Teenage Head album half way to gold in 1st month

Toronto: Attic recording group Teenage Head have achieved sales of over 25,000 units on their new album for the Toronto-based independent label. The album, titled Frantic City, is the group's second release and their debut for Attic. The set, produced at Toronto's Kensington Sound by veteran guitarist Stacy Heydon, has been receiving medium to heavy airplay rotation from all key AOR stations in the country. Also receiving heavy airplay is the album's first single, Something On My Mind/Let's Shake. Frantic City was released one month ago.

Teenage Head, who hail from Hamilton, Ontario, are currently in the midst of a major club and concert tour of western Canada. Stops on the tour include Winnipeg, Red River and Brandon, Manitoba, Regina, Moose Jaw and Estevan, Saskatchewan, Calgary, Edmonton and Vancouver. The final date on the tour is a return to Winnipeg to perform at the Playhouse May 2.



THE CANADIAN BRASS AND FRIENDS

Unexplored Territory - Moss Music Group/CBC Series MMG-1119 Easy Listening S. L. \$8.98 With friends Don Gillis (piano), Erica Goodman (harp) and guitarists Liona Boyd and Brian Russell, Canada's most famous brass quintet have indeed explored some new territory. Well-known classical works by Bach, Satie and Handel are modernized and given the Canadian Brass treatment, as is Amazing Grace. The tunes are rendered with fun and imagination, and are backed amply by the rhythm section of bassist Tom Szczesniak, drummer Brian Leonard and guitarist Rob Piltch. The album also features two pieces by Gillis, The Joust and En Sueno. Quite noteworthy is Bourbon Street Medley, a brassy tribute to Tin Pan Alley. Recorded at Soundstage, Toronto, the LP was produced by Paul Mills for the CBC.

Actress Bernadette Peters is in fine voice on her first long player. She is daring, both on the album jacket (in a sexy Vargas painting) and on vinyl, opening the album with an unaccompanied intro to If You Were The Only Boy. Both this cut and the last You'll Never Know were recorded live at A&M Studios. Peters concentrates her efforts on pretty ballads and excels at her task. She does a good job on tracks like Other Lady and the current 50's-ish single, Gee Whiz. She also turns in a credible performance on faster tunes like Heartquake and Chico's Girl.

Reedman Bill Smith, formerly of the All Time Sound Effects Orchestra, the Avant Garde Jazz Revival Band and CCMC, has put together a trio with violinist David Prentice and bassist/cellist David Lee. Smith handles soprano and sopranino sax and alto clarinet, and wrote the four cuts on the album. The music is free avant garde jazz, very reminiscent of the Anthony Braxton school of playing. In fact, Interludes, which clocks in at just over 21 minutes and occupies all of side two, is dedicated to Braxton. The other cuts have individual dedications as well. The album was recorded at McLear Place, Toronto on December 11, and was produced by Onari Productions. Cover design by Bill Smith.

Anne Murray on tour

Toronto: Canada's songbird Anne Murray is currently on a three-month concert tour of the United States. The newest album by this year's four-time Juno winner is Somebody's Waiting, released by Capitol in April. Murray's new single, Lucky Me, is bulleting up the RPM singles chart, the RPM Adult Oriented playlist, and is also in the top 20 on the RPM country chart. Murray kicked off the release of Somebody's Waiting with an appearance on NBC's Saturday Night Live, hosted by Burt Reynolds, April 12.

In April, Anne Murray appeared in concert in New England, New York and the Deep South in the U.S. Her eleven-city tour in May takes in Atlanta, Georgia and Great Falls, Montana, and will include her first engagement at Nashville's prestigious Grand Ole Opry. Also scheduled is a feature interview on ABC's Good Morning America and a guest shot on the Mac Davis Special, slated for broadcast May 22 on NBC. June will find Murray in Monte Carlo for the taping of two TV shows; she is the only guest star on Kris Kristofferson's special. After her return from Europe, Murray is slated for a four-nighter at the Greek Theatre in Los Angeles, prior to which she will have her 'star inserted in Hollywood's Walkway of Stars near the legendary intersection of Hollywood Blvd. and Vine St.

(21), Sydney (22), Halifax (23), Saint John's (25) and ending in St. John's, Newfoundland on April 26.

Their May Day concert will be held in Brandon followed by Yorkton (2), Regina (3), Saskatoon (5), Lethbridge (6), Castlebar (7), Victoria (9), Vancouver (10), and Kamloops on the 11th. Alberta dates will be Edmonton (13) and Calgary (14) with the tour officially coming to a close in Winnipeg May 16.

Paul White exits Balmur

Music industry veteran Paul White has announced that he is leaving the Toronto-based management firm Balmur Ltd., effective June 1. White has been with the firm since 1978, and as Director of Creative Development, was closely involved in the careers of such artists as Anne Murray, John Allan Cameron and Bruce Murray. He also administered Balmur's publishing activities. Before joining Balmur, White spent over 20 years with Capitol-EMI in advertising, promotion and A&R. While there, he won four straight RPM Year End and Gold Leaf Awards.

In announcing his resignation, White explained, "I have designed my career growth with the clear objective of one day being in the position to bring together and utilize my allround experience in the entertainment industry. An exciting opportunity was recently presented to me, and I am about to become associated

Backstage Productions signs Ronnie Hawkins

Toronto: Backstage Productions have announced the signing of Ronnie Hawkins to a worldwide management deal. The agreement was celebrated with Hawkins' return from Europe and a media party at Shortt's Restaurant on April 16. The event was covered by CITY-TV and is due

to appear on The New Music in the near future. Backstage's Steve Thomson and Ross Munro were pleased with the results of the appearance at Shortt's and are planning record release dates and tour plans for the near future.

