THE DECISION OF THE NATIONAL WAR LABOR BOARD AND THE CANNED MUSIC CONTROVERSY

The directive order issued by the National War Labor Board on June 15, 1944, is published herewith. After reading this directive order you are requested to read the letter which was addressed to all locals of the Federation on June 16, 1944. This letter, which follows the War Labor Board directive order, is self-explanatory and sets forth the reasons for the Federation's refusal to comply with said order.

You will also find Resolution No. 43 passed unanimously at the Chicago Convention on June 7, 1944, contained in the editorial on page 12. This Resolution, by unanimous order of the Convention, makes it mandatory for every member of the Federation to refuse his services for the making of recordings and transcriptions to any person, company or employer, unless such person, company or employer enters into a written agreement with the Federation embodying the same terms and conditions now included in the "Decca" and the "Four Employer" contracts.

Directive Order

By virtue of and pursuant to the powers vested in it by Executive Order 9017 of January 12, 1942, the Executive Orders, Directives and Regulations issued under the Act of October 2, 1942, and the War Labor Board Disputes Act of June 25, 1943, the National War Labor Board hereby decides the dispute between the parties and orders that the following terms and conditions of employment shall govern the relations between the parties:

1. The agreements entered into between the Federation and various transcription and recording companies settling their disputes do not require the approval of the War Labor Board, since the payments to be made thereunder by the Companies to the Union for the benefit of the Employment Fund are not wage adjustments within the meaning of the wage stabilization program.

2. The ban upon playing or contracting for "recordings, transcriptions or any other form of mechanical reproductions of music" by members of the Federation, resulting from the action of the Federation on June 25, 1942, shall promptly be withdrawn.

3. The Federation and the three remaining Companies which are parties to this dispute shall endeavor to reach an agreement regarding the amounts and the schedule of escrow payments to be made by the Companies.

4. If no such agreement is reached within fifteen days from the date of

7. If Step (6) is exhausted without agreement, the parties shall report to the War Labor Board their respective positions, and the War Labor Board will then appoint an Arbitration Board and determine the frame of reference within which the Board so appointed shall render a decision which shall be final and binding upon the parties.

Subsidiary Locals Granted Autonomy

After due consideration, the International Executive Board by unanimous vote has abolished subsidiary charters in connection with colored locals. There were twelve locals operating as subsidiaries under control of the white locals in their respective jurisdictions. This means that these former subsidiary locals will receive a charter of their own from the American Federation of Musicians and will govern themselves in the same manner as any other local.

this directive order, and if the time for negotiation is not extended by mutual consent, the parties shall report to the Board their respective positions. The Board will then determine the amounts and the schedule of escrow payments and order that the payments be begun.

5. After the amounts and schedule of escrow payments have been fixed by agreement or by the order of the Board, the parties shall endeavor within thirty days (or within such further period as they may mutually specify) to reach an agreement regarding the method of distribution of the payments—by whom, to whom, for what purposes, and for how long the payments should be made.

6. If no such agreement is reached within the time limited, the parties shall have a further period of ten days (which may be

The foregoing terms and conditions shall be incorporated in a signed agreement reciting the intention of the parties to have their relations governed thereby, as ordered by the National War Labor Board.

Dear Sirs and Brothers:

The National War Labor Board, by a vote of eight to four directs the American Federation of Musicians to lift its so-called recording ban which became effective August 1, 1942. This so-called ban resulted from a declaration by the American Federation of Musicians at its Convention in Seattle in 1941, and reaffirmed at the following Convention held at Dallas in June, 1942, and states that on and after August 1, 1942, musicians would no longer render services in the making of recordings and transcriptions. This was put into force and effect by the officers of the Federation at the direction of a Convention, and only a Convention can set it aside.

The entire subject matter was brought to the attention of our Convention, which took place in Chicago, June 5, 1944, and the previous actions of the Seattle and Dallas Conventions were ratified and reaffirmed. Resolution No. 43 (which was adopted unanimously at the Chicago Convention and which appears in the second column of page 12) provides that all matters shall remain in status quo and no member be permitted to record for RCA-Victor or Columbia Recording Company, or any other company which has not signed a recording agreement with the American Federation of Musicians.

In order that our members may not be misled by prejudiced press releases and comments, I desire to make a few observations for their guidance.

As a result of the War Labor Board's decision, the contracts with the Decca Company, and eighty-eight other companies, providing for the payment of a certain sum per record to the Federation as an employment fund are valid and binding. These contracts remain in full force and effect. Thus, the principle for which we have fought has been established in the industry, regardless of the bitter opposition of RCA-Victor and Columbia.

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Symphony

WITH their avowed purpose that of providing entertainment and solace for service men on leave and sustaining civilian morale, summer concerts are now being enjoyed the length and breadth of the land. The New York Stadium Concerts Defense Entertainment Committee, in its letter of appeal in behalf of service men, states, "We are fervently hoping that this is the last wartime summer. So please do help us to make it possible for our service men and women from all over the country to hear, for perhaps the only time, these great outstanding artists with the New York Philharmonic Symphony Orchestra."

Excellent conductors engaged for the summer season—among them Alexander Smallens, Vladimir Golschmann, Efrem Kurtz, Leonard Bernstein and Fabien Sevitzky—and artists of the highest calibre—including Marian Anderson, Jascha Heifetz, Fritz Kreisler and Artur Schnabel—guarantee a summer's entertainment of the highest calibre. Ania Dorfmann, Russia's great woman pianist, was soloist July 8th, playing the Beethoven Concerto No. 3 in C minor. Mr. Golschmann conducted.

Special stress is being laid on American works with compositions by Virgil Thomson, Jerome Moross, Morton Gould, Samuel Barber, Leo Sowerby, David Diamond, Aaron Copland and Leonard Bernstein.

Philharmonic Premiere

MORTON GOULD'S "Symphony on Marching Tunes", when it was recently given its premiere performance by the New York Philharmonic-Symphony Orchestra, under the baton of Vladimir Golschmann, was acclaimed by critics and

audience alike. In its four movements—the Civil War Era, with tunes of the time interwoven; "Bivouac", showing the darker side; "Quick-Step", brash and blatant, and "Memorial", tense and austere—America is presented in her varying war-time moods.

Mozart in the Berkshires

DESPITE the fact that the musical world will again this year be deprived of the Berkshire Festival, Dr. Serge Koussevitzky has seen to it that there will be musical activity at Tanglewood after all. He will direct a Mozart Festival of four concerts there on July 29th and 30th, and August 5th and 6th. The orchestra will be made up of members of the Boston Symphony Orchestra and soloists will include Dorothy Maynor, soprano; Ruth Posselt, violinist; Robert Casadesus, pianist, and the duo-pianists, Luboshutz and Nemenoff.

