My first encounter with Tetsuya Hirahara and the Japanese DX club, Radio Nuevo Mundo, was through their first "LA DXing" publication, a highly detailed summary of Latin American reception in Japan. I was, in a word, impressed. These guys were deadly serious about Latin DX. and their exact transcriptions of station announcements and program schedules indicated a command of Spanish and long, extensive periods of monitoring.

Tetsuya explained the the origin and goals of Radio Nuevo Mundo in the May 1983 SWC, as you'll recall, and now, thanks to an assist from his cohort, Takayuki Inoue, we are taken further into....

Latin American DXing Trend In The World

The quality of Latin American DXing has changed greatly since the beginning of the 1980's, because of the activity of DXers living in Latin American countries. Other than Mr. Tony Jorges, who provided us with interesting news from a DXers point of view from Paraguay, there had been no other DXers. But now, there are several who monitor LA stations using communications-type receivers. One of them is Mr. Juan Carlos Codina, now living in Lima, Peru, whose contributions to DX bulletins around the world has attracted every DXer's attention. He is so active in monitoring Peruvian outlets that we are afraid that very little DX news, except for his reports of Peruvian stations, would come from DXers in other countries.

In such a situation, how can we find out and/or provide DX news of interest to others to survive as DXers? To give an answer to this question, it would be somewhat helpful to keep in touch with the LA DX scene in Japan

Latin American DXing Trend in Japan

It was not until the mid-1970's that the so-called "BCL boom" in Japan was closed-up and many novice DXers were born. After a few years' experience, they were searching for something more in their way of DXing. At that time, one of the leading Japanese DXers proposed "DXing for survey" in a commercial DX magazine, stating that a DXer should keep in touch with stations' activities and obtain as much information as possible from what he heard. Influenced by his proposal, many young DXers tried their best to be more high-level DXers. They obtained basic linguistic knowledge for their DX activity, according to their own particular DX target (as Indonesian for DXing Indonesia, or Russian for USSR DX). As a result, this led to the specialization of many DXers. The advantage was that these "specialists" were so illuminative that they shared with others their information, and to our happiness, there were many good opportunities and places to show their experience.

LATIN AMERICAN RECEPTION IN JAPAN (cont'd)

Speaking of Latin American DX, LA fans learned Spanish and/or Portuguese to be experts on that area. LA DX, like other regions, is a very deep thing in itself. The aim of DXing can be defined as the pursuit of clarification of unknown or unidentified stations. The superficial phase is the reception of rare catches...this proves that the station is really operating on the frequency. Japanese DXers nowadays do not get full satisfaction from such a situation. "What characteristic does this station have?" "What type of programming do they have?" "How about announcers?" In order to answer these many questions we use two major ways: One is to contact the station directly, by letter writing and reception reports, in order to get a reply. The other is to carefully listen to the programming. The former is, however, sometimes difficult because LA domestic stations are generally indifferent to our reception reports, or if they do reply, they may not mention the information we wish to know. Therefore "watch" becomes an important means of getting direct information from stations. As you may have noticed, recent DX reports from Japanese DXers put emphasis on taking note of full ID texts. Why do they take down these IDs, when they only seem to annoy some editors? It's because they make the most use of the ID text for getting information such as call sign, nominal frequency, slogans, nominal output power, etc. all of which are usually included in the full ID announcement or at the opening and closing announcements.

You may say that there is no need to listening to the IDs because this information can be obtained from the World-Radio TV Handbook. It is true that the WRTH carries a lot of this information, however, it is sometimes outdated because of the ever-changing station activities in Latin America. (Incidentally, a "DXer" can also be defined as a listener who finds fault with the station, DX guides, loggings in DX bulletins, etc. because any difference from the existing information could be considered DX news.)

There is a good lesson to be learned in paying full attention to existing data when looking for DX news...listening to a Brazilian station, Radio Aparecida on 9635kHz from their sign-on at 0900 GMT, some years ago, I noticed that they were giving a "new" ID which was different from the one I was used to hearing. I looked it up in the WRTH and found that they were announcing a "new" prefix: ZYE236 (the latest edition of the WRTH said ZYE954). I was proud that I noticed the call-sign change earlier than other DXers. Several days after the big "discovery", I happened to see the Brazilian section of a previous WRTH...I was shocked to learn that the old WRTH showed "9635kHz ZYE236"! The prefix which I thought to be a new one was really the old one. Radio Aparecida played an old announcement tape that day!

Except for such a rare case, careful listening to ID texts surely brings us a lot of invaluable information anyway.

Reception Of Latin American Signals in Japan

Though it is very distant from the target area, LA reception in Japan is not so disadvantageous. Generally speaking, LA signals can be heard from 0800-1200UTC (or 1700-2100JST) and a few hours around 2100UTC (or 0600JTC) via long path. The former time range is most popular among Japanese DXers because it falls during the evening in Japan. There are many student LA DX fans because they have time available in the evening. The most advantageous reason to be an LA fan is that there is no need to get up early to catch LA signals.

As you may know, Japan lies from north to south, and reception conditions vary throughout. Judging from loggings reported to DX bulletins, the northeastern part of Japan has better reception of Pacific coast stations and has the longest LA listening times (i.e. earlier fade-in and later fade-out) as well. The southern part of Japan seems to have an advantage in receiving Brazilian signals. However, there is a disadvantage, to our sorrow, and that is QRM from Asian stations (including China and the USSR) operating on the tropical bands. To solve the problem, LA DXers in Japan monitor weak LA signals as often as possible to hopefully encounter an unexpected happening (like interruption for a few minutes of local interfering stations or sporadic frequency changes). The other way is to use an excellent receiver. Members of Radio Nuevo Mundo, a club for Latin

American enthusiasts in Japan, use receivers such as the NRD-515, IC-R70, FR-101 and R-1000, all with good selectivity, which is indispensable for DXing these days, to avoid adjacent QRMing stations. A few hundred kHz in frequency difference can be a chance to get a rare signal more clearly.

