The Industrial, Financial and Employment Situation

A SURVEY undertaken by International Labor News Service especially for associated trade union newspapers reveals certain definite, important facts about the industrial, financial and employment situation which may be summarized as follows:

1—A wage reduction campaign has been under consideration among industrial leaders and has been absolutely vetoed by those financial powers whose word is generally accepted as constituting law, as well as by the employers whose policies usually set the pace among the great mass production corporations of the nation. These have branded what they term "liquidation of labor" as "the worst thing that could possibly happen."

2—There has been a sharp drop in commodity prices, running to 9.1 per cent, averaged over all commodities, from August to June 1 and it was this fall at the very base of trade relations that was a major force in bringing on the stock market debacle of this week and last. Some declare it the determining force.

3—There is an unusual "meeting of minds" on the proposition that an investigation of the stock exchange, as proposed in Congress, would be "devastating," would produce additional chaos and make unemployment worse instead of better.

4—That rehabilitation depends upon a restoration of consuming power, toward which reduction of prices is one step.

The survey brought together opinions from every section of the country, some of which can be quoted, while others can not.

It can be set down that one of the three largest financial institutions of the United States, interested heavily in industrial and utility corporations, joined with the president of one of the nation's colossal mass production corporations to condemn wage reductions as fatal to recovery and to declare that the break in stock prices was due to the break in commodity prices, which, it is agreed, boils down to this additional proposition:

5—Profits at the top have been exorbitant—too much has been going to security holders and not enough to wage earners and consumers. The break will bring down the profit total; prices are coming to a level that is much nearer legitimate costs and goods are moving to consumers with a much smaller golden stream flowing into Wall Street coffers. There is a realization in Wall Street that the goose has laid too many golden eggs and not enough edible ones.

Coincident with this survey came the report that a chain store organization having 1,450 stores with a combined annual business of \$225,000,000, has slashed its whole list of retail prices to at once write off the commodity price drop. Retail prices have gone down as much as 30 per cent on some commodities in this chain. Work clothes are at the lowest price since the war.

It was explained—and the explanation is obvious to the average consumer—that generally the fall in commodity

prices is slow in reaching the consumer. Dealers hang to the old high levels as long as possible and particularly on commodities bought by them at the higher levels. But the action of this powerful chain is expected to force price reductions in competing institutions.

Examination of commodity price statistics as compiled by the United States Bureau of Labor Statistics shows that from August to June 1, wholesale commodity prices dropped 9.1 per cent. That only a small portion of this decline has alighted through to the consumer is apparent, but it is on its way, taking with it a probable loss to large numbers of retailers who probably will be unable to hold to present prices long enough to dispose of present stocks of commodities on which prices have gone down. But this downward trend of commodity prices, steady

and covering pretty much the whole range, is a solid fact forming a foundation to which superimposed prices must drop before stability can ensue. In other words, in the absence of an artificial speculative fever, which seems totally played out, security prices and dividends must come down to rest on substantial values and not on wind.

That wage reductions would be considered has been regarded as probable and in some sectors workers have been "all set" to resist. The fact that the step actually has been under consideration in the highest circles of policy-fixing authority is here revealed for the first time, together with the all-important fact that the move has been vetoed, as far as these powers can exercise a veto. That veto power, it can be stated, is almost positive, so far as the larger institutions are

concerned. It probably can not be made to govern the vast number of medium and small employers throughout, including building trades, but these are so generally protected by agreements that they are exempt from the general condition, though by no means exempt from the unemployment phase of that condition.

Another factor in the stock market crash was brought out by Peter J. Brady, president of the Federation Bank and Trust Co., New York. He declared that the rush to liquidate was in part at least due to the need for money among people throughout the country, with some needless alarm thrown in to create a more furious boiling in the general stew.

"I do not believe that Wall Street had a thing to do with the present crash," he said. "It is simply just a case of the people in outlying districts needing their money and selling their previous investments for what they can get, and some of them becoming unnecessarily alarmed.

"Of course unemployment could be given as the greatest reason, and the cause for that could be charged up to the prosperity rumors which caused the overinflation of last year by the present and past administrations, and they are the persons really responsible for the deplorable situation that exists today.

"While they realize this condition exists and unemployment was called to their attention over a year ago by Senator Wagner, they have successfully blocked every effort in Congress that would give the people at large some enlightenment on the real situation; the bad part of which is that, while they know these conditions exist, they are not suggesting anything in a practical way that will remedy our present deplorable conditions."

