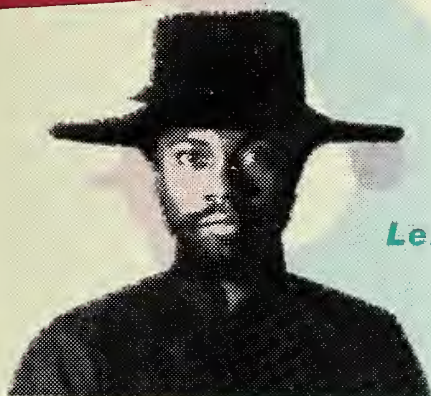

EDITORIAL

Polygram Boosts U.S. Operation

The Polygram Group's increasing emphasis toward the U.S. market took another major step this week with the announcement of some executive appointments: Fred Haayen to the presidency of Polydor; Irwin Steinberg to chairman of Polydor, Phonogram and Phonodisc and Dr. Ekke Schnabel as senior vice president of Polydor and Phonogram.

These appointments, in addition to recent statements by Coen Solleveld, president of the worldwide Polygram group, that he intends to spend more time in the U.S., reiterate that the American market is definitely a priority for the firm in 1978.

A major force in the record industry worldwide, the Polygram group has not been satisfied with its results in the U.S. There now appears to be "get serious" philosophy concerning the American

market from the company with both financial and time commitments to reverse the situation.

Previously, Polygram scored sporadic successes, and maintained a low profile in this country. But, this attitude has changed. Recent agreements with Casablanca, De-Lite and Capricorn, in addition to the existing arrangements with RSO and Island, have beefed up the company's base in the U.S. Also, new attitudes of accessibility and visibility are becoming more predominate.

We congratulate the Polygram group on its recent moves and individually congratulate each of the new appointees.

Another active and vital force in the American record community can only help the record industry as a whole.

Century Chain's Four AOR Stations Air New Wings Album Prior To Release

LOS ANGELES — Paul McCartney And 'Wings' new "London Town" album was aired the weekend of Feb. 24 and 25 prior to its official release over the Century Broadcasting chain's four stations until Century received "cease and desist" telegrams from Capitol Records and MPL Communications, McCartney's publishing company.

Bob Burch, national program director for Century Broadcasting Corp., released the advance recording of Wings' soon-to-be-released album to the four AOR stations Friday, Feb. 24. The stations — KWST-Los Angeles, WABX-Detroit, KSHE-St. Louis and KMEL-San Francisco — played the recording in its entirety Friday and Saturday (Feb. 25) until Burch and Century received letters from Capitol and MPL asking the company to "cease and desist" further airplay.

Burch offered no comment on how he obtained the recording but said nobody at Capitol Records is responsible.

A spokesman in Capitol's legal affairs department said, "It is our understanding they have pulled it. It was a mistake all the way around but now everything is settled between us." The spokesman said Capitol would seek no further action against Century. "I can't see why, as far as Capitol is concerned. I can't speak for the publisher or anybody else."

So far, no release date has been set for the LP even though recording is finished. A Capitol spokesman said McCartney requested some last minute changes in cover

ASCAP, Public Broadcasters Still Opposed On Licensing Plan As Hearing Date Looms

by Joanne Ostrow & Ken Terry

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Reports recently filed with the Copyright Royalty Tribunal by ASCAP and by public broadcasters reveal that these groups' positions on license fees are still very far apart. In an effort to resolve their differences, the Tribunal has scheduled hearings on public broadcasting rates for March 7.

ASCAP believes that license fees and terms of performance for public TV and radio should be based on those for the commercial media. Applying similar percentages to the public broadcasters, ASCAP came up with a fee of \$3.6 million, based on 1976 revenues.

In contrast, the Public Broadcasting Copyrights Project (representing PBS and NPR) estimated that, under an established rate structure, public broadcasters would owe ASCAP a total music payment of \$750,000 per year.

Discrepancy

The discrepancy between the two figures is due to the fact that ASCAP wants a percentage formula rather than a flat rate applied to public broadcasting license fees. BMI and SESAC have already signed blanket license agreements with the public broadcasters which are based on use of their catalogs. Dismissing these precedents, ASCAP is trying to convince the Tribunal that the rate should be based on each public broadcasting entity's gross income. Four schedules of license terms would be arranged for local TV stations, TV

networks, local radio stations and radio networks.

Licensing By Performance

ASCAP argued against licensing performances broadcast over member stations, which was jointly proposed by PBS and NPR. ASCAP said that PBS programs take up only two-thirds of all public TV broadcast hours, and that NPR programs account for only about 10% of public radio's hours.

Capitol, Phonodisc Post Wholesale Pricing Changes

LOS ANGELES — Capitol Records and Phonodisc, the distribution arm of the Polygram Group, are establishing new wholesale pricing structures, **Cash Box** has learned.

Both companies' new policies institute three-tier pricing; and as in WEA's recently announced wholesale pricing system (**Cash Box**, Feb. 4), Phonodisc and Capitol set up distinctions among different types of dealers. WEA's pricing, however, awards discounts based on an account's dollar volume, which neither Capitol nor Phonodisc recognize in their new systems.

In a letter dated Feb. 27 from Phonodisc to its accounts, Phonodisc announced its new system which involves a price increase

Paul Simon Joins WB After 14 Years With Columbia

LOS ANGELES — A statement issued last week by Paul Simon confirmed reports (**Cash Box**, March 4) that the recording artist is going to Warner Bros. Records after he fulfills his current contract obligations with Columbia Records.

Issued March 2 from the artist's New York office, the statement said, "Paul Simon announced today that he has signed an exclusive long-term recording agreement with Warner Bros. Records. Mr. Simon will begin delivering records to Warner Bros. after the completion of his present recording commitment to Columbia Records."

"The switch to Warner Bros. coincides with Paul Simon's plans to broaden his activities in the movies, television and the theatre," the statement said.

No further comment was available from Simon's office concerning the length of the new contract or how much money is involved. At least one published report, however, estimates the deal at \$2 million per album. Simon still owes Columbia a reported one or two albums under the terms of his current deal. Simon first joined Columbia, with Art Garfunkel, in 1964.

Although Simon's solo albums have not reached the sales heights he achieved as part of Simon & Garfunkel (their "Bridge Over Troubled Water" would be several times platinum by today's standards), each of his five solo efforts has been certified gold.

His latest album, "Greatest Hits, Etc.," recently went platinum. It is his only album released after platinum record certification was instituted Jan. 1, 1976. As a result, his decision to change reportedly is not based primarily on sales considerations, but other factors.

A multiple Grammy Award winner, Simon is one of the few artists ever to sweep

ASCAP Revenues Surpass \$100 Million For First Time

LOS ANGELES — ASCAP revenues set an all-time high in 1977 as combined domestic and foreign receipts exceeded \$102 million, according to an announcement made during a recent west coast membership meeting.

Paul Marks, managing director of ASCAP, commented that the record level of income "reflected the steady growth of the entertainment industry in general and ASCAP in particular." He also noted that 1978 presents new challenges. "As a result of the new copyright law, there are additional users of music who are now clearly liable to pay writers and publishers for the right to perform."

Domestic receipts for 1977 totaled \$87.5 million surpassing the 1976 figure of \$80.3 million. A breakdown of domestic revenues showed that \$85.9 million came from licenses (including symphonic and concert), up from \$78.4 million in the previous year; \$1.2 million from interest on investments, down from \$1.6 million; membership dues, \$342,000 up from \$294,000. Receipts from foreign societies amounted to \$14.9 million,

up from \$13.7 million.

The balance available for distribution after deducting salaries and expenses amounted to \$67 million, an increase of approximately \$6 million over 1976. The cost of operating the Society in 1977 was 19.8 percent of total income as against the 19.9 percent level of the previous year. 11 additional employees were hired by ASCAP during the year, bringing the work force to 684 — 514 at the home office and 170 at the branch offices. Total salaries and expenses for 1977 amounted to \$20.3 million.

Quarterly Disbursements

The 1977 quarterly disbursements were as follows: March, \$12.6 million; June, \$13.5 million; Sept., \$19.4 million; and Dec., \$21.3 million.

Total outstanding advances to members were \$3 million, up from \$2.3 million in 1976. A management review of 1977 advances deemed that \$55,000 was non-recoupable.

Foreign Distribution

A July 22 foreign distribution, totaling \$5.7 million, represented monies due ASCAP members from the following countries: England, \$2.3 million; France 1975, excluding film, \$973,000; Germany 1975, \$1.5 million; Sweden 1975, \$438,000; and other countries \$487,000.

On Dec. 23, \$8.5 million was distributed for 1975 to the following countries: Australia, \$742,000; Austria, \$319,000; Belgium, \$272,000; Canada, \$3.3 million; Denmark, \$233,000; France, for film, \$439,000; Holland, \$467,000; Italy, \$597,000; Japan, \$563,000; Spain, \$201,000; Switzerland, \$337,000; and other countries, \$1.1 million.

CPI Raps Times, Denies Charges

NEW YORK — Columbia Pictures Industries, parent company of Arista Records, has issued a blistering denial of allegations contained in a *New York Times Magazine* story of February 26.

The story, by Lucian Truscott IV, stated that Allen & Co., which has a controlling interest in the company, had been trying to sell its stock, and attempted to coverup the David Begelman matter so as not to depress the stock price.

Begelman has been reinstated by the board of directors as president of the motion picture and TV division after admitting to cashing company checks made out to others.

Alan Hirschfield, president of Columbia Pictures Ind., said the reinstatement by unanimous board vote was done in the "best interests" of the company, its employees and shareholders. Hirschfield added that he has been assured by Herbert Allen, of Allen & Co., that no negotiations to sell CPI have taken place.

A lawsuit by Allen & Co. against the newspaper was filed prior to the appearance of the *Times* story last Sunday, and in anticipation of the article, trading in CPI stock was halted on February 24.

"Our company deplores the misstatements, errors of fact, and innuendo concerning Columbia contained in this article," Hirschfield said. "... We have a deep respect for freedom of the press... but it is our view that Mr. Truscott's article goes beyond the bounds of propriety and is irresponsible."

Diener Pledges ABC Support To Indies At 1st Distrib Meet

LOS ANGELES — ABC Records' first annual distributors meeting began with a pledge from ABC president Steve Diener that the label would stay with independent distributors despite what he called a trend away from them.

Speaking at the meeting held Feb. 25 at Los Angeles' Century Plaza Hotel, Diener told the group of about 75 representatives from ABC's 19 distributors, "We have absolutely no desire to change our current distribution which was set up several months ago."

Announced Last Oct.

ABC announced last October its decision to retain branch offices in Los Angeles and New York but serve the rest of the country through independents.

"We changed in five weeks what people thought would take us six months," Diener

NEW YORK — A story on page seven of last week's *Cash Box* stated that CBS Records Group's 1977 earnings were \$63.9 million. Actually, they totalled \$79.9 million. Additionally, the story's headline stated that CBS Records Group expected its profits to remain stable in 1978, when in fact the music division anticipates stability in its profit margins.

There was also a factual omission in the reporting of remarks made by Walter Yetnikoff, president of CBS/Records Group, before a group of security analysts. Yetnikoff told the analysts that prior to the allocation of corporate overhead, CBS/Records Group's profits for 1977 were \$97.7 million. He further stated that, if CBS did not expense artists' contracts and adopted the practice of capitalizing them, CBS/Records Group's 1977 profits would have exceeded \$97.7 million.

Tom Robinson Band

The logo of the Tom Robinson Band, or TRB, is a clenched fist which, Robinson says, stands for togetherness, not violence.

"The fist represents solidarity," Robinson says, whose songs reflect a number of social-conscious themes relating to his native Britain. Besides "2-4-6-8 Motorway," which was a Top Five hit in the U.K., the TRB's songs include a version of Bob Dylan's "I Shall Be Released," "Don't Take No For An Answer," "Right On Sister" and "Glad To Be Gay."

Those titles give evidence of Robinson's concern with human rights, whether for gays, women, prisoners, blacks or other minorities. Robinson said the main focus of his songs is not the minorities' mistreatment, or those doing the mistreating, but those he calls "fence straddlers," who he says are as prevalent in the U.S. as they are in Britain.

"Apathy rules," he says. "People are not prepared to realize their liberty is at stake. I don't want to preach to the converts. It's the people who are supporting Mary Whitehouse (an anti-gay campaigner) who need a good kick in the rear; they need to be challenged."

One problem with trying to help the minority rights cause, he said, is the lack of unity among the minorities.

Blacks, Robinson says, don't want to be lumped in with prisoners, who in turn refuse to be associated with unwed mothers, who themselves don't want to be connected with gays. "They are all putting each other down," he says, "but when the National Front (an extreme right-wing political coalition) takes over, we'll all be in jail together."

"The thing music can do," Robinson says, "is bring people together." Falling generally within the category of "new wave" music, the TRB's music is uncomplicated, basic rock 'n roll.

"There is so much self-indulgence today with groups like Genesis and Yes. It isn't people's music. There is no room anymore for a young musician to get off in a band. Now," Robinson says, "there is a return to the roots; this is rebel music."

In the TRB with Robinson, who plays bass, sings lead and writes, are Danny Kustow, who sings and plays lead guitar, Mark Amber on keyboards and Brian Taylor on drums. Their first album, due on Capitol sometime in April, is being produced by Chris Thomas, who produced the Sex Pistols.

"Once a group like the Ramones, whose tongue is firmly in cheek, breaks in, then ears will be turned to the Clash, whose music is similar but whose message is radically different. Then all hell will break loose."

He added that for the new wave movement to be successful, it will need one dynamic, charismatic figure to emerge, like Elvis Presley in the '50s or the Beatles in the '60s. The movement would have a good leader in Tom Robinson.

Kim Fowley Pacts With Entertainment Company

LOS ANGELES — Kim Fowley has been signed by The Entertainment Company to produce selected projects. Fowley's first project will be a new Helen Reddy LP for Capitol Records.

