# Grammy Changes Highlight NARAS Meet

THE NATIONAL ACADEMY OF RECORDING ARTS & SCIENCES (NARAS), at its annual week-long trustees meeting during May, tackled several issues aimed at broadening the Grammy process, launching Latin American expansion and strengthening arts advocacy efforts.

"Representing more than 10,000 members in ten chapters and branches across the country, our Trustees are committed to keeping the Recording Academy at the forefront of our music community's important issues and developments," said NARAS president/CEO Michael Greene. "Toward that end, we are increasing professional and community service, broadening outreach efforts, and ensuring that the Grammy process remains both inclusive and relevant."

Highlights of the meeting included:

Establishment of a category in the Classical Field for Best Small Ensemble performance (with or without conductor).

Opening the Record of the Year Category to allow album tracks (from a current year's album), in addition to commercially released singles.

Changing the name of the category "Best Mexican-American Performance" to "Best Mexican-American/Tejano Music Performance."

Changing the recording time frame for "newly recorded" Classical product from the present three years to "product which has been recorded within five years of the eligibility year."

Initiatives addressed during the meeting included Latin American Expansion which sees NARAS taking the first steps toward launching a Latin Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences; a domestic Branch Expansion into the Pacific Northwest and Washington D.C., and a National Directory of Master Recordings development.

# ASCAP, BMI Fete Writers, Publishers

### EMI Music Publishing wins ASCAP and BMI honors.

IN SEPARATE GALA EVENTS, performing rights organizations ASCAP and BMI honored the top writers and publishers that belong to their respective organizations.

The ASCAP's honors were given out at the Beverly Hilton Hotel during a dinner, were long-time rocker Tom Petty received the Golden Note Award for his outstanding career songwriting achievements and his service to industry and community. Melissa Etheridge shared Songwriter of the Year honors with the members of mega-selling act Hootie And The Blowfish. "On Bended Knee," recorded by Boyz II Men earned Song Of The Year honors for the song's authors, Jimmy "Jam" Harris and Terry Lewis. Publisher of the Year kudos went to Martin Bandier's EMI Music Publishing

ASCAP's first College Radio Award went to Bjork and David Priner and Dan Murphy of Soul Asylum. More than 52 songs earned ASCAP honors in the Most Plays category.

BMI last week held a pair of events, its Pop Music Awards and for Film and Television Writers and Composers, held on successive days at the Regent Beverly Wilshire Hotel.

On the power of eight hit songs, Kenneth "Babyface" Edmunds was named BMI Songwriter of the Year for the fifth time (joining Paul McCartney as the only songwriter to do so) and EMI Music Publishing

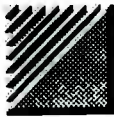

## EAST COAST

**EXPERIMENTAL TO POPULAR AND BACK:** It is a clear sign of the state of music today that the English/French/Aussie group Stereolab can play before packed houses all across the country. At the group's origins there is a resurrection of the Moog and other odds and ends of early musical electronics to create a new take on what had faded into the landscape of current popular music. Taking a cue from early '70's krautrock acts including, Can, Kraftwerk and Faust to name a few, Stereolab mixes ear-laden hooks with a rhythmic drone. With an exponential popularity the band is now able to sell out three shows in the New York area.

Tuesday the 21st at Irving Plaza was the second show of the trio, which highlighted its new ability to play bigger venues without being overwhelmed. Using a lightshow that was a perfect complement to the set, the group exuded an optimism that is almost all but extinct with the "alternative" scene. Stereolab mixed its set up between the pop favorites and the more mantra sounding pieces that were able to keep the crowd silent for a few moments after they ended. This was especially notable when the group went into a couple of what can only be called space-jams, that had instruments heading in different directions but kept themselves in harmony with each other. The truest compliment that can be said of the concert was that the group made the time pass effortlessly with hardly a foot heading for the exit until the last note faded. A taste of Stereolab's oeuvre can be found on its latest album *Emperor Tomato Ketchup* on the Elektra label.

**A SPECIAL BLEND:** It is rare to be able to sit through a whole four-band night without wanting to skip some part of the evening. On Friday the 17th this strange phenomenon occurred at The Cooler as a trio of D.C. talent and a lone North Carolinian entertained. The first group out was The Delta 72 and the band's set the stage ablaze. The group's Mississippi slide guitar attack coupled with a Woolly Bully organ sound provided a punch like a heavyweight. The Delta 72 never came into retro/garage territory because the band was able to take these elements and merge them into something new. This can be heard on the new Touch And Go single "Triple Crown." The next group, Spatula, was the sole NC fare for the evening. This group went into a more sedated but not drowsy set. The group has slowly evolved from more standard lyric-oriented works to a more instrumental stage. A trio consisting of cello, drums and guitar that play off each other to an appealing effect. Spatula's latest offering is *Medium Planers and Matches* out on Jesus Christ

The Warmers are another trio that plays a whole different ball game. The members try and bring an urgency to their playing that overcomes the lack of dynamics. The artsy playing of the drummer and her facial expressions were the highlight of this Discord band's set. The final group was the irrepensible Chisel which exudes bristling energy. The group's songs are very reminiscent of The Jam, with plenty of hummable parts and loads of verve. With all of the jumping and bouncing, the band provided a punctuation to the evening that was worth the wait.

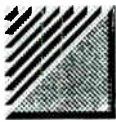

## Nashville Earning Title Of Music City USA

**RANDY BACHMAN REMINISCES ABOUT HIS FIRST VISIT TO NASHVILLE** with an air of wonder. Bachman, the "B" in '70s supergroup Bachman Turner Overdrive (and a founding member of The Guess Who), had secured an appointment to see Arista Nashville's president, Tim DuBois. "I walked into his office. He said 'Welcome. You're royalty.' I looked to see who was behind me. There was nobody there. He meant *me!*" Bachman says. "I said, 'What do you mean?' He said, 'You're a king, man. You've written these songs. For years, we've all known your songs. Welcome to Nashville. We've been waiting for you to come. We've been waiting for John Fogerty and Bob Seger, for you guys to come and bring your influence to country music. We need you.'"

Bachman's experience is not unusual. These days, the city best known as the humble abode of Garth, Reba, and the Grand Ole Opry is fast becoming home sweet home for artists, composers, and writers of all musical genres. "It all begins with a song"—a phrase synonymous with Nashville and familiar to country songwriters for years—has expanded its meaning to include songwriters whose first love is more likely to be Chuck Berry or The Beatles instead of Hank Williams or Patsy Cline.

Cynics who remember Nashville mainly for gingham dresses and bales of hay may be surprised to know that it has become the land of creative opportunity to musical heavyweights such as Michael McDonald and Steve Winwood. Why the attraction? The answer, of course, lies in the song and the songwriter.

"You go to L.A. or New York, it's hard to get your phone call returned. Everybody's doing *lunch*. Here, everybody's doing *songs*," Bachman says. "I find that when I go to an office here, I immediately have the respect of the person I'm speaking to. And when you walk into their office, you see something on the wall that *knocks you out*. It's a hit song—written by them! And so when they sit there and say, 'You know, your chorus is a little weak in the middle of your song,' you're not talking to accountants... you're talking to a guy who's written songs. There's a guitar in the corner. He *still* writes songs. Earlier this morning, he's writing a song. That's why it's Music City. It's run by people who write and play music."

It only takes a second to peruse the local paper and see that, on any given night, one can witness performances by legends of blues, rock, jazz, and country in the intimate setting of clubs once occupied by strictly country writers. The explosion of "non-country" songwriters and artists curiously checking out the Nashville scene has earned the city the nickname of "Tin Pan South." In fact, an annual event of the same name has become a showcase for writers who get inspiration from Tin Pan South's Northern namesake.

Randy Van Warner, writer of the '70s pop hit "Just When I Needed You Most," has lived in Nashville for 10 years. "It's the most song-oriented town in the world. There was Tin Pan Alley in New York years and years ago,

where they were writing very melodic songs. We look back on it now and a lot of classic songs were written back then," he says. "And it was a kind of community like Nashville is now. There's no place where lyrics are more important than in country music, so [Nashville] just seems like a very natural place for people who write words to come."

This year's Tin Pan South, sponsored by the Nashville Songwriters Association International, concluded with a legendary songwriters night held at the mother church of country music, the Ryman Auditorium. That concert offered the works of artists including John Phillips (Mamas and the Papas), John Sebastian (The Lovin' Spoonful), Allen Toussaint (writer of "Mother-In-Law" and "Southern Nights"), and Janis Ian, who wrote such '70s classics as "Jesse" and "At Seventeen."