Frank B. Powers, president of the Commercial Telegraphers' Union of America, put his finger on the stock market as a barometer of present and future conditions.

"I regard the stock market as a barometer of present and future conditions," he wired. "The crash reflected an unexpected business slump in the second quarter, due to continued unemployment and a slump in commodities which gives us little hope for improved consuming power in the near future. Hence, stock prices before the crash were not justified.

"A Congressional investigation," Powers' wire continued, "would only divert attention from the fundamental cause of overproduction and unemployment—the substitution of non-consuming machines in industry for human workers."

Daniel J. Tobin, president of the Teamsters and Chauffeurs, also frowned upon the proposed stock market investigation. He pointed to inflated values on which dividends could not be produced.

"The stock market crash," Tobin wired, "is the result of corporations under present capitalization being unable to earn dividends. Corporations are affected by lack of consumption of products and by overproduction.

LABOR DAY, 1930

Labor Day, this year, is marked by a pronounced trend toward new economic outlooks and a realization that our Nation is at the threshold of another era.

These viewpoints have been developing since the World War. During the past year, however, more thought has been given to the revolutionary effect of automatic machinery and its displacement of workers, mass production, mergers and the encroachment of equity courts in the field of law enforcement.

These sweeping changes, yet in their infancy, have overturned former concepts. The new cycle has brought adherents to policies that would be considered, a few years ago, inconsistent with American principles.

The last thing that man will abandon is his social viewpoint. He readily accepts physical changes, as these are self evident. He clings to the intangibles, however, until new ideas fit into his economic life. He then yields to this inexorable power.

It is because of our changing economic life that the Nation is discussing new ideals. Old age pensions, long advocated by organized labor, was considered, a few years ago, unfitted for our American system. The automatic machine, with its army of unemployed, together with displacement of workers who have reached the age of 40 and 45, make old age pensions a problem of major importance.

The same is true of unemployment insurance which, an eastern Governor recently declared, the people will accept as certain as they accepted workmen's compensation.

The changed outlook is again illustrated by an increasing popular disapproval of our poorhouse system, with its excessive overhead and humiliating failures. The poorhouse is looked upon by thinking men and women as a symbol of human despair.

The new viewpoint on old age pensions again sustains our claim that trade unionists are the pickets of progress and that economic facts and social necessity eventually make certain the principles these unionists are the first to urge.

This has been true of other problems, such as abolition of child labor, establishment of workmen's compensation, higher wages, shorter hours, free education and other issues now accepted by the general public.

The past year has been marked by a clearer understanding of the misuse of the injunction. This process is no longer called a "labor" problem. Equity is rapidly encroaching on the rights of the public press and business. Labor will continue its agitation against this wrong. We are certain that as it is understood the law-making branch of government will yield to an enlightened public opinion. This change will come when the public understand the difference between government by law and government by the conscience of one man who sits as an equity judge and who sets aside every Constitutional guarantee that his irresponsible edicts may be enforced.

The universal five-day week is a certainty in the near future. It is a necessity because of changing economic conditions, and it is now being enforced in many sections.

Organized labor faces the new Collective Age with a better understanding, with increased membership and a greater faith in their possibilities through unified action. We will extend our usefulness just in proportion as we develop intelligence and a will to do.

THE INDUSTRIAL, FINANCIAL AND EMPLOYMENT SITUATION

"Labor is unemployed because of over-production and consequently is unable to purchase goods and material manufactured.

"I am opposed to investigation of the stock exchange, because it would only irritate the present situation; and the actions of manipulators of stocks, including banks and brokers, are protected legally.

"In my judgment, until the millions now unemployed return to work, thereby regaining ability to purchase manufactured products, stock values of corporations will not increase. Idleness is responsible for the present poverty of America's millions and poverty is responsible for 90 per cent of the crime now sweeping the nation."

Frank Morrison, secretary of the American Federation of Labor, one of the closest students of the unemployment situation and an observer who sits at the center of a vast network of incoming observations and facts, declared that while he did not care to venture an expression on the stock market situation as related to the commodity and employment situations, he did hold to the conviction that long-range remedy must have as its keystone shorter work-days and a shorter work-week, with "employers regulating work to output" to avoid the piling up of enormous unsalable volumes. Mr. Morrison said he was closely following the trend of commodity prices and observed that in the main wholesale declines were slow to reach the consumer.

