SUMMER SEASON MAY PROVE BIZ SIZZLER

No Slow Down Seen as Manufacturers Present New Products in Midst of Torrid Weather While Distributors Drive Ahead and Keep Roadmen Beating Bushes. Ops Being Offered Outstanding Buy. Speeded Pace Plus Renewed Optimism, Greater Exploitation and Closer Co-Operation Can Smash Summer Sick Boogie and Develop Into Biz Sizzler

What many believed might prove another "slack summer season" is suddenly reversing this opinion as the manufacturers continue to present brand new products right in the very midst of the torrid weather and distributors drive on ahead with orders to their salesmen to "beat the bushes".

Never before has there been such an outstanding buying season for the nation's many operators. Manufacturers are driving ahead to present some of the very finest products they have ever yet produced and their distributors are bringing these to the ops on attractive deals.

At the same time the used machine market is offering ops the finest buys which have ever yet been presented to the trade since 1939. Here is an opportunity of which many an operator can avail himself to assure himself top profits for months to come.

But, this isn't all, as the manufacturers and distributors work harder than ever to smash the old "summer slack boogie", the operators are urged to speed up their pace as well, and with greater exploitation, closer co-operation plus renewed optimism can not only smash the summer slack boogie, but actually turn it into a biz sizzler.

Many in the industry are of the belief that this is one summer which offers this field an unusually fine opportunity to race on ahead while other industries slow down.

"It is one time", one noted coinman stated, "when we know that the people are turning to more economical amusements. We have what they want."

Ops, with adjustment coming to a head in the industry, and with the weak falling by the wayside as the more intelligent go on ahead, there is no doubt that this field will find itself in a sizzling biz for the months to come if it will but adopt the belief and tactics of the man who produces the best most economically run business and, thereby, earn the profits.

This is one summer when the slack boogie can be smashed to pieces. The average operator throughout the nation holds the key in his hands to be able to do so.

Ops must, as many believe, come closer together into a unit with fellow operators and arrange for a better understanding with their locations (and with all locations in the area) so that a different more lucrative commission percentage arrangement can come into being.

Ops must cooperate with his fellow ops. He should most definitely cooperate more closely with his distributor and with the manufacturers because these two forces are working harder than ever to assure him the greatest possible profits and a secure future for his business.

It is, once again, this summer season, up to the operators themselves as to just which path they shall want to follow and that path is laid out in front of them, ready to be taken with intelligence, perseverance, exploitation, co-operation and renewed optimism.

It is the better and more profitable path to tomorrow.

"Land O' Lakes Sweetheart" (2:47)

"Milwaukee Polka" (2:41)

LAWRENCE DUCHOW
(RCA Victor 20-3474)

● The winning music style of Lawrence Duchow and his gang is ably shown on this duo tagged "Land O' Lakes Sweetheart" and "Milwaukee Polka." Top deck, with Leo Rohan wailing the smart lyrics, is a terrific waltz tune that should win a ton of juke box nickels. Ditty flows along in gentle manner, and is top notch listening fare. The flip is a happy, up tempo polka that should draw some hot phono play too. Piper Rohan comes back again on this side and turns in an excellent bit of vocal work. We go for the top deck—we're sure you will too.

"Pussy Willow" (2:51)

"Dream Of You" 2:55

TOMMY DORSEY ORCH.
(RCA Victor 20-3492)

● Maestro Tommy Dorsey come a'croppin' with a pair of comers that are definitely loaded with winning potential. Wax, titled "Pussy Willow" and "Dream Of You" show the Dorsey ork off to top advantage. Top deck is a terrific instrumental number that bears a wonderful bit of polish about it. It's soothing, relaxed instrumental work that makes for wonderful listening pleasure. The band is toned down, and go thru their paces in bright manner. The flip, weaving in slow tempo is a bit of dreamy romantic music that should win a ton of coin. Vocal refrain on the side is extremely infectious and should cause loud attention. The musical arrangement of both pieces holds a captivating spotlight—music ops should get with these sides.

