

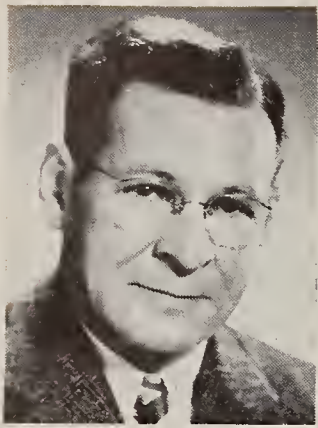

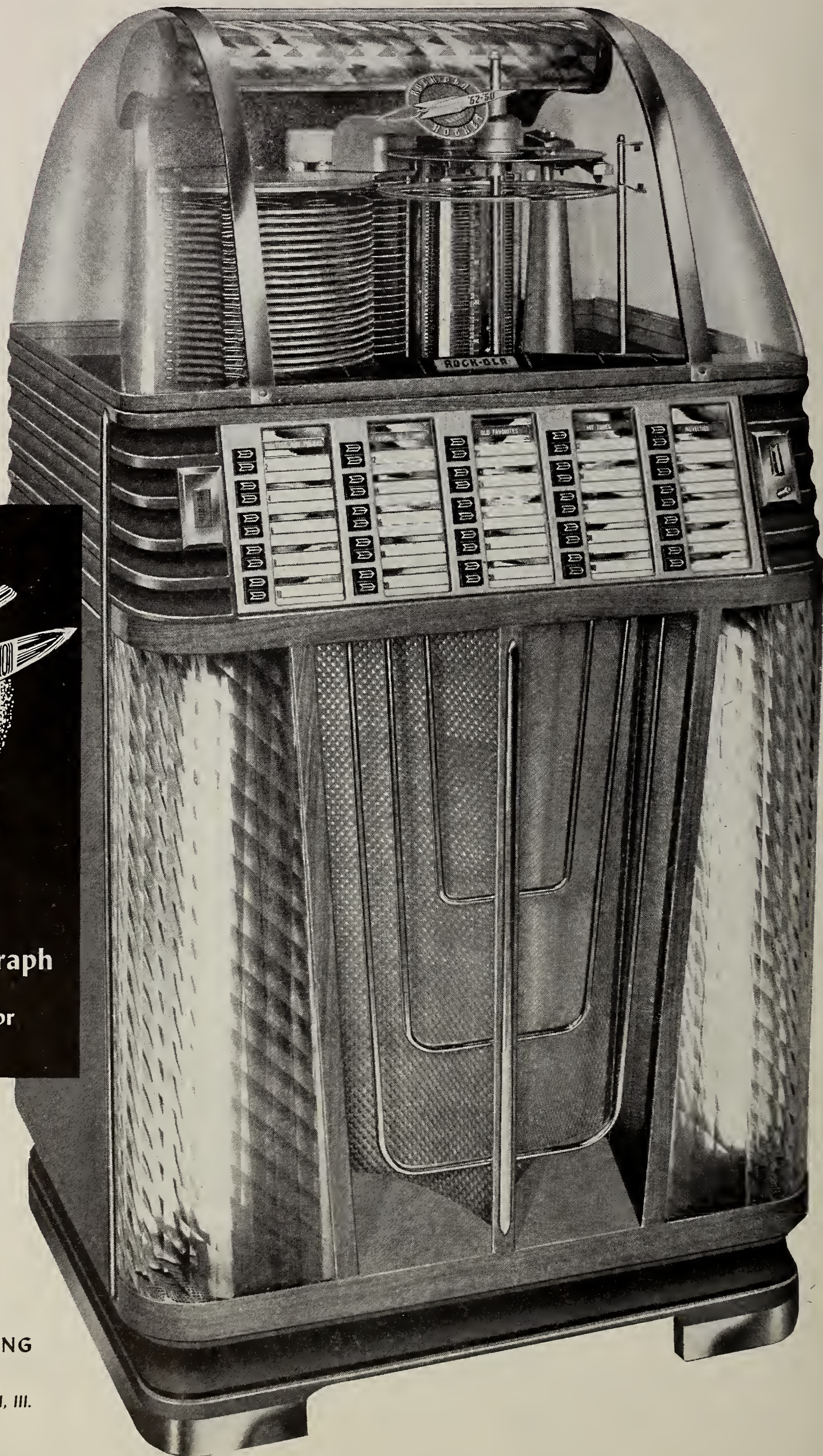

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LAZY, LAZY, LAZY OPERATORS

Perhaps one of the most depressing facts in the industry today is not only lack of direct and personal contact between operators and their location owners, as well as more constant personal contact between distributors and their operator-customers, and even between manufacturers and many of their distributors, but, most important of all, the fact that good old time promotion methods seem to have disappeared to the complete loss of much play on the part of lazy, lazy operators.

In the old days, the placement of a brand new machine on any location, was something that warranted a complete turnout on the part of the operator's organization as well as a complete greeting, of a kind not since seen, on the part of the location owner and his customers.

Many times a new machine wasn't set up for play until evening, when "the big crowd" was in the place and, usually, on an evening when the crowd was sure to be in the spot.

This boomed play, in many instances, for products that didn't even deserve the big play they got from the players.

Today, for some reason or other, the operators send their men over to practically sneak the new machine into the spot. Why? Not one of the old timers

can answer. Except to state that the boys seem to have become lax and lazy, and have come to believe that all that is required to get big play action is to plug the cord of the machine into the electrical outlet and . . . that's that.

That isn't that. Not by a long, long mile.

Today, just as in the past, the operator must get out into each and every location, especially when he is placing a new machine in the spot, and start the good old time ballyhoo and promotion going. Get the players interested in the new game. And get the new machine the kind of first flush action it requires to prove itself.

From then on it's up to the machine itself. If it has what it takes to keep the players interested, and hold their undivided attention hour after hour, the operator can forget all about "the earning possibilities" of this new machine. If it hasn't those great and necessary qualities—he'll learn soon enough, and can throw the machine in the lake.