Matthew Woll, vice-president of the American Federation of Labor, was disinclined to take seriously the Congressional gesture toward investigation of the stock market and dismissed the matter as of no importance. "It isn't going to happen," he said, "and if by any stretch of the imagination it did happen it would be of no avail, except to confuse matters.

"The country is working slowly toward a readjustment and a return of employment. The drop in commodity prices has been material, though little of it has reached the consumer thus far. The more that can be hurried the better it will be. What we have to remember is that this is not an old-time 'panic,' though it has some of the features. It is a product of modern production methods. Those methods are continuing and they become more efficient every day. The forces that piled up a market glut will go right on and to devise a way out of the situation on anything but a permanent basis is mere tinkering.

"We must find a way to make possible a growing consuming power among the masses of our people and that growth must keep step with the increased ability of our national industrial machine to produce.

"The big shaking down in stock market prices seems to me to be due to two things—the settling down of commodity prices, which must have let the bottom out of a lot of too-high stock values, and the need of many persons for the money they had invested in stocks on which they hoped to reach higher profits than now seem possible.

"We need long-range planning against unemployment, general agreement upon and enforcement of a constructive wage and hours policy and a freedom from visionary political experiments."

We cheerfully give Brother Jahns the full benefit of every possible doubt.

As a miscellaneous straw giving pleasing indication of the direction which the summer winds are blowing we reproduce the following from the Pacific Musician:

There is a trend among managers to reinstate orchestras in the leading motion picture houses, evidently finding that the filmed music does not meet all the desires of their patrons. Having had so much contention with the unionized musicians in their former orchestras, the managers had taken the first opportunity to dispense with their services when the sound pictures came into vogue.

But the public has registered an emphatic protest against orchestraless theatres, and the managers are heeding it, as the following local instances show: The new Fantages house in Hollywood was opened with an orchestra of twenty; the Hollywood Egyptian Theatre, coming under the management of Sid Grauman, will employ an orchestra of twenty-five or more; it is announced that an orchestra will be reinstated at the Carthay Circle Theatre, and the "Million Dollar" will continue its orchestra. Also, it is rumored that Warner Brothers and the Publix will come into the orchestral field in the fall. These things may be taken as an index of the changing attitude of public and managers across the whole country.

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The Place of the Organist in the All-Sound Theatre

ALTHOUGH the advent of sound caused a complete upheaval in musical circles, which was responsible for thousands of organists being thrown out of work, there are indications now that the pendulum has started back. Wideawake theatre operators are awakening to a realization that the organist fills a spot that sound, no matter how well perfected, cannot take care of.

A chain manager in a large Indiana city has forwarded us some reasons, which we believe to be pertinent, why all-sound houses should retain organists. He says:

(1) An organist, when featured, takes the place of a short reel on the program, and costs very little, if any, more than would the film.

(2) Most cities have radio stations that will gladly give free exploitation of current shows in return for having the theatre's organist play programs before and after show hours. Incidentally, these programs may be commercialized, and the amount, coming to the organist may be paid to the theatre and applied on his salary.

(3) A feature organist provides the "human element" for which patrons are asking in their entertainment. Through leading community singing he can pep up the crowd and lessen the feeling that the program is mechanical.

(4) An organist is very handy in case of breakdowns, intermissions, silent trailers, or other films not synchronized, and an exit march on the organ sends patrons away considerably more satisfied than does a dead house or record "filler."

(5) Coming attractions can be advertised by having these songs featured in solos or on the radio, and, in many cases, a picture can be sold better this way weeks in advance than by any other method of exploitation. Additional music tieups also are available on numbers featured by the organist.

We believe that there is logic and merit to the foregoing statements. There is no doubt that a featured organist is a valuable asset to any all-sound house. We think that motion picture theatre patrons want him, and, what is more, that eventually they will have him back. It is our opinion, however, that it would be unwise to cut any part of the program to make way for an organist. As things stand now, programs are none too long, and it will breed only dissatisfaction to cut a short reel and feature an organist.

The organist is an asset of sufficient value to warrant his being retained without consideration of the first reason given above.—From the *Billboard*.

