## THE EDITOR'S PAGE

IT WAS with widespread joy that the radio world heard the farewell of the famous Flonzaley quartet, one of the famous musical organizations of the world, hang up its fiddles and bows in front of the microphone not long since. It was an occasion of joy at the opportunity and sorrow over the significance of the event. The quartet itself thereby gave a rare gesture. In the failing age of one of them they saw ultimately a failing synchrony in the ensemble work. Rather than permit art to suffer, the quartet disbanded. This was a great gesture, one which somewhat restores our faith in the vision of ultimates. In contrast with such bilge as the Queen Juicyfruit series, it is most refreshing.

\* \* \*

Respighi's opera, "The Sunken Bell," it has been observed, has thus far produced a much weaker response in America than in Europe. "This may be another of those spontaneous registrations of 'independence plus' so characteristic of the Land of the Spree and the Home of the Rave," says a French correspondent. "Or it may indicate a touch of discrimination minus."

We'll be able to say more definitely when we've had the Pacific Coast reaction. We're not so rampant about our artistic independence out here, but we are very apt to express our musical appreciation or disapproval regardless of the traffic signs of the Intelligencia. While it is true that an artist or an opera or even a composition that wins

wide and enthusiastic acclaim abroad is apt to meet a problematic if not a tepid reception over here, it is largely due to an established public musical consciousness in the older country which requires less intellectual than emotional attention to arouse response—the actual habit of enthusiasm. In America we are not yet used enough to music for it to pass unobstructed into our emotional consciousness. It must first squeeze through the turnstiles of curious and speculative inspection.

We are children here, in higher consciousness—artistic, scientific and philosophical—but children with a healthy curiosity, eyes set wide apart and level, in first-hand contact with precocity. Which, perhaps, with all due respect to our astute correspondent, is a lap ahead of senility and the effete.

\* \* \*

The softly spoken words of Milton J. Cross, announcer at WJZ, finally won for him the gold medal for best diction, offered by the American Academy of Arts and Letters. Cross' voice, it was said, was scarcely audible four feet away, without the microphone, but on the air came over full of resonant timber. Cross, as an announcer, leads all the others. This fact in itself may stimulate, somewhat, correct speaking over the air. It may eliminate the egotist who thinks the air calls him when it is the exit sign instead. Announcing is an art and all arts require training in their individual technique.

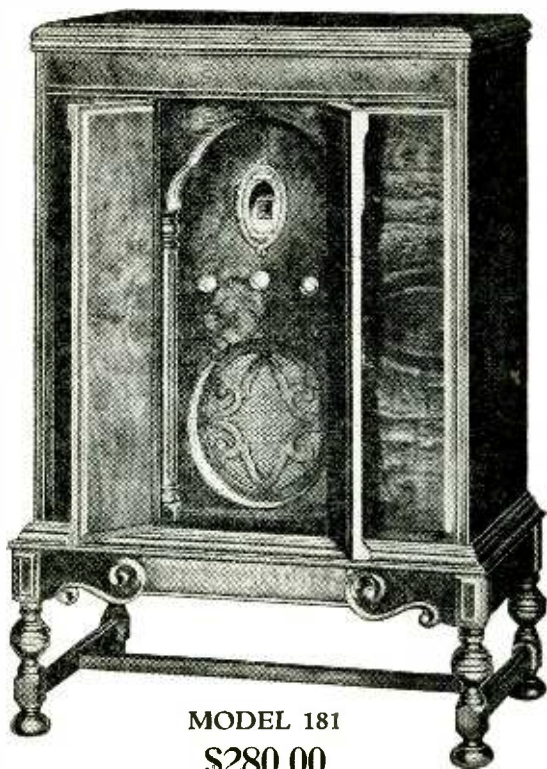

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# The RADIO TATTLER

A GERMAN scientist who has been doing some high tension thinking, chasing the bally little atom around, and forcing this and that electron to marry to see what their children did, has suddenly arrived at the conclusion that he can broadcast smells as well as sound and pictures. He has gone into his laboratory, locked the door, and announced that he will be out by and by and show us how the thing is done. We shudder!

