THEN, ALL OF A SUDDEN...

We believe that the "right" record will sell if it's heard. We also believe that when "right" records are heard, radio ratings rise. Our history of hits prove that the time we take to blend talent and technique together produces many Cadence records that are "right." We had such a record several months back but, truthfully, it was a little sleepy. All it needed to make it popular and saleable was the ears of the public. Then the DJ's from KXGO (Fargo, N.D.) and WTRY (Troy, New York) awakened it one day. To make a long national story short... and strong... check the charts for Eddie Hodges' I'M GONNA KNOCK ON YOUR DOOR. It helps us prove that most Cadence releases have an ability to appeal to an audience and sell. All they usually need are ears. Maybe so many Cadence records "wake up" because of all the

sleepless hours that we put into producing quality... not quantity. Our present releases certainly look awake: Don Shirley's WATER BOY, The Chordettes' NEVER ON SUNDAY, The Everly Brothers' ALL I HAVE TO DO IS DREAM. (This one awakened after three years of resting on its million and a half 1958 sales to hit the charts again.) Two new singles that seem "right" are Johnny Tillotson's WITHOUT YOU and Don Carroll's SEVEN-UP AND ICE CREAM SODA. Whether you play records on the air... or sell them, chances are Cadence releases can mean more to you in audience appeal or saleability... because they mean more to us than a piece of plastic. They mean our reputation for quality hits. That's why we mean to stay awake to the tastes and demands of the American public... your public!

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THE CHANGING SINGLES PICTURE

Ever since the Rock and Roll era enveloped the record industry, the singles record picture has become an increasingly impossible phase of the business to analyze.

The productive "Left Field" out of which so many "surprise" hits develop has become a consistent competitor of the steady Right Field big names such as Elvis Presley, Connie Francis, Brook Benton, the Everly Brothers, Brenda Lee, Bobby Rydell, Bobby Darin, Fats Domino, the host of consistent country singers, the Platters, Paul Anka, Ricky Nelson, Frank Sinatra, Nat Cole, Jackie Wilson, the instrumental artists and many, many others.

Strong evidence of Left Field success is this week's Top 100 which sports 48 of the 100 numbers by artists who were virtually unknown by the public only a year ago at this time.

With the exception of those who have been clicking consistently during the past years, many artists riding the crest years ago are finding it difficult getting through to today's teenagers. However, many such artists are among today's best album sellers.

To a good portion of today's teen market, names are only important if the sound and beat goes along with the name. The singles

business has become a "Title" business. If one comes up with a new sound, a new gimmick or a different quality, he has a chance to become one of the hottest names and biggest money-makers at any given time.

Take today's Top Ten for example. With the exception of Chubby Checker, Connie Francis and Brenda Lee, names occupying the other seven of the top ten slots include: the Highwaymen, Bobby Lewis, the Markeys, Chris Kenner, Curtis Lee, Joe Dowell and U.S. Bonds. As far as the teenagers are concerned, all of these names are newcomers.

It is, of course, impossible to tell which of these seven, as well as which of the other thirty-eight newcomers on today's list will be around five years from today. But one thing is certain. More skill is required to run a singles department today than was the case in the past. The one A&R man set up at any larger label has just about disappeared.

No label can afford to rest on its laurels. It has all but become imperative to surround oneself with independent producers who are nurturing new writers, artists and arrangers with the hit sounds of tomorrow.



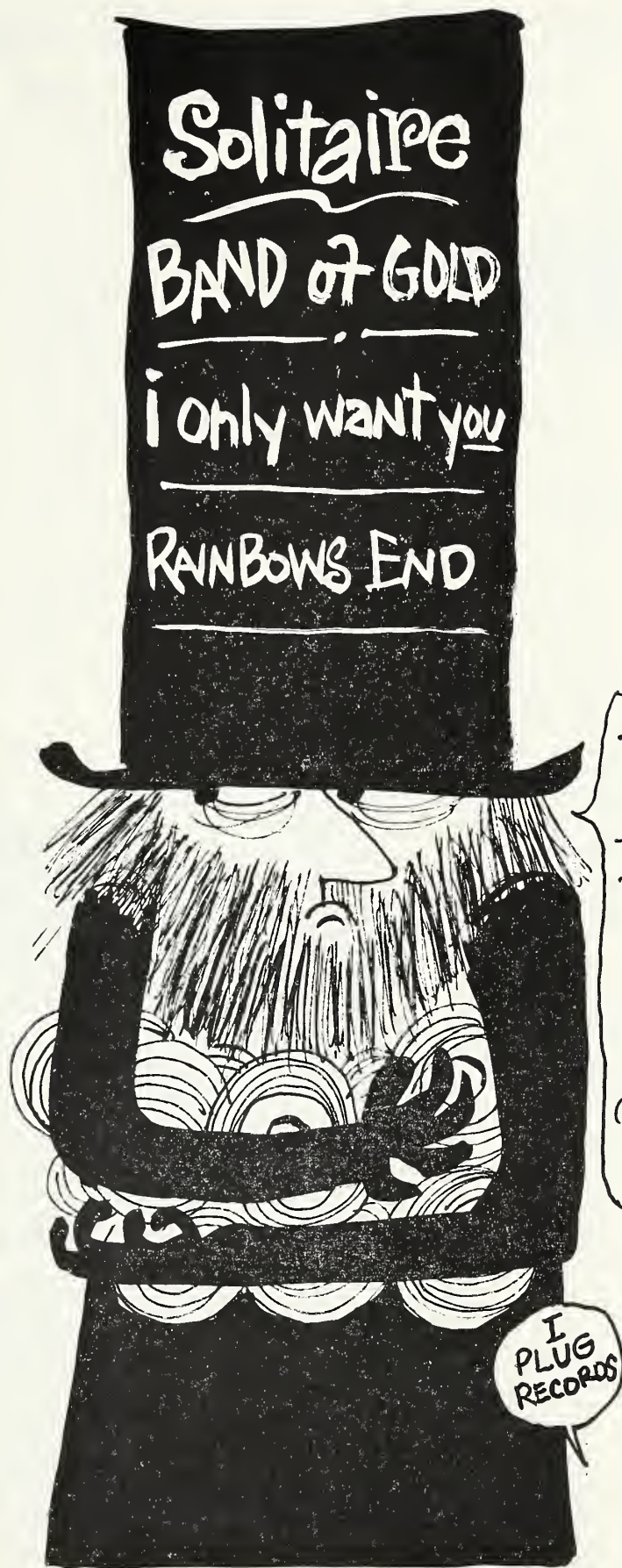

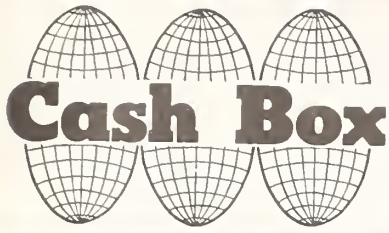

The 'Pres' is back on the wax scene with two more newcomers that can climb to the upper rungs of the hit ladder, side by side. Both the cha-cha-rockin' "Little Sister" and the "(Marie's Her Name) His Latest Flame" jump'er are loaded with sales dynamite. Elvis has a twin chart triumph here. Take your pick.

From Brook's new Mercury package, which includes his current smash, "The Boll Weevil Song," comes another great up-dated oldie, "Frankie And Johnny." It's a bright, shuffle-swing date that sports a sparkling Stan Applebaum musical showcase. Companion piece is a warm and pretty shuffle-ballad newcomer labeled "It's Just A House Without You."

Mr. Versatility follows his click up-dating of "Nature Boy" with something old and something new and both are tailor-made for the teen trade. The old-timer is "You Must Have Been A Beautiful Baby" that takes a funky-blues styled rock-a-cha-cha route. The newie, "Sorrow Tomorrow," is a driving, steady beat thumper that Bobby pounds out with multi-track finesse. Great choral and instrumental support on both ends.

Coupler is a tender affectionate.

Tune, tabbed "(Mama, Mama) Wish Me Good Luck," is a tender, sentimental beat-ballad romancer that the chirp delivers with loads of feeling. Also keep an eye on the lovely, soft beat-ballad "In Your Spare Time (Think Of Me)." It could be a big two-sider.

The "Peanut Butter" boys are back with another similarly-styled rock-a-cha novelty delighter that the teeners oughta latch onto real quick. It's an enticing description about all the problems caused by the gal wearin' a "Tight Sweater." Boys pull out all the stops on the sizzlin' rocker flipside. Wild instrumental backdrop. Can also break loose.

RAYMOND LEWIS (Instant 3233)
(B+) "MISS STICKS" (2:38)
[Tune-Kel BMI—Lewis, Neville] Contagious middle-beat R&B-styled novelty from the label currently hitting big with Kris Kenner's "I Like It Like That." Singer Lewis is backed by a fine keyboard-led combo-chorus chore.
(B) "MISS STICKS AGAIN"
(2:21) [Tune-Kel BMI—Lewis, Neville] Similar presentation of the same tune.

TEDDY ROSS (Dolton 46)
(B+) "WATER BOY" (3:02) [Cornerstone BMI—Arr. by Ross]
Ross does an impressive vocal on the folk tune, receiving an infectious combo sound that resembles Don Shirley's (Cadence) current Top 100 instrumental version of the number. Effective vocal counterpart to the Shirley success.
(B) "AIN'T THAT LOVE" (2:40)
[Progressive BMI—Charles] Happy blues picture for the famed Ray Charles' item.

DEBBIE DEAN (Motown 1014)
(B+) "BUT I'M AFRAID" (2:52)
[Jobete BMI—Stevenson]
Songstress could succeed with her fine teen stand on the catchy romantic. She receives a first-rate Latinish sound from the instrumental-gal chorus setting. Portion to watch.
(B) "ITSY BITY PITY LOVE"
(2:55) [Jobete BMI—Bradford, Wylie] Infectious light-beat sound supports the lark's bouncy essay.

ZORRO (Maske 702)
(B+) "COME ON FISH WITH ME"
[Wistabala BMI—Washington, Kerrin] Teen-dance invitation is announced with polished Chubby Checker-type brightness. Vocalist is ably assisted by the musicians and gal chorus. Diskery is handled by Philly's Tally Ho Records.
(B) "SOMEBODY CARES" (2:17)
[Wistabala BMI—Washington, Kerrin] Performer's hands-in-a sensitive survey of the wistful R&B-flavored ballad.

(20th Fox 258)
(B) "MIDNIGHT LOVE" (2:41)
[Budd ASCAP—Cowen, Kaye]
Both the opus and use of a soprano sax is a reminder of the "Petite Fleur" success. Femme chorus offers attractive wordless accompaniment.
(B) "CHUBBY" (2:11) [Budd ASCAP—Carr, Kaye] Ork steps lightly in this enjoyable bouncer.

DAVID ROMAINE (Savoy 1604)
(B+) "TEASIN' MELODY" [Medallion & Windy City ASCAP—Trace, Martin, Stafford] Ditty with a "Third Man Theme" flavoring gets a pleasing full ork sound, with a guitar playing the zither role. Catchy cut that deserves airtime for those breezy instrumental moments.
(B) "MARCHETA" [M. M. Cole BMI—Schertzinger] A hard rock-beat backs the ork's portrayal of the perennial.

JULES BLATTNER (Norman 509)
(B) "SLIP 'N SLIDE" (2:02)
[Norman BMI] Good teen belt stint based on the current fad in which folks slide on a wet plastic sheet. Worth hoptime exposure.
(C+) "HEARTBEAT" (2:10) [Norman BMI] Intriguing easy blues-beat supports here.

(B) "I'M HOSPITALIZED OVER YOU" (2:16) [Trinity BMI—Wolfe, Mure] Good-sounding bright novelty-rock issue about a guy who gets a going-over from the boyfriend of a gal he just met.
(B) "COTTON PICKIN' LOVE"
(2:11) [Trinity BMI—Williams, Clark, Tucker, Osborne, Dubois] A lighter beat in another teen-laff opus.

TURNER DI SENTRI (Topix 6001)
(B+) "SPANISH LACE (Theme from the West Side)" (2:30)
[Saturday ASCAP—Crewe] Imaginative scoring, with teen-market appeal, of a catchy Spanish-flavored number. Keyboard and castinet-like clicks perform against a lush string setting. Could get attention.
(B) "TEN MILLION TEARS (Theme from Another Apartment)" (2:49) [Saturday ASCAP—Crewe] Moody is attractively displayed by the ork-chorus.

PHIL SOFFOS (Mem 103)
(B) "ROCK ALL NIGHT" (1:50)
[Mem-Life ASCAP—Soffos] Belt ditty is done with all-out vitality by the songster and combo-chorus. Hot side for hop spins.
(B) "PLEASE TELL ME" (2:20)
[Jalo BMI—Soffos] The songster heads a sentimental-beat showing (narrative is included). Label is a N.Y. outfit.

ART HUDSON (Abbeo 103)
(B+) "GIRL WITH THE FRECKLE NOSE" (1:48)
[W&K BMI—Friedman] Amiable teen rhythmic is presented with a merry rock-a-string-backed pose. Singer Hudson does a teen-wise upbeat stint.
(B) "YOU'RE THE LINK TO MY HEART" (2:00) [W&K BMI—Friedman] Much the same happy-rock story here. Ace Adams produced and arranged the deck.

JOHNNY ANGEL (Jaf 2024)
(B) "LONELY NIGHTS" (2:35)
[Jaf BMI—Cole, Verne] After a thunderous drum opening, singer Angel and his combo-chorus backing settle-down to a tuneful medium-beat plaintive.
(B) "SEVEN WORDS" (2:27)
[Podlor BMI—Speeze] Belting rock-a-string chore in which the seven words are: Why did we fall in love anyways?

