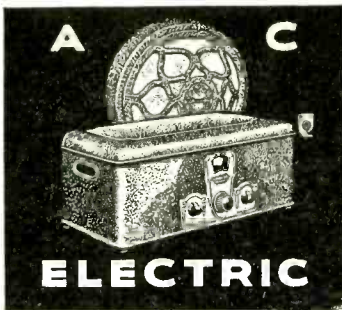

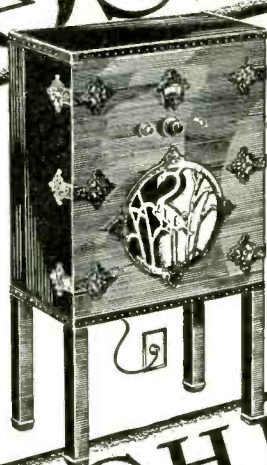

THE EDITOR'S PAGE

Newspapers are filled these days with stories of the coming coalition of airplane and radio for public service. This is the development of the year in radio and aviation. Strange that these two scientific developments should, at this juncture, become so closely allied. Yet this year has demonstrated that aviation must have radio, and that radio is to reach its most universal development through aircraft. We shall endeavor, in this magazine, to keep pace with this new alliance because the speeding plane, talking to its mate high in air, and to ground control stations has overnight become a factor in radio affairs, too important to be neglected.

The Pickwick Broadcast Corporation was recently made defendant in an action brought by a rival hotel to the Pickwick Hotel, to

suppress studio noises. The rival claimed that KTAB was driving guests from the hotel. The court action was based on a local ordinance and in no way sought to control broadcasting from the station, which is purely under federal control.

It is not improbable that within the next few years, means will be found to intercommunicate with any point on the globe with no more power than is used in a flashlight battery. Any electrical disturbance, however small, is felt all over the earth. All that is necessary to record it is more sensitive receivers. Compared with the distance to which the disturbance travels, our present-day receivers are excessively crude. The ultimate solution of radio seems to be not more power but increased sensitivity. Research indicates that some important fact has been overlooked which, when discovered, will radically simplify the entire field.

Whatever may be said of radio as an entertainment, as a hobby it has had a wonderful educative value. Bankers, brokers, lawyers, business men, who knew little of the scientific or technical side of life, playing with radio as a hobby, have become experts in many fields of modern endeavor. Tinkering with the family set has aided them to understand their auto battery, and their telephone. The educative value of radio marks it out as a hobby with a distinct value. In unraveling the mystery of a coil, they have tricacies, and idiosyncrasies, Radio may be said to be the first hobby known to pay national dividends.

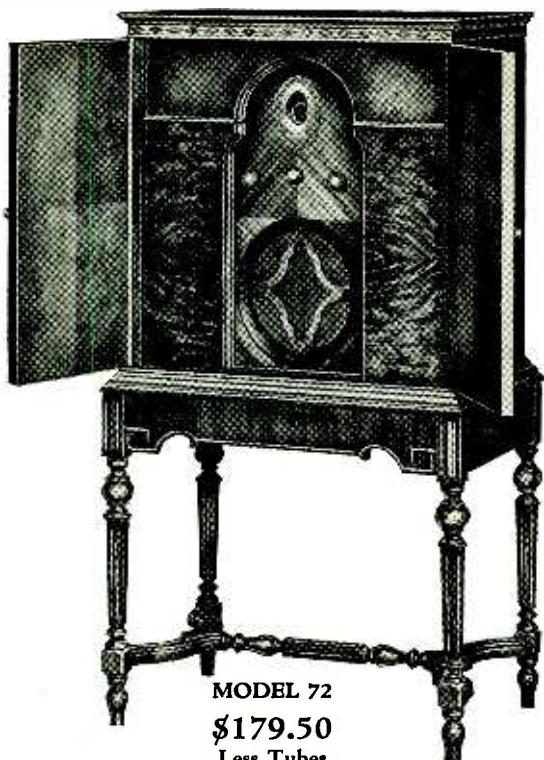

The RADIO TATTLER

IF PAUL WHITEMAN could sit in front of a radio set and listen to the squalling babies in his orchestra he would throw a fit. That is one of the queer things about orchestra leaders—they never get a perspective on their own efforts. Paul is committed to jazz. Give him any kind of a melody and he begins to jazz it up. Well, if Paul thinks he can improve Wagner and some of the old boys who really knew their stuff, he is entitled to try. We know a man who thinks he can improve the Emancipation Proclamation. Perhaps he can. He can't be shot for trying.