\* \* \*

There is the smell of cauliflower, for instance. Innocent looking plant. Nice green leaves. Pleasant bouquet effect. Naturally constructed for weddings, funerals and other decorative purposes. Vile disposition. Smell it green. No odor. Stick it in water and warm it up—ye gods! Cross between a sour Indian and a fermented buzzard. It gets all over the house. Try and disguise from anybody the fact that a cauliflower has been cooked. Ought to be broadcast without the slightest distortion.

\* \* \*

Then there is corned beef and cabbage, commonly known as "red mike and violets." When they get to broadcasting smells, the housewife can escape the c. b. and c. odors that cling to the upholstery. Father can go in the front room and snap on the radio. The smell will reach him on 50,000 watts. The wife can serve "silent meat" and everybody is happy. Or, a cook might even serve turnips and carrots, horse food which people eat, accompanied by a 6 o'clock smell of ham and eggs, and fool anybody. Great idea!

\* \* \*

When smells are broadcast daily from local stations, we can carry little pocket receivers, and when we get on a street car and find it filled, as now, with twenty-five women, each trying to out-smell the rest with all the known brands of loud and cheap perfume, we can snap a switch and tune in a plate of fried onions and give 'em a battle for their fresh air. We might even switch the set to the municipal incinerator and add a few toasted bones to the ensemble.

The broadcasting of smells will mean a control of smells. At the present time, smells are free. There are places where some of the old pioneer smells still exist, and other places where parvenue smells hold forth. Not a day

passes but somebody invents a new smell. But when these are all on definite wave lengths, when we have to tune for them, it will change the whole situation. No one will dare transmit a public or private smell without government inspection.

No more running suddenly into a hot, fetid whiff of moose-lilac or charnel-house rose, as we do now. We'd know in advance.

The soap manufacturers wouldn't be able to saturate their soaps with the high-powered odors either. If the smell receiver was off, we would not be afraid that, after we washed our hands, somebody would dash up and kiss us. We'd have soap that was soap. Instead of soap men sponsoring music, they would sponsor smells. We'd have the Olefactory Eight squirting joy smells at the dinner hour fresh from new-born blossoms. Oh boy!

\* \* \*

Of course we may be a bit previous in all this. Our German friend may come out of his laboratory and say to his wear-and-tear: "Mamma—it iss nicht!" But this is a remote possibility. When a German goes into a laboratory he is apt to bring something out. The trouble is to get him in. This savant, contrary to custom, is now in. And if he emerges with the great problem solved—overnight, ham and eggs, frying on the grill, can be brought into every home for the price of a dental bill.

\* \* \*

Well—we've had a lot of fun, both with liquor and radio. Television must have its day. Perhaps by that time the German will come out of his gopher-hole and show us how to smell wood-violets in the dead of winter and the sizz of fried fish from a mountain stream on the thirty-second floor of a skyscraper. If he can—he's a greater man than Volstead, who opened a new market for machine guns in a peaceful community.

## A Peep Across the Music Firmament

**WE NOTE** with considerable interest the extent to which radio is bringing out of obscurity much that otherwise might have remained hidden. In point is the bass song, "The Wanderers," written by Charles H. Gabriel, Jr., program director of the N. B. C., which was given its premier over the air on a Sunday afternoon. The public response was instantaneous, and it has been repeated to growing approval. The song is now printed and available. In the radio we see an excellent proving ground for ambitious composers who wish to test reactions.

\* \* \*

Again from the radio field we cull the announcement that Leigh Harline, for eight months a star at KFRC, who has been transferred to KHJ, the Don Lee unit in the south, where he will join Baron Keyes, who also was once one of our struggling composers of the bay district. Here are two again who are coming into fame through the revealments of the microphone.