Ian, who moved to Nashville 10 years ago from New Jersey, foresees doing business in Nashville vs. New York or L.A. as a necessity for any artist. "People have to. I mean, you can get fed in Nashville," she explains. "You can't get fed in those other places. Nashville supports you being an artist. They like that. Those other places tolerate it."

Allegiance to Nashville used to be a foreign concept to Ian. "It's become very respectable to live in Nashville. When I came here in '86, everybody told me not to say I lived here because it would destroy my career as a pop artist or as an international artist," Ian says. "And yet these last three or four years, people are just fascinated. Our profile has changed."

Feelings of support and general comradery seem to be a drawing card for artists who may or may not have ties to the country music industry. Writer Steve Seskin (Little Big Town Music) is a San Francisco native who has been visiting and writing in Nashville for a decade. Seskin has noticed a steady stream of writers coming to the city within the last few years who might have, in the past, dismissed it. "I think they have to have a reverence and respect for what Nashville was, what it is and what it's becoming," Seskin says of the newcomers. "I don't think someone should come here and try and change it... 'Cause that's the other thing about people that are here that have been here a long time—if you show them that level of respect and you treat them with the reverence that they deserve, they'll welcome you."

Seskin, in addition to composing country hits, has also written with Peter Frampton, Paul Young and Olivia Newton-John of late. He gives the recent broadening of country music as a primary reason for Nashville's appeal and explains that the growing acceptance of different musical styles makes writers feel a sense of belonging. But he says that fitting in isn't always the reason for choosing Nashville. "Some people, like Peter Frampton, for instance, are just choosing Nashville as a neat place to live and be around. I don't think he has any aspirations of getting into the fold of country music. I don't think you're gonna hear a Peter Frampton record on the country charts soon. Or ever," Seskin smiles. "Same thing with Michael McDonald. So why are they

## SINGLES REVIEWS By Daina Darzin

### ■ MAGNAPOP: "Open The Door" (Priority P253992)

Magnapop is perfectly poised to be a hit with the new, slightly more melodic climate of alternative rock. Much of the band's new *Rubbing Doesn't Help* disc is more heavily-rocking and raw, so this gently lilting, ironically somber tune might be just the thing. It's already an add at L.A.'s KROQ and San Francisco's Live 105, among other stations. "Everything is good these days but all of my friends are dying," sings Linda Hopper in a high, pure voice, as the ensemble backs her with mellifluous little riffs. Magnapop toured extensively with its previous *Hot Boxing* disc, and is set to work the States this summer with Ass Ponys and Tripl3fastaction.

### ■ THE SPECIALS: "A Little Bit Me, A Little Bit You" (Virgin 41689)

Yes, it's the Monkees song. Eighties ska pioneers The Specials are back with a disc of covers. *Today's Specials*, which includes the Clash's "Somebody Got Murdered," Toots and the Maytall's "Pressure Drop" and Dave Brubeck's "Take Five." The Specials' exuberant, lushly percolating version of the first single is just the kind of lighthearted fun track that people like to play at a beach party



### ■ FUN LOVIN' CRIMINALS: "Scooby Snacks" (EMI DPRO-10491)

This is a witty and inventive rap/rock/jazz/alternative/whatever that metamorphoses out of the sampled beginning of *Pulp Fiction* ("Everybody be cool, this is a robbery..."). The track is off Fun Lovin' Criminals' EMI debut, *Come Find Yourself* and deftly mixes a dark, undulating groove, hip hop beats and twangy, reverberating guitar with slightly tongue-in-cheek lyrics concerning a drug-induced robbery. "Scooby Snacks" is available in a "clean" radio edit and could work on either alternative or urban stations

### ■ SPACEHOG: "Cruel To Be Kind" (Sire PRCD 9570-2)

Spacehog loves pop music, and it shows on this eminently catchy, syncopated, fun track that can hardly wait to be played on any radio format. "Cruel To Be Kind" sorta sounds like Bruce Springsteen jamming with Thin Lizzy and the Brit-pop outfit of your choice, and is an excellent follow-up to "In The Meantime," the #2 alternative and #1 AOR track from the band's briskly-selling *Resident Alien* debut.

## PICK OF THE WEEK

### ■ FLUFFY: "Husband" (Tim Kerr Records/The Enclave TK96CD135)

Pissed off vocals and nasty punk guitars will surely get Fluffy compared to Hole, but the British outfit actually draws its inspirations from the genre's originals—'70s punkers and rockers like the Sex Pistols, Dead Boys and MC5. The track's biting Alanis Morissette-esque lyrics about a disintegrating relationship ("You do what he says but you hate him inside...he doesn't have to wear a ring/your girlfriends know you better than him") and cool, driving rhythms make it a perfect modern rock add. One of the first projects of the new EMI subsidiary, The Enclave.

## ALBUM REVIEWS by Daina Darzin



■ **HARVESTER:**  
*Me Climbs Mountain*  
(Geffen DGCD-24959)

If R.E.M., the Doors, Johnny Cash and Green Day got together to write some tunes, the result might be this striking, quietly brilliant album. Thoughtful, liter-

ate lyrics wrap around subtle musical passages that range from jaunty, semi-acoustic irony ("My Buffalo Song") to the hazy, mystically pulsing "Great Springwaters of America" to spare, plaintive beauty ("Wander"). A special record that deserves to be one of those slow-building sleeper hits.

■ **THE SCORPIONS:** *Pure Instinct* (Atlantic 82913-2)

While many '80s heavy metallers died quickly with the advent of the Seattle Sound, and while others linger on increasingly crummier labels, the Scorpions have parlayed a huge European fan base (the band enjoys superstar status to this day in Russia and their native Germany, among many other countries) into a career that has spanned several decades and is still going strong. *Pure Instinct* is, well, another swell Scorpions record: big, melodic hooks, a mass of power chord bombast, and some variety in the form of a mid-tempo groove ("But The Best of You") and a pretty, thoughtful ballad with vaguely political

lyrics ("Does Anyone Know") that clearly hopes to duplicate the success of the Scorpions' monster international hit, "Winds of Change." Might just work, too.



■ **CHARM FARM:** *Pervert* (Mercury 314 532 142-2AD)

Seventies glitter/punk is back in a big new way with bands like Imperial Drag and Spacehog, and Charm Farm is of that school. But not exactly. This spectacularly inventive Detroit outfit mixes Brit-pop and goth, funk and Motown, rave-all-night dance beats along with Stooges-like dark, amphetamine-laced glamour. "With You Forever" features a sinister, guitar-power rush of sound that almost reminds one of Prince, while "Sick" has an ominous, James-Bond-theme vibe.

■ **SOLUTION A.D.:** *Solution A.D.* (TAG 92708-2P)

If you love Dishwalla's "Counting Blue Cars," you'll like Solution A.D.'s "Atypical Day," which sports a similar just-slightly-quirky edge on top of a big, turbo-powered groove. Layers of sound glide into place with an instinctively perfect grace, the result of killer songwriting replete with impeccably crafted hooks. "Fearless," the first single, mixes a jangly, sparkling beat with malevolent, blazing guitar. "Comfortable" is gently syncopated, undulating to a hypnotic beat. A band that was born to be on alterna-radio, Solution A.D. have a great future in front of them.

## PICK OF THE WEEK

■ **THE CURE:** *Wild Mood Swings*  
(Elektra/Fiction 61744-2)



Though the Cure had its greatest commercial success with driving Brit-pop songs like "Let's Go To Bed," its true forte is intensely emotional, dark, heart-breaking sounds from the gothic pits of hell (perhaps best exemplified by classic, gloom-and-doom *Pomography* disc) *Wild Mood Swings*, the veteran band's 10th disc and first studio album since 1992's *Wish*, has something to satisfy both pale black-clad fans and radio programmers. *Wild Mood Swings* is a consistently strong and varied

disc from a band that's always been inventive and cool. Cuts like "Want" and "This is a Lie" are replete in soaring, complex orchestration, complete with strings and a soundtrack-ish grandeur, while "Mint Car" is a loopy, jangly, joyful thing with a buoyant, tropical break.

Audible sorcery is at play on a rap CD served on a melodic R&B platter. "Less is more" in the design and execution of this debut. T-Rob, Lil' Leg Ced, mr. boogie and King reveal the fertility of the Houston music scene as they blend urban flavor, with real instrumentation recalling the seminal output of Roy Ayers and Jimmy Smith during the '70s. Long, strong chants, hypnotic keyboards and easygoing conversations are the grist of this LP.