One of the most widespread panels at the 3DIM was the Tuesday session on industry administration. Moderated by CBS Canada VP Stan Kulin, the panel brought together several of the major forces in the Canadian recording industry - Quality President George Struth, WEA Executive VP Ross Reynolds, Capitol's Bob Rowe and Ed Preston, VP and GM at RCA Canada.

With a very general topic area, and a thorough sampling of the industry to comment and answer questions, the panel covered many areas of interest. Kulin opened the session by commenting that while the dollar is up 100% in the last seven years, the price of records is up only 39%, a noteworthy fact conconcerning an oil-based product. Kulin said he still believes the record business can be fun, but noted the companies are giving away records as though they were worthless. These things, he stressed, have to change, and won't necessarily be bad. Despite an adjustment period, he noted, the changes won't be difficult.

Struth emphasized the need for companies to plan from the bottom line up. The primary areas of concern are over-production, over-shipping, over-hype, discounting and distress sales, and so on. Struth feels the current economic problems would benefit the industry in the long run, as companies look inward and become more cost-conscious. They would, however, have to develop product respect. Struth stressed the need for product research, and to make the consumer more aware. He noted record sales are down thus far in 1980, due to overstocking, market glut and the economic crunch. But he added that music is still the best entertainment dollar value. Struth pointed out the need for good marketing, improved inventory control and a bottom line approach. It is the job of administration, he said, to unify the objectives of the companies.

Reynolds noted several upcoming challenges to the industry. He cited the danger of the bottom line consciousness causing deficit to creativity, and he cautioned the industry not to lose sight of the need for excitement. He stressed the danger of a downward spiral on future sales, and emphasized the need for sharpening of business practices. Companies, he stated, would have to do better staff training, and look toward having fewer people who were better trained.

Industry administration

Bob Rowe stated his agreement with Renolds concerning bottom line vis a vis creativity. He looked toward the 80's as a decade of solutions, adding that everyone already knows what the problems are. Areas of concern, he said, would include Canadian content, returns, discounting and co-op ads. Rowe suggested increasing the prices on prime releases. Hopefully, he concluded, we'll solve our problems in the next ten years.

Ed Preston expressed his concern about the increasing importance of lawyers and accountants in the music business. He described industry administration as one of the keys to the future, but not the only key, and expressed his belief that the industry was returning to the age of reasoning.

With those comments, the meeting was opened to the floor, and the industry executives discussed everything from piracy and home taping to record quality and industry trends for the future. On the subject of independent labels, Kulin noted that with fewer and fewer majors, there was a need for smaller labels. Revnolds expressed his excitement at the new growth of Canadian independents, particularly in Vancouver. Preston, who has experienced success with one of those groups, the Powder Blues, noted, "They don't seem to realize there's a recession!" Struth added, "They seem to be flourishing again, and they're still creative.'

Discussing the quality of records in Canada, Kulin pointed to independent testing which showed that Canadian pressings are a close second to those of Japan, placing them among the best in the world. He added that Canada is the only country in the world outside of Germany to press Deutsche Grammophon records, and added that CBS would be pressing classics shortly.

The panel discussed the possible new musical trends and strengths of the coming decade. Areas like jazz and country were mentioned. Reynolds noted, "I'd hate to have to depend on it to pay the overhead." Rowe pointed out that there are many surprises, such as adultoriented music, which did about 50% of Capitol's business at Christmas, he said. Struth added that jazz and country can be proving grounds

for other types of formats. "Any field can yield a mass appeal piece of product," he stated.

On the subject of piracy, Struth noted, "We're making inroads, but it's very expensive, and it's up to us in the industry to get mad at people who support counterfiet product." Struth added, in response to a question from the floor, that CRIA met with the Canadian Association of Broadcasters to discuss home taping, and that there will be follow-up. Preston added that in the U.S., the RIAA has offered a reward to anyone with a solution.

On management training, Preston noted a past program at RCA. and attempts to reinstate such a program. Rowe said Capitol does basic job training. Reynolds stated that WEA has sponsored seminars, and has also supported courses its employees have wanted to take. So has Quality, Struth noted, and the company also recommends certain courses and encourages refreshers. Kulin stated a CBS objective to set up a training program. The panel agreed that management training was important in all areas, and particularly in financial administration.

The panel was asked about studies from the seventies about projected buying habits into the eighties. Struth noted CRIA is currently surveying the market, with results expected in July. Reynolds mentioned a Warner Communications survey two years ago which concerned demographics and the baby boom. The indication was that people would continue to buy records, raising the median age of the record buyer.

Looking toward the future, Reynolds suggested the industry approach the bottom line in a controlled way. He expressed optimism, but added, "There's a lot of room for improvement." Struth added that some, particularly artists, have abused the value of the dollar. He said to expect rising costs, and that the industry would have to use more ingenuity. Struth added that there may be changes in emphasis, such as fewer artists and records, and more spent in promotion. He added, "You still have to plan long-term." Reynolds concluded, "For the artist, the more proof of viability, the better the likelihood of getting money. Profitability is a keynote.



The panel on selling music internationally featured three Canadian veterans of worldwide dealings. Attic President Al Mair was the moderator, and the panel included Vic Wilson of SRO/Anthem and Dominique Zgarka of Trans Canada Records. The discussion ranged from the benefits of selling individual masters versus making label deals, of selling territory by territory rather than making worldwide agreements, the value of MIDEM as an international marketplace, exporting finished goods, and the use of publishing in international deals.