\* \* \*

While slightly out of the field of music, yet it is nevertheless of interest to radio listeners that the gold medal for good diction among announcers has gone to Milton J. Cross, announcer of WJZ. The medal was offered by the American Academy of Arts and Letters in New York recently. Graham McNamee was not among the last two choices, the decision wavering for a time between Cross and John B. Daniel. The committee, which listened to practically every announcer of importance in the United States, selected Cross because of his quiet manner of speaking. Without the aid of a microphone, his enunciation, which is clear and distinct over the air, could probably not be heard more than four feet, it is said. This award may have its effect in toning down some of the melharmonic blastings which go by the name of announcing in some of our larger stations.

Toscanini, the first Italian to be so honored, will conduct the Bayreuth festival in 1930, it has been determined. The invitation came from Siegfried Wagner, son of the great composer. With two exceptions the great Bayreuth events have thus far honored famous German conductors. The honor to Toscanini comes as an appreciation

of his work in spreading the liking for Wagnerian music through non-German countries.

Mrs. Noah Brandt, assisted by Mrs. Ernest Heuter, will present in recital six promising young pianists on May 16. The presentation will be made at the Fairmont Hotel.

\* \* \*

The Pan American Association of Composers, organized last year by American and Latin-American composers to spread the presentation and understanding of musical compositions of the two Americas, will produce in San Francisco during the coming season, it is understood, the works of Adolph Weiss and Ruth Crawford, pianists; Carlos Chavez, violinist; Charles Ives, symphonist, and possibly the works of Ruggles, Cowell and Varese.

John Philip Sousa has been made honorary life president of the newly organized association of American bandmasters.

\* \* \*

Out of Birmingham, Ala., which has given us so much amusement via the typing fingers of Octavus Roy Cohen, comes the fine singing voice and clear diction of 14-year-old Jesse Drennan, Jr., who has already won high praise as soloist in choir and radio work.

\* \* \*

Another favorite of the air who, in less than a year, is all but swamped with applause letters from Canada to South America is Miss Louise Bave, christened the "nightingale of the air."

\* \* \*

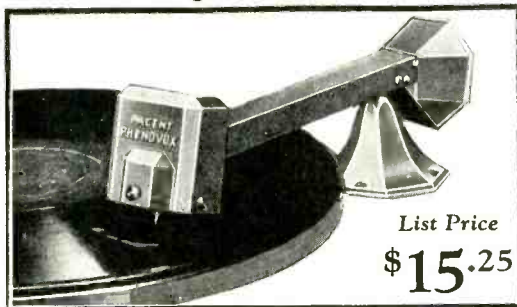
Such outstanding musical prophets of their race as Neville Atkinson and Roland Hayes are striking proofs that "aspiration knows not the limitation of prejudice." We have again recently been moved by the beauty, poignancy and interpretative delicacy of Hayes. It is to be hoped that his work in the schools and colleges of the East will not too long keep Atkinson from appearing on the Pacific Coast.

Hold everything! We may yet hear the hotly disputed, enviously derided, cautiously commended, and unquestionably brilliant and attractive Ganna Walska in the 1929 season. We particularly like to see and hear the victims of pigeon-hole criticism.

# “SCIENTISTICS”

San Francisco has the first fleet of refrigerator trucks in the United States. These trucks, operated by the Golden Gate Motor Transport Company, go in pairs—a truck and a trailer. The refrigerating system is located behind the driver and enables the Sacramento Valley produce to be brought to San Francisco, a distance of ninety or more miles, in perfect condition. The trucks are lined with cork and sawdust.

\* \* \*

By a strange turn of human interest, the country seems to have gone mad over puppet shows. There are a dozen or more in successful operation and even in Europe, the puppet show, long the plaything of the mountebank, has at last come into the legitimate field of entertainment. It is now possible to obtain books on the making and operation of puppet shows. Blanding Sloan in San Francisco has one which has attracted wide attention. His puppets are presenting definite plays, his “Heavenly Discourse,” a puppetlogue of a famous playlet registering a decided hit with packed houses.

