







Radio Lotteries Under Fire

A "SHOWDOWN" on radio lotteries has been demanded by the American Newspaper Publishers' Association of the Government as a result of the allegedly increasing use in the programs of certain stations of lottery and gift offers.

The effort to extend to broadcasting the restrictions which already apply to all other avenues of advertising is the first attack of the publishers in a war which is to be waged for the advertising appropriations of the country's business men. Newspapers now find that radio has made serious inroads in their advertising and have rolled up their sleeves for a finish fight to protect themselves from serious losses in advertising which now threaten.

"During the last few years," it was declared by Elisha Hanson, attorney for the publishers' organization, who is heading the attack on radio lotteries, "radio broadcasting has been given over more and more to advertising programs, and, in a sense, a broadcasting station today is a competitor with all other forms of media for the dissemination of advertising. With the single exception of radio, all of these media are prevented by law from the publication or transmission

through the mails of any scheme concerning any lottery, gift enterprise or similar plan offering prizes dependent in whole or in part upon lot or chance.

"During the last few months particular radio stations throughout the country have been devoting more and more of their broadcast time to the broadcasting of advertising programs in which lottery and gift enterprise schemes predominate."

Bills to make radio lotteries illegal have been introduced in past sessions of Congress, but have never been acted upon. At the next session, however, it is indicated, legislation of this nature will be actively pushed.

Complaints against specific stations which have conducted lotteries have been received by the radio commission from time to time, and are usually given consideration when renewal of the station's license is applied for, as part of the inquiry as to whether the broadcaster has rendered the required "public service." Such complaints, however, so far as is known, have never resulted in denial of license. At the same time it is contended by commission officials there is nothing in the present radio law empowering it to ban lottery enterprises.

you ever betook yourself to the Marina theatre in your neighborhood. He was a featured attraction there for two years or more.


Josephine, San Francisco.—If you will give me the date and hour of the broadcast over which you heard the song you fancied, perhaps I may procure the information you seek.

Intolerance has always made for nasty and destructive history, and for A. M. B.'s benefit I might say that jazz is a simple expression of music in its most appealing and understandable form for those millions of people who have had too little musical education to appreciate the more complicated forms of opera and symphony work. Rhythm awakens our first untutored reaction to music, after which comes melody and finally harmony; and if the rhythm of our jazz orchestras, playing such compositions as "Liebes-traum," "Meditation" from "Thais," Grieg's "To Spring," "Largo" from Dvorak's "New World Symphony" and many others, can teach appreciation of this music when played as originally intended, then much credit is due this popular modern school. After all, has a symphony any more right to orchestrate a classic composition written for the piano, than a dance band to play the same melody after its own peculiar style? A jazz band shows no disrespect in so doing, for they are interpreting a composition which they love in the manner in which they are most perfectly trained.

Those who are best qualified to criticize, criticize the least. Listen to John D. Barry

... SILHOUETTES ...

COMBINING the English trait of knowing thoroughly everything to be attempted before attempting it, with the American gift for showmanship, Fred Hartley fits perfectly into his responsibilities as musical director of KHQ, Spokane's

most popular broadcasting station. This English characteristic is his by right of birth; though the early home at Leicester, England, is but a faint memory now. Most of his boyhood reminiscences center around Toronto, Canada, and Spokane, Wash., his present home.

It was in Toronto that destiny first pointed his steps future-wise, for there his clear young voice was much in demand for choir work. Then the family moved to Spokane, but along with the usual husky school-boy activities, Fred kept right on with his musical interests, finally concentrating on the xylophone, which is still his favorite though by no means his only medium of expression.

After spending some time on the Pantages circuit with Chuck Whitehead's well-known orchestra, he returned to Spokane to accept Leonardo Brill's offer of the assistant managership of the Spokane Symphony Orchestra. In this connection he proved so capable that an orchestra under his own direction was soon organized and engaged to play in the Isabella Room of the Davenport Hotel, where it became one of this famous hotel's feature attractions. These activities have occupied him for the better part of ten years, and together with his work as musical director of KHQ make Fred Hartley an exceedingly busy man.

Next to music and family Fred Hartley's pride and joy is in his garden, and there you can find him outside of working hours, dolling up the delphinium, or puzzling over the proper proportions of sand and cement so as to make a bird bath that will match the newly completed (by himself) lily pool. He really has a beautiful garden.

When it comes to appearance—well, even Charlie Chaplin has nothing on Fred Hartley. And pep—he's got that, too. But what it takes, Fred's got, much to the enjoyment of the radio listeners who tune in on KHQ of Spokane.

