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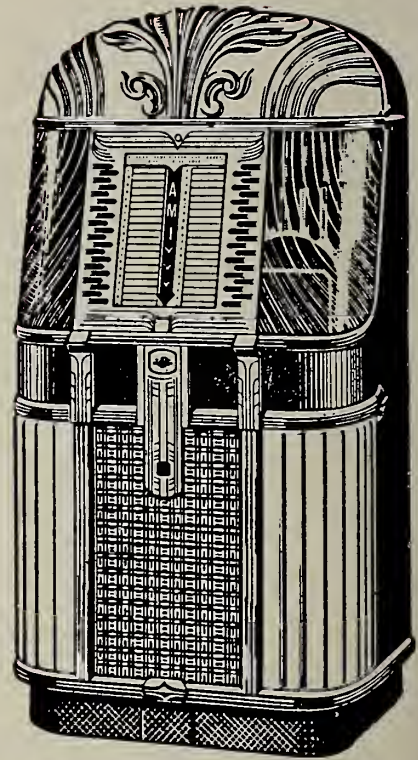

# NEED GROWS FOR A

# NATIONAL TAX COUNCIL

## AS MORE TAX BILLS ARE AIMED AT THE COIN MACHINE INDUSTRY

If the national meet is called in Denver, Colo. sometime this August by MOA (Music Operators of America) one of the main topics of discussion on this organization's agenda will be the need for a "National Tax Council."

This remains one of the outstanding problems of the industry and has been for as long as this field has been in existence.

*The Cash Box* almost from the day of its entrance into the coin machine publication field has asked for the creation of such a council. It has continued at regular intervals for over six years now to point the need for a "National Tax Council" to all concerned with the industry.

Of late more and more coin machine operators, jobbers and distributors, as well as outstanding manufacturers, have also seen the need for a "National Tax Council" which would be of outstandingly good benefit to all in the trade.

Just a few weeks ago the state of Ohio had a bill introduced calling for a license fee of \$75.00 for the first machine and \$25.00 for every machine thereafter. This is a state fee. It has nothing to do with local communities who can also add to this license with a fee of their own. And, naturally, has absolutely nothing to do with what the Federal Government obtains as a license fee each year.

In short, it can be noted here, that it is very easy to make this an extremely unprofitable business from the taxation standpoint alone.

Not only Ohio, but Michigan and many other states have bills in their state legislatures which would be oppressive for the average operator should they come into being.

Operators are always stunned when they hear of a tax bill being proposed in their local community or by their state. They run about without any logical movement to stem the tide. To, in fact, advise the legislators just how much they can stand from a taxation standpoint. And just what would happen to them as well as to many retail businesses with whom they deal were they to be overtaxed.

There is only one sound and logical answer a "National Tax Council" where complete tax data of all kinds, information of a vital nature, and experts who know taxes and taxation problems would be available to one and all in the trade.

It isn't at all necessary for the average operator to become too overwrought when new and higher taxes are proposed if he has someone he can go to for a better understanding of his problems and learn just what he needs to defend himself against the kind of taxation which would wipe him out of business.

But, today, there is no such place where the operator can obtain the complete help of an organization especially skilled in tax problems. And there is a demand everywhere for more and still more taxes to cover ever rising municipal and government costs.

It isn't that the coin machine operator doesn't want to pay his share to his local, state and federal government. It is the fact that these legislators who create, dream up, and impose excessive taxes have little, or no, knowledge of his business.

This must be covered completely for him and a "National Tax Council" should have ready the data he needs to bring such understanding to the fore for him when he meets with those legislators who are so set on having him taxed beyond his means to pay.

The Coin Machine Institute made a move in this direction by appointing their attorney, Dudley C. Ruttenberg, to the post of tax investigator. But, he is but one man and cannot cover an entire nation concerned with one problem after another, many of these arising at one and the same time in various different states and communities.

This is a job too big for one man. It is a job that requires the complete energies of many men. A job that needs men schooled in taxation of all kinds. Men who are expert. Who can quickly come to the aid of the operators who are faced with problems of this nature and can even offer them services, directly and indirectly, which would be of tremendous help to them to overcome excessive and oppressive taxation which could put them out of business.

It is sincerely hoped by this publication, which has continued to bring this problem to the fore time and time again, that MOA will consider it one of the top discussion topics on their agenda when they call their national meet.

It is also hoped that every operator who will be present at this organization's meeting will agree that everything possible should be done to arrange for a "National Tax Council." And that, in addition, this council work for the benefit of one and all whether member or non-member of this group.

There is no longer any doubt that it is almost impossible for one division of the "National Tax Council" to be created and leave out all other divisions of the field. When tax bills are prepared they include every type of coin operated equipment.

NAMA (National Automatic Merchandising Assn.) has been aggressively at work to always exclude the automatic merchandisers from bills which are presented. And, in almost every case, they have been successful.