And now, in continuation, we would like to show you reception of Latin American signals in Japan, focusing on the most attractive of all Latin countries, the Peruvians, with some useful details on those stations heard within the past two years.

PERU - A Survey Of Stations Received In Japan

<u>Freq.</u>	<u>Station name, City (Province/Department)</u>	<u>Station Information</u>
3230	R. El Sol de los Andes, Juliaca (San Román, Puno).	*1000-1100. Frequent reception in winter but signal is very weak. Folklore program concentrated in local morning, partly using Quechua. Founded on October 23, 1962.
3240kHz	R. America, Lima (Lima).	1030-1200 in winter season. It seems that they do not use this outlet full time, so sometimes it is unheard even if reception conditions are good. Their slogan is, "Radio America, la unica y la primera". Their famous news program, "El Noticiero de Radio America", is now broadcast at 1100 (ex-1200).
3310	R. Bagua, Bagua (Bagua, Amazonas).	*1045-1130. Tentative reception in northeastern Japan. There is a possibility to catch them in early spring, but it is very difficult due to QRM from co-channel Chinese station. Per Ralplus (Ralph W. Perry) schedule is 1045-2000. Reports should be directed to Sr. Gilberto Paredes Torres, Director.
3330	R. Ondas del Huallaga, Huanuco (Huanuco).	*1030-1130. Noted almost yearly though signal is weak. Has much folklore in program from sign-on, V/s Flavia Uanos M. Their slogan is, "En su nueva dimension".
3800	R. Esmeralda, Huanta (Huanta, Ayacucho).	*0900v-1130. Noted here until May 1983 when it moved to 4501kHz. This station has also been heard on 5300kHz and later on 5050kHz, but unfortunately has not been heard on 4501kHz here in Japan. Nominal frequency was 3285kHz (OAX5L) and actual one is 4350kHz (OAX5L). V/s Aurelio Lauretto A.
4755	R. Huanta 2000, Huanta (Huanta, Ayacucho).	*0830-1200. Gives a fair signal throughout the year with a program, "Buenos Dias Peru" (a folklore music program, partly using Quechua). They moved to 4746.5kHz from October 1983 to February 1984 and afterward (in late February) moved to 5030kHz only to fight with R. Los Andes. Power is 1 kW. Founded on January 8, 1983. SW call is OAZ5B, MW is OBX50. V/s Humberto Sapaico Salazar, Director Gerente.
4760	R. Tingo Maria, Tingo Maria (Leoncio Prado, Huanuco).	1030-1200. Very difficult to hear because of co-channel QRM from China. There is occasional reception in February and March. Slogan is, "La Voz de la Bella Durmiente". SW call is OAX3W. V/s is Leonidas Infantas G., Gerente.
4762.4	R. Inca del Perú, Lima (Lima).	0800-1200 throughout the year. SW reactivated in May 1983 with a shedule *0900, then began 24-hour service on October 1, 1983. Due to their extensive folklore programming, their slogan is, "La señal folklorica andina". They used the station name "R. Frecuencia" from 1978-1980 but returned to original name in June 1980. V/s Augusto S. Irei Shimabukuro.

- 4775 R. Tarma, Tarma (Tarma, Junin). *1000-1130. Well heard all year around with folklore program, "Musica Folklorica Nacional" in which English IDs are sometimes given. Their slogan is, "La decana de la provincia". SW transmitter is OCX4E and is a Koley 400C with an output power of 1 kW. Their antenna is a dipole 15 meters high. The station was founded on April 25, 1958 and the v/s is Mario Monteverde Pomareda, Gerente.
- 4785 R. Cooperativa, Satipo (Satipo, Junin). *1000-1130 audible only when co-channel QRM from RTTY station is off a few times a year! Their slogan is, "Satipo, la radio". This station is owned by Cooperativa Agrario de Servicios "Satipo" Ltda. V/s Damasco Paredes Corvacho.
- 4790 R. Atlantida, Iquitos (Loreto). *0900v-1200. Audible yearly, though the announced 3lmb outlet of 9625kHz is not in use now. Founded on July 16, 1957. Their slogan is, "La fabulosa".
- 4810 R. San Martin, Tarapoto (Maynas, San Martin). *0900-1130 (formerly 24-hour). Their slogan is, "Una voz y un sonido para un Peru". They play a variety of music until 1130 when they begin their news program. V/s Kelly Barrera Fachin, Administrador.
- 4825 R. La Voz de la Selva, Iquitos (Maynas, Loreto). *1000-1130. Suffers from co-channel QRM (Moscow/Peace & Progress), however easy to note because of its power (10 kW). Station is owned by IPSA (Instituto de Promocion Social Amazonica) and the v/s is Teresita Perez Valera (Secretaria).
- 4827 R. Sicuani, Sicuani (Canchis, Cuzco). *0950 with a program called "Amanecer Campesino" (or "Amanecer Andino"). Their slogan is, "La Voz de Canchis". V/s Raul Siu Almonte, Gerente General, and the station is owned by "Producciones Radiales de R. Sicuani". Nominal frequencies are 1365kHz (1 kW) and 4835kHz (1 kW).
- 4840 R. Andahuaylas, Andahuaylas (Andahuaylas, Apurimac). *1010v-1100. Very difficult to hear because of co-channel Chinese QRM. The station is an affiliate of Cadena de Emisoras Cruz del Peru and the v/s is Daniel Andrea Casafra, Gerente Director. The official schedule is 1100-0300.
- 4854 R. Pampas, Pampas (Tayacaja, Huancavelica). *1030-1200. Programs are mainly folklore and using Quechua. First heard in 1983 and they use the slogan, "Una voz peruana para el mundo" or "Su radio nueva". The v/s is Luis F.D. Mestre R., Administrador.
- 4860 R. Chinchaycocha, Junin (Junin). *1000 (or *1030v)-1130. There is better reception in spring (early) but sometimes with QRM from USSR. After playing the national anthem, they begin their program, "Pentagrama Andino". They use the slogan, "Sus poderosas ondas radiales". The station is owned by Baldeon Hermanos, S.A.
- 4885 R. Huancavelica, Huancavelica (Huancavelica). *0900v (or *1000)-1130. Sign-on varies daily, with folklore music and announcements in Quechua and Spanish. Measured on 4885.3kHz. Also an affiliate of Cadena de Emisoras Cruz del Peru, headed by La Voz de Nasca.
- 4907 R. Cobriza 2000, San Pedro de Coris (Tayacaja, Huancavelica) 1030-1050. Once heard in September 1982 when operating on 4926kHz. Nominal frequency still announced as 4925kHz. Power is 500w. Switch to 4907kHz in late August 1983. Address is Campamento de Cobriza, San Pedro de Coris, but suggest reports be sent to Radio Huanta 2000. Cobriza is a mining town of CENTROMIN.