Fowley, who has been awarded 54 gold and 11 platinum records for his songwriting, production and publishing



Dragon

If developing artists are the lifeblood of the record business, then Portrait recording artists Dragon feel they have what it takes to win respect. Their debut U.S. release, simply titled "Dragon," features a refreshing, down-home style of pop-rock that should sit comfortably with any AOR playlist.

Dragon was born in 1972 in its members' native New Zealand. The group released two albums on Phonogram and worked to become that country's top rock act. But in 1975, the band had reached the saturation point in their homeland and moved to Sydney, Australia. "It was complete culture shock," recalled vocalist Marc Hunter, speaking long-distance from southern Australia late one night after an open-air performance in support of Boz Scaggs. "There are as many people in Sydney as there are in all of New Zealand. We knew nothing at all about managers, agents, bookings and roadies when we first arrived. But we came prepared to work and establish a following, and I think we've accomplished that."

Dragon made its Australian LP debut on CBS about 18 months after arriving in the country. Then, in July of 1977 at the CBS Records convention in London, Dragon was signed worldwide to Portrait. Later that summer, a single from the album called "Sunshine" was certified gold.

The group took the name Dragon from the ancient Chinese Book of Changes, *I Ching*, which states, "Down with the movement, torrent of rain, lightning in the sky, and dragons in the atmosphere." The decision to name the band was accompanied by a "great burst of thunder from the sky," related Hunter. "It's all very corny, but it's quite true," he said.

According to their producer, Peter Dawkins, head of A&R for CBS's Australian affiliate, Dragon is an "extremely tight unit" with potential for AM crossover. He cited the recent success of the band's current Australian single, "April Sun in Cuba," as an example of their hit potential.

Dawkins first discovered the quintet in a sleepy wine cellar where they worked in exchange for their evening's meal, and he agreed to produce them. "They seemed to be living on hope alone," he observed.

Dragon's greatest strength lies in the songwriting of Paul Hewson (keyboards) and Robert Taylor (lead guitar), who compose most of the band's material. "We know that our rough edges are what we need to keep our audiences from falling out," Taylor mused. "Our rhythmic changes are designed to make people attack."

Dragon will tour Australia in support of their record until May, after which they will break for two months to record their second LP. In the summer they plan a U.S. tour.

"One thing Australia has surely taught us," Taylor offered, "is that to stay alive you have to play alive."

College Licensing Agreement Disclosed At NECAA Meet

LOS ANGELES — In response to changes in the copyright law concerning performance rights, an experimental two-year pact has been agreed upon by ASCAP, BMI, SESAC and educational groups which will require colleges to pay for the first time copyright fees on musical entertainment. Although one president of a major university system has purportedly written a letter to fellow college presidents disputing the assertion that colleges must now bear responsibility for royalty payments, formal acceptance of the agreement is expected in several weeks upon resolution of certain outstanding issues and language imprecisions.

The agreement, which was announced at the recent 18th annual National Entertainment and Campus Activities Association convention in New Orleans, stipulates that for contracted musical entertainment of less than \$1,000, colleges will be responsible for a fee of 13 cents per full-time student. All activities with music, other than those specifically exempted in Section 110 of the new copyright law, will be covered by the performance rights societies.

Figure Breakdown

The 13 cent figure is allocated as follows: ASCAP will receive 6 cents per student; BMI will receive 5½ cents; and SESAC will receive 1½ cents. BMI has also stipulated a minimum fee of \$60, regardless of participation.

In addition, the agreements with ASCAP and BMI are two-tiered in structure. On shows paying performers in excess of \$1,000, BMI and ASCAP will charge a performance fee which averages one cent per seat at concerts. The BMI provision is based on seating exclusively whereas the ASCAP license is based on seating capacity and ticket prices.

Carter Tapped As RCA Mktg VP

NEW YORK — Dick Carter has rejoined RCA Records as division vice president of field marketing.

Robert Summer, division vice president of RCA Records-U.S.A., said Carter's new job would involve directing all domestic commercial sales and supervising in-store merchandising and local advertising.

For the past year, Carter has been vice president of product development and label liaison for Phonodisc. Carter worked for 2½ years at the Polygram distribution arm, joining the firm as director of national sales.

A 10-year industry veteran, he previously worked as an RCA field service representative in the Pacific northwest, as sales manager of RCA's north-central region, and as director of national sales for RCA.

Carter's new RCA job encompasses the duties of former commercial sales vice president Mario DeFilippo, who has left the company.

Jerry Wagner Tapped As President Of CTI

NEW YORK — Jerry Wagner has been named president of CTI Records by label owner Creed Taylor.

Wagner, most recently vice president and general manager of the label, joined CTI in 1975 as vice president of marketing. Prior to that, he was co-owner of Babylon Recording Corp., a New York-based independent R&B label.

Wagner also worked for Chess/Janus as director of sales and promotion, and for Jubilee Records in the same capacity.

Benson 'Weekend' Gold

LOS ANGELES — George Benson's third Warner Bros. LP, "Weekend In L.A.," has been certified gold by the RIAA. Both Benson's previous albums, "Breezin'" and "In Flight," reached platinum status.

A moratorium on payments is in effect until the licenses are received by the participating organizations. However, payments for concerts and other musical entertainment on campus are being retroactively considered due from Jan. 1, the date the new copyright law took effect.

The provisions for licenses which cover college radio appear to be an unresolved issue. Although BMI has included college radio in its agreement, ASCAP has yet to detail its full plan. Sheldon Steinbach, staff counsel for the American Council on Education, the umbrella organization which represents over 1400 colleges across the nation, said, "We expect the licenses will be mailed in several weeks' time. I have yet to hear from ASCAP concerning the radio issue, but I anticipate no problems that will delay implementation."

Formulating Response

Attorney Steinbach mentioned that he was in the process of formulating a response to the unnamed college president who disputed the underlying assumption of the agreement that colleges must now assume responsibility for royalty payment.

"The tactic that these people are taking has implications far beyond the college sphere. The challenge is directed at the very basis for our negotiations. It is alleged that the way in which we negotiated these contracts may not have been the appropriate way of dealing with the issue."

Although there were other reports of some discontentment with the agreement, particularly by individuals who felt their employment jeopardized, the general consensus of the participants at the NECAA convention was that the agreements were reasonable. The convention in New Orleans was attended by 2,400 persons from 500 schools and 285 exhibitors.

Proposed Calif. Bill Would Require Licensing Of All Personal Managers

LOS ANGELES — A California state legislator has introduced legislation that would require licensing of all personal managers and make it illegal for personal managers to seek employment for their clients, with violators subject to loss of license.

The bill, which has the strong backing of the American Federation of Musicians (AFM) and other entertainment unions, would also change the name of "artist manager," by which talent agents are known under California law, to "talent agencies." Finally, the bill would rescind the two-year-old Senate Bill 733, and would bring theatrical booking agencies (including musician booking agencies) under the jurisdiction of the State Labor Commissioner. These agencies would therefore no longer have to be licensed as "employment agencies."

The proposed measure is a new

development in the continuing battle between the state's personal managers and the unions and talent agencies.

Say Managers Act As Agents

The AFM has said that it wants personal managers licensed in all states, because these managers have often "expanded their operations" from mere career guidance to actual booking of dates.

The California Labor Commission upheld the union position on Dec. 8 of last year, when it required personal managers who seek employment for their clients to be licensed by the state. The panel also requires contracts between an "artist manager" (including personal managers who book their artists) and a client to be approved by the commission.

The labor panel based its ruling on the existing law that restricts the booking of talent to "artist managers" and booking

Effect Of Fusion Crossovers On Jazz Sales Disputed By Label Executives

by Leo Sacks

NEW YORK — The growing commercial impact of fusion jazz has resulted in an increased commitment to it by a number of major record companies. The possible effect this may have on jazz sales in general, however, is still a matter for speculation.

Elektra/Asylum, for example, recently inaugurated a jazz/fusion division with releases from Lenny White, Dee Dee Bridgewater, and Ubiquity Starbooty. Don Mizell, general manager of the division,

agreed that these albums were "decidedly commercial," but added that the net effect of the fusion "explosion" has helped to open listeners' ears to "pure jazz." "When Chick Corea and Herbie Hancock go into their fusion forms and then come back to play acoustic jazz," he said, "they bring with them a new audience which helps to promote a better understanding of the art form."

Different Approach

Dr. George Butler, vice president of jazz and progressive music for CBS, took an altogether different approach to the issue, suggesting that fusion will not aid overall jazz sales. "I think we've reached a kind of musical impasse in terms of fusion and commercial jazz," he said. "I think audiences are recognizing now that fusion is getting too predictable and formulaized."

Commenting on the creation of E/A's division, Butler said that, while he was in no position to criticize the label, "I don't think it will really help to advance the cause of pure jazz. It's hard enough getting major labels to promote, market, and merchandise pure jazz as it is."

Butler stresses Columbia's desire to keep away from what he called "the fusion trap." He noted that the label recently signed Cedar Walton, the Heath Brothers With Stanley Cowell, and several new acts for which he feels "there is a very appreciative audience waiting to respond to this kind of progressive talent."

Steve Backer, director of progressive product for Arista, feels that fusion will continue to proliferate. "A lot of jazz musicians come across the bridge to rock through fusion, but the transition is very slow and you really don't see it very tangibly," he said.

TV Advertising

Both Backer and Bob Hurwitz, director of A&R for ECM, agreed that the pure jazz artists on their labels are too esoteric for

The advertising campaign is being handled by Sandy Feldman and Lenny Stogel and Wolf & Rissmiller Concerts and is being coordinated by Tom Rubin & Associates Advertising.

California Jam will be held March 18 at the Ontario Motor Speedway. It will feature a lineup of headliners, including Aerosmith, Foreigner, Heart, Dave Mason, Ted Nugent, Rubicon, Santana and Bob Welch.

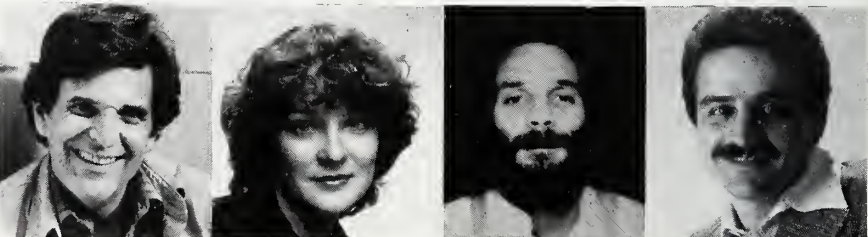

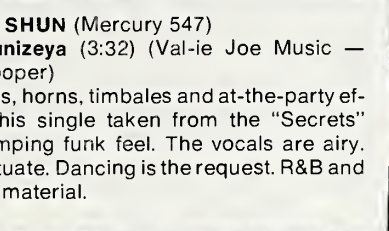

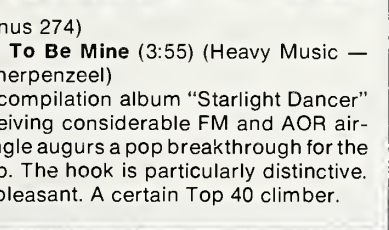

ABC Inc. Announces Record Results; Music Operations Sustain Losses

NEW YORK — The American Broadcasting Companies reported record revenues and earnings for the fourth quarter and full year of 1977. However, ABC Records, as previously reported, incurred an approximate \$22 million pretax 1977 loss, before the application of corporate overhead. (Cash Box, Feb. 4).

ABC Inc. revenues for the year rose to \$1.62 billion, from \$1.34 billion in 1976, while net income for the year was \$109.8 million, compared to \$71.75 million in 1976.

ABC Inc. revenues for the quarter ended December 31, 1977, were \$499.8 million, compared to \$391.23 million for the fourth quarter of 1976. Fourth quarter net income was \$34.85 million, up from \$24.39 million in the comparable period of 1976.

Leonard Goldenson, chairman of ABC, and Elton Rule, president of the company, attributed this solid growth to the performance of ABC's television operations, mainly the ABC Television Network.

They noted that while ABC Records had

MCA Has Second Best Year In '77

LOS ANGELES — While MCA Inc. posted its second best earnings in 1977 on all-time high revenues, profits for the Records and Music Publishing Division fell sharply.

Net earnings for the year ended Dec. 31, 1977 increased 5.4% to \$95.1 million, or \$5.13 per share, up from \$90.2 million, or \$4.87 per share, in 1976. The results were slightly behind the 1975 record of \$95.5 million, or \$5.35 per share.

Revenues in 1977 were \$877.6 million, up 9.3% from \$802.9 million a year earlier. 1975 revenues were \$811.4 million.

Operating income rose 1% to \$151.6 million, up from \$150.2 million in 1976.

Fourth quarter earnings increased 52.8% to \$32.3 million, or \$1.74 per share, on 17.9% higher revenues of \$269.4 million. Operating income rose 61.2% to \$54.3 million.

Record Division Down

Records and Music Publishing Division profits, however, fell 44.5% in 1977 to \$12.1 million on lower sales of \$99.8 million. Records Division profits in the quarter dipped 11.7% to \$7 million on 2.3% lower sales of \$36.4 million.

Filmed entertainment contributed the lion's share of operating income for the year at \$107.4 million, up 6.7% over 1976, on 10.7% higher revenues of \$561.4 million. In the final quarter, filmed entertainment rose 145.6% to \$26.8 million on 18.5% increased sales of \$147 million.

Retail and mail order earnings in 1977 increased 13.3% to \$16.2 million on 16.5% improved revenues of \$136.5 million. "Other" operations showed a 18.2% profit increase to \$15.9 million on 20.4% higher revenues of \$79.9 million.

At year's end shareholder's equity stood at \$529.9 million, or \$28.56 per share, an increase of 17% over 1976. The company had 18.6 million average shares outstanding.

