Love and Rockets Set Course

Longevity in the music business is a rare happening for a rock band. But to go on a four year hiatus, return to record an album that doesn't set the world on fire, and then do another album that takes off, well, like a rocket, is the rare feat being pulled off by American Recordings act Love and Rockets with *Sweet F.A.*, which was launched with the highly-regarded single "Sweet Lover Hangover." The group has overcome any "'80s band" stigma that might linger and has steadily registered sales, embarked on a tour and all the while gained momentum at radio, which soon may be treated to another single. *Cash Box* pop editor Daina Darzin reports.

China To Face U.S. Trade Sanctions

U.S. copyright industries losses estimated at more than \$2.3 billion.

DESPITE STERN WARNINGS, the People's Republic of China has failed to address complaints over pirated CDs, movies, computer software and other U.S. copyrighted works and the U.S. Trade Representative has put the country on its "Priority Foreign Country" list. Noting that China has not complied with provision of the February 1995 U.S.-China Intellectual Property Rights Agreement, the USTR targeted the Asian nation under special 301 provisions of U.S. trade law, and called upon the country to stop production and export of all pirated products and to permit access to all U.S. copyright-based industries.

Naming China as a priority foreign country can lead to economic sanctions being imposed at any time, pending completion of an investigation of the copyright violations.

Eric Smith, president of the **International Intellectual Property Alliance**, said, "China has failed to date to carry out its promises to halt the massive production and export of pirate music CDs, video CDs and CD-ROMs containing U.S. entertainment and business software and text-based multimedia product."

The IIPA is an umbrella group for associations representing various U.S. copyright industries.

Smith said in a written statement that U.S. losses due to the piracy, sales in country and export of the pirate material reached \$2.32 billion in 1995, and that piracy runs between 50% to 99% in all categories of copyrighted material. The IIPA president also applauded acting USTR **Charlene Barchefsky** for enforcement of the 1995 U.S.-China agreement. He also praised the USTR for continue to pressure bilateral agreements with trade partners and using the Special 301 provisions to initiate multilateral dispute settlement proceedings under the new **World Trade Organization TRIPS** (Trade-Related Aspects of Intellectual Property Rights) Agreement.

Jason Berman, chairman of the **Recording Industry Assn. of America** (RIAA), and IIPA member, also applauded the the USTR's action, noting that piracy of prerecorded music in China amounted to more than \$300 million. But RIAA officials noted that **Paraguay** remains a thorny piracy problem for the recording industry. Noting that Paraguay joined 25 other nations on the USTR's "Watch List," RIAA executives say that they had hoped for a more severe citation against the country given the size and scope of the problem. The IIPA estimates that Paraguay's contribution to the recorded music piracy problem in 1995 was \$20 million.

FRANCE HONORS JONES: Multi-Grammy winning producer, arranger and composer, **Quincy Jones** has been presented with the Distinguished Arts and Letters Award, at the level of *Officier*, from the **French Ministry of Culture** in Paris for his musical contributions to the arts.

In his acceptance of the award Jones remarked, "I am truly honored to receive this award from the French Government. France evokes many of the warmest, most vivid memories of my life. From the first time that I traveled to Paris with Lionel Hampton's band in 1951, to today, France has been like a second home to me. Its people enthusiastically accepted our music, and did not judge us by the color of our skin, but instead by the quality of our music. I humbly accept this honor not only for myself, but for all the great musicians which France has embraced over the decades. I can only hope that one day, my country will recognize those contributions, and the importance of maintaining them."

IOVINE, FIELD, BAM MEN: *BAM* magazine, pioneer of the free distribution concept, has named **Interscope's Ted Field** and **Jimmy Iovine** its "Men of the Year" in its ninth annual Bam 100 list of the most powerful people in the music industry. The list is written by the magazine's business editor and author, **Bruce Haring**.

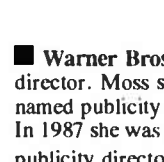

EAST COAST



Some 47 minutes after the box office opened, seats for the KISS tour's June 28 opening night in Detroit, MI's Tiger Stadium—38,000 of them—were sold out. The band's original members announced the plans for the worldwide tour during a press conference aboard the aircraft carrier U.S.S. Intrepid in New York, NY. Pictured in full stage regalia and make-up are Ace Frehley and Paul Stanley of KISS; Danny Goldberg, president/CEO of Mercury Records (the group's label); Doc McGhee, McGhee Entertainment; and Peter Criss and Gene Simmons of KISS.

HAVING A HAPPENING FOR ANDY: The New York scene still has the spirit of Andy Warhol stuck in corners all over the city. With the release of Orion Pictures' *I Shot Andy Warhol*, the denizens of that era once again stalk the Big Apple. Celebrating the premiere on April 29th took the in-crowd to *The Tunnel*, the dance labyrinth that has become a mainstay with the club kids, where the space was bedecked in silver aluminum foil the way Warhol's famous creation *The Factory* was decorated. Entertaining the teeming hordes which included actor Leonardo Di Caprio was Elektra's Luna, who played some originals and covers like "Take A Walk On The Wild Side" and the title track from the film *Donovan's Season of the Witch*. Playing after them was fellow soundtrackers Matador's Yo La Tengo, who proceeded to go into a Velvet Underground style jam session. Appropriate enough since members of the band portray VU in the movie. Almost enough of a spectacle to make even the white-haired mop-topped one break a grin.

LIGHTING ATLANTA ON FIRE: It is hard to contain a sound as vibrant as the one made by the quartet known as the Rock-A-Teens. With a three hollow-body guitar front line, the band has all the power without just being a wall of sound; very catchy without being the slightest bit twee. The foursome's eponymous album on Daemon captures the Rock-A-Teens slashing and burning with those three axes, clearing the ground for fresh seeds. All of which comes out even fuller when played live as they did at Brownies on the 29th. The group, which comes from the sight of the 1996 Summer Olympics, ignited the air with bright strumming. Do not place the group near oily rags or other flammable material.

PUSHING THE EDGES: What can one say about a group that has only two instruments and one of them contains an ironing board? That is why England's Spaceheads are, to say, slightly off the beaten track. The duo features a percussionist and a multi-instrumentalist who mostly plays trumpet, but is not afraid to use other bits of musical ephemera to play through his loops and effects. Playing their first New York show at Brownies on the 25th they lived up to their name with pieces that started in Earth's orbit and blasted into some parts of the Milky Way. Never becoming grating, the Spaceheads still had moments where the audience was overcome with sudden shocks. Their domestic debut is out on *Dark Beloved Cloud*.

SUBTERRANEAN SPACE FILLED: The day after tax day, April 16th, and just following two sold-out shows by Sub Pop's The Grifters, the club Under Acne was suddenly shuttered for good by the management which runs the upstairs restaurant. The venue which has had more than its fair share of rising musical stars play its stage, also had its ups and downs as far as the club's reputation was concerned. Though things appeared on the upswing, it did not stop the doors from being closed. With its closing New York loses another badly needed space for music acts to play.

INDUSTRYTITES AND PARTY CRASHERS got a sneak preview of Soundgarden's new *Down On The Upside* disc, due for release May 21, at the Griffith Park Observatory April 25th. A beautiful star-filled sky, and then a laser light show, accompanied playback of the record, while attendees munched out and drank up. A good time was had by all, despite the occasionally unnerving presence of state troopers walking through the observatory...

MTV GOES TO HARVARD AND OTHER TV STORIES: In partnership with the Harvard School of Public Health, MTV has created a series of anti-violence public service announcements featuring Coolio, Method Man, KRS-One and Vinnie from *Naughty By Nature*. The five "Squash It" spots began airing on April 27th. In completely unrelated news (except, well, it's MTV, and Coolio) the rapper's classic "Gangsta's Paradise" has been nominated as Best Song From A Movie in MTV's Movie Awards, which will air June 13... In the meantime, Sonic Youth follow in the footsteps of Tito Puente, the only two musical acts ever invited to put their personal stamp on the theme song of *The Simpsons*. Sonic Youth's version will cap off the show's "Homerpalooza" episode, scheduled as the show's May 19th finale.