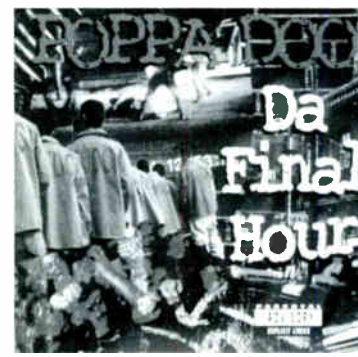
RICHIE RICH: Half Thang (Shot/45110 Records SR 8000) Producers: D.J. Daryl, Richie Rich, Lev Berlak.

ANN NESBY: I'm Here For You (Perspective 31454 9022) Producers: Jimmy Jam & Terry Lewis

Jam & Lewis, producers extraordinaire, harness the elemental lung power of Sounds of Blackness lead vocalist Ann Nesby into a homemade storm front of raw seductive force. Nesby's wide-ranging, lilting notes permeate the ear as part of a well-engineered assault on the senses. Opening cut "Let The Rain Fall" serves notice that a bonafide twister is coming down the pike with solid drum support. Her instrument yields great beauty on ballads "I'm Still Wearing Your Name," "(What A) Lovely Evening," "I'll Do Anything For You," (generous with well-orchestrated strings) midtempo cut "Thrill Me," tear-jerker anthem "I'm Here For You," with Gerald Albright's dramatic sax punctuations, and "I'll Be Your Everything," which works choral magic. Nothing lukewarm on this classy project, with its arsenal of enticing production values.

## THE RHYTHM

Singer/songwriter Bruce Fisher ruminates over his "Wet Dream" of love on his new single for Ed Townsend's Underdog Records. Fisher emerges from his modest profile of penning successful tunes to a more active role as a solo artist.

"OLD SCHOOL" IS A CRYPTIC TERM, a frequent applique—slapped onto urban music considered to be dated faster than the half-life of shattered atomic particles. But the term also represents an era of elegance and classic simplicity once again being embraced by both the industry and consumer alike. This extends from the multiplicity of "Oldies" radio formats nationwide, to material being penned not just as a counterbalance to "hard" bump & grind lyricism but for its own intrinsic beauty as art. Bruce Fisher is rooted in the latter tradition. One is not to be fooled by the title of his Underdog Records' single "Wet Dream." Upon closer inspection, what's "wet" about his dream turns out to be his own sentimental tears. Fisher has previously capitalized off emotions in tunes he's authored or performed over the years, the most lingering example being "You Are So Beautiful (To Me)," a song he penned which transcended categorical boundaries, to be recorded by numerous pop and country artists. Fisher once stimulated listeners with his lead vocal on the title track to Quincy Jones' *Body Heat* LP, and was the song's co-writer. His lead part on the Donald Byrd million seller "Walking In Rhythm" wafted across radio airwaves in the '70s, establishing his signature with the public for posterity. With "Wet Dream" and its companion track "Just Let Me Go," Fisher hopes to renew audience familiarity with his soloist skills in the '90s. If people are diggin' on it, the "Old School" tag is at best a quibble, because some creations never go out of style.

IAAAM OBSERVES BLACK MUSIC MONTH: The International Association of African-American Music (IAAAM), founded by Sheila Eldridge and Dyana Williams, will commemorate the 17th anniversary of African-American Music Month, June 14-16 in Washington, DC. Workshops and symposiums focusing on a variety of musical issues, artist showcases, tributes to music legends and a prayer breakfast are on this year's calendar. The 6th IAAAM Celebration will attract music industry professionals, recording artists, radio disc jockeys, retailers, executives, music aspirants and music lovers. Honorary chairpersons are congressman Chaka Fattah of Philadelphia, *Tonight Show* music director, Kevin Euhanks, and recording artists Yolanda Adams, Jean Carne and Lenny Kravitz. Voter registration will be emphasized this year. The Diamond Award for Excellence concert, June 15, will honor Earth Wind & Fire, New Edition, Gladys Knight, Chuck D., Dee Dee Bridgewater, James Mtume, International Sweethearts of Rhythm, The Isley Brothers and Hugh Masekela. Industry trend setters will be recognized at the Contributor Awards luncheon, prior to the evening concert. Among the slated categories, music journalist/critic Nelson George will receive the James Jones Award, a further testament to the legacy of the late *USA Today* columnist. Byron Lewis, CEO/chairman of the UniWorld Group will be presented the 1996 Founders Award. The White House is currently making plans to welcome IAAAM with a special music industry reception hosted by President Clinton. Says IAAAM co-founder Williams, "Our goal is to bring corporate America together with consumer and creative entities to recognize and celebrate the beauty, diversity and economic strength of this viable music." ## THE RHYME

Violence befalls promising debut artist Young Lay (Lathan Williams) of Young Black Brotha Records. The stabbed body of his fiancée was found tied to a chair after a house fire in Vallejo, CA last week. Their one-month-old son was kidnapped from the scene, and his whereabouts remain unknown.

WAS IT JEALOUSY or gang retaliation? Speculations continue over motives for the suspected murder of Daphne Boyden, 17, fiancée of Oaktown-area rapper "Young Lay" (Lathan Williams) May 17 in Vallejo, CA. Ms. Boyden's charred, stabbed

body was found tied to a chair after a reported fire at her home. Her newborn son, one-month-old Le-Zhan De-Mariae Williams, remains missing from the scene, presumably kidnapped. The tragedy mars the pending release of Young Lay's Black Brotha Records debut LP, *Black & Dangerous* reviewed in *Cash Box* last issue. Previews reveal a gripping project with money-earning potential. Death Row artist Tupac Shakur guests on "I Gotta Survive." Young Lay has been a previous target of violence, surviving a gunshot wound to the head and ensuing coma in August, 1995. He emerged from that ordeal with a newfound appreciation for life, determined to complete his stalled album, and persevere despite the attack, which he attributed to being "at the wrong place at the wrong time." East Bay-area press sources state that witnesses to the fire reported seeing two women enter the house and "carry out a small bundle." A woman requesting anonymity says, "I think it was done by fools who think he's famous and they're jealous. It's ridiculous." She also said Boyden had received several threatening phone calls recently. Vallejo police questioned and released two suspects, but have not established a motive for the crimes. A spokesperson at Young Lay's publicity company, New York-based Double XXposure, remarked that only (Williams) can answer whether he has any lingering enemies capable of the deplorable acts, as prospects for the infant's survival diminish. Young Lay, distraught since the incident, is thought to be in seclusion.

The SRO-packed dance floor below the bandstand was the best spot to be for the 11:00 p.m. celebration. Stag dancing fans in shades of black, white, brown, and yellow head-nodded their ringing endorsement of the island artform.

**GETO BOYS REUNION TOUR:** Houston's notorious bad boys of rap, Virgin/Noo Trybe's Geto Boys kick off their reunion tour Friday May 31, at Houston's Aragon Ballroom. Joining the resurrected group will be Shyheim, The 5th Ward Boyz, Menace Clan and Face Mob. Bookings have been set throughout June '96 in Nashville, TN (6/2), Louisville, KY (6/7), Birmingham, AL (6/8), Atlanta, GA (6/9), Jackson, MS (6/14), Dallas, TX (6/15), Kankakee, IL (6/21), Chicago, IL (6/21), and Cincinnati, OH (6/23)

**ADDRHYME:** Oakland-based rapper Richie Rich drops his first ever solo LP, *Half Thang* on the 41510 label. The project chronicles his 1990 drug bust when he was arrested with a half a kilo of crack cocaine. Universal recording artists The Lost Boyz release their debut LP *Legal Drug Money* June 4. Dangerous Music artist Too Short, rap's original pimpster, had a retirement bash at the Constellation Club in Century City last week. ### Rap Single Reviews

#### ■ BODYSNATCHAZ: "On A Sunday" (Hood Rat/Priority DPRO-30044)

Loose Ends and Funkadelic grooves inspire this cut about the weekend itinerary of cruising partners Crow (aka MC Scattabrain) and Psycho Mic (aka the Microphone Psycho). It's a storyline spun with humor, misadventure, and West Coast flavor. From their debut LP *The Autopsy*, there's enough rhythmic layers to pace a party crowd, but it's laid back enough to relax to. An added remix incorporates the bottom to En Vogue's "Hold On" with a tad of scratching. It's jungle rough, straight up Cali tasty.

#### ■ THE LARGE PROFESSOR: "The Mad Scientist" (Geffen PRO-CD-4858)

"Dropping Science" is the credo of this echoplexed narrative, commencing with the haunting laughter of Vincent Price from Michael Jackson's *Thriller* video, set to a booming beat. Vocal flows resonate as if recorded in a cavernous space, making for an ultra-clear rap to background ratio. Three mixes ensure radio worthiness. Bonus tracks "Spacey" is a fusion of jazz elements, most notably cymbals, with hip-hop pulsations. "Listen" continues the hybrid sensation with free form trumpet blended with sci-fi machine sounds, and chants. A true lab experiment.