BURL IVES (Decca 25524)

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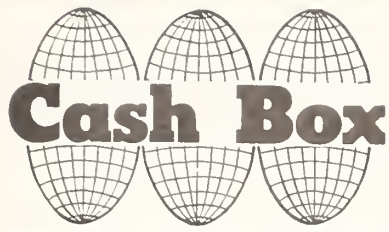

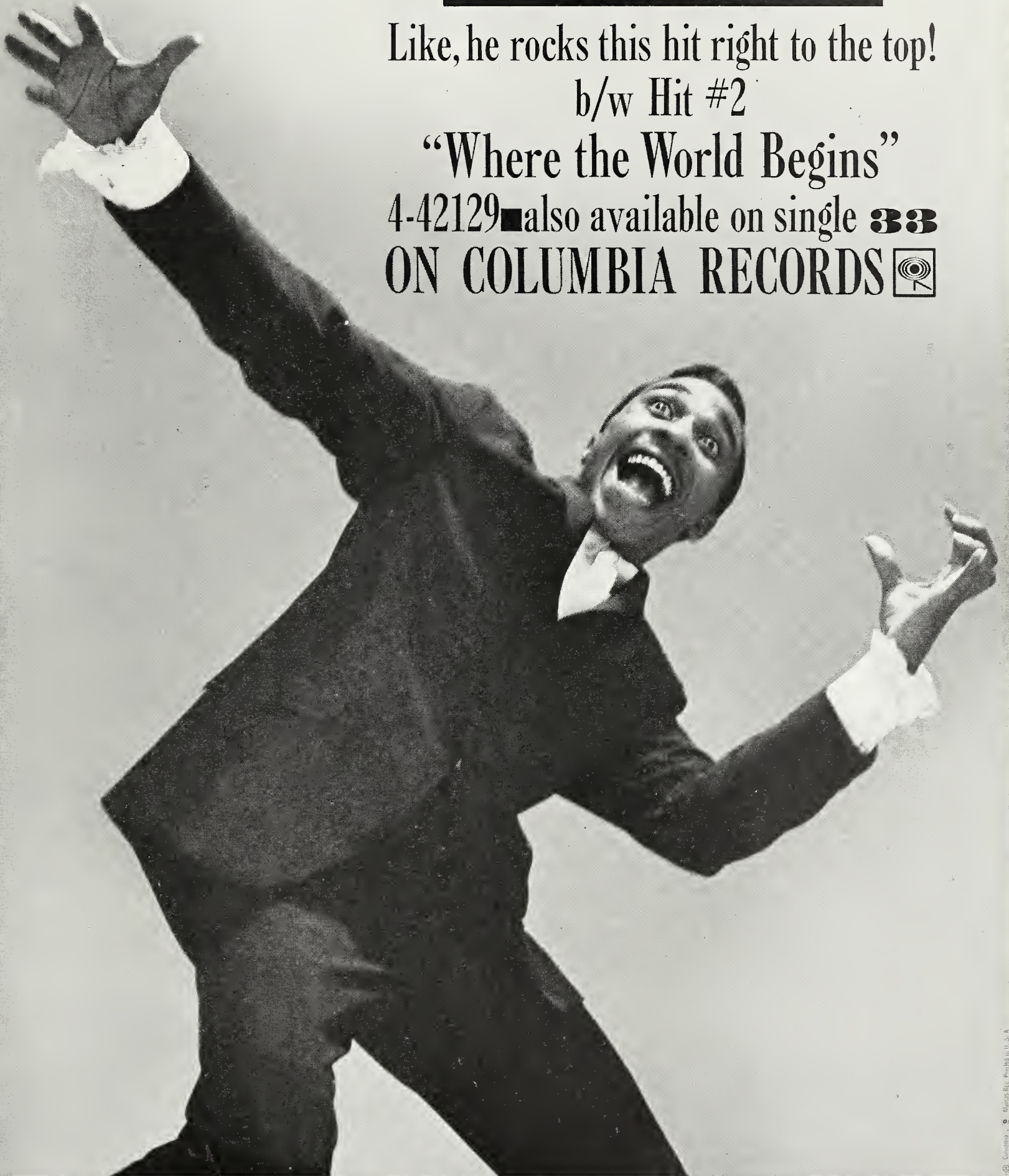
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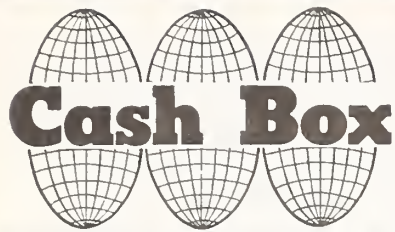

(B+) "JUST OUT OF REACH (Of My Two Open Arms)" (2:46) [Four Star BMI—Stewart] The touching country plaintive is understandingly conveyed by the songster. Soulful sax is included in the pretty soft-beat combo-chorus backing. Could move with sufficient station attention.

(B) "BE BOP GRANDMA" (2:20) [Progressive-Singular BMI—Burke, Burke] Speedy rockin' in this session.

FERRIS & THE WHEELS ORCH. (Bambi 801)

(B+) "CHOP, CHOP" (2:18) [Starring BMI—Adessa] Strong rapid-fire, chanting novelty rockin' from the songsters and musicians as they tell of some guys who plan to break from their confines. Session, handled by Warwick, could move.

(B) "I WANT TO DANCE (Every Night)" (2:20) [Damion BMI—Peters] Infectious teen dancetime work.

DALE & THE DEL-HEARTS (Herald 564)

(B+) "I'VE WAITED SO LONG" (1:58) [Windsong BMI—Gernhard, McCullough] The Herald bow by Dale and the Del-Hearts can develop into a solid money-maker. It's a rock-a-cha-cha thumper that has the sound the kids dig. Eye it closely.

TRUSTIN HOWARD (Acclaim 1004)

(B) "HEY! MR PIANO" (1:48) [Commander ASCAP—Slavin] Ray Johnson's Nashville keyboard is included in this rockin' vocal-instrumental.

(B) "THE DAMAGE IS DONE" (2:04) [Commander ASCAP—Slavin] Tuneful country-styled bouncer is the vehicle for the songster and backing.

CAROL HALL (Columbia 42064)

(B) "I WISH I WAS A TRAIN" (2:35) [Cedarwood BMI—Hall] Catchy folk-influenced romantic blueser is presented with an interesting multi-tracked delivery by the lark.

(B) "BEAT BEAT CLICK CLICK TAP TAP" (2:59) [Four Star Sales BMI—Hall] Lightly swingin' blueser showcases the lark here.

SEYMOUR (Heartbeat 45)

(B) "SWINGING FAVORITES—Part 1" (2:59) [Harms, Berlin, Robbins ASCAP] Ops should be interested in this brisk run-down of old favorites (e.g. "Birth of the Blues," "Blue Skies") by the trumpeter and organist Helen Mayfair.

(B) "SWINGING FAVORITES" (2:30) [Shapiro - Bernstein, Whitmark, Harms ASCAP] Tunes here include "Just A Shanty In Old Shanty Town," "Silvery Moon" and "Sunny Side Of The Street."

JESSE JAMES & THE ROYAL ACES (Shirley 103)

(B) "CHA CHA MINNIE" (2:30) [Carriage BMI—McCracklin] Novelty ditty is relayed with good R&B luff sense by the singers, including lead James and deep-voiced interjections.

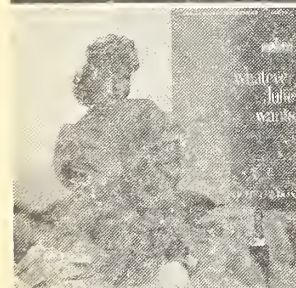
"MUCHO GUSTO!"—More Music of Mexico—Percy Faith and his Orch.—Columbia CL 1639

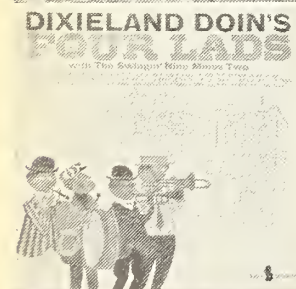
"TIMI YURO"—Liberty LST 7208

Her silken-smooth voice is used swingingly to the accompaniment of bold band backdrops.



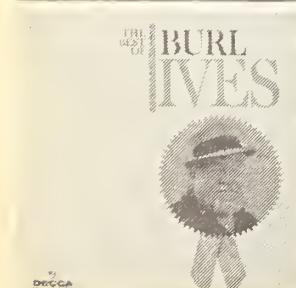
"DIXIELAND DOIN'S"—The Four Lads with the Swingin' Nine Minus Two—Kapp KL-1254

A free-wheeling Dixieland romp by the quartet in which they get "hot" instrumental support from a Joe Sherman-led aggregation. A real swinging affair that all their many fans will enjoy. Selections include "Get Me To The Church On Time," "Mountain Greenery," "After You've Gone" and "The Bilbao Song."



JACKIE GLEASON'S LOVER'S PORTFOLIO—Capitol SWBO 1619

Leave it to Jackie Gleason to be handing out love advice. And he does it in such a nice way, as this album. It includes two disks of a total of 41 tunes, broken into sequences of "Music For Sippin'," "For Listenin'," "For Dancin'," and "For Lovin'." An accompanying booklet advises on the proper wines and stronger spirits for the particular moments in the evening. The whole affair comes packaged in a hardboard portfolio. Lots of lessons to be learned here; lots of good music too.



"THE BEST OF BURL IVES"—Decca DXB 167

America's favorite balladeer is represented in a two-disk collection from Decca. It includes 24 popular folk and folk-like songs, many of which have become associated with the rich and hearty Burl Ives voice. Among them are "Blue Tail Fly," "Old Dan Tucker," "Mrs. McGrath," "Cowboy's Lament" and "Rodger Young."



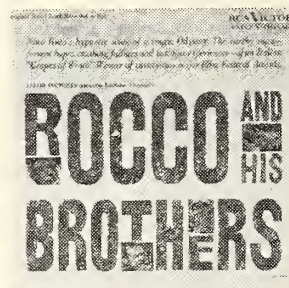
"ROCKIN' HOT!"—Fabian—Chancellor CHL-5019

The teen songster is spotlighted in vigorously rocking performances. He moves along at a fast clip, with ork-chorus keeping infectious pace, through a lineup of some oldies and several new items. Included are "Kansas City," "Singin' The Blues," "Tongue Tied" and "Hey Little Girl." Still has a strong fandom.



"ROUND MIDNIGHT"—Dakota Staton—Capitol ST 1597

The jazz-angled thrush in a mostly murky, after-hours mood here expounding the lyrical moodiness of such as "Round Midnight," "The Folks Who Live On The Hill" and "I Won't Worry." A couple of blues and bright swingers are pleasant contrasts. Arranger-conductor Benny Carter has charted interesting courses with a fair sprinkling of soles as purposeful backdrops to the singer. Good listening date.



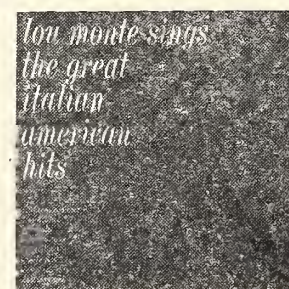
"ROCCO AND HIS BROTHERS"—Original Film Soundtrack—RCA Victor Int'l FOC-2

An unusual motion picture gets an equally unique background score by the impressive Nino Rota. Also responsible for the score to "La Dolce Vita," the first LP release in this Victor series, Rota proves to be one of the leading flick cleffers in the field. The film was critically praised and is doing big box office; this set will benefit from the long run possibilities of the flick.



"MONDAY EVERY DAY"—Al Hibbler Sings The Blues—Reprise R 2005

The singer has discarded the stylized frill of recent years for a return to the straight dramatic singing of his early Ellington years. Result is the best album he's made in several years. Important parts of the outstanding overall effects are the clean arrangements by Gerald Wilson, the effective individual soloists and the wise selections of tunes, among which are "Baby, Won't You Please Come Home," "It's Monday Every Day," "I Got It Bad" and "The Party's Over."



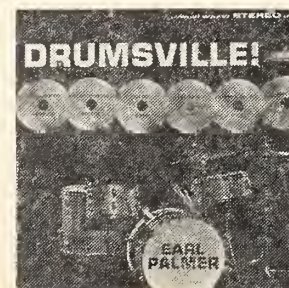
"LOU MONTE SINGS THE GREAT ITALIAN-AMERICAN HITS"—Reprise R-6005

Lou Monte's first album for Reprise finds him in several musical situations. 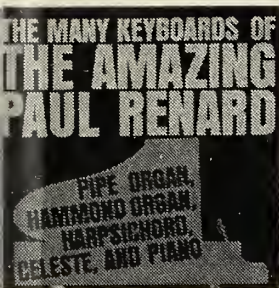
"SHELBY FLINT"—Valiant LP 401

Selections include "What'd I Say," "Whole Lotta Shakin'," "Let The Good Times Roll" and "Hound Dog." Teeners should dig this outing.



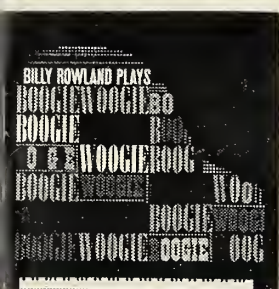
"THE MANY KEYBOARDS OF THE AMAZING PAUL RENARD"—Riverside RLP 97507
Renard's keyboard proficiency encompasses the piano, Hammond organ, Wurlitzer pipe organ, harpsichord and celeste. He takes it yet another step by combining several combinations of these instruments in various tracks by multi-track methods (a sort of Les Paul of the keyboard). But keyboard virtuosity is only a means to a scintillating musical end in which Renard performs a program of evergreens in different styles. "THE SOUND OF THE ASPHALT JUNGLE"—Joe Harnell & his Orch.—Medallion ML-7518
The myriad sound and moods of the city are musically portrayed by a big swinging band under the direction of Joe Harnell. The scene is set by the Ellington-cleffed TV theme, "Asphalt Jungle," followed by such carefully chosen selections as "Blues In The Night," "Take The 'A' Train," "In The Wee Small Hours Of The Morning" and "Solitude." A bold, exciting program that also serves as a workout for the stereo rig.



"THE YOUNG SAVAGES"—Original Movie Soundtrack—Columbia CL 1672
The Burt Lancaster-starred flick of juvenile delinquency features a jazz-oriented score penned by David Amram. Latin themes are also extensively used to comply with the Italian vs. Puerto Rican gang theme of the film. Though the film was not too well critically received, its subject matter promises good box office and resulting disk sales.



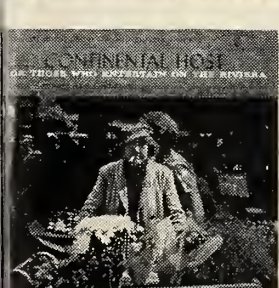
"BILLY ROWLAND PLAYS BOOGIE WOOGIE"—Grand Award GA 259SD
Boogie woogie in a polished, pop-acceptable form is enticingly essayed by pianist Billy Rowland. 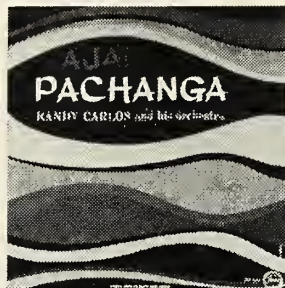
"YES I SEE"—Bob Gibson—Elektra EKL-197

Accompaniment is by several top notch jazz names. Selections include "I'll Be Around," "It's So Peaceful In The Country" and "While We're Young." Album rates exposure.



