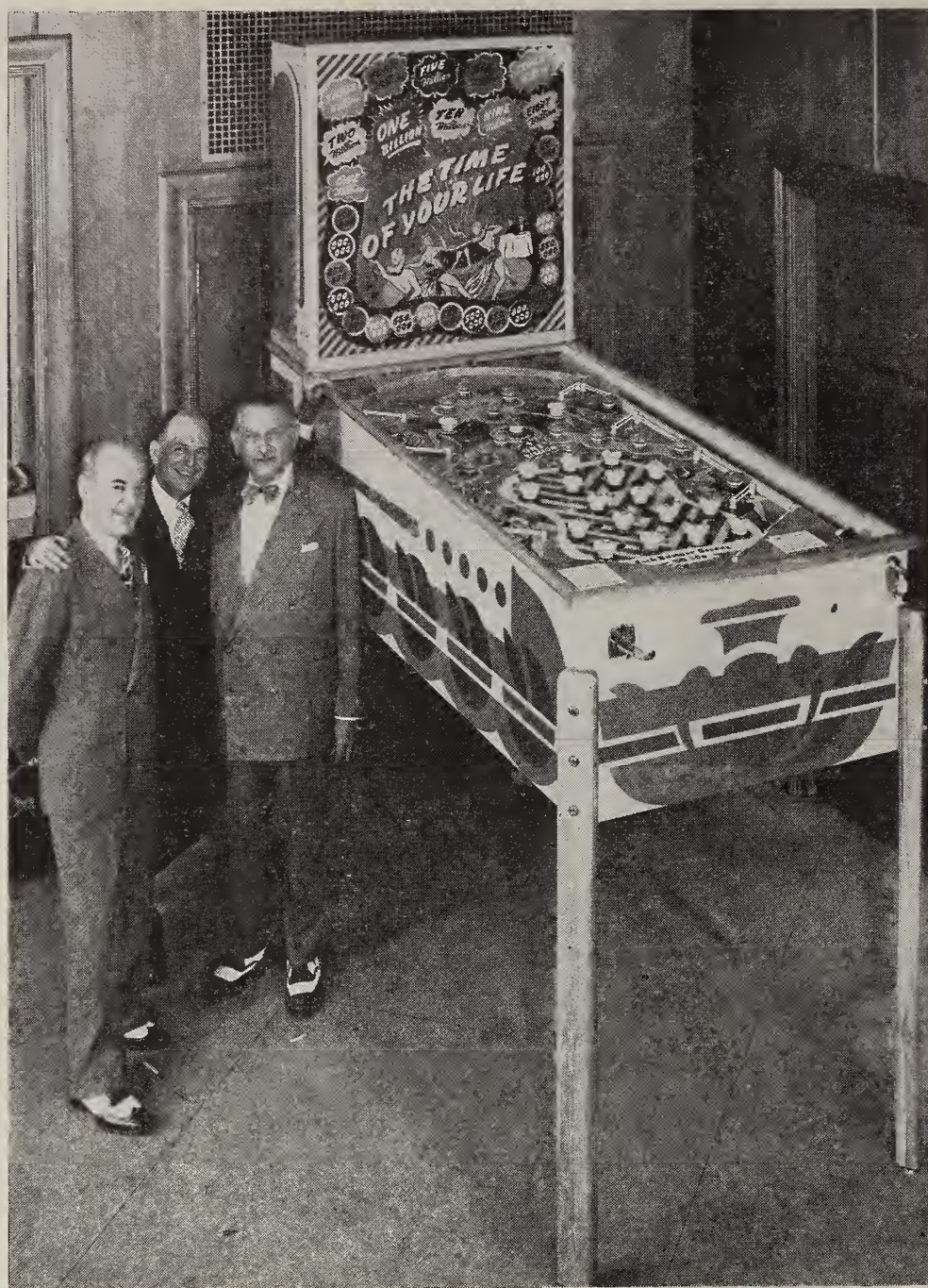
The operator must get more business. Since he cannot do so at this time, he must then get his due and fair share of the collections. He is not now receiving a fair share of the collections from his locations.

