Daylight Saving Time Causes Many Program Changes

LISTENERS are reminded that once again Daylight Saving Time will make its appearance in many eastern cities. Every year certain eastern cities, and in some cases whole states, set the clock ahead one hour during the summer months. This year it will be effective at midnight, April 25th, and will continue in effect until September 27th. This change in time necessitates a general readjustment in all fields of industry and in radio it means that all programs originating in these cities will be broadcast one hour earlier. The Pacific Coast will be affected in that all transcontinental pro-

grams will be heard here one hour earlier than heretofore.

The broadcast time of numerous Pacific Coast programs has been changed to accommodate the eastern presentations. In some cases a station's entire schedule has been changed. The new schedules are shown in this issue. Study them carefully and as a precaution against missing some favorite program make up your schedule for the week, in advance. Tell your friends that this issue of BROADCAST WEEKLY contains the revised programs of all coast stations affected. It's on sale at almost all newsstands on the Pacific Coast.

On the Air with Walt Roesner—

This is the second of a series of articles on the individual members of Walt Roesner's Fox Theater Concert Orchestra. The series was prompted by the tremendous response received from radio listeners upon the program given by this organization each Monday morning over Captain Dobbie's Shell Happytime. During the first three weeks they have been on the air, more than 12,000 enthusiastic fans have written letters of appreciation of the broadcast.—*The Editor.*

OSLO, Norway, cradle of so many of the world's outstanding violinists and other musical geniuses, was the birth-place and scene of study for Thorstein Jensen Holm, first violinist of Walt Roesner's Fox Theater Concert Orchestra. When Happytime audiences hear the beautiful strains of Holm's violin through their loud-speakers, they are listening to the results of more than 18 years of almost constant study, most of which was spent at the famed Oslo Conservatory of Music.

Following completion of his studies, Holm took over the baton of the Concert Master Symphonia at Oslo and later played the Palace Royale Norway and first violin at the Oslo Royal Opera.

Among his first positions in America was that of concert master at Fox West Coast Theaters, where he remained for ten years, just previous to accepting the important post of first violin in Roesner's organization. During this period he also held first violin position in the San Francisco Symphony.

Strangely enough, this man whose life has been literally wrapped in music, lists medical work as his hobby. He takes a keen delight in all phases of surgery, therapeutics and pathology. Who knows, but perhaps some day he will turn his genius toward the world of medicine.

The sailor who is always to be found paddling a canoe or rowing a boat as entertainment on his "shore leave" finds no parallel in the musical world. Musicians, if members of Walt Roesner's orchestra may be taken as a criterion, find their "shore leave" entertainment as far from the field of music as possible. Take Harry Moulin, violinist of Roesner's orchestra, for example.

When not playing at the theatre, Harry may be found almost any day soaring in a glider over the San Francisco sand dunes, an outlet for a love of the outdoors which has burned within him from childhood. His early ambitions were for engineering. He is an active member of the San Francisco Glider Club and participates in many of the competitions held by the organization.

Moulin was born twenty years ago in San Francisco and began his study of the violin

at the age of 12 years. His natural ability soon won him the praise of music critics and at the age of 17, he was playing a number of major musical appearances. Still intent upon furthering his musical education, he took a special course of instruction from the well-known violin master, M. Pastro. Even now his study continues with a course in music theory, which he is taking under D. Brescia.

Born in the shadow of the Thames in London, the musical career of Maurice Feiler, 'cellist of Roesner's orchestra, began almost as soon as his tiny hands would hold a 'cello bow. At the age of twelve, he made his debut in famed Steinway Hall, London, with his sister acting as accompanist.

So successful was his appearance there, within a few years he found himself playing his beloved instrument in the Russian Symphony. But his eyes were turned toward America and when the offer of a post with the Minneapolis Symphony came, he forthwith took himself and his 'cello to the Wisconsin city. Later he joined the Columbia Opera Company and it was during its appearance in San Francisco that Roesner picked him to play in the organization which Shell Happytime fans now enjoy each Monday morning.

The Goddess of the Air must have a strange fascination for musicians and particularly members of Walt Roesner's orchestra, for here is another who turns to glider piloting as a hobby. He is Mel Wesleder, violinist, and recently appointed treasurer of the San Francisco Glider Club.