But, he's got to help that new machine get a good head start. He's got to promote it and its play appeal. He's got to get into the spot, even if it's a five chair off-the-arm lunch wagon. He's got to start the play going by keen promotional exploitation. Then the machine's got a chance to go places and

earn him more than it would ordinarily ever earn for him.

He just can't bring it in and say, "That's that". Nor can he just tell the location owner all about it and then forget the machine. He's just simply got to get in there with the new machine, especially if he's getting dime play started in the spot, and promote up to the limit of his ability. Promote so hard that every customer that walks into the spot will at least "try" the machine.

There's the one big thing that's again needed, and needed badly, in the industry today. Good old time promotion. The kind of circus ballyhoo that got attention to coin operated equipment and then, if the machine was right, earned plenty of moolah for the operator.

The day of "just plugging in" is all over. The days of promotion are here again. Good, old-time, promotion. The kind of medicine doctor promotion that made "Hadacol" a big name in the patent medicine world. The kind of exploitation that actually built this business into a big time industry.

This is the time—right now—for the nation's operators to wake up and become medicine men all over again—"promote" their new machines—not just "place" them on location.

MULTIPLE PLAY AND DIME PLAY GAMES OPEN NEW ERA

End of Nickel Play Era in Sight as Ops Swing Over to Multiple and Dime Play Games.

Those now in the field are privileged to watch an era of many, many long years, gradually fading.

This is the era, which began about 1933-34, when nickel play pinball games became the vogue replacing the penny play games, and has lasted right up to this very day.

But, on demand of the trade itself, manufacturers, still carefully conservative and cautious about completely eliminating nickel play, have started multiple-nickel play games into the market.

And since then, this past month or so, after a few past faded and daring attempts, straight dime play pinball has come into being.

Operators in some scattered parts of the nation have adopted 10c play and have been featuring it right along. But, these men were forced to change the nickel chutes on the games.

Now, the factories themselves have, at long last, entered into the spirit of the new era and have started to place dime coin chutes on the games. In short, the operator now receives his games with 10c chutes directly from the factory.