* * *

But to come back to Paul and his squalling babies: Paul is a musical midwife. He is assisting at the birth of a new national music. Ten years from now he'll look back on the wailing, caterwauling, painless dentistry music which he now sublimates by horn and drum and wonder how he ever let himself in for it. Fathers are always like that. They never can believe that the fine upstanding son was the red-faced, wizened brat they first saw in the crib. Without perhaps being aware of it, Paul is really doing an important work.

* * *

There is nothing that makes a confirmed bachelor like listening to a baby wail. There is nothing that will so inspire good musicians to get in and write good music and get it produced like having to listen to this terrible, moaning, squealing, wailing, primitive, sub-African rhythm crossed with hardware effects and squeaky curves. Even the morons are getting tired of picking up their feet and putting them down in cafes to the monotony of it, and are just shuffling to and fro, too bored to really dance to its weary thumps. Jazz is dying from its very prevalence.

* * *

Jazz was bound to evolve from the "lascivious minuet" of our grandmothers as the world speeded up. The polka was its maternal grandmother and in the giddy '80s it was regarded with an upturned nose and branded a "bustle snapper" by the more conservative. But the polka could not keep pace with the Central Pacific and the free silver standard, and as transportation and thought speeded up, so, likewise, music. Having taken away the Indian's land and rights, we took away his music. Having

robbed the negro of his freedom, we took his rhythm. We gave back the land and the freedom, but we kept the motifs and the thumps. The wedding of the two gave us—jazz!

* * *

Paul Whiteman is the outstanding exponent of the modern rheumatic minuet in its stiffest measure. He has bent musical themes as a plumber bends pipes. He has swooped down on the most sacred melodies, and woven therefrom an Armenian rug in futuristic pattern. He has been a harmonic match-maker of parts and theme has married theme, under the nose of his shotgun, to weird effect. He has converted hysteria into a semblance of cadence, and set insanity down in four-four measure. And for what?

* * *

Well, for one thing, Paul likes to have carefree to jingle in his pockets. For another—he is like a housewife—he likes to mix a cupful of this or that with "butter the size of a walnut" and see what happens. Then again, individuals like Paul Whiteman are sometimes agents of invisible forces working toward a goal, and very often the agent, like any other attorney, hasn't the slightest idea in the world where he is headed. This may or may not be true of Whiteman. But, whether he likes the idea or not, he and Gershwin and all the other super-jazz contractors are building a new edifice of music.

* * *

Real musicians are beginning to see a pattern behind this jazz thing. It is nebulous, faint and gossamer thin, but it is beginning to take form. It is the new music of the new civilization—the music that is content not with harmonic representations, but rich in color, picturography and feeling. It is getting harmony out of mechanics, and preserving therein its core of art, so that the ensemble will shortly begin to revolve about its magnetic and unseen axis.

* * *

We've all heard of the nebular hypothesis—the gob of star-dust out in space which whirls itself into a solid world. Paul Whiteman and his ilk are spinning the jazz-dust of a thousand melodies into a new melodic firmament. It is an interesting thing to watch. The squalling of the babies in the crib echo

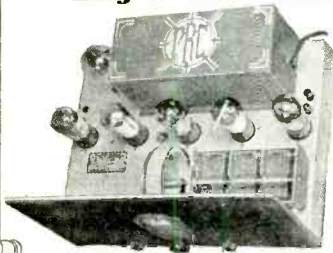

A Peep Across the Music Firmament

NOTHING escapes the maw of the insatiable dollar. Last month the original manuscripts of Schubert's "Erlkoenig," Chopin's famous "A-flat Polonaise," Beethoven's "Der Mann Vom Wort," and Mendelssohn's "Forty-second Psalm" fell under the auctioneer's hammer to the tune of \$8,325 for all four. When one squints a comparative eye over the sums blown for political, theatrical and "socially exclusive" whoopee, one sees the importance of being—nonchalant, or something.