Wilson noted that with one of his new artists, B.B. Gabor, the deal is being worked territory by territory. He commented that one of the major advantages of this system is that each territory considers the act its own, and therefore places more importance on the artist. But Wilson also added that it is important to supplement that type of agreement by travelling and meeting regularly with the companies involved. With acts, such as Rush, on which Anthem has made worldwide deals, Wilson doesn't feel the company has had a fair deal. Certain territories are handed the act by their parent company, and if they don't like the act, they don't work as hard on its behalf. Wilson noted his preference of making deals by territory, but added that it depends on how much the worldwide oranization wants the act. Al Mair added that where the U.S. market once represented over half of the world's sales, it's now down to about 40%. making other territories more significant.

Mair pointed out that Wilson and SRO/Anthem have the advantage of including personal management in their function. As manager, Wilson can guarantee the artist will tour a particular territory, a major asset in making a deal. An act's presence in a given country is often a key factor in its success.

Mair noted that mechanical royalties outside of North America are usually higher, and that by signing a deal directly with an international company in Europe or elsewhere means not only a higher percentage, but a higher percentage of a higherpriced record. Zgarka, whose Trans Canada has just gotten into English language production with the Celsius label, added that the days of signing worldwide deals in the U.S. for the Selling outside North America

advance only are over.

The panel discussed the merits of all-European deals. Mair noted they're usually limited-time agreements, and that therefore, the company might be hesitant to offer tour support. Wilson added that the main advantage is the spillover of excitement about the product from country to country.

On the subject of exporting finished goods (of domestic product not otherwise available internationally), Mair pointed out that it was responsible for a number of disco hits, and that it was also a factor in achieving an international deal for Triumph. Mair explained that exports to Buffalo and San Antonio created markets for the Toronto band, and also enabled RCA U.S. to see the product actually selling. Mair added that the export of an internationally originated Attic master, Riot, led to the group's worldwide signing with Capitol, and that Toronto group the Numbers have sold more records in the U.S. as imports than they have in Canada. Mair deals with Jem Records. He has a list of 100 key reporting U.S. retailers, and sends out product with posters and reply cards.

Wilson noted the first Rush album. on SRO's own label, led to the group's worldwide signing with Phonogram when a year after its release, exports caused it to become a hit in Cleveland. Zgarka, whose company is heavily involved in exporting, sells to most of the U.S. racks, and points out that most of them will take a few copies to see what happens. International group Santa Esmeralda and Sea Cruise are two acts whose success and whose major deals can be attributed to exports. Zgarka added that exports are usually enough to spark the market, but not enough to hurt the territory's own sales. Mair stated that Jem don't usually do much promotion, but they will accept and use free promo material. Zgarka noted Jem pay a lot, so they do want to sell the product they import, and that they can also lease masters for their own labels, Passport and Visa. Mair added that Attic can make more money selling to Jem than to the company's Canadian distributor, CBS, because they don't have to pay sales tax on the exports.

Zgarka noted that the U.S. importers receive Bomb label product cheaper from Trans Canada than they do from the product's original European country. Mair added that the countries from which he leases product want Attic to export to the U.S. because they have nothing happening there, and Attic can be the company that causes the initial excitement. The advantages for Attic are the U.S. advertising, as well as establishing a good reputation among the European companies of origin of the product.

On the subject of MIDEM, Wilson noted it's really the only place to meet everyone from around the world. Much of Mair's international success, which is noteworthy, can be attributed to contacts made through regular attendance at the Cannes marketplace. Zgarka noted Trans Canada brought lawyers and contracts, and signed deals or made agreements. "One territory could multiply your total number of sales or dollars," he stressed. "It cost us \$20,000, and we came back with over \$400,000 in advances."

The panelists compared selling individual masters versus making label deals. Mair noted each master has separate advance royalties, and if the product doesn't sell, five \$5,000 master advances are more than one \$10,000 label advance. On the other hand, the advantages of label deals are that they give the label an identity in other countries, and that they can lead to two-way agreements in which the Canadian company picks up the international label. Mair warned that label deals must be properly structured, and noted it took Attic six years to establish the credibility to get the right deal.

Graham Shaw -A songwriter honing his craft

Although Winnipeg's Graham Shaw is a newcomer to the recording industry, the singer-songwriter is a veteran of many years in music. He's been playing off and on since his pre-teens, a span of about two decades, and in that time has developed expertise in a very wide variety of areas.

Now Capitol Records have released his debut album, titled after his band, Graham Shaw & The Sincere Serenaders. The album is a solid pop effort, running the gamut from Top 40 to gentle ballads to solid rockers. It displays Shaw's skills as a songwriter, singer, musician and arranger. The album was recorded at Record One in Los Angeles, and produced by veteran Kenny Edwards, a one-time member of Linda Ronstadt's Stone Poneys whose production credits also include Karla Bonoff. The album is unusual among name brand L.A. recordings in that it features Shaw with his own band, six Winnipeg musicians, with the only guest appearances from Edwards, one acoustic guitar track, and one track from steel player Dan Dugmore.

Shaw & The Sincere Serenaders are a tight-knit unit comprised of Shaw on guitar and keyboards, guitarist Danny Casavant, bassist Gary Stefaniuk, Gordon Osland on drums and background vocalists Ilena Zaramba and Susan Lethbridge. The band have been performing regularly in the Winnipeg area for some time, have attracted a major following there and are generally acclaimed as an exceptional performing band.

Outside of Winnipeg, however, they have pretty well managed to escape attention. Shaw's only previous claim to fame was a 1971 single on a tiny local label. It did practically nothing, even though a radio request campaign by Shaw and his friends led to local pick airplay.

Shaw's own background is quite widespread. His early training is classical, and he has played everything from folk to jazz to rock & roll. He is an accomplished guitarist and pianist, plays trumpet, drums, bass and a number of other instruments, and also scores and arranges.