**NAVARRE CORP.** (Nasdaq: NAVR) last week announced a 2 for 1 stock split in the form of a 100% dividend. The distribution will be made on June 1, 1996 to all holders of record. The stock distribution was authorized by the Minneapolis-based company's directors May 21 based on the belief that it will broaden ownership of the company and enhance liquidity of the company's marketplace shares. The action will not increase or decrease ownership for the shareholders. Navarre independently publishes and distributes music, computer software and interactive CD-ROM product.

**SOUTHWEST WHOLESALE** is an aggressive one-stop that believes in giving clients a taste of the pie before they buy a slice. Through the dealer's May 13, 1996 edition of *Informant* (a catalog featuring new releases and the one-stop's sales rankings). Southwest has given up another double CD package, *Select Trax, Vols. 5 & 6*, that provides singles from various artists on labels major and independent. Selections of pop on one disc and alternative rock another are offered on the two discs. The nine-track pop disc has material ranging from **Epic Records'** from Down Under R&B/dance diva **Tina Arena** to alterna-gospel trio **de Talk (Forefront Entertainment)**, and lots of dance, techno, rock and R&B/hip-hop sounds in between. **Imperial Drag**, the **WORK/Sony** group featured on the cover of the May 13 *Informant*, leads off

For the first signing she returned to her professional roots and tapped Finnish pop dance artist **Miisha**, whose second single, "Set Me Free," is already gaining chart attention. Miisha will debut for NMC in late May. The label also has signed Swedish alternative rockers **Carpe Wade**, and there is a series titled *Clubland* with production by **Cris Owens**.

Music & Media has been set up by Easton to help clients obtain maximum exposure in all forms of media to create an increase in sales, credibility and name awareness. The *Cash Box Retail Guide* wishes the best to Easton and staff.

**RELEASES AND PROMOTIONS:** *Teknowhore* will be unleashed on the public June 11. The first full-length album by New York City's experimental industrial-influenced aggregation **Bile** will be put on the retail stroll by **Energy Records**. College radio and national metal stations, many of which played music from the band's previous EP, *Suckpump*, are picking up *Teknowhore's* first single, "No I Don't No." The group plans to tour throughout the U.S. and Europe later this summer... While on the subject of energy, be forewarned: the label is also issuing *Contents Under Pressure*, the debut band from NYC thrashers **Pro-Pain**. Also due out June 11, the album's first single is "State Of Mind," which has been serviced to metal and college radio. The album marks the return of Pro-Pain guitarist **Tim Klimchuck**, who left the band three years ago due to illness, and introduces former MOD guitarist **Rob Mischetti**. The band has been on tour since early May and will continue a performance trek that includes stops at radio and retail...

Members of Washington D.C. band **Everything** are mixing an album of live performances from a pair of sold out shows at the capital's **The Bayou**. Featuring live versions of past hits and new material, the **Trumpter Records** release is slated for a mid-summer release. But prior to official release a 1,000 copy limited edition CD, hand numbered, and signed by the band can be ordered through the label's website (<http://trumpter.com/active/ecolon/>) or at the one of the numerous shows during the band's tour in the Northeastern and Southern part of the U.S. during June... **The Dashboard Prophets** just released their debut album, *Burning Out The Inside*, for **No Name Records**,

■ **COCO MONTOYA : Ya Think I'd Know Better (Blind Pig BPCD 5033) Producer: Jim Gaines**

Another great effort from veteran bluesman **Coco Montoya**, this new CD is chock full of choice tunes and expert production thanks to **Jim Gaines**. Riding on the tail of his substantial seller "Gotta Mind To Travel," it looks as though the folks at **Blind Pig** have another winner. **Coco's** playing is all the way live and tasty as ever. One listening to this record and you'll know he's lyin' when he says he can't get his ass in gear. Shuffles, twelve bar blues and everything in between are all covered on this new CD that has an extraordinarily happy feel. Check out "Fool In Love" and "Can't Get My Ass In Gear" and you'll hear what we mean. **Montoya's** vocals are strong and confident on "You Think I'd Know Better By Now" and the slide solo work by **Lee Roy Parnell** is clean and well-executed. This will certainly do very well on blues radio and, combined with in-store play, sales should keep **Coco** on the road for another year. (JR)



■ **BOOM SHAKA: Freedom Now! (Stone Mountain/Knitting Factory Works KFSM501) Producers: Trevy Felix, Fabian Cook**

Reggae band **Boom Shaka** possess the endurance of **Ben Hur**, having weathered the vagaries of "the biz" since 1985 on their sojourn to keep original, consciousness-raising roots music alive and pulsating from their L.A. base of operations. Once a literal bride abandoned by flaky label dealings, **Boom Shaka** retains a hefty dowry of material for its new, on-the-level consort. *Freedom Now* packs the charismatic utterings of frontman **Trevor Felix**, with a double load of righteous island riddims supplied by bassist **Ray "Bassie" Felix**, lead guitarist **Lester "Lesterfari" Johnson**, keyboardist **Binghi Cornwall**, and **Watson "Drummie" Duverney** keeping dem beats. Choice track "Chains" infectious loosens both mental and physical shackles, with an irresistible body-seizing mandate. "Western Town" is a harmonious dancehall ode, trailed by closer "Who Knows Better," a funky sharkbite cocktail that advocates enlightenment. Spirits will sprout tall off this radio-friendly seed corn. (PM)





## News From The United Kingdom, Ireland & Europe

**TOP UK SINGLES:** Pushing her way to the top Number One position is **Gina G's** "Ooh Aah...Just A Little Bit" dropping **George Michael's** "Fastlove" to Second place. **Mark Morrison** is at Three with "Return Of The Mack", and **JK's** "There's Nothing I Won't Do" lands on Four. **Tony Rich Project's** "Nobody Knows" comes to Five pushing **Suggs & Louchie Lou's** "Cecilia" to Six. **Smashing Pumpkins'** "Tonight, Tonight" is found at Seven and **1996 Man Utd Fa Cup Squad's** "Move Move Move" isn't making a goal on Eight. Newcomer **John Alford's** "Blue Moon/Only You" comes in at Nine and another newcomer, **Black Grape's** "Fat Neck" hits Ten.

The UK's Top Album is **George Michael's** *Older* with Top Video sales *Timon & Pumbaa* and Top Vid rental *Crimson Tide* competing for the £ with Top Music Video *Live Cast Recording—Les Miserables*. Top Mega Drive rental is *Toy Story* competing against Super Nintendo's rental *Donkey Kong Country 2*.

Top European single is **Michael Jackson's** "They Don't Care" which heads the charts in Germany, Europe's biggest market and is in second place in most other European countries. **Robert Miles'** "Children" heads the list in Switzerland, Austria, Finland, France, Sweden and Norway while **Take That's** "How Deep Is Your Love?" shines in Lithuania and Macedonia. **George Michael's** "Fastlove" is loving it up in Italy, Spain and Yugoslavia while **Gina G** is going "Ooh Aah...Just A Little Bit" in Israel. Again in the European Album chart, there is no clear winner but **The Cranberries'** *To The Faithful Departed* is leading in France, Italy and Sweden while **Take That's Greatest Hits** hits in Spain and Austria. **The Backstreet Boys'** *Backstreet Boys* comes in strong in Germany and Switzerland while **Alanis Morrissette's** *Jagged Little Pill* is being dropped still in Denmark and Ireland.

**TO MARKET WE GO** as **Thorn EMI** at £18.43 is up 0.2% while **Rank Organization's** £5.35 is down 0.7%. Also down is **PolyGram** at NLf102 (£39.49), 2.1%.

**DEAR MICHAEL JACKSON, IT'S SO TAXING:** **Michael Jackson** said he was going to cancel his German tour because, under new German tax laws, his tax bill would have been bigger than his gross. Under the new laws, foreign artists are taxed on their entire German income and are not allowed to take deductions for production costs. Jackson's European tour requires three jumbo jets and 30 trucks. However, in spite of all the economic problems facing Germany and the rest of Europe, the German finance minister, **Theo Waigel** wrote a 'Dear Michael' letter asking him not to cancel and promising that the section of the law Jackson was protesting would be changed and made retroactive to January 1, and therefore Jackson would be able to deduct all costs.

**SHE AIN'T GOT NO CULTURE** and we're talking about Spain's new conservative minister for education and culture, **Esperanza Aguirre**. Aguirre says that state subsidies to music, stage and cinema would soon be reviewed by the government and warned that cuts could be anticipated.

