## CHANGE IN TAX REGULATIONS

To All Locals and Members:

The following rule becoming effective March 15th, 1935, applies to all traveling dance and other engagements as mentioned in the rule and is binding on all Locals and members:

"All dance engagements, single, weekly or seasonal, played in public dance halls, in auditoriums or halls connected with an institution or amusement resort, and all engagements of whatever kind in hotels, restaurants, cafes, clubs or inns, are considered traveling engagements and the 10 Per Cent Tax Law of the Federation applies thereto. However, if in a hotel or inn a private function of any kind is given by a society, lodge, association or individual, and an orchestra is engaged for same by the parties giving the function and not by the proprietor or anyone else connected with such hotel or inn, then the 10 Per Cent Tax of the Federation does not apply.

"All laws of the Federation, as well as all interpretations, opinions or decisions given in reference to the same subject matter up to March 15th, 1935, are herewith set aside.

"All laws of the Federation, interpretations, opinions and decisions in reference to the same subject matter not in contradiction with this rule remain in full force and effect, which includes the law that on all engagements, whether single or permanent, which obliges members to be on the road for six days or longer, they must carry traveling cards."

The promulgating of the rule became necessary by reason of the activities of many traveling dance orchestras who, without changing the nature of the orchestra, sidestepped the 10 Per Cent Tax Law enacted by the last Convention to apply to traveling dance orchestras.

In many instances traveling dance orchestras formerly composed of members of different Locals have all joined one Local in the district wherein they are playing and then maintain that they do not play traveling dance engagements, but local out-of-town engagements and, therefore, were not governed by the 10 Per Cent Tax Law.

Many smaller Locals committed the error of accepting members of such orchestras as full members of the Local, profiting by the admission fee paid by them, not considering that the orchestra involved merely joined the Local for the purpose of circumventing the law of the Federation to escape the payment of the 10 Per Cent Tax.

No better illustration of the great nuisance to which such activities have developed can be offered than to repeat what the Treasurer of the Federation reported to the President's office concerning the matter, namely, that in the beginning of the collection of the tax, 442 Locals collected same, but that at the present time their number has dwindled

to 208; in other words, approximately one-half of the dance orchestras are sidestepping the law under the arrangement above named, to say nothing of dance orchestras which hoodwink Local organizations by advising them that they are only filling out-of-town engagements and returning to their Local jurisdiction each week, even though they are not doing so. Locals cannot possibly control the number of engagements during any one week that such orchestras play outside of their jurisdiction and, therefore, these orchestras have been left free to sidestep with impunity the payment of the tax, all of which is an injustice to such orchestras as hold themselves bound by the laws of the American Federation of Musicians and pay the tax.

Furthermore, when the traveling dance orchestra tax was inaugurated, many Local Unions did away with their Local tax law, the majority of the engagements being played by traveling dance orchestras in their jurisdiction. Many of the traveling dance orchestras, now sidestepping the law, place these Local Unions in such a position that they are worse off than they were at the time the law was enacted.

It is not to be assumed that any Local of the American Federation of Musicians, or any members thereof outside of those with traveling dance orchestras, who are circumventing the law, are in favor of such unjust practices, and therefore it has become necessary that the President of the Federation exercise his prerogative as laid down in Section 1, Article I of the By-Laws of the Federation and issue this order.

Locals are herewith requested to fully co-operate in the enforcement of this rule, which will eradicate the evil referred to and will greatly improve the morale of the entire membership, as when nearly one-half of the members active in certain fields of our profession—in this case the dance field—can sidestep a law with impunity, it certainly has not the result of strengthening either the prestige, standing or morale of the Federation, nor does it encourage or further the activities of Local Unions to make the best possible use of the organization to advance the interests of their own members and those of the collective membership of the Federation.

### RECAPITULATION

Outside of more clearly defining what engagements are traveling engagements, the following is the most important change:

The **Old Law** provided that orchestras composed of members of the same Local playing single engagements outside their own jurisdiction were not subject to a 10 per cent tax.

The **New Law** provides that they are subject to a 10 per cent tax.

This explanation is made for the purpose of being helpful to Locals and the correct application and interpretation of the new law.

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

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### Chamber of Commerce Runs True to Form

THE United States Chamber of Commerce has taken an action which should end all doubts and questions in Congress on the work relief bill. It is well known to all who have followed the course of public affairs for the past few years, that whenever in doubt, the safest course is to "copper" the judgment of the U. S. Chamber of Commerce.

The U. S. Chamber of Commerce issued ponderous pronouncements at intervals all through the "four years of economic hell" which preceded the inauguration of Roosevelt without offering a single rational suggestion for bringing better times. It sat through the concluding bank crash of that period as if paralyzed. It gave neither aid nor counsel of value in starting the country on the upgrade.

