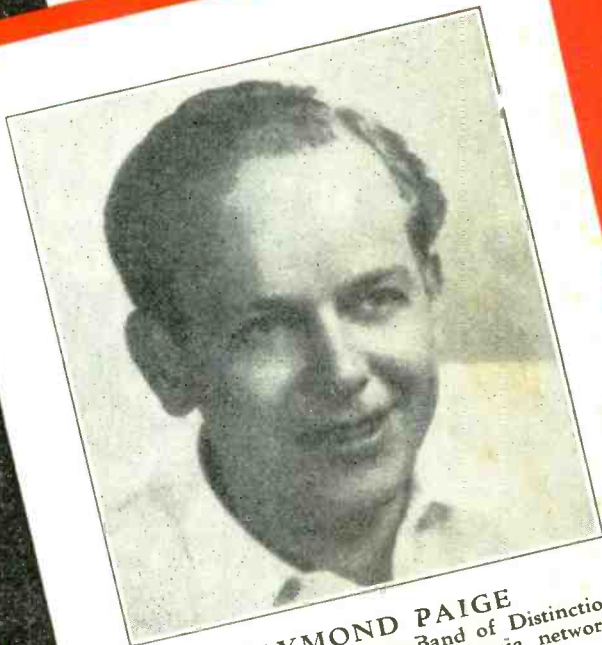

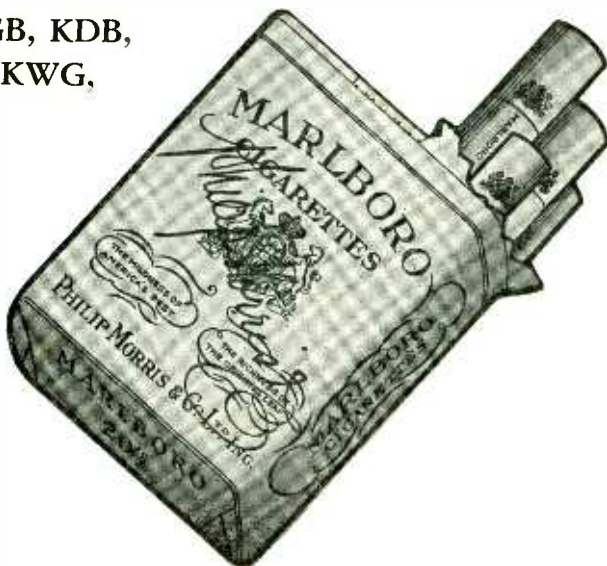

ETHER GLEANINGS

THE administering of a certain oath of office back in Washington, D. C., on Saturday, March 4, will occasion a globe girdling radio broadcast that to the knowledge of this scrivener has never been equaled. To the remotest spots of the earth the swift and penetrating voice of radio will carry the news that the United States has inaugurated a new leader to guide the destinies of our nation—President-elect Franklin D. Roosevelt.

Three coast to coast networks will completely blanket the United States with word pictures of the entire ceremonies and the happenings immediately before and after. Two NBC chains and the CBS wire-up will do the job.

A half dozen or more short-wave stations on both coasts will transmit the happenings, which future generations will study in their school textbooks in years to come, to all points of the globe.

In the West the NBC-KGO, NBC-KPO and CBS-KFRC networks will release the presidential inauguration broadcast. The exact time of the start of the broadcast has not been determined at this writing, but it is expected to commence several hours before noon Pacific time.

The networks will go to extremes to make this the most colorful of broadcasts. It is tentatively planned to have observers equipped with microphones in the dirigible Akron and in the Army's radio laboratory plane, in addition to a scattered battalion of radio reporters on terra firma around the capital grounds. Announcers will be stationed at every strategic point, assuring the listener a good slant on every phase of the inaugural.

For instance, the NBC promises its auditors that it will keep the dialing legion posted on what goes on from the time the President-elect leaves his hotel until he returns to the White House as President of the United States. Cars equipped with short-wave equipment, will follow Governor Roosevelt in the parade and two announcers equipped with "pack" transmitters, strapped on their backs, will mingle with the crowds on the streets and in the corridors of the capital. You are guaranteed a good earful of band music and the whoops and cheers of the throng that is expected for the nation's biggest show.

The broadcast will begin shortly before Governor Roosevelt leaves his hotel and proceeds to the White House to meet President Hoover.