**WHO'S GOT THE MONEY?:** Well, the richest media company in Europe is probably **Reed Elsevier**, a Dutch/English conglomerate. It's followed by **Berlusconi's Fininvest** of Italy, **Bertelsmann** of Germany, **Havas** in France and **CLT** in Luxembourg.

**A 'RECORD' YEAR** is expected in the UK if 1996's first quarter figures carry on throughout the year. Album sales were at £194 million, up more than 13% and singles were being pushed out of the stores some 9% higher than 1995's first quarter.

**STOP VIBRATING** when playing your stereo. Wood speaker casings are affected by external vibrations. The newest casings on the market, said to eliminate these vibrations are made of Welsh slate. Speakers using the 500 million-year old material sell for about £3,000 a pair, give or take a couple of £s. Check the University of Wales if interested.

**AND WHILE LISTENING TO THE MUSIC** sip some delicious **Kopi Luwak** coffee. It costs only \$660 a kilogram and comes from Sumatra where each bean has been eaten and then excreted by a tropical fox.

**BANK ON IT:** The Left Bank, that is, like in Paris. While French radio and television is stuck with the 40% French language sounds, there are no such restrictions on the club scene, which is coming back to life after almost dying out in the 1980s, when the government even banned any record that had the word 'acid' in it. But the 1990s saw the club culture slowly coming back to life and today there are many new bars, clubs, raves and concerts. Helping

the young French catch up are the many Brits who, with Eurostar trains at hand, are flocking into Paris where many of them say the action is better than in the UK.

**CHECK YOUR FRENCH CLOSET** as the clubwear look is taking over the dress scene. Before, when you went out to a club, you had to dress like opening night at the opera. Now the rage is clubwear as seen in U.S. and UK videos.

**G'DAY:** Not for **Kerry Packer**, top Australian media tycoon who has taken **Rupert Murdoch's** News Corporation to court in Australia. Packer says his network has the rights to TV programs and movies from Murdoch's **20th Century Fox**. Murdoch, in turn, is taking Packer to court in an attempt to take Rugby League match tv rights away from him. The two media giants and their companies have been fighting each other for more than fifty years.

**HOOKED?** That's going to be the problem for many people in the UK when the new **Channel 5** goes on the air in January. Since the signal put out by **C5B** interferes with video and camcorder playback, all VCRs are going to have to be retuned to wipe out the interferences as well as receive the station, and we're talking some six million homes here. And **C5B** has to pay for it, as that was one of the conditions imposed on those who bid for the channel. Thus far manual tuning seems to be the only way and **C5B** is lining up more than 6,000 people and allocating \$70 million for the job. However, **Pace Micro Technology** reportedly has come up with an instrument that would automatically retune a VCR and thus eliminate the hand tuning. Pace says their product should retail from £10 to £20 and **C5B** is investigating to see if the product works and then, if it would be cheaper to give each of the six million homes the instrument than to proceed with the hand tuning.

**SEGA SAGA:** In the first third of the year, **Sega** reported it sold some 600,000 Sega Saturn 32-bit units, 2.5 million in Japan and 300,000 in the rest of the world, including Europe. However, the company's profits dropped last year some 33% from the previous year due to the fact they were left with large inventories of their 16-bit units. They hadn't expected the more expensive 35-bit units to catch on so fast and had expected to sell off the slower models.

**COLOR BLIND:** Not CDs. **Sony's** research center in Yokohama reports that they have come up with a blue-green laser. Tiny lasers are used in CD-ROM drives and CD players to pick up digital information and the amount of information that can be put on a CD depends on the color light used to pick it up. Blue-green lasers hold more than twice as much information as the infra-red lasers currently in use. But the blue-green lasers, until now, have had a very short life. The new blue-green lasers operate at room temperature and have lasted more than 100 hours, ten times longer than the existing ones. Sony is working to improve the time.

**MEANWHILE** back in the UK market, the best-selling album during 1996's first quarter was **Oasis'** (*What's The Story*) *Morning Glory*, which has sold, since its release in the UK last autumn, more than 2.5 million copies. Top-selling single in the quarter was **Babylon Zoo's** *Spaceman*.

**LONG HAIR-ED** music sales are up in Ireland, Denmark and Holland where classical music holds onto about 11% of CD sales. However, in other European markets sales are down. In the UK, figures suggest the market was down 6.8%, in France, some 10.6%. While there are no figures from Germany, reports are that the signs are not bright. One way of fighting the trend seems to be the increasing number of compilation albums which are considered less taxing on newcomers to the music.

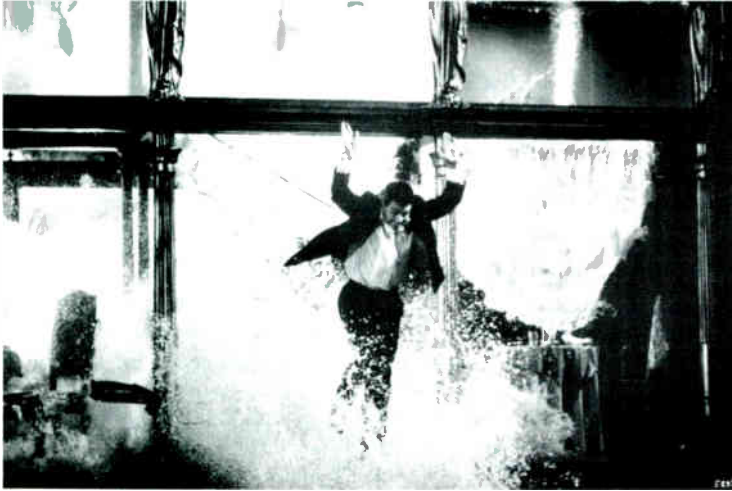
**LET'S GET IT TOGETHER** and the European Union is proposing a review of national and EU laws regarding advertising. Since every country has different laws regarding advertising, it is not easy to come up with an ad that can be used throughout Europe. Hopefully the review will come up with rules and regulations which would permit pan-European commercials.

**PLACE YOUR BETS** in Ireland, maybe. While the jury is still out on the casino to be built in Dublin, Atlantic City's U.S. Gaming Development, Inc. is still working on a floating casino in Ireland's second city, Cork. The conservative element of course, isn't looking at the money and jobs promised, but at their fear of prostitutes and drugs.



# Paramount's *Mission: Impossible* A Rush

That wall and ceiling of water behind Tom Cruise used to be a restaurant...Impossible? Nothing is that in *Mission: Impossible*.

**ALRIGHT, GOVERNMENT SPIES** are out of work. There is no more Cold War. They're dinosaurs, you say. There's no reality from which the cinema can echo. Impossible!

So what?, say Paramount Pictures and Cruise/Wagner Productions. Besides, it's not like *Mission: Impossible* is out there looking for a virgin audience. Chances are if you never saw the Bruce Geller-created TV show you at least *heard* Lalo Schiffrin's theme through the walls of the womb. And if you did that 'sense memory' will jump the IMF right back into your consciousness with the same split second timing that band of hi-tech dare-devils worked with. If you liked the series you're gonna like the movie.

The hook for Tom Cruise's debuting-producer production is not that the IMF is saving the world from some sinister government, it's that various

countries' spies are just spying on others' spies—old habits never die, they just go hi-tech.

This is *Entertainment*, folks: Blood is at a minimum (and the bulk of it, fake), there are a couple explosions, wonderful tension during a security break-in (one of the staples of the series, remember?), and a couple over-the-top stunt/action sequences (one that even people in their *wrong* mind wouldn't attempt to re-create) that effectively bring you to the edge of your seat. Nod to anything resembling reality and the '90s is that government officials are corrupt, will turn on their own like sharks and have even bred out the honor-among-thieves strain of DNA. The character of Jim Phelps (Peter Graves' series role and Jon Voight here), the only one to make the big screen transition, is, here, crooked-er'n a dog's hind leg. But he's up against his protégé Ethan Hunt, Cruise, who ultimately outwits him—would you have it any other way?

*Mission: Impossible* is poised for some big bucks at the boxoffice. AND—believe it or not—left open for a Cruise returning sequel...Nah, I didn't think you'd believe that. Just wanted to see if you were paying attention.

Go. Have fun. Brian De Palma doesn't let David Koepp and Steven Zaillian's minimal story get in the way and Koepp and Robert Towne's script keeps the flavor of what made *Mission: Impossible* possible in the first place: the fast paced 'what-are-they-doing-now-and-how-are-they-going-to-get-out-of-it?' tang. Cruise offers up that patented Cruise charm. The settings are real and the action intense when necessary. Lots of hi-tech atmosphere, and that final stunt of European speeding train and helicopter is fun and imaginative.