Handleman Co. Reports Higher Sales, Earnings

NEW YORK — The Handleman Co. has posted third quarter net earnings of \$3.03 million on net sales of \$58.61 million for the third quarter ended January 28, 1978. This compares with net earnings of \$1.47 million on net sales of \$45.61 million for the comparable period of the previous fiscal year.

For the nine months ended last January 28, Handleman reported net earnings of \$6.59 million on net sales of \$151.85 million. In the prior fiscal year's nine-month period, the company posted net earnings of \$2.41 million and net sales of \$112.41 million.

experienced a "very disappointing" year financially. "We expect a substantial reduction of this loss in 1978 due to the partial conversion of our own branch system to an independent distribution network, better sales performance from a reduced roster, and a lower cost-based operation."

In addition, ABC reported that its wholesale distribution arm, ABC Record and Tape Sales, posted a "moderate loss" for 1977, due in part to expenses incurred in "eliminating two unsatisfactory operations."

Finally, Word Inc., the company's gospel record operation, sustained losses in 1977, according to Goldenson and Rule.

Ubiquity Album Causes Confusion For E/A, Polydor

LOS ANGELES — Elektra/Asylum Records and Polydor, Inc. jointly announced that Roy Ayers does not perform on the Ubiquity LP "Starbooty" on the E/A label. The announcement was made to avoid any confusion regarding Ayers' status as a Polydor recording artist.

Ayers records exclusively for Polydor and his latest album, "Let's Do It," was recently released by that label. Some confusion arose because Ubiquity's album cover reads "Roy Ayers Presents Ubiquity." Ayers produced the album by his backup group, Ubiquity, but does not perform on it.

Elektra/Asylum plans to sticker the "Starbooty" albums under its control to obscure the words "Roy Ayers Presents" from the front of the album jackets. E/A is asking its customers to do the same with any "Starbooty" albums in their possession and to cease using the name of Roy Ayers in publicizing the Ubiquity album.

Register's Report Due

WASHINGTON, D.C. — At press time the Copyright Office was still sitting on the Register's report to Congress, expected to strongly favor the proposed performers' royalty. A comprehensive set of legislative recommendations and economic evaluations, incomplete at the time the Register sent Part I of her report to Congress, are expected.

Register Barbara Ringer will appear on March 27 before the House Judiciary Subcommittee to answer questions on her stance on the performance right. On March 28-29 the subcommittee will hold hearings in Los Angeles to hear the industry side of the question. Broadcasters as well as performers, record company execs, union representatives and RIAA officials will attend.

ABC Sues For \$150G In Infringement Case

NEW YORK — ABC Records Inc. has filed a \$150,000 civil infringement lawsuit in Federal District Court in Los Angeles against Charles Nathan Kantor of Allen's Packaging Company. ABC also seeks a permanent injunction and the impounding and destruction of all infringing tape recordings and the machinery and equipment used to manufacture them.

The suit charges that the defendant illegally duplicated three ABC-copyrighted recordings: "The Dramatic Jackpot" by the Dramatics; "Four Tops Live And In Concert," and "Together For The First Time" by Bobby Bland And B.B. King.

LOS ANGELES — "Sometimes When We Touch," the single by Dan Hill on 20th Century-Fox Records, has been certified gold by the RIAA.

EAST COASTINGS — BREAK ON THROUGH — The Doors are back. Ray Manzarek, Robby Krieger and John Densmore, who, along with the late Jim Morrison, were the members of the famous quartet, are back in the studio putting the finishing touches on a new Doors album. Interpretations of Jim's poetry will be included, along with new material and previously unreleased live material. John Heany will co-produce. No release date has been set.

BRAND NEW BAG DEPT. — About the last places in the world you'd expect to see James Brown perform would be the Turtle Creek Country Club in San Antonio, Texas and the Windmill Dinner Theatre in Austin, right? As it turns out, the Polydor itinerary sheet was not misprinted, and a dust bowl fan of Brown's could indeed have caught Mr. "Cold Sweat" at those fine establishments, as well as at the Lincoln Plaza Hotel in Oklahoma City. Matt Parsons, Polydor's vice president in charge of the R&B division, explained that Brown's appearance before the country club set was not the result of a booking mix-up, but rather quite definitely "by plan. He wants to expose himself more to the white audience," Parsons said. "Enough rock groups have been using his ideas for years, so he might as well go out there and get the recognition." Parsons reports that Brown's new album, "Jam With James Brown '78," which is due out March 13, will be more disco-oriented than previous LPs. However, the album's forthcoming single — the Brown rendition of Elvis Presley's "Love Me Tender" — is aimed at pop stations.

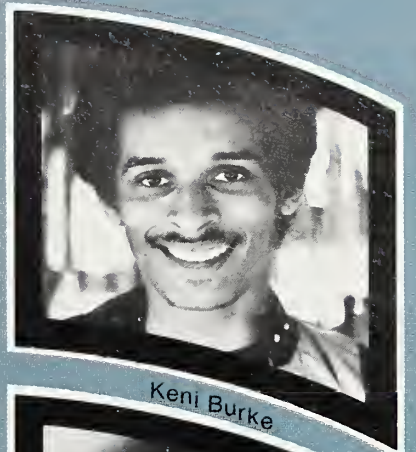

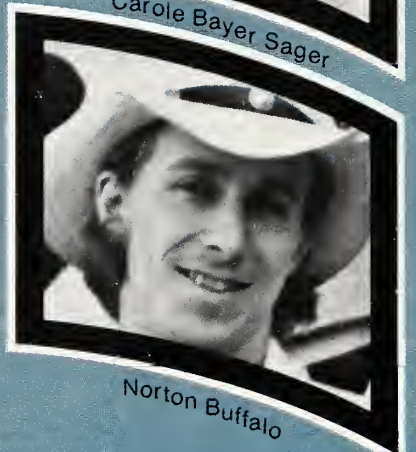

JAZZ ALBUM PICKS

STAN GETZ GOLD — Inner City 1040 — Producer: Nils Winther — List: 11.98

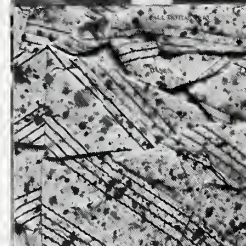
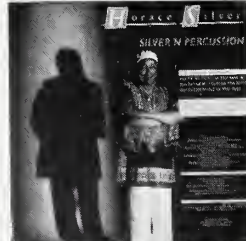
Straight ahead quartet records are comparatively rare in the Getz discography of the past decade, but this double album, recorded live in Copenhagen, goes a long way toward correcting that. Nine stretched out tunes comprise the music with Getz himself contributing a couple of blues numbers. The Stan Getz of today is more fiery and aggressive than in his classic period of the '50s, but the inventiveness is here in abundance. Getz fans will definitely want this one.

BACK TO JAZZ — Johnny Otis & His Orchestra — Jazz World 707 — List: 6.98

The Godfather of R&B returns to his roots with this album of solid big band jazz. Otis plays vibes here, but the collective ensemble has more a Kansas City/Basie feel to it. Barbara Morrison has some fine unaffected vocals and Eddie Vinson sits in for one tune. As one might expect, a driving rhythm section is a part of this (drummer John Boudreaux is super) and the results are playable on jazz or R&B radio.

ESTIMATED TIME OF ARRIVAL — Robert Watson — Roulette SR 5009 — Producer: Fred Bailin — List:

Alto player Watson fronts a 25-piece big band that leans toward a contemporary mainstream groove. The album consists of eight Watson originals, and his charts are distinguished by vibrant melodies and tightly woven ensemble passages, with the accent on rhythm. Key selections include "Reachin'", "Searchin'", "Hum For The People" and "N.Y.C.," which features vocalist Pamela Watson.



SILVER 'N PERCUSSION — Horace Silver — Blue Note LA853-H — Producer: Horace Silver — List: 7.98

Silver's latest album is a two-sided musical tribute, with side one dedicated to the spiritual evolution of Africans and side two to the American Indian. Supported by a six-piece instrumental unit and seven vocalists, Silver's compositions capture at once the primitive tribal feel as well as the celebrative and mystical sides of these two cultures. Ron Carter on bass and Larry Schneider on tenor sax are particularly appreciated.

DANCE — Paul Motian Trio — ECM-1-1108 — Producer: Manfred Eicher — List: 7.98

This album is ironically titled because there is very little danceable music. There is, however, plenty of highly creative improvisation presented in a variety of moods by the Motian-led trio. Charles Brackeen on tenor and soprano sax and David Izenzon on bass offer splendid interpretations of Motian's Middle Eastern-flavored compositions. Motian first gained recognition in 1959 as the drummer in Bill Evans' group and is most comfortable working in the context of a trio.

RED, WHITE AND BLUES — Red Rodney — Muse 5111 — Producer: Dick Ables — List: 7.98

Trumpet star Rodney is in excellent company here (Richie Cole, Roland Hanna, Buster Williams) in an eight-tune program of hard cooking bebop. There has been a steady progression in quality on Rodney's Muse albums and this is surely the best to date. There is a Charlie Parker line and a ballad ("Smoke Gets In Your Eyes") in with six originals, and all are performed with verve and gusto.





Tubes

PANTAGES THEATRE, L.A. — Rock 'n' roll's most theatrical group, The Tubes, brought their outrageous stage show to L.A. for five sellout nights recently and lived up to their reputation. Running through a series of routines celebrating sex and violence, the Tubes used a seemingly endless supply of sets and props to set off their hard-driving rock 'n' roll songs, including all of their most familiar material.

Starting out minus the benefit of theatrics, the Tubes were relatively restrained while performing "White Punks On Dope." But they were soon up to their old tricks, propositioning members of the audience while laying down authentic heavy-metal sounds. By their fourth song, the band was joined by four dancers in helmeted red and green space outfits.

For "What Do You Want From Life," a young woman was picked from the audience and showered with gifts. Soon gifts were flying out into the audience, including pictures of the group, bubble gum and other assorted goodies. For "Smoke," ten-foot cigarettes were carted out on stage.

Following intermission, armed terrorists took over the theatre, throwing people into jail and carrying red Tubes flags. This bit, one of the most invigorating and original in the show, never reached a conclusion, but certainly did present a vivid image.

But for vividness, "Don't Touch Me There" stole the show. Starting out with Re Styles teaching a sex education class, the group's rendition of the song, and especially Styles' duet with lead singer Fee Waybill, seethes with lust and passion.

Among the more unusual props employed on other numbers were a barbed wire fence used during "I Was A Punk Before You Were A Punk" and an electric saw played by Waybill while the band performed the Beatles' "I Saw Her Standing There." But, of course, no Tubes show is complete without an appearance by Quay Lewd, Waybill's impersonation of an overdosed glitter-rock star. But despite the exceptionally lewd costume, this bit has worn thin.

Overall, the Tubes are truly second to none in providing provocative and often hilarious visual effects, overcoming the limitations in their music. But don't take your grandmother to see them.

Spinners Ronnie Dyson

PANTAGES THEATRE, L.A. — The Spinners have been a dancing and singing feast for over 20 years and their recent appearance in the antique splendor of the Pantages Theatre proved that they are young and going strong. In a tightly packed set of classics and new tunes from their most recent Atlantic release, "Spinners 8," the Spinners amply demonstrated their close-knit professionalism.

Opening with "Heaven On Earth (So Fine)," a new song with a soft and building beat, the Spinners melted their voices together into a gentle harmony. John Edwards, the principle lead singer and newest member of the group, has a fine voice which is capable of a wide range of expression from the tender and moving which he demonstrated on "Sadie" and "The Way We Were" to the rough-edged exuberance of passages in several places.

In the best tradition of soul, the Spinners have an excellently choreographed show which includes spins, dips, fancy footwork, all accomplished with style and grace. The instinctive coordination from working together for years shows.

Maurice King conducted the band which included The Pantages Orchestra and the female background singers The New Horizons. Many friends were in the audience. The Temptations and "Chicken George" Ben Vereen took bows. A particular highlight of the show was the version of their hit "Rubberband Man," during which The Spinners broke out huge rubberbands and devised unique dance-steps. The show included use of strobe lights and exploding flash pots. In the grand finale, the Temptations joined The Spinners and many from the audience in a get-down rendition of "I Like To Party." Everybody went home with a smile.

Ronnie Dyson opened the evening with a classy blend of songs from his albums and a medley of hits which included such pop tunes as "Goodbye To Love" by the Carpenters. Dyson is among the best of the pop/soul song stylists and his efforts elicited strong appreciation from the audience.

Yvonne Elliman Billy Falcon

BOTTOM LINE, NYC — Overcoming some heavy orchestration and a busy art deco decor, Yvonne Elliman left no doubt that her recent commercial success is no fluke.

Elliman, who is presently riding the RSO disco wave to stardom, breezed through an hour of music that traced her own background as an artist. Her voice, at times lilting and sensual, at other times husky and sensual, never once failed her.

Beginning with a Phil Spector-like arrangement of "Hello, Stranger" that sounded much like the '60s original, Elliman proceeded to take the audience through her four years as Mary Magdalene in "Jesus Christ Superstar" ("I Don't Know How To Love Him"). Paying tribute to fellow RSO artist Eric Clapton, Elliman further offered a melodic "Can't Find My Way Home." She concluded the show with "If I Can't Have You," a pulsating Gibb tune from the "Saturday Night Fever" LP.

A glittery, Vegas-like stage setting, incongruous at the Bottom Line, and a message board that flashed nebulous visual images sometimes caused audience attention to wander from the music itself. But Elliman's overall command of her performance continually brought them back.

Opening the show was Billy Falcon's band, a Springsteen soundalike. Though Falcon himself hails from Queens, he can wail with New Jersey's best.

Lenny Williams Aalon

ROXY, LOS ANGELES — Lenny Williams' first L.A. appearance as a headliner was certainly an impressive one. The former lead singer of Tower Of Power crooned comfortably in an atmosphere particularly well-suited to his style and capabilities as a solo entertainer.