AND IN CYBERSPACE, Spanish-language material will now be part of the newly-designed Lollapalooza '96 Internet website, which went into operation April 1, handled by the Latino division of Lee Solters Company, which is doing the publicity for Lollapalooza.

MAYBE NOW THEY'LL FORGIVE HIM FOR THE ALAMO: 50 cents of every ticket sold at the May 4 Ozzy Osbourne concert at South Park Meadows in Austin, Texas will go to the San Antonio Habitat For Humanity, which will use the proceeds to build a home for an underprivileged family.

Love and Rockets' Science

LOVE AND ROCKETS HAS ALWAYS BEEN a critical and cult favorite, purveyor of such dark, gorgeously gloomy '80s hits as "Ball of Confusion" and "So Alive." The kind of band who talks art, not commerce. But Love and Rockets, circa 1996, are refreshingly honest about their goals.

"The most important thing is to sell loads of records," says frontman Daniel Ash with a smile. "We're interested in really big commercial success, not underground or elitist. When you do that, everything falls into place. Everything opens up because everyone believes in what you're doing. People give you the freedom to do what you want to do."

Sweet F.A., Love and Rockets' second disc since the band—Ash, bassist Daniel J. and drummer Kevin Haskins—took a four-year break to pursue solo projects, might just do the trick, propelled by the hazy, moody lilt of its first single, "Sweet Lover Hangover."

The record took two years to complete at numerous recording locales, including a house that burned down. "The band went through a lot of changes," admits Marc Geiger, vp of alternative marketing/new media for American, Love and Rockets' label. "The feeling around here was that we were going to have to fight to get any radio play—(it's become) unfashionable to like bands that were around in the '80s, and (until the recent success of bands like Oasis), to like bands from England. Radio was very negative—a year ago, they wouldn't have opened up a Love and Rockets package. I purposely booked a tour right after the album came out, because I knew they'd sell tickets, and I wanted to show radio and other people that fans are still there for this band. Ironically, it got on the radio before we even had a chance to release it!"

Seems Brian Phillips of influential station 99X in Atlanta liked the track so much he started playing it eight weeks before its scheduled release. "It was also around the same time that the Gavin convention was coming into Atlanta—a lot of programmers were in town," adds Mark Neiter, American's vp of alternative promotion. "Instantly, 'Sweet Lover...' became the #1 requested record on the station. People got caught up in the excitement, about the fact that Brian Phillips was waving the flag, plus they were hearing it on the radio, which is a much more exciting experience than having some promo person come in and play it for them in an office. A buzz started to develop. We rush-released the record and people went nuts for it and added it like crazy. That really was the strategy," he laughs. "It really wasn't rocket science or anything."

Love and Rockets' entire tour sold out in advance, and the "Sweet Lover..." video was added at MTV, though it never did make the illustrious Buzz Bin. "Currently, they're selling 4,000 copies a week, but the (industry ratio) is, you get this amount of spins, you should have 'x' amount of records, almost on a table," Geiger complains. "I'm not railing against anything or anybody, but when somebody says to you, 'Oh, so and so got played 10 times and they sold 10,000 records, you're only selling 4,000,' it's perceived as a negative, whereas I think it's great. We're on the air and the band's back and they're selling out gigs and they got a four star review in *Rolling Stone*. Critical reviews have been fantastic. I expected the critics not to care and I'm really pleasantly surprised."

Geiger doesn't underestimate the problem of an '80s stigma. "Sometimes bands don't want to know about that perception in the market, because it's not comfortable or flattering," he believes. "If I was an artist, I'd say, 'Screw you, I've been an artist for a long time, I don't need to listen to what some idiot in the market says.' And rightly so. But for bands to remain relevant for a long time, and be important, quote-end-quote, they really have to push themselves."

"It's hard to accept that a band that made a lot of great records can take a break, for whatever reason, and then everyone will thumb their nose at them in a weird way. I remember when [Love and Rockets' 1988] *Earth Sun Moon* came out, it was #1 on the CMJ chart longer than any other artist. I remember how much people were into them. And I thought it was so cool for them to

come back with *Hot Trip To Heaven* (the band's resolutely, weirdly hypnotic, ambient 1994 release, their first after their hiatus.) I was disappointed people didn't give that record a chance because I think it's a great nighttime record.

"People thumbed their nose at Lou Reed, and then he came out with *New York*," Geiger continues. "And then people go, 'yeah, I always thought he was great.' It's similar with Love and Rockets. They've never made bad records," Geiger declares. And he should know. Formerly a booking agent, he represented the members of Love and Rockets for years, beginning with their legendary stint in Tones On Tail, the band Ash and Haskins formed after leaving the classic gothic band, Bauhaus. "I think they deserve a lot of respect, and I hope they get some."

"One thing Love and Rockets has going for them that a lot of '80s bands don't, is, they never made a watered-down, sell-out record," concurs Neiter. "They left when they were on top and that created a lot of mystique so that when they did come back, there were still a lot of people who were into them and really loyal. I think we're doing a really great job (with the record), especially with the competition that's out there—major platinum bands that have records out right now, which always makes it more difficult for something like this, that wasn't a given (for radio adds) when we first got it."

Undeterred by these obstacles, the band is looking forward with a second single: the frequently-debated candidates are "Judgement Day" and "Fever." "You have to make sure people listen to a song with the right perspective and attitude, and remind people how well the Love and Rockets catalog has held up over the years," Neiter believes. "Modern rock is the darling format out there, and you gotta remind people that when they do their Flashback 500 or auditorium research, that Love and Rockets has stood the test of time with songs like 'Ball of Confusion,' 'No New Tale To Tell,' and 'So Alive.' Then there's the fact that we had this major early indication—the song went on the air and people went crazy for it. As a promotion person, you're always looking for those stories to spread to other stations."

"I think a lot of the record is fairly commercial," muses Geiger. "I don't know if it has a big hit single. I think it's a really, really consistent record—there's no filler on it at all. And it's exciting to see them play. I think the songs stand up well live."

To prevent the stress and exhaustion of constant touring, which was instrumental in Love and Rockets' 1989 breakup, the band is flying to its U.S. dates. ("We wouldn't have made it otherwise," Ash quips.) Appropriate to their material, the tour features an atmosphere of eerie, dramatic grandeur, thanks to striking, original lights that the band members designed themselves—a hands-on approach for a band that's once again passionately dedicated to its career.

"People smell bullshit after a while," Ash declares. "A one-hit wonder is a one-hit wonder. People ask me, are you all going to be like the Rolling Stones (and keep playing forever), and I think, 'maybe,' we've been doing this 16, 17 years. That's a long time for a rock band."

GRAVITY KILLS: "Guilty" (TVT 5912-2)

A nasty, hyper-energetic, inventive industrial/metal/dance track that's so heavy it could kill your plants if you play it too loud, "Guilty" proves that St. Louis-based Gravity Kills are a band to watch. Working the monster-on-a-rampage territory between White Zombie and Nine Inch Nails, "Guilty" could make a fine heavy rock add—but its real strength lies on the dance floor. Smart of the band to

provide 9 different remixes of the tune along with two of the b-side, so to speak, "Tomorrow." The band is currently gaining extra attention as the headliner on ESPN's promotional tour for the 1996 X Games.

DAVE MATTHEWS BAND: "Too Much" (RCA 66904-2)

How many people could interrupt a turbo-propelled funk song for a little folksy, Celtic-sounding break? The Dave Matthews Band manages to do it brilliantly on "Too Much," a wry take on excess in all areas. It's the perfect first single off *Crash*, Dave Matthews Band's follow-up to its triple-Platinum, Grammy-nominated 1994 RCA debut, *Under The Table And Dreaming*.