An old era of long standing is fast fading away. The era of the nickel play pinball games. The days when an operator paid \$37.50, \$39.50, \$59.50, \$79.50 and up to \$99.50 for a game. The price then was still okay for nickel play.

But, as inflation continued its insidious boring into all the nation's industries, and as parts, labor, and materials rose in price accordingly, manufacturers were forced to raise the prices of completed new games. The result was that the operators found themselves between the devil and the deep blue sea.

Unless, they said, all in the territory agreed, they couldn't see how they, individually, just one operator alone here and there, could change to dime chutes, tho they most sincerely wanted to do so.

This is one of the travesties on business justice which are encountered in this, and other, industries. The fact remains that the intelligent ops realized the others were hanging themselves slowly and surely and would soon die a business death. But, they just couldn't do anything about it. At least, so they said.

A few daring souls ventured forth and

started out with dime play. It worked here and there. A scattered and feeble attempt at first. But, it grew. The public was agreeable. It accepted dime play. Just as it accepted the fact that it was now forced to pay a dime for "Coke" in many spots, and for coffee, and much more for everything else.

Those who loved to relax with coin operated entertainment saw no great ill in paying a dime per play. The shuffleboards and then the shuffle games and now, at long last, the pinball games, have also taken advantage of the public's acceptance of this new era in coin operated entertainment—dime play.

The manufacturers eased into the situation rather gracefully. They first came out with multiple play nickel games. These clicked. Ops could obtain anywhere from three to six nickels per game. The public were willing to invest that much if the games entertained them sufficiently to warrant the expenditure.

In short, the old standby of the field, the oldest adage in this business: "If the game's good you can charge your own price—if it's bad dump it right then and there".

A good game always gets plays, whether it's nickel or dime. A bad game gets no play, even if the operator offered 5 plays for 1c.

So, with better and ever better games coming to the market, the games have now started out with straight dime play. That starts the new era for the games field. Just as this new era has gradually taken over in the automatic music field.

Operators prefer the multiple games and the straight ten cent play machines. They have every reason to prefer them. The public likes them.

Just as those who were in the industry in 1933 saw the penny game fade out of the picture and the nickel pin game come into being, the coinmen of today are seeing the nickel pinball gradually fading out of the picture, and watching the new era of dime play arrive.

It was a gradual changeover. It took many, many months. Even a few years might be used to describe the changeover from nickel to dime play. But dime play has, it now seems, arrived.

It is slowly taking hold. It is bound to become ever stronger as the days and weeks go by. It will completely take over, as did

the nickel play games in 1934, sometime during 1952. It will, after that, be a surprise to find a game that is on straight nickel play, just as it was in 1937 and 1938, to find a penny play pin game still operating somewhere in the hinterland.

That's how new eras get started. This new era, just as the last one, was forced upon the operators by economics. The nation had passed into an inflationary period. Or, if some experts are to be believed, into a period of "higher worth". Therefore, higher prices were necessary to offset higher costs. And everything continues to go higher and higher.

One of these days the economy will settle down. It will never again be the "old days" of pennies and nickels. This will settle down to the days when a dime's a dime, and worth a dime.

Again *The Cash Box* modestly prides itself on another prediction come true.

It was back in 1943 when this publication first urged the industry to switch to dime play.

At that time this magazine pointed out that with costs rising, due to war, and with the further fact that these higher costs would remain statically in effect even after the war, the operators could, while the free spending war era was on, easily switch to dime play.

Some listened and tried. But, many were still stubbornly against the plain.

Yet, the years which have since come about, gradually bore out the truth of this prediction.

Now, over eight years later, the prediction has come true. It has become fact, because of economic necessity.

Those who are engaged in this industry, this year of 1951, are seeing a new era born. The era of dime play. It will prove of tremendous value to all concerned with the field.

Because it is economically sound, it means that all will profit thereby.

The operators by earning more will mean more sales. The manufacturers by selling more will mean greater progress.

This new era, therefore, portends to be one of greater progress, and of sounder financial worth, to all concerned with this industry.