A capacity crowd of avid fans gave their full support, and it was evident that Williams was gratified as he energetically delivered tune after tune with brief injections of conversation which contributed to the cordial

reception.

Opening with "Shoo Do Fu Fu Oooh," Williams seemed to enjoy the audience as much as they enjoyed him. The highlight was a performance of "So Very Hard To Go," which Williams recorded five years ago as a member of Tower Of Power. His vocals were smooth and soulful, conquering every note with precision. "Away From Love Too Long" and "Look Up With Your Mind," his latest single, were delivered admirably with an outstanding solo by saxophonist Keith Crossan on the latter.

Rounding out the set were "Ridin' On The High Wire," "I Love You" and "Fact Or Fiction," from his latest LP.

"Choosing You" was a particularly rousing finale. Williams stepped out into the audience, "choosing" a number of individuals to sing several bars of the chorus. In so doing, he turned up some talented vocalists whom he politely applauded.

Aalons' 45-minute set consisted of material from their first LP, "Cream City," and their upcoming release. The group displayed their fine and versatile musicianship with "Rock 'N' Roll Gangster," and a bluesy "Space Walker." Highlighted tunes were "Cream City" and "Magic Night" which featured lead guitarist Aalon Butler in a solo reminiscent of the Hendrix tradition.

Carla Bley Band Colin Walcott Don Cherry

BOTTOM LINE, NYC — Bley has one of the tightest big bands in circulation these days. And, while a certain level of creative anarchy has become fashionable since the breakthroughs of Coltrane, Coleman and Davis, the best moments in Bley's avant garde music come when the players swing within the limits specified by her charts.

Thus, in the Watt recording group's opening number, entitled "Song, Song Long," a lean, powerful ensemble sound was elaborated by short, disciplined solos, duets and trios. With Bley conducting, for instance, alto sax player Alan Branfman traded riffs with trombonist Roswell Rudd over Terry Adams' repeated keyboard patterns. Elsewhere, the pianist showed his somewhat astringent but brilliant playing to good advantage, characteristically chopping off the last note in each blindingly fast run. Also of note here was Bob Stewart's expressive use of the tuba, which in other hands rarely transcends the oom-pah-pah level.

Trumpeter Michael Mantler (Bley's husband) performed a fiery solo in "Rose," underpinned by sustained notes in the lower brass. Then, after a long break by Rudd, Don Preston gave a strong account of himself on organ, segueing into John Clark's French horn introduction to "Sad Song." His drone-like noises on that instrument sounded like chords from another world until he broke into an up-tempo tune which was taken up by the other musicians. Echoing the horn's grittiness, tenorman Gary Windo delivered a solo that had more soul than flash. The number ended with some interesting harmonic changes for the ensemble.

The next piece, a take-off on part of the soundtrack to the film, "To Die In Madrid," was less successful. Beginning with a mellow duet between Bley on piano and Clarke on guitar, the piece combined serious meditations with brief, humorous asides in dramatic "Spanish" style. The result seemed campy and uncoordinated.

The show's opening act, an ad hoc trio composed of Oregon member Colin Walcott, Don Cherry and Nana Vasconcelos, was a little disappointing, but only by

comparison with Walcott's magnificent album on ECM, "Grazing Dreams." (The sidemen on that disc include Cherry, John Abercrombie, Palle Danielsson and Dom Um Romao.)

One of the set's highlights was Cherry's expert performance on the "dousn gouni" ("hunter's bow"), a plucked stringed instrument from Mali. Both he and sitarist Walcott played Western-style melodies on their non-Western instruments, but the rhythmic element and the exotic timbres obtained from an assortment of percussion instruments created a decidedly unique flavor.

Michael Smotherman

TROUBADOUR, L.A. — Michael Smotherman may not be well-known now, but given time and more exposure he'll get there. A musician's musician for several years, Smotherman has worked with such varied artists as Spencer Davis, Natalie Cole, Roger Miller, Captain Beefheart and Glen Campbell (who was in the audience).

Now he's out on his own with a new album on Windsong and a quintet that delivers enthusiastic accompaniment to Smotherman's country-rock songs. Smotherman obviously enjoys himself on stage and the fast-paced set was well received by the audience as well.

Sitting at his organ in his white suit and new haircut, with the band gathered on his left, Smotherman gives the impression of a schoolboy acting up while the teacher is out of the room. His humor is sharp, dry and an integral part of the stage show. But his pithy songs with a down-home flavor are the main attraction.

Smotherman is a soulful keyboard player. His spirited work on organ was extremely effective on the funkier numbers in the show and compensated for the lack of electric guitar on the harder rock songs.

The weak link in the 12 songs the Oklahoma native performed was the inadequate vocal harmonies provided by the band. But with a little more polish in the production, Smotherman could go a long way.

PALOMINO CLUB, L.A. — Take one small nightclub, a receptive audience, and 5 feet 1 inch of unaffected personality and vocal style — mix well — and the end result should be Randy Gurley at the Palomino.

After going through the motions with the usual support acts, Randy Gurley came bounding across the dance floor and onto the stage to officially begin the show. "Southland," a rock-stomping tribute to our southern neighbors, provided a good kick-off for what was to be a well chosen showcase of contemporary country flavored songs that have been written and/or performed by artists of the calibre of the Eagles, Bonnie Raitt and most notably a fine live performance of J.D. Souther's "Faithless Love." Miss Gurley also provided a selection of songs from her forthcoming album on ABC Records.

Gurley's most outstanding feature is without a doubt her voice. It is clear, controlled and adaptable to many different styles. If crossover is the latest chic for the recording artist, Randy Gurley should have no trouble at all. As many of her C&W counterparts know, all it takes is the right song at the right time and you're on your way.

STARSHIP — *Starship* — Grunt/RCA BXL1-2515 — **List: 7.98**
 The long-awaited album is already being called the most successful Starship LP to date and is well on the way to becoming the group's third consecutive platinum album. The band is as strong as ever and the musicianship is outstanding. With songs ranging from the loving "Count On Me," which uses Starship's familiar harmonies to good effect, to the political "Show Yourself" to the energetic "Skateboard," "Earth" should rocket to the top of the pop chart.

LONEWOLF — *Michael Murphey* — Epic JE 35013 — **Producer: John Boylan — List: 7.98**

The title singer/songwriter is bandied about a lot these days, but here's one artist who not only does both, he does them both well. These challenging songs touch on city life, love and individuality while maintaining musical values that would carry songs without such lyrics. "Loving Time" is a lovely ballad and "Paradise Tonight" is a Don McLeanish beauty with Murphey's touching vocal. For AOR and pop playlists.

DOUBLE FUN — *Robert Palmer* — Island ILPS 9476 — **Producer: Robert Palmer — List: 7.98**

Long a favorite of music critics, Palmer appears ready to break through to a mass audience with this exceptionally tasty effort. Already being picked up by AOR stations, the single, "Every Kinda People," could be the Top 40 hit Palmer needs to reach a larger audience. Ray Davies' "You Really Got Me" is another song with potentially wide appeal. R&B influences, top-notch arrangements and Palmer's elegant singing style add up to double fun for listeners.

PIECES — *Bobby Womack* — Columbia JC 35083 — **Producer: Don Davis — List: 7.98**

This collection of eight tunes in Womack's "classic" style will certainly follow up and possibly surpass the success of his previous efforts. His vocals enhance the entire package, which include eight songs with a variety for various tastes. "Trust Your Heart" and "Stop Before We Start" let you know "It's Party Time" while "Is This The Thanks I Get" might get you "Caught Up In The Middle." For a variety of playlists.

SPINOZZA — *David Spinozza* — A&M SP-4677 — **Producers: Mike Mainieri and David Spinozza — List: 7.98**

Spinozza, a leading New York session guitarist, has stepped into the spotlight on his debut album and produced a sophisticated and well-developed LP. Utilizing a slick, orchestrated format throughout, Spinozza moves from the delicate "Prelude To 'The Ballerina'" through Leon Russell's "Superstar" to his own "Country Bumpkin." Strongly influenced by the Wes Montgomery school of jazz guitar, this LP should gain acceptance on AOR and pop formats as well as jazz.

FOTOMAKER — *Atlantic SD 19165* — **Producer: Eddie Kramer — List: 7.98**

This rock 'n roll quintet shows quite a bit of pop potential on their debut LP. For most of the band members this is nothing new — Dino Danelli and Gene Cornish were with the Rascals and Wally Bryson was one of the Raspberys. Fotomaker features rich harmonies on tracks ranging from love songs with string arrangements to pulsating hard rock, with the accent on rock. AOR formats will also pick up on tunes like "The Other Side."

KILOWATT — *The Kay-Gees* — De-Lite DSR-9505 — **Producer: The Kay-Gees — List: 7.98**

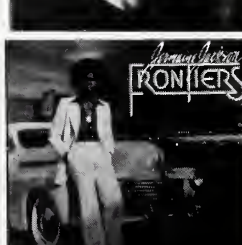
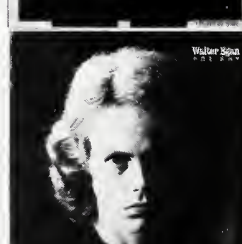
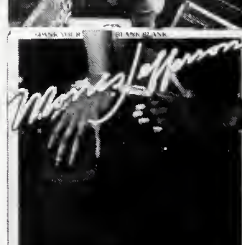
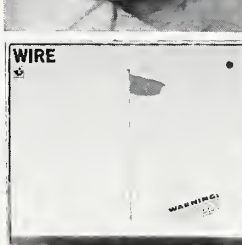
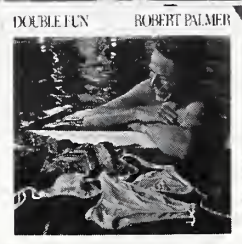
The Kay-Gees return with an album full of high-powered disco funk that already is doing well on the charts (currently #159 bullet on the pop chart and #59 R&B). Ray Wright's tight brass backing and powerful synthesizer play stand out, although the musicianship is generally strong throughout. The Kay-Gees' party sound is vibrant, especially on "Tango Hustle" and "Space Disco." Take heed, R&B programmers.

SAVE THE DANCER — *Gene Cotton* — Ariola SW 50031 — **Producer: Steve Gibson — List: 7.98**

On the surface at least, the title of this LP could be misleading — "Save The Dancer" wasn't made with dancing in mind — this album is for those who like to listen. On his first LP for Ariola, Cotton has embellished his soft melodic pop tunes with some sterling productions that will probably prove extremely suitable for Top 40 and mellow music formats. And for those who place their stock in rock, "Like A Sunday In Salem" could pay off at AOR stations.

PINK FLAG — *Wire* — Harvest ST 11757 — **Producer: Mike Tome — List: 7.98**

England's Wire could very well be the band that proves just how exciting this much-maligned creature called punk rock can be. This LP is a tour-de-force of all those nasty elements that make new wave so instantly recognizable, including bizarre, frenetic instrumentation and a lone vocalist shouting strange socio/political lyrics. What sets Wire apart is a sense of musical refinement and a degree of polish. With 21 songs on the LP, some are bound to be picked up on AOR.



STANDUP COMIC — *Woody Allen* — **United Artists UA-LA849-J2 — Producer: Steve Tyrell — List: 9.98**

Collected from Allen's three albums from his nightclub days, released from 1964 to 1968, this double album shows the roots of a man who has come to be accepted as a comic genius throughout the entertainment industry. Though much of the material will be familiar to Allen aficionados, his routines are still fast-paced and funny, relying on the comic's self-easing humor while commenting on such matters as taking a moose to a party in Manhattan, spacemen bringing their laundry to Earth and oral contraception.

THE RUTLES — *Warner Bros. HS 3151* — **Producer: Neil Innes — List: 8.98**

The music that made the Rutles one of the most popular groups in the world is all here, from the early innocence and charm of the "Meet The Rutles" and "Rutles '65" LPs through the psychedelia of "Sgt. Rutter's Darts Club Band" to the final days of "Let It Rot." It shows how Dirk McQuirkly's vocals and flair for pop melodies, Ron Nasty's biting lyrics, Stig O'Hara's philosophical leanings and drummer Barry Wom's novelty songs combined to give the group a variety unmatched since their breakup in 1970. A must for all Rutles fans.

FRESH FISH SPECIAL — *Robert Gordon w/Link Wray* — **Private Stock PS 7008 — Producers: Richard Gottehrer and Robert Gordon — List: 7.98**

Robert Gordon left the Tuff Darts in 1976 to seek fame and fortune with the help of one of the original rock guitarists, Link Wray. Judging by this, his second album, he's well on his way to the big-time. Gordon sings '50s-style street-wise rock 'n roll like no one else around today, evoking memories of Elvis and Gene Vincent on songs such as Bruce Springsteen's "Fire." Bound to be a big AOR favorite, with unlimited pop potential — nothing fishy here.

WEST SIDE HIGHWAY — *Stanley Turrentine* — **Fantasy F-9548 — Producer: Stanley Turrentine — List: 7.98**

The Sugarman is up to his old tricks on this LP, aiming for R&B and pop listeners as well as jazz on his seventh for Fantasy. With the help of players like Hubert Laws, Eric Gale and Ron Carter, Turrentine and his splendid, full-bodied tenor sax lay down six flowing tracks, including a new treatment of his own "Sugar" and the standard "Walkin'." A lovely ballad, "Ann, Wonderful One," also stands out.

ERUPTION FEATURING PRECIOUS WILSON — *Ariola SW 50033* — **Producer: Frank Farian — List: 7.98**

After touring Europe for two years and releasing smash soul singles there, Eruption enters the American music scene with an impressive debut album — highlighted by an explosive version of Ann Peebles' "I Can't Stand the Rain." The group also does fine work with other classics by Brass Construction, Gladys Knight and even Hamlisch/Bergman's "The Way We Were." Early acceptance in discos and on R&B radio indicates lots of potential here.