The Chamber did, indeed, say some friendly words for the N. R. A.; and the reason was not long concealed. As soon as statistics showed that profits under the N. R. A. were increasing faster than wages, the approval of the Chamber was understood. It has opposed nearly every measure of relief, and every proposal to give labor a standing in the codes which would enable workers to claim and enforce the rights guaranteed them by the Recovery Act.

The only thing needed now to rally public opinion behind the main principles and policies of the work relief bill is to have the National Association of Manufacturers join in denouncing that bill. The N. A. M. is more cantankerous than the C. of C.; but not more reactionary. If the two will join in a loud blast that the work relief bill is a ticket to the infernal regions, the supporters of that measure will know that they are on the right road.

### Ford and Other Wages

IF you have seen these items before, you are lucky in the matter of news—

Ford employes in Detroit are averaging about \$650 per year at this time. The daily wage is \$5; so unless there are factors that do not appear on the surface, Ford workers have jobs only 130 days in the year. Chrysler wages are lower still; from \$400 to \$600 a year. Workers have been known to quit automobile factories because they could feed their families better on relief.

All these things—and quantities more of the same sort—were stated to the President's commission at Detroit a few weeks ago. They rank among the most important and vital news of the day. Yet it is a safe wager that not 10 per cent of the daily press of the United States published 10 per cent of this testimony; and not one American citizen in twenty is aware of the facts given in that one paragraph.

### Turning the Light on Power Rates

THE new Federal Power Commission has done a piece of work which should have been done at least ten years ago. It has prepared a booklet giving the actual prices paid by domestic consumers for electric current in 191 cities of the United States. Further publications of the same sort will supply other information on the same general subject—the cost of current.

To the consumer, this is an enlightening and encouraging document. To the Power Trust, it is a devastating document. It is a death-blow to the evasion and mystery and hocus pocus by which the present often outrageous charges for current have been preserved.

Tables are given showing the sum paid for a given amount of current in different cities; and with one important exception, cities with publicly owned plants are

bunched toward the low end of the scale, while the private plants invariably carry off the prize for getting the most money for the least current.

Cleveland, Ohio, served by a municipal plant, pays 60 cents for 15 kilowatt hours per month. Miami, Florida, under the dominion of the Florida Power & Light Company, pays \$1.17. Mount Vernon, New York, with a private plant, charges \$7.31 for 100 kilowatts per month. Springfield, Illinois, with a public plant, sells you 500 kilowatts for just one cent less—\$7.30.

What price rugged individualism? Of course, no household ought to use as little as 15 kilowatts per month. Few households do, where the rates are decent. Coming up to the use of 40 kilowatts per month, the housewife pays \$1.31 in Cleveland; and \$4.18 in Miami. All Florida seems to be a high rate zone. Some years back, Sidney Z. Mitchell was told by his doctor to take a rest from the exacting toil of Wall Street. He went to Florida—and Florida is still paying for his visit with 30-year franchises, and top rates of 12 cents per kilowatt, and other boons that monopoly loves to scatter.

Another high rate plateau is found in New Jersey, where the Public Service Electric & Gas Company rules the electrical roost. Camden, Elizabeth, Jersey City, Newark, Paterson, Trenton—all pay \$3.20 for 40 kilowatts, while Cleveland pays \$1.31.

The Power Commission deserves a vote of thanks from the householders of the country. Graft and extortion flourish only in darkness, and the Commission is turning on the light.

### Father Coughlin on Corporations

FATHER CHARLES E. COUGHLIN, Detroit's "radio priest," sent over the air the other day a call for taxes to stop the concentration of wealth in the hands of a few corporations, and give the "little men" a chance.

"By the year 1950," he said, "unless salutary laws are introduced in the meantime, 70 per cent of all the corporate industrial activities of the nation will be carried on by 200 concerns. By that year, they will possess half the national wealth, and by 1970, they will own all industrial activity and practically all the national wealth."

Coughlin is drawing his facts from one of the most thoughtful books of the past few years—"The Modern Corporation and Private Property," by Gardiner C. Means and A. A. Berle. In this book, the writers—chiefly Means—trace the growth of corporations until less than 200 companies control a majority of the industrial and transportation business of the day. These 200 corporations have less than 2,000 different directors; so that 1,000 men control the bulk of the nation's investment in mining, manufacturing and transportation.

As a matter of fact, a majority of these directors are dummies or representatives of a handful of financiers behind the scenes. But, taking them at their face value, think what it means to have the wealth and industry of the country controlled by so small a group as that.