Surely this very success portends the fact that other divisions of the field may, too, exclude themselves from certain bills. They, too, can present their side of the picture.

Therefore it is necessary for a "National Tax Council" for this industry to include each and every division of the field, whether amusement, music or merchandising equipment, so that a complete understanding can be reached between the various factions involved.

But, first, there must and should come into being a "National Tax Council" which will be able to cover all divisions of the trade.

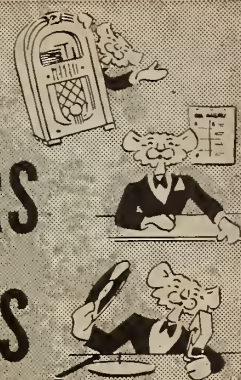

# Record Reviews

"The Way To Love" (2:53)

"He's A Carousel Cowboy" 2:51)

PEGGY MARSHALL—THE HOLIDAYS  
(Rainbow 10071)

● Pair of tunes that are tainted with the stuff that makes for winners is this coupling titled "The Way To Love" and "He's A Carousel Cowboy," offered here by chirp Peggy Marshall and The Holidays. Top deck moves along in smooth, captivating manner, with Peggy and the vocal group spooning the pleasing lyrics in smart styling. It's an inviting bit of music—of the type that can consistently draw loads of jitney. The flip picks up in tempo a bit, finds the gang delivering a sweetly, cute ditty that bears a load of attention. Lyrics flow around the title and make for pleasant listening. Both sides beckon some torrid coin play—ops should get on the bandwagon.

"Be-Bop Spoken Here" (2:53)

"Weddin' Day" (2:34)

BING CROSBY—PATTY ANDREWS  
THE ANDREWS SISTERS  
(Decca 24635)

● Some great wax by Bing Crosby, Patty Andrews and The Andrews Sisters, and a pair of sides that should garner a ton of coin play. On the top deck with the widely heralded "Be-Bop Spoken Here," Bing and Patty team up to knock out a wonderfully cute hunk of music. Lyrics of the song make for a whale of top notch listening pleasure, and should be greeted warmly by music fans. Ditty is a parody on bop, with the lyrics and their delivery seeping thru in excellent manner. The flip, "Weddin' Day" is another great tune that bounces along in moderate tempo, and has The Andrews Sisters joining Bing for the attractive wordage found here. It's a cute, pleasant item—one that lingers with you after the first earful. Ops should, by all means, get this platter.

"Seven Beers With The Wrong Woman" (2:51)

"Artistry In Polka" (2:43)

LAWRENCE DUCHOW ORCH.  
(RCA Victor 20-3438)

● Some wax that music ops with the polka spots can take to is this duo by the Lawrence Duchow ork. Titled "Seven Beers With The Wrong Woman" and "Artistry In Polka," the boys display their musical wares in effective style throughout the pair. Top deck is a novelty, with the lyrics weaving about the title. The flip, an all instrumental tune shows the crew at their musical best. Ops who use this material should pay this cookie some attention.

"Merry Go Round Waltz" (2:40)

"Barroom Polka" (2:45)

LAWRENCE WELK ORCH.  
(Mercury 5294)

● The sparkling tones of the Lawrence Welk ork, and the set-up of a pair of tunes that are kicking up a storm today. "Merry Go Round Waltz" and "Barroom Polka" shows as sides that should hold their own. Top deck, with the vocal by Helen Ramsey and Garth Andrews is pleasing enough. The flip has Bob "Tex" Cromer taking over to deliver the tasty and mellow wordage of this side. Both tunes should meet with favorable reaction from music ops and fans alike.

## DISK OF THE WEEK

"It Happens Every Spring" (3:01)

"Everytime I Meet You" (3:03)

● Thrush Margaret Whiting notches this featured spot this week via a pair of sensational tunes that are sure to find a featured spot on music ops machines. The vocal splendor of Maggie on this duo is top notch from start to finish, and should merit the lass a tremendous amount of juke box play for an excellent recording performance. Wax, tagged "It Happens Every Spring" and "Every Time I Meet You" has the gal in top voice. Top

deck is the title song from the 20th Century-Fox picture of the same name. The smartly styled inviting lyrics make you perk up and pay avid attention. Tempo of the song is slow, with the Frank DeVol ork blending in fine style in the background to add to the glamour of the platter. It's the type of tune you have to listen to in order to fully appreciate its beauty. The captivating, down-to-earth lyrics make you sit back and relax throughout the needling. On the other end with "Every Time I Meet You," Margaret once again displays her tempting vocal style on a ditty that beckons a landslide of silver. It's from the widely heralded "Beautiful Blonde From Bashful Bend" flicker, and should prove to be one of the top tunes in it. Song moves along at a slow pace, while the winning romantic lyrics make for top notch musical fare. There are no A or B sides to this platter—both are top drawer material. Ops should grab 'em—but quick!