FROM RATS TO RICHES — *Good Rats* — **Passport PB 9825 — Producers: Flo & Eddie — List: 7.98**

Good Rats has amassed quite a cult following in the northeast since the release of its first album on Kapp back in 1969. The band's musical stance brings to mind the Led Zepplin/Bad Company heavy metal sound, while Peppi Marchello's lead vocals, which sound like Robert Plant with a dash of Burton Cummings, add to that feeling. The lyrics here contain some of the craziness that might be expected knowing Flo & Eddie are involved. For AOR and Top 40 lists.

SPANK YOUR BLANK BLANK — *Morris Jefferson* — **Parachute PRLP 9003 — Producer: Lucky Cordell — List: 7.98**

Welcome "Dr. Spank." Morris Jefferson gives a full dose of his spanking music on his debut album. All seven tracks are right for the new disco dance craze, the "spank." So put the needle on the LP and spank your blank blank 'til you wear it out. Dynamite dance music for those who want to get down and party. And you can bet your blank blank this album will get on a lot of R&B playlists.

NOT SHY — *Walter Egan* — **Columbia JC 35077 — Producers: Lindsey Buckingham, Richard Dashut and Walter Egan — List: 7.98**

This LP will garner a lot of attention because of its Fleetwood Mac co-producers, but Walter Egan's music deserves attention on its own merits. With driving rhythms throughout, Egan cooks on upbeat numbers such as "Sweet South Breeze" and "I Want It" and simmers on the plaintive "Magnet And Steel" and "Unloved," which features harmonies by Buckingham and Stevie Nicks. Already gaining strength on AOR, Egan's highly accessible tunes could find their way onto pop playlists as well.

FRONTIERS — *Jermaine Jackson* — **Motown M7898R1 — Producers: Jermaine Jackson and Michael McClolry — List: 7.98**

This second offering to credit Jermaine's solo career exhibits some exceptional talents on his part. "Castles Of Sand" certainly exemplifies his vocal abilities, while upbeat tunes like "The Force" and "Take A Trip To My Tomorrow (Let's Encounter For The First Time)" dominate the disc and showcase his talents as a musician as well, but "Je Vous Aime Beaucoup (I Love You)" should not be ignored. Should do well on R&B and pop playlists.

NEW YORK — The Cleveland Orchestra under Lorin Maazel's direction recently played a series of four concerts at Carnegie Hall. The opening night featured "Tchaikovsky's First Piano Concerto" with Lazar Berman as soloist and Stravinsky's "The Rite Of Spring."

Maazel served up a very exciting if somewhat idiosyncratic performance of the latter work. In the first half of the piece, his tempos and transitions between radically different sections were judiciously thought out and admirably executed. The players' overlapping entrances dovetailed beautifully, and there were many individual touches of excellence.

The orchestra's stolid, studied playing in the first movement of Tchaikovsky's "First Piano Concerto" failed to generate the romantic mood which this music needs; and in the last movement, tempos were changed too often and too much to preserve a sense of continuity. Nevertheless, the andante was treated as the delicate, lovely reverie that it is.

After experiencing Lazar Berman's extraordinary virtuosity in solo recitals, it was rather disappointing to hear merely average playing from him in much of the concerto. In one of the long solo passages of the first movement, for instance, Berman didn't supply the kind of dynamic contrast which one expected there. He played as if he were treading on eggshells.

The concert's opening number, the overture to Glinka's "Russian And Ludmilla," was brilliantly performed. Fleet and light, the orchestra's playing showed it to be in virtuoso trim.

In the second concert, the orchestra's reading of Sibelius' "Violin Concerto" with Victor Tretyakov as soloist was a big crowd-pleaser. Nevertheless, this talented young artist delivered a somewhat uneven performance. Despite the sweetness of the soloist's entry in the first movement, for example, and his mastery of fast arpeggios and runs, he didn't always seem sure of the emotional nuances involved. His bowing was very smooth, but one missed the raw power of a Francescatti.

In the cadenza, Tretyakov hit his stride, double-stopping with a true professional's flair. His solo in the slow movement again showed his golden tone — reminiscent of Perlman — but lacked depth. Tretyakov seemed most at home in the finale, where

he played with wild Gypsy abandon.

The orchestral part is crucial in this concerto, and happily, the Clevelanders gave it their all. Among the many special touches in the performance was the way the cellos faded into the first movement cadenza. The orchestra also showed a superb sense of rhythm in the last movement. In their version of Sibelius' "Finlandia," likewise, the Cleveland musicians played like a welded unit, with excellent coordination and timing.

Dvorak's "Symphony No. 8," which rounded out the program, received a warm, persuasive reading. Maazel seemed thoroughly relaxed and in control at the same time. Without allowing any section to become too schmaltzy or melodramatic, he guided the orchestra easily through the work's manifold changes in tempo and mood. Especially pleasing was the Allegro gracioso, which was as graceful as any I've heard. Maazel maintained a rock-steady tempo here, allowing only a tasteful touch of rubato in the strings just prior to the recapitulation.

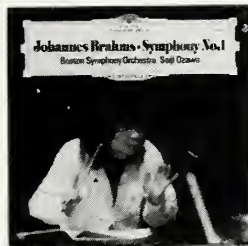
Gerald Humel's "Lepini," which led off the third concert, was the only contemporary work on any of the Cleveland's programs in New York. One would hesitate to label it "avant garde," since the work clearly derived its atmosphere and many of the string effects from Bartok. Nevertheless, "Lepini" showed Humel to be a master of orchestration.

Mozart's "Piano Concerto No. 26 In D Major" is a lightweight among the composer's large-scale works. However, soloist Bruno Leonardo Gelber brought a fittingly clean, precise style to his performance with the Cleveland Orchestra. His brilliance in the cadenza, lifted from another D major concerto by Mozart, was a standout.

The evening's highpoint was Maazel's reading of the Brahms "First Symphony," which he and the Clevelanders recently recorded in a Brahms cycle for London Records. The first movement, while well-paced and feelingly rendered, ran out of steam because Maazel built to a climax too rapidly. But the tender, melting harmonies of the Andante (with a colorful, husky vibrato in the first violin solo) and the masterful transitions of the third movement restored the orchestra's momentum. By the allegro non troppo section of the final movement, they were really cooking. From

BRAHMS — Symphony No. 1 — Boston Symphony Orchestra, Seiji Ozawa, conductor — DG 2530 889 — List: 8.98

Beautifully recorded and performed, this version of Brahms' First could be a choice for either novice record buyers or even those who already own other versions of the work. As usual, Ozawa delineates the music in great detail. Occasionally, this slows down the forward momentum; but in most cases it results in a sound that is both rich and dramatic.



RACHMANINOFF — Piano Concerto No. 3 — Vladimir Horowitz, piano; New York Philharmonic, Eugene Ormandy, conductor — RCA CRL 1-2633 — List: 8.98

No one is going to argue about the high list price on this record, which should be one of the hottest items of the year. Horowitz once again proves why he is considered one of the top pianists around. While he is easily as fast as Berman, and has as light a touch as, say, Tomas Vasary, Horowitz constantly surprises the listener with new interpretations that make various passages of this familiar concerto seem fresh and new.



PUCCINI — Il Tabarro — Renata Scotto, Placido Domingo, Ingvar Wixell, Philharmonia Orchestra, Lorin Maazel, conductor — Columbia M 34570 — List: 7.98

This completes the Columbia version of "Il Trittico," which also features Scotto singing the female leads in "Gianni Schicchi" and "Suor Angelica." "Il Tabarro" requires a different kind of singing from either of the other two, but Scotto rises to the challenge. Placido Domingo (Luigi) and Ingvar Wixell (Michele) make this a fascinating love triangle, and the Philharmonia does full justice to the dramatic music.

Mongo Gets Grammy

LOS ANGELES — Veteran conguero/bandleader Mongo Santamaria was awarded a Grammy for Best Latin Recording on his last effort for Vaya Records, "Amanecer" (Dawn), at NARAS' 20th annual awards show presented here Feb. 23.

Santamaria, who first arrived in the U.S. from his native Cuba in 1950 and was the exponent of the 1963 crossover hit, "Watermelon Man," written by Herbie Hancock, had been nominated twice since the inception of a Grammy in the Latin music category in 1975. The first nomination was for "Afro-Indio" in 1975 and the second for "Sofrito" in 1976. Throughout his career, Santamaria has developed top American music notables through his orchestra, including Chick Corea, who performed on the

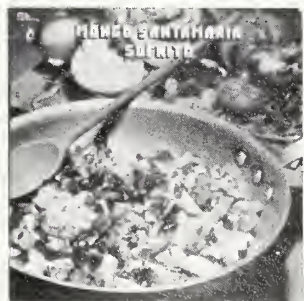

Originally aired over **WNOE-FM** in New Orleans, the program is being offered free of charge, and complete with space for commercial inserts, for nationwide syndication.

PROMOTION IN MOTION

COLUMBIA TAKES TO THE HILLS — "Jamboree In The Hills '77," a two-hour film by Columbia Pictures Pay Television, is currently being distributed to cable operators across the country. The film will serve as a unique promotional tool for the next annual country bash, which is slated for Ohio July 15-16.

The 1977 show at Brush Run Park in St. Clairsville, Ohio, drew about 26,000 fans, and featured a bevy of top country stars, including **Charlie Rich**, **Tammy Wynette**, **Donna Fargo**, **Tom T. Hall** and **Asleep At The Wheel**. Much of the success of Jamboree 1977 was attributed to the pulling power of Columbia Pictures-owned station **WWVA** in Wheeling, West Virginia, which has been broadcasting a weekly jamboree show to 18 states and six Canadian provinces since 1933.

Columbia Pix last week hosted a press preview for the new film, showing a 20-minute excerpt.

Slated to appear at Jamboree 1978 are such stars as **Ronnie Milsap**, **Charley Pride** and **Mel Tillis**. As over 90% of a sample of audience members last year indicated that they would return in 1978, the prospects are excellent for the upcoming festival being the biggest country blowout ever.

The fate of the single should be some sort of indication as to the sales performance of Travolta's next solo Midsong LP, expected later this year. Also, the release of RSO's "Sgt. Pepper" soundtrack album might bring forth "Got To Get You Into My Life" by **Earth, Wind & Fire** as a single on Columbia.

Edward McLaughlin, president of the ABC Radio Network, in making the announcement praised Foreman for "his wide and varied experience with a number of the nation's leading broadcast organizations, working with a variety of program formats, uniquely qualifying him to direct the programming efforts of the four ABC Radio Network program services — the American Contemporary, American Entertainment, American FM and American Information Radio Networks."

ABC Radio programming vice president **Rick Sklar** called Foreman "a welcome addition to the ABC Radio division's select team of highly talented and skilled programmers. His appointment means that the ABC Radio Network will enjoy, on a day to day basis, the same high level of creative programming expertise that we have at each of our owned AM and FM stations."

In his newly created position, Foreman will supervise all program operations of the network as well as its sports programming, talent relations and production. He will also work closely with ABC News vice president **Thomas O'Brien** in the implementation of the four network news services.

CKLW, Pine Knob Deal Announced

DETROIT — Radio station **CKLW** in Detroit recently announced an exclusive promotion and advertising agreement with the Pine Knob Theatre. Future shows at the outdoor pavilion will be presented by **CKLW**.

"This gives us an association with the best concert facility in the northern Ohio and Michigan area," says **CKLW** promotion manager **Al Cecile**. The theatre has an 11,000-person capacity, with 6,000 seats and a hill beyond the seating area. It is located about 30 miles north of Detroit.

The theatre, primarily a summer venue, is managed by the Neaderlander family, who also manages similar venues around the country, including the Greek Theatre in Los Angeles. **CKLW** is reportedly exploring the possibility of broadcasting concerts live from the theatre, but no shows have been announced as yet.

Taft Reports Radio Revenue Increase

NEW YORK — The Taft Broadcasting Company has reported a large increase in third quarter net revenues for its radio properties. Revenues jumped 34% to \$4.49 million for the period ended December 31, 1977.

Overall, Taft's third quarter broadcast revenues (radio and TV) rose to \$20.53 million from \$17.67 million in the previous year's period, while their broadcasting profits rose to \$10.3 million from \$8.7 million.

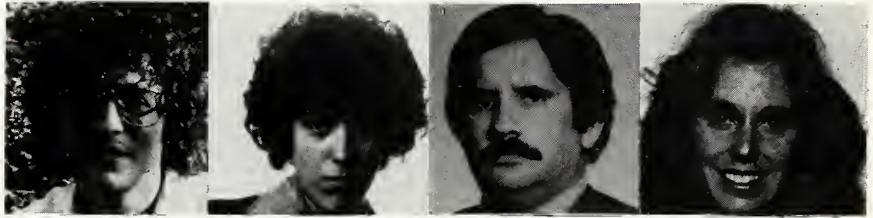

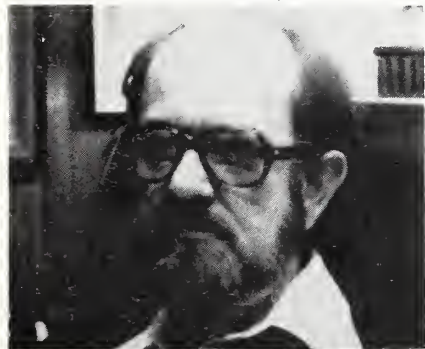
Celebrity Management Offers A Wide Range Of Services

NASHVILLE — Bob Bray, co-founder and president of Celebrity Management, Inc. (CMI) here, operates on a simple managerial premise — offer a client more services than he or she is able to get elsewhere. With that in mind, Bray feels his organization can not only compete with Nashville agencies, but can vie for representation of Nashville celebrities who are being lured by agencies in New York and Los Angeles.

Bray's key phrase is "full-service." After barely a year's operation, CMI has developed to the point where it can oversee all phases of a client's career — concert and television appearances, media representation on all levels and consultation in record-contract negotiations.