PAUL WESTERBERG: "Love Untold" (Reprise 9 46176-2)



Paul Westerberg's former cohorts, the Replacements, were called the greatest rock n' roll band in the known universe by nearly every critic around. After an equally well-regarded 1993 debut solo album, *14 Songs*, Westerberg returns in fine form with this, the first single off his new *Eventually* disc. Produced by Westerberg and Brendan O'Brien (Pearl Jam, Stone Temple Pilots), "Love Untold" is a country-edged, sad-eyed, soaring mid-tempo thing that's just about perfect in its emotional, big-guitar simplicity.

KING'S X: "Sometime" (Atlantic PRCD 6732)

King's X had the bad luck to be ahead of its time—an alterna-metal band that debuted before there was such a category, and has been confusing people ever since. Nevertheless, the band has developed a dedicated cult following over the years, and continues to take an imaginative, original approach to their music. Off the band's *Ear Candy* disc, "Sometime" gets over on a thick, syncopated rhythm track and vocals which take on the vibe of gospel at moments. An anthemic, cool track that's perfect for hard-music stations.

PICK OF THE WEEK

THE CRANBERRIES: "Salvation" (Island 314-524234-2)



What do you get when you cross a critically-acclaimed alterna-band with Bruce Fairbairn, the producer who helped make Bon Jovi a household name? A really big edgy, completely memorable sound that just begs to be on the radio. "Salvation" is the first single off the Cranberries' third disc, *To The Faithful Departed*. A clever, ironic look at drug culture from both a kid's and parents' viewpoint, the track is propelled by Dolores O'Riordan's strong, evocative voice, a wailing horn section, and monster drums. Dark and driving with a nearly perfect pop sensibility, "Salvation" should find a happy home at both alternative and heavy music stations.

■ SUPER 8: *Super 8* (Hollywood HR 62014 2)

Heavy, percussive rockers and gorgeous mood pieces alternate on this fine debut. Super 8 power up to rock-funk on the first single, "King of the World," thrash-funk on "Nothing," then turn appropriately gloomy, intense and anthemic for "April 19," about the Oklahoma City bombing. Super 8 is the new project of Bronx Style Bob, whose 1992 solo album, *Grandma's Ghost*, garnered critical raves and a spot on Lol-

■ VARIOUS ARTISTS: *Soundtrack from The Craft* (Columbia CK 67626)

Appropriately, a movie about Gen X witches sports a soundtrack album that reads like a who's who of up-and-coming alterna-stars, from Sponge to Elastica to Matthew Sweet, doing mostly imaginatively-chosen covers. Our Lady Peace contributes a lush, swirling take on the Beatles' "Tomorrow Never Knows," while Heather Nova makes Peter Gabriel's "I Have The Touch" an edgy, poppy dreamscape. Other standouts include Letters To Cleo's version of the Cars-penned "Dangerous Type," and Love Spit Love's

bass-heavy, percolating edition of the Smiths' "How Soon Is Now?" Spacehog's "The Horror" is a hallucinogen-laced, magical-mystery-tour hoot.

■ FRED SCHNEIDER: *Just Fred* (Reprise 9 46215-2)

Left to his own devices, the B-52s' Fred Schneider wants to be—the Ramones. At least for one track. On others, he's more like the Stooges, Sex Pistols and other tough-minded influences that probably didn't quite fit into the B-52s' gleeful wackiness. (The B-52s' quirky humor is present, however, on tracks like "Coconut.") Produced by Steve Albini (Nirvana, PJ Harvey), most often a purveyor of thick, dark sounds from the depths of hell, *Just Fred* takes off in fine, train-about-to-derail style, with Schneider slambanging through the appropriately-titled "Whip" with aplomb, complete with whip special effects. "Sugar In My Hog," on the other hand, has a demented rockabilly nastiness.



■ SAMMY: *Tales Of Great Neck Glory* (DGCD-24962)

Sammy makes an impressive debut with *Tales of Great Neck Glory*, wherein guitar-backed reminiscences of a surreal suburban childhood are buoyed by a nearly perfect instinct for songwriting as well as story-telling. Think Lou Reed 25 years younger—especially apparent in Jesse Hartman's, gruff-edged voice, replete with built-in irony, and speaking gracefully over the notes it can't reach—with less angst and more crunch. Sammy is a two-man enterprise: Luke Wood was previously in Girls Against Boys; Hartman played in Richard Hell's band in addition to being a critically-acclaimed filmmaker and video director.

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PICK OF THE WEEK



■ THE HUNGER: *Devil Thumbs A Ride* (Universal UD-53000)

One of those records you pick out of the pile because it has a cool cover, and then can't get out of your earphones. Kind of an industrial/country/metal/alterna outfit—in short, it defies description—The Hunger spins out musical influences like a Cuisinart gone mad. A heavily keyboard-based sound nevertheless has room for the title track's strafe-and-divebomb guitar; "Undone" mixes twangy melody (The Hunger is, after all, from Houston, TX) with unearthly electronic blips and Rage Against The Machine-style percussiveness. "Terminal Infection" combines a malevolent keyboard rush and rap-flavored beats, while "Rings and Roses" is a flurry of ominous effects. A really original album, which doesn't happen that often.

MISSION: INFILTRATE URBAN RADIO: Alternative black artists seeking to be heard above the din of mainstream urban radio formats have a new forum compliments of *The Alternative Groove*, a two-hour radio pilot launched by Earth Wind and Fire co-founder/bassist Verdine White and originator/producer Rick Scott. It is no small task the show's planners have undertaken. The work of cutting-edge black artists using a broad palette of musical elements is not easily categorized or widely heard on current "hit"-intensive urban playlists. Despite the commercial impact of Tracy Chapman, Lenny Kravitz, Seal and similar alchemists, their music occupies a minute cusp in urban radio airplay. In order to surpass mass-driven programming formulas, Alternative R&B must run a formidable gauntlet resistant to experimental compositions derived from R&B, soul, rock, jazz, and folk roots. To date, *The Alternative Groove* pilot has generated a buzz of enthusiasm among artists, managers and initial sponsors. Scott informed *Cash Box* that talks are underway to premiere the broadcast with a major urban station in Los Angeles, to air twice weekly before syndication in other markets. KCRW, the local National Public Radio station, known for its eclectic, tolerant fare, has also expressed interest in the show. In addition to Seal, and Kravitz, the pilot program features Me'Shell NdegeOcello, Impromptu, Incognito, Brand New Heavies, Jamiroquai, Maysa (Leak, former lead singer w/Incognito), Des'ree, The Tony Rich Project, Dionne Farris and Groove Theory. A few of the guests projected to co-host or be interviewed on future shows include Terence Trent D'Arby, Impromptu, Jazzmatazz, Level 42, Najee, Marcus Miller, George Duke, Branford Marsalis and Quincy Jones.

Scott and White have argued that urban radio should not ignore the economic viability of pursuing the 18-60 demographic, "the upscale discriminating listener" that customarily supports Alternative R&B. Spanning racial and ethnic boundaries, these color-blind connoisseurs possess an above-average disposable income, comprising an advertising target this artform can serve as it gains popularity. Warm, insightful, ambitious, *The Alternative Groove* seeks to impose variety on a cookie-cutter approach to black music.

COLOUR CLUB RAIDS OPIUM DEN: JVC urban/pop trio Colour Club lurked in the murk of Hollywood's Opium Den nightclub April 29 for a video shoot of their saucy new single "If It's All Good," vying for adds May 6. Fighting heat between takes that day were musicians Les Pierce, Bernard "Skip" Wise and new vocalist Lisa Taylor. Their upcoming LP *In The Flow*, drops June 11. Young upstart director Darren Grant, cool, cerebral production coordinator Trina Davis, and a crew of film loyalists cobbled from Grant's Seattle homies lensed the group on a purple-draped set.

ADDRHYTHM: Producer Bernard Edwards, 43, co-founder of Chic, Atlantic's hitmaking R&B ensemble of the late '70s died of pneumonia in Tokyo April 18, while participating in a concert series. With Nile Rodgers, Tony Thompson, Norma Jean Wright, and Luci Martin, Chic's elegant, patented violin-backed funk closed out the disco era. Hit songs included "Dance, Dance, Dance," "Le Freak" and "Good Times" (later spun off into "Rapper's Delight" by the Sugarhill Gang). "Le Freak" was no mere dance craze, but echoed the erotic flirtations of the day. Edwards was a highly successful producer after Chic disbanded in 1982, working with Robert Palmer, Rod Stewart and, while partnered with Rodgers, Sister Sledge and Diana Ross.