Flop Goes the Weasel

AND the all-sound policies, too, if signs are to be believed. There remains absolutely no doubt that everything points to a back-to-the-theatre movement among the musicians. All over the country, especially in the large centers of population, the public clamor for the return of the orchestra and human element in the motion picture theatre is being recognized.

This is not an original idea with us, served up to bolster the optimism of the floating musician. It is an actual fact. Several of the motion picture chains have winced at the public reaction caused by their throwing out of thousands of musicians. Official announcements have not yet been made, but it is more than a rumor that three or four of the largest circuits are going the whole way, and bringing back not only organists and orchestras, but vaudeville, masters of ceremony, etc.

The public went on strike. Not officially or in an organized way—but just individually, through their utter weariness at an all-sound policy not balanced by personal entertainment and presentation. And when several million individuals object to the same thing at the same time, there is something radically wrong. It is not the same as an organized movement, where a few leaders do all the thinking and make the decisions. That was the case with the theatre bosses, and now they are admitting their mistake.

We quote some items from the *New York Times* of Sunday, June 15, which touch on this very subject of the theatre and human element. They were contributed by correspondents from the very towns in question, and so are undoubtedly authentic, and should be interesting to our readers.

"In a city of Dallas' size the backbone of mass entertainment is the picture and picture-vaudeville White Way. The Public Theatres attempted the costly experiment of serving pictures without orchestras and stage shows. Orchestras and stage shows will come back in a few weeks.

"A theatrical survey recently conducted by THE DALLAS NEWS revealed a strong reaction in favor of 'flesh' entertainment. The situation in Dallas is believed to be similar to that in other southwestern cities."

What happened in Dallas, Texas, is typical of what other important sections of the country are experiencing. The following item concerns Denver, Colo.:

"That 'flesh-and-blood' performers still stand high in the favor of local theatre patrons was indicated by an unhappy experiment made by the largest picture palace in town. This house eliminated its weekly stage revue, its stage orchestra, master of ceremonies and pit orchestra, leaving talking pictures as the entire program.

"The public balked. Attendance dropped almost in half immediately.

"A few weeks of this and the management did an about-face. Stage shows were restored, as were the pit orchestra, the stage band and the master of ceremonies."

The outlook is way up, rather than down. The Fall season for the theatre musician looks like a bumper crop, as compared to that of the last year or two. Not only straws, but actual events point the way to a back-to-the-theatre movement in the worth-while theatres throughout the country. We can say to the theatre musician:

Now is the time to keep your head up and your eyes open. Now, more than ever, the theatre musician must apply high pressure. The start has been made—the public has made it for you. Now it is up to you to finish. *All hands on deck!*—THE METRONOME.

Labor Queries - - -

Questions and Answers on Labor: What It Has Done; Where It Stands on Problems of the Day; Its Aim and Program; Who's Who in the Ranks of the Organized Toilers, etc., etc.

Q.—What was the first international union in the American labor movement?

A.—The International Molders' Union, which extended its jurisdiction to Canada in 1861.

A.—This was an independent union in the steel industry, which joined with other organizations in 1876 in founding the Amalgamated Association of Iron, Steel and Tin Workers of North America.

Q.—Where will the next general convention of the Brotherhood of Painters, Decorators and Paperhangers be held?

A.—In Buffalo, N. Y.

Q.—Who said "The strongest bond of human sympathy outside the family relations should be one uniting all working people of all nations and tongues and kindreds"?

A.—Abraham Lincoln.

Q.—How many Canadian provinces have adopted old-age pension legislation?

A.—Seven.

Out Beyond the Surf--

Where thought, unhastened by necessity or trepidation, sometimes penetrates to truth. Here, where the shallows throw no spray, let us ponder and enjoy the lessons of the art and the work and play of life.

All over this broad, fat land there are slum homes. We don't speak much of slums any more and it is to be admitted that in most cities slums aren't what they once were.

But there are hovels by the millions, wherein poor folks live.

Go through any city and observe the "houses" along the railroad right of way.

Observe them in Baltimore, in Philadelphia, in Washington, in Chicago, in Des Moines, in Omaha, in the cities of the East, the West—though not so numerous in the West—the North and the South.

In New Orleans observe the vast and costly cemeteries wherein lie the dead in crumbling splendor. Observe then how live the poor who cling to life by the tenuous thread of casual jobs.

The poor still get it in the neck—plentifully.

Great wealth lies in piles, enormous, glittering piles. Interest rates are low.