Shaw has spent periods in a variety of rock bands since his mid-teens, and has worked as an acoustic artist, as well as stints as a lineman with CP Rail and as creative director for an

ad company. He's also produced, arranged and performed on sessions and films.

Shaw earned both record and management attention


But it was with the current band in Winnipeg that Shaw began attracting major attention, both from record companies and from the Torontobased management firm of Finkelstein-Fiedler. Shaw was discovered by the industry on the basis of a demo tape he made with borrowed money. He recalls, "It found its way to Capitol Records in the States through Frank Davies, a freelance producer with Capitol who had already managed to interest Capitol Canada. Then later, by chance, Bernie Fiedler was accompanying Dan Hill on his cross-Canada tour, and turned up at the bar where we were playing a Friday afternoon matinee. He liked it a lot, and he got in touch with Bernie Finkelstein. They thought about it, and then when I was in Toronto to meet with Frank Davies, I met with the Bernies."

So basically. Shaw was receiving both label and management attention at the same time. He signed with Finkelstein-Fiedler, who in turn worked out the Capitol deal. With deal in hand. Shaw got together with Kenny Edwards and recorded the LP in what Shaw considers to be "one of the premier studios on the planet. The studio was built by Val Garay, Peter Asher's engineer, and based on top L.A. facility the Sound Factory, with a few of Garay's own improvements.

The album loses nothing for not using the usual Los Angeles session people, Shaw notes. "That was actually a bone of contention coming into it. There was some talk of using them. I was very strong on the issue. Ken Edwards came up to Winnipeg and met the band, and he supported me. I think it's correct to have a self-contained unit, if it's possible. There's a lot to be said for using the session players, but they tend to take on a homogenous sound and approach."

Shaw is very happy with the band. "The drummer and bass player are an incredibly solid bottom end rhythm section. They have a real sense of responsibility toward what should happen at the bottom end so as to clutter the arrangements." And as the city of Winnipeg will bear witness, they are also good performers.

The feeling of the Winnipeg people toward the band is returned in full by Shaw. "The people in Winnipeg are more disposed now to watch their own local talent, and pay money to

do that, then they are to see an outof-town act. And I think that's great.'

Primarily a songwriter

Among his many talents, Shaw considers himself primarily a songwriter. The songs take anywhere from 20 minutes to seven or eight years to complete. Shaw is a perfectionist, and has about 60 songs which he considers ready, and another 60 still being worked on. "I enjoy the craft of songwriting," he notes. "The art of songwriting is to be simple but effective - to make the song as broadspectrumed as you can, and still get everything you want to say in it, so that you're not talking down to anybody, but you're communicating on a broad spectrum."

But not all of Shaw's songs are simple. "I've got some tunes," he admits, "that would make Joni Mitchell accuse me of being long-winded and introspective. And by the same token, I've gone into the lab and decided to write the perfect two minute, forty-eight second single. Songwriting is a craft. It makes you write all kinds of tunes.'

There are differences between Shaw the songwriter and Shaw the recording artist which will have to be resolved. "Since I've committed myself to the record industry now, instead of own-ing my own critical setup, there's a little more art by committee. I'm not sure how I'm going to be affected by that. It's got to be acceptable not only by my standards, but by the standards of the record industry and other involved people. So certain things that I would have liked to see on the album aren't on the album. They were considered a little ambitious or pretentious for an unknown artist. An unknown artist's posture is like two strangers getting to know each other - they invariably talk about the weather first. But basically, the thing is that I'm really happy with the first album. I think it's a good shot."

The panelists agreed that publishing is very important in foreign deals, because the mechanical and performing rights are so high. Wilson noted many foreign publishers are well enough funded to have promo staff. They can advertise, promote, and even offer tour support. Mair added, "The more people working on a project, the better its chances."

Wilson pointed out that in some territories, you must deal with a local publisher in order to receive royalties. Mair noted that there are publishing advances available if you can guarantee a release. In many countries, return rates are so low, the advances are a safe bet. A company might even give away the master free to get good royalties and publishing advances. "But you have to know who you're dealing with," he added, that takes experience. You can get ripped off badly by dealing with the wrong people."

Almada to distribute Sylvia Tyson's Salt Recs.

The Montreal-based Almada Corporation, a national record distributor, has completed an agreement with Sylvia Tyson's label, Salt Records for Canadian distribution of Salt product. The label has released two albums to date, Tyson's Satin On Stone and Sugar For Sugar, Salt For Salt.

The company is planning for the release of three new albums by the end of the year under the Almada agreement. All three are by other artists. Two of them are determined and will be announced at a later date. The third is in the negotiating stages.

Almada has been in existence as national distributor for over 17 years, specializing in folk, blues, jazz, international and children's recordings. Among the roughly two hundred labels they've been distributing are the Toronto-based Elephant Records, whose roster features children's album Juno Award winners Sharon, Lois & Bram (two gold albums), and the jazz label Concord Records, which has moved a lot of product since Almada picked it up last summer.

Ironically, Almada's founders, Aaron Lipsin and Marv Drimer, were originally involved with Tyson when she was a teenager. She was recording with Vanguard and they were working for Musimart, which distributed Vanguard at the time. Lipsin and Drimer were instrumental in breaking Ian & Sylvia's first hit, Four Strong Winds. Now, both Sylvia Tyson and Lipsin and Drimer have come full circle, and are again working together.

The final panel of the 3DIM conference was on the profession of record production, and featured four producers of various backgrounds. The panel was comprised of Jackie Rae of the Canadian Talent Library, a production house and radio subscription service; independent producer Eugene Martynec; Don Lorusso of Falcon Records, a producer and A&R veteran; and moderator Wes Dakus of Sundown Recorders, an Edmonton studio, and Vera Cruz Records.

