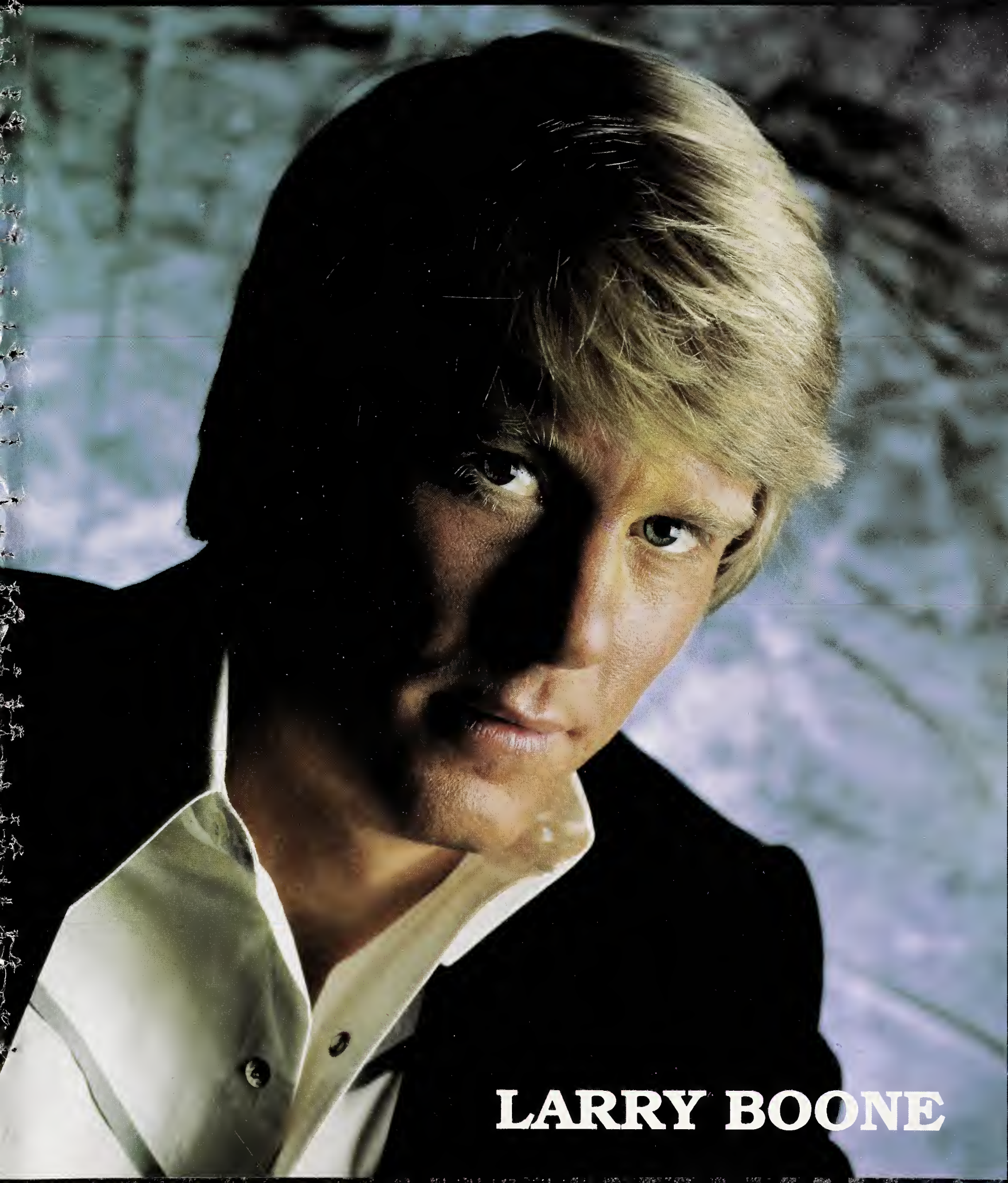

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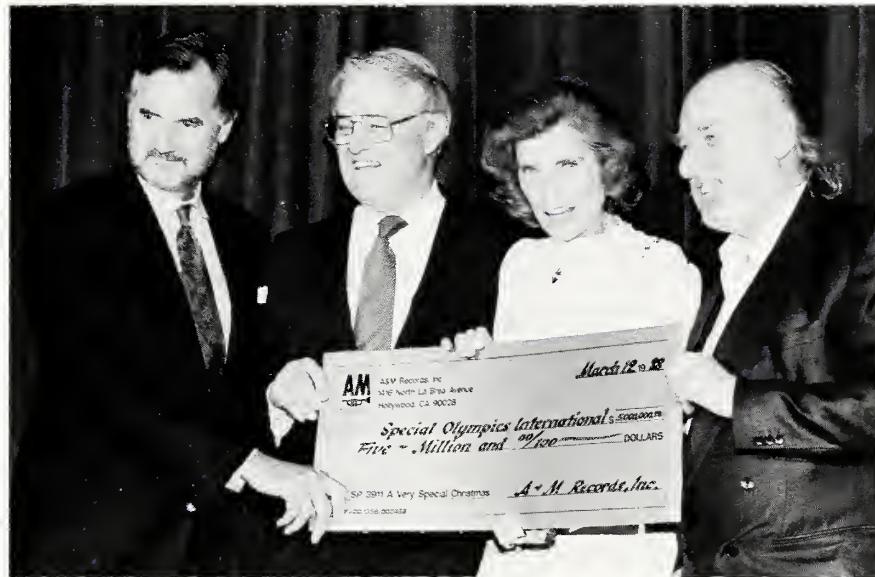

## CBS's Al Teller Delivers NARM Keynote

LOS ANGELES - CBS President Al Teller delivered the keynote speech Saturday morning March 12, 1988 at the NARM convention at the Century Plaza Hotel. He began by describing the progress of the record industry from 1958 to 1988, from the LP to the CD. Then Teller addressed the issue of CD price reductions demanded by some calling it "a dangerous step", claiming that it would seriously reduce money available for new artists signings. "Did you know that over one-third of the albums on the pop chart right now are by artists who debuted within the past year? ...45% in the case of the black album charts?" Teller then announced that beginning in April that CBS labels will initiate variable pricing for new releases, with black, country jazz and mid-range pop at \$14.98 list. New and developing artists will be released at \$12.98. The current frontline pricing would stand for superstar artists only.

Teller reaffirmed the label's commitment to LP's and singles, and announced that CBS Records would enter the cassette single markets at \$2.49 retail. A 3 inch CD single will be sold for \$3.49.

Teller concluded by lamenting the direction of AOR radio, saying, "AOR has largely become COR - catalog oriented radio. Much of it, the Classic Rock stations, have chosen to chase the yuppie generation to its grave." He encouraged support of college and alternative radio. And he encouraged retailers to take a more imaginative approach to their stores. "...imagine them as musical hotbeds, places to dazzle and delight the music buyer. Imagine them staffed by musical missionaries, eager to spread the word about new artists and new music. Imagine them as magnets for music lovers anxious to be turned on by your merchandising skills."

## NARM Merchandiser Of The Year Awards

LOS ANGELES - At the NARM March 14th Awards Banquet, Peter Jones, vice president of sales for BMG Distribution and chairman of NARM's Manufacturers Advisory Committee, announced the winners of the three awards given for Merchandiser of the Year. The first category is for Small Retailer (15 stores or less), second Large Retailer, and last Wholesaler. Criteria for bestowing the award for retailers included artist development and awareness of new product, commitment to stocking all product lines,

cooperation with merchandiser programs and contests, and fiscal responsibility. Criteria for Wholesaler of the Year include good communication and cooperation with all levels, maximization of best sellers and key catalog, etc.