Wesleder was born 29 years ago in Great Falls, Montana, and at the age of nine began his musical studies. In 1920, he moved to San Francisco where his studies continued under Julius Haug.

His first professional job was a two-year engagement at the St. Francis Theater in San Francisco. Next came an engagement at the San Francisco Granada Theater, where he remained until joining Roesner when the great Fox Theater opened. Besides his ability on the violin, Wesleder is an accomplished trombone and piano player, which instruments he frequently "doubles" on in his present position.

ELVIA ALLMAN, KHJ's miss-interpreter of the lighter things in life, began what-a-life in Spencer, North Carolina, September 19, 1905. To save restaurant tablecloths, we figure it out for you. She's 26 years old. From Spencer to Wichita Falls, Texas, is but a leap for a pair of long

legs like Elvia's. There to her undying glory, she graduated with honors from the Wichita Falls Dramatic School, and having earned some money teaching the local banker's, minister's, and feed and fuel baron's daughters the art of the drama, forwarded herself to Chicago. At Chicago University further knowledge was acquired and ambition for a career fanned to white heat. The white heat developed enough steam in Elvia's boilers to get her to New York. But she blew up in Hoboken after a few glorious weeks in stock and a trip around the suburbs in "Smiling Through." Came the big chance. Elvia was cast as the maid in the Broadway production of "Flames." She was also understudy for the female lead. This seemed like an excellent opportunity as the lead was subject to fits and starts. But "Flames" turned to ashes the first week. And opportunity knocked but once. At this point in this career, Elvia's mother, who has been dying slowly since the day she was born, wired daughter to come to Los Angeles to spend the last days with her. Elvia hopped the first freight and arrived in time. She reports that her mother gives every indication of continuing to die slowly for the next sixty years.

It was five years ago that Miss Allman burst upon radio as the program manager of KHJ. While radio, then, wasn't what it is today, Elvia was very hungry and a warm place to sit looked good. When Don Lee bought KHJ it was discovered that Elvia was thrown in with the transmitter to make it a baker's dozen. It should be recorded for historians that Miss Allman's first radio appearance was over the Westinghouse Station in Chicago. She endeavored to entertain with readings from the masters. Although she returned several times, she was never asked to. But—as the count stands

today, there isn't a better she-comic on the air than Elvia—nor a more distinguished impersonator—nor a more delightful interpreter of the low-down in popular music—nor a more finished actress in farce comedy. Believe it or not, a large hunk of the radio audience, recognizing her fine intelligence and vital personality, are betting that the bundle of volatile arms, legs, eyes, ears, nose and throat, known as Elvia Allman (alias Auntie McKassar, Malaria, Harriet, etc.) will go as far as radio.

OSCAR HEATHER, lyric tenor, is a person who would have been called, in past years, "a gentleman and a scholar." The kindly twinkle in his blue eyes, the even-tempered voice, and pleasant manner all stamp him as that rare individual, a radio artist without temperament! And a lyric tenor has his trials and tribulations.

Mr. Heather is a pioneer in radio. He was the first tenor on KYW on 1924, and from there he went to WENR for three years in the capacity of staff soloist, and also as an announcer. It was during this time that he became so popular with Illinois fans—and now scarcely a day passes without someone calling KFWB; inquiring if "that delightful voice I heard was Oscar Heather? Well—well! I heard him first when I lived in Chicago; and I told my husband that it must be the same person!" After a time, he was made assistant musical director, and was kept so busy that he had little time to appear on programs.

Before coming to KFWB, Heather was assistant musical director of radio station KMOX, in St. Louis, and also was guest artist on feature programs.

Besides his radio experience, he has been the soloist with the Minneapolis Symphony Orchestra, and with the Chicago Apollo Club. He was also a member of the Marshal Field Chorus with the Chicago Symphony.

He has a warm, sympathetic voice with a great deal of beauty to it, especially fitted for the numbers which he sings nightly on the "Slumber Time" program.

IT was the limitation of space which made a radio book reviewer of Joseph Henry Jackson, whom NBC network listeners hear Sunday nights in the "Reader's Guide," through NBC station KGO.

Known as the most noted book critic in the West, Jackson, like so many other writing men, chafed at the constriction of newspaper and magazine columns. There was so much to say, and so little room to say it.

Then came a time when he was asked to speak at a luncheon which was broadcast over the radio. It suddenly occurred to the young critic that if newspaper columns were limited, the air was not. He had always believed in treating books like news, instead of topics for solemn lectures on style, and he wondered if that wouldn't appeal to the radio audience.