I note that for some time NBC engineers

have been experimenting with the portable transmitters, both pack sets carried by the announcer and the heavier sets in automobiles. Recently a degree of perfection has been attained which justifies the use of this new equipment for such an important event as the inauguration. They will aid materially in giving a complete "coverage" of the Washington ceremonies.

Without a doubt the most important new "commercial" of the month in western radio-dom is the Marlboro Band of Distinction program, which slid into the airwaves at its launching over the Columbia-Don Lee California chain, Tuesday, February 21.

Its sponsor is the Philip Morris Company, manufacturers of the Marlboro and other cigarettes.

The program is being wafted out over the entire California chain from 9 to 9:15 p. m., thrice weekly—Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays.

Raymond Paige, the network's ace western musical director, is batoning a twenty-six piece orchestra on these quarter hour affairs, aided and abetted by the singing of Sam Coslow. Bill Goodwin is taking care of the commercial announcements.

This marks the air debut for Marlboro in the West. The only other program sponsored by the company in the United States is now going over a Chicago station.

The CBS-Don Lee stations dealing out the Band of Distinction entertainments are: KHJ (point of origin), KFRC, KGB KDB, KMJ, KFBK, KWG, KERN

Because, according to the NBC, the San Francisco Musician's Union refused to cut its wage scale, and was not in a cooperative mood, eight musicians were given their walking papers this month at the big program factory.

If the Union had sanctioned the wage cut, Lew Frost, NBC program generalissimo told us, it would not have been necessary to have lopped off those men.

The NBC scale to the musicians is considerably higher now than it was several years ago. In fact, he explained, the music makers are getting more salary than they were during the "boom" days of 1928 and 1929. And that, he maintains, is all out of proportion to the present economic situation. The Union Execs. couldn't see it that way. And so the NBC released eight men and cut down the time of the rest on its staff. The NBC musicians average around \$90 a week at present.

Cecil and Sally become foolight troupers on Sunday, February 26, when they make their stage debut at the Fulton Theater in Oakland in the three-act comedy: "Cecil and Sally" written by the former, who is Johnny Patrick in everyday life.

Four years on the air and yet they are as nervous about this personal appearance business as a couple of kids at a school graduation.

In all that time on the air, Cecil and Sally have never made a personal appearance, in fact, they have always excluded every one from the broadcasting studio except those actually taking part in the performance.

Johnny Sirmyer, business manager for the famous radio pair is confident that they are going to "click" in more than a big way on the stage. He is extremely gratified at the tremendous advance seat sale. They will play the Fulton for one week and tentative plans call for a run in San Francisco. If the latter proves successful they will probably tour the coast. John G. Fee, veteran stage director and microphone star, is directing the show. Most of the principal characters from the radio skits will appear in the play, including: Cecil, Sally, Widow Mason, Uncle Thomas, Mamie, Aunt Bess, Mr. Gilliwater and Dr. Morgan.

The Remar Bread Company of Oakland steps into the radio picture hereabouts on March 1 when it inaugurates a series of weekly broadcasts over KFRC entitled: The Remar Jubilee. The program will be heard each Wednesday thereafter from 8:30 to 9:30 p. m. A sixteen piece orchestra under the direction of Walter Kelsey and a group of soloists and specialty artists will contribute the entertainment.

The recent \$50,000 fire at the Lido Cafe, San Francisco night club, caused considerable damage to KYA's pick-up equipment. Two microphones, the amplifier and other equipment at the remote control station was damaged.

Two of the latest NBC "commercials" to take off over the ether domains in this territory were "Manhattan Merry-go-Round" sponsored by the R. L. Watkins toothpaste company on February 19 over KPO and "Around the World Club," sponsored by the Hormel Company, food packers, on KGO, February 20. The former will be heard every Sunday and the latter four times a week—Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Saturdays from 5:15 to 5:30 p. m.

Meredith Willson is now orchestra supervisor of the NBC Pacific Coast division.

It might just as well have been a thug's picnic as a John Law's entertainment, as far as Bill Wright and a group of other KFRC luminaries are concerned. In spite of the fact that they were entertaining several hundred coppers in San Jose recently, clothes snatchers got into their dressing rooms back stage and walked away with hats, topcoats, scarfs and what not, belonging to the troupers.

Those who suffered losses included Wright, Mac, Ronald Graham, Consuela Gonzales and Marjorie Lane Truesdale. The show was being given for the California Municipal and County Motorcycle Officers Association.

Basil Wilson, baritone, is the latest addition to KYA's artist staff.