## NARM Best-Seller Awards

LOS ANGELES - On Monday evening, March 14, the 30th Annual NARM Convention concluded with the presentation of the 1987 Best-Seller Awards. Harry Anger, Senior Vice President of Marketing for PolyGram Records, served as Master of Ceremonies, and RCA recording act Bruce Hornsby And The Range provided musical entertainment.

The NARM Best-Seller Awards represent the only recognition given by the industry of actual over-the-counter sales to the consumer of pre-recorded product - records, tapes and compact discs - during calendar year 1987. Ballots were sent to all Regular Members of the Association: retailers, rack jobbers and one stops. Each member company received one vote, and write in votes were available in all categories.

# VJ Roger Rose Dying For A Laugh

LOS ANGELES—Question: Which video jockey appearing nightly on VH-1 Video Channel risks his life so you, the easily distracted home viewer, won't nod off between Anita Baker and James Taylor videos?

Answer: Actor/Comic/Advertiser Roger Rose. "I could die. This is a stinkin' video show! I'm dying for a Michael Bolton video? Give me a break."

We're talking about Roger Rose's recent remote to the Carnivale festivities in Rio with Manhattan Transfer. Says Roger, "My producer is a real idiot. He tries to put my life in danger on remotes. He said, 'Your going hang-gliding.' I thought it was a boat with a rope over the ocean. No. You jump off a mountain on a kite. So I hung on to a guy who flew the thing, and I did it. As I jumped off the cliff I said, 'This is for all the Rick Astley videos that we've played.' Rick's a great guy, really. I'm a doofus, if there's a camera there I'll do it."

Doing it on camera is what Rose is all about. An experienced comedic actor and voice-over man, he has been a one-man ratings bonanza for the fledgling music video channel, emerging as perhaps the most influential and watched VJ. He doesn't just introduce videos, he offers a variety show between clips, including interviews, skits, bits and remotes. Due largely to his show, VH-1 has become MTV's main "competition" (as you may know, VH-1 was created by MTV—that's for industry ears only). VH-1's demographic, 25-45, demanded a different approach. And that was Roger Rose, age 28.

Rose is determined *not* to have the holier-than-thou attitude of some VJ's. "We're dealing with a different audience, the yuppie crowd. They're not gonna sit all day like a kid watching videos—so how do I keep 'em? I'm gonna entertain. I'm not going to sit there and go (sneering) 'Hey, I was with Bruce Springsteen last week we were talking...' For example Kenny G. and I are good friends, but when I talk about him on the show, we have a running bit... I'll give some content then say, '...and by the way, my good buddy Kenny G.' and the crew will go 'yeah sure, you're full of it' and throw objects at my head. I totally ig-

nore it. It's funny, but you at home are going 'good, they got him.'"

Rose's philosophy parallels another television maverick, David Letterman. The medium *itself* is part of the joke. But Rose goes one step beyond, Rose will get in there and make a fool of himself, he'll lose his dignity for the good of a laugh, more like Johnny Carson used to do.

"Every two weeks or so we have this bit where the crew rebels against me. One day I called the crew morons, I said that the set was overdone. So as the show goes on they start coming in and removing things, they remove the background, my chair...they remove my clothing until all I have on is a tie and a pillow over my crotch. The show airs and my boss Jeff Rowe calls me into his office and shows me a scathing hate letter about me. This viewer had documented everything I'd done for two weeks in intricate detail, including the nude show. And Rowe said that it was the best thing that he could hope for. The guy hated me so much he watched me every day!"

Rose is encouraged by VH-1 management to "push the envelope"—to go to extremes in bits and interviews. With Carly Simon, known for her stage fright, he tried to ask her out on a date, giving her flowers, telling her "you have an overbite that's giving me a serious woody." She cut him up with some sharp retorts, and as revenge forced him to sing live backups on the spot. She loved it and will be on again. He's gotten Smokey Robinson and Anita Baker into funny bits, two not known for their humor. Jo Beth Williams did a Ray Charles impression. The artists love it because it shows them in another light.

Rose often does "theme" shows between clips, such as his send-up of the Jerry Lewis Telethon. He slicks his hair back, puts three cigarettes in his mouth and apologizes that the celebrities could only send in videos. On another occasion he received psychotherapy between videos.

Rose's remotes work very well, because he plunges into the action. "We show the local flavor," says Rose. "I went to Hackensack New Jersey, to J.T.'s Dream, James T. Taylor (formerly of Kool And the Gang) has a hair salon in a kind of funky neighborhood. I went and got an Afro. I had a barber shop quartet behind me during the whole show, doing things like, 'here goes Roger's haircut.' In New York we had Frankie and Annette at Battery Park doing a beach party with bums going 'uhg...' For my one year anniversary show we went to Sammy's Romanian Restaurant in New York City. Larry Bud Melman was my announcer. We had a group called Black Shabos, three guys

dressed as Hassidic Jews... Instead of doing 'Amadeus, Amadeus' they did 'Sammy Davis, Sammy Davis'.

You might wonder if the video clips get lost in the shuffle. The answer is no. They occupy 50 minutes on the hour in his program. And the videos *do* get watched. VH-1, Roger and their other excellent VJ's are credited for launching Kenny G. into the stratosphere, as well as playing videos shunned by MTV such as Bruce Hornsby and Smokey Robinson.

As far as Rose's future plans, he says, "I'm aiming to be either Tom

Hanks or David Letterman." He's been offered a substantial deal to do a syndicated entertainment show, which he declined. "I thought it would take me to the Wink Martindale school, I'd be saying 'now let's go to the big wheel!' Do you know what it's like to be offered that kind of money? My tongue hung out. I was depressed afterwards. 'No thank-you...UUUHH...'"

We hope Roger continues to decline any job that fails to showcase his brilliant talents the way VH-1 does. However, we believe a big raise is in order, VH-1. How's *that* Rog?

## Bruce Springsteen And The E Street Band

THE SPECTRUM, PHILADELPHIA - Do you want to talk about love or do you want to talk about rock 'n' roll?

Let's talk about rock 'n' roll for a minute. Bruce Springsteen and the E Street Band rocked Philadelphia's cozy (for an arena) Spectrum harder than I've ever seen any band rock any place at any time. That includes Springsteen on both ends of the *Born in the U.S.A.* Tour and that includes the Rolling Stones in their nastiest, hardest-rocking heyday. During the last hour of this particular stop on the *Tunnel of Love Express* - the second of two nights in Philly (as close as he's

going to get, during this leg of the tour, to his hometown) - Springsteen and company pounded out exultant, adrenaline-pumping, foundation-shaking rock 'n' roll. It all began with a typically thunderous "Rosalita" (which he interestingly introduced as the best love song he ever wrote) and by the time the dust cleared, Springsteen had ripped through "Love Me Tender" and a pumped-up, 95-mph version of his old standby "Detroit medley": "Shake," "Jenny, Jenny," "Devil with the Blue Dress On," "Sweet Soul Music," on and on. The hits, as the radio guys say, just kept on coming. And after everything was said and done - after three hours and fifteen minutes on stage, after the E Street Band was wringing with sweat - Le Boss shooed everybody back to their instruments for a roaring "Raise Your Hand." Oooooo-ey!