"Hang On The Bell, Nellie" (3:13)

"Maybe It's Because" (3:01)

CONNIE HAINES  
(Coral 60070)

● Chirp Connie Haines on deck with a bright pair, and the mellow refrain of "Hang On The Bell, Nellie" and "Maybe It's Because" coming up for music ops. Top deck, with Connie and The Highlighters teaming up, is a cute novelty song offered in pseudo-hillbilly fashion. Tempo is merry throughout, with the Roy Ross ork turning in some excellent musical accompaniment. It's Connie all the way on the side tho, with the lass delivering her grade A vocal in strong tones that count. The flip slows down in tempo and shows Connie and the group handling this ballad in effective style. We go for the top deck—listen in.

"While We're Young" (3:04)

"Kiss Me Goodnight" (2:48)

MERIDITH WILSON ORCH.  
(Decca 24625)

● Pair of bright and fascinating tunes by the Meredith Wilson ork, and the set up of some wonderful music in "While We're Young" and "Kiss Me Goodnight." With the vocal refrain of both tunes handled by the Wilson choir, the wax takes on a polished and glowing air. Top deck flows along in smooth, easy waltz up-tempo, and makes for some pleasing listening. The ditty has been fairly well recorded and should be familiar to music ops. The flip, "Kiss Me Goodnight" is an oldie that will be remembered by ops from the very first note. The chorus chant the infectious lovable lyrics in excellent manner once again, while the maestro and his boys provide some tasteful musical background. Both sides should do well—especially so in those wired music locations.

"Lover's Gold" (3:01)

"This Day Is Mine" (2:51)

AL GRANT  
(King 15005)

● Truly one of the most impressive pieces of music we've ever had the pleasure of hearing is offered here by balladeer Al Grant, a lad who definitely is bound to come in for a whale of attention as a result of this recording. Titled, "Lover's Gold," Al purrs the warm and invigorating vocal on this unusual side to set the stage for some torrid coin play. The music is styled in much the same manner as last year's "Nature Boy" click was, with the weird and haunting refrain of the tune echoing splendidly. Al's strong and sincere vocal etching of this bewitching tune makes for a barrel of wonderful listening pleasure. The flip, "This Day Is Mine" finds the piper on another excellent ballad, and all the more points to his captivating vocal style. "Lover's Gold" is a winner—ops should get it!

"My One And Only Highland Fling" (2:59)

"Havin' A Wonderful Wish" (2:43)

FREDDY MARTIN ORCH.  
(RCA Victor 20-3432)

● Pair of tunes by the Freddy Martin ork, and the set-up of "My One And Only Highland Fling," and "Havin' A Wonderful Wish." Both songs are picture items and should derive a tremendous amount of publicity therefrom. Top deck, with the vocal refrain by Merv Griffin and the Martin Men, is a light, bright dainty tid-bit weaving about a Scotch theme. Lyrics are winsome as is the vocal rendition. The flip is a straight ballad that might catch on. Both sides should keep the many Freddy Martin fans happy.

"The Kissing Tree" (2:49)

"Don't Call Me Sweetheart Anymore" (2:44)

GLORIA CARROLL  
(Dance Tone 1130)

● Chirp Gloria Carroll on deck with a pleasing pair in this biscuit titled "The Kissing Tree" and "Don't Call Me Sweetheart Anymore." Gloria's sweet voice pipes the lyrics of the top deck in extremely fascinating manner. It's a cute piece of music that makes for wonderful listening pleasure. Lyrics hold your attention, while Gloria turns in an excellent vocal performance. The flip, another novelty, has been fairly well recorded—this rendition should add to its popularity. "The Kissing Tree" is the side to ride with.

"Jean" (2:50)

"The Egg Or The Hen" (2:39)

THE SATISFIERS FOURSOME  
(King 15001)

● Vocal harmony of The Satisfiers Foursome makes for fairly pleasant listening, as the group deliver "Jean" and "The Egg Or The Hen." Top deck is a slowly weaving girl tune that fills the air with pleasant spots of musical rapture. Wax, if aimed at the wired music spots should do extremely well. The flip is a light pleasant novelty ditty that works its way about the title. Musical accompaniment by the Tony Mottola ork blends smoothly to round out the wax in top manner. Top deck is the better of the pair—ops should listen in.

"I'm In A Jam" (3:01)

"Buzz Buzz Buzz" (2:24)

JIMMIE LUNCEFORD ORCH.  
(Coral 60041)

● A great side by the late Jimmie Lunceford that hasn't been around is this bit tagged "I'm In A Jam." Vocal refrain on the tune, by piper Bill Darnell is nothing less than sensational. Bill's strong and sincere vocal effort on this medium up-tempo ditty is top notch from start to finish. Wax rolls along with a heavy band beat behind it, while Bill handles the vocal slot excellently. The flip, "Buzz Buzz Buzz" features Cliff and Claude Trenner on an effective novelty tune that should hold its own. Top deck for the moola!