Unemployment is ghastly.

Millions are idle—waiting for something to do—resting, as some might say.

The filthy hovels are there.

The great wealth is there.

The idle workers are there.

Why not, in these parlous times, wipe out all hovel homes and build anew, using the idle money and the idle workers?

The venture could pay and the nation would be richer in every possible way.

It is not a mere dream that this big thing could be done. It is a crime that it is not done.

The shack hovels of every city are a menace to everyone in each city.

The shack hovels breed illness and they breed social rebellion.

Sometimes it seems a matter for wonderment that they do not breed more festering social sores.

A great task of decent home making awaits the doing. Every resource of men, money and materials lies at hand in abundance.

Can the vision that will lead to the doing of this big thing be aroused?

Probably not, because of many things, including the fact that the men who possess wealth do not yet care much about the men who have no wealth.

But why should this thing not be done? Is there any valid, sane, logical reason?

Unemployment could be ended over night!

World-Wide Tide of Depression

REPORTS of mounting unemployment have come from practically every industrial country during the recent months. Business depression in Germany is reflected in 22 per cent unemployment. In Great Britain over one and one-half millions were reported unemployed, with severely depressed conditions. Russia reports one and one-half millions out of work. Even Switzerland has rising unemployment. In Italy and Spain industry and commerce are depressed. In France there is little unemployment though the textile industry is depressed. In Canada an inter-provincial conference on unemployment is to be held. Great Asiatic countries like China and India are torn with internal dissension. Business depression continues.

France has been but slightly affected by world-wide depression because buyers at home so far have absorbed the products of its revived and expanding industries.

We have in this world-wide wave of depression evidence that industry and commerce must keep an eye on world markets. Economic forces gather like a tide and spend themselves against the industrial institutions of all countries.

It is a blind policy that refuses to consider the interdependence of prosperity of all nations, and to organize accordingly. Industry, finance, technical and other scientific groups organize internationally to provide channels of information and co-operation. Great industries are extending their branches around the world. Industry everywhere seeks the most advantageous conditions. It flows around barriers and makes for gradual equalization of world prosperity. Depression in any country affects all others and prosperity is equally contagious. The Bank for International Settlement foreshadows closer interrelations in the financial world.

The meaning of these interrelations in industrial forces is something for Labor to consider seriously.

CANNED MUSIC

The Federated Press correspondent of that city says that when the American Federation of Musicians met in convention in Boston, as they did June 9th, canned music would be the big problem which they would have to face.

No doubt that is true. And while reports of the convention are not yet to hand as this is written, we may be quite sure that they will continue to struggle against all elements which place their interests in jeopardy.

The Labor Advocate rises to remark, however, that canned music is a problem which far more of the people than the professional musicians must sooner or later face. For it is not merely the professional calling and the bread and butter of the musician that is at stake. It is the art of music itself.

Now it's true today as yesterday that people cannot live by bread alone. Nor can civilization prosper and progress unless the arts as well as the sciences are made the accompaniment of progress. Indeed many and many a civilization that has come and gone is now remembered not for its wealth, its grandeur or its scientific achievements, but for the masterpieces of art and the conceptions of the great artists which they left behind.

It was not the mummified body which the archaeologists sought when they rifled the tomb of Tut-an-kamen, nor which attracted the attention of the whole world. It was the marvels of artistic work and rare craftsmanship in gold and silver and precious stones which aroused the attention of all.

The Italian republics which flourished during the so-called renaissance and which since have gone down in the dust of ages, are remembered more for their musicians, their poets, their painters, their sculptors than for their dukes and their princes. And it is a fact that we take the measure of their civilization more correctly by their artistic achievements than by the dull records of the wars or their banking systems or their wealth accumulation.

Modern music expresses the soul of the nations and of the time. There is hardly any doubt of that. The great masters were the prophets of their day and they rose to sublime heights when their ideals were lofty and grand, while their work was vulgar and base when their culture was shoddy stuff.

Modern music, before the advent of the canned art, was in a fair way to great things in America. The works of McDowell, of Herbert and others were providing the nucleus, for example, for a great and original school of music in America. And it might be said that even the better forms of that more popular music known by the horrible name of jazz, had in them possibilities of development which when some really great and creative artist would work upon it, might lead to schemes of musical arrangements that would eventually move the world.