Now let's talk about love for a

minute. *Tunnel of Love* - a great album if you ask me - is a small, intense, melodically monochromatic album. It's an understated, poetic expression of the increasing maturity of a 38-year-old man. It's a concert hall-sized album, or maybe even a club-sized album. It's not an arena-sized album. Arenas are for cartoons - for flashy anthems that everybody knows the words to, for celebration rather than introspection. Which is why Springsteen works so well in arenas - many of his songs are anthemic and he knows how to work the dimensions of a room make for basketball and ice hockey. The E Street Band is a larger-than-life rock 'n' roll band - as they proved handily on this night - and their leader is a larger-than-life rock figure; he's the Hulk Hogan of rock 'n' roll.

The songs from *Tunnel of Love*, good as they are, didn't work well at all. The audience didn't seem to be

familiar with the lyrics yet, and trying to make them out in the overly loud mix was a chore. As each *Tunnel of Love* song ended - "Tougher Than the Rest," "All That Heaven Will Allow," the haunting "Spare Parts," et al - the audience began murmuring for the anthems they knew were on deck (after the first Worcester show the *Tunnel of Love* set list was as familiar to the Following as the words to "Hungry Heart"). Springsteen offered full-band versions of these songs for the most part (generally minus Clarence Clemons' saxophone) when he probably would have been better off serving them up starkly, in a *Nebraska*-like solo acoustic setting. They didn't expand into the room. When the 75-minute first set ended with "War" and (BAM!) "Born In the U.S.A.," it was a catharsis. The blistering two-hour second set was the payoff.

The de-emphasis of Clarence

## Yes

THE FORUM, LOS ANGELES - PACIFIC AMPHITHEATER, IRVINE - Yes descended on Southern California last week with two precisely constructed shows that once again demonstrated that progressive rock leavened with pop works. Even though their latest LP *Big Generator* has not reached the heights of 90125, there were still plenty of youngsters in attendance, young enough to be Chris Squire's kids.

Once again it is apparent that lead singer Jon Anderson, bassist Chris Squire, keyboardist Tony Kaye and drummer Alan White have given a good part of the show over to their phenomenal (young and good looking for good measure) lead guitarist Trevor Rabin. More about him later. The stage and lighting was basically the same as on their 90125 tour, plenty of smoke and computer controlled spots. Besides a few choreographed moves, Yes basically stands and delivers their repertoire with a controlled precision that borders on un-

nerving. For Yes, opportunities to open up are limited to soloing, so they include spots for each player to flash. Ironically even these are basically the same each show. It's a major complaint non-Yes fans have about the group.

The show opened with a rousing version of "Rhythm of Love", and one was struck immediately by the miracle that is Jon Anderson's vocal chords. Jokes about bicycle mishaps aside, there is no clearer and pure a high tenor in rock and roll especially considering his age (not a teen anymore). In both shows he wasn't flat *once*, a little sharp maybe on "Roundabout" in Irvine, but who cares. Never cracked or missed a note. It's amazing.

Highlights of the first part of the show included "Heart Of The Sunrise" from *Fragile* featuring some smoking unison lines between Squire and Rabin. And the amazing "Shoot High, Aim Low", a song about life after war from *Big Generator* was a slow motion explosion, unfolding in delicate vocal answer lines between Rabin and Anderson into the majestic and

moving chorus. This one is a thousand times more powerful live than on record.

Anderson displayed his sweet intensity on an excerpt from the piece "Ritual" on the *Tales From Topographic Oceans* album. The passage entitled "Nous Sommes Du Soleil" featured Squire's deft base picking as sole backup.

Next came a steel guitar solo by Rabin. Guitarist Trevor Rabin has become the focal instrumental voice of the band, bringing both contemporary flash and modern compositional ideas that have broad popular appeal. His solid mimicry of the challenging guitar parts on the older material written by former guitarist Steve Howe is admirable. On the steel solo segment he mixed familiar melodies, quirky koto-like sounds, single line shredding reminiscent of an Al Dimeola, and a rhythmic frenzy very much in the Steve Howe vein.

The second part of the evening at both venues was highlighted by a crowd-pleasing version of "Owner of A Lonely Heart", and as number-one songs are apt to do, everyone

was on their feet, both nights. But a version of the lilting "And You and I" from *Close To The Edge* held it's own, even with it's more complicated structure and mood shifts. Chris Squire did a solo version of "Amazing Grace" on bass. And an extended version of "Years of No Disgrace" from *Yes* once again showed Rabin's fire along with tight ensemble playing.

The show closed with the 3 chord vamp from "Starship Trooper", which seems an almost perfunctory act of simplicity, definitely too long, despite some exciting playing on keyboards from Tony Kaye and omnipresent Rabin. More exciting were encores of "Love Will Find A Way", "All Good People" and of course "Roundabout". "Roundabout" has been abbreviated, it's more up and funky, axing out the acoustic guitar intro and slow section.

Yes remains a top concert attraction, still able to cement the gap between their older and younger fans. And the glue is Trevor Rabin.

THE ROXY, LOS ANGELES - Atlantic recording artists D'Molls performed at the Roxy recently in one of a series of L.A. shows anticipating the release of their first album in mid-April. The band combines a hard rock/street-glam look and their sound fuses the best aspects of early 70's Zeppelin/Aerosmith crunch with an 80's eye to party rock ala Van Halen. Highlights in the set included the rockers "Dressed to Thrill" and "D'Stroll," the ballad "Hi 'n' Low," and a cover of The Troggs "Wild Thing," a D'Molls tribute to three-

chord rock.

Lead singer/guitarist Desi Rexx and lead guitarist S.S. Priest display talent and charisma to spare; bassist Lizzy Valentine and drummer Billy Dior are one of the tightest, rock-solid rhythm sections coming up in the business. The band enjoys itself and its audience thoroughly during its performance, as the abundance of eye-contact and interaction between band and crowd will attest to.

Transplanted from Chicago one year ago, D'Molls (the name is an acronym meaning "Documentary Musicals of Life's Little Satires") the band was signed to Atlantic Records almost immediately after arriving, and started attracting considerable

attention in the local club scene, consistently playing to sold-out houses. Judging from the enthusiastic crowd they were able to bring in on a Sunday night at the Roxy - some serious national exposure could be just around the corner. Check these guys out before it's impossible to get tickets.

## Larry Boone

Larry Boone has impressed a great many people in the country music industry. Like most new artists, Boone's first releases were not chart-toppers. But, because he is one of the most complete entertainers in country music's new traditionalist school, singer/songwriter Larry Boone has gained across-the-board respect during his first year on Mercury/Polygram. Fans, disc jockeys and critics, alike, have agreed that Boone ranks among the top new faces on the country scene. This opinion has recently been substantiated by the Academy Of Country Music's final list of nominees for their 1988 "Hat" awards. Larry Boone was named one of the five finalists in the top new male vocalist category. He will also be a featured entertainer on the nationally televised awards show.

Larry Boone is a confidently humble young man who overflows with well-mannered personality. His career might well have ended before it started. During his high school and college years in his home state of Florida, Larry was an outstanding athlete in several sports. The thought of becoming a sportswriter weighed heavily on his career choices. But, Larry had supplemented his income during college with his musical talent, and he decided to move to Nashville and pursue a career in country music.

Boone tells of his Nashville-related past. "I arrived here in 1981. Like so many others I began trying to get a singing job. Luckily I got that chance at the Country Music Wax Museum. I did a single act in the restaurant there for about three years. It gave me a chance to perform a lot of my original material. I also was able to gain a lot of fans there. There are thousands of tourists and fans passing through there each year."