* * *

Oscar Ziegler, pianist, arranges his programs in sections, this way: "For the tired business man—For the tired critic—For the music lover." Wouldn't it be just too bad if the tired business man got over into the music lover's stall?

* * *

At one of the recent symphonies two women of the type that insist on whispering their personalities loud enough to be heard two rows back, were directly ahead. Said one:

"I heard Boris Godunoff in New York."

"Yes?" said the other vaguely. "And didn't he come in good out here?"

Josef Hoffmann, director of the Curtis Institute, whose fortnightly network programs have become radio joy hours, and Serge Rachmaninoff, so widely apart individually, have one trait in common. One may hear either as often as one likes and never be quite sure just how either will interpret any one number. With Rachmaninoff it will always be a new perspective, as though the lens of philosophy, revolt, compassion or rebellion—a new Rachmaninoff. With Hoffmann it will be a new experiment—the same Hoffman but a new adventure in skill. No danger of crystalization or complacency with these men. They are not mere virtuosi, but actual manipulators of creative force.

Realizing that the artist and his audiences can at best be joined but rarely, and that, more and more, the audiences are demanding their artists, the talking machine companies are really turning loose their best capacities to bring the best music of the world into the home. Every week brings new delights for the music lover from the laboratories of Co-

lumbia and Victor. The latest record lists show a brilliant recording of Tschaikowsky's "Romeo and Juliet," a frankly glorious reproduction of the Grieg C-minor sonata played by Rachmaninoff and Kreisler and a Frederick Stock direction of the Bach B-minor suite played by the Chicago Symphony Orchestra. To make such musical fare as this available to public personal possession is a history-making step in itself.

* * *

New York musicians are interested in a new collapsible 'cello, which, instead of being carried about in much the same manner that an early English undertaker carried his coffins, can now be folded neatly into a small case. Its inconspicuousness adds to its charm, but its musical value remains to be demonstrated. However, San Francisco is again somewhat ahead of New York, having already demonstrated a collapsing piano to Senor Respighi on the occasion of his last visit to the Pacific Coast. The noted composer did not take kindly to the exhibition.

National Music Week—we seem to be unable to escape these weeks, which, if anything, are usually worse than regular weeks—has been set for May 5 to 11. Last year's observance was interesting, from the Pacific Coast point of view. Might it be too much to expect from the generosity of the product sponsors that they give us this week free from the usual objectionable advertising bilge which characterizes the other fifty-one weeks of the year, and thereby make Music Week, this year, really memorable?

Honegger's "Le Roi David" and "Judith" were given their premieres in Switzerland, the native land of Honegger's parents, recently. The severely simple but picturesque old rustic theatre at Mezieres, where "Judith" was offered, carries a wealth of tradition for musical and dramatic presentations and throws about the composer a spiritual luster such as no other spot but Baireuth can give.

Two California artists are making good in case-hardened New York, Elizabeth and Frances Copeland of Los Angeles, who are presenting a number of two-piano recitals there to select audiences. They have been well received, according to press notices.

SCIENTISTICS

By MAX BEHR

BOEING Air Transport, Inc., announces this week the equipment of a fleet of 35 mail planes with radio telephones, to work with twelve ground station installations, in seven states. The completion of the equipment and its operation along the mail and passenger airways is the outstanding event in radio equipment operations.

The service makes possible inter-communication between planes and ground stations over the entire 2000-mile flight distance from Chicago to Oakland. Pilots in planes may communicate with ground stations when 175 to 200 miles from them and when the planes are from one to two miles in air. Planes may "work" each other as far apart as 175 miles—adequate for all plane operation purposes.

In the event planes get out of touch with each other, they may work ground stations which will relay messages. In this manner planes are apprised of weather or storm conditions ahead of time, and ground stations can be notified of the condition and location of planes. In the event a plane develops trouble, such as the loss of landing gear, it can radio this in advance and the ground stations will be prepared to handle the difficulty.

The bulk of the work will be conducted by radio telephone. This obviates the necessity of having trained code operators in the planes, a pilot being able to operate a radio telephone with a few minutes instruction. The design of the instruments is for compactness and efficiency, the total equipment, for both transmitting and receiving, weighing less than 100 pounds. An eight-foot vertical antenna is used, mounted on the top wing. The entire equipment is practically automatic in operation.