EMMMA KNOX, ingenue of the KPO Drama Guild was born in Newcastle, England—stands five feet five inches in height—weighs 115 pounds—is blessed with intriguing blue eyes, blond hair, and a winning smile.

When Emma was seven years old her parents brought her to Berkeley where she received her schooling. From her kindergarten days, Miss Knox had a hankering for the legitimate stage—everything she did centered around the theater—she tried in childlike earnestness to imitate the actresses she saw—and as she grew older she read plays—books on the theater, and it naturally followed that she eventually studied for the stage with Mrs. John Howell, noted dramatic teacher of the University city.

Those who have sat under the stars and watched the remarkable productions put on at the Greek Theater, will remember her as the feminine lead in many of the Shakesperian plays played there—"The Merry Wives of Windsor," with Gilmor Brown—"Romeo and Juliet," "Henry the Fourth," and in Wheeler Hall attractions she distinguished herself in Oscar Wilde's "Importance of Being Earnest" and in A. A. Milne's success "The Dover Road." In San Francisco Miss Knox won equal recognition by her stellar work in plays presented by the Community Players.

Two years ago Miss Knox made her radio debut from KPO in St. John Hankin's "The Constant Lover" and was enthusiastically received by the station's audience. But not until the KPO Drama Guild was formed several months ago, could she be induced to forsake her work before the footlights. The fact that the new KPO organization was to present only the best dramas obtainable, under the capable direction of Baldwin McGaw, brought about a change of mind and Miss Knox agreed to play the leading feminine roles. And so, radio KPO has gained the services of an actress whose poise, finesse and histrionic ability is an asset in producing better and worthwhile performances. Her hobbies—her only one—is the theater.

TO BE haunted by a ghost isn't such an unusual experience, judging by the number of ghost stories in existence.

But to be haunted by a play, and one which has a supernatural vessel plying between this world and the next for its setting, is a bit out of the ordinary, contends Barton Yarborough, of the NBC National Players.

"Outward Bound" is the name of the play which has "followed" Barton for so long that he wouldn't be surprised to see the Sutton Vane play pop up on the radio almost any day.

It first entered his life when he was a student at the University of California and a member of the Mask and Dagger Club. He played the role of Prior, leading masculine character of "Outward Bound," in three different productions at Berkeley. His first job after he was graduated from the university was in a company which was taking the Sutton Vane drama on tour. He reached New York and played a season there when he was offered the opportunity to originate the part of Prior in the first London production of the same play.

Barton grasped the chance and went back to the ghost vessel for the long run it enjoyed in England. There he met, and later played with Sir Gerald Du Maurier, who still represents the height of his own profession to Barton.

Long before he entered U. C. and student dramatics, however, young Yarborough was a seasoned performer. Born in Goldthwaite, Texas, the thespian germ attacked him at an early age. He was just 17 when he joined a musical comedy and sang his way to a juvenile leading role. Then followed a season or two of vaudeville, ranging from the "two-day" to six or more.

decided to go to college, and he never returned to vaudeville. Following his graduation and his London engagements he played with noted figures of the American stage—Eva Le Gallienne, May Robson, Robert Ede-

ALTHOUGH he is 25 years old, Jean Whiteaker Kantner, KJR and Northwest Broadcasting System baritone, has been singing for more than eighteen years.

The sensation he created as a boy soprano when he was seven years old still is remembered by Seattleites. He instantly became one of the concert attractions in the Pacific Northwest.

One success followed another for Jean. He filled concerts at the Congregational Church, Salem, Ore.; Normal School, Bellingham, Wash., and concerts in Portland, Ore., and many other cities.

Other notable achievements include his appearance as soloist in a child's role in the oratorio "Elijah"; soloist with the Seattle Philharmonic Orchestra; district winner at San Francisco, 1927, National Federation of Music Clubs; baritone role in "The Holy City," First Swedish Baptist Church, Seattle, and many other church engagements. With this great record behind him, Kantner came to KJR and the Northwest Broadcasting System.

Kantner's training came from his father, Clifford White Kantner, a basso-cantata, and one of the outstanding instructors in the Pacific Northwest for voice. Jean received the devoted instruction of his father through the long years of training.

As an instructor, Kantner is also attracting attention. He has the command of four languages which assist him in voice instruction, along with a thorough familiarity with music theory which he obtained at the University of Washington.