It's hard to change the habits of a show trouper when he is put before a microphone. There's that vivacious little musical whiz-bang, Eddie Peabody, for instance. Being an invited guest at his initial radio broadcast over the NBC, we particularly noticed that he carried out the stage idea as much as possible there in the radio studio. He was on a platform with his dozen or so stringed instruments flanked on both sides of him. He was in costume with those proverbial balloon trousers, a dash of make-up and a contagious smile. He not only played the best he knew how for his new patrons of the air, but he acted, gesticulated, danced about, perhaps unconsciously. But nevertheless, he acted. They all do, these ex-stage troupers, when they get before a mike. We've watched many of 'em.

Billy Page, the popular young NBC actor, who occupied a front seat during the inaugural broadcast, was one of the most interested in the studio. Later we overheard him propositioning the banjo wizard to teach him a few tricks on that instrument. And Peabody was ready and willing to start with his promising pupil right then and there.

Van and Don, the "two professors" who went to the NBC camp in Chicago after winding up their commercial program here are now in New York working for the same network folk. The Windy City studios ousted 'em after a month's time.

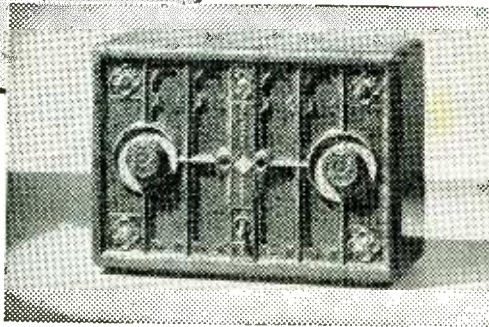

Too Much Medicine

BBROADCAST WEEKLY for the week of February 12-18 arrived this morning and I have finished reading your editorial.

Regarding the programs that we get here, I might say that I listen to very little outside of NBC programs and a few of the local programs over KHQ. When our local programs get too raw and conditions are favorable, I try outside stations but as a usual thing it is a NBC program.

I have noticed that during the last six or eight months, or possibly the last year, there has been a gradual improvement in the quality of the programs I have listened to. However, there is one thing I want to comment on. I think there is too much patent medicine stuff going over the air. I tune in occasionally over KNX and generally they are putting on an awful lot of patent medicine stuff. Possibly they are not taking any kind of advertising of that kind that newspapers are not taking, but there is a difference there. The patent medicine ads in the newspapers are not read generally and don't have the same carrying power an ad over the radio has and I am wondering if the continual broadcasting of emphatic statements regarding so-called cure-alls by way of radio is not a bad practice. Of course, I realize that broadcasting stations are having a difficult time to get enough business to keep going, at least some of them are. If this trend toward inadvisable advertising continues, it seems to me that it is going to necessitate some drastic regulations.

Referring to your editorial

of last week—the week of February 5 to 11, I heartily agree with that editorial and if it were possible to broadcast over a nation-wide hookup at least a part of the sessions of Congress I think it would result in taking some of the bunk out of the Congressional sessions.

BROADCAST WEEKLY is coming very regularly now. I get it either Thursday or Friday morning of each week.

SILHOUETTES



THREE pretty girls — almost always dressed in blue—from one of radio's most engaging trios. Theresa Aezer, Marian Peck and Meredith Gregor, the NBC Bluettes, are just as charming in person as they sound when they blend their voices in popular harmonies over the air. Still in their twenties, they have had a full meed of experience, and their three-cornered comradeship is based on six years spent traveling and working together, all over the United States. They started their triangular career in Southern California and played the Keith and Loew circuits in forty-one states and Canada, crossing the continent twice in an automobile which was their joint property, and which carried, as well as the three songstresses, a specially built piano which they still use for rehearsals.

Individually, the girls are a fascinating study in contrasts. Starting at the "top" with Marian Peck, who sings high soprano in the trio, and who is blonde and willowy, you come next to Theresa Aezer, pretty auburn-haired, "Middle voice," and then to Meredith Gregor, dark-haired, blue-eyed contralto.

Meredith was born in Eureka, California, but grew up in Long Beach, where her family moved while she was still a baby. Her mother was a concert pianist, and taught her to play when she was just old enough to sit on the piano stool. By the time she was thirteen she had added the banjo, steel guitar and saxophone to her repertoire of instruments, and at fourteen she made her first appearance in public playing at soldiers' camps and Red Cross benefits during the world war. She played in vaudeville as a single until she met Marian Peck and Theresa Aezer in Southern California, and they formed a trio known as the Three Co-Eds until three years ago, when they became the Bluettes.