Boston

SUCH is the magic of the Boston "Pops" Orchestra under Arthur Fiedler that even the Japs use it for musical ammunition, relaying to our fighting men in the Pacific via radio the regular Saturday evening concerts. As one of the commentators puts it, "Nothing could be more accommodating, except perhaps a mass hara-kiri movement on the part of the little Nips."

Joseph Wagner, founder of the Boston Civic Symphony Orchestra, has retired as conductor after eighteen years at that post. His successor is Paul Cherkassky, who has been violinist in the Boston Symphony Orchestra for twenty years.

Philadelphia

A "POP" CONCERT, unique in the history of Robin Hood Dell and American music generally, with some twenty writers of America's songs participating as piano and vocal soloists in their own numbers and with composer Sigmund Romberg as conductor and master of ceremonies, is promised by the Dell management for August 3rd. To be featured as a "Salute to the American Song Composer", the concert will present Harry Armstrong, Stanley Adams, Peter ReRose, Charles Tobias, Herman Hufeld, "Luckey" Roberts, Harry Tierney, Mabel Wayne, Milton Drake, Al Hoffman, Jerry Livingston, Alex Kramer, Dorothy Fields, Nat Simon, Sammy Stept, Ray Henderson, John Whitney and Abel Baer. Their numbers are to be set forth in arrangements specially prepared for the symphony orchestra of ninety musicians.

Washington, D. C.

FIRST of the service men to appear on this summer's Watergate Concerts, Oscar Shumsky, Musician 1st Class, U. S. N., played on the evening of June 18th the technically demanding Wieniawski Violin Concerto No. 2, and by his performance proved himself a full-fledged and highly competent artist. Stanley Chapple conducted.

The Watergate Concert of June 28th was dedicated "to those inhabitants of Washington who do most of the work and get little of the glory", that is, to the Federal employees. Soloist was the young pianist, Earl Wild, "American to his finger-tips", now serving in the Navy as a Musician 1st Class. Nathan Milstein, at the concert of June 30th, played the Mendelssohn Violin Concerto in E Minor.

The all-Tchaikovsky program conducted by Antal Dorati on July 7th was set off by the brilliant pianism of Jorge Bolet, Assistant Military Attache of the Cuban Embassy.

North Carolina

THE North Carolina Symphony Orchestra, Benjamin Swain, conductor, concluded its 1943-44 season with a week-end of five concerts in Chapel Hill, Greensboro and Greenville, North Carolina. The soloist for the Chapel Hill and Greensboro concerts was pianist Paul Stassevitch, who performed the Tchaikovsky Piano Concerto with the orchestra.

New Orleans

MASSIMO FRECCIA, who has recently become permanent conductor of the New Orleans Symphony, has already begun "working on an idea" of touring with the orchestra along the length of the Mississippi River much in the same way Serge Koussevitzky at one time traveled up and down the Volga river on a concert tour. As Mr. Freccia puts it, "There are thousands of large and small communities along the Mississippi. Why not take an orchestra on a long trip up the river? Of course, it could not be done until after the war, but I see great possibilities in the idea. There are some enormous steamers on the Mississippi—big excursion boats that are palatial, with great ballroom decks which could accommodate an orchestra and a large audience." Certainly, good music would thus be brought to many who have never had the opportunity of attending symphony concerts before.

The second annual series of New Orleans summer "pop" concerts, which started June 15th, is being directed by Izler Solomon who, for the first program, conducted a "United Nations" concert in conjunction with the opening of the Fifth War Loan Drive.

Cincinnati

TO celebrate the fiftieth anniversary of the Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra, which takes place in the 1944-45 season, the organization has announced a nationwide competition for the writing of a

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Cleveland

FOR the sixth consecutive season the Cleveland Summer Orchestra, under the direction of Rudolph Ringwall, is presenting a series of "pop" concerts given Wednesday and Saturday evenings.

Detroit

A SERIES of eight Detroit Symphony Twilight Concerts, conducted by Karl Krueger, came to a close July 12th with a Vienna night, in which Robert Stolz, Hertha Glaz and Mario Berini participated. Other soloists of the season were Gladys Swarthout, John Charles Thomas, Ezio Pinza, Oscar Levant and Alec Templeton. The profits of the concerts go to the Maintenance Fund of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra.

Ravinia

ALREADY in this season's Ravinia Festival, Joseph Sziget has appeared as soloist in no less than four concerts, on July 4th, 8th, 11th and 15th, playing concertos respectively by Beethoven, Mozart, Brahms and Mendelssohn. Always a favorite with Chicago audiences, he has been especially warmly received this year. Other soloists to appear will be Rudolf Serkin (July 22nd) and Alexander Brailowsky (August 1st and 15th), pianists; Kerstin Thorborg, mezzo-soprano, and John Garris, tenor. The latter two soloists will sing the Mahler "Song of the Earth" at the concerts of July 20th and 23rd.

The Perfect Host

LOCAL 10, as one means of proving itself the perfect host to the 48th Convention of the American Federation of Musicians, presented on June 5th a complete concert by the Chicago Symphony Orchestra under the direction of Désiré Defauw. Marian Anderson, as soloist, sang two spirituals, "De Gospel Train" and "My Soul's Been Anchored in De Lord", and the arias, "My Heart at Thy Sweet Voice" from "Samson et Dalila" and "O Mio Fernando" from "La Favorita". Orchestra numbers included Berlioz' Overture to "Benvenuto Cellini", Debussy's "The Afternoon of a Faun" and Strauss' tone poem, "Don Juan", Opus 20.

The Women's Symphony Orchestra presented a concert on July 7th, conducted by Jerzy Bojanowski. Grace Moore was soloist.

Minneapolis

THE 1944-45 season of the Minneapolis Symphony Orchestra will open October 18th, Dimitri Mitropoulos continuing as its regular conductor. Instrumentalists already engaged as soloists are Robert Casadesus, Rudolf Serkin, Artur Schnabel, Fritz Kreisler, Jascha Heifetz and Nathan Milstein.

Hollywood

A PROGRAM of summer musical entertainment which the prospectus describes as "fabulous" is the fare of Hollywood Bowl in this its 23rd season of "Symphonies Under the Stars". From July 11th on there will be thirty-seven nights of highly-diversified programs built around the Philharmonic Orchestra which will perform in its complete personnel under the direction of eminent conductors such as Dimitri Mitropoulos, George Szell, Artur Rodzinski and Otto Klemperer.