Rae described the CTL operation. which began as a non-profit organization to record Canadians who couldn't get deals otherwise. Over 250 stations in Canada, the U.S., Britain and Australia subscribe to the CTL and receive the product for airplay purposes. CTL also leases many of its masters, and all funds from both subscriptions and leasing go back into production. CTL also has major access to Eastern Sound in Toronto - both operations are owned by Standard Broadcasting. The CTL has a release arrangement with Pickwick's new Intercan label, and anticipates increasing the number of productions to 12 or 14 albums per year. Originally focusing on MOR material, the company is getting more involved with rock, country and other areas.

Martynec noted he produces basically artists who are already signed to label deals. Most of them already have their own material, but other pre-production chores are very important. These include selecting songs and, if necessary, musicians, choosing the studio and engineer, and scheduling time.

Dakus, as a studio manager, stressed the importance of developing the studio and its credibility. He pointed out the need for a studio to have some high quality product to show prospective clients as a sample of what the studio is capable of.

The panel discussed the importance of the artist and producer feeling comfortable in the studio, the importance of having a good engineer, and the relationship between the act and the producer. Martynec feels most of the major studios are comparable, but that the engineer is of paramount importance, and that the value of a good engineer includes his personality and ability to get along with the producer and artist, as well as his technical ability. Martynec uses Ken Friesen primarily, and does much of his work at Eastern Sound. Rae added that the assistant engineer is also very important, adding to the atmosphere and helping put the artist at ease.

Record production

The panelists agreed on the importance of pre-production, ironing out the kinks and giving the artist a feel of the approach toward his music in a studio atmosphere. Lorusso stressed the need for pre-production in selecting and arranging the material, but he cautioned that some things, like the fine-tuning of sounds, would still require a certain amount of time in the main studio.

Answering a question from the floor, Rae noted that after production, the producer can still play a major role in achieving a deal for the artist and the finished product, if it is not already signed. Rae suggested seeing the record companies personally, with plans that go beyond the first product, and trying to get the record company to listen to the product while the producer is there.

Lorusso advises prospective producers to start with a good group and good songs. Dakus adds, "Don't go in and expect to make a deal right off. Hang in - there's somebody who will listen." Rae notes that with many producers and artists, the role includes directing the performance. "Most hits aren't in the sound of the bass," he adds, "but in the song and the performance."

The panel discussed the relationship between the producer and the artist, and what to do if there is a personality clash. The panelists stressed the need to put the right producer with the right act - some acts need a lot of direction, others hardly a good engineer. Lorusso adds, "I've used a lot of studios. You can have digital equipment and lots of things, but number one is a good engineer. The record is a sacred event to the act and the producer. Number two is to have a comfortable studio."

And what do the panelists feel about Canadian acts using U.S. producers? Should there be more input from Canadians? Rae noted, "Show business is not indigenous to any country, and it shouldn't have bias or restrictions. The act should go where the best coupling is. We hope to sell our product in the U.S. There should be no restrictions." Lorusso expressed agreement, noting that five years ago, groups saw the names of producers and wanted to use them. Now Canadian producers like Terry Brown are being built the same way on the basis of their work (ie. Rush. Klaatu, Max Webster). Lorusso concluded, "It's silly to use somebody just because he's Canadian."

any. The consensus was that if problems between artist and producer couldn't be resolved, the relationship should end. The panel also stressed that if one member of a band couldn't play well in the studio, even if he was an important part of the group's stage show, he could easily be replaced on the record. Dakus noted. "Even groups like the Eagles use other people on their sessions."

What do the panelists like in a studio? Martynec likes to see the studio well-maintained, with equipment on a par, a good assortment of mikes, a few special effects and 'toys', good echo and a comfortable room. But he especially likes to work with



CBS sign Britain's Chris Rea, release new album

CBS Canada have announced the signing to the international company roster of veteran British artist Chris Rea. The company is currently in the release stages on his first Columbia album, titled Tennis. The set was self-produced and is the artist's third album release overall.

Chris Rea, a veteran artist, first came to public attention with his signing in 1976 to Magnet Music. In 1978, Magnet/U.A. released his debut album, Whatever Happened To Benny Santini, which led to a hit single in Fool (If You Think It's Over), as well as a Grammy nomination as Best New Artist. The following year, Magnet released a second album, Deltics. Both sets were produced by noted session master Gus Dudgeon, and each LP sold over 100,000 units in the U.S.

Drake's AOR single catching nationally

Toronto: Paul Drake, well-known local club personality, is experiencing strong national adult-oriented play for his latest release, I Honestly Love You. The single, released on the Record Canada label, was co-written by Peter Allen and Jeff Barry and was a giant country/pop hit for Olivia Newton-John.

Archie Macdonell, who handles business affairs for Drake, reports that he has noticed an increase in interest from country programmers and has reserviced the single to country stations.

The Montreal-born Drake is also very popular throughout the Maritimes where his product is handled by Distribudisc, a Truro-based record service headed up by Rhoda Taylor. Drake's previous single, Lady Linda, a message song about his wife who passed away five years ago, was particularly strong throughout the east in its first few weeks of release, an influencing factor for its eventual national breakout. Both Lady Linda and his current single are included in his album, Paul Drake Sings Love. The album was produced by Andy Hermant at Toronto's Manta Sound.

Besides being handled through Distribudisc, Drake's product is available through A.R.S., Taylor's Record Sales, Pindoff Record Sales and Roblans. Record Canada is located in Toronto at 21 Dundas Square.