When an operator splits the take 50-50 he is *NOT getting 50% of the proceeds*. His share isn't even 20% of the gross after his overhead expense is removed, whereas, when the location owner removes the small overhead expense he has, his share is better than 40% of the gross.

It is up to the music operators. It is up to them to decide now whether they want to continue on in business profitably, or whether they want to fall lower and lower on a losing scale.

A service fee—first. A better commission basis—second. So that the hand that deposits the coin which rocks this industry will not be able to upset its equilibrium now or in the future.

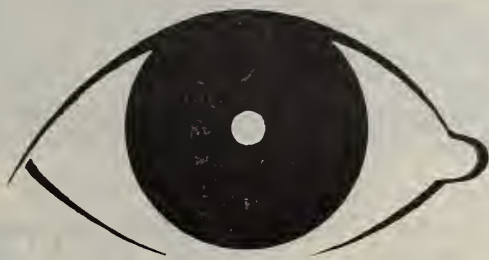

"May I Still Hold You" (2:56)

"You Belong To My Heart" (3:01)

FRANCES LANGFORD
(Mercury 5183)

● Pair of oldies by Frances Langford, and the set up of "May I Still Hold You" and "You Belong To My Heart". Both sides of this platter shows the gal's pipes in pleasing manner and should rate well with music ops. Top side has kicked around a bit and culled quite a bit of coin not too long ago. Frances' interpretation of the tune is pleasant enough. On the flip with "You Belong To My Heart", the gal pitches pipes in attractive mood to set the stage for some possible coin play with this oldie. Ditty itself has seen better days, and altho there might not be a heavy call for it, the song has always brought in its fair share of jitney. Both sides are there for the asking—ops take it from here.

"Underneath The Arches" (2:42)

"I Want Some Money" (2:35)

THE SERENADERS
(Columbia 38274)

● Another rendition of the widely popular "Underneath The Arches", with The Serenaders on deck for the smart offering. Ditty, as rendered here makes for fairly pleasant listening and should meet with fair reception. It's a top coin culler at the present time—this rendition should add widely to its popularity. On the backing with "I Want Some Money", the combo give out with loads of novelty stuff which spills around the title of the song. Waxing is done up in mellow timing, with the instrumental backing resounding in attractive manner. Both sides of this platter can be used to excellent advantage as filler material. The biscuit rates ops avid listening attention.

"What Did I Do" (2:51)

● It's another smash dinking for click chirp Dinah Shore, and a ditty that is sure to spin hot and heavy in phonos throughout the nation. Dinah's latest offering, titled "What Did I Do" should undoubtedly prove to be one of her best, and should reap harvest for music ops. The ditty stacks up as high as a spade flush—that's the extent of its greatness. Titled "What Did I Do", Dinah displays her top notch pipes behind this attractive hunk of wax. The mood and manner of the song make you stop and listen—and then come back for more. Wordage is really cute and infectious and is bound to be appreciated widely. On the backside with "The Matador", Dinah once again turns in another brilliant performance. Grab the title and throw in some vocal background by the Brazilians and you've got the wax story here. "What Did I Do" is the deck they'll trek to—hop to it.

Titled "The Click Song", and aimed as an ode to the famous Click Club in Philadelphia, Sammy and the boys display some of the best versatile musical styling we've heard in a long time. With the Kaydets on deck for the smart and smooth

ditty and increase ops take as well. Switching to a waltz ditty on the flip, the combo come up with "The Silver Wedding Waltz", a pleasant enough tune which should meet with fair approval. Ops who have the spots on their machines would do well to look into this pairing.

"Here I'll Stay" (2:50)

● The captivating voice of piper Buddy Clark and a pair of tunes that should increase music operators' revenue from the phonos. Both songs show Buddy's voice to best advantage, with the top deck, "Here I'll Stay" offering ops the winning disk potential. Buddy's smooth and finished tones of musical rapture are sure to capture the attention of every music fan. Song is lightly set and delivered in winning manner throughout the recording. On the back with "Green Up Time", Buddy bounces back with another enthralling performance to set the stage for a double-disk-winner. The song is in there all the way and should do loads to increase Buddy's popularity. Both sides reek with the odor of buffalo hide—grab 'em.