Horsebackriding and tennis are Meredith's favorite sports, and she and Mona Lowe, NBC contralto, play tennis together every morning. Meredith is the official chauffeur of the Bluettes trio, and does most of the driving when the three girls go on long trips together.

Theresa Aezer was born in San Francisco, and her early life was divided between the bay region and San Pedro, California. She was only sixteen when she had her first professional piano engagement, accompanying a soloist at a Los Angeles recital. Her ambition was to be a concert pianist but when she met Meredith and Marian the present trio was formed, and vaudeville claimed them almost immediately. Theresa was still in high school, and her fellow Bluettes like to recount how she had to stay in her hotel room and study, keeping up her school work by correspondence while they were on tour. She did it so well that she was able to return to San Pedro and be graduated with her class, in a summer interlude between theatrical engagements.

Theresa makes the vocal harmony arrangements for the trio, and plays piano accompaniments for their rehearsals. Long walks and cooking are her favorite diversions—she enjoys radio because she can have an apartment and prepare meals for herself and her friends. Collecting dog pictures is her hobby, and biography her favorite reading material.

Marian Peck, the blonde Bluette, was born in Los Angeles, and has studied music almost since babyhood. She was fifteen when she made her debut as a soloist in a recital given at Riverside, California. She appeared in various productions in Southern California while she was still a high school student, and was one of the few soloists who sang at a municipal production given there. She and Meredith Gregor became acquainted when they were billed on the same program at a local theater, and formed the nucleus of the present trio.

Football and reading are Marian's favorite diversions, to which she adds horseback riding and basking in the sun on the beach. Eddie Cantor is her favorite radio artist—"a good laugh is my biggest enjoyment" she says.

The Bluettes made their first microphone appearance at an eastern station but definitely "went radio" three years ago at KFI. Their first NBC work was done in the Who Cares program at station KPO

MICROPHONE GOSSIP



• • • When Raymond Paige, director of California Melodies heard over CBS, recently conducted the Los Angeles Philharmonic Orchestra the huge L. A. Auditorium was sold out for the first time in several seasons. He has just been re-engaged for another guest appearance in the near future.

• • • Antiques? Yes, that's my hobby—I am rather much of one myself when it comes to broadcasting—said Wilda Wilson Church, pioneer in the radio field when asked what her hobby was. My apartment on Pacific Avenue is filled with interesting antiques—one of which is a small rosewood melodian made in 1800. It is the melodian used in the Cleveland Baptist Church where John D. Rockefeller and his chums the Featherstone boys used to lead the congregational singing. I also have the baton on which they all cut their names with a penknife. Mrs. Church, always interested in "starting things," is soon to open a radio school in conjunction with Captain William Royle, another veteran in radio. Their studios will be in the American Broadcasting Company's spacious rooms at 149 Powell Street, where full equipment will be available for microphone practice and making records. They expect to discover and develop new talent and furnish finished programs for radio stations throughout the country.

• • • The most dramatic moment of Jimmy Wallington's life, according to the NBC announcer, came in the half light of early morning when the S. S. Relief with Wallington aboard met the two ships of the Byrd Antarctic expedition far at sea.

Admiral Byrd recognized Wallington's voice through a megaphone although he had never heard it except by short wave radio. Wallington, as an announcer of station WGY, Schenectady, had been in frequent communication with the Byrd expedition.

• • • Recent visitors at Fred Allen's Bath Club Revue were Fannie Ward, long-time Broadway favorite, and her husband, Jack Dean, the motion picture actor. . . . Jeannie Lang, pert young vocalist heard with Stoopnagle and Budd, is being featured in movie shorts. . . . Whispering Jack Smith, who won a reputation as a pianist many years ago, can't refrain from seating himself at the keyboard occasionally and playing his own accompaniment during his CBS programs with the Hummingbirds and Arnold Johnson's Orchestra. . . . Roy Atwell, the word-scrambler heard with Fred Allen, wrote "The Christmas Letter," a playlet which was seen on the vaudeville stage for years and was considered a vaudeville classic. . . . Jack Smart, CBS dialectician, was on the listening end of a "March of Time" broadcast the other night for the first time. . . . Illness caused him to mar his record of having played roles in every one of the CBS news dramatizations.