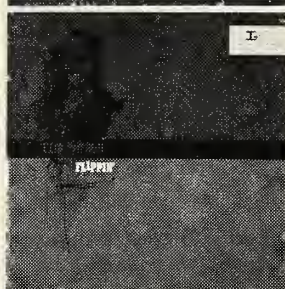
"CONTINENTAL HOST"—Raoul Maynard and Orch.—Warner Bros. W1424

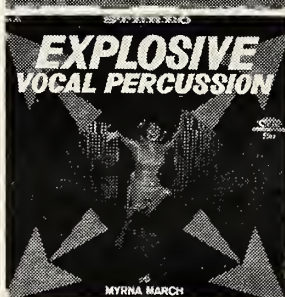
"AJA! PACHANGA"—Randy Carlos and his Orch.—Fiesta FLP 1317

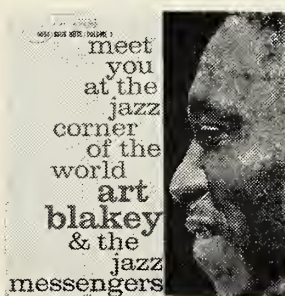


"FLIPPIN'"—Flip Wilson—Imperial LP 9155

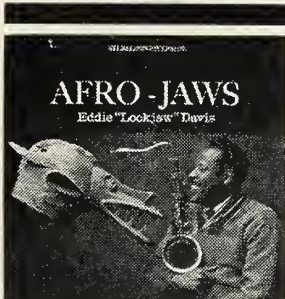


"EXPLOSIVE VOCAL PERCUSSION"—Myrna March—Strand SLS 1033

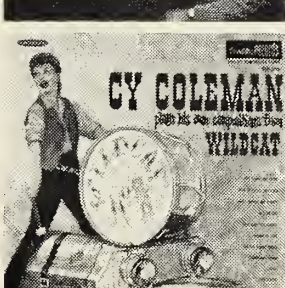
JAZZ PICK OF THE WEEK

Once more Blue Note has gone into Birdland to cut Art Blakey and again the result is a superb recording. This, volume one of a two disk series, opens with the familiar Pee Wee Marquette introduction and then swings into a vigorous, compelling performance featuring collaborative ensemble work, excellent solos by the maturing Lee Morgan and Wayne Shorter, Bobby Timmons and long stretches of showmanship by Blakey. Tunes include "Round About Midnight," "The Breeze And I" and "The Opener." Top jazz disk.



"AFRO-JAWS"—Eddie "Lockjaw" Davis—Riverside RLP 9373
The complementing combination of Lockjaw Davis' earthiness and Afro-Cuban music meet head on here. Jaws' tenor sax is backed up by a six man combo plus Ray Barretto and his Latin Percussion. They perform "Tin Tin Dee," "Star Eyes," a Davis title tune original and four by arranger Gil Lopez. A pulsating, fiery jazz date of large interest.



"CY COLEMAN PLAYS HIS OWN COMPOSITIONS FROM WILDCAT"—Indigo GBM-502A
Composer/jazz pianist Cy Coleman in a dual threat role here, playing his score from "Wildcat." The score is already well enough known. Coleman's keyboard technique is light and fresh, with an enthusiastic zip that lends additional sparkle to a lively lineup of songs. Dave Bailey (drums), Bill Takas (bass) and Ralph Dorsey (conga), contribute rhythmic bounce to the effort.

Johnny Tillotson



"Without You" jumped into the Top 100 this week at the #60 slot and promises to be another smash hit for Johnny Tillotson.

Though only 22, the Cadence disk star boasts of an unusually intensive training program in show biz. Born in Jacksonville, Fla., April 20, 1939, he moved to Palatka, Fla. at age 8 (he still calls it home) and there developed his early musical interest — country music. By the time he entered high school he had earned a local reputation as a fine performer. Then came a 3-year contract as a regular on a TV variety show, "The Tom Dowdy Show." Lee Rosenberg of Southern Belle Music heard him and arranged an audition with Archie Bleyer, Cadence Records prexy. Bleyer inked Tillotson immediately and then followed "Dreamy Eyes," "True, True Happiness," "Jimmy's Girl" and now "Without You."

The Four Preps



A talent show at Hollywood High School prompted four boys to organize what was to become a fantastically successful quartet, the Four Preps. They began at local college and high school functions and in 1956, through agent Melville Shauer, caught the ear of Capitol Records producer Voyle Gilmore, who signed them to a long-term Capitol contract and began grooming them professionally.

Their first network TV break came on Ernie Ford's morning show, followed by a stint on his nighttime stanza. Then came a guest shot on the Lawrence Welk show after which they did six acting-singing films for the Ozzie & Harriet series. Now aligned with Ricky Nelson, the Preps toured the country during the summer of 1957 with Ricky.

Disk stardom came first via their initial Capitol release, "Dreamy Eyes," in 1957. They broke wide open with "26 Miles" in 1958 and since have scored successively with "Big Man," "Down By The Station" and now, "More Money For You And Me Medley," "Four Preps On Campus."

Comprising the group are Marvin Inabnett (high tenor), Bruce Bellard (lead tenor), Glen Larson (baritone) and Ed Cobb (bass).



PLATTER SPINNER PATTER

When Bob Prince, Jim Woods and Paul Long broadcast the Pittsburgh-Cincinnati game Aug. 5 on KDKA they marked the 40th anniversary of play-by-play baseball radio coverage. Philips Issues First Shakespeare Set In Europe

NEW YORK—Philips Records Ltd. has just released its first Shakespeare Recording Society (Caedmon) set, "Othello," starring Frank Silvera, Cyril Cusack, Celia Johnson, and Anna Massey, in all European markets. The continent-based firm will release all the complete plays on disk produced by the Shakespeare Recording Society, as they become available, Harold Drayson, national sales manager of SRS and Caedmon Records, said last week.

The three LP set, with text of the play included, will retail slightly more abroad than in the U.S. where such sets are priced at \$17.85. Though distributed abroad under the Philips aegis, the packaging will bear the Shakespeare Recording Society imprint. The plays on disk, which will eventually number 37, are produced in England by the Shakespeare Recording Society, Inc., an American-owned corporate entity.

The label is also hoping for Top 100 action on Don Carroll's "7 Up And An Ice Cream Soda," Florian Zabach's "Oceans Of Love" and George Feyer's "Claire Di Lune," and a revival of the Everly Bros.' years-back smash, "All I Have To Do Is Dream."

Alan W. Livingston, Capitol's vice president for creative services, is pictured with a copy of "Lover's Portfolio" in an advertisement which will

appear full page in Newsweek, Aug. 24; Sports Illustrated, Aug. 24; The New Yorker, Sept. 7; and half-page in Look, Sept. 12; Esquire, Sept. 15; and Holiday, Sept. 14. Additionally, the album will be featured in a full page in Playboy's September issue.

In other promotion, CRDC is providing dealers with carefully detailed and illustrated instructions for special Jackie Gleason's windows. For creating this typical romantic setting for display of the Gleason album, Schieffelin is providing CRDC dealers with exotic wine and liquor bottles for props.

Easeled cardboard reprints of the Livingston ad will be available to dealers. "Ask Me About Lover's Portfolio" buttons will be distributed to dealer's staffs.

Gleason is CRDC "Star of the Month" for August. Dealers with "Star of the Month" floor pieces will get a strip of Gleason promotional material to use on the electric moving displays.

NEW YORK—Bob Mersey, a top indie producer, joins Columbia Records this week as an A&R producer, Cash Box has learned. Mersey, who will do both LP and singles work at Columbia, has cut such big teen names as Bobby Rydell, Ray Peterson, The Flamingos, Jimmy Clanton, Dion, Jimmy Jones and Curtis Lee. Under the name of Spencer Ross, he clicked on Columbia awhile back with "Tracy's Theme."

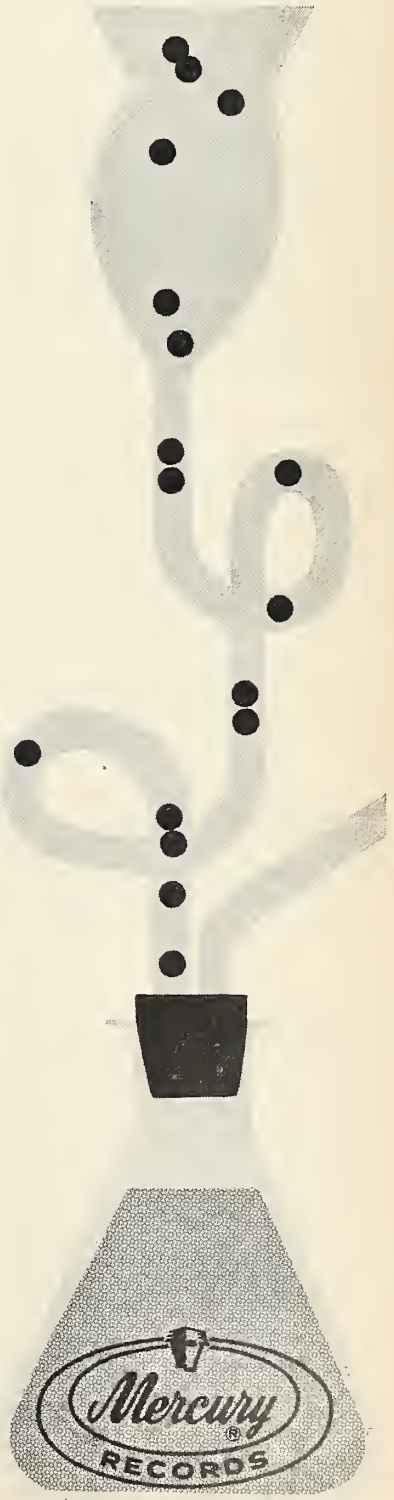

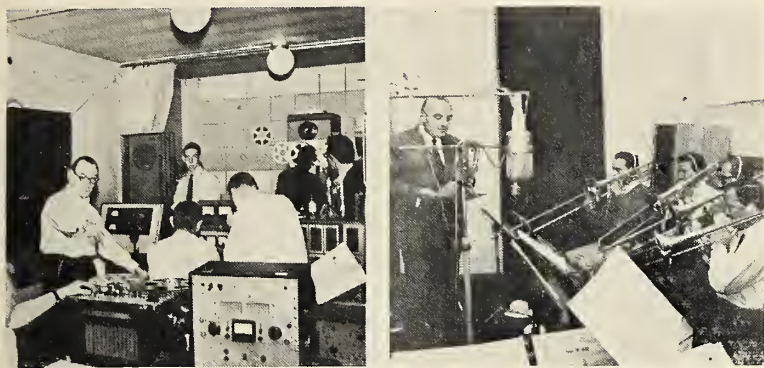

London Bows "phase 4 stereo," New 'Deluxe' Sound Line

NEW YORK—London Record next week will make the strongest move in its history to capture more of the pop market when it unveils its new stereo sound LP series, "phase 4 stereo."

The line, the first twelve albums of which will be previewed at the label's sales meet in New York this week (Aug. 15) was produced in England with the usual aspect of having been entirely A & R'd by the label's American A & R staff.

London has named the series "phase 4 stereo" because it feels it is the next major step in the advance of stereo sound techniques on records.

The line features a number of recordings that were done in a unique manner: four separate sessions were held for the main sections of the orchestra (percussion, brass, woodwinds and strings). This method enabled London engineers to balance each section in the final mastering in such a way as to produce the most effective stereo results. In addition, the material used in the LP's is described by London as "music which lends itself to separation, with no emphasis on artificial separation."

Among the LP's bowing the line are: Ted Heath's "Big Band Percussion," Edmundo Ros' "Bongos from the South," Ronnie Aldrich's "Melody in Percussion for 2 Pianos," Johnny Keating's "Percussion Moods," Eric Rogers' "Percussive 20's," a parade album (cut in the studio), "Pass in Review" by Bob Sharples.

The LP's will be housed in a four-sided, colorfully designed "art" jacket, a complete departure for the label, that will carry an explanation of the entire "phase 4" sound on the two inside liners while the front cover artwork will visually denote the musical content of the album. The back-cover will describe the LP itself and the material.

Mono counterparts to the stereo disks are tagged "sound 4 monophonic high fidelity 1962."

Those attending the sales meet, including critics, equipment manufacturers, reps from national chains, and, from England, execs from Decca Ltd., London's parent firm, will take part in a series of talks and demonstrations designed to explain all aspects of the "phase 4" recording program.

London personnel out of New York and regional promotion men will hit the road later this month on a large-scale, coast-to-coast publicity drive. Abroad, the disks will also be available in Germany, England, Canada, France, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa, and Belgium.

Summing-up the label's move into the sound LP field, vice-president and general manager Lee Hartstone said: "The trend in stereo is clear. People want to be entertained and look to stereo as a form of entertainment. They no longer look to stereo merely to recreate stage presence which it was originally intended to do. But you can't go on forever giving the public a gimmick, a ping pong product. We have taken the position that music

properly selected and scored and then dramatically engineered so that separation is effected musically is what the stereo buyer wants and is ready for. We've got that product and we're ready to hit hard with it."

London will announce prices and complete details of its massive sales program next week at a meeting for which its entire sales organization will be brought in from all across the country on an all-expenses-paid basis.

Mercury-Philips Plan Stronger Hong Kong Ties

CHICAGO—Strengthening of the Mercury-Philips set-up in Hong Kong and surrounding areas is expected to come about as a result of meets between Mercury topper Irving B. Green and Ren Da Silva, managing director of the Diamond Mercury Co., Ltd., Hong Kong, which, under licensing agreements, presses disks of Mercury and other labels.

At such a meet last week, plans for the plant, which is the only record pressing plant in the Hong Kong territory, were discussed, including expansion of the plant facilities as well as the distrib system, which will also include imports.

Da Silva left Chicago last week to visit with Willem Langenberg, head of the International Philips Record Group, to further discuss the future plans and consolidation of effort between Da Silva, Mercury and Philips in the Hong Kong territory, which includes, in some instances, Singapore, the Federated Malay States, Thailand, and Indonesia.

Da Silva is due back in the U. S. August 17 for another meet with Steinberg and confirmation of plans on the new pressing-import distribution organization.

Cadence Makes Foreign Rep Deals

NEW YORK—Cadence Records has just concluded deals for representation abroad. They include agreements with the following labels: Peak, New Zealand; Blue Bell, Italy; Artone, Holland; Metronome, Scandinavia; British London, England; Microphone, Hawaii. Negotiations are presently being conducted for Deutsche Grammophone to handle the Cadence line in Germany.

Sinatra Buys Pic, Cast LP Rights to "Subways"

NEW YORK—Frank Sinatra has just paid \$1 million for the film and original-cast rights, on his Reprise label, "Subways Are For Sleeping."

The pic rights go to Sinatra Essex Productions, which will produce the screen version starring Sinatra himself. Besides the original-cast LP, Sinatra and other artists on Reprise will cut tunes from the show.

The musical, based on a story by Edmund Love, will have book and lyrics by Betty Comden and Adolph Green and music by Jules Styne, collaborators on such hits as "Bells Are Ringing" and the current "Do Re Mi."

David Merrick will produce and Michael Kidd will direct. Sidney Chaplin will star.

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Roulette Offers Juke-Box Singles

NEW YORK—Roulette Records has joined other labels which have added a specialized line of juke-box singles. The line, "Juke Box Favorites," issued for juke-box use only, is a result, the label said last week, of numerous requests at the recent Roulette distrib meet for such a line.

The disks, which will not be available in retail outlets, will be sold to one-stops and operators through the regular network of Roulette distributors in both 45's and 33's.

According to Joe Kolsky, the label's exec veep, the label went direct to its distributors for suggestion on the launching of the series and even accepted a list of titles and artists from a number of distributors to make-up its initial release.