Father Coughlin can see no escape from industrial feudalism except by invoking the full strength of the taxing power. He would have not only income and inheritance taxes graduated steeply upward, but taxes which amount to excess profits taxes on the gains of corporations, though he does not call them that.

**Labor Queries** Questions and Answers on Labor: What It Has Done; Where It Stands on Problems of the Day; Its Aim and Program; Who's Who in the Ranks of the Organized Toilers.

Q.—How are departments of the American Federation of Labor supported?

A.—By a per capita tax paid by affiliated national and international unions.

Q.—Did organized labor ever officially condemn the Ku Klux Klan?

A.—Yes. A. F. of L. conventions in 1922 and 1923 denounced the Klan as an interference with liberty and danger to the labor movement.

Q.—Have trade unions made studies of the sanitary and safety conditions in their industries?

A.—A number of unions, including those in the printing and garment trades, have made such studies. These surveys have usually included physical examinations of the workers to determine the effects of working conditions.

Q.—Who is the workers' representative from the United States on the governing body of the International Labor Office?

A.—William Green.

Q.—Is there a broom makers' union?

A.—Yes, the International Broom and Whisk Makers' Union. Headquarters are in Chicago.

## Out Beyond the Surf

Where thought, unhastened by necessity or trepidation, sometimes penetrates to truth. Here, where the shadows throw no spray, let us ponder and enjoy the lessons of the art and the work and play of life.

Once there was a saying—Let's look at the record. It was a good saying and it scared a great many whose records weren't good to look upon.

The saying is good today. Let's look at the record of Big Business under N. R. A. and see what it has done.

In the main, not a nice record. If there is one industry that has gone to Washington to say, "Let us see how high we can put our wages and how far we can cut our hours," you can pin a medal on that industry.

You will not need a pocket full of medals for the job. You will not need any wholesale supply of medals. And it will not be costly to do this decorating.

Industry after industry went to Washington, determined to hammer down the wage rates in its code to the last possible tenth of a cent and to hike hours up to the last possible notch.

Industry after industry tried to whittle away 7-A and to cut the heart out of the libertarian guarantees therein.

High-priced lawyers were employed to gyp workers out of dimes.

All in all, if we look at the record, it is a sordid thing, sadly lacking in that patriotism about which Big Business talks so much around banquet tables.

Labor can be proud of its record; business; its face should be red.

Business has talked a lot about self-government. It means government by employers, with each employer watching the other like a hawk to see that the other doesn't get any tricks all to itself.

Business, by large, doesn't understand self-government in which labor has any votes. To business, "industry" means "employers;" it doesn't yet mean "employers and workers."

That's why there has been such a drag to Recovery. It's one of the big reasons, anyway.

In the houses on the hill they have always learned slowly—just as it is with the automobile industry today; and as it is with steel and textiles and tobacco.

It is amazing and astounding that one big tobacco company pays more in dividends in a year than the big four tobacco companies pay in wages to all the workers in their plants.

And, as for unions—one plant among the big four has its workers so thoroughly scared that NOT ONE of its employes pays dues to the union. Yet, strange as it seems, union members smoke the cigarettes they produce.

Look at the record. It is a good thing to do now and again.

The record is where we go to get facts. Facts condemn wrong and sustain right.

No great movement, working for human freedom, can afford to overlook facts.

Look at the record—get facts—go armed with truth. With facts Big Business is put on the spot—on a very hot spot. Labor stands clear, with banners bright.

Get facts and build unions. Move, thus, toward a better tomorrow.

### The President Speaks

LABOR officials generally agree that the public has been inclined to give undue credence to many wild stories appearing in the daily press, presuming to assert that a breach of understanding and even a lack of confidence developed between organized labor and the President of the United States.

No responsible labor newspaper has repeated this assertion, of course, for the simple reason that no such breach or lack of confidence has ever developed. And no responsible labor official has attacked the President.

Labor representatives have on occasion found it necessary to speak the truth frankly with respect to the attitude and activities of certain individual members of the Administration, but none has found it either necessary or desirable to speak ill of President Roosevelt.

The President now is familiar with the position of organized labor on several vital subjects, for the Executive Council of the American Federation of Labor was received at the White House and afforded the opportunity to present its collective views.

The President's statement closes with a paragraph that strikes a responsive chord in the hearts of all wage earners, for it expresses their ideal:

"We are seeking to promote peace, co-operation and understanding in all of the industries of the United States between labor and management, to the end that we can eliminate the inequities and institute practical and scientific stabilization for the common good of all those engaged in industry as well as for the nation itself."