"THE HUNKIE MAN" (2:18)
 "THE GREEN GRASS GROWS ALL AROUND" (3:01)
 SUGAR CHILE ROBINSON
 (Capitol 1719; F-1719)

● The talented Sugar Chile Robinson comes up with a pair of fair sides. The top deck is a driving thing that gets a vocal and piano working over from Sugar. The under side is a jazzed up version of a cute, old folk type tune. The artist might prove to be a novel attraction in the boxes.

"DARDANELLA" (2:39)
 "WHY DO I ALWAYS REMEMBER?" (2:46)
 AL MORGAN
 (London 991)

● Al Morgan offers his version of an oldie on the top end. It's a bouncier item that gets a nice vocal from Al. Flip is a slow number in the ballad vein, in which Al's voice is dubbed over twice. The orchestra backs both sides appropriately. Either half can draw the nickels.

"CHICAGO BLUES" (2:45)
 "SERENADE" (2:51)
 BILL SNYDER
 (London 1080)

● The upper lid is a self composed tribute to Chicago done by Bill Snyder. Bill offers some fine piano playing while leading the orchestra in a better than average instrumental. The under level is a soft, slow number that comes out very listenable. Ops should take a look at this disk.

"LITTLE PEPITA SAMBA" (2:43)
 "THE FESTIVAL OF BRITAIN" (2:54)
 EDMUNDO ROS ORCHESTRA
 (London 1039)

● Edmundo Ros and his orchestra again deliver another one of those Latin American numbers on the first side. An average vocal and a lively samba beat carry this ditty through. The lower deck is a fast thing that is done in the Calypso vein. The vocal group and orchestra are shown to greater advantage here. Ops oughta take a gander.

"SAXOPHONE MAMBO" (2:47)
 "TAKE A LETTER, MISS SMITH" (3:00)
 TED HEATH ORCHESTRA
 (London 1014)

● A slow mambo beat is dished out by the Ted Heath orchestra on the first side. Some fine sax solo work marks this number as a good instrumental. The second half is one of those talk-sing vocals and features Lita Roza and Jack Parnell. It's a cute novelty that might be a contender. Ops should watch both ends.

"ELEVEN MORE MONTHS AND TEN MORE DAYS" (2:56)
 "AULD SCOTCH MITHER MINE" (2:49)
 BILLY COTTON ORCHESTRA
 (London 1034)

● The Billy Cotton orchestra along with Alan Breeze and the Johnson Brothers play around with a bouncier novelty item. It has some clever lyrics and a cute presentation to make it a pleasureable ditty. Doreen Stephens delivers the back side which is a slow sentimental thing. Ops might look in.

DISK OF THE WEEK

"LONGING FOR YOU" (2:40)

"THE SON OF A SAILOR" (2:43)

VIC DAMONE
 (Mercury 5655; 5655 x 45)

● Vic Damone has another hit on his hands as a follow up to his recent success "My Truly, Truly Fair." This likely ditty is a waltz number that has an infectious melody and some catchy lyrics. Vic dishes this tune out in a wonderful manner and makes it sound good right through. George Bassman supplies a musical backdrop that makes this side even more appealing. The lower end is a cute, bouncy thing that gets a cheerful vocal by Vic and a fine backing from the orchestra and choral group. Either end can go, but the side that should break first is the upper half. Ops won't be longing for nickels if they get with this Damone disk fast.

"LONGING FOR YOU" (2:53)

"JAZZ ME BLUES" (3:10)

TERESA BREWER
 (London 1086)

● Here is a tune that seems tailor made for Teresa Brewer. Labeled "Longing For You" this top deck is a lovely waltz number that can't miss. Teresa pipes the lyrics in a meaningful and appealing manner. Jack Pleis and his orchestra, with the assistance of a choral group, sets the musical backing in very fine fashion. The combined effect is one to make ops take notice and stock up fast. Flip is a jump tune with a bit of a dixieland beat that should have every one hoppin'. Teresa gives this side a good going over with the help of the All Stars. The side we're stuck on is that top lid.