MTV ADS SQUASH VIOLENCE: MTV recently teamed with the Harvard School of Public Health for a series of anti-violence public service announcements featuring Coolio, Method Man, KRS One, and Vinnie from Naughty by Nature. Each of the five "Squash It" PSA's was produced in New York, and urges viewers to walk away from violent situations, react with their heads instead of weapons.

DOMINO EMITS MORE PHYSICAL FUNK: Outburst Records/Def Jam artist Domino releases his long-awaited *Physical Funk* LP June 11. The title track certified Gold 90 days after its February 23 debut. Newly waxed follow-up single "So Fly" drops May 28. Long Beach vibes and scenarios are replete through the LP's cuts.

■ FUGEES: "Killing Me Softly" (Ruffhouse/Columbia CSK 7847)

Dropping after weeks of pre-release airplay, this trio's reworking of the Roberta Flack standard expounds on the original for modern urban tastes, and it succeeds wildly. Basically they dropped a new rasta engine in the ballad for the diddy-bopping, head-nodding masses. Bet this will be the only version they think exists. The "Sound Barrier Remix" contains rude dancehall energy, as it plays with the harmonies. While the clean LP version of "Fu-Gee-La" is a bonus, the Mary J. Blige-inspired video remix remains the ultimate best take. Watch them hog it for the vaults.

■ WHORIDAS: "Shot Callin' & Big Ballin'" (Southpaw/Delicious Vinyl SP 2210)

It's "Bounce, Rock, Skate, Roll" on Angel Dust, the way these gents play tricks with that song's rhythms. Comes off hallucinogenic. Extra points for reproducing a 40-oz. drunken haze.

■ DA CRIMINAL: "A Better Day" (Berry Juice Records/WCG Records WCCG 0602-2)

More criminals should put their thoughts down like this one. Sweet, original melody, charming chorus, and a prayerful expression of remorse for friends lost in Chi-Town's urban undertow. Will gain fans with exposure.

Although the Monterey Fairgrounds won't provoke a frenzy of postcard mailings, the surrounding Monterey Bay area is as majestic as any geography on this beleaguered planet. The Hollywood Hills in which the Hollywood Bowl is nestled provides a rustic oasis for fans of the Playboy Jazz Festival. The San Francisco Jazz Festival has an entire cosmopolitan environment as the stage for its music presentation. There are other examples, including the Glen Ellen Newport Beach Jazz Festival.

The third annual staging of this event is set for Mother's Day weekend, May 11 & 12, at an amphitheater of the Hyatt Newporter in Newport Beach, CA, south of Los Angeles in Orange County. The Pacific Ocean and Newport Back Bay serve as the undulating backdrop for planned performances by versatile Atlantic Jazz saxist Gerald Albright guitarist Peter White, pianist Alex Bugnon and Southern California fav Poncho Sanchez. And that's just Saturday's line-up. On Sunday, the cooling breezes will glide over performances by Warner Bros. recording artists Joe Sample, Earl Klugh and Boney James, who will be joined by sax newcomer Joe Vincelli and keyboardist Gregg Karukas.

The Hyatt Newporter's amphitheater will also be the site of the 6th annual Glen Ellen Summer Jazz series, which kicks off May 24 with GRP recording artist Diane Schur. GRP's *The Rippingtons* featuring Russ Freeman will hold forth on May 31; June 7 will be highlighted by guitar performances by MoJazz artist Norman Brown and accomplished guitar duo Strunz & Farah. Keiko Matsui, an Orange County resident who happens to be a world-renown composer/pianist, will perform June 14, and the versatile pianist David Benoit will close the series on June 28.

You see, people do come to California for more than the cheese.

MORE RIM SHOTS: The United States Postal Service will unveil the "Jazz Musician" commemorative stamp series in Europe as part of the activities at the 30th Montreaux Jazz Festival. Eubie Blake, Erroll Garner, James P. Johnson, Thelonius Monk, Jelly Roll Morton, John Coltrane, Coleman Hawkins, Charlie Parker, Charles Mingus and Louis Armstrong are the artists featured in the series, which was originally issued in the U.S. at the Monterey Jazz Festival...

then, has experienced quite a bit in his thirtysomething years. The church's gospel and the blues are evident in much of his music, especially on "Grandma's Blues" and the playful "Nutman's Invention," tracks from this latest album. But Chestnut displays a prodigious facility for lyricism, like on "My Song In The Night," which harkens back to something evident on his two prior Atlantic jazz recordings, especially on *The Dark Before The Dawn's* "Baroque Impressions." Of the originals here, "Decisions, Decisions" is an example of Chestnut's ability to waffle between broad dynamic playing with introspective musings. "Cooldaddy's Perspective," is hip, cool and could be music for a swing on the open road. Chestnut and his accomplished musical companions craft a wonderful collection of sound stories.

■ **HERB ALPERT: *Second Wind*** (Almo AMSD-8005). Producers: H. Alpert & Jeff Lorber.

Every few years, impresario/record executive Herb Alpert reinvents his perspective as a musician. Employing the considerable playing and production skills of Jeff Lorber, the collaboration on this new album, Alpert's first in four years, shows how the former leader of the Tijuana Brass can seize the moment, seemingly capturing the spirit of the ethers to serve up a contemporary tapestry of jazz/pop sounds. While the trumpeter uses jazz-influenced playing as a springboard for his music, several formats can laser-mine this disc for

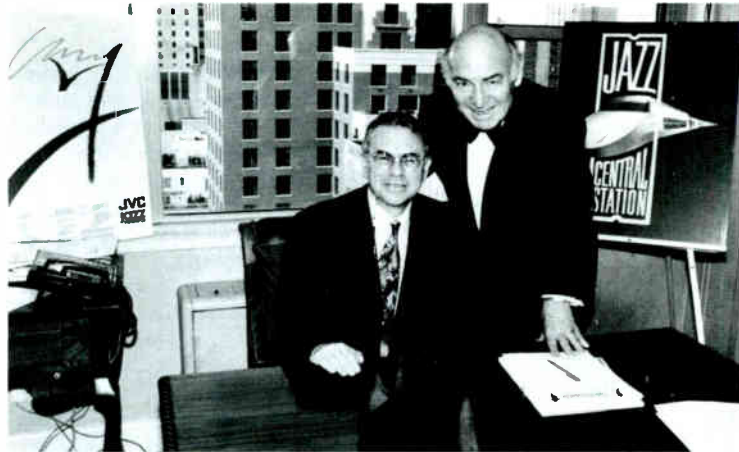

The site will also feature historical Festival highlights that include text, legendary photos, sound samples and video clips.

This year's JVC Festival features a cornucopia—a horn, voice, percussion and keyboard aplenty—with artists such as Aretha Franklin, Herbie Hancock, Ahmad Jamal, Dianne Reeves, Kenny Barron, Chick Corea, David Sanborn, Joshua Redman, Paulinho da Viola, Eddie Palmieri among others.

"Larry Rosen and I have been friends for many years," Wein commented. "Larry's first claim to fame was as a drummer in the Newport Jazz Festival Jazz Youth Band, so I am pleased to see that he is still doing great things in the music business. In this age of ever-changing technology, promoting the jazz festival online is certainly a logical and positive step."