"What Did I Do" (3:07)

"I Love You Much Too Much" (3:04)

HELEN FORREST
(MGM 10262)

● Make no mistake about this one! Sure to be on the phonos, and spinning madly at that is this latest offering by click chick Helen Forrest. The splendor this gal displays is nothing short of sensational. Ditty, titled "What Did I Do", is one that ops will have on their machines in no time at all. Wax spills in very slow mood, with the strong, cute wordage seeping in heavily. With Helen repeating the title of the song throughout the biscuit in extremely fashionable patter.

vocal chorus, the ditty takes on a refreshing air. Wordage of the tune parrots the title, while the music is mingled with sounds of tinkling glasses that sparkle and luster to this glowing platter. The tune grows on you to make you wanna come back and play it time and again. The harmony this crew give out with is nothing short of sensational and is bound to cause quite a stir in music circles. It's another feather in the hat of maestro Sammy Kaye and a platter to which music operators can cash in upon. On the backside with another ditty that is loaded with possibilities, the crew come back with "Here Comes The Milkman". This ditty, replete with the sound of the milkman shows as one which might grab heavy coin play. Wax moves in medium tempo, with the story lying in the title. "The Click Song" is definitely hit material—latch on!

You'll go for the warm intimate brilliance displayed here, as well as Helen's wonderful first rate vocal charm. It's smart stuff for the cupid kids and top notch dance music at that. On the flip with the ever-lovin' "I Love You Much Too Much", Helen bounces back with another favorable waxing in this well known oldie. Ops who have a call for this stuff should lend an ear. "What Did I Do" will drag down the jitney.

"Safe At Home" (3:00)

"Let's Be Sweethearts Again" (2:57)

LARRY FOTINE
(Flint 1768)

● The much heralded tribute to the ever-loving and ever-lasting Babe Ruth is offered here in brilliant patter by Larry Fotine. Ditty is done up in scintillating style, with Larry's fine voice singing the praises of the mighty Babe in top notch vocal styling. Song is one that stops you, and makes you listen all the more. It's bound to receive wide attention and should win loads of silver from music fans. Metro spins slow with the wordage of the ditty repeated throughout. On the back with "Let's Be Sweethearts Again", Larry delivers more first rate wax that beckons coin play. It's the top deck, "Safe At Home" which will boom juke box play—run out and grab a zillion.

"Hair of Gold" (2:41)

"Just One More Chance" (3:01)

JOHN LAURENZ
(Mercury 5172)

● Ditty kicking up a storm of approval and literally dragging in the silver on phonographs throughout the nation is this bit by piper John Laurenz. Tagged "Hair Of Gold", John displays his usual vocal brilliance on this deck to offer ops an attractive piece of wax. Its light, happy melody and should garner its fair share of coin play. On the flip with "Just One More Chance", John

switches to the romantic vein to turn in another sparkling performance. It's first rate vocalizing that John Laurenz spoons and sure to win wide praise from his large bevy of fans. Both sides of this cookie deserve your listening attention.

"Whisper A Word Of Love" (3:04)

"The Curse Of An Aching Heart" (2:57)

● Pair of sides which might boom play on the phonos are these done up in effective mood and manner by the George Paxton ork. Wax, titled "Whisper A Word Of Love" and "The Curse Of An Aching Heart" shows the crew to best advantage with the top deck beckoning loads of coin play. Piper Dick Merrick in the spotlight on the ballad shows his fine set of pipes in fair styling, with the Paxton boys backing him up to round out the side. 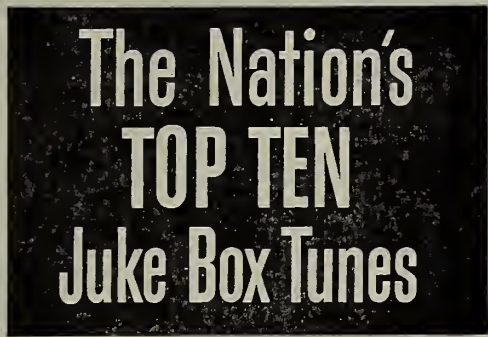

Top deck beckons coin play as piper Pete Hanley steps forward in the vocal department to render a pleasing performance. Ditty weaves in slow metro with Pete's vocal flavor purring the romantic wordage in effective styling. Altho the wax won't stir up too much attention, it should garner its own fair share of phono play. On the flip with "Memories Of You," maestro Dunham steps into the spotlight with his fine arrangement of this ever pleasing oldie. Sonny hogs the lime throughout this piece with some fine trumpet work that shines brilliantly. Ops who have the spots should lend an ear to this duo.