Marian Anderson will make her Hollywood Bowl debut on July 18th with Mitropoulos conducting. Jascha Heifetz will also be numbered among the soloists, as well as Oscar Levant, Artur Schnabel, Yehudi Menuhin and Joseph Sziget.

Toronto

FOR her Toronto Promenade Concert on June 22nd, the anniversary of the date of Russia's entrance into the war, Bertha Glaz, contralto, chose three Russian songs, including a Red Army song, as tribute to our ally.

Erno Rapée was the guest conductor of the concerts of July 20th and 27th, at which Vivian Della Chiesa and Conrad Thibault were respectively soloists.

News Nuggets

DURING the Fifth War Loan Drive Arturo Toscanini contributed his services as conductor to two War Bond concerts presented by N. B. C.

Henry Fabrizio of the Boston Symphony Orchestra not only plays the cello but actually makes the instruments himself. The first one he fashioned for himself so impressed fellow cellists that he began receiving orders. He uses only the choicest woods and is painstaking in his craftsmanship.

Georges Barrere, considered one of the world's greatest flutists, died in Kingston, New York, on June 14th at the age of 69. To his credit must go at least part of the responsibility for the flute's being put to use as a solo instrument, since his mastery of it proved its artistic expressiveness. Mr. Barrere, as well as playing with the New York Symphony and other important ensembles, made several nationwide concert tours and wrote many articles for magazines and newspapers.

Top-Flight Bands

IT is a matter of conjecture whether swing leaders themselves realize fully the significance in cultural and entertainment value of the music they dispense—that, as a matter of simple record, for instance, together with sky-scraper architecture, animated cartoons and musicals such as “Oklahoma”, “jazz” stands as one of the purely American contributions to world art and culture. However grudgingly top-flight leaders are bound to take the news, jazz is as “highbrow” in its category as works of Bach or Beethoven are in theirs. As a recent article by Paul Eduard Miller and Leonard Feather in *Esquire* puts it, “Jazz bears the same relation to popular music as does classical to light classical music.” This same article gives also two excellent definitions of jazz:

“Jazz is an externalization in musical sounds by men who instinctively ‘feel’ the spirit of the times”, and, “If it is nothing else, good jazz is a type of music which can withstand repeated playing without inciting feelings of boredom and revulsion.”

NEWS from the HOME FRONT

When on June 20th the American Theatre Wing Stage Door Canteen in New York City reopened, a long line of service men who had been waiting outside streamed in and were welcomed by the women of the American Theatre Wing War Service. Their enthusiasm was amply justified. Gone were the crowded conditions that hampered the old canteen. The dance floor oval had been moved into the center of the room, with a fifty-foot extension. To the small tables that dot the place, side wall benches had been added, making room for scores more of seats. The rough plaster posts had become mirrored columns that reflected the dancing couples. At blue and red counters a crew of seventeen girls were serving coffee, tea, pie and 2,500 sandwiches. But perhaps the crowning touch in these sweltering days was the new cooling system warranted to make dancing, eating and other such canteen activities a pleasure.

SYMPHONIC SCHEDULES

As soon as the American forces retake the Philippines, General MacArthur wants

Eugene Ormandy, conductor of the Philadelphia Orchestra, to direct the Manila Symphony Orchestra in a series of "victory" concerts. Mr. Ormandy has accepted the invitation with alacrity.

That the love of symphonic music can survive every adverse circumstance is amply proved by a letter from an American prisoner of war in Germany, received by the Philharmonic-Symphony Society recently. "I am an American officer prisoner of war in Germany", it read. "While in our present difficulty my fellow-officers and I, who before the war were constant listeners to the New York Philharmonic concerts, want to keep in touch with the orchestra, its conductors, soloists and concert schedule. We would be very much obliged if you could make available to us your weekly program notes and your programs for the summer season. Also any current literature about the orchestra will be appreciated. If the intermission commentary is being printed we would like to have it, too. Thanking you very sincerely, I remain, Lieut. T. M. H."

The Philharmonic assures us that the request was filled in record time.

SONG WRITERS, ALL

Zo Elliott, Vermont composer, who wrote that gem of World War I, "There's a Long, Long Trail A-Winding", has written a military march which has been accepted by Gen. Sir Bernard L. Montgomery as a marching song of the British Eighth Army, according to Carl Fischer, Inc., publishers of the music. General Montgomery acknowledged the receipt of the dedication of the march in the following words: "I have received the band score for the march which you have composed for my army, and I am delighted with it. I accept its dedication to the Eighth Army. Thank you very much. Excuse this captured Fascist paper, but it is all I have at the moment. Yours sincerely, Bernard L. Montgomery."

Speaking of song-writers, Pvt. Raymond Rand says he has discovered the secret of how to become one. While in an army hospital in Africa last December, he says, he received two shots of blood plasma, since which time he has written no less than thirty songs. His is a natural conclusion, therefore: "There must have been music in the blood."

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE CHICAGO CONVENTION

Seven Hundred and Fourteen Delegates Attend—Entire Staff of Officers Re-elected.

By CHAUNCEY A. WEAVER

To Chicago, artistic, commercial and industrial colossus of the Middle West, fell the task of entertaining the Forty-eighth Convention of the American Federation of Musicians. This made three occasions upon which she assumed this great undertaking—1918, 1933 and 1944. Specifically, to Local 10 came the honor, the detailed responsibility and the fulfillment.

On Monday, June 5th, at 2:00 P. M., President James C. Petrillo's official gavel fell. For one and one-half hours the assembling delegates and visitors had been regaled with a concert program by the great Chicago Symphony Orchestra, under the direction of Conductor Désiré Defauw, orchestral numbers being interspersed with vocal numbers by the incomparable Marian Anderson.

"The Star-Spangled Banner" for American members, and "God Save the King" for their Canadian affiliates, and the Convention was under way, in the Grand Ball Room of the Stevens Hotel. The invocation was delivered by Dr. John Thompson, long-time pastor of Chicago Methodist Temple. William Kowalski, chairman of the Local Entertainment Committee, then assumed charge and addressed a cordial

welcome to all. Mayor Edward J. Kelly, long-time friend and civic associate of President Petrillo, extended felicitations in behalf of the city. Sheriff Mulcahey, of Cook County, brought reassuring words to all visitors who might become innocently involved. Victor A. Olander, Secretary-Treasurer of the Illinois State Federation of Labor, pledged to the musicians whole-hearted support in their pending fight against the competition of mechanical music. Former President Joseph N. Weber was introduced and reviewed the early struggles of the musicians, after which President Petrillo delivered his opening address. President Roosevelt sent a telegram of good wishes, after which Mr. Joe Hansen of the District Council of Carpenters, presented President Petrillo with a gavel, ominous in its potentialities for the enforcement of order. This was followed by a roll-call of delegates which revealed that 714 Federationists had presented credentials of authority under which they were entitled to have a part in the transaction of the official business of the convention.