"FALLING IN LOVE WITH LOVE" (2:56)

"LOVER COME BACK TO ME" (2:53)

STANLEY BLACK ORCHESTRA
 (London 1021)

● A pair of beautiful oldies are turned out by the orchestra under the able baton of Stanley Black. Both ends are slow tunes that are presented by the boys in a very appealing manner. Fine orchestrations make this disk even more desirable. Ops have strong filler items here.

"ASK ME" (2:18)

"LONESOME AND SORRY" (2:47)

DORIS DAY
 (Columbia 39490; 4-39490)

● Looks like Doris Day has come up with a successful follow up to "Shanghai" on this top lid. It's a lively ditty with a cute tune and vocal to match. Doris is backed solidly by Paul Weston and his crew and the Lee Brothers. Flip is a pleasant, slow ballad that is handled in an equally fine style. Ops should get with it fast.

"TOM'S TUNE" (2:49)
 "PRETTY POLLY POLKA" (2:54)
 ETHEL SMITH
 (Decca 27649; 9-27649)

● Top deck is a jumpy tune that has already created a fuss. With Ethel Smith at the organ, this end offers good listening. The lower lid also features Ethel and her organ with a cute sounding polka that has a nice bounce throughout. Ops know what this stylist can do for a tune.

"THE CHOO CHOO SAMBA" (2:53)
 "JEZEBEL" (2:49)
 WINIFRED ATWELL
 (London 1060)

● Some wonderful piano playing is dished out by Winifred Atwell on his latest waxing. Both ends are fast moving numbers that get vigorous and lively treatments by Winifred. The piano interpretations help make this disk a listenable one. Ops can have their choice with either half.

"COME ON-A MY HOUSE" (2:28)
 "OH, BEAUTY" (3:09)
 WILLIAM SAROYAN &
 ROSS BAGDASARIAN
 (Coral 60544; 9-60544)

● William Saroyan and Ross Bagdasarian, composers of this ditty that's taking the nation by storm, offer their own interpretation of this Armenian tune. Done in a folkish manner, this side has lots of appeal. Flip is an Arabic number that has wonderful lyrics. Ops oughta watch both sides.

"PUSH 'EM AWAY" (2:45)
 "I LOVE THE SUNSHINE OF YOUR SMILE" (2:26)
 JERRY GRAY ORCHESTRA
 (Decca 27695; 9-27695)

● Jerry Gray and his orchestra come up with two similar sides. The first half is a novel type number that gets a fair vocal from Tony Gray and a strong orchestrational backdrop from Jerry. The second end is delightful thing done in a martial vein with lyrics handled adequately by Tommy Traynor. We like the lower lid.

"THE MARCH OF THE SIAMESE CHILDREN" (2:58)
 "FIDDLE DERBY" (2:05)
 PERCY FAITH ORCHESTRA
 (Columbia 39491; 4-39491)

● Here are two sides of instrumentals as served up by the Percy Faith orchestra. The upper half is a beautiful sounding tune, but may lack commercial appeal. distributors, manufacturers and suppliers to display at the show.

The Cash Box will have a booth at this show and will, at the same time, have many of its representatives present.

NPA Gives Repairmen Special Rating (DO-RE) For Parts & Materials

WASHINGTON — The National Production Authority has granted repairmen a special rating so that they may obtain materials and parts.

This order goes into effect as of July 6, 1951.

The intent of the rating, according to the NPA, is to allow persons in the business of making repairs to obtain the controlled parts and materials.

The allotment symbol "RE" must be used by repairmen in obtaining controlled materials.

The rating "DO-RE" must be used by repairmen in obtaining products and materials other than controlled materials.