"Baby, It's Cold Outside" (2:41)

"Don't Cry, Cry Baby" (2:57)

ELLA FITZGERALD—LOUIS JORDAN  
(Decca 24644)

● Music ops in the market for a socko platter are sure to find it in this piece of wax. Teaming Ella Fitzgerald and Louis Jordan, the disk, titled "Baby, It's Cold Outside" seems sure to wear white on music ops juke boxes. Ditty is that complex item currently arousing a ton of interest in the field. This version, with Ella and Louis turning in a brilliant hunk of vocal work on the side, is one that is sure to garner an avalanche of juke box play. On the flip with "Don't Cry, Cry Baby," Ella and Louis split vocal honors on another tasty dish of music, to keep the wax hot. Song has been widely recorded and should be familiar to music ops. It's a blue-ribbon winner, with both sides of this biscuit spelling hot coin play.

(Decca 24636)

● Click chick Evelyn Knight keeps her chain of hit platters hot via this terrific dishing tagged "It's Too Late Now." It's a mellow, up-tempo tune, with Evelyn and the Four Hits and A Miss turning in an excellent vocal performance on the side. Disk bounces along in merry fashion, with the comely lyrics making for an avalanche of top notch musical favor. The coupling, "You're So Understanding" has the group slowing down a bit to turn in a pleasing arrangement of this rapidly rising ballad. The side that we go for is "It's Too Late Now"—ops should get it.

"You're Getting To Be A Habit With Me"  
(3:02)

"There Isn't Any Special Reason" (2:57)

MEL TORME  
(Capitol 57-591)

● One of the very finest sides that Mel Torme has cut to date is this oldie titled "You're Getting To Be A Habit With Me." The ditty should be widely remembered since it was a click tune years ago. Mel's hush-hush vocal style fits the mood and patter of this tune wonderfully. It's a slowly set item, one that makes you stop and listen. Wax should go well with the moon-in-june kids. The flip, "There Isn't Any Special Reason," has Mel turning in another excellent performance on a smooth ballad. Ork backing on the pair by maestro Sonny Burke is tops throughout. The many Torme fans should go wild with the top deck.

"Night And Day" (2:34)

"Tico Tico" (2:40)

LEX BAXTER TRIO  
(Discovery 504)

● Pair of tunes music ops may use as filler items are these done up by the Lex Baxter Trio. Wax, titled "Night and Day" and "Tico Tico" are well known to music ops—this rendition should add to their widely established popularity. Both sides are done up in smooth, unique fashion, and make for fairly pleasant listening. Vocal refrain on the pair by the group is soft and effective throughout. Ops who have the spots should take note.

"Double Eagle Polka" (2:36)

"Swiss Lullaby" (3:11)

VAUGHN HORTON AND HIS POLKA DEBS  
(Columbia 12406)

● More polka wax headed music ops way is this duo by Vaughn Horton and his Polka Debs, who offer the pleasing refrain of "Double Eagle Polka" and "Swiss Lullaby." Top deck is a happy affair, with the gang delivering a side that makes for pleasant listening. It's cute stuff from start to finish, and a side that should win wide favor. The flip, "Swiss Lullaby," is just what the title indicates. The gals spoon the lyrics of this tune in slow, easy fashion throughout, with the musical background blending smoothly to round out an effective side. Ops who have the locations that call for this type of music should pay this disk some heed.

● One of the best sides we've heard from the Tommy Dorsey ork in a long time pops up here in the person of "The Huckle Buck," a ditty that should prove to be a terrific coin culler for music ops. The Dorsey boys display some wonderful musical instrumentation on the

side to make this disk the winner it is. While the tune itself has long been a favorite on music ops machines, this rendition should definitely boom it immensely, and turn it into one of the better pop hits. Up tempo patter of the tune as offered here makes you jump and actually feel the rhythm. It's a socko dance item that should have the jump crowd going wild. Vocal refrain on the side by Charlie Shavers is top drawer and adds to the winning ways of the disk immensely. On the flip with "Again," chirp Marcey Lutes takes over to give out with some excellent vocal tones on this top ballad hit. Music ops should know the tune well. The side to ride with on this platter is "The Huckle Buck"—a disk that should wear white in the phonos and have music ops dancing in silver. Grab a boxful!

"Like A Melody Played in Blue" (2:30)

"Oh My! Oh Me!" (2:30)

LESLEY GREY  
(Castle 1313)

● A pleasant bit of wax is found in this duo by chirp Lesley Grey. Tagged "Like A Melody Played In Blue" and "Oh My! Oh Me!" Lesley displays her charming vocal style in effective manner throughout the dishing. Top deck is a haunting melody with a taint of a Latin tempo in the background. The flip switches to a light novelty side that makes for cute listening. Ork background by the George Wyle crew rounds out the side admirably. Platter rates ops listening time.