• • • The Oklahoma Cowboys continue to entertain KFWI listeners with their popular cowboy songs from 12 noon to 12:30 p. m. daily. Bill Kennedy heads the aggregation as master of ceremonies, and numbers among his flock: Pee-Wee, vocalist, specializing in yodeling, also adept at tap dancing; Silas, violin; Luke, guitar; Elmer, banjo; Bud, accordionist. Visi-

tors are permitted in the studio during the broadcast, and every day finds a happy group of fans assembled in the studio ready to enjoy the program.

• • • Two loud-voiced lovebirds in a cage unexpectedly competed with the Hummingbirds and Whispering Jack Smith the other night. The birds were brought to the studio by Smith and turned over to Arnold Johnson, CBS conductor, as a gift for Mrs. Johnson who is ill in Roosevelt Hospital. In the middle of a vocal selection during the rehearsal the two birds started chirping loudly—to the delight of Smith, but to the annoyance of studio engineers. They were banished from the studio for the actual broadcast of the program.

• • • Fred Waring and his Pennsylvanians made their debut on Columbia's Old Gold program the other evening on the thirtieth anniversary of the founding of the famous band. The Pennsylvanians were organized at Penn State College in 1920 by Brothers Fred and Tom Waring, and that demon drummer, Poley McClintock. At that time Fred Waring played the banjo and doubled on the ocarina. McClintock, owner of the most lugubrious voice in the world, had a high squeaky tenor as a boy and developed a sinister false basso in order to frighten his family. Poley was so successful that his voice has been a comic feature of Waring's Pennsylvanians ever since.

• • • Spectacular records of long distance reception have been made recently through the powerful new equipment of Columbia's station KSL at Salt Lake City. Verification

from Europe has now established KSL's listening area with a six thousand mile radius. Programs from KSL were clearly heard in Southwest Australia a few weeks ago. The latest record for reception was noted in a letter dated January 6, 1933, from James S. Donaldson of 12 Greenlaw Avenue, Paisley, Scotland, logging KSL's programs for the evening of January 5th. Donaldson, in his Scotland home at four in the morning, particularly enjoyed Nino Martini, tenor, and Howard Barlow's orchestra, broadcasting from New York at 11 p. m., or from KSL at 9 p. m., E.S.T.

• • • Rubinoff, presenting his masterful arrangements of modern and classical music on the program with Eddie Cantor Sunday evenings, conducts his orchestra with broad sweeps of the baton and emphatic gestures with the left hand. The broadcast is the fruit of many hours of rehearsal, in the course of which the players are grouped and re-grouped to give the best effect over the air. When Rubinoff is ready for his violin solos, which usually have an orchestral accompaniment, he turns the baton over to Menotti Salta, his capable assistant, and steps up to within two or three feet of the microphone, his favorite fiddle poised. Among the prominent conductors of radio, Rubinoff is virtually unique in never speaking through the microphone. He believes in having his music speak for him, and all of Eddie Cantor's "kid-ding" of his goes unanswered. They are the best of friends, however, and Rubinoff laughs as heartily as anyone when he becomes the butt of a jest by the comedian.

• • • Carl Haverlin, sales manager of KFI-KECA, has resigned his post to assume a position as executive with the advertising firm of Bowman, Deute & Cummings. "It is

with regret that I accept the resignation of Mr. Haverlin, who has been connected with us for nine years," said Mr. Kales, general manager of the Anthony stations. Haverlin started his radio career as an announcer, specializing in sports events as well as in symphony and opera broadcasts. When the scope and volume of broadcasting was increased, resulting in the acquisition of KECA, he confined his work to the sales management of the two stations.

• • • Vincent Sorey, conductor of the Sorey Ensemble, and Tito Guizar, CBS soloist, always drink maté instead of coffee. Sorey points out that maté and not coffee is Brazil's national drink. It's a piquant beverage derived from a bush similar to the tea plant, and it grows high up in the Brazilian Andes. Other maté enthusiasts in this country are President-elect Roosevelt, William Randolph Hearst, Henry Ford and Governor William (Alfalfa Bill) Murray, of Oklahoma.

• • • Annette Hanshaw, charming singer of blues songs and ballads heard over NBC networks on Captain Henry's Show Boat, is the proud possessor of one of the only two original Chippendale drop-leaf breakfast tables in the country. The other is in a museum.

• • • Cliff Hall, Jack Pearl's Thursday night Magic Carpet straight man, can pronounce every word in the English language.