The order restricts repairmen as follows:

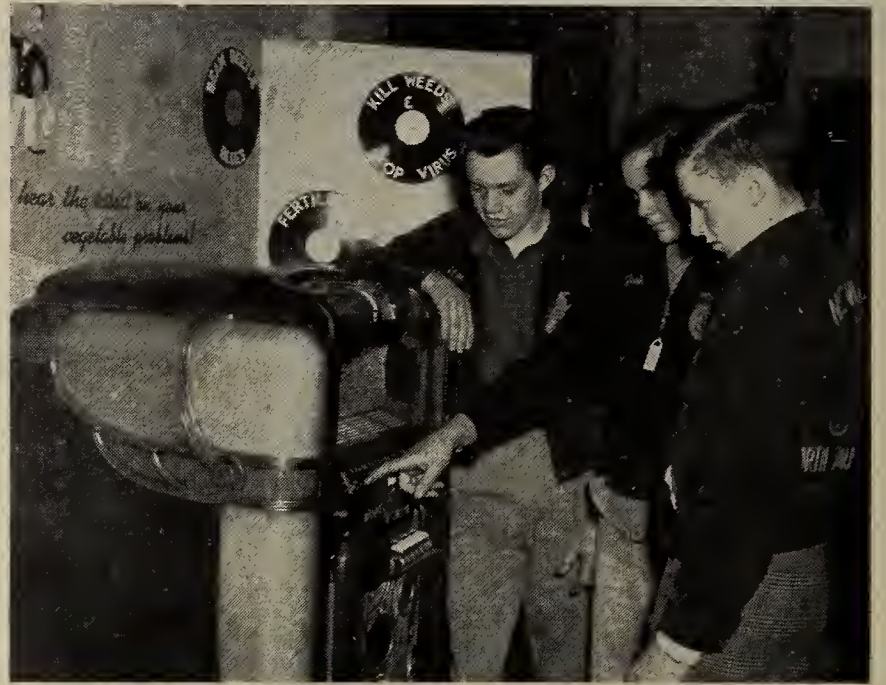
1) Use of repair parts and materials obtained by use of the RE symbol of DO-RE rating to repair and maintenance work only.

2) Use of RE symbol to obtain controlled materials in excess of 20 tons of steel, 500 pounds of copper, and 500 pounds of aluminum products or materials.

3) Use of RE symbol to obtain copper wire mill products to \$150 worth or to 20 percent of what was used during 1950, whichever is greater.

The order prohibits the use of the DO-RE symbol rating on orders for materials for persons for whom the work is to be done can obtain the materials under the CMP Reg. 5 (MRO Regulation).

Juke Box To Replace College Professors?



ITHACA, N. Y.—The juke box has been used for many purposes in the entertainment world, but leave it to the college professors to think up a new twist.

Pictured above we see three North Syracuse Central High School boys punching a selection button on a juke box to learn a few farm tips. This Wurlitzer model 800 was programmed with records prepared by the New York State College of Agriculture at Cornell University. The occasion was Farm and Home Week at Cornell where the Future Farmers of America gathered to learn how to combat insect pests and diseases which are injurious to vegetable crops.

The juke box played special record-

ings combining music with high school age appeal and a crop or garden lesson from an agriculture leader.

H. J. Carew, associate professor of the department, explained "We told them for years to come to us and be educated. They stayed away. Last year we put in potato chips and they ate it up. They came back today looking for them and got a lesson from a juke box.