Twelve singles bow the line, 10 from Roulette LP's two from the Roost affiliate. Featured are Pearl Bailey, Joe Williams, Maynard Ferguson Orchestra, Harry "Sweets" Edison, guitarist Johnny Smith and altoist Sonny Stitt.

All labels and title strips supplied for these issues indicate the album from which the selections have been made.

Promotion head Bud Katzel said that quantities of specially prepared order blanks have been shipped to distributors to aid in writing orders for the singles and a direct promotion campaign aimed at one-stops and operators is planned. Katzel added that initial distrib orders indicated an "unqualified success" for the line.

80% Of Atlantic Distribs Fill LP Program Quotas

NEW YORK—In last week's story on the success of the Atlantic LP program, it was incorrectly stated that "10% of Atlantic distributors had reached their quotas for July and August." Actually, a much more respectable 80% had reached their quotas.

Capitol's Fiscal Year Sales Show \$2 Million Increase

HOLLYWOOD—Sales of Capitol Records, Inc., for the fiscal year ended June 30 increased to \$48,364,719 from \$46,368,096 in the preceding year, according to the firm's annual report issued last week.

Sales were second highest in company history, exceeded only by the \$94,266,860 registered for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1959.

In a letter to shareholders, Capitol's president and co-founder, Glenn E. Wallichs, revealed that the \$2 million increase in sales enabled the company to show a slight increase in profits, despite a highly-competitive industry situation that has resulted in reduced profit margins. Net income was \$1,815,523, equivalent to \$3.93 per share on the 461,409 shares outstanding at the end of the year. This figure compared with a net of \$1,796,233 (\$3.77 a share) in the fiscal year ended June 30, 1960.

In his report, Wallichs reviewed highlights of the company's operations for the fiscal year just closed:

"Important events during the year included the signing of new contracts providing continuance for long periods of three artists in the best-selling category—Nat King Cole, Tennessee Ernie Ford and Judy Garland, whose sensational performance at Carnegie Hall and Capitol's album recorded 'on-the-spot' skyrocketed her popularity. New artists signed by Capitol included the singing star, Vic Damone.

"Capitol continued its Broadway activities with the acquisition of album rights to Noel Coward's first musical in recent years, 'Sail Away.' 'Gay Life,' produced by Kermit Bloomgarden ('Music Man'), and 'Kwamina,' an Alfred DeLiagre production, are two other top shows for the fall season which will be issued by Capitol in album form.

"The Unsinkable Molly Brown, for which Capitol provided financing as well as producing the original cast album, proved to be a most successful show, and there is every indication of a prolonged Broadway run. 'Fiorello,' another Capitol album property continues in its second year to be an outstanding attraction. Albums of both shows remain on the list of best sellers.

"During the year a greater number of Capitol singles were placed on the best-seller lists of trade magazines. Expansion of the educational and religious markets continues to show great promise for Capitol. Future plans include aggressive marketing of Capitol's children's record line at a competitive price.

"The improvement in the general business economy that is anticipated in the year ahead should have a beneficial effect on the record industry, and your Company is in a strong position to participate therein," Wallichs concluded.

Mercury To French Philips; Ends Long Barclay Ties

NEW YORK—Because of the upcoming Mercury-Philips tie, Mercury and Barclay Records have agreed to terminate their 12-year representation agreement, which still had three-and-half years to run, with Mercury moving over to George Meyerstein, head of Societe Phonographique Philips of France.

The termination agreement, which Barclay felt would be to the mutual advantage of all, thus ends an association in which Barclay represented Mercury in France and Mercury had the rights to Barclay dates for release in the U.S.

In addition, Barclay and Mercury had collaborated in many areas regarding sales outlets throughout various countries of the world, and many Mercury artists were cut in Barclay's Paris studios, including Quincy Jones, Clebanoff, David Carroll and The Platters.

Jones also served as musical director of the Barclay organization, cutting such European stars as Dalida, Eddie Constantine and Bob Az-zam.

French Philips has such top attractions as Sasha Distel, Yves Montand, Juliet Greco, Michele LeGrand and Patachou. These and other artists will appear in the U.S. under the Philips tag when the label bows here in September. First Mercury product to be released in France under Philips will take place next month. Release and sales plans will be debuted at a meet of the entire Philips sales staff at its fall meet in Paris on August 25.

Capitol Extends Holdings In Toshiba Musical Industries

HOLLYWOOD—Capitol Records has entered into an agreement to "substantially" increase its interests in Toshiba Musical Industries of Tokyo, according to an announcement last week by Lloyd W. Dunn, the label's marketing veep. Capitol has already purchased 10% of TMI's outstanding shares and has the option to increase its holdings up to a total of 49% of the stock. (Tokyo Shibaura Electric Co. (Toshiba) owns the remaining shares.

The agreement between Capitol and Toshiba, which handles Capitol Records in Japan, calls for Capitol to provide TM with advice and counsel regarding the record business and to contribute to the management of the Japanese firm. Towards this end, Capitol has designated Warren Burkenhead, Tokyo, and G. N. Bridge, England, to fill two vacancies on the TM board of directors.

Among specific business operations under immediate consideration by Capitol and TM are improvement of record manufacturing and expanding sales and merchandising activities.

The agreement also calls for TM personnel to visit Capitol's plant, studios and offices in the U.S.

The agreement was confirmed in writing on June 5 by Glenn E. Wallichs, Capitol president, and Motoji Kuno, senior managing director of TM. TM's shareholders approved the deal at a general meeting in Tokyo on July 28.

Since shortly after its formation in October of 1960, TM has manufactured and distributed Capitol disks in Japan, pressing them from master disks provided by Capitol. Prior to that, Japanese distribution and pressing of Capitol disks was handled by TM's parent firm, Toshiba. Under the terms of the agreement, Capitol will continue to provide TM with its pressing catalog of recordings.

ABA Section Adopts

Anti-Bootlegging Resolution

NEW YORK—The patent trademark and copyright section of the American Bar Association, at a recent meet in St. Louis, adopted a resolution, sponsored by Sigmund Steinberg, attorney for the Association of Record Manufacturers & Distributors (ARMADA), backing the fight against counterfeiting and the enactment of anti-bootlegging legislation on the state and Federal levels.

"This is a significant step forward in the continuing program to eliminate this cancer from our industry," said Art Talmadge, ARMADA prexy, and we welcome the action which has been taken by this body of outstanding attorneys."

Victor Signs Heifetz Pupil

NEW YORK—Erick Friedman, 21-year-old violin pupil of Pascha Heifetz, has been signed to an exclusive contract by RCA Victor Records, which gave Friedman a student pact in 1958.

Already cut by Friedman (with Heifetz) is Bach's Double Violin Concerto, with Sir Malcolm Sargeant conducting the orchestra, and plans are now being discussed for a new session.

Friedman just completed his first European concert tour with recitals in London, Amsterdam and Berlin, as well as several radio and TV recitals.

Friedman made his Carnegie Hall recital debut in 1956, and has appeared with the New York Philharmonic, the Chicago Symphony, the National Symphony in Washington and other U.S. orchestras. During the 1960-61 season, he was part of the Young Artists Series in the Metropolitan Museum in New York.

The resolution, as adopted, reads as follows:

"Be it resolved that it is the sense of the Section that the State Trademark Statutes or the State Criminal Codes be amended where necessary to provide that the forging or counterfeiting of any registered trademark constitutes a criminal offense with a suitable fine or imprisonment and such other penalties or sanctions as may be appropriate and that the Section cooperate with the National Conference of Commissioners on uniform state laws in an effort to draft and promote the adoption of such legislation as is necessary to effectuate the Sense set forth herein."

During the debate on the above resolution, Steinberg reviewed ARMADA's activities during the past year on the counterfeiting front, describing the prosecutions that were sponsored by the association.

The ABA also held a special symposium on recommended revisions of the United States Copyright laws. It was decided to give further consideration to these changes at additional meets to be held in New York and Los Angeles later this year.

WB 33 Singles Sampler Pushes Everly's LP

NEW YORK—Warner Bros. Records has come-up with the idea of using a 33 singles sampler to stimulate sales of its Everly Bros. LP, "Both Sides Of An Evening."

The sampler, which retailers can give away free or sell at a minimal charge, contains excerpts from ten of the LP's tracks and narration by both Don and Phil Everly.

If the customer is interested in buying the full album, a departure for the team as it contains many pop standards, he can return the sleeve of the sampler for a full refund (if he paid for it) on his purchase of the full LP.

WB feels that if the promo comes-off, it will offer other samplers on future albums, especially since in-store auditioning of LP's is no longer a feature of many outlets.

The label is backing the LP with a promotional campaign, which includes a full-color window displays, special 10-inch radio transcription of five tracks from the album and various publicity material.

New Angel LP's Include Rare Lipatti Performances

NEW YORK—Angel Records is releasing two LP's this week, including a newly-discovered recording of the late pianist Dinu Lipatti's last concert with orchestra, Mozart's Piano Concerto in C Major with Herbert von Karajan conducting the Lucerne Festival Orchestra.

The recording is a result of a search by Angel artistic director Walter Legge and Lipatti's widow for an amateur recording of the concert—at the 1960 Lucerne Festival—which was broadcast. Two broadcast recordings were found in 1959, the better-sounding version being worked on by Angel engineers in London. Disk is coupled with Enesco's Piano Sonata No. 3, also made during a radio broadcast.

Lipatti died in 1950 at the age of 33.

The second album is by Herbert von Karajan and The Philharmonia Orchestra and consists of Sibelius' Symphony No. 5 and Finlandia.

NEW YORK—Peter Pan Children's Records, the 7" line that has retailed at 25¢ for the last 15 years, will retail at 29¢ beginning with its Christmas product. According to Ira L. Moss, exec veep of Synthetic Plastics Records Corp., producers of the label, the move is a result of the label's expansion program which includes signing of "name artists" and new educational lines. In addition to the price change, all of the current 7" Peter Pan disks are being offered to retail six for \$1, starting this week (15) and continuing through December. Purpose, according to Moss, is to clean out the inventory of jacketed and re-packaging of the entire line.

Dooto Celebrating 15th Anny

LOS ANGELES—Dooto Records, the large diskery here specializing in Negro talent, is celebrating its 15th anniversary with the promise from topper Dootsie Williams that "as a result of public acceptance, we are now able to promise expansion of our . . . catalog, more extensive operations in the motion picture field and further diversification in other phases of show business."

The celebration at Dooto has been marked by a complete renovation of home offices, the assignment of an architect's commission to design a record pressing plant which will also house offices, and the signing of a comedienne, Hattie Noel, who will be heard soon on her first Dooto album, "The Whole of Hattie Noel."

Williams formed Dooto in 1946, following a term as an A&R man for a major Hollywood label. Previously, he had gained extensive experience in show business as a musician and as a discoverer of talent.

At first, he concentrated on R&B music. Then, encouraged by the night club success of the late comedian Billy Mitchell, he pioneered the field of recorded comedy, long before the nation heard of Mort Sahl, Shelley Berman, or Bob Newhart.

Subsequently, Williams signed Redd Foxx, George Kirby, Allen Drew and other comedians. Meanwhile, he discovered The Penguins, whose recording of "Earth Angel" has sold more than two million records; The Medallions, and many other groups.

"We specialize in Negro talent," Williams has explained, "because we feel that here is a wealth of talent

Capitol-Angel Fall LP Program

HOLLYWOOD—A fall program for Capitol and Angel LP's was announced last week by Bill Tallant, vice-president of national sales and operations manager of Capitol Records Distributing Corp.

Both deals run through September 30, and to qualify, dealers must purchase 50 Capitol LP's, 30 Angel items.

The Capitol deal, a two-pronged campaign aimed at moving disks into and out of retail outlets as quickly as possible, includes: a 12% special dis-

count (in place of the normal 2% cash discount) on all purchases made during the program period; on top of this, dealers will receive a special coop ad allowance equal to 3% of their program purchases; the ad privileges earned within the framework of the program must be undertaken and completed between September 1 and December 25. The plan also includes Capitol's regular controlled 100% exchange plan.

The Angel program offers qualifying dealers discounts of up to 20% on all albums. For the discount end of the deal, albums have divided into three categories: group one, containing 100 titles, will be offered at a 12% discount; group two, containing 200 titles, will be offered at 15% off; group three, containing the balance of the catalog, will be available at a 20% discount. Distrib Robbed Of 20,000 45's; Decks Listed

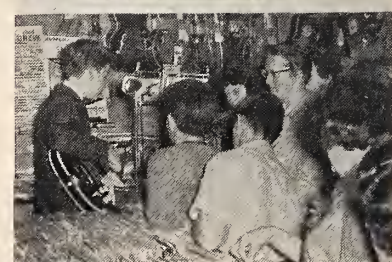
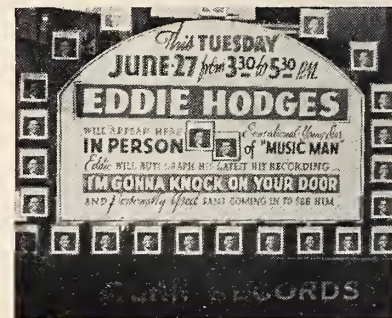

Bob Kornheiser, Atco sales chief, said "that while Atco recognizes and understands the problems facing wholesalers, it feels that it is the responsibility of wholesalers, as it is of all businessmen, to meet their financial obligations in a reasonable manner."

RIAA Starts Consumer Articles On Disk Benefits

NAACP Adopts "Freedom Now" Suite

NEW YORK—The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) has officially adopted the "Freedom Now" Suite, written by Max Roach and Oscar Brown, Jr., and has organized the first of a series of tours to present "live" performances in 20 cities.

The work, part of the Candid label's "We Insist!" LP, is a suite in the modern jazz idiom with spiritual and African music influences (performed on the LP by Roach, Abbey Lincoln, Olatunji and others).

The I Congresso Latino-Americano De Produtores De Discos (First Latin American Congress of Record Producers) will take place Sept. 7 and 8, with representatives of all Latin-American record producers attending. Cash Box will be represented too, and readers will be completely informed about the meeting.

Here is another Brazilian Record Company: Discos Musicais California LTDA. Main office in Sao Paulo, at Rua Quintino Bocaiuva, 191-6th floor. President and A & R—Mario Vieira; Manager—Milton Vieira; Public Relations—Getulio Alves.

California is a very young company and is still selecting its artists. Here is some of them: Lucio da TV, Paulo Queiroz, Pepe Velasquez, Oswaldo Ferreira, Delio & Delinha, Edevaldo, Guido Miyoshi, Carculinha, Pirigoso, Pedro Alexandrino, Miranda, Nilson Costa, Rubens Garcia, Pedro Miguel and Irma Souza.