An offer from Henry Duffy brought him back to the Coast. In the first stock production in which he appeared Yarborough was cast opposite Barbara Jo Allen, pretty young Duffy actress. Their love scene "got over" so well that they have continued it in real life ever since. Mrs. Yarborough is still a member of the Alcazar Stock Company.

Her husband's voice has become familiar to thousands of NBC network listeners as "Sergeant Jack Long" of Carlton E. Morse's mystery serials, though he appears in numerous other NBC dramas also.

Boyhood chums, Sharples and Connolly were born and reared in the same city—McKeesport, Pennsylvania.

• • • A young lady in Los Angeles, Miss E. Rolleston, has sent Lord Bilgewater of KFRC a necktie which, she avers, was sent to her brother from his mother in England. But, she says, little brother refuses to wear it in public. She thought the lord

might be interested. It is a fore-in-hand, ready tied, that clasps in the back, which explains matters.

• • • Carl Mathieu, of CBS's "Four Clubmen" quartet, was a recent casualty when he engaged in a losing argument with a taxicab. No bones were broken, but Carl is limping about the studios with the aid of a cane. And speaking of the "Four Clubmen" there is a legend difficult to verify that concerns the quartet when it first began to perform in Hank Simmons' "Showboat." The program, as you may know, has an audience in the studio that takes part in the performance. Several large printed cards bearing such legends as "Applause," "Cheers," "Hisses," and so forth, are used to give spectators their cue for action. The story goes that on one particular night the "Clubmen" had just finished singing when someone picked up what he thought was the "Applause" card. It turned out to be the wrong card. And the audience, puzzled but obedient, responded with a hearty and prolonged "Boo-o-oo!" For a few minutes the quartet felt somewhat discouraged.

• • • The Hallelujah Quartet, KHJ's famous negro singers, grew up together in the cotton fields of Van Buren, Arkansas. Van Buren is in the heart of the drought-stricken area of the Old South. These four big-hearted, modest negro artists haven't forgotten the old folks at home, or the old Van Buren school house, or the old church where, as four ragged little pickaninnies, they made their first public appearance. Four envelopes full of checks leave Los Angeles for home every week.

• • • The biggest contract ever offered for a series of movie shorts has been signed by Floyd Gibbons, NBC broadcaster and former war correspondent. He will appear in a series of thirteen shorts, entitled "Floyd Gibbons' Supreme Thrills," to be produced by A. P. Waxman and Michael Mindlin in association with the RKO-Beuren Corporation.


- • • Johnny Toffoli, whose accordion is a feature of the Associated Spotlight Revue, broadcast through the NBC network Saturday nights, is kept busy teaching people to play the accordion. His oldest pupil is a man between fifty and sixty years of age, and his youngest, a boy of seven. Middle-aged and elderly persons apparently find Johnny's instrument attractive, and several of his twenty-five pupils are men and women past their early youth. Johnny hopes to organize an accordion band eventually.
- • • H. C. Connette, who writes "Memory Lane," NBC's epic of midwestern life in the late nineties, is the son of an engineer who constructed and built many of the street railway and inter-urban lines in Indiana. As a small boy Connette traveled with his father while the lines were being built, and in this manner became familiar with many of the small towns like "Goshen Center," his mythical "Memory Lane" town.
- • • Norman Higby, who is responsible for the sound effects in dramas broadcast from the San Francisco studios of the National Broadcasting Company, has a whole flock of new problems to solve in Carlton E. Morse's new mystery serial, "The Return of Captain Post," which started April 24. A cobra's hiss, the crash of elephants in the jungle, the scream of a parrot, the cry of a monkey, and the sound of Chinese temple bells are just a few of the sounds which will have to be reproduced before the microphone.
- • • The cymbalum, a native Hungarian instrument, was introduced to the American audiences of the air by Emery Deutsch (CBS) in his Hungarian Gypsy Orchestra. It consists of a piano-like arrangement of strings, and is played by two padded mallets. Emery claims that of all the instruments played, the sound of this one is the most difficult to reproduce faithfully over the air.
- • • Imelda Montagne, pretty, dark-eyed, and the smallest member of the Coquettes, NBC singing trio, is noted for the smartness of her clothes. Not long ago she admitted that she designs and makes most of her own frocks and hats.
- • • One of the most vehement opposers of jazz at NBC's San Francisco studios is to be found in Eva Garcia, talented pianist of the Rembrandt Trio. Still it was in playing jazz at dances that Miss Garcia made enough money to travel across the continent to study with Frank La Forge in New York.
- • • Frederick Stark, assistant conductor of the KHJ staff orchestra, stooped down to pick up a golf ball last week and had to be carried off the course on a stretcher. Broken ligament in back. Proving one shouldn't stoop to such things. He is now conducting his programs from a swivel arm chair and local osteopaths are tying his backbone into lovers' knots between broadcasts.
- • • Russell McNeil, the young man in charge of some thousands of dollars worth of music at the San Francisco studios of NBC, is no longer one of those "behind the scenes." Russell is studying voice with Harold Dana, NBC baritone, and is now heard singing regularly on the Woman's Magazine of the Air.
- • • The curious continue to ask Phil Cook, NBC's one-man army of voices, if he is a brother of Joe Cook, noted stage comedian. The answer is "No." They aren't really related, and Joe Cook's name isn't really Cook. He is Joe Lopez, of Spanish and Irish parentage—no, he isn't related to Vincent Lopez, the orchestra leader, either, for Lopez' real name—oh, well, let's get back to Phil Cook, who DOES have a brother who has contributed to radio entertainment. He is Burr Cook, author of the exciting Harbor Lights melodramas and several other NBC dramatic programs.
- • • Three miners away up in Anchorage, Alaska, are earnest admirers of Gunnar Johansen, pianist, who is heard Sunday nights through the NBC network. The artist has received a two-page letter from one of them, in which the miner discusses Gunnar's radio recitals with all the seriousness of a professional critic, concluding, misanthropically, "We are very glad to hear that good music is played still in America, and, furthermore, we like to hear something different from the silly 'I love you' stuff."