MO' JAZZ ONLINE: Smooth jazz operator Herb Alpert recently launched his first performance tour in eight years with a chat on America Online, where he served cyber surfers info about his new Almo Sounds/Geffen album *Second Wind*—the 33rd album release from the godfather of the Tijuana Brass. 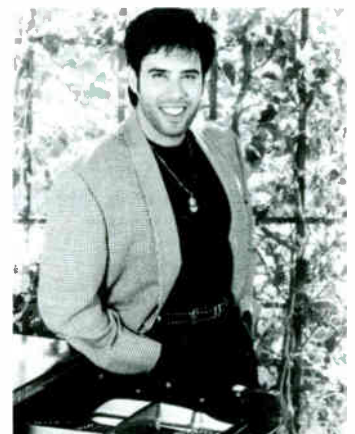
programming. There's a slight Miles feel to "Sneakin' In," while bright horn work and a Nathaniel Phillips thumping bass undertow pull "Drivin' Home" to paydirt. Alpert addresses gentler sensibilities on the cut "Can't Stop Thinking Of You." Lorber's keys and Paul Pesco's guitar work on the intro to "My Funny Valentine" give this evergreen renewed spring. Worth the wait.

■ RICHARD ELLIOT: *City Speak* (Blue Note Contemporary 7243). Producer: R. Elliot.

This album is a testament to how saxophonist Elliott continues to amalgamate his sound from the elemental sensory input he's experienced as a musician, and it also shows that he continues to grow as a distinct composer. From the sassy "Walk The Walk," to the lilting "Unspoken Words," there's a lot of smooth territory covered on this album. A sure multi-format favorite will be the instrumental cover of the Boyz II Men hit "I'll Make Love To You," which begs for lyrics, but in the end needs none. "Scotland," harkens to some of the dynamics that Elliott shared with the group Kittyhawk. The sax man switches gears on "That's All She Wrote," a traditional jazz exercise that broadens his musical dialect.

■ FREDDIE RAVEL: *Sol To Soul* (Verve Forecast 314 526 760-2). Producers: Maurice White & F. Ravel.

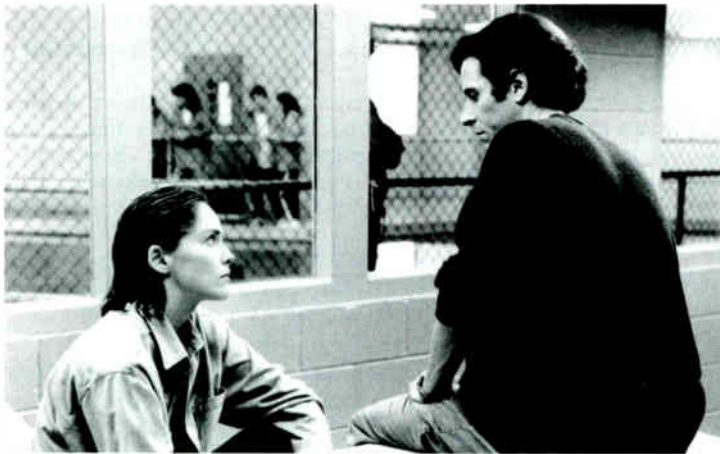
Some musicians can distinguish themselves with a variety of stellar frontmen. But when they endeavor to release their solo work, it can come out sounding like a mish-mosh of influences. Not so with keyboardist Ravel, who seems to benefit from varied imprints on his own sonic template. With Earth, Wind & Fire progenitor Maurice White co-guiding this multi-layered package, Ravel offers a buffet of smooth, Latin-flavored delicacies that are designed to warm the spirit. One of the tastiest dishes on the menu is "Havana Nights," which combines post-bop sensibilities with unrelenting rhythmic propulsion. Denetria Champ's vocals play easily against the production of the radio ready "We Belong Together."

Touchstone's *Last Dance* Is Multi-Rhythmed

EVERYONE'S *LAST DANCE* is a dance with death. Here, it's Sharon Stone's on death row in some unnamed Southern prison with the number played being "Capital Punishment" and the rhythms shifting faster than anyone can keep up with—especially when the game of politics is conducting.

If you think *Last Dance* is going to support your belief for or against the death penalty, think again. If you're of that minority audience group who prefer thought provocation within the context of films, go, because *Last Dance* compels you to consider many rhythms, inside prison and outside prison; inside and outside your own head and belief system; inside/outside our own justice system and the politicians who control and use it for their own gain.

Ron Koslow has crafted a multi-layered script from a story by himself and producer Steven Haft. Behind the thin veil of a love story, what unfolds is the last dance of one character's naiveté, the last dance of a prisoner's hardness, as well as the continuing waltzes of the manipulation of the system by those egos in power, as well as others. Koslow expertly dances with mini-themes as he leads us around this dance floor; nodding, acknowledging, and above all, allowing us to consider all the steps, all the emotions, along the way.

Director Bruce Beresford works almost as instructor, giving us instructions, the steps, but permits us to add our own interpretation to the dance. He brings us a nicely balanced piece of work but insists that we, as audience, invest thought into the work also. He and Koslow weave gender and race themes into the composition without making them issues, causing them to become balanced moments at work in *living* sequence; none taking precedence but all interacting, taking their time when it comes and pleading their case. Naturally, the winner is the one who's in favor with those in control at the moment—Life, reality, governing *power*.

Rob Morrow is the younger brother of politically climbing Governor's aide Peter Gallagher, who puts little brother in a low profile position—part of the clemency board—where he can pursue a life of skirt chasing and keep out of importance way. When the novice begins questioning political issue actions; why not grant clemency to death row's Sharon Stone who's truly changed, he loses his naiveté and also his job. Still he fights. Major question is, will he fight into the future after he loses and has been shown the way by the more experienced *professional* politicians. Maybe he'll simply become like clemency board chief/pal Randy Quaid who plays golf and the judicial game the way the big boys want it. Probably.

Stone, as the prisoner, presents a non-glamorous portrait of the crackhead murderess. The actress is in full control of her emotions and presents a chilling moment of insight of snapping nerves which'll raise the hair on your neck. Morrow leads us through the less-than-deep opening world of his lawyer character and then into the darker waters of championing a lost cause with expertise. Gallagher is perfectly at home as the slick politico carving

Jack Thompson adds the more than workable air of ego/superiority the governor calls for. Pamela Tyson stands strong as a crusading lawyer and Skeet Ulrich is solid as Stone's brother.

Peter James' expert photography is our eye, revealing the forbidding views of prisons, eavesdropping on upscale parties. And Mark Isham's music never overpowers but definitely adds to the tension.

Newcomer **Ash** has its "Goldfinger" on five and moving up to six is **Suggs & Louchie Lou/Michie One's** "Cecilia." **Lisa Marie Experience's** "Keep On Jumpin'" jumps onto the charts at seven as **The Prodigy's** "Firestarter" burns down to eight. Also falling is **Mark Snow's** "The X-Files" landing on nine and **Robert Miles' "Children"** ends up on the ten spot.

The Top UK album is **Take That's Greatest Hits** and the top music video is *Les Miserables—Live Cast Recording*. Top video rental is *Braveheart* and video sale is *Pocahontas*. In computer games rentals *Mortal Kombat 3* leads **Mega Drive** and *Donkey Kong Country 2* is top **Super Nintendo**. At the local cinema house, **Buena Vista's Toy Story** is still selling most tickets. Europe's top single is **Robert Miles' "Children"** which leads in Austria, Sweden, Norway, Switzerland, Germany, France, Israel and the Republic of Macedonia. The Prodigy's "Firestarter" is number one in Finland and Yugoslavia while **Take That's "How Deep Is Your Love"** covers Latvia and Lithuania. **Take That's Greatest Hits** album ringing the cash registers in Ireland, Austria, Germany & Denmark, while **Rage Against The Machine's Evil Empire** tops in France and Sweden. **Celine Dion's "Falling Into You"** is best seller in Switzerland and Holland.

DON'T CALL YOUR BROKER as **Thorn EMI** at £18.40 is down 0.58% with **Rank Organization** at £5.39 showing no change, and also holding its own is **PolyGram** (Nf 104.20) £40.49.

PARLEZ VOUS QUOTA: While the **European Commission** is examining a complaint against the French Government by a private French broadcaster regarding the requirement that 40% of all music broadcast in France be sung in French, there are rumors that Austria and Portugal are thinking of joining France (as well as Ireland, which also has a quota) in "protecting" their culture and language. Joining in the complaint to the EC is the **Association of European Radio Stations**, which represents some 5,000 private stations. **AERS** says quota laws violate the **Singles Market Act**.

