POST WAR RECONVERSION

One of the most important steps in the Gates program for reconversion and postwar expansion is the move in progress to the new location at 123 Hampshire Street.

A plant of approximately 50,000 sq. ft. of floor space, including some of the most modern features for office, manufacturing and sales rooms, is now available for use.

It is hoped that within the near future the entire plant will be moved and 100% production will be in full swing.

At the new location the stockroom is now complete and with a few minor details to be worked out, other department locations will be ready soon.

Of course we miss the "Brains" of the plant who are still at "220", as the engineers "dub" themselves, but with their arrival at "123" the organization will be complete.