- 4911 R. Libertad, Trujillo (Trujillo, La Libertad). *1000v-1100. Thanks to Ralphus' confirmation of reactivation, noted in Japan on 4910.7kHz with slight QRM from Emisoras Gran Colombia, only 100Hz above though irregularly. Music format is mainly huaynos and they use the slogan, "Al servicio de la cultura, el comercio, la industria, el turismo y la defensa de los derechos del pueblo". V/s Carlos Burmeister B., Director General. Reportedly a good verifier.
- 4922 Ondas del Titicaca, Puno (Puno). *0930v-1130. Severe QRM from ABC-Brisbane (4920kHz) and China (4925kHz) but relatively audible from January to April. Plays first-class folklore music and messages for listeners in the program, "Por los caminos del folklor". V/s Jose Luis Lescano, Director Gerente. The station was founded on September 25, 1961, with the name "Radio Indoamerica S.A." operated by the famous Peruvian political party "APRA". The use a 1 kW Philips transmitter.
- 4934 Radio Tropical, Tarapoto (San Martin). *1000v-1200. Easy to hear throughout the year especially strong from winter to spring. Measured on 4934.6kHz (very stable) using the calls OAX9E for nominal 4935kHz and OAX9D for 9710kHz which is not in use per actual reply. They play a variety of music until the news at 1200 and they use the slogan, "Primera sintonia musical". Station founded on September 2, 1961. V/s Juan Pablo Mori, Director.
- 4935 R. Abancay, Abancay (Abancay, Apurimac). *1000-1130. Measured on 4935.lkHz since Spring of 1984, noted earlier in the Summer of 1982 on 4934.2kHz. Suffers QRM from R. Tropical and is barely audible. Their slogan is, "Emisora municipal del Peru". Official sked is 1100-2300 and the station was founded on October 8, 1958. V/s Zonon H. Farian Cruzado, Gerente or Sr. Lucio Fuentes who is in charge of a program called "Amanacer Andino".
- 4950 R. Madre de Dios, Puerto Maldonado (Tambopata, Madre de Dios). *1040v-1120. Barely audible under co-channel R. Malaysia and China. The signal on 4950.lkHz can be noted frequently but getting an ID is very difficult. In broadcasting for 26 years, this station belongs to CEMCOS (Centro de los Medios de Comunicacion Social). V/s Fco. Javier Aniz B., Director.
- 4955 R. Cultural Amauta, Huanta (Huanta, Ayacucho). *1100-1200. Heard regularly (especially January through March) with very strong signal (sometimes S9+20db!). Have been serving the people of Huanta (Esmeralda de los Andes) for 23 years and offers a very nice music program called, "Ritmo Folklorico", at 1100 in both Spanish and Quechua.
- 4966 R. La Voz de Cutervo, Cutervo (Cutervo, Cajamarca). *1100-1200. Heard since late May 1983 opening with the national anthem, ID and a program called, "Amanacer Campesino". They announce nominal 4965kHz (OAX4G) which is measured at 4965.8kHz.
- 4990 R. Ancash, Huaraz (Huaraz). *0930-1130. Heard relatively well with some QRM from China (Hunan PBS). They began a test broadcast on February 7, 1984 using a 10kW transmitter (Marti SCG-8H) and a vertical antenna (80m high). Their slogan is, "La razon para escuchar radio", and the station is owned by La Voz de los Andes S.A. V/s Edgard Caceres Flor.
- 4996 R. Andina, Huancayo (Huancayo, Junin). *0850v (or *1000v)-1200. Regularly heard with QRM from JJY (5000kHz) and Mongolia (4995kHz). Their programs are: 0900-"Pentagrama Andino", 1000-"Ecos Andinos", 1100-"Fiesta Andina". Their slogan is, "La mas potente del centro peruano". The station belongs to Cadena de emisoras Cruz del Peru". The station was founded on October 31, 1961. There has been no QSL news from this station in many years.

New Tenor, New Tone at the Voice of America

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30.—In many corners of the world, the Voice of America's shortwave radio broadcasts come through with all the authority of a whipper at a crowded cocktail party.

The reason: The United States sends its programs in 42 languages on the best equipment money can buy—11 of one was doing the buying in 1945. Nearly 80 percent of the transmitters are more than 10 years old. Some were seized from the Nazis at the end of World War II and are no end of the Voice of America operative in one machine shop to make spare parts.

"At one point in Morocco, we were broadcasting to the Ukraine with a 30-kilowatt transmitter," said Kenneth T. Tomlinson, director of the Voice of America. "My God, the Ukrainians would have been writing Ralph Nader and complaining about consumer fraud. That's about like broadcasting from Chappaqua, New York, with a ham radio set."

Groundwork for Improvements

Mr. Tomlinson, who ends a two-year term as director this week to rejoin Reader's Digest as a managing editor, believes he has laid the groundwork for improvements in the station's signal within three to four years. Congress has appropriated the first \$100 million of a planned \$1 billion for modernization and bids are being sought on a large engineering project to increase the quantity and quality of the transmitters.

The Voice now has 418 shortwave transmitters, while the Soviet Union has 37 for similar shortwave broadcasting, France, 11, and Britain, 8. Under Mr. Tomlinson's leadership, the Voice has campaigned to raise its visibility in Congress and worldwide, a drive that is expected to be continued by Eugene Pelt, the deputy associate director who was named acting director this week.