Last week we had a very pleasant surprise. Columbia Records issued an album entitled "Cantos E Danças Da Renascença" (Songs and Dances of the Renaissance) with a Brazilian Chamber Group, under the direction of Roberto De Regina. This record is really a great achievement since we can't find anything like it, even among the most important European specialized record producers. Roberta De Regina selected fourteen songs and dances from the Renaissance, three by unknown composers: Dança Do Principe (Prince's Dance); English Dompe and Pavana Francesa (French Pavane). Four by Jannequin: Ce Moys De May, Le Chant Des Oyseaulx, Le Chant De L'Alouette and La Bataille De Marignan; and the following: Quando Ritrovo (Constanz Festa); Matona Mia Cara (Lassus); Dança Bassa (F. de La Torre); Mi Ganczen Willen (C. Paumann); Pater Noster (Obrecht); Faulte D'Argen (Josquin Dea Prés) and Dança Dos Judeus (Hans Neusiedler). It's very important to say that all these Renaissance compositions are presented in their original forms by the Dante Martinez Chamber Choir, a Brazilian amateur group. They are: Heloisa Maria Madeira and Miryan Balbi Cerviño—(Soprano); Arlete Leitao and Maria Pereira Araujo (meso-sopranos); Henry Siedlikowski and Sallyr Lerner (Tenors) and Marcello Brasileiro Madeira and Meyer Sirota (Bassos). Regina is the leader and plays the harpsichord too. This is considered one of the most important releases of the year.

Cash Box ARGENTINA

Fermata publishers considering the possibility of releasing disks under its own label. The trade mark is already registered in Argentina, Uruguay, Paraguay and Chile, and Fermata Do Brazil is already operating in this field (presses Cameo, Hispavox, Young, Fermata, Jupiter, Atco and Premier records). However, releases in Argentina will start only when the organization is finished.

Well known songstress Gloria Lasso will be here the September 1, and will spend some days in Buenos Aires. She will probably visit also Uruguay and Santiago de Chile. Ives Montand will also make a tour of this part of America. The date of arrival is unknown yet, but we suppose that Montand will be here in September or October. Other important visitors are Tito Guizar—the Mexican singer—and Los Tres Ases, famous Central American trio.

Surco (United Artists & Atlantic-Atco representative) plans to keep its releases up to date with American charts. This will be made by putting in the market "Portrait Of My Love," and "My Clair De Lune" (Steve Lawrence), "Michael" (The Highwaymen), "The Magnificent Seven" (Al Caiola) and "One Eyed Jacks" by Ferrante & Teicher. Atlantic-Atco releases will be started in a couple of months, as soon as jazz expert Carlos Alizieri finishes selecting the material for publishing. Bobby Darin will receive special promotion, as the label believes that he may become an all time seller very soon.

"Total Para Qué" may become Argentina's next big hit. It has been already recorded by Jolly Land for RCA and Las Chispitas (Chilean duet; was inked by Odeon Pops after their TV performance). Jose Rota, A&R of Odeon Pops, told us that he has bookings for 80,000 records. (More or less equivalent 700,000 copies in the States) before the waxing was even put to sale.

Two new Italian titles published by Fortissimo Americana: "Notte Di Luna Calante," already cut by Domenico Modugno (Music Hall), Renato Renzi (TK), The Dango Twins (Columbia) and Alberto Rodi (Record), and "Corramos Juntitos" (Let's Run Together), already waxed by Billy Cafaro (Columbia), Luis Bastian (RCA) and Los Chapanecos (Odeon Pops).

Three companies are currently improving their offices: Fermata increased its working space by buying three new rooms in the building it occupies; Columbia will finish its new recording studio in October, and after it will change substantially the distribution of its offices, and Siamericana will change into a new building next November.

The Dutch Swing College Band has been well received by local jazz fans. They performed on "Casino Philips" (TV 13), Tabaris and Escala Musical dance parties. Their tour included also Chile and Uruguay. For fifteen days of performances, the band received about four million pesos (50.00 dollars).

According to information received from Madrid, Baby Bell has been a big success in Spain. She performed at the Pavillion, radio and TV. Now, Mexican manager Jose Sabre Marroquin wants to ink her for appearances in Mexico next October, but Baby hasn't decided yet whether to accept or not his offer because she has the possibility of taking part in a Spanish film that will begin soon. Her last waxing, "Café Del Bueno" (composed by Ben Molar and Tony Arren) and "La Redonda," will be released in Buenos Aires in a couple of weeks. The same thing will be made in Spain.

"Flor Sin Retoño—Mexican hit recorded some years ago by the late Pedro Lante—has been released in the original version by TK-Polydor. Besides, Colombia has it recorded by Ruben Cortez, and recently Fabio Etcheverry cut the same tune for Odeon Pops.

Los TNT have already finished their performances in Venezuela and are now in Lima, Peru. The September 1, they will go to Santiago de Chile, and will stay there 15 days, performing on Radio Minería and the Waldorf.

These are some other titles that may soon become hits in Buenos Aires: "Wheels" (String Along); "Apache" (Al Caiola); "Hats Off To Larry" (Del Shannon whose "Runway" is "running" very well); "Surrender" (Elvis Presley), and "Quiero Amanecer" (Sarita Lascarro, Nila Valdez). All these titles are currently receiving big air play and promotion.

Last week was the premiere of "La Novia" (The Bride), starring Antonio Prieto and Elsa Daniel. The film is based on Joaquin Prieto's song, and includes other five tunes, sung by his brother. Among these are "A Ti" and "Los Ojos Del Diablo" (Devil's Eyes), contained also in Prieto's last single record, recently released by RCA.

CHILE

Neil Sedaka, Caterina Valente, Frankie Avalon and Dean Reed are the visitors Chile liked best this last 6 months. Reed left some copies of his first imperial record, "Once Again" to the main disk jockeys, who played it very much; now, Polydor has released it with good results. "Wheels" brought a golden period for instrumental tunes, as "Apache," "Bonanza" and others. "Wheels" was "discovered" by Ricardo Garcia (Chile's top disk jockey), who started playing it in his three radio programs, in Minería; it got to the top of the charts in a few weeks.

Los Huasos Quincheros, good folk music group that was presented in Patti Page's show in the States, have been inked by Philips. Previously, they recorded for Odeon. Los Cuatro Duendes, currently on Minería, will soon start a new tour of Argentina and Uruguay, where they toured last year.

Cash Box GERMANY

It seems that the idea of holding an international convention of distributors with an important industry event has also caught on here in Germany. The big Phono-TV-Radio Fair to be held in Berlin at the end of August will also be the meeting place for representatives from over 40 countries representing RCA. From America, Dario Soria, the international liaison vice president of RCA; Robert Yorke, the vice president of A&R; C. R. Hottelet, the vice president of RCA International Ltd.; A. Klein, the European sales manager and F. N. Swenson, the record marketing manager will be on hand for the important conferences. Klein will remain in Germany to take in the Radio Luxemburg Pop Music Festival to be held at the beginning of September in Weisbaden. Further reports on artists to be present at the Fair: Electrola will have Rudolf Schock, Conny, Chris Howland, Paul Kuhn, Sari Barabas, Georges Guetary, Lale Anderson, The Hellberg Duo, Ruth Fischer, Vittorio Casagrande, Nora Nova, Carmita, The Dentler Terzett, Alfons Bauer, and The Kollmannsberger representing them there.

Ralf Bendix is busy recording the "Babysittin' Boogie" in English, despite the Buzz Clifford version, and in Italian. His recording has passed the 700,000 mark here in sales. Lale Anderson has recorded her hit "Wenn Du Heimkommst" in English under the title "Happy Journey and Auf Wiedersehn." She's also done the song in Dutch, French and a special version in the Belgium dialect.

Electrola Records has had such a success with its "Newest From Yesterday" series of records that they have re-released a new crop of "Oldies" on the market. The hits from 10, 20, and 30 years ago are once again becoming top sellers here.

Rolf Budde reports that the "Lucy's Theme From Parrish" has been recorded here by Helmut Zacharias and his magic violins and that several of the American versions of the song have already been released. Rolf is also busy working on "The Sheriff From Arkansas" by Caterina Valente which has passed the 50,000 mark in sales.

Hans Gerig reports that his big push items this month are "La Paloma" by Freddy and new recordings by Ted Herold and Willy Hagara.

We just received the list of artists appearing at the Berlin Fair from Polydor records completing our list of stars from major films appearing. Lolita, Bill Ramsey, Lil Babs, Crazy Otto, Bully Buhlan, Ines Taddio, Ralf Paulsen, Greetje Kauffeld, Freddy, Willy Hofmann, Heinz Erhardt, Maria and Franco Duval, Alfred Hause, Liselotte Malkowsky, and Kurt Edelhagen will all be there.

Palette Records will have The Cousins, Peter Kreuder, Lou Neefs, and Marlene Stolz on hand too.

Hans "Pepe" Wittstatt will pick up a Golden Record at the Fair also for his hit which sold over 2 million in the world.

BENELUX

BELGIUM

Italian wonder Robertino, now a disk success in Belgium. Two EP's and one single have been released under the original Triola label, distributed by Fast Records and sales predict a bright future for the vocalist. He has been invited to appear in popular Flemish TV program "Zeg Hé, Spaar Je Mee?"

September 1 will be A-day for new Latin-American record by Los Ranadas entitled "Soulouwé." Los Ranadas are led by Eddy Ranada, an Indian-born in Suriname. Eddy is a bright composer as well as arranger. He played important roles in Spanish movie pictures. The record will be released simultaneously in Benelux, Germany, Scandinavia and France and a heavy promotion is planned throughout Europe.

Giovanni Zecca, an Italian born singing barber of Eisden (Belgium Limburg), cut his first sides for Fast Records: "Bella Signorina" and "Oh, Gina." Giovanni is a close friend of Rocco Granata and he hopes he may be as successful as his world famous friend Rocco.

Freddy Quinn does it again. After a rather poor "Soviel Träume," he comes up with a sure fire hit, "La Paloma." Initial reaction with dealers is great and Polydor has high hopes for a number one slot.

Famous Dutch vocal combo The Spotlight Partners, which hit the Belgian best sellers with their rendition of oldie "Violetta" will appear on Flemish TV on August 27.

Francis Bay's version of "African Waltz" is very successful in Europe. In Benelux as well as in Germany and France the Bay disk is selling like big.

The first record of The Spotnicks was released last week by Philips, in Belgium as well as in Holland. The Spotnicks is a Swedish guitar-group of excellent quality and their rendition of "The Old Spinning Wheel" is sure to make them popular. The group is managed by Stig Andersen, famous Swedish publisher and writer of "Rockin' Billy" (Klas Goran), the Ria-Valk-record which sold over 100,000 copies in Holland.

Ping Ping, whose recording of "Sucu Sucu" reached the 800,000 sales mark, now touring Scandinavia. This record still sells like hot cakes in Denmark, France and Japan. Ping Ping will appear on television in Berlin on August 31 and then leave for Italy. His new recording "Marianne" b/w "Nix Capito" is selling very well.

Sam And The Saxtones' European hit "Kaput" will be released in the US on September 1 (Kapp Records). Dave Kapp reported "tremendous" acceptance by American disk jockeys in the South, especially in Texas.

HOLLAND

After a concert on August 18 at the famous Kurhaus at the sea side resort Scheveningen, RCA artist Henryk Szeryng will return to Holland in December for a series of concerts, in The Hague, Rotterdam, Utrecht and Amsterdam.

A series of concerts by important American jazz groups were announced last week for next winter season. In October, the Modern Jazz Quartet will give concerts at Amsterdam and The Hague, in November the Dave Brubeck Quartet will come to Holland for an exclusive concert at Amsterdam, and in December Art Blakey And The Jazz Messengers will give concerts at Amsterdam and The Hague.

C. N. Rood L.C. is doing 'Crazy Business' with 'Crazy Love' John Lamers with Cees And The Skyliners made the record "Crazy Love" for release on CNR records. There are two versions, one in Dutch, one in English. The Skyrockets, one of Holland's leading rock groups, made their best CNR record up till now: "Should I" b/w "Gitarren Spielt Auf." Rood is rushing Gary (U.S.) Bonds' "School Is Out" for the Dutch market.

One of the new presentations that will be inaugurated during the forthcoming Bovema Annual Sales Convention is the new-look of Gramophone-house's record club, which will be divided into two separate departments. Subscribers will get the opportunity to choose between a pop and a classical disk or take them both. Modern, attractive lay-outs are being designed by Bovema's Publicity department.

"Rawhide," Sheb Wooley's LP, is very much in demand, says MGM's label manager Frank Visser, through broadcasts and plugging in other directions. Also the idea of releasing a Hank Williams EP with four of his very best numbers met with much approval. Furthermore, there's a Carson Robeson (daddy of hillbilly) recording with square-dances with calls. The interest in Harry James is increasing, especially for his "Spectacular Sounds of Harry James" LP.

Several top French singers are coming to Holland for AVRO TV appearances in the near future. Best known is Juliette Greco, whose records are on the Philips label. Simone Langlois, who made perhaps the greatest impression of all at the recent Knokke Songfestival in Belgium, will be here in October. Also expected is another prominent Fontana artist: Philippe Clay. His best known chanson is "Le Danseur De Charleston."

Re-released in the Philips Giant Jazz Gallery series is the unforgettable album "The Bix Beiderbecke Story," with Bix' greatest recordings, dating from 1927-29. Among them are two tracks with Paul Whiteman And His Orchestra, one being "Oh, Miss Hannah," with a short vocal by young Bing Crosby. Bix' most famous piano composition, "In A Mist," is also included. The record has been released by Phonogram L.C. Henri Coene and his Accordions are heard on Philips' "Accordion Party No. 7" in a selection of current hit tunes from several countries.

Fine ballads Frank Sinatra recorded some ten years ago are put together in a new Fontana LP, titled "Reflections." Among them are the Sinatra versions of "Goodnight Irene" and "Nature Boy," which have not been available here since the days of 78 rpm records. New instrumental group The Guitar Fighters is making a debut on disk with "Si, Si," composed by Lex Vervuurt. Another Fontana single that's making news these days is Marty Robbins' hit version of "Jimmy Martinez," a nice follow-up to "El Paso," which also was one of his own songs.

Bobby Rydell's latest hit "The Fish" released at the end of last week on Columbia. Next release is the Chubby Checker version of "Let's Twist Again."

Mr. Kaiser of Teldec-Hamburg, paid a visit to Rood L.C. Results include a completely reorganized publicity-department for Telefunken in the near future.

The Limburgse Zusjes have a nice Dutch sung version of the catchy "Where Were You" on the Philips label. Anneke Grönloh, popular teenage singer, has a Dutch version by Stan Haag of the Italian hit "Flamenco Rock" on same label. Some months ago, the charming Ann & Joy made their debut on disks with "Vaya Con Dios." The girls have a second disk just out, with "Yellow Bird," recently revived by Arthur Lyman and Lawrence Welk. Flip has the 50 year old evergreen "Let Me Call You Sweetheart," in a modernized version. The Norman Luboc Choir also has "Yellow Bird" on its latest Philips single release. It's backed with a number that is also getting renewed attention these days, "The Boll Weevil Song."