PARLEZ VOUS FRENCH: France's **Conseil Superieur de l'Audiovisuel**, the government regulatory agency reports that only five local stations have violated the 40% rule. **CSA** says that due to the quota system, nine of the top 20 singles on the playlists are from new French groups, with rap talent getting more and more airplay. And, of course, long-standing favorites like **Celine Dion** and **Francis Cabrel** are back on the top again.

CAPITAL IDEA: The UK's **Capital Radio**, whose **Capital FM** and **Capital Gold** have nearly 40% of the London market, is spreading its nets all around. With pre-tax profits of £40 million for the year ending September 1995, they examined several overseas markets, including South Africa and India and decided to go ahead with plans for a joint venture in India. They've also applied for a regional license in Yorkshire as well as a second FM license in London. Also on the books is the opening of new studios as well as a radio themed restaurant at the headquarters in London's **Leicester Square**.

OY VAY OY-ASIS: **Oasis** celebrated their return from a U.S. tour, with reports ranging from fair to sensational, with a concert at **Manchester's Maine Road** stadium, home of the group's favorite soccer team, **Manchester City**. To be fair, they invited rival soccer group **Manchester United** to the gig. The stadium, which seats 39,000 sold out in two hours. Later that evening, at a Manchester nightclub, **Liam Gallagher** of **Oasis**, insulted **Ryan Giggs**, star of **Manchester United**, and went at him. Only intervention by friends helped prevent a riot. Again, **Liam** seems to be working hard on keeping up his image as a "bad guy." The group now goes into the studios where they will be preparing their third album.

WHAT DO YOU GET WHEN YOU COMBINE Planet Hollywood and the **Hard Rock Cafe**? Well, you can't come up with **Hollywood Rock Cafe**, but the UK's **Luminar's** chain of 14 cafes is called **Chicago Rock Cafe**. **Luminar** also owns 18 discotheques and they plan to come onto the stock market next month in order to raise money for expansion. Four **Chicago Rock Cafes** will be opened by the end of the year, and another four are scheduled

for next year. In order to combine drinking, dancing and eating in one venue, the cafe is a combination cocktail bar, restaurant and nightclub.

DON'T GIVE UP YOUR DAY JOB: French soft porn actress **Luciana Gratalval**, who starred in three *Emmanuelle* films, wasn't sure as to how her career was going, so she developed a side line, using side arms. Gratalval was busted in Paris, accused of nine robberies of banks and boutiques. She was very upset and told police she was worried about how her conservative parents and relatives would react to the fact that she was a crook.

ATTRACTIONS ATTRACT: So **Elvis Costello** hopes when he starts the European tour, **Attractions**, on July 5.

STRETCHING THE POINT as **Elastica's** ex-bassist **Annie Holland** is expected to rejoin the group on their new album. She left the group last year, blaming "tour pressures" and her spot in the band has not been filled. Thus the reason for the invite.

MOVIN' ON UP: The **Rank Organization** has appointed **Barry Pickersgill** managing director of **Top Rank**, their division which operates the **Top Rank** and **Mecca** bingo halls. **Pickersgill** was formerly managing director of **Rank Amusements** and **Associated Leisure**, the company's gaming machine businesses.

WHERE HAVE ALL THE TRIBES GONE? Well, not to the UK's **Fifth Tribal Gathering** which was supposed to be this summer's biggest dance festival. With some 30,000 expected, the local authorities decided not to license this year's event, thus in effect cancelling the program. Organizer, **The Mean Fiddle Organization** will bring its case to the **Crown Court** in order to reschedule the event, hopefully in time for the three-day holiday weekends coming up in June and July.

ROCK MET COUNTRY as **Willie Nelson** was invited to dinner at **Bono's** house in Dublin, together with the rest of the **U2**. Even though this was the first time they had met, five years ago **Bono** wrote and sent to **Nelson**, a song he wrote for him and **Nelson** wrote back that he'd like to record it someday with **Bono**. So, after dinner, it was down to the **Bono's** studio in the basement where the song was recorded. As yet no plans have been made for releasing it. However, the next night, during **Nelson's** gig at Dublin's **The Point**, **Bono** jumped on stage and joined him in singing "Amazing Grace."

NAUGHTY NAUGHTY: The **United States Trade Representative** is going to complain to the **World Trade Organization** about countries that are not enforcing laws governing copyrights. Even though the **WTO's** rules are weaker than those of the U.S., the U.S. thinks the bad publicity might help make their case. Countries expected to be named are **Portugal, Turkey, India** and **Pakistan**. **China**, a leading offender, is not a **WTO** member.

BUT WHAT'S THE MUSIC LIKE? **Carlsberg Beer** is sponsoring a sports bar in **Limerick, Ireland**. The bar has 28 TV screens, \$160,000 worth of sport memorabilia and a Wall of Fame for celebrities to leave their autograph. **Carlsberg** plans to open three more pubs in Ireland by the end of the year, pointing out how dedicated sports bars are proving very successful in the U.S. So are they going to play "Take Me Out To The Ballgame" all night long?

MORE QUOTAS? Not taking any chances, American studios are looking into opening studios in the UK so as to qualify their product as European. **Disney** is reported to be far along in their plans for cartoon and film studios in England, with the animation plans looking to come on line first. **Warner Bros.** is reported seeking planning licenses in West London for a studio capable of making big-budget films and **Fox 2000 Pictures** is thought to be interested in restoring the old **Elstree Studios**. While the UK has resisted the EU program quota, which requires that more than 50% of programming be European-produced, the chances are that the UK will soon have to give in and it will be a major loss to the American industry.

WHY MOVE TO THE UK? Well, according to the Brits, they can't offer concessions like the Irish are doing, nor tax breaks like the French, but their labor laws are considered more flexible than the rest of Europe and the country is eager for the business. While the government has been resisting subsidies for filmmaking, the studios are looking for a certain amount of government grants for industrial jobs being created and in a bidding war for building a new studio, often local governments come up with many tempting offers.

■ **FLACO JIMENEZ:** *Buena Suerte, Señorita* (Arista Texas-BMG, 18816) Producers: Cameron Randle & Flaco Jimenez. TEJANO-CONJUNTO.

Three-time Grammy Award winner, Flaco Jimenez is truly Tejano music's ambassador. The world-renown conjunto accordionist is also revered as the patron saint of conjunto music. With his album, *Buena Suerte, Señorita*, Jimenez returns to his musical roots. As co-producer Cameron Randle puts it, "This is garage-style conjunto... Flaco's authenticity is unquestionable and that makes him palatable for music junkies and audiophiles everywhere." Mrs. Jimenez better make room for Grammy #4. Meanwhile, listen to Flaco and you'll enjoy one unforgettable party like back home in San Antonio.

■ **LOURDES ROBLES:** *Soy Quien Soy* (Sony Latin, 81805) Producers: Christian de Walden & Max Di Carlo. POP.

Soy Quien Soy is Caribbean artist Lourdes Robles' sixth album for Sony Discos. Two previous albums (*Imagenes* and *Definitivamente*) have won Gold records. Robles renders a more contemporary approach to this collection of well-composed love songs. She purposely selected material that provided more of an artistic challenge. The result is clearly evident in the first single, "Me Dejaré Llevar," a delicate pop ballad. Overall, Robles definitely reaches higher ground with her best work to date.



■ **FREDDY ACOSTA Y LA HAPPY:** *Freddy Acosta y La Happy* (Sono Max, 303) Producer: Freddy Acosta. TROPICAL-MERENGUE.

Composer-singer-bandleader, Freddy Acosta, and his merengue band, La Happy, have had various hits in their native land, the Dominican Republic. Their first mainland album showcases the band's versatility and Acosta's well-developed vocal style as a merengero. The first single is "Seras Tu," but the real hit can be found with "Errores En La Vida," an infectious dance tune with a humorous twist. One thing for sure, Acosta will never be unhappy with his career. Look for more to come from this bright talent.