One great aspect of *Mission:Impossible* is that music of Lalo Schiffrin's. If there has *ever* been music which better defined a piece of entertainment—be it book, movie, series, anything!...even music—I'm not aware of it, and it fills the movie screen also with anticipation, excitement and promise of things to come. Musician Danny Elfman has wisely chosen to just build on to Schiffrin's foundation, supplementing scenes when needed.

The Cruise role of Hunt has been finely crafted to incorporate the mysterious flavor of the spy theme while giving the actor the space to bring in all the elements necessary—master of disguise, remember that?—to allow him to be 'Tom Cruise.' Jon Voight has fun with the Phelps character. Emmanuelle Beart is attractive as Voight's wife and co-spy. Filling out the

The screenplay by Rick Friedberg (producer/director/father) & Dick Chudnow and Jason Friedberg (son) and Aaron Seltzer from story by the latter duo hinges all its action on the spy ilk while setting up other stet balloons within the action and puncturing them. Technically it's solid for the genre (certainly more so than what's come out the last few years), but there are no really solid, get-down-on-the-floor-and-roll laughs like the first *Naked Gun*, *Police Academy*, *Airplane* or, going back to the great breakout piece, *Blazing Saddles*. It's understood that, in this farce milieu you fire both barrels, loaded with as much scatter shot as you can cram in that barrel, and hope as many as possible hit, but *knowing* some won't. A lot hit here, but for the most part they're just birdshot, not buckshot. Just maybe this genre has run its course for the '90s. Huh?

Director Friedberg keeps it coming fast and furious, leaving little time for thought as he pushes his cast through the samples of *Bond*, *Home Alone*, *Pulp Fiction*, *Speed*, *Sister Act*, a Michael Jackson commercial (with a flaming haired MJ) and any number of other recognizable flicks. It's a good diversionary, fun film with an already good word-of-mouth about it which certainly won't hurt any careers connected with it.

The cast is terrific. Leslie Nielsen is Dick Steele, Agent WD-40. He's got a lock on these roles and no one does them better. He certainly seems to have more fun here than he did in the title role of last year's *Dracula: Dead And Loving It*. As his femme spy partner, Niccollette Sheridan, while spoofing her own slinky femme roles displays some fine comedy maneuvering and shows that *no one* wears a stocking mini-dress like her. Charles Durning, spy director known only as "The Director," with a penchant for hiding from and spying on his own operatives goes beyond terrific. "Miss Cheevus" is Marcia Gay Harden, the "Money Penny" of the opus. Barry Bostwick is a Kennedy-esque, lusty-for-power, assistant spy director while Andy Griffith takes it over the top as an armless villain, General Rancor, and has a ball with it.

Fun scene bits—credited as 'Friends Who Stopped By'—are offered by Ray Charles as the Bus Driver in the *Speed* take off; Pat Morita as a fey waiter; a karate kicking Dr. Joyce Brothers, Hulk Hogan, Roger Clinton, Robert Culp, Fabio, Robert Guillaume, Alexandra Paul, Mr. T and the voice of Alex Trebek. Weird Al Yankovic wrote, produced and performed the "Spy Hard Theme," knock off of the *Bond*-ers.

## HBO's Norma Jean And Marilyn

**ACCORDING TO HBO PICTURES'** *Norma Jean And Marilyn*, when filmmakers hired Marilyn Monroe they were actually getting two actresses for the price of one. Well, that depends on who you talk to in town, some thought they were getting more than *two*.

The lore that has long swirled around the Hollywood sex goddess-actress-legend is the stuff myths—and movies—are made of. Marilyn's life has been chronicled for over 40 years in magazines, books, on TV in documentaries and films. I don't know

everything on the Internet but I'll bet you *something* about her is traveling those waves also, right now. Monroe, Presley and Dean are probably perched on a satellite waaayyy out there somewhere, monitoring, sipping champagne and Dr. Pepper, giggling and asking each other: What else can they come up with?

Good question. The only thing new about *Norma Jean And Marilyn* is the structure utilized by writer Jill Isaacs which puts both the unknown NJ on screen *with* MM which allows the writer-imagined internal arguments of the two-in-one to be broadcast. The rest of it is merely known facts, lore and oft-told tales rehashed and somewhat chronologically strung together. In answer to the question: There's nothing left to come up with.

But this is a cable TV presentation so there's the freedom not allowed on network and/or free channels, meaning the makers can re-create the nude calendar snapshots of the youthful NJ and explore the person's much-discussed penchant for nude freedom and her early realization that sex was her ticket to Hollywood stardom. The Hollywood power structure and superficial masculinity of the town in general come in for a bashing—well, bashing. It's all in the correct venue since the presentation isn't big enough to nail down a theatrical, big screen release and network TV...well, why go into that.

Director Tim Fywell seems to have envisioned the piece as two separate arenas and jazzes up the Isaacs-imagined docu-drama portions with cocked camera angles and washed out colors while presenting the known areas almost as a run-on mosaic comprised of tableaux taken from MM's still photographs and films.

Ashley Judd as Norma Jean displays the growing talent promised in her *Ruby In Paradise* feature debut. The young lady gets better with each performance. She has the most actor-freedom for invention and speculation with NJ while Mira Sorvino as Marilyn is given pretty much—except for the pair's scenes together which sometimes crackle with intensity—material locked-down by known history. Hers is the public persona and in that *any* actress will fight a losing battle. To her credit Sorvino doesn't work terribly hard at imitation but attempts an inner essence while allowing a suggestion of whisper, wigs and costumes to set the visual tone.

Josh Charles is a 'constant' male in NJ&MM's life. Eddie Jordan, serves the role nicely. Re-creations run from the unrecognizable and tacky to comically credible.

Marvin Worth executive produced; Guy Riedel produced. Runs on HBO Channel the month of May.

■ **RAY BARRETTO & NEW WORLD SPIRIT: *My Summertime*** (Blue Note-Owl Records, 35830) Producer: Jean-Jacques Pussiau. **AFRO-CUBAN JAZZ.**

World-acclaimed conga player, Ray Barretto, caps his forty years plus as a musician's musician with this latest release, *My Summertime*. Mr. "Hard Hands" himself offers the best description: "What we were are trying to do is to create a music containing all the joyousness of our Latin rhythms, at the same time introducing lots of variations and

breaking with the dance tradition, but respecting the jazz idiom at all times." Barretto is indeed one of the most prolific and influential of Latin percussionists in the history of modern jazz. All ten tracks exemplify his artistic versatility. *Twister* meets Jesse Cook's *Tempest*. No contest. The rumba flamenco-flavored storm version can incite as well as seduce any mortal soul. Cook has filled most of his waking life with the passion of his music. The composer, producer and performer, who began at age 3 strumming a toy guitar to his mother's flamenco records, is simply inspiring. His music has been played in over twenty countries and in every medium imaginable. This debut recording by Cook is another incredible must-have production from the insightful minds at Narada.



■ **VOODOO GLOW SKULLS: *Firme*** (Epitaph, 86465) Producer: Gggarth. **PUNK-SKA-ROCK.**

Punk powerhouse, Epitaph Records, unleashes the Voodoo Glow Skulls, aka Los Craneos Fosforescentes del Voodoo, on an unsuspecting world. At least, outside of Riverside County (home of the group). Their first album, *Firme*, was first released in English. With their Spanish-language version, the band, headed by the Casillas brothers, Frank, Eddie and Jorge, can't help but blast off in the

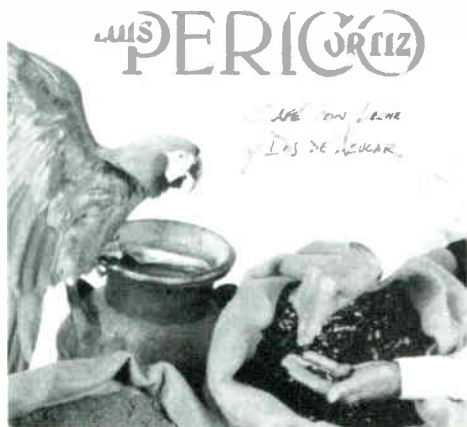

## THE LATIN LOWDOWN

### News From U.S. & Latin America

#### JOSE BEHAR: THE MAKING OF AN OLYMPIC TRIBUTE:

It began with his creative vision and a passionate inspiration of enormous magnitude. **Jose Behar**, president of **EMI Latin**, was the individual who carried the torch in creating one of Latin music's most monumental and ambitious efforts ever. His inspiration is *Voces Unidas*, the first tribute to the Olympic Games by a variety of stellar artists and renowned producers in the Latin music industry. The immensity of this incredible collaboration is enough to stagger the mind. It's also colossal enough to break the back of any record executive. Yet, Behar persevered in his quest to realize his vision. "I wanted to do something along the lines of 'We Are The World,' but with a smaller cast," remarked Behar. "This was not to be about sports, but rather about universal concepts that unite us (like world peace and striving to be one's best. In 'Puedes Llegar,' one can find relevance in its theme about aspiring to achieve. That applies to a waiter at Denny's, or Jose Behar who started in '77 working in the mailroom, and to the swimmer who yearns to win a Gold medalion. We are very different, yet very similar. The (Olympic) five rings speak to that."