It is the unfortunate alternative of this that jazz easily lent itself in its lower forms to the incoherent jangle of the talkies, and since it was easy to popularize syncopation of the crudest sort for the show houses where noise is at a premium when mechanically emitted, it

became the type of "music" that the commercialized showmen sought to fasten on the people.

We all know the absurd depths to which the silent drama had with few exceptions sunk before the advent of the talkies. The eternal triangle was the never-failing theme, varied, of course, to prevent the notion of plagiarism, and it was this sort of stuff that passed muster on the screen as art.

Commercialism is doing exactly the same thing for music and all the magnificent splendor of orchestration and the individuality achieved by genius in "a concord of sweet sounds" is swept from the board to be replaced by the wretched thing that is heard as canned music, in which neither the true technique of the artist, the timbre of the instrument nor the true symphonic power of genius is to be recognized. This is the degeneracy of art.

Music, above all other arts, and musical genius above all other geniuses, are matters of evolution. It has advanced from the tom-tom of the savage to the glorious symphony orchestras of the present day and the amazing beauty of harmonious sound that has been essentially a recent development in the 19th century. And this development will depend upon the extent of musical education and musical culture in every land.

It is not possible to say how many musicians in ten thousand will be geniuses or brilliant composers. But it is possible to say that the greater the number of trained musicians and the greater the number of people able to enjoy and appreciate because they understand good music, the greater the number will be composers of originality and genius to express the soul of the nation.

And if we reduce the means of living for musicians, we reduce the number who will follow it, just as we will degrade and destroy the taste for good music if we are going to continue to accept the infernal discord passed off in the talkies and mechanical reproductions as "music."

Therefore, when the American Federation of Musicians attacks canned music and all its works, warns of its degenerate influence and tendencies, and struggles to keep alive the individuality expressed by the artists themselves, they are fighting a battle in which all of the people have an intimate and a more than sympathetic or academic concern.—TACOMA LABOR ADVOCATE.

The following report of the delegates to the Convention of the American Federation of Labor at Toronto, Canada, in 1929, is submitted:

LABOR DELEGATES' REPORT

To the Delegates to the Thirty-fifth Annual Convention of the American Federation of Musicians:

The November issue of the International Musician contained a several column detailed report of the Forty-ninth Annual Convention of the American Federation of Labor, held at Toronto, during the first two weeks of October, 1929.

The only essential remaining in connection therewith is to make a record here of the efforts of your delegates to execute the trust imposed upon them by the Denver Convention of one year ago.

Three major events distinguished the Toronto gathering:

(1) The visit of Prime Minister Ramsey MacDonald of Great Britain.

(2) The definite declaration that the hour had struck for an organized crusade through the Southern States in promotion of the establishment of the Trade Union movement where it had hitherto languished, but where its beneficent mission is now meeting the challenge of a most fertile field.

(3) The signaling by representatives of the various railway shop crafts of a desire to end the period of aloofness from the parent labor body which has existed for so many years and the perfecting of a complete amalgamation therewith.

Prime Minister MacDonald was given a wonderful reception because his personal record had a natural appeal for the ranks of labor. The story constitutes a romantic chapter in the history of industrial evolution. His elevation from the lower ranks of human privation to eminence in official station in a great world empire had not dimmed the fire of his enthusiasm for a great cause. That it should have fallen to his lot to sit on a log in the woods and discuss with the President of the American Republic the hopes and aspirations of American Labor for the realization of world-wide peace, but emphasized the happiness and satisfaction of the Toronto delegates.

It has long been a mystery to many trade unionists why an organization like the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, composed of 185,000 men, should not become a constituent part of the American Labor movement. The appearance of President A. F. Whitney before the Toronto Convention with a message of good-will and an expression of desire for unity insured for him an eager and sympathetic hearing. It is expected that the next annual labor convention will reveal that all barriers have been removed and that unity will supercede the old-time in-defensibility division.

To industrial conditions in the Southland, the Convention gave earnest attention.

An editorial in the Indianapolis Times of October 8, 1930, sponsored by the Scripps-Howard press, under the caption, "Where Is the A. F. of L.?"—which sought to convey the idea that Labor had been indifferent to the needs of that section, was deeply resented by the delegates and a showing was promptly prepared and published to the effect that the United Textile Workers' organization alone had, during the past quarter of a century, sent to the South more than \$1,080,000, and that scores of other unions had contributed comparatively generous amounts.