• • • Louis Katzman has three of radio's most famous saxophonists, Andy Sanella, Arnold Brillhart and Laddy Ladd, in his CBS orchestra which is heard on Fred Allen's Club Revue. But none of the three plays a saxophone during the broadcasts. Katzman, who is of the anti-saxophone school of orchestra conductors, utilizes the ability of

the three famous musicians to play clarinets, flutes, oboes and piccolos.

• • • When Jerome Kern, composer of "Show Boat" and more than thirty hit shows in the past two decades, arrived in the studio the other night to take part in the dramatization of his own career for Columbia's new "Inside Story" series, almost every musician in the building rushed to peek through the doors at one of America's finest masters of melody. . . . Kern, wearing a floppy brown hat three sizes too big, and a voluminous rainbow-tinted paisley tie, looked like a be-spectacled gnome from the Black Forest, or an old fashioned German professor about to give a music lesson . . . with intense blue eyes, crisp silvery hair and a hawk-like face that's a bit severe in repose, Kern lounged about the studio during rehearsal, wincing like a true composer whenever the orchestra had to play a passage or modulation different from the way he had originally written it.

• • • Visitors to Columbia's New York studios during evening hours last month totaled more than 7,400.

• • • Olive West, N B C character actress, is a direct descendant of Priscilla Alden. On her mother's side of the family tree, the line of ancestry goes straight back to the Speak-for-yourself-John girl.

• • • Those Boswell sisters regret having an auto license, C-1, that is so easily spotted. Since they've had it they've been stopped a hundred times by traffic cops who want autographs or just to get a good look at the harmonizers.

• • • The Alabama Cotton singers, a colored group, will hold one of the main spots on KTAB, and it is said the Hillbillies are going to be busy in the future making personal appearances.

• • • After years and years of struggling along on their own resources, Amos 'n' Andy (Freeman Gosden and Charles Correll) have employed a secretary. Now the two NBC comics admit that it keeps them busy trying to find enough work to keep her busy.

• • • A recent guest at one of Leonard Hayton's Chesterfield programs over CBS was his youthful looking mother. Mrs. Hayton confessed that she used to think her son would be a great music critic. When Lennie was seven years old Mr. Hayton, Sr., held him perched on his shoulder one evening at a Central Park concert. A trumpet player made a slight slip. In the midst of a silent and attentive crowd young Leonard shrieked — "Flat, Mamma. That's flat. He played it flat,"—much to the consternation of the audience, to say nothing of the trumpet player.

• • • Maurice Gunsby, noted tenor, who has been away from the microphone for some time is now KTAB'ing it.

• • • Headwear seems to play an important role in the lives of certain radio performers. Bing Crosby wears a cap or a slouch hat during every broadcast, and the eminent Colonel Stoopnagle never faces the mike without Announcer Louis Dean's London topper on his head. On the other hand, Jacques Fray, of Fray and Braggiotti, and Joe Sargent, of Keller, Sargent and Ross, never wear hats at any time, in any weather, or under any circumstances.

• • • Coming to KROW via the NBC studios in Chicago and Denver Tommy Herbert, violinist, is now broadcasting regularly from the Oakland studios. Herbert specializes in classic compositions having studied under the celebrated violin teacher, Rudolph Ganz, at the Chicago Musical College.

• • • Ramona, singing-pianist with Paul Whiteman's Orchestra on NBC networks, has a secret ambition. She wants to roller skate. Ramona hasn't gone roller skating since she was a youngster out in Kansas City and she has challenged Peggy Healy, Irene Taylor and Jack Fulton, heard with Whiteman at the Hotel Biltmore to a skating contest in Central Park in New York.

• • • Frank Watanabe, the celebrated Japanese mimic, and the Honorable Archie, are being heard regularly at 7 p.m. each evening over KTAB. The program originates in KNX, Los Angeles, but is brought to San Francisco via the North American Broadcasting Company.

• • • Those Boswell sisters have autographed 212,000 pictures in four years on the air. . . . Anson Weeks is importing dance tunes from London, Paris and Vienna for variety. . . . Fans have sent 1500 old-time songs to Carson Robison, the hillbilly singer.

• • • John and Ned, N B C harmony duo, have been friends ever since their high school days in Council Bluffs, Iowa, and partners almost that long.