This enormous undertaking began over two years ago when **Louis Wayne Cunningham**, vice president of the Atlanta Centennial Olympic Properties (ACOP), the joint marketing venture of the Atlanta Committee for the Olympic Games (ACOG) and the United States Olympic Committee (USOC), spoke with Behar. He told Cunningham about his ideas. From that point on, enthusiasm by others about the "Voces Unidas" project began to soar to the sky. Behar described his conversation with **Emilio Estefan, Jr.** "We were backstage at one of **Jon Secada's** shows. I was talking to Jon's manager, Emilio about the project and the possibility of his coming on board." Estefan's response was an immediate and emphatic "Yes!" Estefan's involvement brought a vital element of credibility to recording the project. Soon Behar and Estefan were working together making calls to various artists. "I would call Plácido (Domingo) and Emilio would call Julio (Iglesias)," related Behar. "Artists from around the world were returning calls. The response was tremendously enthusiastic!"

Soon Cunningham and Behar were enroute to Estefan's recording studios in Miami. "Puedes Llegar," co-written by **Gloria Estefan** and **Diane Warren**, was the first single to be released by EMI Latin in May of this year as part of the Latin artist's tribute to the Olympics. A who's who of artists were included in the song: **Roberto Carlos, Plácido Domingo, Julio Iglesias, Ricky Martin, Alejandro Fernandez, Jose Luis, Jose Luis Rodriguez, Jon Secada, Patricia Sosa, and Carlos Vives**. The lyrics were done in Spanish by Estefan with both ladies performing the tune. The special Olympic production was co-produced by Emilio Estefan, Jr., and **Lawrence Derner**. According to Behar, Emilio played a key role in the project.

The arduous assignment of choosing the right combination of talent and producers proved to be a task of Herculean proportions. Behar remarked about the intricacies involved. "Record companies are instinctively possessive of their artists," he said. "We don't find it easy to share our artists, especially when it comes to participating in such a great project. Yet, we found a mutual goal, a common ground that put aside all territorial feelings. We had a lot of people who wanted to be a part of our project. Maybe next time, someone else will pick up the challenge."

If so, they will need to match Behar's achievements. "Blockbuster called me," recalled Behar, "and they said that not since **Luis Miguel** (*En Concierto*) has an album moved so quickly. It all boils down," he noted, "as to how an album does in retail."

The EMI Latin executive expects to have 5 to 6 singles by the time all the fanfare of this coming July 19th fades away. The single by **Selena** is in 13th place with a bullet on the national charts in its second week. **The Barrio Boyzz'** live cut is in 4th place. An aggressive radio and TV campaign continues to run as strong as the 15,000 mile torch relay.

Challenge is also an integral part of Behar's executive career. He has helped mastermind the meteoric rise of the late Tejano star **Selena**. If it were not for her tragic fate, the idol of millions could have easily achieved cross-over success under Behar's guidance. (The *Selena* movie soundtrack will be released on **Warner Bros.**) Other EMI Latin artists, such as **Jon Secada** and **Emilio**, have flourished in their mainstream efforts due to Behar's expertise in marketing and talent development.

What's next on this executive's agenda? "In August," said Behar. "We will be presenting a 'Mexican Overture' featuring the late **Lola Beltran, Juan Gabriel, Vicente Fernandez, Lucha Villa, and Analia Mendoza**." This was Lola's last recording before her passing away. Beltran's daughter, said Behar, will also be on tour. The performance will also be aired as part of the "Fiestas Patrias" celebration on the immensely popular TV show, *Siempre en Domingo*. As Behar so aptly said, "We plan to go all out."

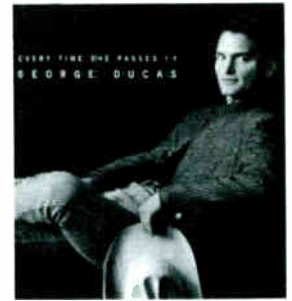

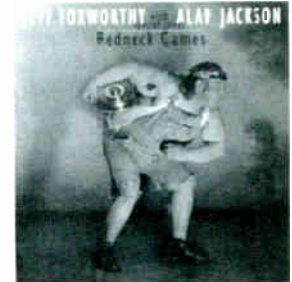
### PATRICIA CONROY

### JEFF FOXWORTHY: "Redneck Games" (Warner Bros. PRO-CD-8152)



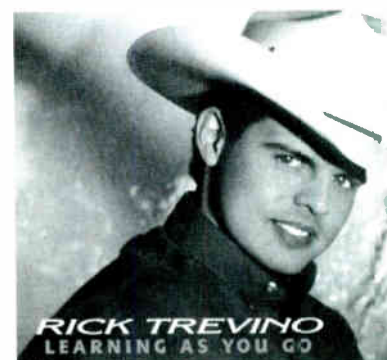

## ICME Holds Third Annual Workshop

NASHVILLE'S MUSIC INDUSTRY EXECUS, HOPEFUL ARTISTS and future execs will come together to share ideas and dreams at the third annual International Country Music Expo (ICME) August 29 through September 1 at the Opryland Hotel. This year, the four-day seminar has adopted a new name, created a charitable relief fund and settled on a long-term location.

The ICME educates and directs people on careers in recording, songwriting, publishing, artist management and other aspects of country music. For 1996 and subsequent years, the organization formed a charitable relief fund called "MER-C," which stands for Music Emergency Relief Contributions. MER-C is for members of the country music industry and their families.

"Our primary goal is to help people with career education, but through MER-C, we want the International Country Music Expo to play a special, beneficial role in the lives of people in times of need," said ICME board member John Sturdivant.

Sturdivant added that the 1996 ICME will donate \$10,000 to establish MER-C, and beginning in 1997, an annual celebrity golf tournament at Opryland's Springhouse Golf Club will raise money for the charity.

Past participants in the ICME include songwriter Dean Dillon, singers Paulette Carlson and Billy Dean, talent exec Jim Halsey, performance rights exec Roger Sovine, and former label head Jim Foglesong.

ever," Seskin smiles. "Same thing with Michael McDonald. So why are they moving here? I don't know. It's a very exhilarating place to be around when you're a creative person."

"This is a publishing mecca," states Stewart Harris, co-writer of several Travis Tritt hits and the theme to *America's Funniest Home Videos*. "It is the publishing mecca, because you can still get songs cut. You can still write a song, demo the song and get the song cut." Harris, also the owner of publishing company Edisto Sounds International, says Nashville is a hotbed of activity. "And I frankly think that there are already little pockets here and there of pop, R&B, and rock and roll. I think it won't be too long before you'll see record labels—at least successful independents—cutting other kinds of music out of Nashville."

It won't be long at all. In fact, it's happening right now. When British rock band Bad Company decided to record their latest album in America, they chose Nashville as the location. The album is a mixture of new songs and "unplugged" versions of their greatest hits, and features guest musicians such as Vince Gill and Alison Krauss. The experience was quite different than previous stints in the studio. "Everybody I've met here, they have a time schedule," marvels lead singer Robert Hart. "They start at 10 in the morning and they finish at seven o'clock at night, where we would be used to, say, working 'til four o'clock in the morning, doing it in a rock and roll way. We've gotten more disciplined because of it."

The band enjoyed its time in Nashville so much that it plans on returning to rehearse for an upcoming tour. "I think between five or 10 years' time, this will be *the* music center of America," predicts drummer and founding member Simon Kirke.

Producer Josh Leo had another reason for recording the group's first American album in Nashville. "Creatively, I think the studios are much better here," Leo says. "I know, because I work in L.A. as a producer, I work in New York as a producer, and these studios are every bit as good as both of those places. It's a little bit cheaper to record here—now. I don't know how

much longer it's gonna be (that way). And the players are 10 times better here than they are anywhere else. And you can print that."

Beth Nielsen Chapman, a contemporary pop singer/songwriter who has made Nashville her home since 1985, echoes Leo's sentiments regarding Nashville studios. She recently recorded her third album entirely in Nashville—a first for Chapman. "Some people have said that Nashville's not as cutting edge—technically, in the studios. But I think all that's past history now. There's a big resurgence of analog recording. There's also a lot of first-rate digital recording facilities here now. It's a boomtown, really."