\* \* \*

Eastern advertising concerns are using giant planes, with various words spelled on the under side of them by means of neon tubes to broadcast publicity regarding cigarettes and other wares. The planes fly over the city, totally invisible except for the words, which are clearly readable from the ground even at flying heights. By means of various gasses, tube lights of varied color effects are utilized.

\* \* \*

Two Paris scientists have found a system by which, by the use of 1200-watt tungsten lamps, they can fool strawberry plants into blossoming and bearing fruit. The strawberries cost about \$5 each, figured on a kilowatt consumption basis.

\* \* \*

Experiments are being conducted in Florida with mosquito control which may be adopted by the Department of Agriculture in other parts of the country. An airplane, equipped with boxes of Paris green in an inert dust, flies over the affected area and releases the dust which showers down on all vegetation. One plane can cover twenty square miles of territory at a cost of 70 cents an acre. The mosquitos are completely eliminated.

Tree scientists are doctoring plants by means of test tubes filled with gases of various kinds, which are placed over buds and then sealed to the tree. Stimulating gases can be used to cause premature budding of trees and fruit crops may be advanced considerably by experiments of this nature, it is said.

\* \* \*

As rival to the Frigidare, a kerosene refrigerator is now on the market which uses an oil stove for a cooling device. The thing costs two cents a day to operate, gives plenty of room for food, supplies below zero temperature and is invaluable on farms and in rural communities, where the usual automatic refrigerator cannot be used.

\* \* \*

There is enormous concentration in the radio field in the making of more and better speakers. The speaker story may be said to have gone through three stages—the horn or telephone receiver stage; the cone, and lastly, the dynamic. Now the manufacturers are putting out augmented forms of dynamics, such as the “auditorium type,” which is powerful in the extreme, and a very recent type called the “inductor dynamic.” It is pretty generally conceded that to get the most out of a dynamic type speaker, some source of B-power supply capable of giving at least 400 volts must be used. Nearly all recent sets are incorporating such a “power pack” in the set itself, along with the dynamic, and making the whole thing automatic and A. C., or “house lighting current” operated. The loud speakers used in the talkies are not usually of the dynamic type but of a special unit design capable of enormous volume and customarily used in public address systems. Such speakers, although marvelously accurate, embody too much mechanism to make them available, either in point of size or price, for ordinary radio use.

\* \* \*

A letter of thanks to various radio stations in the bay district has been sent out by E. H. Bowie, meteorologist of the United States Weather Bureau in San Francisco, thanking them for the invaluable service rendered the farmers of the state during the recent frost epidemic. Many of the stations sent warnings twice a day when a frost was impending, enabling smudge pots and other preventive measures to be taken.

Joseph Diskay, famous Hungarian tenor, known to music lovers throughout the country for his vaudeville and radio appearances, is to be heard exclusively over the Paramount Pictures-Los Angeles Evening Express station KNX, Hollywood, for a long period, it was announced recently.

Bobbe Deane, famed in radioland for her efficient mimicry, in reality is Mrs. Ted Maxwell, wife of the NBC production manager. Bobbe keeps house, a sporting police dog and a vivacious marmoset when she's not before the microphone.

Monroe Jockers, well-known orchestra leader, has signed an exclusive arrangement whereby his orchestra will be heard regularly over station KNX, Hollywood. A daily half-hour concert, from 6:30 to 7 o'clock, will be augmented by other nightly appearances.

Clarence Carlquist, KGW operator, has left on a three-weeks' tour of California. To keep in touch with his home station he took along a portable set and expects to listen in every night.

Charles Hart, recent addition to the program staff at the NBC San Francisco studios, gave his first radio program one St. Patrick's Day. Coincidentally, he came to NBC on another St. Patrick's Day to direct the Sunday Afternoon Concert, and remained as orchestral conductor.

The cigarette and the cigar have been banished from the studios of KGW. The anti-cigarette league can claim no credit. The object was merely to save the rugs and grand pianos from further scorplings.

Peggy Rollins, Vitaphone star, returned to her old haunt, KGW, the other evening and did her stuff before the mike for her old Portland friends.