Because of Boone's songwriting, it took him but three short years to make his mark in Music City. His songs grabbed the attention of many top artists and producers. He also met his manager, Gene Ferguson, who directed the success of singers John Anderson and Charly McClain. Larry's songs were being recorded by many top country artists and Gene Ferguson knew that Larry Boone had another talent along with his writing ability...singing!

Gene Ferguson brought Larry to Mercury in 1986, soon after the arrival of label head Steve Popovich. He became one of

Popovich's first signings at Mercury. Steve Popovich later commented, "This young man has all the ingredients. After seeing his reception at Fan Fair '86, Johnny Cash said to me, 'Steve, I don't know where you got him, but he sure impressed me!'"

Larry Boone's self-penned recent single, "Roses in December," was Cash Box's second most added record following its release, and was a top 40 record for him. His new self-titled album is to be released this month with one of the very best in the business, Ray Baker, producing. There are uncountable fans waiting for the album. Why? It's simple. Larry explains it this way, "The most satisfying aspect of my career is the way the fans respond to my music. When they come to see my shows, it tells me a lot. They are spending their hard-earned money to attend and I do my very best to make them feel their money was well-spent on good entertainment!"

"Plus...it's my opportunity to live out my dream. The competition is very tough, but I'm glad I never quit trying. I believe I'm here now because of *good faith*, and *hard work*. The songwriting career has been the catalyst for me, too. When other artists begin recording your songs, things begin to 'snowball' in your career. Sometimes it's nice to back off and take a look at my progress in the last few years."

Larry Boone may be the first country artist who has never had a #1 national song, featured on the cover of Cash Box. However, we feel confident his number one's are coming soon. When we have the opportunity, we believe in helping, in our own way, those who are deserving. Larry Boone's "good faith and hard work" have paid off. Yes, Larry Boone has impressed a lot of people in the country music industry...including Cash Box!

Clemons in this show - fewer sax solos throughout, fewer Bruce/Clarence buddy-buddy stuff - has caused the focus to shift to the other members of the E Street Band, particularly to the tremendous rhythm team of Max Weinberg and Garry Tallent. Has there ever been a better rock drummer than Weinberg, or a better one-two drums-bass

punch than Weinberg and Tallent? Arrow-straight for three hours and quarter. Perfection. Sure, Clarence and Bruce dance a bit, and, during the beginning of the show they engage in an *I'm Not Rappaport*-like exchange on a park bench (actually, it's a Springsteen Memory Lane monologue, with Clarence grinning, nodding and producing an album of baby photos), but there's much less of Clarence's reheated-King Curtis saxophonizing (and, due to a serious weight loss, much less of Clarence). As for the five-man saxophone section - they add a nice oomph to the rockers and the rollers, but they are particularly useless on the *Tunnel of Love* material.

Other highlights of the show included a relaxed, acoustic "Born to



# Basia

NEW YORK — Basia — whose debut album *Time and Tide* was issued late last year on Epic — is a Polish-born singer who lives in England and sings music influenced, mainly, by American soul music and Brazilian bossa nova. Does Basia ever have an identity problem?

"I don't really, no," says Basia (whose full name is Basia Trzetrzelewska). "In my head, I feel quite cosmopolitan. I've lived in so many parts of the world and I don't really feel that those parts of the world differ that much. All the people I meet, from Japan to the United States, they all seem to have the same way of thinking, the same way of feeling, and the same heart. And I don't feel that I'm something different from them because I come from Poland. So I don't really have an identity crisis. The biggest problem I have is to find a place I call home."

Here, then, is Basia's life story in a nutshell:

"I was born in a little town in the south of Poland which is an industrial little hole," she says. "I had a few friends there who played in a group and when I was 15 years old, they asked me to join them and take part in a talent contest, a national thing. I did. And I happened to win, as Best Vocalist. From that moment on, I was offered all sorts of work with established bands in Poland."

"One of those was a six piece girls group called Alibabki, and when I finished high school I joined this group. We mainly worked in Poland and Eastern Europe, mainly in Russia. I worked with them happily, but after two years I was a bit fed up with being just a part of a band where I was one of six girls. I wanted to sing a bit more on my own. So I left the group and I organized a band which, after we had only just started, was assigned a six-month contract in Chicago."

Chicago — with its blues and soul music — was Basia's kind of town. She and her group sang in a Polish club in a Polish neighborhood, singing everything from old Polish folk songs to American Top 40 covers (in accented English). The band eventually disbanded, Basia resettled in England and became a member of Matt Bianco, the bossa nova-ish, soft rock group that had some of chart success. After a couple of years of singing back-up

Run" (Springsteen calling it his favorite song), "Cover Me," "Dancing in the Dark," "Tunnel of Love," "Light of Day" (which Springsteen is ready to reclaim from Joan Jett and Michael J. A pair of songs with tentacle-like hooks, a pair of songs that will surely become Springsteen standards in short order.

All in all a terrific concert, but a

"I decided it was time for me to do something on my own. I left, and the keyboard player, Danny White, left with me."

Voila! *Time and Tide*. All of the songs are written by White and Basia (with Peter Ross' lyrics on half of them) and all of them are in a soft, low-boil, breathy, bossa-cum-pop style. There's even a paean to the queen of the low-boil, breathy, bossa-cum-pop style, Astrud Gilberto.

"It's very difficult for me to describe my style," says Basia, "because I'm too close to it. I think that what we do as pop music is influenced by jazz and bossa nova and soul, but it's basically pop music and I'm a pop singer. I know people keep using the word 'jazz,' but I don't think I'm in the same league as all the great ones."

In any case, Basia, whose first single is "Time and Tide," will be touring the States this spring. The whole thing, she says, is a "dream" for a singer born in Poland, "to break out and release something in the West."

And does she encounter any jealousy on her Christmas trips back to Poland?

"There are wonderful singers in Poland who tried but didn't succeed somehow. It's a very difficult thing to do: You have to sing in this language and you have to live here, I think. They all tried doing it from a distance and it didn't work. So there is a little bit of jealousy, but I think they're also pleased about my opening the door for them."

somewhat off-balance concert. The *Tunnel of Love* songs need to be heard better, their lyrics need to be understood; perhaps they need to be performed as starkly as they were recorded, although no arena, in any circumstance, was ever famous for its ability to allow lyrics to be understood. And Springsteen should release some tension in the hall before he settles down with those lovely little gems: rock out, *Tunnel of Love*, rock out, that kind of thing.

Do you want to talk about love or do you want to talk about rock 'n' roll? Bruce Springsteen, clearly, wants to talk about both. And, in Philly, when he screamed, "I'm just a prisoner of...." he never finished the sentence.

**WHAT TIME IS IT?** — It's Mofungo time. There's an off-kilter drum crack as Elliot Sharp wraps a massive claw around the neck of his guitar. Hand moving up and down the fretboard like a dancing spider, he sends sounds flying through the air: shards of scrap metal that flash like diamonds just before they hit the ground.

Take that idea of the industrial as the beautiful and you have the sort of apparent contradiction this NYC quartet thrives on; the source of their greatest energy is the yoking together of opposites, building new sounds and perceptions out of the clashes. Willie Klein's tense guitar strumming and Robert Sietsema's bass establish the pop structures that support Sharp's avant-noise. Mofungo uses the notion of 'song' to cross the (sound)bridge from 'interesting' to 'fun.'