The efforts to reshape the Voice have been explicitly encouraged by President Reagan. Last year, Mr. Reagan devoted a weekly radio address to the road for new equipment at the station. The month the President returned to the theme to a White House speech to "Polib-Americans." He praised the improvements in the Voice saying, "Our broadcasters will carry the truth to captive people throughout the world."

An Usual Agency

The Voice of America is one of the more unusual agencies in the Federal Government. It is part of the United States Information Agency and it combines political appointees, career foreign service officers and professional journalists who serve as correspondents.

spondents in Washington and foreign lands. His reporters have long prided themselves on their professionalism and independence.

"I have often said that running a journalistic enterprise under Government rules constitutes an unusual act," Mr. Tomlinson joked.

The Voice of America, broadcast worldwide, covers world news as well as reports on the United States. The distinguishes it from Radio Free Europe and Radio Liberty, based in Munich, which aim their programs at Eastern Europe and the Soviet Union and concentrate their reporting on events in those areas.

Some of the Reagan Administration's innovations for the Voice, such as the advent of editorials entailing opposition and hence of major broadcasts could be seen as propaganda but other initiatives, including the drive to buy better transmitters, have gained bipartisan support.

Increasingly Competitive

Mr. Tomlinson says the world of international broadcasting is becoming increasingly competitive. The cost and size of shortwave receivers have been dramatically cut by new technology, and the potential audience has grown. Since 1950 the number of transmitters worldwide has grown from 385 to 1,596, the Voice says. The program involves familiar scenes like the British Broadcasting Corporation. But countries like Japan are also in the market for major shortwave services, and China is expanding following suit, Mr. Tomlinson said.

The Voice has not exactly reacted with the technicism of a domestic station in a major way. Still, it has begun to advertise programs in magazines and brochures. In June, it started publishing an English language magazine every two months on programs and sending it free to 60,000 subscribers. It has even given listeners T-shirts with the new red, white and blue Voice logo.

"This sort of thing has been lacking for a long time, simply because we have never had the funding for it," said Herb Koster, director of the Office of Audience Relations.

Mr. Koster's office, which was opened two years ago, is also responsible for answering and analyzing mail from listeners in 190 the General Advertising Office criticized the Voice for, among other things, neglecting to answer its mail.

New Programming Added

Beyond more aggressive promotional activities, the Voice has added new programming to take it out of what Mr. Tomlinson calls a "1950's disk jockey talk" in October, for instance, the talk show host Larry King, who is well-known within the United States, will begin a call-in program on the Voice of America.

"I think competition is very, very good," Mr. Tomlinson said. "I've encouraged cooperative news programs between the Voice of America and other Western broadcasters because I

wanted to get across to our people what we needed to offer, a daily commentary that was better than the BBC's. From an internal standpoint I tried to increase the awareness of the competition because, internationally, the competition is out there."

The Voice of America estimates its audience at 110 million people over the age of 12 who tune in at least once a week. Officially, however, these figures are guesses in Eastern Europe, for example, a listening survey is based on interviews with travelers from the Communist bloc who are visiting the West.

According to the Voice, its audience in Poland swelled after the declaration of martial law and 40 percent of the adult population, or 115 million people, now listen to the Polish-language broadcasts.

Mr. Tomlinson and other officials say they see new signs that the Reagan Administration's policy on broadcasting daily editorials is driving away listeners or undermining the credibility of the Voice. Mr. Koster said most mail on the editorials was positive, though "more in a while we get an occasional letter of complaint."

In the past two weeks, the editorials have discussed a number of topics near and dear to the President's heart: the merits of modernizing the education system; a Cuban teacher who deflected a fire being sent to Nicaragua to help the Sandinistas; the United States by Communist countries. Yet another ridiculed the impending elections in Nicaragua.

Mr. Tomlinson said the Voice of America charter requires the broadcast to be "in the interests of the United States." "Someone complained that your editorials would just hear Ronald Reagan," Mr. Tomlinson said, "and I said you're damn right and I'm proud of it. The editorials should reflect the viewpoint of the party in power."

The Voice of the Listeners

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30.—Each month the Voice of America compiles excerpts from letters from listeners and circulates them within the Administration and on Capitol Hill.

The letters, called from about 20,000 people of many nationalities, run the gamut. Some ask for information about American customs or groups like the American Indian. Others complain about the quality of the signal or jamming by the Russians. A few complain about editorials or programming.

Following are recent messages, whose authors were not identified by the Voice.

"Only thanks to you was I able to be a direct witness to the great moment when the Nobel Prize was presented to our great Pole—Lach Wales. The best reception is always late at night—the later, the better." (Polish Service)

"I hope the U.S.A. shakes hands with the U.S.S.R. and other nations of the socialism. Every body admits that the U.S.A. and U.S.S.R. are leaders of

the world, so you should not be opposed to the idea of cooperating with each other."

"I'm only a girl and can do nothing for world peace with these little hands. I'm very motivated to see. The only thing I can do is write this letter, giving my opinion. I can't help but believe peace should be the goal for nuclear war." (Japan)

"Your editorials give us the impression that the U.S. Government is not listening to an independent, reasonable radio station, but to a lecture of the U.S. Government's own spokesman. For God's sake, instead of this program, please broadcast a critical and unbiased news program of the U.S. Government." (Sialkot, Pakistan)

"I'm listening to the V.O.A. program every day. I'm very interested in your variety and detailed information. They don't hide anything from us. Unlike other radio stations, they don't broadcast sugar-coated news programs." (Buenos Aires, Cameroon)

'Voice' in a Costa Rican Pact

WASHINGTON, Sept. 11.—The Voice of America has contracted with a private group in Costa Rica for the use of transmitters to broadcast to Costa Rica and Nicaragua, according to a spokesman of the United States Government radio.

The spokesman, Rogene Waite, said that President Luis Alberto Monge of Costa Rica had requested the establishment of the transmitter in 1963 in a letter to President Reagan and that the Costa Rican leader approved the \$3.1 million deal two weeks ago.