As an independent auxiliary service, ground stations will "train dispatch" the planes by means of radio "plane orders," which will give clearance, manifests and such other data necessary for carrying on a mail and plane business. All transmission will be in the "upper 80-meter band," but far below the broadcast channels.

* * *

The International Telephone and Telegraph Corporation has purchased the Radio Corporation of America's world-wide wireless communication service for a price alleged to be \$100,000,000, the biggest communication deal in history, according to wire

reports. The sale links telephone, telegraph, cable and wireless in one giant merger. Since its organization in 1920, the International T. and T. Corporation has acquired the Mackay companies with the Postal affiliations and the Federal Telegraph links, the International Western Electric Company and companies in South America, Europe, Cuba and Porto Rico. The sale is particularly interesting because of the fact that the White act forbids a merger of radio and telegraph interests. By outright purchase it is believed that the provisions of this bill will have been circumvented.

* * *

Venice and her canals froze during the European cold snap. Also the famous lagoon. The ice, however, was not hard enough for teams or pedestrians, and planes had to be resorted to to convey supplies to islands and other points. The spectacle of modern planes circling over historic palaces where gondolas have paddled for centuries was an incongruous element for tourists.

The Bureau of Standards at Washington is making a study of atmospheric fluctuations on radio signal strength. Certain stations are being used for the test and the records of their signals are put on a tape by means of an automatic recorder. The device works in colors, each station being marked down by pens with different colored inks. In this way a simultaneous comparison of signal intensities with regard to time and weather conditions can be made.

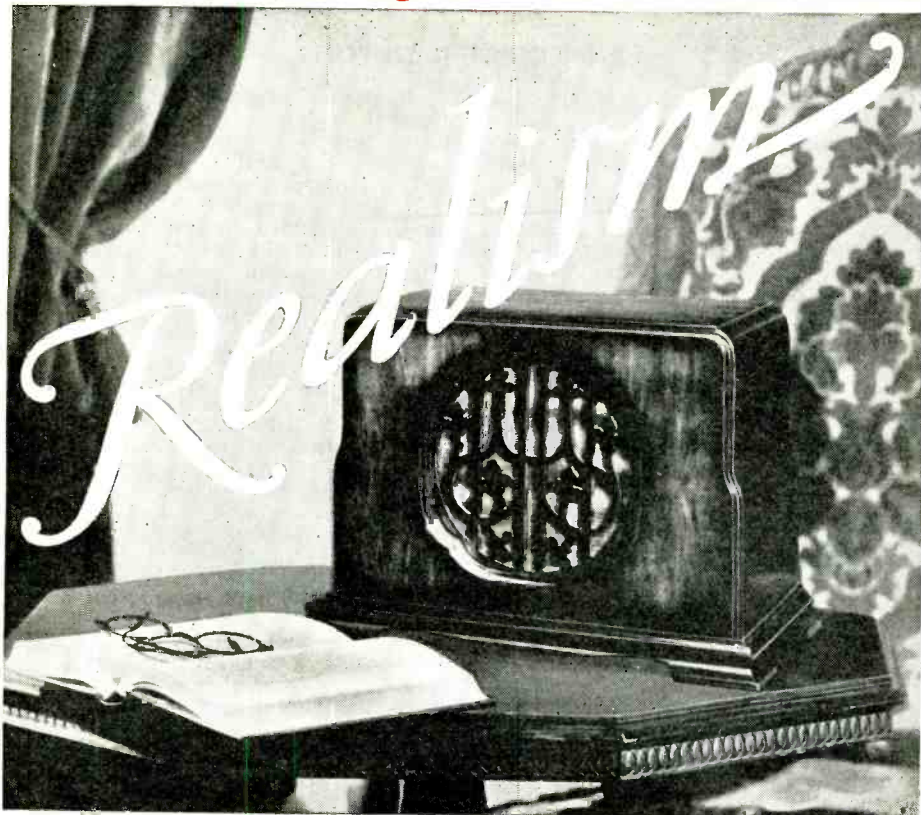

A variation of the system used by the Key System Transit Company for stopping trains automatically if they pass a block signal is now in use on fast passenger service lines between New York and Chicago. Locomotives are equipped with receivers. Electric inductors are placed at intervals along the rails. If the train passes a signal, the inductor affecting the receiver throws the brakes, by means of relays, and sands the rails. A train may be thus stopped without human hands.