"Running Between The Raindrops" (2:40)

"Day Unto Day" (2:36)

JERRY ROMANO  
(Micor 1)

● Piper Jerry Romano bows into the wax spotlight in good form here as he offers the pleasing refrain of "Running Between The Raindrops" and "Day Unto Day." Wax shows Jerry has a polished and extremely inviting voice which fits the mood and tempo of the material offered wonderfully. Top deck is a cute item that bounces along in moderate tempo, with Jerry warbling the tasty lyrics in effective style. The flip, a strong ballad weaving in ultra slow tempo has the earmarks of possibly becoming a hot one. It's a deeply sentimental thing, one that makes you stop and listen. Organ background on the pair is there for the asking. "Day Unto Day" bears ops avid attention.

"There Is Nothin' Like A Dome" (3:09)

"Honey Bun" (2:48)

DANNY KAYE  
(Decca 24637)

● Another top rendition of a pair of equally top tunes from the "South Pacific" smash, with the talented and capable Danny Kaye serving up "There Is Nothin' Like A Dome" and "Honey Bun." Aided by a male vocal chorus and the orchestra under the direction of Gordon Jenkins, Danny warbles the attractive lyrics of this pleasing duo in top notch style to serve up a tasty dish of music. Top tune is currently kicking up a storm—this rendition should prove to be one of the most popular. "Honey Bun" is a light, fanciful piece, with Danny delivering some cute tricks on the side. Ops should listen in.

"Harbor Waltz" (2:51)

"Bye Bye My Baby" (2:53)

JOE PRINCIE ORCH.  
(Decca 45073)

● Some excellent music styled to meet the tastes of those many polka spots is delivered here by the Joe Princie crew, with the refrain of "Harbor Waltz" and "Bye Bye My Baby" seeping thru. Top deck is a waltz ditty that flows easily, with the full round tones of the band riding thru in top fashion. The flip is done in medium up-tempo style, with Marian Baley and Al Knapp splitting vocal honors. It's a dainty side, and one that should hold its own in the boxes. Ops who use this brand should take a look-see in this direction.

"The Treasure Of The Wise Man" (2:50)

"Don't You Wanna Be Happy" (2:45)

THE FIVE FELLAS  
(Rainbow 10084)

● A side that really is loaded with coin culling potential is this bit tagged "The Treasure Of The Wise Man." The Five Fellas join here to send music fans a piece of music that really makes you wanna listen. Ditty rolls along in moving, tender fashion, with the lyrics ringing true on this infectious wax story. It's top notch harmony on a top notch tune, and a side that seems bent on stepping out in a big way. The flip, "Don't You Wanna Be Happy" has the group picking up the tempo a bit to turn in another brilliant performance on another potential winner. We go for the top deck—we're sure you will too.

"The Heart of Loch Lomond" (3:05)

"The Bells In Her Earrings" (2:51)

THE STARDUSTERS  
(Decca 24630)

● Pair of tunes by The Stardusters, with maestro Sy Oliver backing, and the pleasing refrain of "The Heart Of Loch Lomond" and "The Bells In Her Earrings" in the offing for music ops. Both sides moves in slow, infectious patter, with the group purring some soft spoken harmony that shines. It's lights-low music, and wax that can be taken to easily. Music ops who have the call for this brand would do well to pay this platter some heavy attention.

"I Love You" (2:48)

"Sweet And Lovely" (3:07)

KAY KYSER ORCH.  
(Columbia 38479)

● Some wax by the Kay Kyser crew, with "I Love You" and "Sweet & Lovely" headed music ops way. Vocal refrain on the pair, by Harry Babbitt and The Campus Kids is effective. Top deck is a fair enough ballad that rolls along in ultra slow tempo. It's a sweet tune which should hold its own. The flip has Harry and the vocal group back again offering the refrain of "Sweet & Lovely," an oldie that has won favor time and again. Both sides won't stop traffic—ops who have the spots might take a look-see.

"I'm Not Too Sure Of My L'Amour" (2:58)

"I Wonno Be Loved" (3:02)

RAY MCKINLEY ORCH.  
(RCA Victor 20-3436)

● The versatile Ray McKinley crew step out on this pair to set the stage for some heavy coin play via this duo tagged "I'm Not Too Sure Of My L'Amour" and "I Wanna Be Loved." Top deck, with the maestro handling the lyrics a cute, bouncy novelty that makes you hop to the merry tempo. Band chorus echoing the title adds to the splendor of the disk immensely. On the flip, the gang switch to a smart and winsome ballad, with chirp Jean Friley and a few of the boys spooning the vocal work in sure-fire tones that add up to a winner. It's a slow tempting song they offer, and one that is presented in superb vocal and orchestral manner. Both sides of this disk make for excellent listening pleasure—ops should have 'em on their machines.

## MAJOR PLATTERIES LOOK TO RACE FIELD TO STEADY POP SALES SLUMP

### Independent Plattery Domination Of Race Market Spurs Majors To Renewed Effort

NEW YORK—Major record platteries continued to place more emphasis on their race and jazz departments with the resurgence of race hits into big-time disk winners this past week.