The contract is "in full conformity with Costa Rican law and has the full approval of the Costa Rican Government," Miss Waite said, adding that some Costa Rican groups had opposed the arrangement.

The agreement is with the Costa Rican Association for Information and Culture, a businessmen's group.

At the signing ceremony in San José,

the Costa Rican capital, President Monge praised President Reagan for responding favorably to the request.

According to the Voice of America, other such arrangements with private groups are being explored in other countries.

The Costa Rican arrangement will also enable the Voice of America to broadcast to Nicaragua, where the Sandinista Government is being opposed by the Reagan Administration.

The Voice of America reaches Nicaragua by short-wave broadcast. Access to the station in Costa Rica, officials say, will permit clearer reception and access to a larger audience.

The Costa Rican contract is part of a proposed \$1 billion modernization of the American Government radio's operations, including an increase in the quality and quantity of transmitters. An initial installment of \$130 million has been approved by Congress.

There apparently are a lot of "beginners" in the NASWA ranks. And they are looking for help. A letter last time on the subject drew three responses, including this one from Larry Vipond in Phoenix, Arizona:

"I enthusiastically agree that a regular column designed to benefit the novice SWL is long overdue. The beginner may need help more than some, but I suspect even "oldtimers" could benefit from such a column. The idea certainly got my vote.

"Regarding your question: 'How can FRENEX and NASWA better serve its members,' and 'Are we doing enough to publicize the hobby?': I guess my only complaint about FRENEX is that there is really very little space devoted to the day-to-day basics of our hobby. Page after page is devoted to who is broadcasting when and on what frequency, how long it took to get a QSL, etc. I am not suggesting for an instant that this is bad. I simply think there is more to the hobby than that. We need to address the basics, or if you prefer, the stuff that makes it all possible -- equipment, repairs, operating techniques, where to find help, recording equipment, safety, the ideal shack, etc. I would like to see an annual survey on modification and repair facilities in the U.S. and Canada. Who does a first class job and at what cost? What is the best way to ship a receiver in need of repair? What modifications are recommended for what receivers? What really is the best antenna? Do antenna tuners really help? How do you make a good one?

"What I am suggesting is that we have drifted away from the basics. The bottom line is our equipment and how to get the most enjoyment possible out of it.

"I do not believe we are doing enough to publicize our hobby. I'm not even sure we are publicizing it. The solution? I'm not sure what the answer is but I think we need to find it -- and the "right" answers many turn out to be many."

Rev. John Eckert in Norristown, Pennsylvania, also says beginners could use a hand:

"I just read the letter from Joe Freeborn in Contact concerning the plight of the novice DXer. I too started to listen at the beginning of the year. I have found no one in my area who is a DXer, though there probably are some. And since I have absolutely no knowledge of electronics, I find myself skipping over all technical articles in FRENEX. I feel FRENEX is written for those who have more than a rudimentary understanding of electronics and communications. Despite the fact that I don't have the foggiest idea of the difference between a ceramic filter and a crystal one, I have still managed to monitor 113 countries since the beginning of the year. I have a GE World Monitor II. I would like to learn more about the basics of shortwave receivers, antennas, filters, and the like.

"I would also like to meet one of the 'masters' who knows a lot about DXing who could explain these things and let me hear what I don't understand, like what does RTTY sound like compared to all the other sounds you hear? Would any of the more experienced listeners care to help us newcomers with a question and answer column in FRENEX? I want to learn but there is no one around to teach me!"

We get a different perspective on the issue from Don Moore way down in Comayagua, Honduras:

"As I've been involved with the shortwave hobby since 1971, I read Joe Freeborn's comments with interest. I went through the same many years ago and have helped some novices since. However I'm not so sure that a regular 'novice corner' would fit the bill. There is a constant influx of newcomers, and even repeating itself every few months it likely would not supply specific information when it's needed by each newcomer. If you join in April and want advice on a new receiver, it doesn't help much if that was dealt with in February and will be again in October. What is needed is a constantly available resource for novices. To this end, I offer two proposals:

First, a Big Brother system. Each newcomer who asks for help would be assigned an experienced hobbyist to correspond with. This person could answer the novice's questions, or at least know where the answers could be found. One person could serve as coordinator. Experienced hobbyists willing to get involved could volunteer through the coordinator, stating how many newcomers they could assist. As newcomers request help, the coordinator would assign a 'Big Brother', trying to keep both people in the same geographic region.

"A newcomers packet could be sent to new members who request it, probably for a small fee, say fifty or seventy-five cents. This would include articles on basic topics, lists of addresses, and other references. To be truly effective, it would have to be compiled by a committee of both novices to ask the right questions and experienced listeners to supply the answers. And it would have to be updated annually.

"One of the worst things to do, I feel, is supply ideas and then do nothing to help implement them. However, that is just the position I find myself in. I will be travelling in 1985 and won't settle down in the U.S. again until 1986. So if anything is to be done about this before then, it's up to you!"

It is indeed up to us. Are there experienced people out there willing to lend a hand to newcomers? Let Contact know.

Although most shortwave hobbyists listen to programs, to one degree or another, there is surprizingly little comment about the content of those programs in the hobby press. In an effort to correct this, Contact is now open to your nomination for the Best and Worst programs on the air. Radio Tirann is specifically banned from this poll, however. It's just too easy to pick on. Along with your choices, send a brief explanation including suggestions to the station on ways to improve the show in question. As always, address your letters to:

Uniden CR-2021 Review

Why would an SWL with an R4C, SPR-4, IC-R70, and an R390A buy a Uniden portable? Ever try to lug an R390A up a couple of flights of stairs? Ever get to a band edge on a crystal controlled receiver and find you need only a few more kHz of coverage? How about portable operation of a table model 'state-of-the-art' receiver such as the FRG7700, IC-R70, R-1000, etc. You might pull 30-40 minutes of operating time from a AA NiCad pack. For casual SWLing and even some DXing, a portable that is truly portable as opposed to trans-portable is highly desirable.