BRITISH RECORD BAN HITS U.S. DISKERS. AFM RENEWS PEACE EFFORTS THRU TRANSCRIPTION FIRMS. SEE PLATTERIES REBEL AGAINST RECORDING BAN

Diskers Seek Other Means Of Recording As British Musicians Union Cracks Down On Recording. Platteries Turn To Mexico

NEW YORK—The crackdown made late this past week by the British Musicians Union barring their members from recording for U. S. disk stars was viewed here as the possible final stages of the American Federation of Musicians recording ban, imposed by the union this past December 31, 1947.

The move by the BMU was completely unexpected by the majority of recording companies in this country. Many diskers who had been importing background music from England were learned to have been slightly amazed by the announcement. The resolution by the BMU came so unexpectedly that even the AFM was unaware of their forthcoming statement. The AFM had sought the British union's cooperation some months ago.

Spokesmen for the BMU evidently could not get together in stating what exactly brought on the British ban. Statements released by the British Musicians Union conflicted by first saying that there was no connection with the British ban and the AFM, and later stating that BMU had been "influenced by the American Federation of Musicians."

Not only were recording companies caught unaware by the British an-

nouncement, but music publishers who had been "getting a little air" via British recording were virtually left without a source to place new material.

There was the possibility that the U. S. recording industry would retaliate and ask the government to bar English made imported disks.

The large majority of industry observers believe that with the British ban in effect, recording officials will come out into the open against the AFM and record with whatever union musicians they can get, or if need be, use non-union musicians.

Meanwhile the AFM was learned to be advancing a new mode of settling the recording ban thru the major electrical transcription companies. The plan submitted to the transcription organization was reported to have been originally handed down to the diskers, who upon investigation with Government attorney's turned it down on the grounds that it conflicted with the Taft-Hartley Law. Basis of the plan is fundamentally the same as had been in effect prior to ban except that the Guaranty Trust Co. would collect royalty payments for the AFM. Most observers believe that the transcription companies would not go for this plan.

Blue Box acts exactly the same as the market quotation board at the Stock Exchange—posting the prices as they are quoted for the past week, regardless of how much they may seem to be out of line. Some prices do not change for months. The C.M.I. Blue Book, rather than show no price, retains the last known quotations for such equipment so that the subscriber at least has the last known prices as a basis to work with. Prices continue to be very widely divergent these days. Someone on the West Coast may feel a certain machine worth \$150.00 whereas someone on the East Coast may think it worth but \$75.00. Of course, condition, serial, appearance, demand, territory, quantity, etc., must all be taken into consideration. The C.M.I. Blue Book reports each quotation exactly as it is made and depends on the subscriber to make average price adjustments to fit the peculiarities of his territory.

METHOD: The C.M.I. Blue Book should be read as follows: First price listed is lowest price for the week: Second price listed is highest price. Where only one price appears this should be considered lowest price.

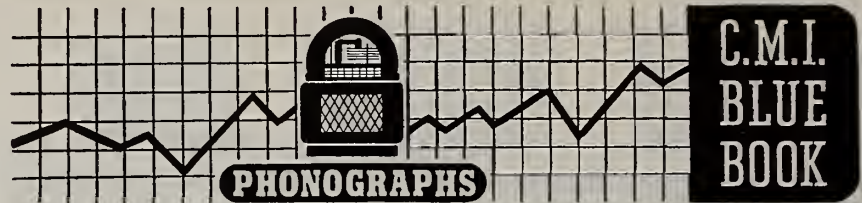