At CBGB Friday, March 11, they filled the place with a gleeful racket, at times pushing the harmonodics to a screaming level that threatened to destroy the 'songs.' It was like standing in front a dam you think will burst at any moment; when it doesn't you don't know whether to be relieved or disappointed. Their set lost momentum towards the end, but not before featuring a few numbers from their upcoming LP *Bugged*, their first album for SST (sixth overall), due out April 5. Sharp produced earlier records, and joined Klein, Sietsema, and drummer Chris Nelson on '86's *Messenger Dogs Of The Gods* (Lost-Twin/Tone), the first Mofungo album that fully reconciled the herky-jerky Ornette Coleman-isms with songcraft. Last year's *End Of The World, Part 2* took a half-step backwards. It sounded like they were taking the connection between politics and aesthetics too damn seriously to have a good time; all I ever noticed was Willie Klein's radical-beat-poetry-declamatory-lyrics, which are usually less exciting than the sounds that accompany them. I've had one quick listen to an advance copy of *Bugged* and it sounds epiphanously groovesome. If they ever really wanted to, these raging mofos could rule the airwaves. Which reminds me of my dream project: Arto Lindsay and John Zorn doing straight readings of Carmen Miranda songs. I'll keep dreaming.

**BROADCAST NEWS** — Latin hip-hop now has its own TV showcase. It's called *It's Dance (ID)* and in the New York area it airs Saturdays from 12pm — 1pm on Channel 9, WWOR, right before *American Bandstand*. Essentially, the show is an hour-long celebration of the whole youth-style Latin hip-hop dance aesthetic. The *ID* dancers look like their average age is maybe 16, and they dress and dance to impress. Filled with the vital aliveness (and tight tummies) of youth, the dance segments flash with the energy and power of sex appeal (not sexuality itself). The March 12 edition featured a *New Order* video, an interview with *Hairspray* star Ricki Lake, and Tommy Boy trio TKA performing their club smash "Tears May Fall." Tracking shots of

palm trees and sunny beaches strung things together, making *ID* the ultimate mixture of Cali lifestyle and NYC punch. And you get all this and preaching too: interspersed throughout the show are rap sessions led by Dr. Joy Brown concerning drug and alcohol abuse. Remember kids, Drugs Are Like Quicksand: They Always Bring You Down. The credits are pretty hep: *It's Dance* is an I.R.S. World Media Production, filmed at Manhattan nightclub 4D, music provided by HOT103.



**TEXAS FLOOD IN NYC** — The Antone's Texas Independence Day Celebration at the Lonestar Cafe Wednesday, March 2, turned into a post-Grammys blues fest when (l-r) Stevie Ray Vaughn, Albert Collins, and David "Fathead" Newman turned up to jam with Dr. John and Robert Cray Band bassist Richard Cousins.

**BEGGARS CAN BE CHOOSERS** — The Brit based label Beggars Banquet has recently opened an American office in NYC. The flood of Beggars Banquet vinyl now reaching these shores includes the latest album from *The Fall* (first single is a cover of the Kinks' "Victoria"), and two records from Howard Devoto's new band, *Luxuria*. The first *Luxuria* album, *Unanswerable Lust*, is out already on Beggars Banquet/RCA, and the single, "Redneck," is five-and-a-half minutes of terminally cool ringing guitar and dark blue keyboards. The damn thing builds its droning moodiness into a rising and falling melancholy most of this dance-trance pop doesn't have any legitimate claim to.

Also from Mark Ghuneim at the Beggar's Banquet NYC office (212-697-7742) comes the news that 4AD artists XYMOX, whose "A Million Things" currently rules the import dance singles charts, will play the first date of their American tour on March 22, at Drums. And finally, Big Black guitarist and *Forced Exposure* scribe Steve Albini has produced *The Pixies* debut, *Surfer Rosa*, out soon on Rough Trade.

**TIDBITS** — Passport has signed Agony Column, an Austin band described as a cross between Metallica and *The Birthday Party*. Agony Column reportedly began as a Goth band, evolved to a hard rock/rockabilly group, and is now a real cool thrash outfit. Look for titles like "Cars, Sex & Violence," and "66 Six-Guns" on their summer release. Maybe Russ Myer can direct the videos...Expect a new Mekons album from Twin/Tone in April...Agitpop, upstate New York band who have a groove not wholly unlike the Minutemen, will put out their third record, but first for Twin/Tone, this month...George Harrison's classic *All Things Must Pass* out on CD from Capitol later this month...John Lennon's classic *Plastic Ono Band* also out on CD from Capitol later this month.

**S**UPERBAD JASPER - As an integral member of the Isley Brothers and Isley-Jasper-Isley, Chris Jasper has been at the forefront of progressive R&B music since the early 1970's. Now this multi-talented performer is stepping into the spotlight with his premier solo album, Superbad, on CBS Associated Records.

Chris Jasper's professional career began in earnest in 1973, when the original Isley Brothers trio expanded to include younger brothers Ernie Isley (guitar) and Marvin Isley (bass) along with cousin Chris on keyboards. The new group made its vinyl debut that same year with the groundbreaking 3+3 album, and followed up with a series of modern rock and roll classics like That Lady, Fight The Power, Live It Up and What It Comes Down To. Chris Jasper was a key player, arranger and songwriter on the Isley Brothers' gold and platinum albums like Showdown, Live It Up and The Heat Is On.

In 1984, Ernie, Marvin and Chris broke away from the Isley Brothers to form Isley-Jasper-Isley. Writing, producing and performing as equal partners, the trio released a striking debut LP, Broadway's Closer To Sunset Boulevard. This expert blend of R&B feel and advanced pop technology yielded two successful singles, Look The Other Way and Kiss And Tell.

Isley-Jasper-Isley's second album, Carvan Of Love, appeared in September, 1985, with the title track becoming a number one black hit. An acappella version by the Housemartins later topped the U. K. charts as well. The third Isley-Jasper-Isley LP Different Drummer, was released in April 1987. It included a powerful anti-apartheid anthem called Brother To Brother as well as the romantic radio hit Giving You Back The Love.



CHRIS JASPER

Superbad was written, produced, arranged and performed by Chris Jasper. The album contains eight tracks, their arrangements built on Jasper's multiple keyboards and carefully layered vocal harmonies. Givin' All My Love is a mid-tempo love song with a syncopated rhythm; Like I Do is a lush ballad which plays Jasper's intimate lead vocals against his own falsetto background voices.

The hard-edged and funky title cut, Superbad, (achieved top 5 chart activity) encouraged kids to stay in school, say no to drugs and look out for each other. The follow-up single One Time Love has garnered well over 60 radio station adds in less than three weeks since its release. Look for this to become another major hit for one of the nicest people you will ever meet!

A personal favorite of mine, Son Of Man will be serviced to Gospel formats around the country as an album cut. The album is appropriately titled, Chris Jasper and his music is S-U-P-E-R-B-A-D!!

FREEDOM SETS TOUR - A young man destined to become a major star in

the world of entertainment is Billy "The Kid" Freedom, whose cover of the Rolling Stones' hit Miss You on Caloma Records continues to pick up strong radio support around the country. Programmers have listened and added the record on over 50 (including many major markets outlets) stations. The remarkable part is, most stations receive so much product on a daily basis and for a small independent label to receive this type of airplay without the benefit of a promotion budget or staff, the record and Billy's talent must be in the pocket.