Drake is currently playing Shakespeare's in downtown Toronto and, through A.R.S., will be doing autograph sessions throughout the area. Macdonell is also hopeful of setting up a concert tour for Drake in the near future.

The Powder Blues - Doin' It Right

The success of RCA recording act the Powder Blues is reflected in the title of their current single, Doin' It Right, from their first album called Uncut. Led by guitarist Tom Lavin, the main driving force behind the band, the Powder Blues recorded Uncut at Lavin's studio and released the disc on their own Blue Wave label. A total of 16,000 albums were issued on Blue Wave, the first 2,000 of which are already collector's items because they contain ten songs instead of nine. Recently, RCA Canada signed the band and the Blue Wave tracks were remastered for the RCA pressings. Uncut is fast approaching gold status, and is hoped to go platinum.

Tom Lavin explained the story behind Doin' It Right, the first single from Uncut. "Doin' It Right is about a band playing in a little club, about playing in most of the cities in North America. It's late at night, and you ask somebody, 'Where's it happening, where's a band that's hot?' And they always tell you to go to the wrong side of town, down an alley, up a fire escape and through a window. It seems that the grungier the place, the hotter the music and the vibes. We were playing in this tiny little club called the Spinning Wheel in Gastown, Vancouver, and this just started happening. The band was in its formative months, and these people were standing in line in the rain for hours just to get into this place because the vibe was there.'

The flipside of the single, The Rockchopper, "started as a thing to get everybody to solo, which was basically a procedure for loosening up," said Lavin. "My philosophy is that if you get the band to loosen up, the audience picks up on it and they start to loosen up. Then it starts that lovely feedback/regeneration cycle where everybody loosens up."

"... I don't really consider Powder Blues a blues band ... "

Lavin said that he chose to play modern rock/blues rather than the more traditional style of blues, as the latter was a turn-off to a lot of listeners and record company people as well. "I think that's what stopped the blues from selling. There was a great backlog of black blues music and fantastic musicianship, and a lot of the white players in the early 60's from England and the States picked up on it and tried to copy it note for note. But a guy from the 70's or 80's has no right or business singing about being in the cottonfields, 'cause he's never been there. I think there are adequate subjects for the blues right now, such as the cosmic blues. The human predicament of having to be alive and coping with mortality and daily existence is

enough to give anyone the blues." And the Powder Blues have recently experienced a little of what Lavin was talking about. On February 14, Lavin's guitar (a 1960 Gibson ES-345 sunburst, serial number 100500) was stolen from the Commodore Ballroom in Vancouver, and then on April 14, the band's truck went over a cliff in Golden, B.C. and they lost all of their equipment, including a very costly P.A. system. Fortunately, noone was seriously injured, but the accident led to the cancellation of the rest of the Powder Blues' eastern tour after Toronto.

Regarding the music of the Powder Blues, Lavin stated, "I don't really consider Powder Blues a blues band as such. It's a lot closer to R&B. Powder Blues are closer to rock, and we're being lumped in with Downchild and Dutch Mason, who both play a lot more laid-back stretchedout blues. We're being categorized because of the name. We do have only one blues tune out of nine (on the LP); Personal Manager by Albert King is the only straight blues tune. We wrote six of the songs and picked up three from other places.

"To look back at the supergroup of the 60's, the first two or three Rolling Stones albums were only R&B and blues. The first five albums by Fleetwood Mac were nothing but the blues. The Eagles' Heartache Tonight is the blues. Queen's Crazy Little Thing Called Love is rockabilly blues, and that was stolen from black music. So to say that this (Powder Blues) isn't a commercially viable form of music is to be blind to the facts.

"That's why I call the whole thing blue wave. I think that rock is like a river that continually finds new tributaries, only some of the tributaries never quite find the sea. At that point, the water flows back to the main trunk, and as far as I'm concerned, that main trunk is blues.

Tom Lavin's formative period

Said Lavin, "I didn't pick black music as such. I grew up on the south side of Chicago. I was in the generation after the Butterfield/Bloomfield/ Bishop/Steve Miller/Boz Scaggs group that was hanging out and learning the blues from these older black gentlemen. They put up with me at first; I was 17 and dragged around a \$30 guitar with me. They'd say, 'Here comes that crazy white boy again,' but that's my roots. I spent five years doing that. It was my most formative period musically and I just carried that with me." Lavin, while in Chicago, played with Southside Johnny Yannon, Hound Dog Taylor (both are no longer living), Buddy Guy, Junior Wells, Otis Spann and a host of others. In more recent years, Lavin played as a jazz/rock session guitarist and did a stint with Vancouver's Prism.

Lavin took what he considered essentials of the blues - the emotional impact, hypnotic quality and the essence of escape - and put those things into a more modern form; hence the urban strut sound of the Powder Blues' music. He said that he didn't want to imitate the older black bluesmen, because "it's not creative for us to go and do what's already been done. We have to take what's been done and take it a little further.' Lavin constantly ran into the attitude that a white person can't play the blues, but he feels entitled to play the blues due to his Jewish heritage. He claimed that the Jews were oppressed long before the blacks. Lavin grew up with black musicians, and keeping to his witty form, he joked, "Every white has a Negro lining, and vice versa."

The East/West musical split

West Coast bands have often had trouble and have even been ignored in eastern Canada. A group can be very big in the West and be nothing in the East, and this problem had Lavin perplexed. He couldn't see why a western band could have so much trouble breaking in the rest of Canada. Prior to a showcase at Toronto's El Mocambo on April 18, Lavin said, "For us, one of the reasons could be that we haven't played here (Ontario) yet. I'd hate to have to break this band in Toronto by breaking in the States first. That would seem like a real crime." The Powder Blues' single is in the top ten in Montreal, and both the album and the single are doing extremely well west of Ontario.