I enjoy sitting in the middle of a local fishing lake in my 21 foot sailboat, and I derive some sadistic pleasure watching the ski boaters, bass boaters, and even other sail boaters trying to avoid my skill-lessly piloted vessel. I also enjoy listening to the news from R.F.I. and U.A.E. while those other nuts are hollering at me to go home, or perhaps somewhere else! How did I survive before the Uniden? I had to lug my FRG-7 complete with its' 8 internal alkaline D cells and a ground plate to drop over the side as well as a clip lead to hook the aerial input of the FRG-7 to the aluminum mast of my boat. I lost count of the number of clip leads, square copper plates, and batteries that I have float tested while trying to listen from my boat. The Uniden is much handier to say the least.

I also find the Uniden to be a most welcome companion in my office during those late night sessions. I can keep up with Jeff White's "Radio Earth" (at least until WRNO drops him!) and even R.N. "Media Network" when and if it ever returns. I can even listen to local FM stations. All of this good news has me worried: what, if anything, is wrong with this radio? It certainly is not an R390A. One can DX with a far lesser rig than this, but don't expect to hear "Tristan de Cunha" on a regular basis, Nibi-Nibi is more likely.

The Uniden and Radio Shack DX-400 are identical save their signal strength indicators. The Uniden utilizes 5 LEDs where the DX-400 uses a conventional meter. The Uniden has a one year warranty versus the DX-400's 90 days. The Uniden CR-2021 currently sells for \$100 (E.E.B.) or 1/3 the DX-400 list price. I must admit, even if Uniden sells the O.E.M. board to Radio Shack, I still have not been overly impressed with the recent Radio Shack offerings such as the DX-300/302. The service of the Radio Shack equipment is bound to be better, especially considering that Uniden stated in a recent correspondence that they did not have a schematic for the CR-2021, a reply I find unbelievable at best.

The 1984 WRTH has Larry Magne's typically excellent review of the Uniden/Radio Shack receivers, a review that should be read if contemplating such a purchase. I'll try to hit the high spots and then give my reactions after nearly 6 months of use.

The CR-2021 has 6 memories on LW/MW/SW and 6 more on FM with two more memories that represent the user enforced scan limits for LW/MW/SW. The scan function will automatically halt at a given carrier strength if so desired. The frequency scan is selectable in either 3 or 1 kHz increments on LW/MW/SW or 50/100 kHz on FM. In FM the scan memories are not functional and the scan begins on the last entered frequency and continues up in frequency. An interesting side-light of the low frequency scan is that it automatically starts at the lower of the two scan memories.

One enters the frequency calculator style with most significant figure first. Entry and readout is only to 1 kHz from 150-29,999 kHz and to 50 kHz increment from 87,400 to 108,000 kHz. An improper entry will result in a cute "Try Again" reply! You can scan either up or down in 1, 3, 10, or 30 kHz increments by manually depressing one or two of the appropriate buttons. This makes for convenient band scanning.

Two selectivity positions are functional on the lower non-FM range. The narrow range is still a little wide, but should prove to be easily remedied, although I have not inspected its innards to ascertain whether room is present or not for a better filter. The CW/SSB position has a very good product detector and a highly stable variable BFO. In fact, this synthesized receiver is second only to my Icom R70 in the stability department. I have had good success in using the Uniden with an interface and RTTY decoder to copy USIA and PL (Cuba) teletype broadcasts.

The audio is excellent with sufficient power to drive a small external speaker, if so desired. The FM capture is quite good for a portable. Two local 10 watt educational stations occupy the same frequency during the daytime with the closer one signing off at 1900 and the farther one at 0000 (local). The closer station is plainly audible until sign-off with the farther one then audible. To its detriment, it only has a simple hi-frequency roll-off adjustable tone control.

Power can be supplied by either 6 C cells (alkalines-internal), 110 V AC, or by a 11-14 V DC (cigarette adapter cord available from Radio Shack for about \$4). On AC and external DC, the radio's pilot lamps are always on. The battery drain with pilot lamps off measured 150 mA compared to my FRG-7 and its' rather meager 95 mA; less than the SPR-4 as well. I would advise removing the AC cord when not in use since the AC supply is always on and does get warm. The AC cord is quite common in case you misplace it. Always unplug the AC cord on this and other radios during electrical storms as many of the modern AC/DC sets are always "on" and simply switch the output side of their internal AC supply. The Uniden and R70 are examples of this type of circuitry (only the R70 memory supply applies).

Use test: I am ready for my third set of alkaline cells. I have been using the radio at my listening position with an external 12 V 6-A-Hr NiCad (DXpedition goodie!) and an external 6.5" speaker for nearly Hi Fi reception of the typical SWL fare: Spanish Foreign Radio, BBC, RCI, etc. I prefer this setup to my R70 et al for EZ listening. I typically use only the built-in whip, and the wear and tear is beginning to show. It is getting increasingly harder to maintain the vertical stance of the original whip, especially when the radio is in its' semi-prone position with the handy handle positioned as a support.

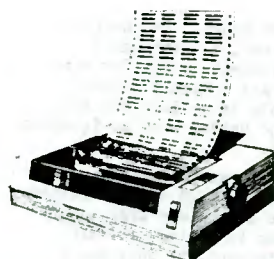
External antenna can be used-but I would highly suggest that you use either a short antenna or an antenna tuner to match a longer antenna. The built-in trimmer does not have sufficient range to cover the loading effect of a directly-connected long antenna. Always use a good ground when using the AC supply as the RF coupling (or decoupling) of the internal AC transformer allows a large amount of internal micro-processor generated hash to be present on LW and even into MW. This disappears when an external ground is utilized. The antenna trimmer must be constantly readjusted when tuning from one end of a band to the other. This is not as much of a problem as it sounds. Improperly adjusted, the receiver is highly susceptible to strong MW as well as super power SW stations. A good antenna tuner can't be over-emphasized. My favorite antenna is a 10 foot wire dropped behind my bed for bedside listening, (saves the whip) where my AC cord permanently resides.

One function that I use almost daily is the sleep function. This allows me to go to sleep knowing that the radio will shut itself off in 10 minute increments from 10-90 minutes. My younger son likes that function as well. Unfortunately, he only uses the radio for just local FM.