BILLY "THE KID" FREEDOM

Billy and his old high school friend Carlos M. Diaz, a talented guitarist/keyboardist/songwriter are scheduled to team up for the upcoming tour starting on June 19 in Providence, Rhode Island. Carlos stays busy, between studio sessions, writing and producing, with his very successful Guitar Technology (203-448-1802) business in Connecticut. He is well known as one of the top pro audio consultants in the business, having done work for some of the top guitarist in the world, including members of the hit group Whitesnake.

To those labels looking for some exceptional talent you might keep the name Billy "The Kid" Freedom close to your telephones.

# THE INDEPENDENT WAY

## IAC Committee Meets; Officially Joins NARM

Independent Action Committee chairman Phil Jones of Fantasy Records got the third meeting of the full committees off to a flying start with a pep talk reminiscent of Knute Rockne at his "win one for the Gipper" best. Among the points Jones made in his opening remarks was the importance of continuing to come together (independent labels and distributors) with positive energy; and the fact that in the short four months of their existence as a unit they had made impressive headway in furthering the independent cause. Said Jones, "We are certainly getting more press than we ever commanded in the past."

Jones pointed out that the IAC had been invited to formally affiliate with the National Association of Recording Merchandisers, and the affiliation became official upon the taking of a nearly unanimous show-of-hands vote.

In discussing the phenomenon of successful independent artists showing up on major labels, Jones stated that some people were so low that they would steal a dead fly from a blind spider. That statement was appreciated by the attendees, many of whom had been through losing either viable artists or viable labels over the past several years. Tony Delasandro was congratulated for his response to Robert Poziak's commentary, and Cash Box was thanked for its continued participation in, and support of, the IAC and the entire independent record industry.

Also discussed was the possibility of labels pooling together to hire a professional to create a product presentation video that could be presented at next year's NARM. This seemed to be very acceptable to those in attendance.

Eddie Holland, of the famous writing team of Holland, Dozier, Holland, was present. Holland sat in on the promotion committee meeting and later accepted an offer to become a member of the action committee.

## SALES AND MARKETING

The meeting of the joint sales and marketing sub-committees started with Eric Paulson briefly going over the agenda from the committee's last meeting in North Carolina. He introduced

the topics that he wanted to discuss in this meeting, to clarify objectives and to analyze recommendations and suggestions. Also discussed were the do's and don'ts of the independent record distribution business.

Jenienne Leclercq took the floor. She went on to discuss the possibility of a brochure package that the distributors could send to the manufacturers (and visa-versa) consisting of the needs and expectations of each other in order to make a better working situation. It was also brought out that the brochure should include the different steps in the marketing of successful product. It was agreed that better communication is a necessary factor in the overall scheme of things. In looking toward the future, there was talk of a need for more viable product advertising, more CD releases, and development of catalogue product.

## PROMOTION

John Saistone, chairman of the promotion sub-committee, reported that his members had had a very productive meeting and had succeeded in establishing a conference call system. The first such call is to take place on Thursday afternoon, with such distributors participating as Big State and M.S., among others. Following that call, manufacturers will have access to a conference call in order to discuss marketing strategy, potential new releases and current status of released product. A list of each distributor's promotion people, their direct phone numbers and FAX numbers, is being compiled. Standard release sheets are being developed to assist the distributor in more effectively marketing and promoting the product. Also in the works is a common tracking sheet for the purpose of more accurate follow-up on airplay impact at the retail level as product is added to playlists.

In bringing this session to a close, it was said that, "We (the independents) must crawl before we can walk," but, to this reporting observer, it seems evident that the attendees, radiating positive energy, will not have sore knees from crawling for very long.

The next meeting is scheduled to take place prior to the NAIRD convention on May 12th in New Orleans.

## Indie Groove

I got those low down recovering from convention blues. I got those real low down, recovering from convention blues. And there ain't nobody else to write the doggone news.

Item: Distributors' Report. Both Navarre Corporation and Big State Distributors FAXed in their report sheets too late to be included in last week's listing. In order to recognize their participation, here is a brief analysis of their reports. Big State reported only album sales as follows: **Rock/Pop** - Cover Girls *Show Me* on Fever/Sutra; Mason Williams with Mannheim Steamroller *Classical Gas* on American Gramophone; and *California Raisins* on Priority Records. In **R&B** albums, Big State also reports *Show Me* as his best moving product, followed by Betty Wright's new and extremely hot *Mother Wit* on Steve Alaimo's Vision label and Just Ice's *Cool & Deadly* from Fresh/Sleeping Bag.

Navarre also reported *Classical Gas* in **Rock/Pop**, following it with Salt-n-Pepa's still selling *Hot, Cool & Viscious* on Next Plateau and *Nevillization II* by the Neville Brothers on Spindle Top Records. In the **R&B album** category, Navarre gave its nod to Anita Baker's *Songstress* LP on Beverly Glen Records, as well as to Dunhill Compact Discs for its digitally remastered *The Genius of Ray Charles* in Volumes I and II and 4th and Broadway's *Paid In Full* by those rascals of rap, Eric B. & Rakim.

Under the **Jazz** heading, Navarre joined three other reporting distributors in selecting Alphonse Mouzon's *Early Spring* on the Optimism label. (By the way, the title song has just been selected by National Public Radio (NPR) as the theme it will use under its coverage of the national presidential campaign and election.) Also reported in the jazz category was *Deep Breakfast* by Ray Lynch on Music West and *Second Chance* by Oceans on the Breeze label. Big State liked Denon's self-titled release *Elaine Elias*, on CD only, as its number one mover, followed by TBA's *The Very Best of George Howard* and the Hank Crawford/Jimmy McGriff opus *Steppin' Up* on Fantasy's Milestone label.

Big State passed on the New Age category, but Navarre selected Higher Octave's *Apuremac* by Cusco and Ray Lynch's *Deep Breakfast* on Music West as their first and second big sellers, respectively, followed by *Fresh Aire IV* by Mannheim Steam Roller on American Gramophone in the third spot.

The categories of Reggae, Gospel/Christian, Comedy/Novelty, Country and Spoken Word/Children are covered in this issue. Our full report will return next week. A minimum of two selections will be required for the product to appear on the report.

Item: The Welk Record Group tugs on heartstrings with its CD release of 22 digitally remastered Doris Day recordings to the accompaniment of the Van Alexander Orchestra and the Page Cavanaugh Trio. This is a mid-line CD on the Hindsight label, which ought to do well in suburban malls across America, and should get adult contemporary airplay as well. Memories are made of this.

Item: Two timeless summa cum laude graduates of the bebop school of jazz appear in new releases from Landmark and Milestone (both distributed by Fantasy Records) in the form of *Harlem Blues* by Donald Byrd and *Dancing In the Dark* by Sonny Rollins. According to Gene Ferriter, Cash Box's own jazz chart expert, both these albums are getting multiple reports from around the country and ought to be debuting in the next week or two.

Item: Apologies to *Don't Lets Start* a 12-inch single by They Might Be Giants on Bar-None Records, which was reported on Valley Record Distributors' report last week. Apparently, the star we used to indicate its presence was of the falling variety.