He took his query to Wilda Wilson Church, then dramatic director at station KGO, and still a member of the NBC staff.

"Try it out!" said this white-haired, young-hearted radio pioneer, and Jackson did. That was in 1924, and the "experiment" is still running strong. Jackson has come to the conclusion that people do like to hear the news about new books, provided the one who informs them doesn't assume the attitude of a professor or lecturer.

In the six years he has been the NBC "Reader's Guide," Jackson has brought more than one hundred authors before the microphone with him. Some of the writers who have been interviewed by the critic are Stewart Edward White, Charles Caldwell Dobie, Gertrude Atherton, Peter B. Kyne, and Richard Halliburton.

Persons who note Jackson's youthful appearance, and the apparent ease with which he conducts his radio book reviews may think that his job isn't difficult. But behind his ease lies a background of deep experience.

Born in New Jersey, the critic was educated at Lafayette, famous old Pennsylvania school for boys, and entered the Seventy-second Infantry the day after graduation. The World War was on, and for two years, Lieutenant Jackson forgot all about his plans to be a writer. At the conclusion of the war, he came to California, and from newspaper work passed to magazine work.

KFRC's Junior Maurice Chevalier, Charles Carter, began his artistic career by impersonating Al Jolson at the age of 12. Two years later the Maurice Chevalier storm broke and young Charles switched his affections from the Mammy singer to the captivating Frenchman. He saw his shows, studied his records and became so adept in imitating him that he thought there "was no harm in trying out on the KFRC audition period."

It turned out there was considerable good to accrue from the venture. Only recently Charles, who is now 15, flew to Los Angeles to take Maurice Chevalier's part in the radio version of "The Love Parade," a broadcast over the Don Lee network. It was Al Pearce who saw possibilities in the young man's impersonations. He was used first on the Jamboree and then on the Happy Go Lucky Hour. Since then his popularity has steadily increased.

Charles is fifteen years old at the present time. He is a student at the Wilkins Private School, in San Francisco. His reason for attending a private school is so that his hours may be arranged to accommodate his daily appearance on the Happy Go Lucky Hour, from 2 to 3 o'clock in the afternoon. He finances his own tuition.

The young man comes from a theatrical family. His father was a black-face comedian at one time in Chicago; his mother was a concert singer in England before coming to America. His parents are both English.

He confesses that above everything else he enjoys singing and appearing in plays. Of course, there is football. He plays right tackle on his school's team.

From associate editor of Sunset Magazine he progressed to the editorship. Radio took him away from that, and his time now is given up entirely to writing for magazines, teaching other folk how to write, and chasing news in books.

Yes, he's married. And his wife isn't a writer, either. She's one of the few persons with whom Joseph Henry comes in contact, day after day, who has no aspirations along that line, which may be one of the reasons why the union is such a success.

The effect was good, but Bernice put so much feeling into the dish-smashing that when the act was over, her fingers were covered with gore, and for sometime wore a bandage on her left hand.

• • • One of KFRC's accounts is a summer resort called Cuesta La Honda. On the desk of Merle Matthews, KFRC's production manager, there recently appeared a number of plans for very unusual summer cottages. It developed that Miss Matthews had drawn them—architecture being another of her studies—for the Cuesta La Honda Company. She was employed for several years by a well-known architect.

When interviewed exclusively young Roach vouchsafed the information that it was much easier to pronounce words over the air than to spell them for the news-sheet.

• • • KFVB's slender redhead, Loyce Whiteman, ballad crooner, said despondently the other day, "I wish I could convince announcers that my name isn't 'Lois'—but 'Loyce!' But I guess it's too much to expect!" Just then the gentleman at the microphone said with gusto, "Lois Whiteman will now sing—" and that was that!

• • • Oscar Heather, lyric tenor, will win California fans as he has won his listeners in Illinois and Missouri. He comes to KFVB from station KMOX in St. Louis, where he was soloist and assistant musical director. Previous to that he was a member of WENT's staff.

• • • So heavy is the response to Dr. Howard W. Haggard's Sunday night CBS talks on "Devils, Drugs and Doctors," on behalf of Eastman Kodak that in the six weeks he has been broadcasting he has had more than 50,000 requests for copies of his talks close to 560 requests for every minute he has been on the air.