From this point on will appear a routine report of each day's convention proceedings. For a more intimate review of events of the week you are referred to "Over Federation Field".

He addresses the Convention and states that he is glad to be among his friends. He reads a telegram from President Roosevelt, which is applauded by the delegates.

He makes a full explanation of the recording situation.

He refers to President Green of the A. F. of L. as having done a grievous wrong to the A. F. of M. when he attempted to interfere with the internal affairs of our organization.

President Petrillo explains the workings of the War Labor Board. At the close of his address he was cheered.

Mr. Joseph Hansen, vice-president of the Chicago Federation of Labor, District Council of Carpenters, presents a gavel to President Petrillo.

Opera and Operetta

OPERA returned to the Lewisohn Stadium, New York, June 26th when Verdi's "Aida" was presented with an all-Metropolitan Opera cast under the direction of Alexander Smallens. It was repeated the following evening. Zinka Milanov, Bruna Castagna, Kurt Baum and Alexander Sved sang the leading roles. "La Traviata" was given on June 30th and July 1st with Bidu Sayao as Violetta, Jan Peerce as Alfredo and Alexander Sved as Germont.

Summer opera in Chicago, too, will feature these two operas, with an added one, "Il Trovatore". Fortune Gallo and Harry Zelzer are the promoters of the out-of-door operatic series which, in Soldiers Field on July 21st, 22nd and 23rd, will present these operas with casts made up principally of singers from Mr. Gallo's San Carlo Opera Company, including Stella Andruva, Elda Ercole, Anna Kaskas, Sydney Rayner, Mario Palermo, George Czaplicki, Mostyn Thomas, Stefan Ballarini and Harold Kravitt. George Schick is the musical director.

Piedmont Festival

DONIZETTI'S "A Daughter of the Regiment" will be presented during the course of the Piedmont Festival of Music and Art which is to be held in Winston-Salem, North Carolina, July 19th through 23rd. George King Raudenbush will direct that and all other musical events of the week.

Autumn Plans

WITH all performances in English and casts of young American singers, the Philadelphia Opera Company plans a seventh season, in which four operas, "Tosca", "The Marriage of Figaro", "La Boheme" and "The Merry Widow", the latter in entirely new production, will be given in Philadelphia during March and April. The company will also undertake a twenty-week tour, under the management of S. Hurok, which will begin in October and include engagements across the entire continent. David Hocker has been re-engaged as the company's general manager.

Assuming his first operatic post in this country, George Sebastian, Hungarian-born conductor, is scheduled to conduct the San Francisco Opera Company in that city and in Los Angeles this Fall.

The Metropolitan Opera Association announces that it has engaged Erich Kleiber, distinguished Austrian conductor, to take the place of Bruno Walter, the latter having departed for a year's vacation after directing on the podiums of various symphony and opera orchestras for fifty years. Mr. Kleiber has directed the New York Philharmonic-Symphony and other orchestras in this country, and in Europe was conductor of the Berlin State Opera. Born in Vienna in 1890 he held various posts of importance in Europe until 1936 when he resigned his Berlin post and left that Nazified country with his wife and two children and with exactly forty marks in his pocket, the equivalent of about \$10.00, or all the capital the German authorities would permit him to take out of the country.

G. I. Joe's Fare in Algiers

THE Opera House in Algiers, North Africa, kept open until the middle of July this year, instead of as usual suspending in May, in order to provide entertainment for the men in service. Despite all kinds of wartime difficulties the Opera House maintained an uncommonly varied repertoire, having staged no fewer than thirty-four separate productions—seven plays, ten operettas and seventeen operas.

Mexico City Season

WITH a varied repertoire and a cast that compares favorably with the Metropolitan roster, the National Opera season in Mexico City opened June 14th with Wagner's "Tristan und Isolde". Conductors for the series include Gaetano Merola, Jean Morel, Jascha Horenstein, Guido Picco, Carl Alwin and Ignacio del Castillo.

Curtain Call

THE honorary degree of music has recently been conferred on Fausto Cleva, general artistic director of the Chicago Opera Company, by the College of Music of Cincinnati. Mr. Cleva has been musical director of the Cincinnati Summer Opera for the past ten years.

"The Sunken Garden"

DR. ERIC SORANTIN, for many seasons conductor of the Chicago Little Philharmonic Orchestra, has been engaged as musical director of the San Antonio Civic Opera Company which is presenting a summer series of operettas at the open air theatre, "The Sunken Garden". The

opening performance of "Rio Rita" on June 15th, 16th and 17th with Marita Farrell of the Metropolitan Opera Company as leading soprano proved unusually successful as was Friml's operetta, "My Maryland" given July 13th, 14th and 15th. Operettas yet to be given are "New Moon", "Mile. Modiste", "Desert Song", and "Rose Marie".

Opera Writers, Attention

An award of \$1,000—as an encouragement toward writing of a short American opera—has been offered by the Alice M. Ditson Fund of Columbia University and the Metropolitan Opera Association. The manuscripts must be in the judges' hands by September 1, 1945, and the com-

posers must submit full orchestral as well as piano and vocal scores. Only native and naturalized Americans will be acceptable as competitors. The sponsors stipulate not only that the opera be suitable for production at the Metropolitan but also that it have an English text and be not over seventy-five minutes in length. Full details may be obtained from Eric T. Clarke, administrative secretary, Metropolitan Opera Association, Inc., New York 18, New York.

"Song of Norway"

"SONG OF NORWAY", based on the life and music of the illustrious Norwegian composer, Edvard Grieg, and created especially for the Los Angeles and San Francisco Light Opera Associations, proved to be a hit when given by the Los Angeles Civic Light Opera Association last month. One of the critics in his "first-night" write-up described the occasion as the "most significant premiere held here in some years." The operetta is based on a story of Homer Curran. Robert Wright and George Forrest are responsible for the musical adaptation and lyrics.