THE BEM'S---KGO

STANISLAS BEM'S Little Symphony Orchestra, Eugenia Bem conducting, is again available to radio listeners three nights a week from KGO. Sundays 9:20 until 10:15 and Mondays and Fridays from 7 until 8 p.m.

Perhaps no other small concert organization in the bay district has been so consistently popular as this one since it first came on the air over five years ago with the opening of KFRC. The answer is doubtless to be found in the superb musicianship of the two Bems.

They were both born in Warsaw, Poland, and knew each other as children when their musical interests brought them together. Eugenia can't remember when she first began playing the violin. She only remembers that she was playing when she was six. At the age of eight, standing no higher than a samovar, she played her first concert. Soloist with a symphony orchestra tiny Eugenia Argiewicz offered the Ninth De Beriot Concerto.

Although her father and mother were not musical three of their six children were unusually gifted in this direction. Both Eugenia and one of her brothers were known all over Europe as child prodigies. Another brother has been for years with the Philadelphia Symphony Orchestra under Stowoski and now goes to Gabrilowitz.

From the time she was fourteen years old Eugenia has earned her own way in the world with her violin. She saved her money and came to America when she was twenty—straight to Seattle, where her brother-in-law, who had been her teacher, was residing—and joined the Seattle Symphony Orchestra as soloist.

Stanislas Bem was twenty-three when he came to America with his cello. He played for a year with the Cincinnati Symphony and then went to New York to concertize for two years. He next played four years with the San Francisco Symphony under Hertz. With Eugenia Bem he was in vau-deville for several years and for the past seven they have been at the Hotel Whitcomb. Stanislas Bem married Eugenia Argiewicz at the Whitcomb (when it was the city hall) thirteen years ago. Eugenia says that with his name he didn't have much difficulty in winning her. She was already resolved to marry the first man with a single cylinder name who presented himself, just to be able to discard her old four-cylinder, out-board valve cognomen which was operating very poorly in America.

Mr. Bem's period of study in Europe, although no less brilliant, was more conventional than his wife's. His parents (his father was a well-known physician) sent him to Paris to study at eighteen. Then to Brussels Conservatory, from which institution he graduated with the highest distinction, winner of the Grand Prix for the year. His first important public appearance was at the age of seventeen, when he played Schumann's Concerto for the Warsaw Philharmonic.

The Bems' only child, a girl, Vanda, eight years, although not a prodigy, already takes her music very seriously. She is very decided about her favorite composer, Bach, and her ambition is to play his compositions on the violin. She already plays some of his piano numbers, which are not quite so difficult. When we say that Vanda is her parents' "pride and joy" we do not want the triteness of the expression to detract from its full meaning. She emphatically is their pride and joy. At present she is attending the Dominican Convent at San Rafael, and they see her twice a week, on Wednesdays when she comes to San Francisco for her music lesson, and on Sundays when the parents go to San Rafael and spend the day, picnicing, if possible.

The Bems' diverse individualities make them an interesting couple. Their happiness together is by no means dependent upon similarity of likes and dislikes. Take modern music. Stanislas likes it. Gershwin's compositions he thinks are marvelous—the harmony and the novel combinations appeal to him very much. But in Eugenia there is none of the blood of the modernist. With the exception of the Viennese waltz she feels that modern jazz has the most fascinating rhythm of any dance music ever written, but that it has absolutely no place on the concert stage. Their tastes in literature have a tendency to diverge, too, though they are both fond of Ibsen. Eugenia likes Kathleen Norris and Mary Roberts Rhinehart.

Eugenia says that the three Bs—Bach, Beethoven and Brahms—encompass her favorite composers. Stanislas mentions Wagner, Brahms and Richard Strauss.

Mr. Bem is proud of the fact that three years ago he sent one of his pupils to Paris and she was not only admitted to the Paris Conservatory, an unusual honor in itself, but was awarded a gold medal. She is Flori Gough, now with the San Francisco Symphony.