New releases on Bovema's Capitol label last week were: Tennessee Ernie Ford's "Little Red Rockin' Hood," Peggy Lee's "Yes Indeed," Dean Martin's "Sogni d'Oro" (Golden Dreams) and the Judy Garland EP "Judy—That's Entertainment."



ENGLAND

Helen Shapiro, 15-year-old Columbia star, tops the British charts this week with "You Don't Know" establishing herself firmly in the ranks of Britain's top recording stars with her second waxing. Her first "Please Don't Treat Me Like A Child" reached the No. 6 position. Her third disk "Walking Back To Happiness" has been chosen as the subject for a documentary film on the recording industry by The Rank Organization in its "Look At Life" series. Based on an idea by Harold Shampman of Filmusic (who publish the song) the film, featuring Helen, traces the life of a disk from the studio to the consumer and will be screened in 1,500 cinemas in the United Kingdom and 31 overseas territories to coincide with the disk's September release. Helen is currently making TV and concert appearances in Stockholm and Copenhagen.

Pye Records expanding activities in the jazz field with the launching of a new label, Pye-Jazz, on September 5. LP, EP and single releases will include American material from the Chess, Checker and Argo catalogs by artistes including Al Grey, Ahmed Jamal and Nina Simone and British material by Kenny Baker and Bob Wallis. Pye making September a jazz month and the new label will be launched by high pressure advertising and promotion.

The latest British musical destined for Broadway is the highly successful "Stop The World—I Want To Get Off" starring Anthony Newley. American Impresario David Merrick (who has already acquired Lionel Bart's "Oliver!" for New York production in 1962) clinched the deal with Bernard Delfont. Although one of this country's leading impresarios, this will be Delfont's first Broadway venture. As Newley and the London cast will be appearing in the production, it is unlikely that New York will see the show until late in 1962. Another success for Delfont is the current cabaret season at Talk Of The Town by American jazz singer Frances Faye. Following rave notices and capacity audiences the original four-week season has been extended to eight. Frances Faye topped the bill of this week's ATV "Sunday Show."

"King-Kong"—the sensational all-African musical ends its London run in September. After a nation wide tour, the cast leave for a Broadway season in February 1962. The unqualified success of the show represents Africa's first major entry into the world of entertainment.

Two weeks ago saw the London Premiere of "Wildest Dreams" from the pen of Julian Slade and Dorothy Reynolds the team responsible for "Salad Days", the longest running musical in the history of the English theatre with 2,200 performances. Music is published by Francis Day & Hunter and EMI has released an original cast LP on the HMV label.

Bing Crosby makes his first appearance on British TV on August 26. Having previously refused all offers by British TV companies, he was persuaded to make a guest appearance on The Peggy Lee Show for ABC TV. The sequence was just recorded. Crosby will receive no fee but in return Peggy will give him one of his American programs. He is in London to film "The Road To Hong Kong" co-starring Bob Hope.

Into London recently came Frank Sinatra and Dean Martin who, with Peter Lawford, will make a guest appearance in the 'Road' film before flying to the Riviera for a 6-week Mediterranean cruise.

Alas, the recent annual Jazz Festival organized by Lord Montagu and held on the grounds of his Hampshire home at Beaulieu will be the last. This, in no way reflects on the thousands of genuine jazz enthusiasts who supported a program by the best names in British jazz. However, the elaborate precautions taken to prevent an occurrence of last year's hooliganism proved inadequate and once again, the Festival attracted a minority of trouble makers bent on destruction. The damage they did both in the grounds of Beaulieu and in the village itself has forced Lord Montagu to abandon all hope of holding similar festivals in the future.

A reception was given by EMI Records for two famous American musicians—Nelson Riddle and Paul Weston. Riddle is in London to write the score for the Associated British picture "Lolita." Weston is on a holiday visit while his wife Jo Stafford tele-records her series of programs for ATV.

Recent visitor to the Cash Box office: Jan Koopman, well-known dj from AVRO Hilversum, Holland in London to tape interviews with the many top American artistes currently in this city. Koopman is particularly grateful to Peggy Lee for her co-operation whilst recording a 25-minute programme of her record. Other artists interviewed include Rosemary Clooney, Anita O'Day, Jo Stafford and Nelson Riddle.

Ed Sullivan in London securing talent for his American TV show has booked Philips recording artist Roy Castle for April 1962. The signing followed a visit to the London Palladium where Roy is appearing in "Let Yourself Go" and makes his British cabaret debut at "Room At The Top" on December 26 followed by dates in Johannesburg, Durban and Cape Town.

Matt Monro makes his major British cabaret debut at "Room At The Top" on November 13 for 2 weeks. H.R.H. Princess Margaret attended the recent London premiere of the Jerome Robbins "Ballets U.S.A."

Luis Eutierrez, general manager of EMI's Spanish company—Campania de Gramafono-Odeon S.A.E. in Barcelona, in London for discussions with EMI executives regarding plans for the coming season.

This year's Royal Variety Show will be presented by Bernard Delfont at the Prince of Wales theatre on November 6 attended by H.M. Queen Elizabeth, The Queen Mother. All proceeds of the show are donated to the Variety Artists' Federation.

Great Britain won first place in the recent International Song Contest. Knokke, Belgium with a total of 372 points followed by Belgium with 317. The team comprised Carmita, Kathy Kirby, Dick Francis, Ken Kirkham and Tina Valdi.

Eartha Kitt tops the bill of Bernard Delfont's "Sunday Show" for ATV on August 13th. Following extensive plugging of his first disk actor/singer Job Leyton has jumped straight into the charts at No. 13 with "Johnny Remember Me" (Parlophone).

Not long out of the charts with "You'll Never Know" Shirley Bassey this week makes two appearances with both sides of her latest disk "Climb Every Mountain" and "Reach For The Stars" (Columbia).

SCANDINAVIA

Victor Borge in Stockholm for a TV show which got plenty of publicity here; it was described as the most expensive Swedish TV ever made.

Swedish Radio and TV might find difficulties in reaching an agreement with the record companies regarding payment for records aired, according to Anders Holmstedt, head of EMI in Sweden. Holmstedt just returned from Lysekil in western Sweden where EMI in Denmark and Norway had a four days meet to discuss current problems.

The Platters, Cliff Richard, Otto Brandenburg and Helen Shapiro are artists from the EMI stable who have been or are on their way to tours in Sweden. Helen, 14, British bestselling discovery, is set for an engagement at the Gröna Lund-Tivoli here this week.

Frank Guida, producer on the Legrand label in the U.S., is expected in Stockholm on August 15 where he will stay five days, making recordings in English with Lill-Babs, according to Simon Brehm, head of Karusell and Joker Records, and manager of Lill-Babs. "Should her recordings do good in the United States, the William Morris Agency is definitely interested," Brehm said. He also informed Cash Box that her German manager Stefan von Baranski is coming here to discuss recordings in German. A German TV show is also planned for her. Little Gerhard, rock 'n roll star from Karusell, changed his name and now calls himself Lille Gerhard in Sweden when he sings records which are not typical rock 'n roll songs. At the moment Gerhard is on the charts here with the German song "Da Sprach' Der Alte Häuptling" (Than Spoke Old Indian Chief) and a 20 years old Swedish song "Petter and Frida."

Rolf Björling, son of late opera singer Jussi Björling, to United States where he will appear on the Jack Paar and Ed Sullivan shows and give ten concerts. In Sweden, he records for Joker Records.

The Swedish song "Gotländsk Sommar natt" will be recorded in Germany by Bert Kaempfert, reports Lennart Reuterskiöld of Reuter & Reuter who is handling the international distribution of this song, which has been on the best-selling lists in Canada titled "C'est Ma Norvège." The song has been cut in French by Michel Noel on Alouette and Jane Morgan on Kapp. The latter has also made an English-language recording titled "Homesick For New England" for Kapp. Earlier this year, Swedish radio listeners voted this song as "Melody Of The Century."

The Directory Issue of Cash Box was very well received by the subscribers in Scandinavia. Everybody I have been speaking to has been very glad to get the book, which they describe as "a wonderful reference book for the industry." Among the Scandinavian dailies much space has been given to the great success of Jorgen Ingmann, who was voted "most promising instrumentalist" by the American DJs.

Einar Ekberg died here on Aug. 5. He was 56. For many years, Ekberg had been recording on the religious label Hemmets Härold, and was one of Sweden's most wellknown singers of religious songs. He toured the United States several times. The number of recordings he made is estimated at around 400.

Mel Torme, who has just been appearing in Stockholm, is very interested in a couple of Swedish songs, publisher Lennart Reuterskiöld of Reuter & Reuter told Cash Box. After returning to the U.S., Mel will start work on some Swedish songs to see if they have any chances on the American market.

Almost every record company has made "tourist records" for sale to tourists, but despite the fact that there have been more foreign tourists in Sweden this year than last, the sale of tourist records has not been what the companies hoped for.

DENMARK

The strike in Tivoli in Copenhagen, reported in last issue of Cash Box, was postponed just a few hours before it should have started. It is reported that negotiations are going on to solve the problems during the two weeks the strike was postponed.

Danish-American star Victor Borge in Copenhagen for performances. A native of Denmark, he left his country when the Germans occupied the country during World War II, and after a short visit in Sweden, he left for the United States.

NORWAY

"Don't Touch Grieg"—this seems to be the slogan here. Any artist in the pop field who looks at compositions by Edvard Grieg has plenty of problems to face. Around ten years ago, Swedish pianist Charlie Norman made a jazz version of "Anitra's Dance" which, after a trial, was banned. Earlier this year, Kokomo's "Asia Minor" also caused a great outcry by the Grieg Association, which managed to get the recording banned in most of the European countries. A recent arrangement of the "Peer Gynt-Suite" made and recorded by Duke Ellington is the most recent example. So far, the recording has been banned in seven European countries.

Egil Monn Iversen, head of record company with same name and also composer, theatre manager, etc., received a prize for "best film music for a Norwegian film," it was "Line," which has been obtained for world-wide distribution by Warner Bros. The music has also been recorded by the WB label, handled by Egil Monn Iversen A/S in Norway.

ITALY

Bobby Weiss, international director of Warner Bros. Records, arrived in Milan following his around-the-world tour in behalf of the film diskery appointing licensees in the Far West, etc.; to meet with the Italian licensee of WB records, SAAR, plus important meetings with the Italian sub-publisher of Music Publishers Holding Corporation—RICORDI, as well as to meet with the WB film office. Plans were formulated for the Fall sales campaign of WB records in Italy with special emphasis on the original sound-tracks of the WB films, "PARRISH" and "FANNY." Weiss also outlined the new Fall LP product to Messrs. Gurtler and DiGioia of SAAR with an emphasis on the release of new singles in Italy by George Greeley, Connie Stevens, the Everly Brothers, Joanie Sommers, Bob Luman, Dorothy Provine, Joe "Fingers" Carr, etc. During his visit, Weiss revealed that WB had obtained the first foreign release of the recording of "Al Di La" (prize-winner of the San Remo Festival) from Dischi Ricordi last January and that it had been released under the WB label in many international markets, including the US. Weiss noted that with a few exceptions the Italian market had become more nationalistic than ever before with emphasis on the home talent and local songs but still felt optimistic about the future of the American record business in Italy and in particular for the WB label. From Milan, Weiss flew to Barcelona and Madrid for meetings to be followed by a jet tour of Hamburg, Stockholm, Oslo, Copenhagen, London, Berlin, etc.

The other week Tony Dallara phoned us asking to become a subscriber of the Cash Box. He cut a waxing which has big possibilities of hitting: "La Novia." There was a rumor of a strong competitive struggle among our biggest music publishers to get the rights to it. Mr. Sugar won and got the Italian rights. From South America, where Dallara toured just after the last San Remo festival, he first carried to Italy the finest tune (that, to be exact, comes from Argentina) and first recorded it in Italy on the Gurtler label. It's becoming successful. While Mr. Gurtler is the sole and exclusive distributor of Tony's records across Italy, this singer is completely free abroad and his brother and impresario Gino Lardera is just signing contracts with foreign record producers for local distributionships as well as contacting foreign music publishers and impresarios. He is arranging for brother Tony a big world-tour next October to next Xmas which will touch Japan, Australia, South America and US. All foreign impresarios interested in packing Tony for local singing appearances in theatres, night clubs, TV, etc., should write to his brother. The samba "Brigitte Bardot" has got off to a flying start on the radio and on the beaches. The lucky sub-publisher is Caravelle from the well known Barclay Group. The original recording has been waxed under the Barclay label and is the only one available at present. This song is an offensive to bring back into circulation the Samba against the Pachanga.

Since "Bleu Blanc Blond," Marcel Amont has been searching for a new tune. He found this in "Wheels" (Dans Les Yeux De Ma Blonde) the French pe title, which is one of the best sellers in France at the moment. Everybody humming this one. Marcel owes this to Madame Legrand.

The film "Exodus" is being projected quite a lot in France, but the song has not caught on. On the other hand, Chappell has neglected nothing in the way of exploiting and plugging this to try and make it a best seller.

Flash from Pathe Marconi. The best disk seller of Edith Piaf is still without a doubt "Non Je Ne Regrette Rien" and it seems that it will be her best for some time to come. Since her last operation, it will take her some time before she starts singing again. She has cancelled all her engagements. We can only repeat, as we have been doing often for some time now, that she must take things easy.

We met Mr. Tournier of Edition Tutti who gave us certain news concerning the modifications in the Editorial group Tutti Pares, affiliate of Philips. Tutti will specialize in the exploitation of song writers who perform their own material.

It's rather surprising that not one of the songs placed in the finals of the "Coq D Or De La Chanson Francaise" clicked.

Apart from this everybody is deserting the Capital. Lucette Raillat (DDG) continues her singing tour in Paris.

The summer: Eddie and Nicole Barclay have just left for Cannes. Léo Cabat already at Golfe Juan. Francois Minchin (EMI), who voyages a lot, is not in town at this moment of writing. Chappell, Francis Day, Beuscher, etc. . . will either close down or slow down for the Holidays, during August.

Odeon has re-pressed "Du Gris" by Berthe Sylva, a tune that has as much a success as the famous French tobacco of the same name, and is likely to surpass the "Roses Blanches" by the same Berthe Sylva (30,000 LP's are sold each year).

Mimile Prud'homme, one of the most popular accordeonists in France, has made a trip around the world on Odeon LP. "Mimile Globe Trotter" unites the best sellers of 14 countries.

Pierre Mac Orlan of the Goncourt Academy said of Simeone Real the new recruit of Odeon: "Since Frehel no authentic popular songstress has existed . . ."

Odeon disks has just released an LP much in demand by foreign tourists visiting France. This is the "Tour De Notre France," a song illustration of the French Provinces presented by the dynamic Georges Briquet.



CANADA

Don Passerby of CFOX Radio has voiced a complaint which is repeatedly heard by Cash Box in Canada from many disk jockeys and radio stations. He mentioned that the manufacturers should put the amount of recorded time of the label. Although many companies are printing the recorded time, he feels that many manufacturers are neglecting to put this information on their records. The timing of records by the dj's or librarians is a time consuming task which could be avoided if the companies were to simply include this information on their labels, point out the jocks.