The great English poet, Robert Browning, sang:

"God's in His Heaven,  
All's right with the world."

This is undoubtedly true, as the world originally came from the hand of the Great Artificer. Responsibility for the sorry mess made of so many things must be laid squarely at the feet of those who were given universal dominion and then failed to be faithful to the great trust committed to their keeping. We are approaching the noontide of Twentieth Century civilization. There is wealth beyond the dreams of avarice. There is distress which cannot be measured in words. There is food rotting as it waits for a market. There is clothing on mercantile shelves, while destitute are shivering with the winter's cold. On every hand may be heard the deepening inquiry:

Hell's broke loose,  
What's wrong with the world?

Statesmen are philosophizing; politicians are promising; demagogues are beating the air. Human nature being what it is—the situation hopeless? Careful reflection can only lead to one general conclusion: Some effective means for eliminating the dry rot of human greed from the system must be devised if any substantial or permanent improvement is to eventuate. Shall the reform begin with you? Or with you? Or with you? Individual introspection is the starting point. As Cassius observed in "Julius Caesar"—"The fault, dear Brutus, is not in our stars, but in ourselves, that we are underlings."

The neck-and-neck race between President A. C. Hayden of Local No. 161, of Washington, and President Harry C. Dunspaugh of Local No. 86, Youngstown, continues without default or variation on either side—each having been elected to his twenty-eighth term as head of their respective organizations. The report from the latter local seems to indicate that the members are generally disposed to retain faithful officials all along the line, as long as they are willing to serve. For example, Frank Pascarella was re-elected to his twelfth consecutive term as vice-president; Benjamin J. Seaman, secretary, twenty-fourth year; George H. Foster, sergeant-at-arms, eighth year; Joe Mace, Richard Flaherty and Charles Martin, twentieth year as trustees. Members of the Executive Board named were: Bert Reardon, Jess Cartwright, Frank Patton, P. J. Loftus, Stephen Napolitano, William V. Carroll and Wick Mackey. Local business interests seem to be given consideration over the political interests which sometimes strive for the mastery.

The national convention of the American Federation of Musicians to be held in Asbury Park, N. J., is just three months away. Indications are that the Locals are very much alive and determined, if possible, to be represented in its deliberations.

As a current feature of the craze to tax everybody and everything under the sun, Locals should demand state and municipal legislation for promotion of the band tax idea.

From the Public Service Magazine we glean the story of four professionals dis-

cussing whose profession was the oldest.

The Clergyman: "Mine is the oldest, because it took a minister to marry Adam and Eve."

The Physician: "Mine is the older. It took a physician to take the rib out of Adam."

The Civil Engineer: "No, mine is still older. It took an engineer to bring order out of chaos."

Politician: "Mine is the oldest. It took a politician to produce the chaos in the first place."

Surely, in this medley of boasting the Musician is entitled to a place; for was it not then and there, at Creation's dawn, that "the morning stars first sang together?"

During a recent passing through Chicago, there was afforded an opportunity to hear the rendition of Bach's "Passion," sung by the famous Appollo Club of that city and with accompaniment by the great Chicago Symphony Orchestra, directed by Frederick Stock. The deathless character of the works of the old masters finds impressive illustration in this work. It will be no waste of time to recall that Johann Sebastian Bach belonged to the 1685-1750 period. His compositions marked the beginning of a distinctively new epoch and justifiably gave him the oft-quoted distinction of being "The father of modern music." His classical leadings induced him into practically all fields of composition, except the operatic, and upon each he left the mark of his individuality. He brought the chorale and the fugue to a high degree of perfection. No less than 226 cantatas bear his name. The religious tone in his work is very pronounced. This musical event was given in Orchestral Hall and every available seat was taken. Chicago is winning world-wide recognition as a seat of culture.

It is interesting to know that President Albert L. Eggert, of Local No. 30, St. Paul is still sounding forth the trumpet-call in behalf of a more intensified development of community music. His office is in receipt of a constant increase of inquiries and offers of assistance in the matter of appeal for governmental subsidy and he expresses appreciation of the help the cause has received from publicity in the January International Musician. President Eggert is delivering a carefully prepared lecture on "Music and the Community" before university institutes, societies, clubs and various organizations interested in the esthetic side of life. This is the kind of activity which must be stressed if lovers of and believers in the cause of musical development are to reach the hoped-for goal.

As these lines are written announcement is made that Hauptmann is guilty of the murder of the Lindbergh baby. Thus endeth the main chapter in the greatest drama ever enacted upon an American court-room stage. Wide and varied were the predictions as to what the verdict would be. Under the most approved method ever devised by man—a system oft proclaimed as the crowning glory of Anglo-Saxon civilization—eight men and four women have weighed the evidence and uttered the decision, fulfillment of which decree means Death.