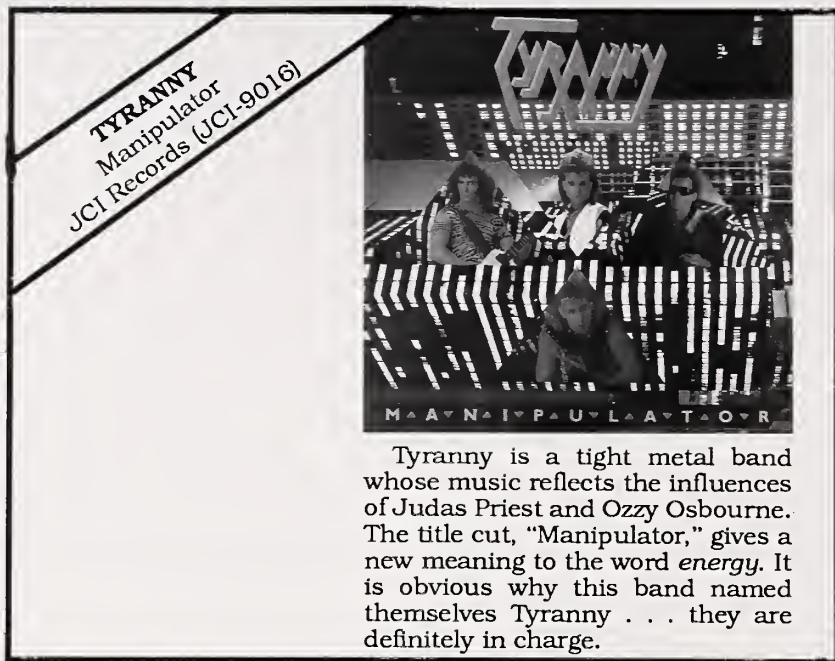

Profile PRO-1246

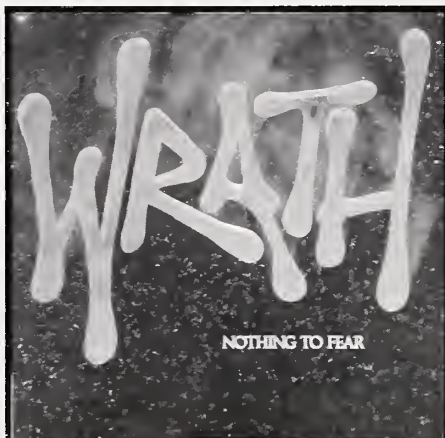

# "JAZZ, NEW AGE OR WHAT"

Chicago, IL - On Thursday March 10th, Baker & Taylor Audio and Navarre Corporation held a seminar for retailers entitled "Jazz, New Age or What", at B & T's Chicago branch. The joint effort was the brainchild of Steve Harkins and Rich Krupa of B & T, and Navarre's Chris Stimson. The goal was to bridge the gap between retail and radio on what is new age music, how to merchandise it, and how radio stations program this format. To achieve this goal a panel of radio programmers and representatives from Chicago and Milwaukee new age stations gave insights on what music they played and on which direction their stations were going. The participants were Erv Jezek, Satellite Music Network; Rick O'Dell, WCLR; John Radford and Sil Scaglione, WNUA; Danya Calderon, WBEZ, public radio; and Steve Amann and Bill Harman, WBZN.

The points the panelists agreed on were the need for retail and radio to communicate with each other. The new age-light jazz-contemporary vocal format will

be the format of the 90's and will be adult contemporary music of the 90's. Because of the format's newness it will take time to mature; the programmers are currently writing the rules and guidelines with each day. With this in mind, both radio and retail will develop this music in the marketplace and on the air. This will call for the availability of playlists for retailers and listeners; stations receiving feedback on sales from retailers; and announcers informing audiences on selections they have played.

Panelists were split on automated versus live announcers. Satellite Music Network's formula is to make music the star. Their research had indicated people had tired of DJ's. WCLR and WBZN found it essential to inform their audience beyond simply giving artists and titles.

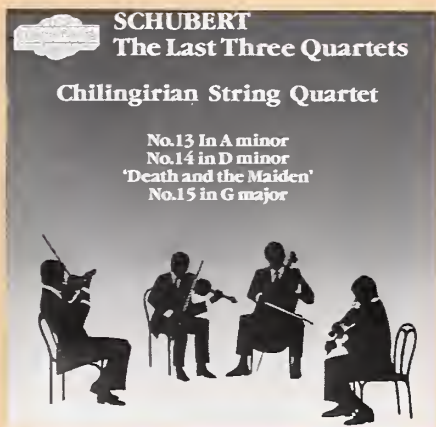
After a question and answer period, Breeze Recording Artists, - OCEANS performed and energetic and tasty set featuring songs from their newly released album, *Second Chance*.

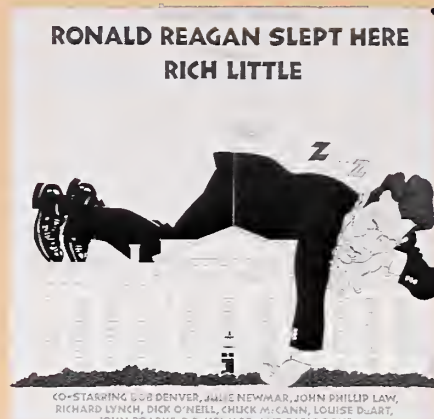
The last four years of Schubert's life saw the creation of his greatest masterpieces, works marked by an intense lyricism and an attention to textural detail. His treatment of subject matter achieved an emotion and poetic level unknown in the composer's music prior to 1824.

To this period between 1824 and 1828 the A minor, D minor, and G major quartets belong, alongside the last three sonatas for piano (D.958,959,960), the *Wanderer Fantasy* for piano, the 9th Symphony, the song cycle *Winterreise*, the two Piano Trios (D.898,929), and the String Quintet in C major.

The Chilingirian String Quartet approach these three early Romantic Period works without the excessive 'angst' that can bog down performances of music of this time. They play with fire and emotion when called for, especially at the opening of the D minor, and, in the tradition of the renowned Amadeus Quartet, they show great eloquence and restraint during the spun-out melodies of the slow movements. This is Schubert explored with a complete range of emotion and virtuosity. Highly recommended for chamber music and Schubert aficionados alike.

Listen to "Crazy Eyes," "Southbound Train" and "Roadside" for an idea of Tarz-io's writing ability in various categories. The music is uniquely American, and true to its traditional roots. Michael Doucet and the rest of Beausoleil have recorded quite a slice of Louisiana history. It makes for fine listening.

The story is about the feelings of love between an "everday man" and his everyday wife, but it is told from a third person point of view. "Everyday Man" is more than an everyday product for Gary and RCA.

Tommy Brasfield has had his songs recorded by Barbara Mandrell, T.G. Sheppard, Millie Jackson, Barry Manilow, Ronnie Milsap, John Anderson, T. Graham Brown, The Bellamy Brothers, Earl Thomas Conley and Charley Pride just to name a few. He is currently signed with Opryland/Milene Music and is producing the new super group "Canyon" on 16th Avenue Records.

# The Dollars And \$ense Of Business Promotions – Part IX

by Roger Sharpe

One of the most difficult concepts for most location owners to accept is the notion that promotional activities do not have to be expensive, hard to manage, and, ultimately not worth the time and effort to administrate given all the other concerns that take place during a normal work day. Hopefully, what this series has attempted to do is to give some very specific suggestions for those programs that can be accomplished with very little expenditure of money or time; especially in terms of the potential returns on investment.

This time around the focus will be on the simplistic option of providing signage that can inform players of existing new games or those products which will be coming in the weeks ahead. Although this might not sound that earth-shaking, there are many arguments to be made for the power of publicizing equipment to your audience, instead of just letting them discover the latest addition on their own.