The representatives of organized labor in the South, who have so loyally and heroically held the banner of the Trade Union movement aloft for so many years, will now be able to bear testimony that the current year has witnessed the arrival of new forces of co-operation and aid and that the dawn of a new day is at hand.

Government by injunction received the usual attention. The debate upon this subject is becoming more heated each year. It also discloses that more Labor students are studying the issue and becoming better prepared to play an intelligent part in discussing the principles involved.

If there are those disposed to pessimistic ruminations over this particular field of labor, struggle, we need only to refer them to the recent episode at Washington in which a certain presidential nominee for the United States Supreme Court was weighed in the balance and found wanting.

The clamor for new legislation was unusually small. The Convention was content, in large part, with enunciation anew of cherished ideals and pressing forward toward the mark of that high calling for which the American Federation of Labor sprang into being.

Your delegation wishes to include in this report its keen appreciation of the untiring and supremely successful efforts of Local 149 to make the stay of its members enjoyable and memorable.

While in Toronto we made pilgrimage to the last resting place of the lamented Brother David A. Carey, and in the name of the American Federation of Musicians we placed a wreath where he sleeps.

The Toronto Convention adjourned, after voting to hold the Fiftieth Annual gathering at Boston—convening there on the first Monday in October, 1930.

Moved and seconded to adopt.

Discussed by delegates Mayers, Bowen, Executive Officer Greenbaum and delegate Groover.

An amendment is offered to change the time for Conventions to the fourth Monday in May.

Discussed by delegates Luyben, Millington, Jarrott and Executive Officer Birnbach.

The amendment fails of adoption.

The Resolution as offered is concurred in by the Convention.

The following Resolutions are offered for immediate consideration by Delegate Bagley:

RESOLUTION NO. 67

All laws, rules and regulations of the Federation relating to the subject of appeals are hereby referred to the Incoming International Executive Board, and said Board is hereby authorized and instructed to revise and change said laws, rules and regulations at its discretion and in accordance with Resolution No. 56, adopted by the Thirty-fifth Annual Convention of the American Federation of Musicians; and when such laws, rules and regulations have been so revised and changed they shall have the same force and effect

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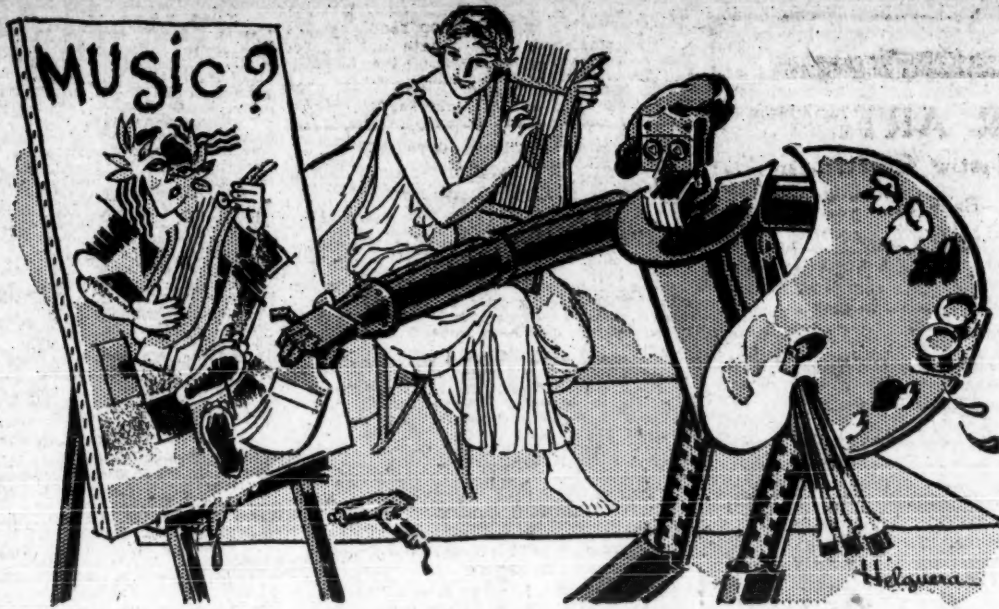

Minutes of the International Executive Board During and After the Convention

Copley-Plaza Hotel, Boston, Mass., June 13, 1930.

Meeting of the International Executive Board called to order by President Weber at 8 P. M. All present.