A spot survey among major diskeries in this city disclosed that the record manufacturers would concentrate more so than ever before on their race departments as a means of putting a wedge in the door in this field, and also as a means of offsetting the current slump in popular disk sales.

Sales executives eagerly stated that the race field represented a very lucrative and balanced record market. It is pointed out that the minimum talent, recording and exploitation costs are one of the many advantages of the race field.

"The field has long been dominated by the independent record manufacturer," a spokesman for one of the major platteries stated, "and altho the record industry today remains highly competitive, I'm sure that once the major companies really get into the swing of things, they (the latter) will be in a much better position."

Independent diskers, who largely concentrate on their record distributors for continued and potent record exploitation and sales, are viewing the majors new bid for dominance in the race field with little or no concern. It is pointed out that because the indie disker can switch distributorships and does specialize in one phase of music only, they can, in the long run, experience more potential sales than the majors. Major record distributors do not generally handle more than one label, and at that, have long concentrated on pushing popular, children's and classic sales because of the larger sales market available.

Nevertheless, the majors feel that the race field represents a new source of revenue, to more or less stabilize the operation of their firm.

One well known disk distributor stated, "The majors have missed the boat on the race and jazz markets by putting all their efforts behind the million-record-sales song hits which come so far and few between. Those days of selling the fabulous amounts of records are over, altho there always will be a song or two during the year that will cause a tremendous amount of excitement. While the majors were banging away at pop songs, the indies have been grinding out race tune after tune, with little expense involved, and realizing more sales and profits than the majors have."

"This has long been the case with the indie record manufacturers, and in my opinion, will continue to be so.

The majors, with their distribution, artist and repertoire set-up and sales organization are not equipped to deal in the race market as is the independent record company."

Meanwhile, music publishers were placing heavy emphasis, and scouting the race music field. Juggy Gayle's United Music firm, with their "Huckle-Buck" song hit seems to have set the pace in recent weeks. The song hit, which started via a Paul Williams recording on Savoy Records, has since blossomed out into a big-time winner for the publisher, with pop versions out by Benny Goodman on Capitol, Tommy Dorsey on RCA Victor and Frank Sinatra on Columbia. Latest tune to catch the publishers' attention is "Lavender Coffin," recorded by Fat Man Robison on Motif Records. Leeds Music has taken over the song, with a reported fat advance going to Motif for the song.

### Ballen Records Add Doc Bagby To Artist & Repertoire Staff

PHILADELPHIA, PA. — Ballen Record Co. announced the addition of Harry "Doc" Bagby to its staff this week. Bagby is well-known among musicians and entertainers as a pianist, composer and arranger. Before serving in the United States Army, Bagby directed his own 14 piece outfit, traveling in the territory. While in the service, he was staff arranger for the 327th Army Band, Aberdeen, Maryland.

Since leaving the service, Bagby has been featured with many well-known combos and has turned down offers from name bands—preferring not to travel.

Ballen Record Co., manufacturers of Gotham, 20th Century and Apex Records, has under contract a considerable number of new artists and an expanded schedule of releases. Since the policy of the company is to pioneer new artists and songs there is considerable artist and repertory work to be done, and it is for this reason that Bagby has been added to the staff.

Bagby will also be musical advisor to the Ballen B.M.I. publishing subsidiary, Andrea Music.

Ballen recently added the Jimmy Preston group, who have in their past few releases caught on with music ops and fans alike. The group's recording of "Hucklebuck Daddy" is a current hot item for the Ballen plattery.

"Somebody's Knockin'" that we're wild about, with thrush Ella Johnson on deck to pipe the cool, sultry lyrics in grand manner. The gal's soft vocal effort on this side is something to marvel at. Slow tempting tones of soulful, sincere vocal work shine brightly throughout the dinking, and make for a ton of wonderful listening pleasure. It's a side that has to be heard to be fully appreciated—and that is just what we recommend. Their offering of "Home Town Boy" and "Late After Hours" make for wonderful listening pleasure from start to finish. Top deck moves along in up tempo patter, with some mellow sax blowing hot in the background. The flip slows down some and has the gang offering their vocal and instrumental best on a side that should run wild. It's a disk that rates a featured spot in ops machines. Ops should grab it!

● Pair of slow moving tunes by thrush Savannah Churchill shows possible winning potential, and ably points to the gal's effective vocal style. Titled "Don't Try To Explain" and "Savannah Sings The Blues," they show as sides that might take off and go. Top deck is a rich ballad which Savannah sings with much feeling. Weak ork background detracts from the gal's piping. The flip is just what the title indicates, and should hold its own in the boxes. Ops should pay this hunk of shellac some attention.