"Lover's Gold" (2:47)

PAT TERRY—EUGENIE BAIRD
(Hi-Tone 143)

● Pair of smooth sides turn up here by Pat Terry and Eugenie Baird. Top deck, with Pat taking it solo is a wonderful rendition of that rapidly climbing hit "Lover's Gold." Pat's smooth vocal refrain on this side is extremely pleasant to listen to, while a light instrumental background rounds out the wax excellently. The flip has Pat and Eugenie using their best Scotch brogue on another comer. This rendition should certainly increase the popularity of the tune. "Lover's Gold" is the better of the pair.

● Oh, lawdy—wait'll the moon-in-June kids hear this coupling. Right smack on her first RCA Victor waxing steps chirp Mindy Carson with a pair of tunes that are definitely labeled hit material. Make no mistake of it—this lass is gonna spread her wings in no time at all and prove to be one of the biggest juke box money-makers ever.

Mindy's wailing of "One More Time" and "Twelve O'Clock And All Is Well" has that taint of grandeur that goes toward making hit tunes. The top deck, a slowly paced romantic ditty, is the type of tune that lingers long after the first earful. Mindy's soothing and relaxing vocal effort on this side is really something to marvel at. Vocal chorus in the background adds to the winning incentive of the platter immensely. The flip keeps in the same tempo, and has Mindy warbling in wonderful vocal manner throughout. "Twelve O'Clock And All Is Well" is another tune that should prove to be a top song in the very near future. Novel musical and vocal arrangement displayed here adds more emphasis on the beauty of the deck. Both sides of this cookie are a blue ribbon winner for music operators—grab 'em by the boxful!

"Bopscotch" (2:38)

SERGE CHALOFF and THE HERDSMEN
(Futurama 3003)

● Pair of light, polite bop sides by Serge Chaloff and The Herdsmen really come off here with a wonderful sound. This platter by the Woody Herman boys should definitely win wide favor with the many bop enthusiasts. Top deck is the better of the pair. It's smooth stuff—the kind that makes for easy listening. The flip picks up in tempo a bit, and has the gang going thru their paces in top notch manner. "Bopscotch" should win a spot on phono ops machines.

"Paris Wakes Up And Smiles" (2:51)

"Dites-Moi" (2:56)

JEAN SABLON
(RCA Victor 20-3473)

● Pair of tunes from the "Miss Liberty" click, with Jean Sablon turning up with "Paris Wakes Up And Smiles" and "Dites-Moi." While both songs, as offered here, won't fill the needs of most locations, the platter can be used effectively in those sedate wired music locations that go for this brand. The songs are rendered in softly flowing French expressions that should satisfy those who appreciate this type of music. Ops who have the spots should listen in.

"It's A Great Feeling" (2:30)

"At The Cafe Rendezvous" (2:50)

DORIS DAY
(Columbia 38517)

● Thrush Doris Day steps out with another fresh bit of wax that really glitters. Titled "It's A Great Feeling," Doris delivers her vocal spot on this biscuit in top notch musical manner. Ditty is a lively, happy item, and has the vocal work of the Mellowmen joining in the background. The tonsiling of Doris on this side is sure to excite juke box fans throughout the land, and result in top phono play for the platter. The flip has Doris in versatile manner as she injects a bit of French accent into "At The Cafe Rendezvous." It's the top deck that'll score—ops should get it.

"Take Love Easy" (3:00)

"I Could Get A Man" (2:55)

DUKE ELLINGTON ORCH.
(Columbia 38519)

● Pair of fair enough sides turn up here by maestro Duke Ellington, with thrush Dolores Parker handling the vocals. Titled, "Take Love Easy" and "I Could Get A Man," Dolores displays her vocal allure on this duo in effective styling. Both sides whirl in medium slow tempo, with the Ellington ork blending smoothly. It's smooth stuff that might catch on—music ops might take a look-see in this direction.

"Rue De Romance" (3:10)

"Love Is A Beautiful Thing" (2:20)

FRANKIE CARLE ORCH.
(Columbia 38518)

● The smooth offerings of orkster Frankie Carle, and the set up of "Rue De Romance" and "Love Is A Beautiful Thing" turn up here for music ops to take a peek at. Top deck, with thrush Marjorie Hughes to wail the comely lyrics is a lightly fashioned ballad that should win its fair share of favor with music fans. Vocal work and the instrumental blend is effective throughout. The flip, done up in corn tempo, has the Sunrise Serenaders rendering a cute novelty bit weaving about the title. Top deck is the side to ride with.