Experimental Opera

OUT-OF-DOOR SUMMER OPERA will be introduced to Indianapolis on an experimental basis with the three-night presentation July 21st, 22nd and 23rd of "The Pirates of Penzance" in Garfield Park's amphitheatre as a cooperative venture between the sponsoring committee and the Indianapolis Department of Public Parks. The success of the series will pave the way for a permanent summer light opera organization.

Grand Rapids

THE Grand Rapids Municipal Opera Company opened its season at the Ramona Park theatre July 3rd, with "Naughty Marietta". Subsequent offerings are "Roberta", "Robin Hood", "Rosalie", "New Moon", "Hit the Deck", "Babes in Toyland" and "Vagabond King", the last named to run two weeks.

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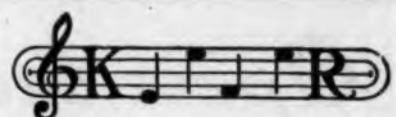

Convention Gives Unqualified Approval

AFTER the recording ban went into effect on August 1st, 1942, the country was flooded with newspaper articles, editorials and cartoons, all part of an organized campaign of vilification and scurrility against President Petrillo and the Executive Board. The large majority of the attacks were aimed at President Petrillo, making him appear as a dictator who had forced the Federation to do his bidding, notwithstanding the fact that the ban was the result of the insistent demand of our entire membership for relief from the competitive use of recordings by many persons who employed no live musicians yet got the benefit of their services.

In spite of all the attacks, which in the main consisted of prejudiced untruths, the President and Executive Board stood firm in carrying out the mandates of numerous conventions and fought our enemies through the courts, up to the Supreme Court of the United States, which tribunal upheld our position. Then the interests, some of whom never employed a live musician, forced the matter before a sub-committee of the United States Senate and also before the War Labor Board, which latter body has just handed down a decision apparently not in our favor, but which in reality decides nothing.

The hearings before the panel of the War Labor Board developed the interesting fact that the National Association of Broadcasters, generally known as N. A. B. (the majority of whose members employ no musicians in their radio stations), which was not even a party to the proceedings and therefore had no official standing in the case, paid for all the expensive exhibits introduced in evidence in the case by the transcription companies. These consisted of charts and graphs made up of statistics gathered by N. A. B., and it was admitted that N. A. B. had financed the proceedings on behalf of the companies.

It is to be noted that, whereas more than eighty companies who have signed our contracts admit a responsibility for the plight of the musician whose employment is reduced due to mechanical competition and are willing to assist in its alleviation, two recalcitrant companies, though they admit there is such a problem, with callous indifference declare it "none of their business".

Attempts were made to bring discord into our ranks by stories that our President was not acting in the best interests of the members and that our by-laws gave him dictatorial powers, with the intimation that these laws were passed at his instigation, whereas it is well known that they existed long before he became President.

The old game of waving the flag was also indulged in by our enemies. We were supposed to be unpatriotic notwithstanding the facts that nearly one-third of our entire membership is in the armed services, that we have contributed millions of dollars in services for the armed forces and are continuing to do so and that the ban did not hinder the war effort in the least. We continued to make records for the use of the men in service and have many letters from governmental agencies attesting their appreciation of our help.

Instead of having the desired effect these distortions only served to solidify our Federation. We have always been a unified organization and can boast that our members were never more loyal than during the past two years. Knowing the truth they stand foursquare behind our President in the realization that he is carrying out the wishes of the rank and file of the membership.

If any evidence were needed that musicians have full confidence in their officers it was furnished by their reelection at our Convention in Chicago a few weeks ago. (Incidentally—and this came as a surprise to Senator Clark*, father of the Senate Investigation into the affairs of the Federation, who learned of it first during the hearing before the Senate Sub-Committee—our by-laws provide for nomination for office from the floor of the Convention, instead of by an intervening nomination committee, which is the method used in many organizations to control elections by a small group.) Further proof of confidence of members was provided by the following resolutions which were spontaneously introduced and unanimously adopted:

RESOLUTION No. 43.

(This resolution directs that no members play for recordings except in conformity with the existing contracts. It is a mandate to the President and the Executive Board to continue in the same manner as heretofore, and ratification of everything that has been done in the recording situation.)

WHEREAS, The Convention of the American Federation of Musicians, held at Seattle, Washington, in June, 1941, instructed the officers of the Federation to take appropriate action to abolish the evil of unemployment created by the use of mechanized music; and,

WHEREAS, President Petrillo of the Federation reported to the Convention of the Federation at Dallas, Texas, in June, 1942, that the Executive Board was prepared to take action in the matter by terminating all licenses for all musical services in connection with the making and manufacture of recordings and transcriptions, and

WHEREAS, The American Federation of Musicians did on June 21, 1942, send written notice to all persons engaged in manufacturing and making of records and transcriptions to the effect that after August 1, 1942, musicians would no longer work in the making and manufacturing of recordings and transcriptions which had the effect of displacing live musicians; and,

WHEREAS, On August 1, 1942, all employment of that character terminated, and no demands were made upon employers, and the same was a complete severance and termination of the employment relationship; and,

WHEREAS, Subsequently, some of the former employers did agree to employ members of the American Federation of Musicians in the making of transcriptions and records upon terms and conditions embodied in certain agreements, one of which is known as the "Decca" agreement, and another is known as the "Four Employer Contract", and the making of said agreements being instigated by Government agencies, and

WHEREAS, Other companies are desirous of employing members of the American Federation of Musicians in the making and manufacturing of records,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That no member or members of the American Federation of Musicians shall take employment or become employed in the making and manufacturing of records and transcriptions upon terms and conditions different from those prescribed in the "Decca" contract or in the "Four Employer Contract"; and the officers of the American Federation of Musicians hereby stand instructed to refrain from entering into any contracts or agreements with any person, company, or employer who seeks the services of any musicians in the making of records and transcriptions unless such person, company or employer enters into a written agreement with the Federation embodying the same terms and conditions now included in the "Decca" contract and the "Four Employer Contract", and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Convention now in session hereby ratifies and confirms all acts of the officers and the Executive Board of the Federation heretofore taken on the subject referred to in this resolution.

RESOLUTION OF APPRECIATION

(This resolution was introduced and sponsored by all the colored delegates to the Convention and is further evidence of the unanimity of opinion among the members.)