Bill Fisher of Phonodiscs reports very strong action on these newies: "That's What Girls Are Made For" by The Spinners on Regency, "Clair de Lune" by Roger Williams, "Summer Souvenirs" by Karl Hammel Jr., and "Little Ruben" by Al Garner on Delta.

Capitol Records, recently closed its Vancouver office and assigned the label to Select Music for distribution in that area.

Art Young reports the opening of two new Canadian labels to be handled by Zirkon. The two new labels are Debbie Records and Record-O-Rama. Debbie is already on the charts with "Princess" by Frank Gari.

Alice Kouri of London Records flying high with, "Pepito" by Los Machucambos, "Last Night" by The Markeys, "The Mountain's High" by Dick and Deede, "Girls, Girls, Girls", by The Coasters on Atco, "Hurt" by Timi Yuro on Liberty, "Let The Four Winds Blow" by Fats Domino on Imperial, "Amor" by Ben J. King on Atco, and "Take Good Care Of My Baby" by Bobby Vee on Liberty.

Mike Lipari of Musimart reports that "Les Enfants Du Piree" by Dalida on Barclay which was released quite a while ago, is enjoying a strong comeback. This is the French version of "Never On Sunday," which is also enjoying a very strong comeback on the English charts by The Chordettes on Cadence. The Limelighters, now with RCA Victor, had their first album on the Elektra label (this label is distributed in Canada by Musimart.) Mike Lipari, by the way, represented Canada as a weight lifter at the Olympic Games in Rome.

"A Qu'il Petit Coeur Apres Neuf Heures", the big French Canadian record has sold over 100,000 records. This was due to the combined efforts of Roger Miron on RCA Victor and Marcel Martel on Apex. There were other versions, but these two recordings took the honors as the coin getters. Another very big French Canadian recording which has done unusually well in the history of the French industry is "Le Rapide Blanc" by Oscar Thiffault.

Bill Haley, who now appears in Canada under the Zirkon banner, currently appearing at the Montana Inn in Quebec.

Fred Roy has formed a new country label called Acadia Records. First releases will include Larry Harvey and Jack Silvers of CJSS-TV in Cornwall, Ontario.

Ron Richards of Arc Sound reports four new releases in its Somerset line. New items include the 101 Strings in "Hawaii Paradise," "La Pachanga" by Rafael Seijo, "Strictly For Dancing" by The Statler Dance Orchestra, and "Around The World In Percussion" by Irv Cottler.

Leo Label, Montreal D J with CJMS Radio, reports that his Hi-Fi Coca Cola Club will be visiting different welfare institutions in and around the island of Montreal with his Hi-Fi members.

Michel Louvain's look alike Dave Boxer is now with CFCF-TV. Dave was previously with CKGM Radio.



AUSTRALIA

This column ran a paragraph two weeks ago which was later proved to be incorrect. It said that Lyle Richardson had been appointed as A&R chief of Australian Record Company. The Cash Box has since been advised that no such appointment has ever been made and we regret any concern that may have been caused as a result of the story.

Cash Box is very grateful for the many congratulatory messages and calls received following the Special 19th Anniversary Directory Issue. This issue has been hailed by the entire trade as undoubtedly the most valuable and useful worldwide trade guide ever assembled in one publication.

The Joy Boys, Col Joye's instrumental group, are having a great deal of sales success with their revival of the old jazz piece "Smokey Mokes." Released on the Festival label, it is currently one of the hottest singles in Sydney and its popularity should soon overflow into other States to become a national hit.

The mention of national hits brings us to one of the leading topics throughout the record industry in Australia. Cash Box has received many reports from record company executives—mainly those producing local products—expressing concern over the difficulties facing record companies in their efforts to develop singles into national hits. This problem seems to confront mainly those companies recording artists from Sydney and Melbourne. A great number of records featuring Sydney stars find it tough going trying to break through in Melbourne and the same applies to disks by Melbourne artists who are hard pressed to get off the ground in Sydney. While this situation exists, it is becoming increasingly difficult for a label to produce national hits. Probably the one exception at the moment is Col Joye as Col's disks are warmly accepted by DJs in all States and this affords them every chance of Australia-wide sales success. But outside of Col Joye, there are many fine disks by Australian talent that are enjoying fairly consistent sales response in individual States with little or no chance of national popularity.

Local record producers are naturally very deeply concerned that such a situation exists because if it continues it must of a necessity—mainly through economical reasons—bring about a curtailment of the number of records being locally produced. This would be a tragedy at a time like this when the general standard of the local disk is reaching a stage of worldwide acceptance. Several record companies have invested large sums of money in studios, equipment, staff and the development and promotion of Australian talent only to see their pioneering efforts thwarted by the isolated State—only acceptance of their disks when many of them deserve national rewards. No record company expects all of its disks to go into overnight success right throughout Australia because, of course, there is a percentage of poor records produced here just as there is in any other part of the world—but, if a single should win solid sales support—genuine support—in one State it is obvious that it has what it takes for national success as there is not a great difference in the tastes of record buyers State for State in any one country.

In the interests of future development of the Australian record industry and Australian talent, Cash Box urges everyone that is in the position to do so to give serious consideration to the part that each responsible person throughout the entire industry can play to support—without prejudice—the best of all local records being produced. There are vast frontiers to be conquered by the Australian record industry which can open tremendous opportunities for a self-supporting operation.

All of a sudden we are breaking out in a whole rash of singles of "Lil Ole Me." This number—which hasn't done anything startling overseas—is the subject of three singles that have been issued during the past couple of weeks. Young Sydney pianist Warren Carr has cut "Lil Ole Me" on a Leedon single, W & G released the Johnny Rand version from the Herald-Ember group and the Pye label has a locally cut rendition by the Brass Monkeys.

Following on the success of "Dollar Down" by The Limelites, RCA made a rush release of the same group with "Paco Peco."

Among some of the latest singles from the EMI organization are Bobby Rydell with "The Fish" and Linda Scott's "Don't Bet Money Honey" both on Columbia; the London label carries "Should I" by The String-Alongs and Jan & Dean with "Heart And Soul"; and on the HMV label is local lad Grade Wicker with what is without doubt one of the finest disks yet produced here—an up tempo performance of a traditional number "The Wild Colonial Boys." This one has all the earmarks of a hit right from Grade Wicker's vocal down through Geoff Harvey's arrangement and backing.

MEXICO

Radio 6.20 and Radio Mil of México City last week broadcast the 20 winners of the Spanish music Festival of Benidorm, in which "Enamorada" (In Love) took first place and Ana María Parra was elected the best female singer. The majority of these songs have not caused any impact among Mexican listeners. Anyhow, some of these songs are going to be recorded here with national artists.

Under the Columbia label, the beautiful Armel Sisters recorded the Greek song "Las Chicas Sonrientes de Grecia" (The Smilin' Girls of Greece) and the number one Argentinian song "Moliendo Café." The Armel Sisters are now preparing a new tour through South America.

RCA introducing its low-priced RCA Camden line here, and the catalog will be composed with the best of old recordings by Mexican artists like Trio Calavera, Genaro Salinas, Pedro Vargas, Lola Flores, Hnas. Aguila, Los Bribones, Luis Arcaraz, Trio Tariácuri, Nestor Mesta Chaires, Lira de San Cristóbal, Juan García Equivel and many others who recorded these songs for RCA some years ago.

César Roldán, manager and shareholder of Discomoda, a Venezuelan label, made a business trip to México and came to an agreement with Peerless Records in which each firm will handle the other's label in its country.

After a short vacation in Argentina, folk singer, Miguel Aceves Majía returned to México in company of his Argentinian wife. Miguel will start to record a new album for RCA, and make some theater appearances.

Competition between stations in México City is getting tougher each day. Two of the most important radio organizations are giving away between 80 and 100 dollars to people who say they are listening to the radio stations they represent. And if asked a few days later if they are still listening to the same stations, they get another 80 or 100 dollars. The consequences is that ratings are not true and advertising agencies are complaining about it, because almost all the people are saying that they are listening to the stations even if they are not. So, the Radio Chamber of México is going to intervene to prohibit this type of promotion from "home to home."

While César Costa recorded at Orfeon label the numbers "Baila Muchachita" (Dance Little Girl) and "Muchacho Naturalista" (Nature Boy), Enrique Guzmán, the other popular young rock and roll singer, cut at Columbia Records the songs "Gotas de Lluvia" (Raindrops) and "Creación" (Creation).

Another member of the Prieto's artists family is getting a big push from RCA. She is Chela Prieto, sister of singer Antonio and composer and arranger Joaquín. Last hit of Antonio Prieto was his interpretation of Joaquín's song "La Novia," which at the moment has sold almost 300,000 records in Argentina. The Prieto's family is original of Chile but now live in México. Chela sings with a very personal style and her first records are "Y Anoche, Una Pena y Una Cariño" (Last night, a Disillusion and an Affection) and "De Donde" (From Where), both of them new Joaquín compositions.

Lucho Gatica, who is again in México, recorded at Musart his Spanish version of "Las Verdes Hojas del Verano" (Green Leaves of Summer) and the popular national song "La Enorme Distancia" (The Enormous Distance). Lucho will reappear on TV on the new Musart's show with Cuban singer Olga Guillot, Cuban vocal group Los Columbus and the Mexican orchestra of Carlos Campos.

Another version of Argentinian best seller "Moliendo Café" was recorded with the Navarro's Sisters at RCA with Luis Gonzales' orchestra. The Navarro's are appearing successfully here.

Night life is getting worse each day in Mexico City. Two of the most popular night clubs, El Patio and Los Globos, closed their doors. Owners say that it is because the government prohibits cover charge and minimum. This could be very dangerous for the tourist trade.



JAPAN

2,806,645 records were produced during June by Japanese diskeries, according to monthly statistics released by the Japan Phonograph Record Association (JPRA). Out of 1,670,136 copies of local tunes, 422,504 were LP's; 46,402 EP's; 1,043,133 singles and 158,117 78's were still available. On foreign tunes, 588,980 copies were LP's; 29,255 EP's; 518,274 singles, totaling 1,136,509. 382,693 stereo disks were produced. These figures indicate that 14% more disks were turned out than the previous month.

44 RCA Victor disks will go out of print effective August 15. Those to be discarded include 29 classical LP's and 19 LP's of the Argentina tango.

Westminster decided to release a special series in stereo: "Great Works Collected for Family Listeners"; Schubert's "Ave Maria" by Philadelphia Symphony Orchestra with Stokowski directing and other selections.

American Westminster, released here by Nippon Westminster for 7 years, was re-established via its recent purchase by ABC Paramount.

Mari Iwamoto, first-rate classical violinist, will join Toshiba Records in the near future.

The executive committee of 1961 Record Festival asked NHK (Japan Broadcasting Corporation) to help in broadcasting two new shows by the Japan Phonograph Association (JPRA): "Popular Song Festival by New Artists" and "Joint Concert by JPRA's Member Diskeries." These shows will be held in Tokyo and other cities on November 3. NHK is the one and only non-commercial radio-TV network here.

There Are Several Paths To

This Inevitable Increase

**The 60-40
Commission
Arrangement**

Today's coin machine operator finds himself pretty much in the position of the candy store owner selling a 2¢ plain. The question is not whether he should increase the price of the seltzer but rather *how* he should go about it in order to continue selling seltzer at a profit.

Today's operator must first recognize the need for a change in the antiquated 50-50 commission arrangement and then proceed to outline just *how* this increased 60-40 arrangement can be brought about. A realistic margin of profit must be sought in view of the increased costs of equipment and labor.

We have discussed this topic before, the most recent editorial appearing in our July 1st issue and since that time several constructive programs have been submitted by responsible men in our business.

The most recent large-scale program involving a 60-40 commission presentation to location owners was made three weeks ago when the Bilotta Distributing Company of upstate New York hosted several hundred location owners, along with hundreds of operators and disk jockeys, during an evening that had as part of its overall purpose, proposal of the 60-40 commission arrangement to location owners.

Part of the plan to achieve the hike in commission, which also featured a minimum, was the offer of new equipment for the location which in turn would result in increased earnings and at least as much money for the owner as he received when the 50-50 split was in force. A new bowler priced at 25¢ per play, and a ten-tunes-for-fifty-cents programming feature were explained as money-makers that would increase earnings in the locations. The owner would now receive 40% of a greater amount, the operator 60%, and the new arrangement would make possible the purchase of the new machines and the increased collections. Location owner interest was keen, according to reports from the area, and follow-up calls will undoubtedly be made. This is just one way to propose an increased commission arrangement to locations.

Another way might be to do the same thing but with a sponsorship of several groups, all with the same goal in mind. Perhaps in this way area-wide changes could be made eliminating the need for location-by-location programs, one of the reasons the "dime play" movement dragged.

It appears as if the offer of new equipment will almost certainly be a part of any deal calling for greater percentages for the operator. Operators must be ready to give, as well as take. The mention of minimums, made earlier, might also be part of a new deal. New equipment without a minimum arrangement is bad business.

Each operator knows, or should know, his location. They all aren't 60-40 potential. But the average location on 50-50 must be changed to a 60-40 arrangement and the sooner, the better.

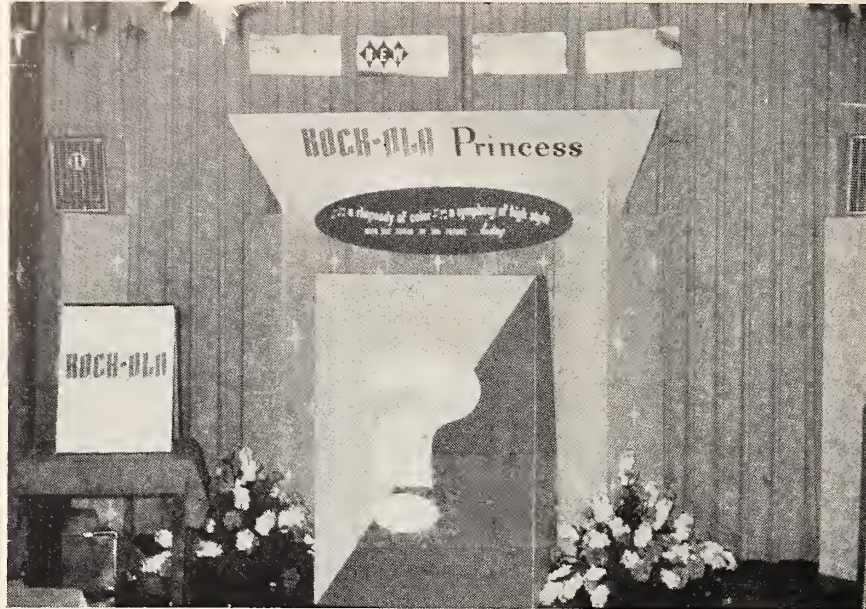
Rock-Ola Distribs Show New "Princess" Phono

Nationwide Operator Showings Start This Week On Optimistic Note

CHICAGO—After two weeks of regional distributor meetings in four major cities, the Rock-Ola Manufacturing Corporation set its sails for nationwide operator showings starting this week, August 13, in distributor showrooms across the United States and Canada, terming the week-long premiere "Princess Week," after the 1961 Rock-Ola phonograph, "Princess."