"Let's Take An Old Fashioned Walk" (2:49)

"Paris Wakes Up And Smiles" (2:51)

MARGARET WHITING
(Capitol 57-666)

● The wonderful warbling of thrush Margaret Whiting is displayed in all its splendor on this coupling from the Irving Berlin "Miss Liberty" winner. It's top deck that we really go for. Maggie's wailing of "Let's Take An Old Fashioned Walk," with a vocal group chanting in the background, is top notch material from start to finish. It's a bright, gay bit of music that makes for wonderful listening. On the other end with "Paris Wakes Up And Smiles," Maggie delivers a very dramatic vocal spot on this tender, heartwarming melody about Paris. "Old Fashioned Walk" is a cinch to ring the bell!

"That Wonderful Girl Of Mine"
(3:04)

"Auf Wiederseh'n" (2:51)

JOHN LAURENZ
(Mercury 5303)

● The vocal splendor of piper John Laurenz is displayed in rich tones that satisfy on this coupling tagged "That Wonderful Girl Of Mine" and "Auf Wiederseh'n." Top deck, an adaptation from an old Yiddish melody, has been widely recorded and should be fairly familiar to music ops. This rendition should definitely increase the popularity of the tune. The flip, with adequate wordage weaving about the title, is a slow melancholy bit of music that should win its fair share of phono play. Wax won't stop traffic—it will hold its own though.

JO STAFFORD
(Capitol 57-665)

● More great wax from the hit "Miss Liberty" musical production, with chirp Jo Stafford offering "Homework" and "I Love You." Both tunes are definitely among the best the show has to offer, and should be among the most played in no time at all. Jo's rendition of "Homework," a terrific ballad loaded with a ton of smart lyrics is top notch throughout. It's the type of tune you wanna listen to time and again. On the flip with "I Love You," the Starlighters back Jo, as she purrs the lilting refrain to this comely ballad. Ditty is a winner—especially so for the romance kiddies. Ops can't miss with this disk.

"The Golden Sands Of Hawaii" (2:51)

"Roly-O-Rolling Out On The Roly Coaster" (2:45)

RUSS CARLYLE ORCH.
(Coral 60081)

● Some wax music ops can use to excellent advantage is this duo by orkster Russ Carlyle. Titled "The Golden Sands Of Hawaii" and "Roly-O-Rolling Out On The Roly Coaster," Russ and his boys come up with some effective wax for the phonos. Top deck has the maestro and the Mello-larks wailing an ode to Hawaii in moderate tones that satisfy. The flip is a zany up tempo novelty tune, with Russ and a vocal ensemble handling the lyrics. Wax should make top notch filler material.

"While You Are Gone" (3:08)

"Tonight I Shall Sleep" (3:20)

SARAH VAUGHAN
(Columbia 38512)

● The great Sarah Vaughan, one of the nation's foremost song stylists, comes up with a pair here that should find a top spot on music ops machines from Maine to California. The gal's tremendous vocal range is easily demonstrated on these sides in beautiful, clear vocal strains that make for wonderful listening pleasure. Top deck is a deeply fetching item that makes you stop and listen. Sarah's wonderful dramatic ability is brought to light all the more on this platter. The flip keeps in the same mood and tempo, and has the lass turning in another brilliant vocal performance. Orchestral accompaniment on the pair by maestro Joe Lipman rounds out the biscuit in top manner. Ops should climb on the bandwagon with this one.

TONY MARTIN

● Long missing from the phono spotlight as a name attraction, baladeer Tony Martin notches this featured spot this week via a pair of tunes that are definitely loaded with coin culling potential. Wax, titled "Circus" and "No, No And No" has that familiar strong, dra-

matic vocal effort so closely associated with Tony Martin. It's the top deck that should step out and go. Ditty is a deeply moving romantic item, with Tony warbling the comely lyrics in deep, resounding tones that echo brilliantly. Wonderful background music on the side makes you stop and take notice. It's a plush lined ballad—the kind that grow in popularity with each listening. On the other end with "No, No And No," Tony comes up with another excellent recording in this bit of music. Wax is tainted with a gypsy musical air, and has Tony rendering the captivating wordage in meaningful tones that score. Both sides of this biscuit make for excellent listening pleasure—with the edge going to the top deck, "Circus." Ops should climb on the bandwagon.