Where would I rate the CR-2021 as a DX machine? Having had an FRG-7 (Gilfer Mod-1) to compare with it, I must admit that the Uniden was the hands down winner. It seemed less susceptible to overload than the FRG-7 and was certainly easier to use. The selectivity in the narrow position was equivalent to the 4 kHz equipped Gilfered FRG7, with the wide position approximately equivalent to an unmodified FRG-7. The FRG-7, with its' traditional knob tuning, is a bit better suited to manual band scanning. With practice, however, the keypad tuning is soon mastered. The 5 LED signal strength indicator is just as useless as the overly optimistic S meter of the FRG-7. Background noise, presumably from the synthesizer, is more noticeable on the Uniden. The Uniden is far better suited for LW/MW DXing since the FRG-7 is poor on MW and does not cover LW.

Exalted carrier reception is highly stable as previously mentioned. Unfortunately, selectivity is not good enough to offer selectable sideband operation. SSB is quite acceptable except when listening on crowded ARO bands. Utility DXing is certainly possible, again mainly because of the already heralded stability. CW selectivity could be enhanced by using an external audio filter if so desired.

The Uniden is far from being perfect. It is, however, a definite improvement over the Sony 2001, and I prefer it to the FRG-7. The Uniden is general coverage and much more portable. In fact, the Uniden does so many things in a fair manner that it is hard not to like it! It is hard to believe that this rig costs less than the FL44A filter for my ICOM. Good DXing! // Thanks, John! See you next month! 73- Jim

Being a veteran dxer, the thought immediately crossed my mind that perhaps some of the lesser heard IVs would be audible under these circumstances. My ears watered at the thought! I opened up my WRTR and decided to turn on the 2001 and hit the frequencies of these inactive and not too often heard stations. I was having little luck until I punched in 6020 kHz. A poor signal there, but the Spanish talk caught my ear. I immediately went back to the 180 in hopes of digging something out. Being a normal human being, I would be cheating in this story if I did not tell you that I thought of the IV that broadcasted on this frequency, Radio Anzoategui. How long had it been since they were last logged?

I set the recorder and gave a listen, playing with all the dials and knobs on the 180 trying to improve reception. I listened and felt sure I was hearing cuts from a victory speech by an individual. He mentioned almost all the South American countries at times in his speech. About every ten minutes or so, the station announcer would break in and would speak over obviously joyous music. Something of a celebration I concluded. At 0425 GMT he came on and I felt sure he gave an identification for Radio Anzoategui!!!! Now I was really excited, although the ID remained tentative. I listened until 0458 GMT. Cops, I should have noted earlier that I tuned in at 0415 GMT. The station was killed off by the VOA coming on at 0458 GMT.

I was really intrigued now. I quickly played back my tape a number of times, and each time I played it back I kept getting more certain that Radio Anzoategui was what I had heard. But the static and noise on the frequency kept troubling me from being completely certain. I was not 100% sure, but I decided to take my chance and write a report of tentative reception to the station. I sent off my report with details noting that I felt it was a special election broadcast, with a speech by the President-elect being broadcast in edited versions, with the station announcer in between.

I could go on and make some serious statements about listening and GBLing, but my incident does not strike me that way. It just strikes me as funny now. I wonder if Arreaza Garcia was actually earnest in his letter? Perhaps he got a great kick out of putting in his "Note"? Well, it is kind of funny, not

As weeks and months passed the whole incident continued to bother me. I had made a mistake and my ego was more than bruised. It was not likely not the last, however, it kept bothering me. I finally realized that I had to tell this rather amusing story, and so I have. I feel much better now, having related my anger, my hopes, my despair. The whole thing is rather funny in retrospect.

I thought about writing back and asking if they were on just that one night, and I realized that surely Senior Arreaza Garcia would have told me that, and I just flipped the of the letter. I had not heard Radio Anzoategui and I had not verified them.

What!!! I was mortified!!! What!!! The reality finally sunk in with a second reading years ago. Apparently, Luis Armando Arreaza Garcia's "Note" was as follows: "Our transmitter of 6020 kHz doesn't function since many starting to get excited when I noticed a "Note" at the end of the letter. I was

I stopped reading and started to reflect upon this letter I had just received. I was

With this, we say goodbye, grateful to you one more time for the acceptance of our signal and you receive a friendly greeting from all the personnel who work at this station."

Normally we fulfill events for our public with great success. For example in December of 1983, we have fulfilled for the second time a Christmas concert, in which there participated more than 200 families; also a children's festival, where the children could enjoy, equally the elder ones—which attended the event, but the most important on has been one that we made happen on Silver Island, that which we call Sun and

Shore. Silver Island is a small island, very beautiful and known in all the country. There we gathered around 5000 persons among young people, adults, and children.

We take advantage of the occasion to make you know that "Radio Anzoategui" is a broadcasting station of youthful style, which works 24 hours a day, and that actually we occupy 1st place in tuning in the younger than 35 years old population.

This is exciting for the personnel that works in this broadcasting station, due to which, it comforts us that signal reaches a place so distant from our country, and that it should have the acceptance of at least some inhabitant of that band.

It serves for the present, in order to show you our gratitude for the received correspondence, in that which you verify to us the reception of our broadcasting station, on your receiver Humarilund M150—and antenna of 50 meters length. This is exciting for the personnel that works in this broadcasting station, due to which, it comforts us that signal reaches a place so distant from our country, and that it should have the acceptance of at least some inhabitant of that band.


The months passed and nothing turned up in my mailbox. Finally, in early February, I came home from work one night and saw the envelope on the table. It was a letter from Radio Anzoategui! I quickly opened it up, got out my 50 dictionary and started to translate it. The letter was from Gerente General Luis Armando Arreaza G. In addition to the letter he also sent along his business card and some very nice stickers from the station. Following is a translation of the letter.

THE IMPACT OF EMPIRES - Some thoughts on broadcasting in Africa.