Some Nashvillians who remember the popularity of country music in the '80s are tempted to write off the "in-ness" of Nashville as another trend. But today's songwriters tend to think that the city's prosperity is here to stay. "I think it's for real now," counters Harris. "I think Nashville is a full-blown music power. And I think that the people I know, from producers, writers, publishers, studio owners—everybody is really shooting to keep that excellence going. 'Cause I know there were a lot of us who went through the Urban Cowboy syndrome and all that, but what they didn't have during that period [was] the record sales. This time...sales are great. And that's what the influx of that money is able to support—widespread experimentation and support of the industry."

To paraphrase the slogan of one of the city's premiere clubs, the Bluebird Cafe, you never know who you're going to see in Nashville. Steve Seskin tells of meeting an unlikely fan at a gig three years ago: "Who'd ever expect Jon Bon Jovi to walk into the Bluebird Cafe and hear me in the round doin' like, a quiet story song, and come up and say 'Hey, I love that song'? But I think that's part of the interesting comment of what's going on in Nashville. People like that are coming here, even if they're not living here, to check it out. They know something's happening that they want to be a part of, 'cause it's cool."

## Midway Intros New Pin In New Product Category



Midway's Safecracker

CHICAGO—Midway Manufacturing Company announced a brand new coin-op product category, the Token-Pin pin game. The first model representing this new category is called *Safecracker* and it features a combination of pinball game and electronic board game. It was designed by the same team that created the smash hit, *The Addams Family*.

"Market conditions demonstrate that the time is right for this new category of game," stated Joe Dillon, vice president of sales for Midway. "Token-Pin games are in some ways similar to the European fun games that are collection gold mines

overseas. Token-Pin games have incredible collections potential at all locations, especially taverns."

Token-Pin games feature a game within a game. Play begins on the pinball playfield. All the elements of traditional pinball are included—flippers, bumpers, ramps and drop targets. By hitting the correct shots, players can activate an electronic board game within the backbox. Players with enough skill to make it through the board game are rewarded with a "Magic" token, which actually rolls down the top of the playfield glass right into the hands of the player!

"The token dispenser is a major innovation in that it gives players a tangible reward to try to obtain," said Dillon. "Players have something to play for besides points. They can either keep the token as a trophy demonstrating their skill or put it back into the game to activate special features."

Midway is introducing the Token-Pin with *Safecracker*, a multi-player Bally game that challenges players to hit shots on the pinball playfield that will allow them access to the Bank, which switches play to the board game. The pinball area is not centered around the traditional 3-ball play, but on time. When a player buys a game he or she buys a guaranteed amount of time. All shots add a small amount of time to the game. Losing a ball doesn't mean losing a turn. Once the time is up, it is up to the player's skill to keep going. If the player loses the ball after the time has expired, the game is over.

There are three series of shots that will allow players access to the bank in *Safecracker*. The first is a 3-bank drop target that guards the main entrance to the bank. Players that hit these three targets will then be able to lock their ball in the bank and enter through the Main Entrance. Once the bank is lit, players can also hit other 3-bank targets that will allow access through the Roof or Cellar. Any of these options provides access to the bank, and play switches to the electronic board game.

Once inside the bank, players track their progress on the electronic board in the backbox. The challenge is to move the correct number of spaces to the Safe. The number of spaces players advance is determined by a rapidly spinning safe dial animated in the dot matrix display. Players control when to stop the dial, hoping for a number that will move them closer to the safe and keep them away from hazardous spots on the board. Certain spots are occupied by Guards and Alarms that will confiscate points and send players back to the pinball game. Each successful move forward results in additional points. Players also have the option after each successful move forward to quit with their points (and return to the pinball game) or to continue, risking their winnings in an attempt to get to the safe.

If a player is able to reach the safe, he or she will be rewarded with a "Magic" token. There is the additional chance to hit the Jackpot! of multiple tokens by entering the correct safe combination. Players must obtain the combination while playing the pinball game. The Jackpot! is progressive and competition builds as players race to get a chance to crack the code and hit the Jackpot! in the safe.

While the token concept is expected to add significantly to collections, it is an operator-controlled option. The operator chooses how the tokens are used—for a free play or as a trophy. Operators can also set the game to function without tokens.

Throughout the four-day period there were numerous contests, prize drawings and a full range of social activities on the agenda.

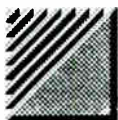
## John Tesh Skedded For Rosemont Theatre

Tesh has composed and produced music for Wimbledon, NBA Basketball, NBA Football, the World Gymnastics Championships and the Ironman Triathlon.





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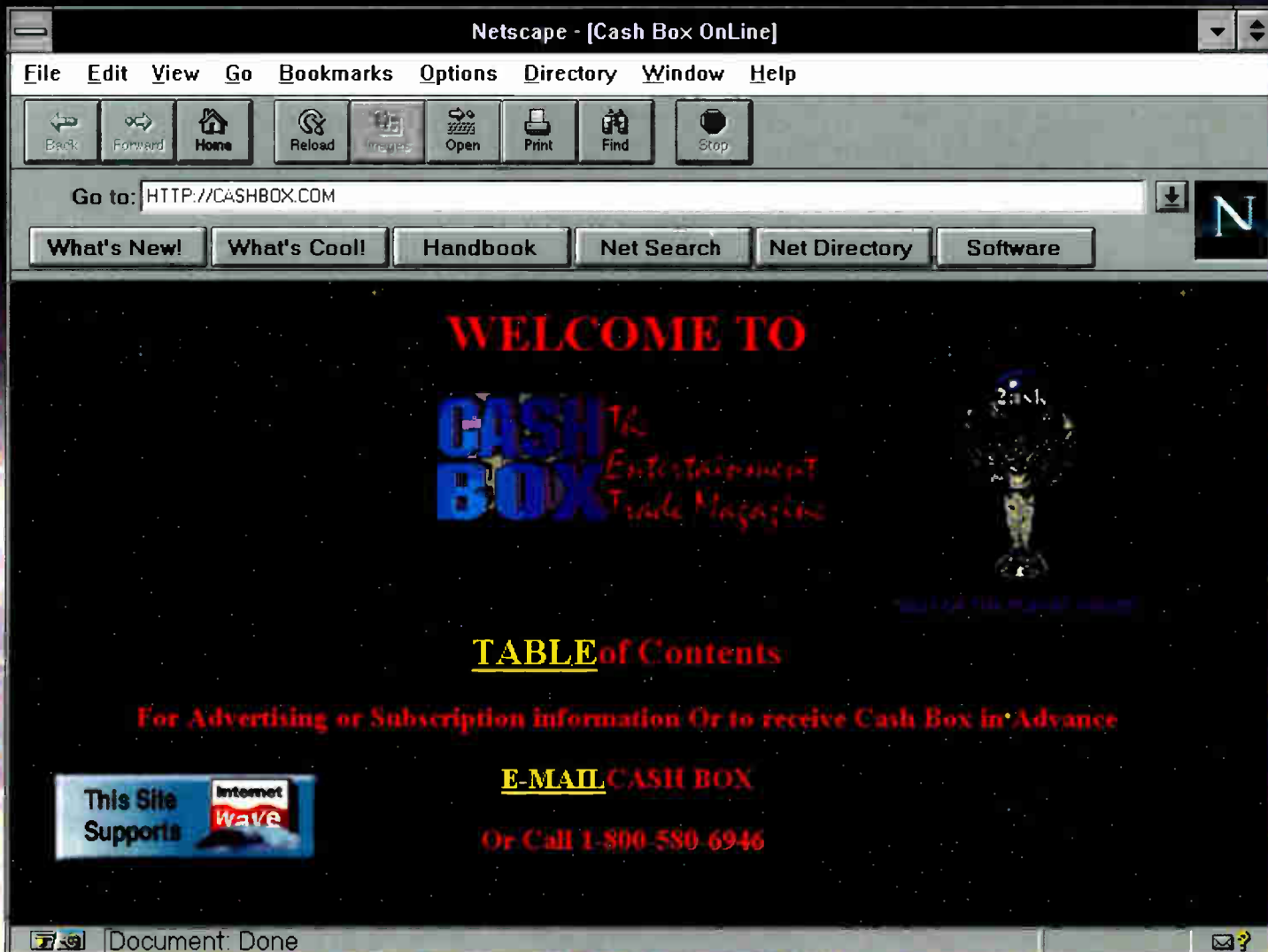
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