The flip has Snooky coming back again, with Elmo Tanner joining him for a whistle spot on this quaint bit of music. Wax isn't too much to shout about. Ops who have the room on their machines might take a leek-see.

● Pair of fair sides music ops can take a peek at are these rendered by the Frankie Mullec ork, with "Tell Me A Story" and "Pyramid Polka" seeping thru the wax. Top deck is a slowly paced waltz, with a vocal chorus handling the lyrics effectively. The flip is just what the title indicates—a happy polka item which should satisfy the many polka fans throughout the nation. Both sides are there for the asking—music ops can take it from here.

Vocal refrain by Billy Leech and Nancy Evans respectively is effective throughout. Music ops who have a call for this brand might listen in.

The tune is loaded with the stuff that makes for laughs and merriment and should win wide favor. The flip, "The Telephone No Ring" is another novelty bit that should win its fair share of approval. We're betting our money on the top deck!

● Thrush Terry Lee on deck with a great pair of sides, in this disk-ing of "After My Laughter Came Tears," and "I'm Crazy 'Bout That Guy." The gal's lilting jazz intonation in the platter makes for wonderful listening pleasure throughout. Top deck is a mellow medium up tempo ditty, with Terry purring the top notch lyrics in tones that score. The flip slows down somewhat in tempo, and has the canary warbling lyrics that bounce around the title. It's a boffo biscuit that should go like wildfire. Ops should get this disk!

● More wax from the "Miss Liberty" click with thrush Peggy Lee serving up "You Can Have Him." Peggy picks up the tempo on this bright ballad, and with the Dave Barbour ork backing, turns it into a mellow hunk of shellac. The gal's pipes pitch pretty throughout. The flip, from the Warner Bros. flicker "It's A Great Feeling" is a slowly etched piece, that makes you stop and listen. Tender, romantic lyrics with a taint of French about them add to the pleasure of the platter. Take note of some great guitar work by Maestro Barbour on the side. We go for the top deck.

INDIE DISKERY IN MONEY BACK GUARANTEE TO MUSIC OPERATORS

ST. LOUIS, MO.—Said to be the first time any phonograph record has been backed by a money back guarantee, Premier Records, a division of Premier Radio Enterprises, Inc. of Saint Louis, has placed its new disking by Charlie Ackerson of "I Had My Heart Set On You" to playing on more than 800 juke boxes in and around St. Louis in such a manner that anyone who plays Premier's recording of "I Had My Heart Set On You" and fails to like it may get his nickel back.

Premier Records, through its distributor, Robert's Record Distributing Company, of St. Louis and Kansas City, has furnished to all music machine operators a small sign for pasting on the juke box glass that reads: "Money Back Guaranteed! Play—and listen carefully to—my new Premier Record, "I Had My Heart Set On You," then if for any reason you don't like "I Had My Heart Set On You" write me at Premier Records, tell me why you don't like it, and I'll send your nickel back at once—Charlie Ackerson."

Music route operators have reported that the gimmick has resulted in an unusually great number of plays for "I Had My Heart Set On You" as well as having stimulated interest in all other numbers on the machine. Charlie Ackerson, through Premier and his personal manager, T. P. Desloge, has reported that no one has asked for his nickel back, and that the promotion will be extended throughout the nation for the entire Premier line after its test in the mid-west area.

Three Speed Disk Biz Continues To Caution Record Distributors In Buying

NEW YORK—Record distributors throughout the nation continued their current practice of "wait and see" with regard to business conditions facing the entire phonograph recording industry.

With a majority of the industry's top executives agreeing that the current situation has to be remedied, and that the industry is at present facing one of the most crucial times in its history, record distributors who represent the buying power of the disk biz, generally agreed that the present three-speed system of record operation has caused by far the largest harm in the sales of phonograph recordings.

This is further brought out by reports from radio and radio-phono-TV manufacturers whose sales in recent months have dropped substantially, with this industry also pointing to the three-speed platter system as one of the causes.

Meanwhile, Columbia and RCA Victor Records issued reports this past week on the progress of their respective phonograph playing systems and records. Paul E. Southard, vice-president in charge of merchandising of Columbia Records, made his report in connection with the first anniversary of the introduction of the 33-1/3 LP recording.