■ **LOS DEL RIO:** *Macarena: Bayside Boys Mix* (RCA-BMG, 64407) Producers: Carlos A. De Yarza, Mike Triay. POP.

Last summer's monster sensation, *Macarena* by the Spanish duo, Los Del Rio, is back. This time around the club favorite is resurrected in the form of re-mix by De Yarza and Triay of the Bayside Boys. Look for it in the RCA compilation *Club Cutz* which contains other dance gems like "Scatman" by Scatman John and Dreamworld's "Movin' Up."

PICK OF THE WEEK

■ **OLGA TAÑÓN:** *Nuevos Senderos* (WEA Latina, 13667) Producer: Marco Antonio Solís. POP.

Puerto Rican singer Olga Tañón steps out of her merengue world to record her latest album, *Nuevos Senderos*. The project was done entirely in Mexico City under the direction of Marco Antonio Solís. The Mexican singer/songwriter wrote all but one of the selections for this album. The exception was Jesús Monarrez' exquisite ballad "Cuestión de Suerte." Tañón performs ballads and cumbias which is something she has always dreamed of doing. The merengue icon is admittedly a little nervous about embarking on such a change. Will old fans like it? The new ones obviously do.

GEREE—REFLECTIONS OF LOVE: Her name is Geree. Her latest album, *Reflections of Love*, took three and half years to make. Its release, however, couldn't have been more timely. And very soon she'll be the talk of the town. Influential program directors at So. Cal. radio stations like **Power 106** and **KLVE** have already requested bilingual remixes of "Dame Tu Amor/Give A Little Love." This first single has sold over 15,000 units in Los Angeles alone.

So what's a girl to think? The "Mexican-American diva from South Central L.A." is definitely making her mark. "I just want to make music," says the singer. Geree describes how much she enjoys coaching young female vocalists in between working on her new material for a forthcoming CD. Her first album was the 1981 MCA album, *Come And Get It*, which featured a collection of R&B ballads. "They didn't know what to do with it or with me, a Latina," says Geree. "The album was never promoted and we parted ways. A year later Gloria Estefan (and the Miami Sound Machine) broke loose on the U.S. market with material similar to my own." With a keen sense of ambition, Geree would like to take her act to an international level one day. With a new show for an upcoming tour being rehearsed, Geree's all-Spanish album is set to be released later this year.

Her husband and co-producer, **Edward Contreras**, is president of the L.A. based **Our Town Records**, the company that produced Geree's album. "We are working diligently with Geree, as we do with our other artists," says

Contreras. "The overall development of an artist is crucial. That's what made Motown successful." The largest independent distribution network in the U.S., **Indi**, is slated to put the album on retail shelves nationwide by mid-May. Geree's promotion campaign will be kicking off simultaneously. "We're just coordinating our radio promotion," says Contreras. "We received faxes this morning from Seattle, San Francisco,

Chicago, and Philadelphia. Everyone is picking a different single from this album to run with. I'm glad to be at this stage. It took us awhile to get here. But, our business plan is right where we planned it to be. We plan to keep the momentum going." Our Town Records also intends to promote the immense, yet virtually untapped pool of Latino talent within their community. Perhaps the "Gloria Estefan of the West" is right here in our midst. Then again, her name could very well be "Geree."

BRIEF NOTES: Internationally reknown keyboardist, **Raul Di Blasio**, kicks off his U.S. tour in New York City's **Radio Music Hall** on Sunday, May 5th, at Miami's **Jackie Gleason Performance Center** on May 10, 11, and 12, and in L.A.'s **Universal Amphitheatre** on June 29. Blasio returns from a 12-day sold-out tour of Mexico. His **BMG** album, *Latino*, has sold nearly one million copies. Guatemalan pop singer, **Ricardo Ajorna**, recently renewed his contract with **Sony Music**. He was presented a special award for having achieved over one million in sales in the Latin American region. **Radio MTV** hit the airwaves in Latin America this past week on 30 stations in 16 countries reaching some 70 million people. The exclusive radio package is a co-production of **MTV Latino** and **Westwood One International**, which will also market and distribute the show... And pop Mexican singer, **Amanda Miguel**, recently completed her second album for **Karen Records**. The production was recorded in Rome, Italy, with the participation of Italian arranger, **Giovanni Salvatori**, and Miguel's producer-husband, **Diego Verdaguier**.

Album Reviews

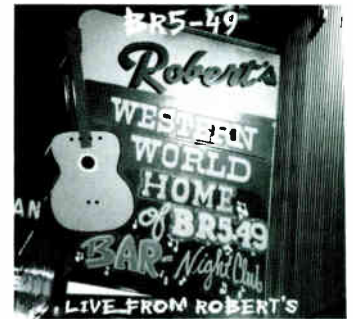


■ GEORGE STRAIT: *Blue Clear Sky* (MCA D-11428)

Throughout his 15-year career, the steadfast Strait has remained the same. He's bucked the current trend at radio that rewards cowboy rock and synthesized sweetness. Instead, Strait sets the pace for hot and humid country music like "Rockin' In The Arms Of Your Memory" and the Lone Star swing of "I Ain't Never Seen No One Like You." Also on the album are trademark songs of regret such as "King Of The Mountain" and "She Knows When You're On My Mind." It may be a stretch, but one could easily say that Strait is the southern Sinatra of his generation. He's the toast of Texas, and *Blue Clear Sky* is another low-key, hit-packed collection.

■ BR5-49: *Live From Robert's* (Arista 07822-10800-2)

With a band name taken from a character on the show that epitomizes good-time country corn (Junior Samples on *Hee Haw*), BR5-49 is a record label's marketing dream...or nightmare, depending on the label's balance of optimism and pessimism. Arista seems to be counting on sweet dreams with the group that could revive the classic country sound of the '50s and '60s. But this time around, the music has been given the tag of "alternative country." BR5-49's debut album is actually a live EP that consists of six songs with topics ranging from The Andy Griffith Show ("Me 'N' Opie") to a tribute to a local porn movie/B-movie star ("Bettie Bettie"). Their sound is wonderfully eclectic and traditional and with any luck, they will progress much further than their current "novelty band" status.

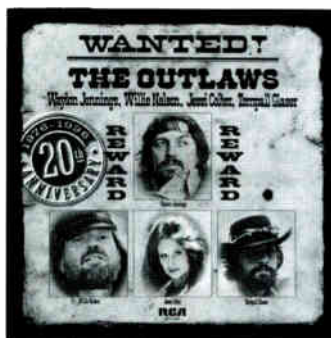


■ VARIOUS ARTISTS: *One Voice* (MCA D-11403)

Nashville's ode to the Summer Olympics opens with a cosmopolitan hoe-down of sorts—half symphony and half pickin' party. "Atlanta Reel '96" features the instrumental talents of Michael Omartian, Vince Gill, Chet Atkins, Alison Krauss, Bela Fleck and Paul Franklin, and sets the mood for what is a diverse and pleasing project. The album succeeds by teaming some likely and unlikely artists for duets, showing the musical diversity that Nashville has to offer. For instance, there's the pop and twang-fused "Every Kinda People" by Amy Grant and Patty Loveless; "We Must Believe In Magic" by Willie Nelson and Marty Stuart; and "From A Distance" by Nanci Griffith, Raul Malo (The Mavericks) and Donna Summer. Other noteworthy songs on project are Lorrie Morgan's self-penned "One Down, With One More To Go" and "The Flame," performed by Trisha Yearwood.