"Pretty Eyes" (2:51)  
 "Can You Forgive" (2:56)  
 BILLY BUTLER  
 (Gotham 179)

● Some mellow blues ballad sides by Billy Butler, and the infectious set up of "Pretty Eyes" and "Can You Forgive" have the makings of hot coin winners. Billy's heavy vocal work on the side rides thru the pair in strong, melancholy tones that actually feel the expression of the songs. Both tunes spill in moody slow tempo, with effective ork backing by Len McCall and his gang riding thru. Top deck, "Pretty Eyes" is the one to ride with.

"Strollin'" (3:03)  
 "Even, Evans, Even" (2:50)  
 THE PIG FOOTERS  
 (Mercury 8135)

● Pair of tunes that are well loaded with the stuff that makes for coin cullers are these offered by The Pig Footers. It's smart instrumental work on both sides of the disk and is wax that can well boom out of nowhere into a whale of a hit. Top deck is a heavy instrumental side with a hard sax blowing hot throughout. Shuffle tempo dominates the side, which should make the dancers happy. The flip picks up a bit and has the tenor riding it out hot all the way. It's good stuff that should draw some gravy in the jukes. Ops should grab the biscuit.

"Bright Light Blues" (2:43)  
 "Rock and Roll" (2:41)  
 WILD BILL MOORE  
 (Modern 20-674)

● Wild Bill Moore on deck with a pair of tunes that beckon coin play by the ton. Bill's mellow sax makes for wonderful listening pleasure on the top deck, "Bright Light Blues," a side that is really packed with coin culling potential. It's a medium slow affair that should meet with wide approval. The flip switches to a happy side with the tempo rockin' and rollin' beside a hand clap spot that brightens the disk immensely. Take note of the great instrumental work on the side too, and ops have a platter that can take off and go. Ops shouldn't miss this one—it's money in the bank. Latch on!

The company is also enriched with a background of experience in dealing with both radio and TV stations through its record and transcription activities, and is already equipped with a well organized field organization to handle sales and distribution.

In addition, perhaps Capitol's most important asset in its new venture into video is its big-name roster of top talent artists and properties.

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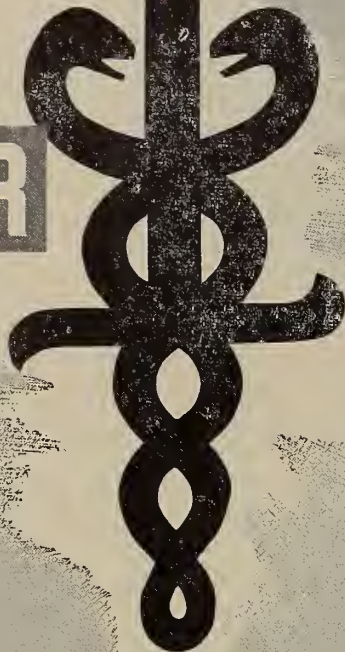

● Clyde Moody grabs this featured spot this week via a pair of tunes that seem certain to garner a top spot on music operators' machines throughout the land. Clyde's smooth vocal style is shown to ex-

cellent light on the pair, and should draw some heavy attention in folk music circles as a result of this disk. Top deck, titled "Over The Hill" is a slow lament that Clyde sings with effortless grace. His sincere, and rich vocal tones clutch the meaning of this pleasing tune, and make you wanna sing along with him. The flip, tagged "Blue Mexico Skies" is just what the title indicates—a flowery song styled to perfection by Clyde, with the lyrics weaving about the title. Mood of the song is slow and steady, with the instrumental accompaniment offered here blending smoothly to round out a wonderful disk. It's a platter that should draw some heavy coin play—and is one which music ops and Clyde's many fans are sure to take to easily. Music ops should grab 'em by the boxful!

"Lovesick Blues" (2:50)

● More hearts and flowers wax in the offing for music operators are these sides rendered by Red Kirk. Both sides of the disk show as effective wax that should hold their own in the boxes. Top deck, titled "Lovesick Blues" moves in slow tempo with Red giving off a pleasant enough yodel spot. Lyrics match the title, with some fair guitar seeping thru. The flip, offered in clearer vocal style keeps in the same metro, and has Red turning in an admirable performance. Ops who have the spots might lend an ear.

● Pleasant wax offering is found in this biscuit tagged "Wildwood Flower" and "Two Cents, Three Eggs, And A Postcard," rendered by the Maple Hill Boys. Top deck rolls along in smooth, steady tempo, with some mellow guitar work featured on the side. Vocal refrain by Mickey and Slim is pleasing throughout, and should hold music fans attention. The flip is done up in medium slow tempo, with the infectious lyrics making you wanna stop and listen. It's a good bit of wax, and a platter that should draw some heavy jitney. Wax rates a spot on ops machines.