Mr. Southard's report was made in connection with the first anniversary of the introduction of the revolutionary LP record. The LP record was first presented to distributors at the Columbia convention in Atlantic City on June 21, 1948.

"In the brief year that the LP records have been available to the public, between 750,000 and 1,000,000 families have secured equipment to play them." Mr. Southard pointed out. "This same group has purchased more than 3,500,000 LP records—the equivalent of 17,500,000 conventional records. This sales record exceeded our most optimistic expectations."

Mr. Southard's report also showed that the volume of LP record sales has increased consistently every month since October, 1948, when complete distribution facilities for the records and reproducing equipment were made available. May, 1949, was the biggest LP month to date. Some dealers state that Columbia's LP represents as much as 50% of their total record volume.

Spokesmen for RCA Victor records also disclosed that sales of their 45 rpm phonograph recordings and player had met with widespread favor. The subject of the plater's forthcoming 45 rpm plans was also one of the main topics of discussion at the recent nationwide field-force meeting conducted by RCA Victor this past week in Philadelphia, Pa.

Withstanding all reports of the reception of 33-1/3 and 45 rpm recordings, the fact remains that the bulk of the industry, sales executives, distributors, dealers and operators, all mutually agree that having a three-speed system in the business is a most "unhealthy condition."

Henry Okun To Handle Record Exploitation For Cavallaro Ork

NEW YORK—Henry Okun, nationally known publicist, this past week took on the record exploitation and promotion of the Carmen Cavallaro orchestra, top-notch Decca recording stars.

Okun is set to immediately institute a nation-wide promotion campaign among disk jockeys, juke box operators and dealers. Scheduled for immediate hypo are Cavallaro's latest Decca recordings "Twenty-Four Hours Of Sunshine" and "There's Yes! Yes! In Your Eyes."

Okun was primarily responsible for the tremendous publicity and promotion campaign on such hits as "Four Leaf Clover" "Underneath The Linden Tree" and "Whose Girl Are You." He has handled such accounts as Art Mooney, Claude Thornhill, Bill Darnel and others in recent months.

N. Y. C. Occupational Tax Due July 15

NEW YORK—Operators in the City of New York have been notified by Spencer C. Young, treasurer, that the last day for payment of tax pursuant to the Occupancy Tax law falls due on July 15.

The Treasurer pointed out that the tax applies to all occupants of rented premises used for a gainful purpose for one month or more prior to July 19, 1949 (this takes in equipment on each location). It is pointed out that penalties which the law prescribes for late payment is five times the amount of tax, plus interest of five percent per month.

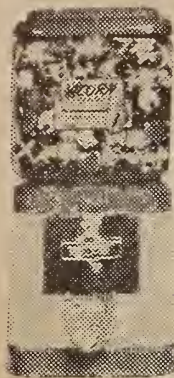

According to a story released by the Field Research Division, Paper Cup and Container Institute, Macy's department store has close to 100 vendors of various types continually serving their customers throuth the store and their employees in recreation rooms and lounges. Most of the machines are located for use by Macy's 10,000 employees, with profits going to the Macy's Men's Club and the employees' service organization. Nine drink machines are leased by Macy's Men's Club. Six machines vend cokes, two are "three drink" vendors, and one is a hot chocolate machine. In addition, this club has equipment selling popcorn, cigarettes, candy, cookies, and milk. Recently three additional machines were added, vending ice cream in cups. The employee's service organization maintains no drink machines, but runs candy, cookie, cigarette and popcorn machines. The drink machines maintained for the store's customers are operated as part of the grocery department. These machines vend coca cola, lime, cherry and a Macy special "Sparkoffe." The latter is a cold coffee drink at 10 cents per cup. Of great interest to the trade is the scientific manner in which these machines are spotted. One of the best locations is where the equipment is close to the toy department, where children are always asking for a drink. The music department also proves lucrative.

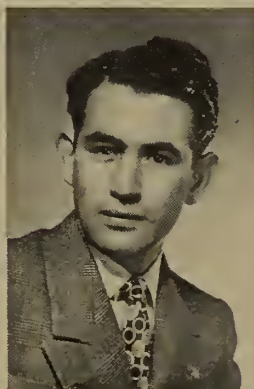

METHOD: The C.M.I. Blue Book should be read as follows: First price listed is lowest price for the week: Second price listed is highest price. Where only one price appears this should be considered lowest price.