All too often, the choice of the industry in general is to let a game survive on its own with the burden placed on the players to provide the necessary word-of-mouth to help hype its existence. And though this normally works in practice, there are ways to help push along any and all machines so that your public does play them and make their own conclusions as to appropriate entertain-

ment value.

However, when there is a row of machines – one next to the other – or banks of games filling center floor space; it's often difficult to discern what's new even if someone is a regular customer. All too often, in fact, many machines get lost in the crowd and suddenly become "old" before their time and with the price of new equipment today this is something that every location owner *doesn't* need to deal with along with everything else.

Simply stated, in-store signage can be a very powerful tool in helping to "sell" games to your clientele no matter if you're situated in a mall, free-standing building or a street location where traffic is plentiful and earnings are up. The suggestion for any and all sites is to utilize existing materials from the manufacturers – those giveaways that so many of us pass on at every trade show; posters, flyers, bumper stickers and all the rest.

These items are valuable if you

think of your business as a retail establishment or even a leisure time entertainment site. After all, how many of us look at the posters and screen stills in the movie theaters, the posters in travel agencies, signage that might be posted in banks, and the list goes on. Should a game room, family fun center or arcade be any different?

A poster or banner displayed in your window would have to attract attention, especially of those people passing by your front door and, if there are limitations as to what you can put up, how about a free standing floor easel or those old-fashioned sandwich boards to hold the posters you can get directly from the manufacturer or through your local distributor?

If your interior has any wall space by a change machine or some central desk where a store manager sits, what about displaying brochures of the games that are new, or those that are soon to arrive? They're colorful, eye-catching and whether it's for a

pinball machine, video game or any other amusement machine, at least they provide some visual representation of the name of the game and some of its characteristics that players are going to find appealing even if we tend to take these printed materials for granted.

There is one operator I know of who even goes so far as to put up a blackboard in his arcade with just a list of names of upcoming games for players to be on the look-out for. And after the AMOA, he usually tires to bring back some extra caps, key chains, t-shirts and other premium items that he then hands out to his more dedicated customers as a way of saying "thank you for your business".

It is this personalized attention that can mean so much to any bottom line return, and also be the extra step that can help promote machines you're counting on to pay the rent and bring back the biggest return on investment in the shortest amount of time. And the suggestions here are relatively inexpensive, if not free, for those who want to take a first step in attracting new players, keeping regulars happy and helping to make day-to-day operations that much more successful in what is rapidly becoming a much more intensively competitive environment given all of the other leisure time entertainment options most people have.

## CASH BOX PROFILE

### Grand Prix's Jan Smith

From the football field, to the route, with time in between to become a wife and mother. How many women in the coin-op industry had the unique experience of trying out for their highschool football team? If your answer is Jan Smith of Grand Prix in Dania, Florida, you are absolutely correct.

Of course, her name was Jan Coelho then. It was 1971 and she was about to enter her senior year at school. The opportunity came as the result of an assignment offered to her by sports editor Ed Plaisted of the Hollywood, Florida Sun-Tattler, which she unhesitatingly accepted as "super cool". Only it turned out to be "lukewarm"!

Jan's arrival for Monday practice was greeted with catcalls and plenty of kidding as she took her place on the field – the only girl among 100 Spartans! To everyone's surprise (including the coach) she was back a 3 pm that afternoon to go to work and prove that she was ready, willing and able to try anything the boys did and make whatever sacrifice was necessary – to get her newspaper story.

Jan had no idea of what a workout would entail, besides which there was the problem of understanding the "jibberish". Calisthenics took on a new meaning for her. Push-

ups...ugh! It was a painful and yet rewarding experience which got her terrific story and also prompted her decision to forego the football field and settle for "yelling in the stands and baking brownies in the kitchen."

After college, Jan toyed with the idea of pursuing a career in journalism. She chose marriage instead and is the proud mother of Tiffany Ann, who is now 15 years old.

On occasion she has done some route work, but the firm has a full staff for this function. ## Counterfeit Boards Seized In Washington

CHICAGO - U.S. Customs agents in Seattle, Washington seized 18 counterfeit printed circuit boards enroute from Canada to operators in the states of Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana, according to a report from AAMA.

Robert C. Fay, director in industry affairs and enforcement for the American Amusement Machine Association, stated that the customs seizures involved such games as Double Dragon and Rastan as well as other Taito, Capcom, Romstar and Data East products.

Fay said the counterfeit printed circuit boards were being shipped

from R.J. Rose in Barrie, Ontario and also International Computer Systems of Woodbridge, Ontario. He pointed out that these seizures were significant due to the fact that these boards were being shipped via the U.S. mail and noted that the U.S. Customs agents, in addition to monitoring the U.S. mail system as well.

Fay advised that the results of the seizures will be sent to the appropriate customs officers in the above states, adding that the northwest section of the U.S. is now a priority area for AAMA's enforcement activities.

## CMMAA Calls Emergency Meeting

CHICAGO - In an all out effort to combat a prohibitive city ordinance, the Chicago Metropolitan Music & Amusement Association (CMMAA) convened on March 1, in an emergency session during which a twelve man committee was or plan strategy and inaugurate a Legal Defense Fund.

The ordinance in question, passed by the Chicago City Council in mid-

February, prohibits anyone under the age of 17 from playing amusement machines between the hours of 8 a.m. and 3 pm on days when public schools are open; and from playing the machines in establishments where retail alcoholic beverages are sold (Cash Box, 3/19/88).

The newly formed strategy committee is composed of members rep-

## Favorable Ruling In Massachusetts On Sales Tax Collection Suit

CHICAGO - The number of favorable state court sales tax rulings concerning taxability of management fees and reimbursements paid by clients to foodservice and vending service contractors was increased last month when the Superior Court of Massachusetts decided that the state's revenue department could not collect sales tax on such payments.

"This extends the string of victories in such cases by NAMA and its members and we are delighted with the decision and the language used by the judge," declared NAMA government affairs director Richard W. Funk.

"King George III would have been

proud of the (Revenue) Commissioner's efforts to assess and collect sales taxes on management fees and operating expense reimbursements received by the plaintiffs," stated Justice William C. O'Neil, Jr.

The court ruled in a suit brought by Dining Management Services, Inc. against the state's revenue department, according to Funk. Earlier the court had prohibited the state from assessing and collecting the tax while the suit was pending.

Funk said other favorable rulings were obtained in recent years in Connecticut, Iowa, New Jersey and Virginia.

fort. Papers are now being drafted to file a lawsuit to prevent enforcement and/or declare the new ordinance unconstitutional.

Right now, the group is seeking financial assistance from all levels of the trade, in the Chicago area. A follow-up citywide meeting was scheduled for March 15.

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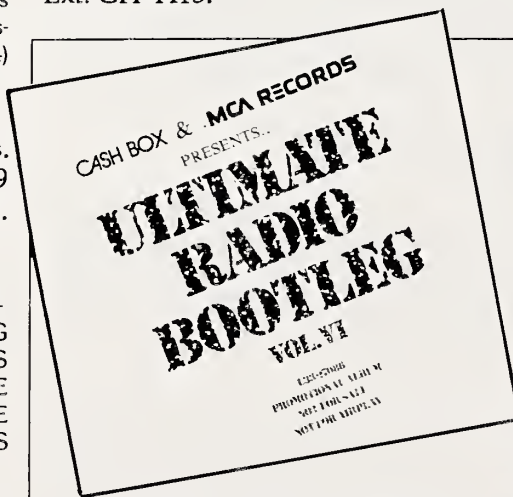