"Most of the booking agencies in Nashville book artists and are not primarily interested in career development and this

type of thing," said Bray, a veteran of 13 years in the banking business who moved here in 1973 and entered the field of entertainment. "As a result, we have seen many artists leave Nashville for representation on the west coast and New York City. We thought that should change. There is no need, no logical reason for acts to leave Nashville. Most of the Nashville crossover acts need to be represented here.

Main Difference

"The main difference between our agency and others here is that an artist can walk through our doors and receive everything he needs," added Bray, whose organization grossed over \$1 million during its first year of operation. "We feel very strongly about the value of public relations and promotion. We can provide major feature articles for some of our artists, and we can provide television exposure. More than that, we can work directly with the record companies. We feel that an artist's ability to reach stardom is primarily the result of a record company's interest in that artist."

Expanding in a year from a two-office suite to a seven-office suite, CMI includes a public relations division (managed by Bray's wife, Charlene), a publishing division (Alamo Village Music) and a new west coast office, managed by Brian Mark. Texas Happy Shahan is a silent partner in CMI. And recently, CMI has entered the pop-rock booking field with the addition of Blackbird, Inc.

Among those represented by CMI now are RCA's Gary Stewart, RCA's Steve Young, "Hee Haw"'s Roni Stoneman, humorist Dr. Charles Jarvis, New Orleans's WWL Radio's Charlie Douglas, True Records's Leon Everette and Sahara's Elvis Wade, an Elvis imitator. CMI's publicity division represents United Artists' Dottie West and Columbia's Moe Bandy.

Recently, CMI has acquired representation for Bert Lance, President Carter's former Director of the Office of Management

and Budget. One of CMI's first moves was a successful negotiation for Lance and his wife, LaBelle, to appear on Tom Snyder's nationally televised "Tomorrow" Show. As a result of CMI's efforts, "Playboy" Magazine has interviewed Wade, and Stewart will soon be seen on "The Midnight Special."

CMI believes in individuals, not merely recording artists. According to Bray, CMI seeks to develop the potential of individual personalities.

Focus on Concept

"Our main focus is strictly on concept," Bray said. "Whether he is a star now, or whether we think he has star potential, we take a person and explore all of the areas for career development — be it country or pop music, or as a public speaker or sports personality. As long as a person has the potential ingredients with which to build a career, it doesn't matter to me what field he represents.

"You know, there are many, many acts in this town today that I think have the potential of being major acts who are just not doing anything with their careers," Bray added. "I also believe there are acts here who have made it big, perhaps with a hit record, and don't know how or where to go from there. The services provided by us are geared to get an artist off the ground, build him up and keep him going."

Improper Planning

Bray also said he feels many acts are improperly planned. According to Bray, some artists can perform well on stage, but lack the knowledge of record promotion. And there are others who might have a hit song, but are at a loss as to what their next step should be. Bray said the two elements "should mesh together." He feels this is a definite area where CMI can benefit a client.

When Bray signed Elvis Wade (CMI's first client), he encountered certain logistical problems which pointed to the need for more services by management agencies.

"Our very first act was an Elvis impersonator by the name of Elvis Wade," Bray said. "Wade had moved down here from Detroit (Michigan) and he had had some

WILLIE NELSON (RCA PB-11235)

If You Can Touch Her At All (3:03) (Resaca Music — BMI) (Lee Clayton)

Taken from the "Waylon And Willie" album, this combination of Willie Nelson's clear vocals with Lee Clayton's spare, insightful lyrics should shoot "If You Can Touch Her At All" right to the top of the charts. Production completely supports this sterling song.

DOLLY PARTON (RCA AFL 1-2544)

It's All Wrong, But It's All Right (2:42) (Velvet Apple Music — BMI) (Dolly Parton)

Despite the growing sophistication which surrounds every aspect of Dolly's career, her basic roots remain seeded in the soil of country music. Picked from her "Here You Come Again" album, this cut may go pop but it belongs high on the country charts.

MERLE HAGGARD (MCA 40869)

I'm Always On A Mountain When I Fall (2:48) (ATV Music Corp./Shade Tree Music Inc. — BMI) (Chuck Howard)

Merle has moved into the middle of the road with this mellow ballad. This polished record has a good chance of crossing over into the pop charts.

THE STATLER BROTHERS (Mercury 55022)

Do You Know You Are My Sunshine (2:13) (American Cowboy Music — BMI)

Bridled with booming bass harmony and a bright hook line, this new single should hop high on the charts and prove a winner for the Statler Brothers.

SONNY JAMES (Columbia 3-10703)

This Is The Love (2:43) (Bobby Goldsboro Music — ASCAP/House Of Gold Music — BMI) (B. Springfield/L. Wood)

Even Sonny James is working with strings and more elaborate production these days, but "This Is The Love" is a pretty ballad which will bring Sonny back on the charts.

This song was a hit for Del Shannon in the '60s and is the perfect vehicle for Narvel to once again show his vocal range. Should draw heavy play at jukebox level.

This standard produced by David Barnes should shine a new light on Nat Stuckey's career. A good strong beat and soulful female accompaniment add to the enjoyment.

RED SOVINE (Gusto-Starday SD 180)

Lay Down Sally (2:44) (Stigwood Music/Unichappell Music — BMI) (E. Clapton/M. Levy/G. Terry)

Sovine is very well liked by country programmers and that may be the lever he needs in order to get more airplay on this song. Country music directors also have the Eric Clapton and Jack Paris versions in hand.

CATES SISTERS (Caprice CA-2047)

Long Gone Blues (2:42) (Sabal Music Inc. — ASCAP) (Dave Hanner)

These girls reach higher into the charts with each release. Their last single "I've Been Loved" hit the Top 30 of the **Cash Box** country chart and had heavier than normal sales.

FREDDY FENDER (ABC AB-12339)

If You're Looking For A Fool (2:16) (Crazy Cajun Music — BMI) (Thomas/McRae/Thomas)

Huey Meaux again produced Fender and the Houston sound is obvious. That sound, along with the unique Tex-Mex delivery, should see many adds at country stations.

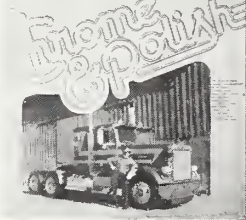

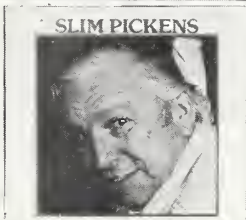

Slim Pickens will go down in screen history as one of our finest Western character actors. And no one . . . no one has been blessed with a more distinctive, tumbleweed speaking voice. Someone has finally taken that voice into the recording studio. Although the production detracts slightly from Pickens's unique vocals, Pickens lends character and strength to a selection of narrations and western songs. Guy Clark's "Desperados Waiting For A Train" is a powerful cut, and the interesting "A Stranger In Nashville" could be a surprise country hit.

CHARLEE — *Standing In Your Shoes* — Amerama A-1005 — Producer: Henry Strzlecki — List: 6.98

You can expect to hear more in the future from this talented lady. Charlee can belt out an up-tempo tune or settle down and caress a soft, country ballad. Some of the material on this album could be improved, but Charlee brings out the best in the lyric of each song. She mixes a couple of country standards with new tunes for a well-rounded album. "All The Good Things Are Gone" could be a hit song. "Standing In Your Shoes" and "You Hum The Tune" are also quality songs.



The Country Column

The week of the Grammy Awards culminated a tremendous year for United Artists' **Crystal Gayle**. In the space of one week, Crystal learned her album, "We Must Believe In Magic," had been certified platinum by the RIAA, and she won a Grammy Award for the "Best Country Female Vocal Performance" with **Richard Leigh's** classy "Don't It Make My Brown Eyes Blue." It was less than a year ago that Crystal made her first network television appearance on **Lou Rawls' ABC Special**. In addition to winning nearly every country female vocal award this year, Crystal's music has had a major influence on the changing face of country music and the acceptance of more diversified music in Nashville.

Ovation's **The Kendalls**, who captured a Grammy for "Best Country Vocal Performance," accepted the award following a 26-day tour of the southwest. Two nights before the Grammy Awards, **The Kendalls** made their debut at **Los Angeles's Palomino Club**, where folks like **Linda Ronstadt** and **The Oak Ridge Boys** caught their act. **The Kendalls's** "It Don't Feel Like Sinnin' To Me" is picking up where "Heaven's Just A Sin Away" left off. It could be another No. 1 song for the duo.

If you can believe this, Mercury's **Sherri Williams** has a new single out called "Close Encounters Of The Cheatin' Kind." **Jerry Gillespie**, who wrote "Heaven's Just A Sin Away," co-wrote and produced Sherri's new single.

Capitol's **Lee Clayton** came by the **Cash Box** offices here last week. After a self-imposed layoff from the Nashville music scene, Clayton has been active here the last few months and his career seems back in full swing. Clayton's new album, "Border Affair," is on the market, and **Willie Nelson's** new single, "If You Can Touch Her At All," is a Clayton-penned song. "If You Can Touch Her At All" is on the **Cash Box** #1 country album, "Waylon And Willie." Clayton burst on the Nashville scene four or five years ago when he wrote "Ladies Love Outlaws" for **Waylon Jennings**, a song many felt gave direction and definition to the "outlaw movement" here.

This week Warner Bros.' **Margo Smith** will sing "Don't Break The Heart That Loves You" on the **Chuck Barris Rah Rah Show**, a new, one-hour television variety program.

Doc and Merle Watson are back in the studio working on a new album. Doc's son, **Merle**, has been producing the sessions at **The Soundshop** here.

Hank Williams, Jr. was a recent guest on "Soundstage," a music show on educational TV. He has also been in Los Angeles working on material for a new album.

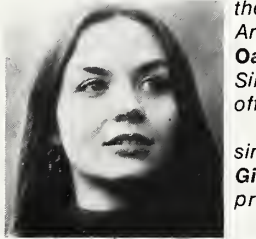

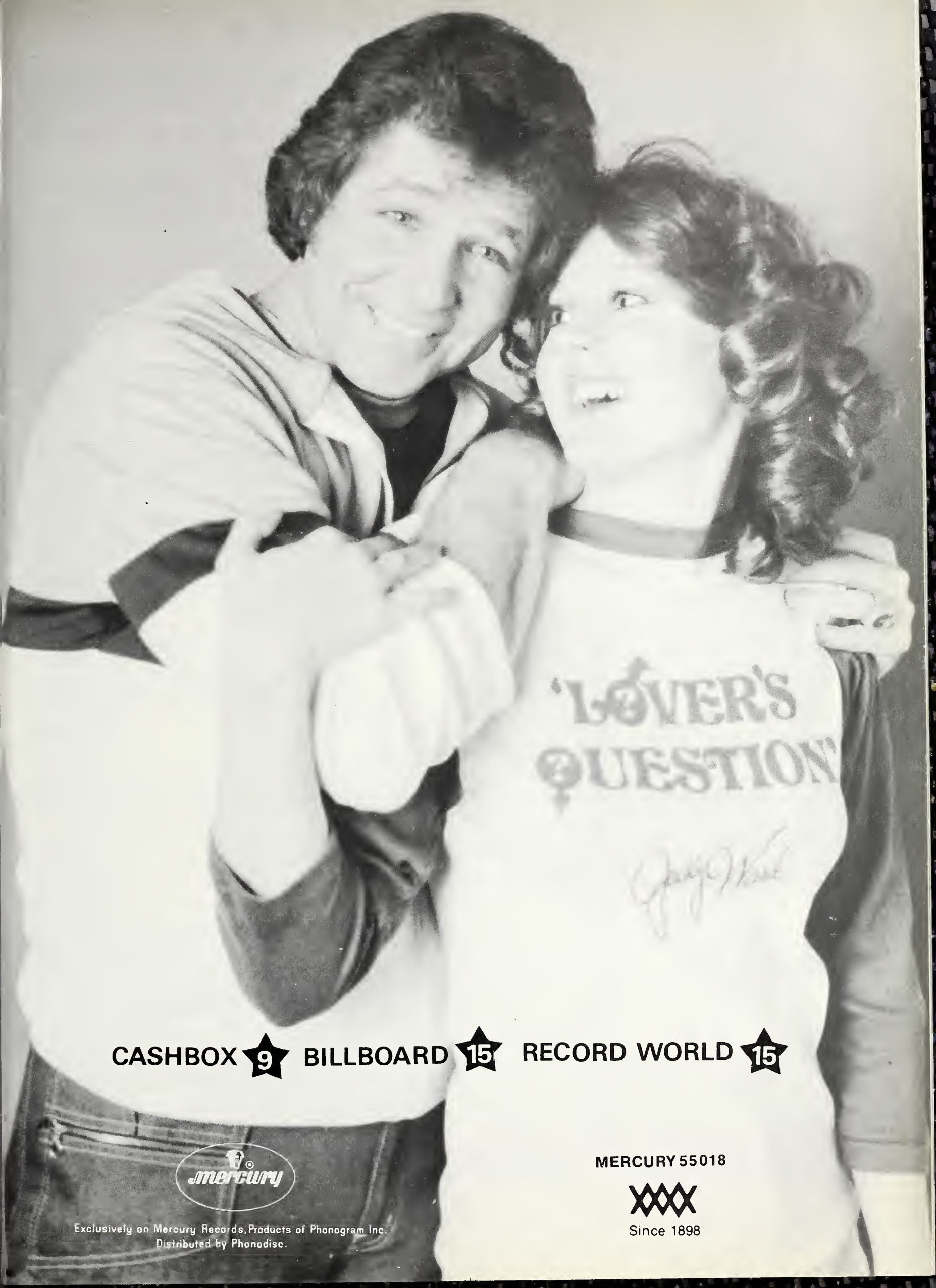

Don Williams Plays Nashville Date With Eric Clapton Before 10,000

by Bob Campbell

NASHVILLE — Country artist Don Williams shared the concert stage with rock guitarist Eric Clapton here recently before a packed house of 10,000 people in Nashville's Municipal Auditorium. In addition to the significance of a major country artist being billed with a major rock artist, the concert marked Williams' first major personal appearance in Nashville.