In the calm after-glow of the turbulent scenes enacted over a five-week period there will be much of reflection which should be solemn in its content.

The murder of a Lindbergh child, with its fiendish and gruesome incidentals, was bound to engage the attention of the world. Had the innocent victim been the offspring of an obscure father and mother—utterly unknown even to local fame, the diabolism of the affair would not have been less pronounced. But the name of Lindbergh had long before become a household word throughout the domain of world-wide affairs and prominence like mountain peaks attracts a wide range of vision.

The uncomfortable reflection arises that money was a powerful expedient in helping to secure the Hauptmann conviction. We clip the following estimate from today's press as to the cost thereof:

The government, including the three branches, federal, state and New York City, had 28 workers on the case for 30 months, at an expense estimated at \$284,000.  
A conservative estimate of the various costs would show approximately the following figures:  
Cost to Colonel Lindbergh, \$75,000.  
Cost to Colonel Breckenridge, \$10,000.  
Cost of police and detectives, \$284,000.  
Telephone, telegrams and cables, \$20,000.  
Trips to Europe by officers, \$5,000.  
Cost of handwriting experts and charges, \$50,000.  
Cost of wood expert and exhibits, \$10,000.  
Federal expenditures, \$75,000.  
Cost of trial, \$100,000.  
Total, \$629,000.

The cold-blooded murderer and the kidnaper deserve the same fate—the end of a rope or the electric chair. There can be little dissent from that conclusion if law is to be vindicated in its meaning and civilized society is to stand.

As to the Hauptmann trial—a multiplicity of characterizations are possible.

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
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


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It has been a carnival of maudlin sentimentality.

It has been a saturnalia of hysteria. It has been a Hollywood flair. It has been a mink coat fashion bazaar. It has been a journalistic debauch.

The trial was presided over by one who has impressed the public as being a dignified and conscientious judge; but he was confronted by an uncontrollable mob. The news reel gang and the moving picture gang cared not a rap for court room propriety and the stories published and broadcast outraged all sense of decency. We need to mention but one instance—the pictorial and reportorial screed about one of the jury women carrying on a flirtation with the defendant. The verdict itself is all that is needed to expose the hollow crudity of that journalistic myth.

Another feature: We have not contacted a lawyer during this entire sensational period who has not been utterly astounded by the spectacle of the attorneys on both sides telling the world in advance what witnesses they proposed to place on the stand and of the evidence they expected to produce.

To give away in advance your own side of a pending law suit is a procedure quite unknown to legal strategy, court room ethics, or the fundamentals of common sense.

Let us hope that out of this welter of criminal court room spectacularism will emerge a fear which will compel the murderous kidnaper to forget his hellish cunning and insure to the uttermost degree the safety of little children as they grow and develop in the sacred atmosphere of their own home.



### The Cherry Tree

Where with our Little Hatchet we tell the truth about many things, sometimes profoundly, sometimes flippantly, sometimes recklessly

In his thoughtful book, "Labor, Industry, Government," Matthew Woll urges labor to look sharp that government does not gain too large a measure of control over the lives and affairs of the workers.

Those who keep an eye on things doing in Washington may be more than a little inclined to conclude that Matthew Woll took a long-sighted look at the political currents before he dipped his pen in ink.

The book deserves more than reading. It deserves study. The passing of years has made possible the saying of many things that could not so well have been said even five years ago.

Among other affairs treated with searching candor is the International Labor Organization and how idealism was trimmed by cold European diplomacy in Paris—again government riding hard on the workers.

As the time draws on for enactment of a new NRA legal backbone, the wonderment grows as to whether some of the great fictions of the present structure will be continued.

One of these fictions is that creation of the Labor Advisory Board gives labor some voice. It gives labor no voice which it does not have by the strength of its own lungs.

Another fiction is that there ought to be Labor, Industry and Consumers' advisory councils, as if this device made for a perfect division of the social structure. It makes for a wholly fictitious division and is one of the choicest pieces of hokum in the whole scheme.

Another and probably the greatest fiction is that code authorities composed of employers can rule industry in a manner justifying the term "industrial self-government."

The truth about this is that the idea puts workers on the same plane as machinery and supplies and the bosses govern the whole works.

That truth hasn't really sunk in yet—but when it does!

One of the best commentators engaged in the business of telling about national affairs says that while the President started out with a 99 per cent control of Congress, his control now is about 70 per cent.

In spite of the assertion of a wise Congressman that "Congress will not enact any measure that the President does not want," the commentator is more nearly right than wrong.