Questions & Answers

By N. EARL BORCH

Consulting Engineer of the California Electrical Construction Company

All questions should be put in clear, simple form, and should ask directly what is wanted. Give full name and address. Personal replies or diagram will be supplied for a fee of one dollar each.

QUESTION: In your opinion what are the best radio tubes to use in my receiver? I have a Majestic Model 22 and contemplate changing tubes.—Mrs. Charles D., San Francisco, May 4.

ANSWER: Any standard tube will operate satisfactory in your receiver. Insist on your radio dealer testing them before purchase, so that they will all have approximately the same characteristics. Cunningham's have been standard since 1922.

QUESTION: Please answer in Broadcast Weekly. Why is it that whenever we turn into KPO lately except late in the evening, we get nothing but a terrible roaring noise that drowns out all program, while other stations come in clearly if turned into them. We have a high, long aerial, and a short one, both act the same.—Mrs. D., Fellows, Calif., May 3.

ANSWER: It is possible that in your location the wave from station KFEQ at St. Joseph, Mo., may be interfering with the wave from KPO. If you will log down the time when you first hear the roaring and also the time it stops for a week or ten days, we can get a definite check on this which will be appreciated by the Federal Radio Trade Commission. If you decide to do this please forward the result to me in care of Broadcast Weekly.

QUESTION: Every time the elevator runs in our apartment house, I hear it in my radio. How can I correct this?—John C., Seattle, Wash., May 2.

ANSWER: Every automatic contact used on elevators constitute a miniature broadcast station when the contactor is being operated. The result of the operation of a contactor is the sending out of interfering radio waves which manifest themselves as clicks, scratches or buzzes from the loud speaker. Due to the fact that the addition of any

equipment to the elevator which would reduce interference would be a danger to passengers in the elevator, the National Board of Fire Underwriters prohibit the installation of such devices. The only feasible method for elimination of interference from such a source is, therefore, by proper arrangement of antenna, to minimize the effects of the elevator interference. In practically all cases, this can be done by using a wire of not less than sixty feet on the roof and by running the downlead to the receiver as far removed from the elevator shaft as is possible. The ground connection is also important and should be made as near the earth as circumstances will permit. If location of radio receiver makes it necessary to run the downlead close to the elevator, a special wire having a metallic shield on top of the insulation, should be used. This shield must, to be effective, be connected to the water pipe system of the building. Your radio service man can advise you regarding such construction.

Question: A little after eight o'clock every night a noise appears on the radio which nearly drowns out reception, this has a sound similar to something frying on the stove and keeps up about a half an hour then dies out.

This occurred very often last winter but have not had it for several months until tonight. What is the cause of this and what is the remedy.

If it is the result of some machine in the neighborhood can one complain to the Radio Commission?—Geo. H. H., San Francisco, April 30.

ANSWER: The interference of which you complain is evidently caused by some automatically controlled electric equipment in your vicinity. If you will refer this to the Pacific Radio Trade Association at 316 Bellevue Hotel, the interference investigator will locate it for you free of charge.