In order to handle the increasing number of network programs originating at KFI, Freeman Lusk has been added to the staff of the continuity department. Lusk has had much experience in scenario writing and stage work.

Eva Gruninger Atkinson, contralto on the NBC staff at the San Francisco studios, has been signed by the San Francisco and Los Angeles Opera companies for rôles in three operas with each company for the fall 1929 season.

## *Mr. California Home Life of KGO*

HAVE you ever wondered how it would look to gather together in one place an entire radio audience for a given program, just as they are when listening in? Take the daily morning audience of Mr. California Home Life, who talks to the ladies while they are busily engaged in California home-living. Mrs. Jones has paused a moment before the radio with a curtain in her hand she is about to hang. Mrs. Smith is just in the act of administering a mild thrashing to little Louise, whose mysterious adventures have left her with a torn dress and a skinned knee. Mrs. Johnson is busily engaged with a stub pencil trying to figure out how to make a \$75 check stretch around \$35 for rent, \$28 for groceries, \$8 for a tire, \$12 for a dentist's bill, \$3.50 for wood, \$3.75 for shoes for John Jr. and still have enough left for a dress for herself. This little problem is liable to interest Mrs. Johnson in Mr. California Home Life's talk with rather more than ordinary intensity because that radio man is very much concerned with helping people in financial matters.

We have always assumed that budgeting was a scheme to make people spend their money for the things they should, rather than for the things they wanted, and we have steered clear of it. But, according to Mr. Park, if you have enough faith in budgeting, and allied subjects, in some mysterious way a given income will actually buy more rent, groceries, tires, gold crowns, wood, shoes and dresses under the budget system than by itself. Ever since he once found himself in a hole, entirely surrounded by bills, and not an income in sight big enough to pull him out, he has made a study of income vs. out-go. The benefit of this experience and study may be had by tuning in from 9:30 till 10:30 in the morning on KGO.

Other items on Mr. Park's list that are calculated to add content and happiness to California homes are interior decorating and child training. In connection with these he functions more in the capacity of a director of the program than an expert himself. At present there is being broadcast a series of talks on child training, primarily concerned with the problem child, by well-known stu-

dents in that field. Mr. Park himself talks informally upon the problems of managing children upon the basis of his own personal experience. His own two little girls, the oldest seven and the youngest four, have never known a spanking or an unkind word. And yet he is very stern with them. It never occurs to them to try to take advantage of him. In order to teach them responsibility he is training them in financial matters very early in life. For everything they do about the house, such as straightening up their room, they are paid so much. Then, when they want a doll or some other precious possession, they must contribute so much toward it out of their earnings.

Charley Park is an advertising man and lays no claim to being more. He came from the magazine representative game into radio about a year ago. He has done so well that he can occasionally be caught (at least he could if one were able to divide his thoughts) figuring out just what he would do if he owned a broadcasting station himself. He left high school for the newspaper advertising world (in spite of an appointment to Annapolis), and a few years later, at the age of twenty-two, took it upon himself to be the head of a family. Both sets of parents provided objections, the best sort of fuel for youthful love, and in a borrowed car with a borrowed ten dollars in the pants pocket they drove to San Rafael and were married. The first few years fulfilled all of the parents' prognostications—the marriage didn't go so well. But after that father got on his feet and they have been a happy, devoted household ever since.

Mr. California Home Life is a serious, intense, ambitious, persevering chap with firm convictions who is anxious to please and fearful lest he offend. He was born in Alameda (laughter from the gallery) and raised in the East Bay district. His parents are of English extraction. His mother was an opera singer and his father is engaged in the real estate business. He is the only child. Tennis has been his favorite recreation in sports for many years and at one time he held the Alameda County championship.

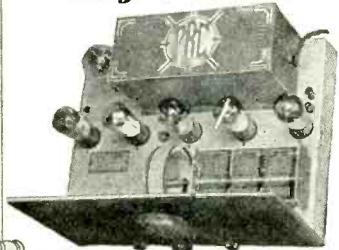