However, the El Mocambo gig on April 18 was highly successful. The highlight of the evening was a live half-hour broadcast by CHUM-FM. The band remained at the El Mocambo for two extra nights (Tuesday and Wednesday of the following week), due to a cancellation by the previously scheduled Tommy James. Four days before the Toronto showcase, the band opened for rock giants The Who at Vancouver's Coliseum. If the current trend of success for The Powder Blues is indicative of the future of the band, then they are indeed doin' it right.

Rockabilly Heaven debuts in Ottawa

Ottawa: Who is Billy Rock? - a question that could soon be buzzing around the music business, and on the minds of music fans across Canada.

For on April 10th, Billy Rock starred in the World Premiere of Rockabilly Heaven, a musical review produced by Maynard Collins (who authored Hank Williams: The Show He Never Gave) in conjunction with Georges Lozano.

The location was Arnold's, Ottawa's original rock'n roll night spot. Since Arnold's opened its doors on Ottawa's Rideau Street entertainment strip just a year ago, it has rapidly established a popular following among fans, some of whom travel a sizeable distance for early rock'n roll music.

Gaining the premiere of Rockabilly Heaven was consequently a coming-of-age for the popular spot, even though the revue may be better suited to a concert stage than a tavern environment.

Rockabilly Heaven opens with three back-up musicians, Andy Lozanc lead; Brian Dennison, bass; and Geoffrey Baker, drums, playing the roles of a young group of entertainers, impressed with new wave, and playing loud but not memorable music. After a short set, they are introduced to

Edmonton, Alberta: Dyna West Records, established as an independent western Canadian label, has undergone expansion resulting in the release of new product in the areas of contemporary and country music. Peter Kowalchuk, the label president, has announced that Mavfield Music Ltd., an Edmonton publishing and promotion company, will work with Dyna West to maximize the effectiveness of the label's activities. The two companies introduced the Swiss act Peter, Sue & Marc to Canada in 1978. The group enjoyed successful chart action and have a new album, By Airmail, scheduled for release this month.

Dave Paul and Patti Mayo both have singles on the market now, and albums by each are slated for release shortly. Paul's single is titled My Baby Loves Me b/w I Wonder; the LP is Good As Gold. Paul has received five awards from the B.C. Country Music Association and is a regular on Opry North. Patti Mayo has appeared with the Spade Neilson Band and has toured with Ronnie Prophet. In 1978, she was awarded the B.C. Danny Award as Best Female Country Artist of the Year. Her current single is This Ain't Tennessee b/w Superstar Cowboy, and her self-titled album will be available later this month. the veteran Billy Rock, who thereafter sings lead and explains rock'n roll's early beginnings to his new friends in short capsulized comments between songs.

The band comes alive, and so does the crowded bar room, as everyone swings into some well-known numbers.

Billy Rock is an embodiment of many rock'n roll stars, past and present. Squeals come in all the right places as he adopts the gestures, quivering, and movements typical of early rock stars. He switches styles with ease.

The show pays homage to early rock throughout, by including many well known hits by Jerry Lee Lewis,

Carl Perkins, Gene Vincent and, of course, Elvis, while not overlooking early Canadian stars Ronnie Hawkins, Jack Scott and Ray Smith.

The two hour show has Billy Rock on "the rocket express to Rockabilly Heaven, where it is always Saturday night, where all the rockabilly cats and be-bop babies are getting it on, and where a dime will play the RockOla jukebox through eternity'' - to quote from the show's publicity material.

The focus is the fifties, but some of the music is entirely original, and fits right into the mould.

The total show is visual, and would make superb television, but equally, it presents an opportunity for recording that fits a pattern: talented musicians who have never before managed to be in the right place at the right time, get together with a novel idea, and have the making of a smash. No recording contract exists.

From the opening night scene, there are a few rough edges to iron out, and Billy Rock will need to place his delivery of the explanatory material to suit the audience, but the potential is undeniable.

After ten days at Arnold's, Rockabilly Heaven moves to the Horseshoe Tavern in Toronto, after which producers will review progress and decide on the next step.

Meanwhile, what do we know about Billy Rock?

We are told that he was born in Almonte, Ontario in 1939, and travelled to Texas as a young teenager where he became caught up in the rockabilly fever which was to sweep North America in the early fifties. He picked up a guitar, and eventually played in a number of bands - from rock'n roll to country to R&B - then went to England in 1963 following a severe auto accident, and has "just returned to Canada's Ottawa Valley, where it all began."

And producers Maynard Collins and George Lozano should make the latter's unbilled piano contribution a permanent part of the show, for it adds considerable depth and authenticity. But Collins shows us that Hank Williams was no accident. He can pick up an idea and make it work.

Both tracks were recorded at Toronto's Captain Audio Studio and produced by Don Geppert, Edward plays rhythm guitar, harmonica and mandolin, Harding handles lead guitar and recorders and McLean plays keyboards. They do their own arrangements of material. Edward, Harding & McLean have opened for major Canadian acts and have appear-

ed on various TV shows and appear on a semi-regular basis on CBC's Morningside radio program. They have done a broadcast album titled Edward, Harding And McLean . . . Now And Then for the CBC network.

Anne Murray wins NARM Award

The record beat out competition by the likes of Barbara Mandrell and Crystal Gayle. A former Grammy winner and this year's major Juno recipient, Anne Murray now has this award to her credit. New Kind Of Feeling was also named Album of the Year at the 1980 Junos, and I Just Fall In Love Again from the LP was voted Single of the Year.