• • • The song, "Brother Can You Spare a Dime?" brings some unusual listener response. After Bing Crosby sang it over the air, he received a telegraph money order for ten cents with the message, "Well, brother, here it is." The same song netted Vaughn de Leath a letter advising, "I was so touched that I took an old friend into my apartment, fed and clothed him and started him off with a new lease on life."

• • • Glenhall Taylor, KTAB program manager, is tickling the keys once more producing the popular Taylor-made Tempes.

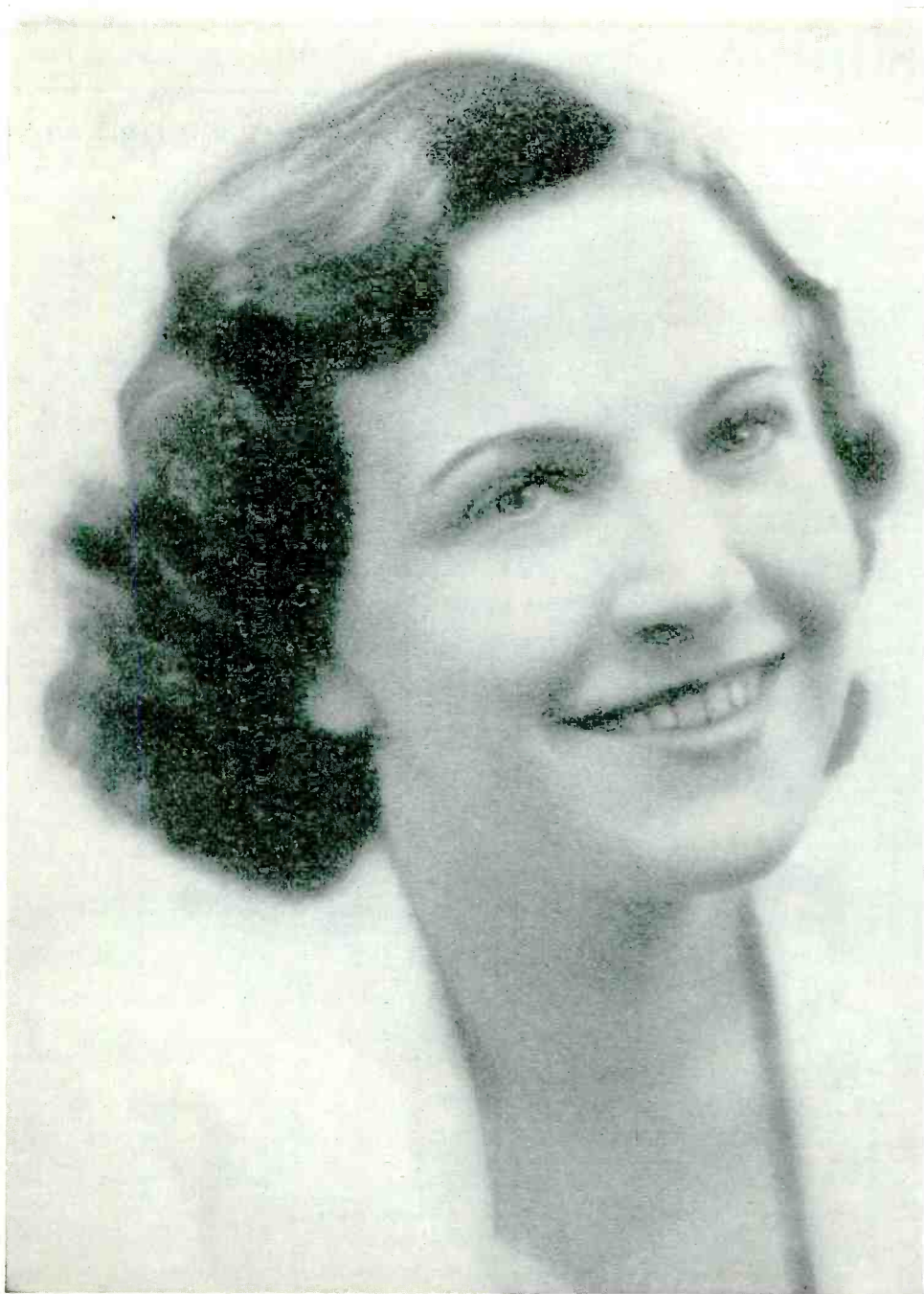

FADA Announces Tiny Personal Radio Set

A compact radio set, no larger than milady's traveling jewelry case but performing with the best of full-sized radios, has just been placed on the market by Fada Radio and Electric Corporation. It is called the "Fadalette" and comes in a handsome artistically embossed leatherette case and is available in four color combinations with gold trimming.