According to Jerry Bailey, ABC's national country publicity director, Williams and Clapton met for the first time two years ago during Williams' European concert tour.

"They met in England approximately two years ago when Don was touring on the strength of the English pop acceptance of 'I Recall A Gypsy Woman,' Bailey said. 'Eric and Pete Townshend came to some of the shows. Eric admired Don's music and they became friends. A year later when Don returned to England, Clapton played dobro

behind Don on a couple of his shows. When Eric came over here to tour and found out he would be playing Nashville, he asked Don to open the show. Eric encouraged Don to take a big step and play before a

rock audience."

Dressed in his customary jeans and old felt hat with the tasseled Civil War hatband, Williams opened the concert with a 30-minute set. Backed with his usual three-piece group of lead guitar, bass and drums, Williams moved through most of his hit songs such as "Amanda," "Shelter Of Your Eyes" and "I Recall A Gypsy Woman." Williams received a warm reception.

In retrospect, Bailey considers the concert a success for Williams. Although many in the audience were unfamiliar with Williams, Bailey felt the crowd accepted his

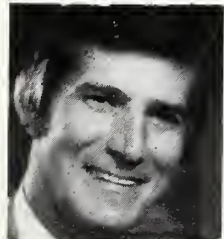
bad experiences in the business. We began to work with him. We learned a lot from working with Wade, and he is doing better than he ever has."

Bray emphasized again his concern for CMI to function as a full-service agency. "Our main goal is to provide total career guidance. The only way to do that is to provide for them here what they can get elsewhere."

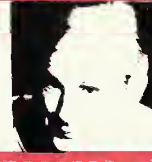

Sega Announces Increased Second Quarter Sales And Earnings Figures

REDONDO BEACH, CA — Sega Enterprises, Inc. has reported fiscal 1978 second quarter earnings of \$175,000, or 10 cents per share, on sales of \$8.35 million. This compares with earnings of \$48,000, or two cents per share, on sales of \$7.08 million for the similar period in the previous year.

Net earnings include a foreign exchange translation gain of \$116,000, or six cents per share, in fiscal 1978, and a foreign exchange translation loss of \$17,000, or one cent per share, in fiscal 1977.

For the six months ended Dec. 31, 1977, earnings were \$546,000, or 29 cents per share, on revenues of \$16.68 million. This compares with earnings of \$689,000, or 36 cents per share, on revenues of \$14.43 million in 1977.

Net earnings include foreign exchange translation gains of \$210,000, or 11 cents per share, in the first half of fiscal 1978 and \$224,000, or 12 cents per share, in the fiscal 1977 period.

Game Centers Expand

The increase in second quarter revenues reflected expanded amusement center operations in the United States, which more than offset a decline in sales of coin-operated games and large screen television systems. Revenues in Japan, the company's principal market, increased also, as a result of the differential in the yen exchange rate for the year and from expanded amusement center operations.

Sega reported it has introduced new coin-operated amusement games in both

the United States and Japan. The company is also continuing efforts to expand the profitable amusement center operations.

Various Operations

Sega manufactures and distributes coin-operated amusement games, large screen television projection systems, and other entertainment products. The company, which also operates amusement centers in the United States and Japan, is a 95 percent-owned subsidiary of Gulf+Western Industries, Inc.

CHICAGO — Ross B. Scheer, director of marketing at Bally Manufacturing Corporation, announced the promotion of Felicia Tornabene to the position of field service assistant in the firm's marketing field service department. In her new position, she will be assisting Bernie Powers and Jack O'Donnell in the area of customer relations.

Ms. Tornabene came to Bally in September of 1976 on a student internship program from Mundelein College. During her internship she worked in departments relating to her educational studies which included personnel, labor relations, safety, and security and insurance. She also assisted in the coordination of the three international electronic flipper schools which were held in Chicago in May of 1977.

After graduation from Mundelein she became a full-time employee at Bally, serving as personnel administrative assistant at the firm's Franklin Park facility.

Vending Machines Bring Aid To Ohio Blizzard Victims

CHICAGO — Thousands of Ohioans who were stranded at home or at work during the recent blizzards that ravaged the state discovered some modern day St. Bernards in the form of coin-operated vending machines. The machines, according to Walter Reed of the National Automatic Merchandising Assn. (NAMA), supplied food and beverages to victims of the storms when no other method was available.

The association went on to cite numerous examples of public reliance on vending machines in the face of continuing harsh weather conditions to illustrate the timely aid provided by vending companies and route service personnel throughout the state.

Reports emerging after the storms indicated that vending machines in factories sustained stranded workers in Cincinnati, Zanesville, Springfield, Columbus, Dayton and other cities. In a number of afflicted areas, vending companies donated meals, bread and fruit to persons seeking shelter in armories and Red Cross shelters.

Emergency Appeals

Sheehan Brothers Vending Service, a Springfield-based vending firm, supplied bread to Mercy Medical Center in

Springfield and to Mercy Memorial Hospital in Urbana, when the two hospitals broadcast appeals for assistance Jan. 26 after they had run out of bread. Sheehan Brothers also responded to requests for help from employees of the Ohio Bell Telephone Company (who were on 24-hour duty and stranded at their offices) by providing fruit, foods and beverages. In another incident, this one at a factory, Sheehan personnel discovered that money from a dollar-bill changing machine had been used to supply coins to stranded employees who wanted to use their vending machines during the emergency. Factory officials later refunded the money to the vending company.

NAMA further reported that some 20 factories served by Quality Food and Vending Company of Dayton and Columbus chose to offer free foods and beverages from the machines. Quality's Columbus branch had scheduled a company dinner for 500 persons which was cancelled because of the storm but, rather than waste the food, the company donated it to the Red Cross for the many victims being sheltered at the National Guard Armory.

Williams Shifts Its Solid-State Games Training Class Program Into Full Gear

CHICAGO — To familiarize distributors and operators with the unique features of solid-state games, Williams Electronics, Inc. has been conducting an intensive training school program throughout the United States.

Directing the program is David L. Poole, manager of advanced development at Williams. He describes the program as a combination of classroom lectures with a "hands-on" session whereby those attending gain actual experience in solving on-the-job problems.

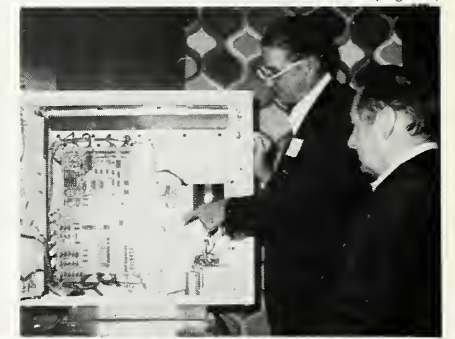
"These new games have an entirely different technology," Poole says. "They can be a real challenge to distributors and operators accustomed to electromechanical types of games since the machines require a higher level of expertise and present different types of problems."

The training program is divided into separate sessions for distributors and operators, and will continue through May. By then, according to Poole, the company will have explained the features and advantages of solid-state games to 100 distributor service managers and approximately 2,000 operators.

Instructors for the initial session were designers and programmers for the company. The three-day sessions were held during a three-week period in December 1977, with distributors attending from as far away as Germany, France and the Netherlands.

The second phase of the program consists of one-day classes, which began in February. The sessions are concentrated versions of the first phase of the training program and are directed to operators. The operator training sessions, with between 30

CHICAGO — Dick Finger, Gottlieb's field service seminar leader, escaped the storm ravages of the U.S.A. the week of Feb. 13 by jetting to Europe where he conducted technical sessions for the distributors of Mondial Commercial Corp. in France. He conducted similar sessions in Hamburg, Germany for Nova Apparate, Gottlieb's distributor in that country.

Prior to the overseas trip, Finger had been dodging snow catastrophes in various

American cities and in many instances schools had to be postponed because of weather conditions; but, in spite of it all, he managed to conduct several successful and well attended seminars for a number of Gottlieb distributors. According to Finger, the "man in the field" feels very strongly that the Gottlieb solid-state system is not only highly reliable but quite simple to work with and understand. Service-All Announces Vending Machine Alarm

LOS ANGELES — The Security Systems Services Division of Greensboro, North Carolina-based Service-All Inc. has announced Vend-Alarm, a warning device that protects coin-operated machines from losses due to damage or theft. The heart of the system consists of a microswitch that trips the alarm as soon as forced entry is attempted — or before doors are bent or mangled.

The Vend-Alarm features a loud electronic siren with an official "police-type" sound. The alarm will continue even if the door is closed and the wires are cut.

An automatic 15-minute turn-off system and an automatic patent-pending arming device is available along with a Medeco lock feature that will lock a group of machines with one lock.

According to the manufacturer: "An important feature is the unit's value to the vendor and, if losses in problem locations amount to more than \$25 from theft or damage over a five year period, the alarm will usually save the owner and/or operator money."

Game time and coin modes are operator adjustable and extended play can be awarded on operator-selected high score levels. A convenient slide out step is another built-in feature.

Lila Zinter, Meadows marketing director, said 3-D Bowling was developed in response to requests from operators and distributors who wanted a more realistic video bowling game. Both stand-up and cocktail versions are currently available through the firm's network of distributors.

Earnings have been solid and consistent, he added, and even during the bad weather period here, collections in test locations have been most outstanding.

BALLY'S FIELD SERVICE MANAGER Bernie Powers had 96 people in attendance for the Bally school he conducted at Greater Southern Dist. in Atlanta. At press time, he was en route to Toronto to join Midway's **Andy Ducay** for a Bally-Midway session at Nu-Way Sales. **Jack O'Donnell**, meanwhile, conducted a session at Empire in Indianapolis followed by two schools, under sponsorship of the Rowe distributorship in Houston and San Antonio, respectively.

"In Dayton we used our radio facilities to take calls and we ferried doctors and nurses to hospitals and to treat elderly persons who couldn't get out," said Quality Vending co-owner **Judy Phillips**. She said the company assigned two employees to every truck so that they could get through the snow-clogged roads.

Stranded Workers

Sanese Services of Columbus brought a four-wheel drive truck to reach stranded workers in one plant and opened food storage areas in three other factories so that trapped workers could eat. The firm also made special efforts to supply workers of the electric power company who were scattered in outlying areas while trying to restore power to hospitals and to the telephone company.

In Cincinnati the Howard Derringer Company operated a "modified taxi service" and company personnel helped to dig cars, trucks and people out of the ice and snow.

Evacuation

Servomation Corporation of Zanesville assisted in evacuating isolated families from their homes to a church and proceeded to supply the nearly 200 evacuees with sandwiches, cups, confectios, books and even baby clothes.

Larry Weiner, a maintenance man for Servomation, secured a company van and

worked around-the-clock to free stranded families and assist the National Guard and police officials. Using a CB radio and police contacts, Weiner helped to free 30 persons who were marooned in a barn five miles from the nearest passable road.

Ohio vending company managers received numerous letters of commendation from clients and from victims of the storm.

television stations to identify the composers of a record each time it is played or performed on the air in the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico. The legislation is still under study by the Puerto Rican House of Representatives.

Robert L. Bennett, president of Mid-Ocean Broadcasting Corp. in San Juan, cited what he believes to be potentially disastrous results should the legislation pass. He told *R&R Magazine*: "Imagine what this will do to the beautiful music stations which don't even give song titles, much less the names of the composers. The clutter on the airwaves will be unbelievable!"

According to Bennett, the bill also proposed that all record labels must contain composers' names, publisher's names, recording dates, and copyright protection data. Most or all of this information can already be found on the vast majority of record labels, but Bennett anticipates possible expensive customizing problems for record companies whose labels might lack the information and who seek Puerto Rican sales. He urges that lobbies in Washington should be contacted to inform congressmen of the Puerto Rican developments, so that they in turn can attempt to make industry views known to the Puerto Rican legislative bodies.

ASCAP, Public B'casters Still Far Apart On Licensing

programming, talent, staff, and even sponsors. Over the past decade, ASCAP noted, public broadcasting has been increasingly supported by commercial sponsors (which PBS and NPR call corporate underwriters). Business sponsorship of public TV, the rights society said, rose from \$6.6 million in 1973 to \$17.4 million in 1976.

To further support its position, ASCAP described the PBS interconnecting station system as parallel to commercial networks. It was also pointed out that public TV's prime time audience share is more than half the average prime time commercial viewership, that music is a vital element on public radio stations, and that the public radio audience is growing. According to ASCAP figures, public radio had 3.4 million listeners in 1976.

Public Broadcasters' Response

In opposition to ASCAP, the Public Broadcasting Copyrights Project told the Copyright Royalty Tribunal that, "The goals, programming, sources of funding, audience, etc. of public broadcasting in this country are so unique that the analogy does

not fit. Nevertheless, even if one were to make such comparisons (to commercial broadcasting), a total music payment of \$750,000 per year would be appropriate."

The \$750,000 figure approximates the revenues that would accrue to ASCAP under a five-year license arrangement that would set fees depending on the medium and the purposes for which a copyrighted work was used.

For TV feature presentations, performance rights would be \$100 and recording rights \$50; background and theme music would be \$25 for performance and recording rights.

For radio feature presentations, the rate would be \$10 for performance and recording rights; background and theme music would be \$25 for both rights. Series theme music would be 200% of the above theme rates.

Written comments for ASCAP and the public broadcasters indicate that both parties will be armed with dollar figures, tables and charts to support their arguments when they battle it out with Tom Brennan and the Tribunal this week.

the point at which the stately theme bursts into a wilder incarnation to the many-faceted finale, the orchestra played with tremendous power and eloquence.

The series' final concert opened with a fine rendition of Schumann's "Second Symphony." Especially enthralling was the Clevelanders' performance of the Adagio, which is the best part of this symphony.