WHEREAS, In the past two years our honored President, James C. Petrillo, has done everything possible to carry out the mandates of the National Conventions of the A. F. of M., and

WHEREAS, In the course of his activity as President, he has ever been militant in fighting for the common interests of all members of the Federation, regardless of race, creed, color or national origin, and

WHEREAS, In the interest of good faith and fair dealing, we the undersigned, here and now resolve to let the people of our nation know of our feeling toward President James C. Petrillo, our honored Chief Executive, and

WHEREAS, Because of the most unfavorable publicity he has received at the hands of the enemies of organized labor, as well as the press and syndicated newspapers and periodicals, who have sought along with many others, high in the government of our country, to discredit his acts, with the hope of gaining public favor—further to attempt to destroy the high morale of the members of our organization:—

* While the investigation was supposed to be impartial, Senator Clark assumed the role of prosecutor of President Petrillo. Also strange was the fact that, while the witnesses for the Federation were put under oath, the witnesses against it were not required to conform to this formality. Of such strange things are Senatorial investigations made. Senator D. Worth Clark, we might add, was recently defeated for renomination.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That we, the representative delegates to this Forty-eighth Convention, do hereby give our President a sincere vote of confidence. Be it further resolved, that we delegates concur in all former acts of our honored President. We herewith pray that the rich blessings of God Almighty be upon him, giving him strength, wisdom and understanding that he might continue the great work before him, that of raising the cultural values of the art of music, along with greater opportunities for economic advancement, and the perpetuation of our time-honored Federation.

RESOLUTION No. 19.

(This resolution is also a pledge of confidence to our President, calling specific attention to the fact that his actions were the result of instructions of the Convention in Seattle in 1941.)

WHEREAS, We, the members of the Corpus Christi Musicians' Association, Local 644, A. F. of M., have received the written reports of President James C. Petrillo regarding the canned music fight, through the medium of the International Musician, and

WHEREAS, We have learned through the reports of the action he has taken to place before certain groups the right of our membership to be protected, and

WHEREAS, In his reports he has given the officers of the A. F. of M. full credit for their support in this fight, as well as the membership as a whole;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That at this National Convention of the American Federation of Musicians, the delegates present wholeheartedly endorse his reports, his actions, as per instructions of the Forty-sixth Annual Convention of the American Federation of Musicians in Seattle, Washington, and the results he has obtained, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Convention here assembled give our President a rising vote of thanks and confidence at the time this resolution is adopted.

This should be sufficient answer to those who have been defaming our President. It should prove conclusively that the recording ban is an expression of the will of our entire membership and that the manner in which it has been conducted has its whole-hearted approval.

Public sentiment which was swayed by the misrepresentations of a biased and unfriendly press is turning in our favor, as the truth forces its way into the open. The knowledge that we are right strengthens our purpose to continue the fight until we achieve our goal.

New Laws and Changes

The following are important New Laws and changes in the By-Laws of the American Federation of Musicians, adopted and ratified by the 1944 Convention. They will become effective September 15th, 1944, and all members are directed to govern themselves accordingly.

Conditional Membership Abolished

Due to neutral jurisdictions being eliminated the granting of Conditional Membership has been abolished.

Correction in Transfer Law

Change the words "one week" on line 3 of paragraph 2 of Section 10, Article XII, page 113, to read "two weeks". This corrects the verbiage and makes it consistent with the law.

National Secretary to Notify Locals When Claims Are Filed Against Establishments in Their Jurisdictions

In all instances where claims are entered by out-of-town musicians against establishments in which they have played, the National Secretary's Office shall immediately notify the local of that fact.

Simplifying the Laws of the Federation

The Executive Board has been instructed to codify and simplify the laws and index at the earliest opportunity.

Leaders and Agents Must Notify Local Where They May Be Located

On arrival in the jurisdiction of a local where an engagement is to be played, the leader or his agent must advise the local secretary of the place where the leader and agent may be located.

Changes by President to Be Published

Whenever the President under his powers in an emergency promulgates an amendment to the Constitution or By-Laws such change shall be printed in the first issue of the *International Musician* after the effective date of promulgation.

The Indiana State Conference was held
at Kokomo, in the ballroom of the Labor
Temple, Sunday, May 28, 1944. Twelve
locals out of the state's twenty-four were
represented, as follows:

and unprecedented conditions. The 30 per
cent tax which was the latest incubus to
be attached to the mechanism of modern
existence; the reduction in local active
personnel; the great difficulty in making
public officials appreciate the right to pro-
fessional recognition which is an inherent
right—these were issues which were dis-
cussed with intelligent force and in good
temper throughout the session.

The Conference was in session from
10:00 o'clock forenoon to 4:30 afternoon.
At noon, an hour was set aside in which
to partake of a magnificent chicken din-
ner at the Courtland Hotel.

Henry, the "Fitz", Field Representa-
tive, of Cleveland, gave an interesting re-
view of the conditions disclosed by visita-
tion to various sections of his territory.

Executive Officer Weaver reviewed the
long-drawn-out battles which the Interna-
tional Executive Board has been com-
pelled to wage during the past two years,

but did his best to paint a silver lining
to the prospects which lie ahead—if the
Federal powers that be will consent to
remove the impedimenta which they have
seen fit to lay across our path.

Resolutions of appreciation of the fine
entertainment provided were adopted by
unanimous vote.

The Conference election resulted in the
following selection of officers for the en-
suing year: President, L. B. Elmore of
Lafayette; Vice-President, Francis Eck-
stein of Elkhart; Secretary, C. R. Coving-
ton of Anderson; Treasurer, Fay Bloss
of South Bend; Board of Trustees, E. C.
Souders of Muncie, Elmer Kruse of Indi-
anapolis, Ralph Hutto of Kokomo.

The oath of office to the new officers
was administered by the writer.

The next State Conference was set for
the last Sunday in April, 1945, at South
Bend.

is officered as follows: President, Walter
Sparks; Vice-President, Walter Aspy; Sec-
retary, Ralph Hutto; Treasurer and Busi-

ensuing year resulted as follows: Presi-

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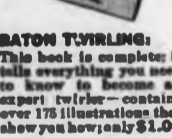

One of the musical delights of the Convention period was the pipe organ playing of Mr. F. LeRoy Nelson, a Chicago native son, and member of Local 10 since 1919. His repertoire was as amplitudinous and variegated as the world-wide range of musical composition. Classical, modernistic, and the unusual responded to his touch with equal felicity; and the two daily programs both had large crowds of attentive and appreciative listeners.

It was a pleasure to have A. R. Teta appear upon a national Convention scene once more. For an extended period he has functioned as Chief Supervisor and Inspector of Band Instruments Section, at Atlanta, Georgia. He has relinquished that position to become secretary-treasurer of the United States Army and Navy Bandmen's Association, Inc., where he can be reached through P. O. Box 1826, New Haven, Connecticut. To meet him again was to span once more past years through which he has come apparently hale and hearty and zealous in the cause in which he has been so long engaged.