• • • Harry von Zell, nother CBS aerial spokesman has written the first 3,000 words of a novel. But the strain of an announcer's day, which is more intense than you might think, has caused him to lay aside the masterpiece until some time when he will have more leisure.

• • • Eddie Lynn of KHJ's Continuity Department is Charles Wakefield Cadman's chief collaborator and lyricist. "Glory" and "Little Blue Gate," are their two most recent efforts. Curiously, "Dream for Two," which will be published in the fall is dedicated to Virginia Flohri of KFI. When KHJ's staff sopranos hear about it, they'll probably get Eddie in a corner and beat him to a pulp. Well, why not?

• • • Listeners who tuned in KOA, Denver, one minute before the station was scheduled to begin its broadcasting one day recently, heard a strange greeting come out of the silence of their loudspeakers. Alex Deno, the KOA janitor, hurrying to finish dusting the studio, accidentally threw the switch, putting the studio on the air. And not knowing he was speaking into an open microphone, he voiced the proverbial plaint of janitors throughout the world, "Gee! This is a dirty place!"

• • • Ralph McDonald Robertson, former announcer of the National Broadcasting Company of WRC, has been signed to fill a similar position at KFI-KECA, Los Angeles.

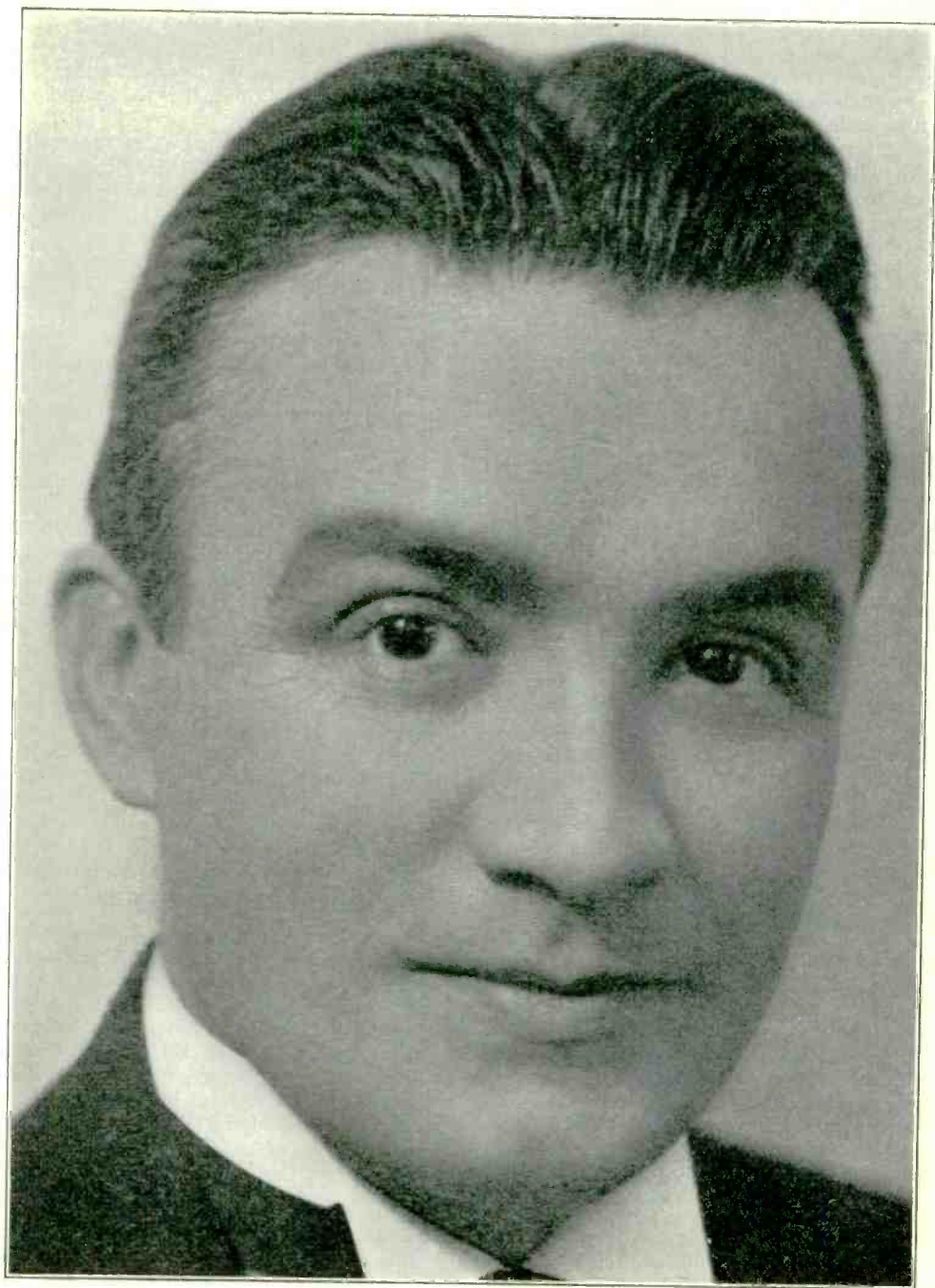
Hearing of Stephanie's fine voice, Schipa dropped around the next day to hear Stephanie sing. Schipa's praise followed.