Maazel and his players also delivered an

effective reading of Mahler's "Das Lied Von Der Erde." The light yet pungent textures of the orchestra (for example, the woodwinds played against cellos in the first song) gleamed brightly or darkly, depending on the mood. This stunning clarity, with every melodic strand and timbre etched in sharp relief, was maintained throughout the performance.

Mezzo-soprano soloist Julia Hamari has a velvety voice which sounded best in its highest range. At the conclusion of the sixth song, her ethereal tones gave the text a magical meaning; but where the tessitura was low, as in the fourth song, she could barely be heard. The other soloist, Richard Cassilly, has a rich tenor which he used to good effect in the ardent song of youth and the humorous drunkard's song.

After three years with Red Bullet, Haayen returned to the Dutch Polydor subsidiary as managing director. In 1974, he was appointed to run Polydor Ltd., U.K., which he left in December of 1977 to become vice president of Polydor International.

Dr. Schnabel, who was vice president of business affairs for both Polydor Inc. and Phonogram Inc., will continue to focus his attention on business affairs in his new capacity. His functions at the sister labels will not change significantly, as he has been involved in their management for some time.

A graduate of the University of Wurzburg, Germany, and the University of California at Berkeley, Dr. Schnabel has worked with the Polygram Group both here and abroad for more than a decade. He was appointed vice president of business affairs for Polydor in 1974 and vice president of business affairs for Phonogram in 1976.

Community Service Programs Stepped Up At Radio KKTT

LOS ANGELES — "The Kat," Los Angeles radio KKTT, will step up its public service programming in an effort to increase community involvement in black radio. At the same time the station is urging various service organizations in the city to become involved in the project.

According to Ron Dungee, director of news and information, in the past the station's community service programs have been lacking in certain areas, and, as a result, there is a need for shows with "more meaningful content."

"The best way to achieve this," stated Dungee, "is to get people who are actively involved in trying to promote changes to be involved in community service programs."

So far, the NAACP, United High Blood Pressure Foundation, the Brotherhood Crusade, the Los Angeles Urban League and the Black Businessmen's Association have been contacted for the project. Each organization, in Dungee's opinion, is significant to blacks.

Significant Groups

He pointed out that the NAACP is the oldest civil rights organization in the country and that the Urban League and Brotherhood Crusade are two of the most active groups of this kind. The fact that high blood pressure is one of the foremost killers of black Americans makes the United High Blood Pressure Foundation a logical program choice, he said. Dungee noted further that the Black Businessmen's Association would be able to provide information on employment opportunities (including government related programs) and the creation of additional jobs through black-owned businesses.

"Through this particular segment," says Dungee of the Black Businessmen's

Association, "there is the possibility of blacks coming into their own by operating their own businesses, thereby keeping more of the hard earned dollars in the community. Statistics show that dollars fly out of the black community at a faster rate than in any other ethnic neighborhood." He adds that it is the lack of economic stability in our community that has, in the past, caused a vast majority of our community problems."

Format

Currently the station is working with the organizations in planning the subject matter and formats. The first program is scheduled to air in about six weeks. The programs will be presented on Sundays at 11:30 a.m. with a specific title/topic selected by the agencies themselves. The approach will be a "news-type" presentation designed to eliminate some of the "unnecessary chatter" Dungee associated with the moderator/guest format.

'Talk Back'

In addition, KKTT has tentatively scheduled a "talk back" segment to air on Sunday evenings in conjunction with the earlier program. This will be a live broadcast featuring the individuals involved in the previously aired taped segments and will allow for "direct and immediate contact between the community and the agencies involved," according to Dungee.

"If this initial effort proves to be as successful as we believe it will," Dungee says, "the effort will be expanded to include other community organizations in the city."

He concludes, "The whole idea is to give this radio station back to the community. For so long it has been like an impregnable fortress. Black people expect more from a black radio station and the only way for a station of that caliber to succeed is through heavy community involvement."

television marketing. But Hurwitz said that this could change. "Eventually the fusion audience will overcome their difficulties with the avant-garde purists. Five years ago, for instance, Keith Jarrett, a purist, would never had sold as well as he does today."

The major record companies evidenced a general feeling that the return for dollars invested would simply be too low to justify advertising "pure" jazz on TV at this time. "The only progressive music I see that would gain any benefit through TV exposure would be mass-appeal music, and

that's crossover jazz," Backer observed.

Crossover Helps Jazz

Ron Goldstein, director of Warner Bros.' new jazz and progressive music division, took a similar tack. While he said that he was interested in pursuing TV as a promotional outlet "considering that the medium lends itself to jazz a lot better than to rock and roll," the only Warner Bros. jazz artist who might be featured on TV is George Benson. However, he added that crossover artists like Benson, Bob James and Ronnie Laws are exposing people to a jazz base that they might have never known before.

agents. The commission noted that it was virtually impossible to function as a personal manager without getting involved in the seeking of employment. The panel, in so ruling, voided a pact between the group Burlesque and the firm of Management 3. Later, a state appeals court in another case stated that the terms of a particular personal manager's contract required license as an artist's manager.

Managers Respond

The personal managers have vigorously opposed the efforts of "talent agencies" to also act as personal managers. The personal managers, through such organizations as the Conference of Personal Managers, claim that the talent agents are offering "cut rate" (10%-15%) service and have tried to squeeze personal managers completely out of the business (Cash Box, Oct. 22, 1977).

To the charge that their "cut rate" services do not meet the career needs of their

clients, the talent agents respond that personal managers often collect fees as high as 50%, and that unregulated contracts between personal managers and clients may last for up to seven years, with no right on the part of the client to terminate except for failure to perform.

In contrast, the talent agents add, licensed "artist managers" are limited to one- and three-year client contracts, and those must contain provisions allowing the client to terminate if a specified amount of work is not obtained during a certain time period.

The newly-proposed state law, according to its proponents, would not only give the force of law to restraints on personal managers, but would clearly distinguish between "agents" and "personal managers." The AFM, in a statement released last week, cited instances in which personal managers have attempted to get legislation passed which would allow them to obtain "incidental" employment for their clients, while remaining free of restraint. All such bills have been defeated, the union noted.

NEW YORK — Sire Records at the recent MIDEM sessions in Cannes, France acquired U.S. distribution rights for two European hit singles in separate deals. The 45s are "Up Town Top Ranking" by Althia And Donna, and "Ca Plane Pour Moi (Jet Boy Jet Girl)" by Plastic Bertrand. The former is currently #1 in the U.K., while the latter is #1 in France, Switzerland, and Belgium.

Both 45s will be released in the U.S. in March.

on all product except classical and Mercury singles.

Under the three-level set-up, rack jobbers and one-stops will pay \$3.98 for a \$7.98 list album; a multi-unit operation with three or more retail stores having a central warehouse pays \$4.09; and the third category, "other retailers," pay \$4.35. The new structure goes into effect March 13.

In the letter sent out to the companies' accounts, there was no specific definitions of "rack jobber." It could not immediately be learned whether rack jobbers which own retail chains will qualify for the lower price.

Capitol, in a letter also dated Feb. 27, informed its accounts of a new three-tier system which is effective on orders received after March 17. But Capitol's plan breaks down prices according to shipping locations.

If drop shipments are to be made to individual locations where little or no redistribution is done, the letter states, an account will pay Capitol's "base price" of \$4.23 per \$7.98 list, \$3.70 per \$6.98 list. LP and tape prices are equal.

If the shipments are made to one receiving point per distribution zone (of which there are between 35 and 40 in the U.S. under Capitol's new plan) each of which services at least five retail locations, Capitol will pack and ship orders and charge the "consolidators price." This price, \$4.10 per \$7.98 and \$3.59 per \$6.98 list, is three per-

cent less than the "base price."

The third price level is six percent less than the "base price," or \$3.99 per \$7.98 list and \$3.49 per \$6.98 list. This amount, termed the "bulk price," is given to accounts described above as consolidators, except that Capitol will pack and ship the order in bulk as if it were servicing one location. This covers large dealers who redistribute the orders through one central warehouse.

Foreigner To Embark On First World Tour

NEW YORK — Atlantic recording artists Foreigner will begin a worldwide tour in mid-March, extending into late April. Billed as "Around The World in 42 Days," the tour kicks off at the "California Jam II" festival in Ontario, California. The band then travels to Honolulu, Japan, Australia, Germany, Holland, and England. The group also plans visits to Hong Kong, China, and India. The tentative itinerary calls for a final concert in New York City, with details to be announced.

Derek and Kate Burbridge, a husband-and-wife filmmaking team, will accompany the group to record the tour for cinema audiences.

Meanwhile, Foreigner is presently wrapping up their second album, planned for release this spring. Their debut Atlantic LP has reached triple platinum status.

Sinatra donated his engagement's opening night proceeds to the National Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children, for its National Advisory Center on the Battered Child.

ABC recording artist **Don Williams**, whose single "You're My Best Friend" was voted the No. 1 Country Song Of All Time in a recent poll conducted jointly by Country Music People magazine and BBC radio 2 in England, will headline a concert March 25 at the 10th annual Wembley Country Music Festival in London.

After the Wembley Festival, Williams travels to Holland March 28, Norway April 1, and Finland April 2 as part of Mervyn Conn's Country Festivals in Europe. Williams is also scheduled to return to Europe May 7 to appear on Starparada, Germany's major pop music TV program. He then will tape his first BBC special in England.

The 5th Dimension, made up of Florence LaRue Gordon, Lamonte McLemore, Mick Bell, Terri Bryant and Danny Beard, have been set for a six-week concert tour of the Far East. They departed on March 10 and will appear in concerts in the following cities: Auckland, Sidney, Melbourne, Adelaide, Perth, Singapore, Bangkok, Manila, Kuala Lumpur, Jakarta and Tokyo. While enroute they will be doing promotion on their first album release on Motown Records, entitled "Star Dancing."

Israeli vocalist **Chava Albertstein**, CBS Records, Ltd., will be embarking upon a major American tour. Chava, a four time winner of Israel's Grammy, the "Kinor David" award, has recorded 15 albums for CBS/Israel. Chava's latest album, "Like A Wildflower," is a collection of new songs written by Israeli poets. This upcoming American tour will begin on April 4 with two performances in Cleveland and will take Chava from coast to coast until the tour ends on May 24, 1978.

BPI Investigates Newspaper Reports Of Chart Hyping

LONDON — Following the report in *Cash Box* (Jan. 28) concerning the British Phonographic Institute's employment of private detectives to eradicate the hyping of the BMRB record chart, national newspapers in England recently carried stories exposing the hyping as having been practiced on a fairly widespread scale. Geoffrey Bridge, director general of the BPI, called a general meeting of the council and asked for documentary evidence from the newspapers concerned so that lawyers at the BPI could decide if further action is necessary.

The British Market Research Bureau chart, used by the BBC and English trade paper *Music Week*, is compiled from a secret list of 375 record shops throughout the U.K. The chart is compiled from weekly returns from dealers. This secret list of dealers is available on the black market, making it easy for record companies to purchase their own product from the relevant shops. However, if the dealer suspects mass buying of one record then he may delete this from his return. Claims in the national papers allege that promotion companies are either employing people to buy copies of singles or they are encouraging dealers to make false returns. As previously reported in *Cash Box*, this offense carries heavy penalties.

On the whole, the industry has abhorred this practice and the majority of record companies have not entertained this form of promotion. The BMRB now intends to increase the number of record outlets from which it derives charts and tighten up the security of the secret list.

SIM Planned for Sept.

MILAN — The 12th edition of SIM (International Music Show) will be held this year at the Milan Fair Ground September 7-11.

Five buildings, with a total surface area of 40,000 square meters, will house the entire world production (800 brands from 40 countries) of musical instruments and amplification, P.A. systems, high fidelity equipment accessories as well as those for professional audio and video systems.

Already one of the biggest specialized shows in Europe, the Milan exhibition is visited each year by about 80,000 people, including at least 2,000 foreign visitors from 69 countries, and also by 30,000 businessmen, technical and professional experts in the field of music.

The SIM general secretary's office has been moved to new premises (11 via Domenichino, 20149 Milano, Italy; Tel. (02) 49.89.984; 46.97.519) where modern equipment, more suited to the growth of the show and its operative needs, is available.

RCA International Hosts Latin Meet

NEW YORK — RCA Records International will host a Latin American product meeting for subsidiaries and licensees at the Othon Hotel in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, March 8-9.

Karl Kurz, division vice president of RCA International, will chair the meetings and address visiting executives from RCA companies in 20 nations. Kurz said the purpose of the two-day session is to formulate release schedules and marketing plans for the rest of 1978.

Highlighting the meetings will be product presentations from most of the attending Latin American nations, as well as showings from England and the U.S. Richard Schwartz, manager of International Marketing Services, will make the U.S. audio-visual presentation, spotlighting new releases by Jefferson Starship, Valentine, Dr. Buzzard's Original Savannah Band, and other artists.

Another highlight will be appearances by recording artists from Argentina, Brazil, and Spain. Their performances will be recorded and made available for commercial release.

Record Production Down In Japan During 1977

TOKYO — The total record output in 1977 for Japan decreased 8 percent from the previous year while the monetary value remained constant. According to The Japan Phonograph Record Association, the gross output of records during the 12 months of 1977 reached 184 million copies. The 1976 figure was 199 million copies produced. At the same time, this volume for both years represented 163 billion yen.

Tape volume was 34 million units, 10 percent more than the previous year. This represented a value of 59 billion yen which was 8 percent more than the previous year.

The total figures for both records and tapes represented 222 billion yen which was 1.95 percent higher than the results of 1976.

Dave Clark Hits Again

LONDON — Dave Clark's compilation album, "25 Thumping Great Hits," released on the Polydor label this week, has been certified gold on advance orders alone, before the start of a TV advertising campaign. Clark, who between the years 1964 and 1966 had 14 consecutive singles in the American Top Twenty chart, has just completed a film script which he is currently showing to film companies.