Everything about the new set is designed to yield the maximum of convenience. The set complete weighs only six and one-half pounds. It operates on either A.C. or D.C. current and requires only twenty feet of aerial wire for operation, or the aerial may be the nearest radiator. As a matter of fact the customer can with good cause say to the dealer: "Just wrap it up and I'll take it along with me," for these new sets can almost be slipped into the pocket of the average man's overcoat.

The "Fadalette" will be sold through the regular radio channels, but in addition, it is expected that sets of this type will be in great demand through thousands of other outlets not ordinarily handling radio sets. Even now many such sets are being sold

in hotel newsstands in large Eastern cities.

The "Fadalette" lists at \$25. The latest types of tubes are used.

Technically, the set is the highest type of engineering design and a full-fledged dynamic speaker is used. Two control knobs are on the front, one a combined on-off switch and volume control, the other a station selector. Plug and line cord of ample length are supplied together with a 20-foot aerial wire, both of which are stowed away within the set when not in use.

Sound Equipment Used in Sales Promotion Campaign

The talking motion picture has been making slow but steady inroads into the field of sales promotional and advertising departments. As an expression of this, the Packard Motor Car Company recently had filmed a ten-reel talking picture, descriptive of their new line of cars and at the same time giving a dynamic lesson in sales presentation to their distributors and salesmen throughout the country.

The C. C. Langevin Company recently installed a complete Western Electric Talking Picture System in the sales rooms of Earle C. Anthony, Incorporated, San Francisco, for the showing of

this picture. So interesting is this type of sales activity that the show rooms were packed to the point where no more standing room was available.

Novel Dock-Ship Transmission

A novel dock-to-ship communications service, worked out by Charles J. Pannill, executive vice-president of the Radiomarine Corporation of America, was inaugurated recently by the crowd waiting for the Leviathan on Pier 59, North River, New York. For the first time it was possible for persons on the dock to directly exchange communications with those on board an approaching ship through the service, established jointly by the Radiomarine Corporation of America and the Western Union Telegraph Company.

A radio operator, using a portable radio set, was on the dock with the crowd to transmit and receive communications to and from the ship at Quarantine and as she steamed up the harbor. The arrangements which have been completed at Pier 59 permit direct transmission and reception between the dock and all the large vessels using the International Merchant Marine Pier, including the Majestic, Olympic, Georgic, Brittanic, Pennland, and other incoming ocean liners.

New Radio-Phonograph Combination

A new combination radio-phonograph with automatic record changing device, listing under \$100, will shortly be announced by Audiola, according to Brown, Doran Company, San Francisco, factory representatives.

The new set is an eight-tube superheterodyne combined with a phonograph and record changing device that automatically plays and changes eight records. The motor is adjustable to play either the 33 $\frac{1}{3}$ or 75 r. p. m. records.

World's Largest Transmitter for WLW

A contract for the installation of the largest broadcasting transmitter in the world, rated at 500,000 watts, at station WLW, Cincinnati, which is owned and operated by the Crosley Radio Corporation, has been awarded to the RCA Victor Company, according to an announcement made last week by E. A. Nicholas, vice-president of the latter company.

The expenditure for the new station involves a sum estimated at \$400,000. The contract calls for the installation of the transmitter within a year. This new giant transmitter, for which an official permit for experimental purposes has been issued by the Federal Radio Commission, will serve as a practical

laboratory for the scientific development of actual broadcasting in the fields of super power radio transmission.

When installed, the new WLW transmitter will have ten times the power of any other, regular broadcaster in the United States, a limited number of the highest powered stations having been granted permission by the Federal Radio Commission to operate at 50,000 watts. The new transmitter will be of the most advanced type in the world incorporating the latest developments of the art. Mr. Nicholas said. It will utilize twenty of the largest transmitting tubes made for commercial use, each rated at 100 kilowatts and standing about six feet high.

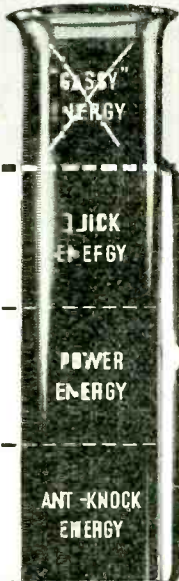