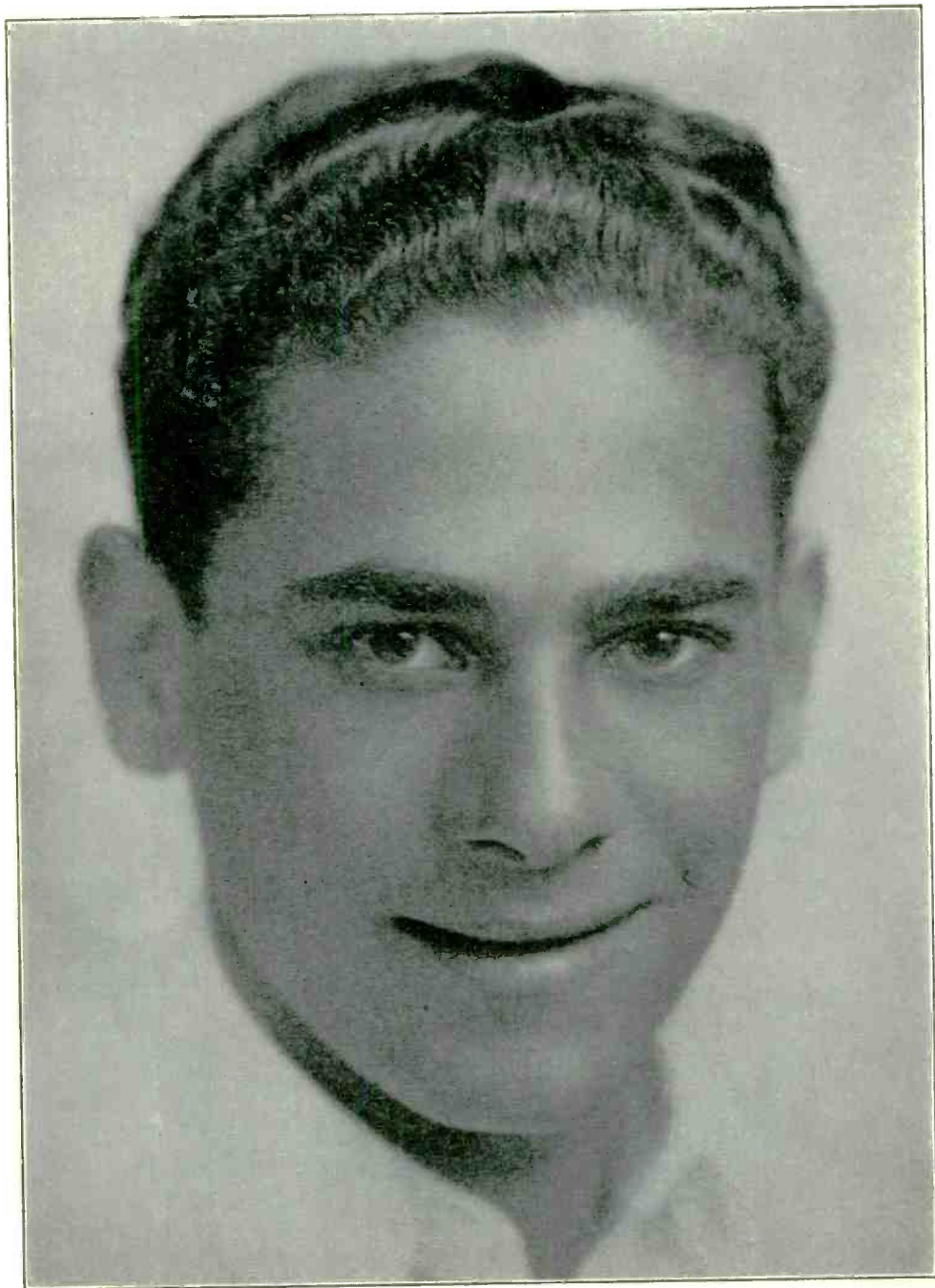

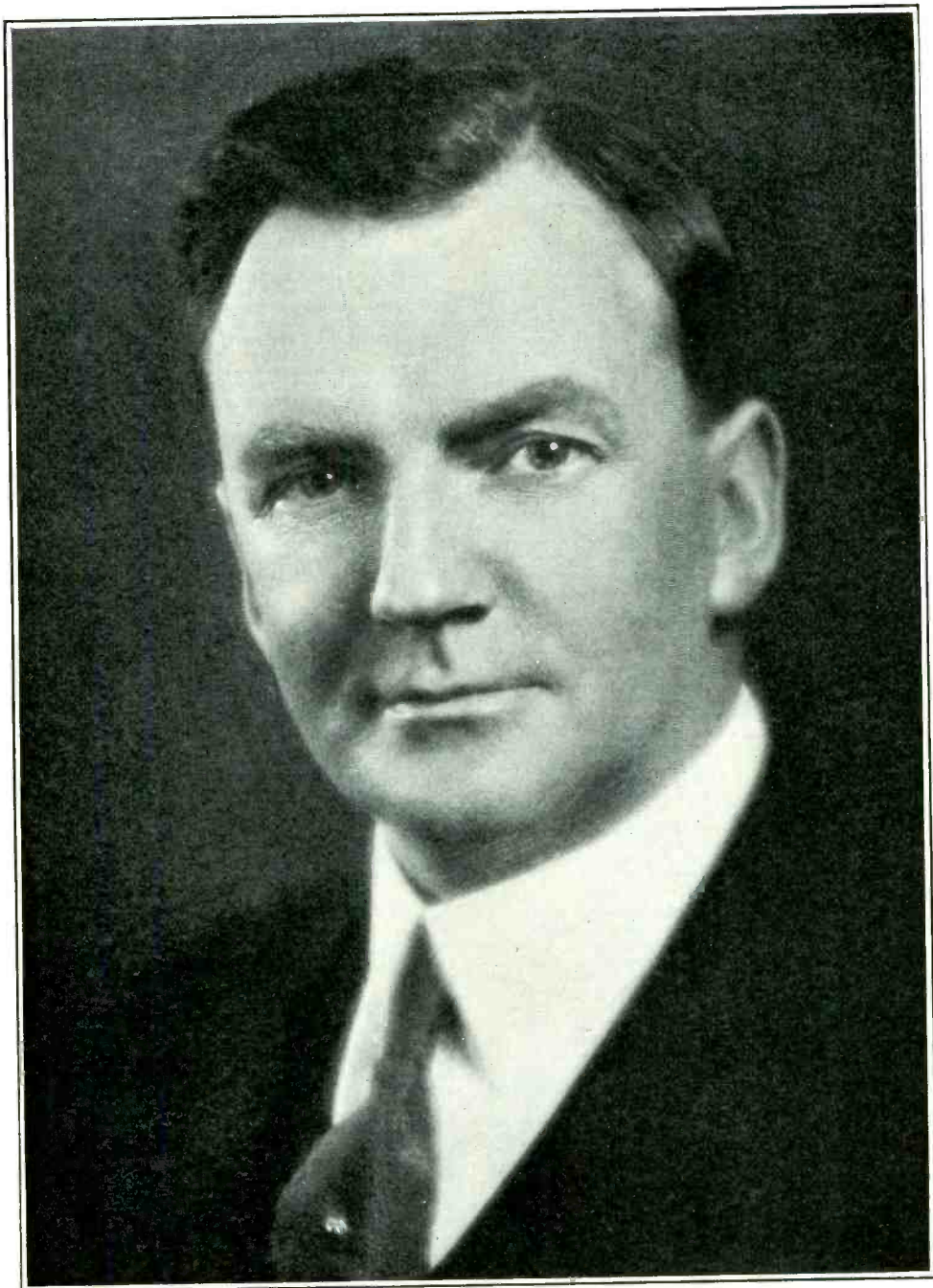

Cunningham to Head Radiotron Corporation

CARRIED to the top of America's radio tube industry from a modest start in San Francisco sixteen years ago, E. T. Cunningham becomes president of the RCA Radiotron Company. Announcement of his appointment was made in New York by David Sarnoff of the Radio Corporation of America.