Delegates W. B. Hooper of Local 192, Elkhart, Ind., and Oliver H. Payne and Jos. M. Korn of Local 278, South Bend, Ind., are heard in the matter of controversy between the two Locals. It concerns Manager Kreighbaum of the Tasmog Gardens at South Bend, Ind., which latter is on the Forbidden Territory List.

Mrs. Mary Robling, representing Local 79, Clinton, Iowa, appears in relation to a local situation. She relates the circumstances of her engagement and discharge at a local theatre.

The matter is referred to the President's office.

The President announces the reappointment of the present assistants in his office.

Delegates W. Ralph Fetterman and H. C. Zellers of Local 463, Lincoln, Nebr., appear and request a reduction in the amount of fine imposed on member R. C. Johnson of that Local.

It is referred to the President's office to arrange for payment in such manner as shall be deemed proper.

Delegates Ed. Haug and Henry Pfizenmayer of Local 4, Cleveland, Ohio, appear in connection with a controversy with the management of the R. K. O. Palace Theatre.

Adjournment taken.

Copley-Plaza Hotel, Boston, Mass., June 14, 1930.

Meeting of the International Executive Board called to order by President Weber at 3:45 P. M. Present—Mayer, Weaver, Hayden, Birnbach, Greenbaum, Henderson and Kerngood. Excused—Brenton.

The Board considers Resolution No. 34, which was referred to it by the Convention. After discussion it is referred to the President's Office for investigation and later report to the Board.

Resolution No. 39, which was referred to the Board, is considered. The Board finds that if the agent acts as the representative of the band or orchestra, he cannot be held personally responsible; and if he is the engaging party representing the employer, or is engaging the orchestra on his own responsibility and selling the services to the parties requiring same, the present laws afford full protection.

Recess taken.

Board reconvenes.

Consideration is given to Resolution No. 50, which has been referred to the Board by the Convention.

The Board adopts the following substitute for the resolution: "Transportation charges per man must be made at not less than the lowest rate obtainable by available public transportation service regardless of whether or not members travel by privately owned automobile or other conveyance."

Resolution No. 55 is considered, and on motion is referred to the President to take up the matter with the I. A. T. S. E.

Recess taken.

Session resumed.

A request of member Geo. R. Madden for reopening of Case No. 594 is on motion denied.

A question of the proposed amalgamation of Local 428 of Huntington Beach, Calif., and Local 687, Santa Ana, Calif., is considered. On motion, the protest of Local 353, Long Beach, Calif., is dismissed and the consolidation of the two Locals is approved.

The Board considers the complaint of Local 10, Chicago, Ill., against Local 325, San Diego, Calif.; Local 20, Denver, Colo.; Local 104, Salt Lake City, Utah, and Local 70, Omaha, Nebr., for failure to enforce the law regulating the inspection of cards of traveling members. After discussion the matter is referred to the President to act in accordance with the instructions of the Board.

A request for strike pay of \$75 from Jordan Emery is considered. Upon investigation the Board finds the claim is proper and it is therefore allowed.

Resolution No. 17 was referred by the Convention to the Board for considera-

tion and action. After long discussion it is laid over for further consideration.

Licensing of agents is considered at length and referred to the President's office for certain investigations and later recommendation to the Board.

On motion the Board reduces an outstanding fine of member Peck Mills to \$400.

An application for reduction of outstanding fine of \$100 against Mary Wilkins, a former member of Local 94, Tulsa, Okla., is received, and on motion the fine is reduced to \$50.

The Board holds that the President of the A. F. of M., as the representative of that body, should uphold the standing of the musicians' organization on all occasions and at all times, and he is directed to travel in a manner befitting the position he holds. He is further directed when visiting other cities to secure such hotel accommodations as will enable him to hold conferences in rooms suitable for the purposes and thus properly maintain the prestige of his position.

A prolonged discussion takes place on the continuance of the efforts to properly safeguard and advance the interests of our organization and its membership. The Board directs the President to continue the advertising campaign on the lines agreed to by the Board.

The Treasurer was authorized to make the proper distribution of gratuities to hotel employees and others who had rendered services during the Convention.

A bill of \$50 for services of the Sergeant-at-Arms was allowed.

A bill for \$500 for services of Legislative Agent A. C. Hayden is allowed.

The Board adjourns, subject to the call of the Chair.