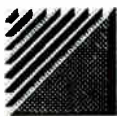
PICK OF THE WEEK

■ WAYLON, WILLIE, JESSI & TOMPALL: *Wanted! The Outlaws* (RCA 07863-66841-1)



In 1976, Waylon Jennings, Willie Nelson, Jessi Colter and Tompall Glaser made history by recording the first platinum-selling country album. Twenty years later, RCA has released the original *Wanted! The Outlaws* plus nine "lost" tracks and one new song. The project is a time capsule that remembers the outlaw movement

through the voices of four definitive rebels who resurrected the pioneer spirit of country music. Listening to gems such as "I'm Looking For Blue Eyes" (which could teach today's "girl singers" a thing or two about emotional delivery), "My Heroes Have Always Been Cowboys," and "Yesterday's Wine" stirs a thirst for more historical brilliance that is quenched via new/old songs like "(I'm A) Ramblin' Man," "If She's Where You Like Livin' (You Won't Feel At Home With Me)," and "You Left A Long, Long Time Ago." "Nowhere Road," the Steve Earle/Reno King tune sung by Waylon & Willie, is solid proof that there is cause (and demand!) for a follow-up album to *Wanted! The Outlaws*.

Midway's NBA Hang Time

CHICAGO — Midway Manufacturing Company is now offering the latest in its series of NBA-licensed basketball video games—*NBA Hang Time*. The game, which was designed by the same team that produced *NBA Jam* and *NBA Jam Tournament Edition*, features 2-on-2, full-court basketball action between players right off the rosters of National Basketball Association teams.

Double dunks, spin moves, hook shots and an outdoor court atop a towering skyscraper are among the new game play options. *NBA Hang Time* also has expanded team rosters, new secret codes, new secret characters, an NBA trivia contest built into the game and original songs from renowned rapper M. Doc. There is even a "Create-a-

Player" option, a new concept for coin-op games that allows players to customize their own character for use in the game.

"Create-a-Player" is a feature that fans have been looking for in sports games," said Mark Turmell, head of the NBA Hang Time design team. "Game players have an option to enter a mode where they design their own character. They control the player's appearance and physical attributes, including height, weight, face and uniform as well as basketball skills such as shooting, passing, dunking ability and defense," he continued. "Once a player is created, it can be used repeatedly in the game."

Players are also rewarded for designing their own character in Create-a-Player mode. Additional attribute points are awarded to players as they play full games with a Create-a-Player character.

Midway also announced it will be offering a low-cost upgrade to *NBA Hang Time* in November, to coincide with the beginning of the 1996-97 NBA season. This upgrade will include 1996-97 NBA rookies, reconcile trades made during and after the 1995-96 season and add new game play features.

"One of the most difficult challenges we face in creating licensed sports games is the constant change in sports," commented Sal Divita, lead artist for *NBA Hang Time*. "Players are traded or released, and superstar rookies enter the league. In the past, sports video games immediately became dated after one season," he continued. "We are targeting this problem with a low-cost upgrade that will make the game appear brand new to players for the next season."

Player animations on the new model have been improved significantly from *NBA Jam*. The scale of the animation has been increased, so the players are larger and movement appears more realistic on the screen. The player rosters have been increased to include more than 40% of the NBA. The sound also moves to the next level through the use of the DCS Sound System and the inclusion of original songs from rapper M. Doc.

Secret codes are a big part of *NBA Hang Time*. A screen appears at the beginning of every game that allows players the option of entering codes to activate special features. Big heads, super dunks and an outdoor, blacktop court are a few of the special features that players will be trying to activate through the code screen. There are also a number of secret characters in the game.

Game players who are fans of the NBA will also have the option to test their knowledge of the league through the *NBA Hang Time* Trivia Challenge that is built into the game. Players who enter their initials and per-

sonal identification number at the beginning of a full game will see a screen with a trivia question at the end of their game. The question is selected randomly from a library of questions stored in each game. Each time a player answers a question correctly, his or her trivia total (also stored in the game's memory) will be increased by the point value of the question. Any player who can answer enough questions to raise his or her point total to 100 within the time of the contest will become an *NBA Hang Time* Trivia Champion. All of the trivia champions will be entered into a drawing for a group of prizes including a trip for two to a major NBA event. Players who participate in the trivia contest are also rewarded with attribute points for their characters in the game.

Finally, players will now be challenged by the *NBA Hang Time* computer. After teams are selected, the computer will make a prediction on the outcome of the game based on the detailed offensive and defensive records and game summaries stored in memory. It will be up to the players to prove they have the skills and show that the computer underestimated their performance.

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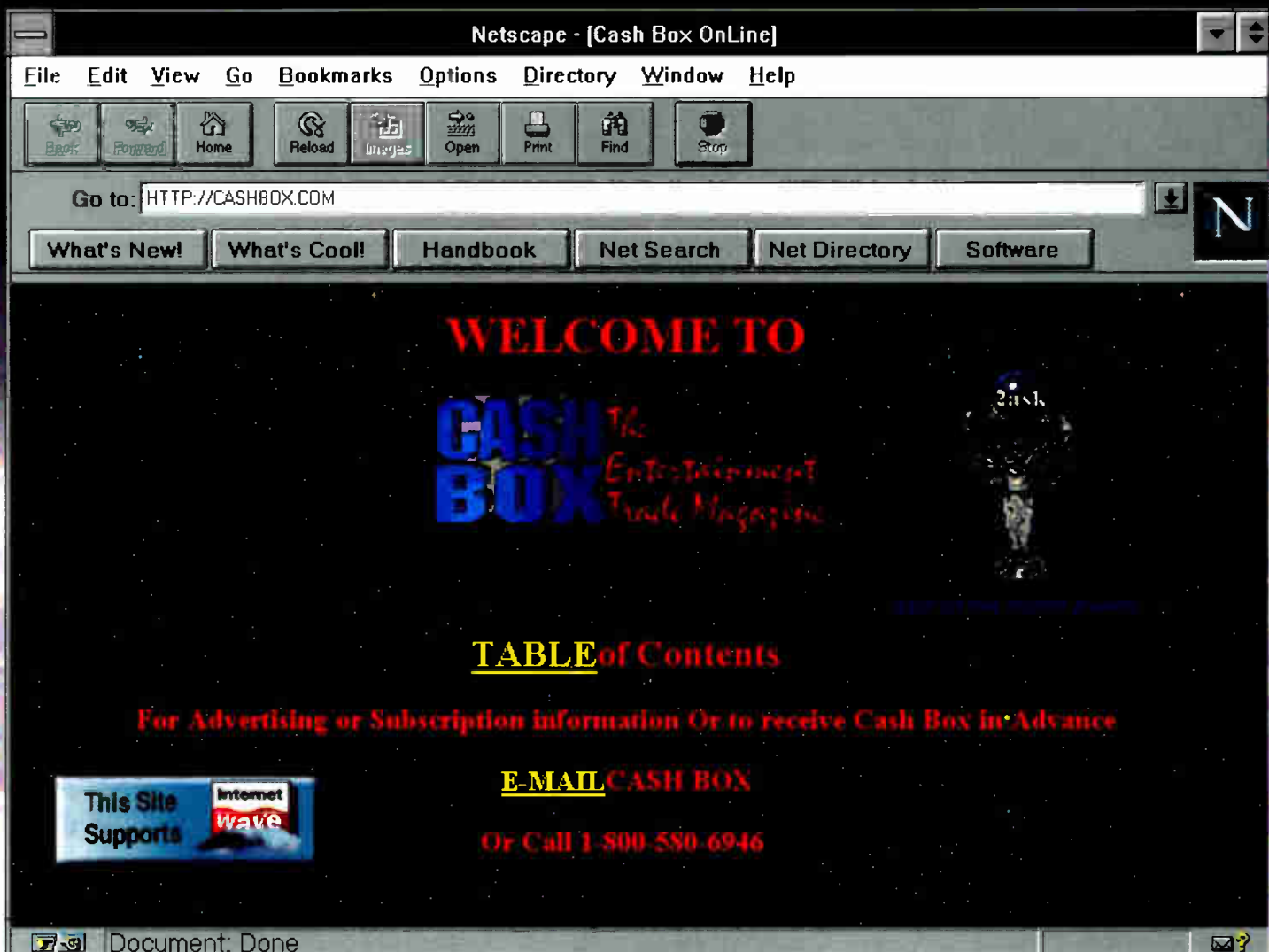
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