Many delegates propounded the query, "Where will we go from here?"

To appreciate how Chicago has grown, one should read a description of the city at the time Abraham Lincoln was first nominated for the Presidency in the Wigwam, which had been erected for that historic event, in 1860.

Anyone carrying the patronymical embellishment of Désiré DeFauw must be endowed with a high-grade of genius. The one we have in mind is surely in that class. We refer to the new conductor of the Chicago Symphony Orchestra. This great organization had its foundations laid under the leadership of Theodore Thomas. When Thomas passed away, the viola player in the orchestra, "to fortune and to fame unknown", was called to the position thus vacated. As usual there were lifted eyebrows of apprehension, whisperings of suspicious dissent, and clamorous tongues opining that the young Frederick Stock would never do. Well, he did do for something like a third of a century; and brought this notable company of instrumentalists to a world-wide fame. Stock's hour of translation came and the new conductor, above named, assumed the baton of leadership. Some of Chicago's tinsel-winged newspaper critics are filling their allotted space with the barbed-wire tips of their high and lofty animadversions. We venture to say that the one and one-half hour concert given by the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, on the opening day of the recent Convention, was looked upon by delegates and visitors as a great event, an enriching experience, and that the new man at the helm made a profound and lasting impression. All hail to Désiré DeFauw!

Color is not a handicap to Marian Anderson. Modestly and with calm poise her very soul seems to lift upward on the wings of song. It is no exaggeration to say that she held her convention audience spellbound. Her recalls were numerous. She was generous in response. Long may she live to make her inspiring contributions of melody to all races of the world.

Local 10 was determined to see to it that there was no lack of fine band and orchestra music. Think of crowding into a single week such an array of high-class musical organizations as the following:

- Chicago Symphony Orchestra, Director, Désiré DeFauw.
- Dyett's Concert Band, Leader, Captain Walter Dyett.
- Women's Symphony Orchestra, Conductor, Jerzy Bojanowski.
- Cavallo's Symphonic Band, Director, Peter A. Cavallo.
- Board of Trade's American Legion Band, Leader, Colonel Armin F. Hand.
- Red Saunders and his Band, Leader, Red Saunders.

With eminent propriety this might have been called "A week of musical saturation". Inspiring, glorious, memorable!

Too bad the blackguard and character-assassinating press could not have heard President Petrillo's address and the ovation accorded him on the opening Convention day. However, it is difficult to make impressions on empty skulls.

What thanks we owe to officers and men for giving us a week we'll ne'er forget! But language fails us—much to our regret! Our hats are off to Local No. 10!

NEW LAWS AND CHANGES

(Continued from Page Twelve)

Charter to Lapse When Local Membership Becomes Less Than Fifteen

When the membership of any local becomes less than fifteen bona fide members in good standing the charter of such local shall automatically lapse and the members in good standing of such local shall have the right to join the nearest local without payment of initiation fee.

Leader to Be Permitted to Cancel Management Contract If Average Earnings Are Not Maintained

Compliance with the twenty weeks within six months work provision required by Federation contracts shall be deemed fulfilled by booking agents only if the latter shall have offered the artist twenty weeks engagements within each six months period at a scale in reasonable conformity with the average earnings of the artist during the preceding six months period.

New Opera Scale Where Price of Choicest Seat Does Not Exceed \$4.00 and Also Where It Does Not Exceed \$3.00

Section 5 of Article XIII is changed from "... each week, per man, \$100.00" to read "... each week, per man, \$115.00".

Section 6 of Article XIII is changed from "... does not exceed \$2.00, ... each week, per man, \$85.00" to read "... does not exceed \$3.00, ... each week, per man, \$100.00."

A new Section 7 is added providing "Where the price of the choicest seat (exclusive of box seats) does not exceed \$2.00, for not more than seven performances each week, per man, \$90.00."

To the third line on page 137 add "Section 7, pro rata".

Change the seventh line on page 137 which now reads "Sections 5 and 6—\$2.00 per hour or less" to read "Sections 5, 6 and 7—\$2.00 per hour or less".

Change line 21 on page 137 which now reads: "Sections 5 and 6—not less than \$66.00 for one or two rehearsals per day" to read "Sections 5, 6 and 7—not less than \$66.00 for one or two rehearsals per day".

Contracts of Employment Must Contain the Following New Clauses:

"Any member or members who are parties to or affected by this contract, whose services thereunder or covered thereby, are prevented, suspended or stopped by reason of any strike, ban, unfair list order or requirement of the Federation shall be free to accept and engage in other employment of the same or similar character, or otherwise, for other employers or persons without any restraint, hindrance, penalty, obligation or liability whatever, any other provisions of this contract to the contrary notwithstanding."

"All contracts of any character or nature for the rendition of musical services are subject to all the existing and future provisions of the Federation's Constitution, By-Laws, Rules and Regulations, and all amendments thereto, all of which are made part hereof, with the same force and effect as if they were incorporated herein in full, and in the event of any inconsistency or conflict the provisions of such Constitution, By-Laws, Rules and Regulations shall control."

Members Are Not Permitted to Take Employment for Recordings Under Conditions Different From Those Prescribed by Present Federation Recording Contracts

No member or members of the American Federation of Musicians shall take employment or become employed in the making and manufacturing of records and transcriptions upon terms and conditions different from those prescribed in the "Decca" contract or in the "Four Employer Contract"; and the officers of the American Federation of Musicians hereby stand instructed to refrain from entering into any contracts or agreements with any

person, company, or employer who seeks the services of any musicians in the making of records and transcriptions unless such person, company or employer enters into a written agreement with the Federation embodying the same terms and conditions now included in the "Decca" contract and the "Four Employer Contract".

The Convention now in session hereby ratifies and confirms all acts of the officers and the Executive Board of the Federation heretofore taken on the subject referred to in this resolution.

A New Law Designating Through Whom Members May Accept Engagements

Members of the American Federation of Musicians are permitted to solicit, negotiate or accept engagement to play in bands or orchestras ONLY from employers who engage or employ them through a leader, another member, or other persons, who for this purpose shall be considered the agent or agents of such employer. Provided that members may contract personally with a symphony orchestra management.

If a member violates this section the violation shall constitute and be considered as his resignation from the American Federation of Musicians and the local or locals in which he holds membership.