Lon became so excited when Charles Park, KGO announcer, whispered the glad tidings to him, that he didn't know which end of the piano was the bass.

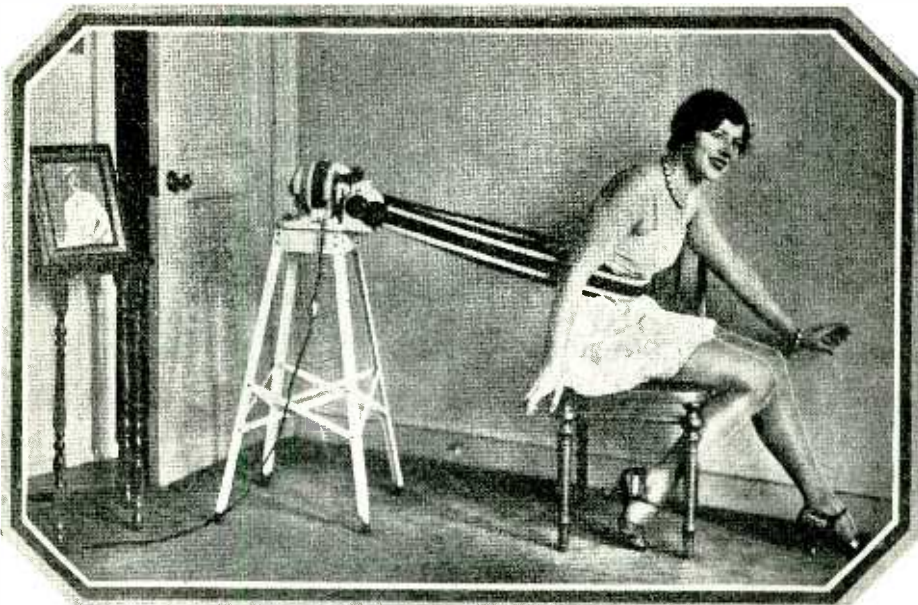

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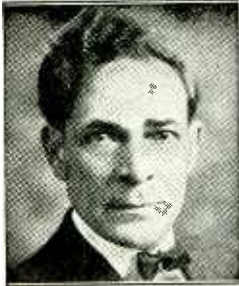

of the man-child to be. The bleat of the calf is the growing veal. The rocking rhythm of the jazz is shaking down our old world convictions and conventions. But it is all getting somewhere.

* * *

We don't approve of Paul Whiteman's musical effects any more than we approve of a man filing a saw under our bedroom window. But when they are both through with the racket, the real work can begin. The one thing we do think should be curbed is the spraying of it all over the air. The government ought to buy an island down off the coast of somewhere and let all these jazz blacksmiths who are hammering out their new patterns, make a workshop of it. When they've found what they are after then they can come back and we'll listen in.

* * *

We ask you—do you like a baby when its mouth is wide open and its tonsils are showing and it is shrieking its little head off at a dumb world? Do you like this racket hurled at you by a dynamic speaker with 700 volts on the plate? Do you like the yipe of a cat with its tail mashed in a door, amplified 4,567,892 times? Neither do we. That's why we don't like jazz. We like the baby, the cat and the jazz—when each is through with its fits. This musical motherhood is dogged tough on us and we wish some of these ambitious parents of new ideas would remember this when trying out the ambitious offspring before a "mike."

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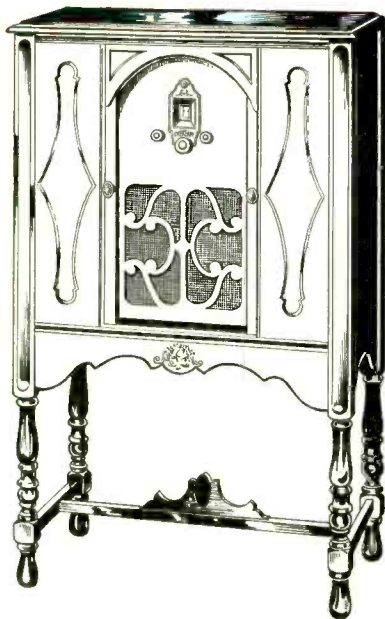
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