Cunningham's election as head of the Radiotron Company brings to the position an outstanding figure in the development of the radio tube business in this country. His present age of forty-two years ranks him as one of the youngest executives ever to attain a post of this importance in the industrial world.

In a statement made following the announcement of his appointment, Cunningham said:

"Radio industry, in common with all industry, has been going through a difficult period. There is very definite evidence that the dark clouds are passing. This is indicated by the fact that the public last year bought more radio sets than in 1928, and only slightly less than in 1929. The greatly lower average prices are set to meet today's pocketbook, and now no home need go without a radio to tap the air's continuous store of music, entertainment and education."

The RCA Radiotron Company, Inc., of which Cunningham is the new president, was formed January 1, 1930, as a wholly owned subsidiary of the Radio Corporation of America, with headquarters at Harrison, N. J. The company operates factories at Harrison, N. J., Newark and Cleveland, and has warehouses in Newark, Cleveland, Chicago, San Francisco, Atlanta and Dallas. Tubes marketed by the company are sold under the trade name of "Radiotron."

The E. T. Cunningham, Inc., radio tube organization, of which Cunningham is the founder, is likewise a wholly owned subsidiary of the Radio Corporation of America. Its product is marketed under the Cunningham trade name through an entirely separate and distinct channel of Cunningham distributors and dealers.

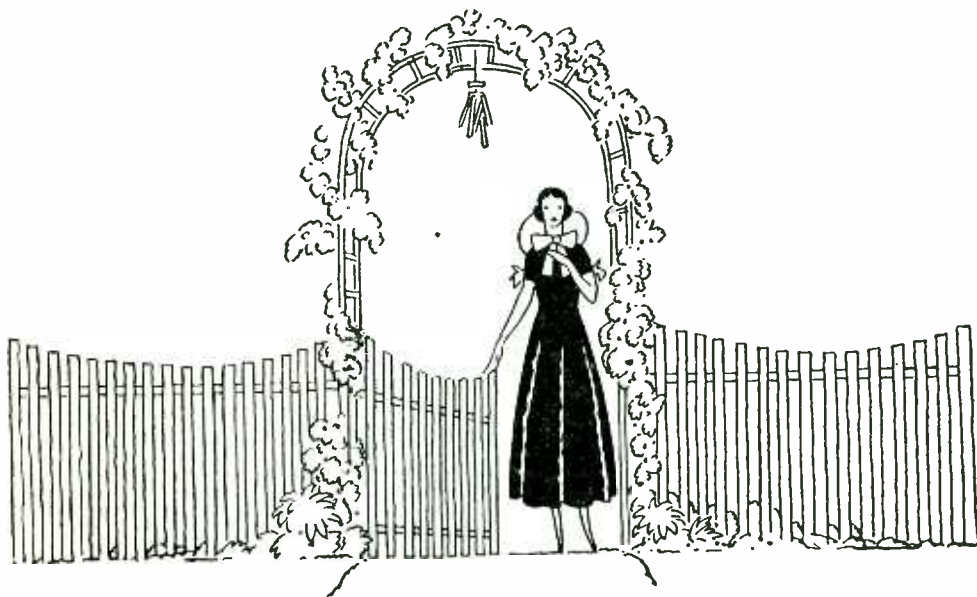

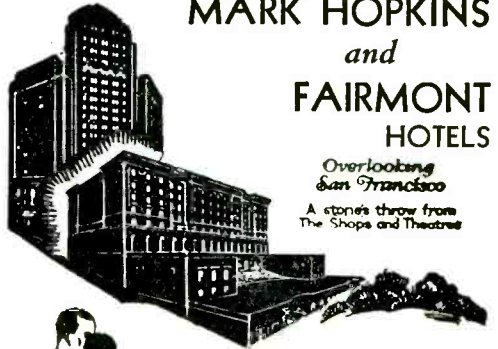