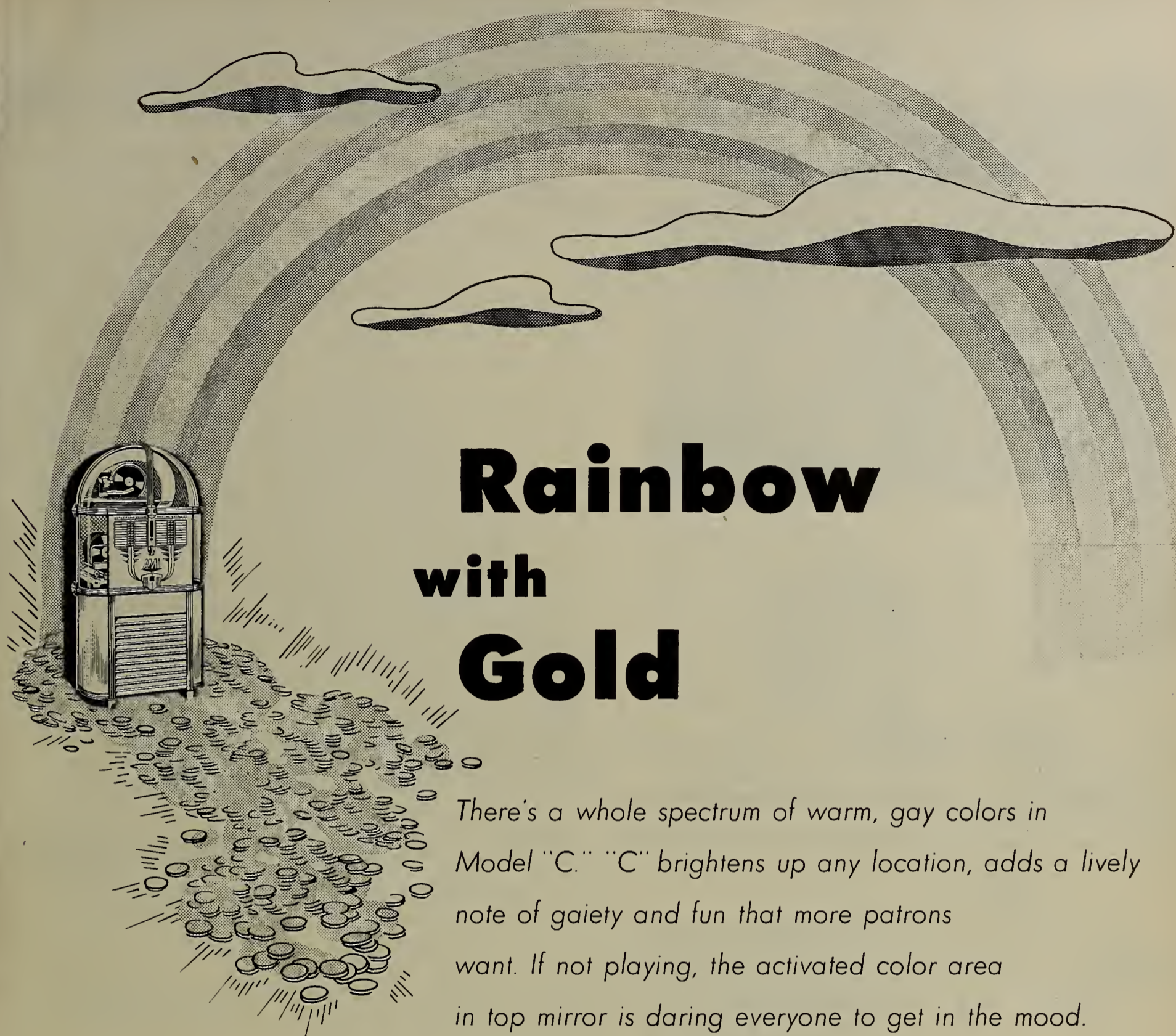

**Employment Keeps Growing With
Full Impact Still To Be Felt**

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The impact of defense production upon labor supply has been increasing steadily, the Bureau of Employment Security reports.

The volume of job orders placed with the public employment service by defense and employers in essential industries has grown month by month. This department predicts that the full impact of defense production manpower requirements is still to come.

For nine straight months the local employment offices have placed more workers in non-agricultural jobs than in the corresponding months of the previous year. During the first 5 months of this year job placements in manufacturing and other non-agricultural employment totaled 2,600,000, an increase of 742,000 over the first 5 months of 1950.

With all the placements, large num-

bers of openings are still available, according to the Labor Department. Various types of skills are needed in Connecticut, New York, New Jersey, Ohio, Kansas, Maryland, California, Washington and the District of Columbia.

The number of women in the civilian labor force increased by 800,000 between May 1950 and May 1951, and a million more women were employed almost entirely in non-agricultural industries. The Labor Department states that some of these were drawn from the unemployed, but most had been nonworkers, probably coming from those who were keeping house.

With more people employed and with a great many more to be taken on by defense work in the months to come, locations featuring coin operated equipment will benefit greatly by offering music and amusement thru its economical equipment.