Taverns and Inland River Boats Added to Traveling Engagements Under Article XIII

Taverns and inland river boats are added to the type of engagements which are considered traveling engagements and should be added to the word "inns" on lines 11 and 20 on page 121, Article XIII.

Traveling Members Must Be in Possession of a Membership Card or Receipt

Article XIII formerly provided that traveling members produce a paid-up card. The law has now been changed so that members must on demand produce either a membership card or a receipt showing current quarter paid in local or locals in which they hold membership.

Fifth War Loan

Two resolutions were introduced having to do with the purchase of War Bonds. A substitute for these resolutions recommended by the committee and passed by the Convention urged and recommended that the American Federation of Musicians and all of its locals and members purchase War Bonds to the fullest extent of their ability to pay.

Locals to Receive Share of Radio Tax

Article X, Section D, Paragraph 2, is amended to provide that 20 per cent of the radio tax collected thereunder is to be returned to the local and 80 per cent to be retained by the Federation.

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DECISION OF NATIONAL WAR LABOR BOARD

(Continued from Page One)

Our contracts with the eighty-nine companies read that if we give a better deal to anyone else, they are entitled to get the same deal. How can we record for two companies which have not signed up and still require eighty-nine companies which have signed up, to pay the Federation so much per record? If we record for Columbia and RCA-Victor, we may lose the eighty-nine contracts now in force. To permit our members to work for these two companies without a contract would give an unfair competitive advantage to these two companies.

I desire to emphasize the fact that the agreements executed by the eighty-nine companies were accepted by us at the insistence of the Fact Finding Panel which was appointed by the War Labor Board, and was urged as a solution to the existing controversy. Now, it repudiates itself and its Panel by refusing to impose the same obligation on two stubborn employers who, during the hearings, agreed to the principle involved and later rejected that approval. The attitude of these two recording companies was, no doubt, inspired by the National Association of Broadcasters, Wall Street and the National Association of Manufacturers.

I should like to point out that we did not ask the War Labor Board to order anyone to give us anything. Even now, we do not ask the War Labor Board to direct these two powerful and wealthy corporations to sign the same agreement that Decca and eighty-eight other companies have signed. Our position before the War Labor Board was that it should not permit these two companies, which have fought a solution to the problem of unemployment in the musical field for years, to obtain a competitive advantage over eighty-nine other companies which have agreed to make a limited payment per record to the American Federation of Musicians for an employment fund. We also asked the War Labor Board to abstain from imposing upon us a condition of involuntary servitude.

People who are informed in labor history, and who know how employers have fought labor unions in the past, have stated to me and to others, that no companies ever fought the principles embodied in the Decca and similar contracts, as viciously as RCA-Victor and Columbia have fought us in our efforts to have these principles adopted.

The War Labor Board, however, has ruled that the "ban" should be lifted so that our members will be free to record for RCA-Victor and Columbia, even though these companies have refused to sign the same form of contract as Decca and the others have signed. The Board has further recommended that negotiations be resumed with these companies in an effort to settle the controversy.

With respect to the Smith-Connelly Act—we do not come within its provisions because employment was severed many months prior to the passage of this Act. As a matter of fact, the Executive Board action was taken on October 1, 1941, following which our people quit their employment and severed the relationship of employer and employee.

With respect to labor's no-strike pledge, it applies only to the relationship of employer and employee. There can be no strike without an immediate and proximate relationship of employer and employee. I may say that this subject was discussed at the Convention of the

American Federation of Labor at Toronto. The American Federation of Labor unanimously went on record in support of our position in proclaiming and maintaining the so-called "ban". This emphasizes the fact that the "no-strike pledge" does not apply to this controversy.

Our position at all times has been that we are not a war industry, nor are we in any manner impeding the war effort. These companies are working at full capacity in making recordings. The American Federation of Musicians has made records for the Government from the time the "ban" was placed until the present moment and will continue to do so.

In conclusion, the ban remains in effect by order of the Chicago Convention until such time as RCA-Victor and Columbia execute the same form of contract that Decca and the eighty-eight other companies have signed. Neither the President nor the International Executive Board of the American Federation of Musicians has power or authority to reverse this action. Members will be governed accordingly:

All of Mr. Berlin's moves on the checkerboard of the music industry have been predicated upon the conviction that music dealers of the country constitute the cornerstone of the music business. Having long specialized in the sales promotion of quality lines, Mr. Berlin may be considered an expert in that field. Experiences of the Gibson company in war production, in which notable achievements were recognized with the award of the Army-Navy "E" recently, have convinced the management that the elimination of all problems of sale and distribution will permit the factory to scale new heights of quality and efficiency.

Schillinger System

Walter Fischer, president of Carl Fischer, Inc., today announced that contracts had been signed for publication of the internationally famous treatise on musical theory known as the Schillinger System of Musical Composition. Written and developed by the late Joseph Schillinger, scientific and musical genius who died last year, the contents of the celebrated manuscript are known at present only to a limited group of outstanding composers and arrangers who studied with Schillinger.

The complete roster of Schillinger students reads like a "Who's Who" in American music. Big name bandleaders include Benny Goodman, Will Bradley, Jack Miller, conductor for Kate Smith; Lyn Murray, Paul Lavalie, leader of the

Lower Basin Street Symphony; Alvino Rey and Glenn Miller, whose song hit, "Moonlight Serenade", was first written as an exercise for Schillinger.

Among the song writers, George Gershwin was a pupil of Schillinger for four and a half years. Vernon Duke, musical comedy composer of the current army show, "Tars and Spars", and Matty Malneck, writer of "Star Dust", were pupils of the theorist.

In its present form, the Schillinger manuscript consists of twenty-five volumes of about 3,000 typewritten pages. Book I deals with Schillinger's Theory of Rhythm, which he regarded as basic to his system. Succeeding books cover every phase of musical theory and practice, including melody writing, pitch scales, counterpoint, harmony, evolution of musical styles, instrumentology and orchestration.

When he set out on his journey of discovery, Schillinger's first effort was to find whether or not the music of the conceded great composers—Bach, Mozart, Beethoven, Wagner—was constructed on rational principles. To thousands of actual works of these "greats", Schillinger applied the powerful instrument of advanced mathematical and scientific analysis. As a result Schillinger discovered principles which, for the most part, were entirely unsuspected by previous theorists.

Negotiations for the publication of the Schillinger manuscript were conducted by Mr. Fischer himself and Mr. Arthur Hauser, sales manager of Carl Fischer, Inc. The work is to be put into immediate production.