Solid Gold's Toronto to tour Maritimes

Toronto: Following a series of successful appearances in Toronto, Montreal and Ottawa with the likes of Chilliwack, Harlequin and Pat Travers, Solid Gold recording act Toronto will tour the Maritimes. The eastern tour will take in 25 dates in 28 days, beginning May 1 in Campbellton, New Brunswick and finishing up May 28 in St. John's, Newfoundland. Key dates include appearances in Charlottetown, Halifax and Fredericton. Solid Gold directors Neill Dixon and Steve Propas are currently making arrangements for Toronto to do a national tour in the summer. Toronto's current single is Even The Score, from their Solid Gold debut album, Lookin' For Trouble.

Major Canadian tour set for Van's Prism

Vancouver: Allison Glass of Bruce Allen Talent Promotion, has announced a major Canadian tour for Prism that will take the Capitol recording group into several major and small markets across the country. The tour will commence in Kelowna on May 17 and will include dates in Saint John, St. John's, Kitchener, Ottawa, Toronto and Grande Prairie, to name just a few. Another Capitol recording group, Red Rider, is expected to join Prism as their opening act when they complete their current tour with April Wine on May 16. A new single, The Young and Restless, co-written by Prism members Lindsay Mitchell (lead guitar) and

BSR introduces dbx discs into Canada

Toronto: BSR Canada has introduced a line of dbx-encoded digitally mastered recordings into Canada. a milestone in the evolution of recorded music. Until now, conventional vinyl records have had two handicaps, restricted dynamic range and record surface noise. But the dbx process overcomes these problems, providing a highly expanded dymanic range and virtually eliminating surface noise, even found on the state-of-theart digital and direct-to-disc recordings. When played through the dbx Model 21 Decoder, dbx-encoded records provide a full 90dB dynamic range. As well as eliminating record surface noise, the dbx system removes turntable rumble and groove echo. Inner groove distortion is also reduced, because narrower grooves can be used for the dbx-encoded disc. This allows the dbx-encoded master to be cut further away from the centre of the disc. The end result is a close reproduction of the clarity and realism found on the studio master tapes, with a background of silence.

When a record is dbx-encoded. the signal is compressed linearly in dB to one half its dynamic range, so that it fits easily within the storage capacity of the vinyl disc. Played back through the decoder, the signal is restored to its original dynamic range, giving a 50% greater dynamic range over that of conventional records. At the same time, the surface

noise is reduced 30dB lower than that of regular records, rendering it inaudible.

The first recordings were jointly produced by dbx and M&K RealTime Records, and feature popular classics performed by the Philharmonia Hungarica under the baton of Zoltan Rozsnyai. These records are part of the M&K dbx RealTime Masterpiece Series. Subsequent releases will include light orchestral and film music. as well as pop, folk and jazz recordings. There are currently 72 dbxencoded albums on the market which are available through Canadian franchised dbx dealers, distributed by BSR.

To obtain full benefits from the dbx-encoded discs, the dbx Model 21 Disc/Tape Decoder is necessary. This device was launched simultaneously in Canada with the dbx-encoded discs. The decoder enables both discs and tapes, which have been encoded using the dbx Type II noise reduction system, to give studio master tape quality without surface noise. Sounds caused by imperfections in the vinyl, as well as high-frequency noises due to manufacturing faults, are eliminated

Triple F introduces Foreground Fact Finder

Foreground programming was once regarded as a legislated burden by many programmers in the FM ranks. Because of this attitude, progressive foregrounding has been relatively slow in developing. It took a number of positive thinkers, willing to spend a little time and money, to show the broadcast community that foreground material could actually work in one's favour when it came to attracting listeners. Foreground innovations, pioneered by FM'ers, have proven so successful that AM stations have been literally forced to join the bandwagon in an effort to retain listeners. Currently, one of the biggest problems encountered when putting together a foreground piece has been a lack of up-to-date artist information. The proprietors of the Triple F Record & Artist Data System are hoping to change all that.

Triple F stands for Foreground Fact Finder; an information file system now being marketed to some 5,000 radio stations across Canada and in the United States. The idea behind the Fact Finder is to provide an easy to use and easy to maintain comprehensive assembly of artist information. The advantages of this system are many. For one, the Fact Finder virtually eliminates the valuable time lost sorting, editing and filing cumbersome pieces of record company information. Apart from being a compact desk-top filing system, the Fact Finder is quick, effective, and accurate. Over 500 recording artists have been documented in full detail, from their origins to their current status. Each profile includes data on individual group members and/or solo artists; a complete current album breakdown; an edited biographical account; a single and album discography including labels and catalogue numbers; management information and a major television and concert appearance schedule. In addition, each artist is monitored through direct sources, insuring that the information remains valid through constant updating within the system.

U.S. giants WAVC New York and KFI Los Angeles, and Canadian majors Q107, CFTR and CHFI-FM Toronto, among others, have already subscribed to the Fact Finder System, in effect endorsing its credibility. Further support has been voiced by programming consultants Dave Charles, John Parikhal and Hilly Leopold of Joint Communications, who claim, "For several years, we have been in a musical phase during which most

listeners were not particularly inter-

ested in facts and details about musicians. The next phase, which is already developing, will return many radio listeners to an earlier period, when they were interested in details about the music and artists, etc. Those stations that are the most credible with their listeners will have a great advantage over those who fail to pay attention to the next musical phase. The Foreground Fact Finder Record & Recording Artist Data System seems like a good bet to us " A diversified sampling of most prominent recording artists insures the Fact Finder should prove useful within any number of musical formats. The subscription cost to stations seems reasonable at \$365 (U.S.) for the complete annual service. Orders for the Foreground Fact Finder System are presently being accepted and processed for servicing in September of 1980. 