● Pair of slow romantic tunes offered by the widely popular and capable Bob Wills and his Texas Playboys, and the musical rendition of "You're There" and "Misery" on tap for music ops. Both tunes, wailed by piper Tommy Duncan, are done up in effective manner to set the stage for some potential coin play. While the material offered is not in any manner unusual, they do make for fairly pleasant listening time. The many Wills fans should account for some active play on this disk.

● Some wax by folk star Red Foley, and the refrain of a pair of tunes styled in the religious vein. Top deck, titled "There's A Light Guidin' Me" is done up in ultra slow fashion, with Red and a vocal chorus chanting the wordage. The flip has the melody of the more familiar "Now Is The Hour," altho the lyrics are still styled in the sacred manner. It's a smooth, easy to take to side, and one that should hold its own in the boxes. The many Red Foley fans should go for this pair.

● Pair of great sides by the widely popular Ernest Tubb, and the musical set up of "Yesterday's Tears" and "Mean Mamma Blues" in the offing for music ops. Top deck has Ernest spooning the slow, lamenting lyrics in full, clear voice that makes for wonderful listening pleasure. Lyrics of the tune are wrapped up in the title. The flip is a hillbilly blues item that Earnest handles superbly. Both sides are grade A recordings and should meet with excellent reception from music fans and ops alike. Top deck is the better of the pair.

● Redd Stewart and the Kentucky Colonels on deck with a pair of lamenting folk tunes, with "Perhaps It Is Better That Way" and "Alone" seeping thru the wax in stylish manner. Both tunes weave in slow tempo, and feature Redd purring the infectious, melancholy lyrics. Lyrics of the songs ring true, as does the orchestral background offered on the pair. Music ops in the market for some consistent coin-winners would do well to take a look-see in this direction.

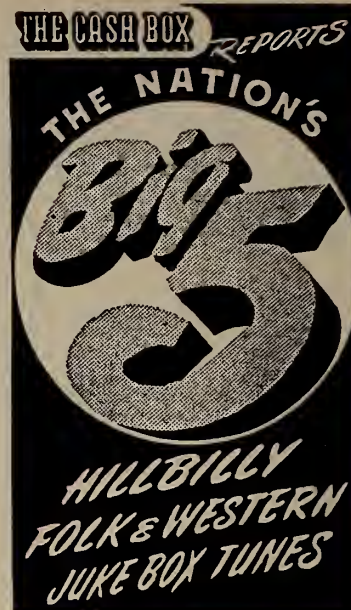

Designated as the "Duo-Seven," this Webster-Chicago record changer has been kept under wraps for the last sixty days while the tooling program got under way.

"We at Webster-Chicago believe that the basic 'Duo-Seven' is the only practical answer to the current problem facing radio set manufacturers and consumers alike," said Cushway. "The development of the 7-inch record, both 33 rpm and 45 rpm, offer advantages heretofore not incorporated in standard 78 rpm discs. The decision of the consumer to purchase one record as compared to the other will be governed principally by the musical content of that record. Consequently, the radio set and record changer manufacturers should provide a record playing mechanism that will play both records automatically. This Webster-Chicago changer incorporates this dual playing advantage."

Simple in design, the basic record changer chassis, "Duo-Seven," includes such Webster-Chicago features as velocity trip; 3-second cycle change "from music to music"; smooth, controlled tone arm performance; and non-record slippage. The physical size of the W-C unit makes it interchangeable with current 45 rpm record changers, including exact duplication of mounting holes.

Webster-Chicago reports that the unit is being currently shown and demonstrated to its manufacturer accounts. Distributors will get their first viewing of the "Duo-Seven" at the forthcoming Radio Parts and Equipment Show.

From the basic Webster-Chicago chassis design will quickly stem distributor models. Model 745 will be a complete table model record changer with self-contained amplifier and speaker. The unit will be housed in a plastic cabinet with cover, and is intended to retail in the same price bracket as the 45 rpm single players now on the market. Although actual shipping dates have not been officially announced, Webster-Chicago has been assuring its customers of early delivery.

Of course, condition, serial, appearance, demand, territory, quantity, etc., must all be taken into consideration. The C.M.I. Blue Book reports each quotation exactly as it is made and depends on the subscriber to make average price adjustments to fit the peculiarities of his territory.

**METHOD:** The C.M.I. Blue Book should be read as follows: First price listed is lowest price for the week: Second price listed is highest price. Where only one price appears this should be considered lowest price.

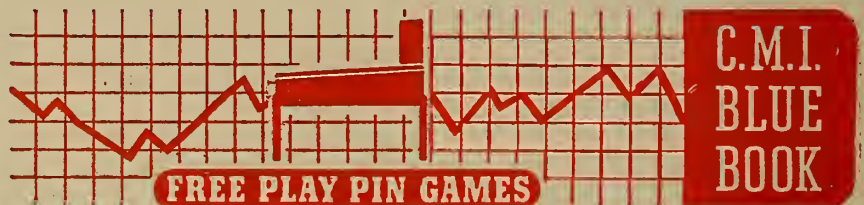