The wholesalers saw the phonograph in New York, New Orleans, San Francisco and Chicago during a 14-day road trip led by Ed Doris, vice-president in charge of sales, and Donald Rockola, who has been responsible for the design of the Rock-Ola phonograph during the last few years. Rock-Ola Company executives assisted Doris and Rockola during the distributor premieres and general reaction from the outset was highly favorable. The machine is designed differently from the 1960 "Regis" line. Specifications with complete details will be released next week after the trade has seen the phonograph during the showings.

The firm's distributors were very satisfied with the sales program and pricing arrangement for the coming year and reports from at least seven different territories during telephone interviews by Cash Box last week indicated that sales had already started

big with orders being taken on the sole demonstration model available in most distributor showrooms during the pre-showing week. Reports indi-

cated that total orders ranging from six to twenty machines were on distributor books and the outlook very optimistic.

Frank Mitchell, Ralph Wyck and Jack Barabash traveled the country with the Doris-Rockola team and meetings evidently resulted in distributor interest and enthusiasm.

While many distributors were scheduled to begin formal showings on Sunday (8/13) some were planning in-showroom festivities during the week-long show with light refreshment and beverages.

A unanimous attitude was evinced in talking with Rock-Ola distributors in every section of the country and was one of respect and high regard for the Rock-Ola leadership.

Wholesalers were openly frank in making it a point to compliment Rock-Ola execs mentioning the manner in which distributors were treated, sales policies of the company and general personality traits of the Rock-Ola brass. In the words of one Rock-Ola distributor, "They sell themselves as well as the machine, and they do this every time we come in contact with them. The Rock-Ola executives are very nice people."

Invitations were mailed to every operator in the country last week giving of the dates and time of showings.

CMC Membership Lags; Lack Of Funds Termed "Alarming"

Committee To Decide Fate Of Industry's PR Future After 90-Day Wait

CHICAGO—The executive committee of the Coin Machine Council, the national public relations organization for the coin machine industry, issued a stern statement Tuesday, August 8, during an important session in the Morrison Hotel in this city, to the effect that unless the committee's urgent demands for a considerable increase in support from the coin machine trade is evidenced within the next 90 days it will be regrettably necessary to disband and dissolve the organization due to the alarming lack of funds.

The organization had been wrestling for several months with the realization that all of its efforts to overcome the existing lack of support and apathy has been increasing rather than lessening, despite the concentrated efforts to spark the vitally necessary membership drive.

The entire committee—president Lou Casola, secretary Herb Jones, vice presidents O. L. (Bob) Slifer and Les Montooth, and directors Clinton S. Pierce and Andy Hesch—considered it uniquely ironic that, despite the fact that the public relations effort over the past year has proven successful in regards to accomplishments in most communications and in the creation of a more

desirable image in the minds of civic leaders and national legislators as well as the consumer press, it may be necessary to dissolve the Coin Machine Council unless there is considerably more support engendered among the coin machine industry's operators, manufacturers, distributors and jobbers.

For example, in 1960, 244 new operator members were enrolled, Renewals in 1961 dropped alarmingly to 112, with 147 new members. Distributor and jobber members in 1960 numbered 77. Less than 43% renewed in '61. Actually, according to the CMC executive committee, 44 members in this category dropped out this year.

Another drastic slash was evidenced this year among the nation's manufacturing concerns. Presently only a few manufacturers have remained among the membership, and prospects dwindled considerably.

The painful fact, as expressed by the committee, is that it is inconceivable that such a dire predicament can possibly exist despite the tremendous, consistent support given the Coin Machine Council by the industry's trade press.

"This is a sad commentary," said one committee member in evaluating the direful situation. "We seem to be

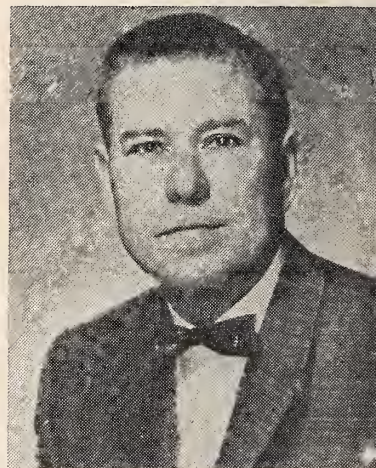
haphazardly walking on a treadmill."

During the 90 day trial period, commencing immediately, the public relations council will initiate an intensive mailing campaign to be distributed throughout all facets of the coin machine industry in a concerted effort to create a considerably healthier membership and to arouse more interest, especially among the nation's operators.

"We don't want a 'pat on the back' for our past accomplishments," the committee stated, "what we need is the financial support and cooperation from everyone in the industry, or else we will be forced to dissolve the CMC corporation. Don't let this happen!"

Despite the somber air of the meeting in the Morrison Hotel the committee proceeded with the important business of electing new officers and the board of directors in hopes that it will be possible to continue its intensive public relations campaign during and after the 90 day trial period.

Re-elected for the next term of office were Lou Casola, president; Herb Jones, Bally vice president, as secretary; Herb Oettinger (United Mfg. vice president), treasurer. New vice presidents include Les Montooth, Harold Lieberman (re-elected), Bob Slifer and Jack G. Bess.

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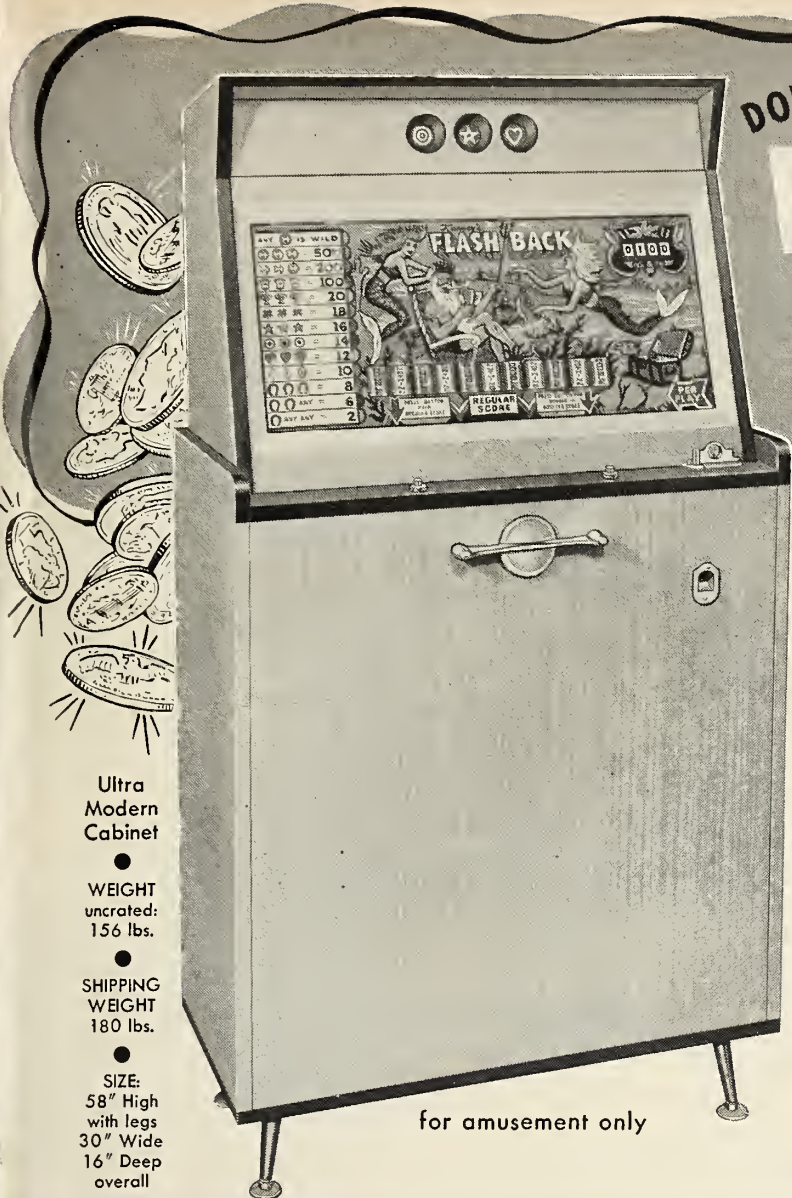

Connecticut Health Rules Discussed

CHICAGO—Six representatives of the National Automatic Merchandising Association and its Connecticut state council conferred with officials of the Connecticut Department of Consumer Protection to help set up administrative procedures under the new state health regulations for vending at a meeting in Hartford on Wednesday, July 26, according to Louis Grossman, president of the council.

Tentative agreement was reached on a number of administrative procedures of the new Connecticut Vending Inspection Law, said David E. Hartley, NAMA public health counsel, who acted as industry consultant at the meeting.

As a result of the meeting, the following proposals are being made:

Operators would provide their own machine identification tags in metal or plastic, bearing the state identification, the operator's identification number and a serial number (as set up by the operator). The operator's company name and address can be included, if desired.

The operator would keep a record of numbers he assigns and tags would be permanent.

The operator license numbers would be renewed each year, but not changed.

Sanitary regulations promulgated by the state commissioner under the law would be uniform with the U. S. Public Health Service Code insofar as possible.

Provisions to be made so that existing equipment which is safe to operate can be continued in use.

The vending representatives agreed to provide a list of all known Connecticut operators so that the Commission can mail the required forms under the new law to all concerned, avoiding unwitting violation by operators.

At the Commissioner's request, the vending group submitted samples of suggested inspection score sheets, and operator and machine license applica-

tion forms, Hartley said.

Other matters discussed at the meeting included inspection methods, training schools for state inspectors and legal opinion expected from the state attorney general regarding local exemption provisions. Hartley said further meeting is scheduled next month.

"It is important to note that the Commissioner invited vending representatives to assist him in drawing administrative regulations and that this spirit of cooperation is for the benefit of the public as well as the vending operator in Connecticut," Hartley commented.

State officials present were Commissioner Attilio R. Frassinelli, Division Director Harold Clark and Earl Smith, senior inspector.

In addition to Grossman and Hartley, the following represented NAMA and the state council: Morris Gottlieb, Sidney Diamond, Julien Brightman and Ed Isenberg.

United Fund Cup Program

CHICAGO—Operator members of the National Automatic Merchandising Association will assist United Fund and Community Chest campaigns this year for the 11th time, according to W. J. Manning, Jr., chairman of the association's public relations committee.

Manning said that five manufacturers of vending cups are offering cooperation by imprinting the approved "United Way" message on cups without extra charge to the customers.

"A special survey of operators this summer disclosed that over 75 percent of our operators who offer beverages want to participate in the hometown public service project," Manning said. Only a small minority of operators did not consider the program worthwhile in the survey of 1,300 companies.

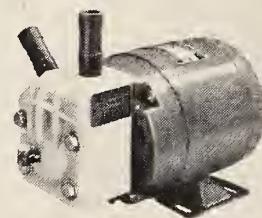

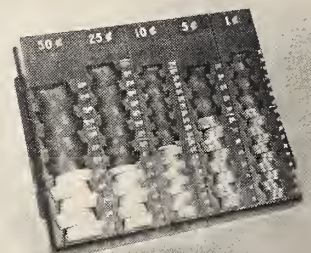

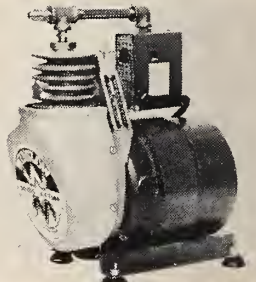

Roulette Records Will Issue Disks For Juke Boxes

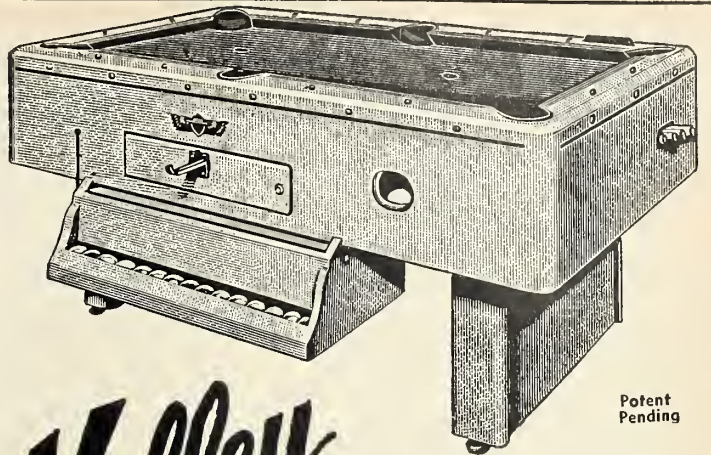

Queen Mary Will Try Slots On Next Voyage

SOUTHAMPTON, ENGLAND—Simultaneous articles appeared last week in the nation's press detailing the Cunard Steamship Company, famed passenger liner firm with headquarters in London.

The first feature to be released advised that the steamship line was awaiting approval from the British government for launching of its own airline company, a step that has been decided upon by the Cunard board to offset decreasing traffic on the company's famous Queens—the Mary and the Elizabeth.

The second story outlined as to how the Cunard Queen Mary would install slot machines for the next voyage across the Atlantic. The company said the idea was "an experiment."

"They have been installed to amuse the passengers," stated a Cunard press item. "We will see how they appeal to the customers," continued the Cunard official release.

Twenty machines in all, the slots were to be dispersed throughout the ship with five for the first class, ten for cabin class, and five in tourist. The "study" will require three round trip voyages, said the company.



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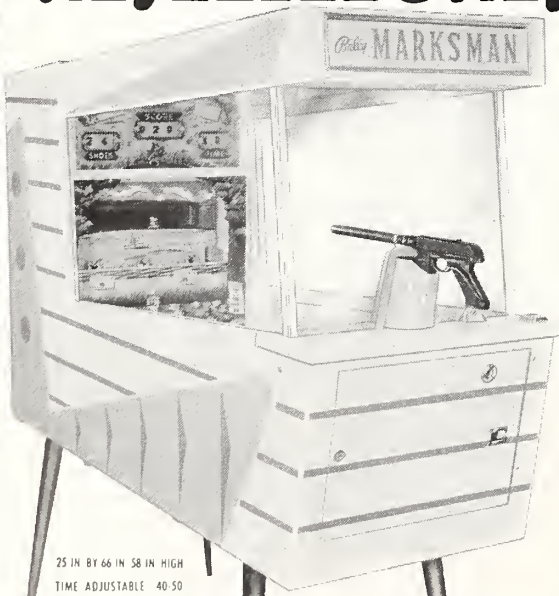