AFRICA - THE DARK CONTINENT. A land of great geographic, economic, political, historical, and cultural diversity. Each of these elements plays an important role in determining the character of the nations of Africa, and in turn, determining the character of broadcasting systems operating within Africa. It can be argued that the variable with the greatest impact upon broadcasting in Africa, more specifically Anglo and Francophone Africa, is history.

Broadcasting in Africa began when much of the continent was under foreign domination, and it was the Colonial powers who established the prototypes from which present-day systems, Anglo and Francophone have evolved. To understand broadcasting in Africa today, one must examine the basic Colonial philosophies of Britain and France.

The two great powers had two distinct ways of governing their colonies. British rule was a case of classic imperialism. Often governing through the policy of "indirect rule", the British empire often granted local autonomy to native administrators. Britain tended to allow retention of native identity, yet made its presence known through economic, legal, administrative, and military subjugation.

Conversely, the French employed the Gallic Colonial theories of "la mission civilisatrice" and "la pacte imperiale". French rule emphasized strong administrative centralization and attempted to control and unify its Colonial territories by burying local identity with French culture. In essence, it was their attempt to civilize black Africa.

Radio broadcasting spread throughout Africa, and the broadcast policies developed by Britain and France for their colonies were simply extensions of their basic Colonial doctrines. Britain, in keeping with its "indirect rule" policy, established stations to serve local populations, trained natives for technical, administrative and performance roles, and used radio as a tool of education and information. British broadcast policies encouraged development of local culture through broadcasts in native languages and the presentation of local music.

French Colonial radio, in keeping with the policy of "la mission civilisatrice," was used primarily as a tool to further impose French culture upon native Africans. There was little local programming; in fact, the imposition of French culture, coupled with the French centralization policy, created a dependence on rebroadcasts of programs produced in France for broadcast in France. Centralization resulted in the establishment of a relatively small number of high powered stations to cover large areas, rather than a greater number of smaller stations to cover smaller areas.

Predictably, the effects of independence from Colonial rule upon the broadcasting systems of African states varied greatly, depending on which empire one examines. Native broadcasters in British colonies were well-suited to take the reigns of control upon independence - they had essentially been running the show for some time. Broadcasters in French colonies, however, were still heavily dependent upon their former subjugators, and this relationship continues even today. In an attempt to sever the Colonial umbilical cord, France established a program of aid to assist its former colonies in developing more independent broadcast systems. Although the French aid program succeeded in training Africans for broadcasting, the reliance upon France for programming continued (18,000 hours were sent to Africa in 1970). Perhaps this is one explanation as to why the programs coming from Lome, Yaounde, Abidjan, Et Al, tend to sound very much alike.

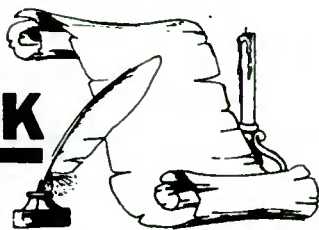
And the situation today? Former British colonies have continued, for the most part, upon the paths forged in the early days of African broadcasting. One notable exception is Nigeria, whose broadcasting system has moved increasingly toward federalization. The situation is quite different in Francophone Africa. While some systems have remained virtually unchanged, others appear to be moving away from strong central control toward a more regional approach to broadcasting. Radio in Cameroun may be the best example of this move toward localism.

History has certainly played a significant role in determining the nature of broadcasting in Africa. Yet as time goes by, the effects of Colonial heritage will diminish and the effects of other variables will be felt. Politics, economics, culture, and geography will play the primary roles in determining the future evolution of broadcasting in Africa. Independence will finally be complete.

This station has been in consistently lately. (Barto, CT 9-11)

CHILE R. Minería, 9750, in SP 1135+. Prgm of beautiful mx with many anncmts and the "Dr. Who" theme, which was often played during anncmts. Stn ID at 1142. (Johnson, TX 9-4)

COLOMBIA R. Macarena, 5975, in SP 1141. Long ballad sung by M and then booming stn ID. Frequent mention of "La Hora Dias." Perhaps the name of the prgm? (Hans Johnson, TX 9-9) +++

LV del Guaviare, 6035, in SP 1122; EzL vocal and guitar mx. Many stn IDs. (Johnson, TX 9-12) +++
LV de Llano, 6118, in SP 1155; Super network ID and a stn ID before next mx selection. (Johnson, TX 9-9)

GUINEA BISSAU R. Nacional, tentative, 5475.2, no ID heard but African here with local tunes and M anncr in PT. Vy weak signal from 2229-40. Some sources report a move to this freq. (Barto, CT 9-11)

INDONESIA RRI Palu (tentative) but definitely in IN w/ M anncr from 1100-04; possibly nx. M vocals from 1056-1100 in IN. ARO QRM. Freq 3960. No ID though. (Barto, CT 9-6)+++RRI Jakarta, 4774.5, in IN 1015-30; ballads and instrumentals, some commentary by a W anncr, ID 1030 by W. Very strong and best I've ever heard this. Also noted BBS 4725 and weak Indos on 4699.1 and 4845 during the same period. (Barto, CT 9-7)

SAUDI ARABIA BSKSA, 7245, in AR 0124; AR Service commentary on Lebanon situation by M, ID at 0128, and mx. (Johnson, TX 9-9)

SINGAPORE RS, 5052, in EG 1110-22; Alternating M and F anncrs. Some pop mx, ID 1115 by W. Checked 5010 and it sure seemed parallel but much weaker. (Barto, CT 9-7)

VANUATU RVanuatu, 3945, in FR 1015-1030. W anncr to 1030 when ID. Very good. (Barto, CT 9-6)

First in our feature spot is our regular report from Takayuki Inoue in Japan, with some very special reports:

2380 **FALKLAND IS.** FIBS, Pt. Stanley, *0958-1030 fair condx 7-25. Better in USB. At last could catch this signal w/ nice condx. S/on w/ march mx and after opening anncmt by M, "You are tuned to Falkland Broadcasting Stn." Included freqs as 2380 SW and FM 100 MHz (96.5 MHz not used now.) Then BBC World News relayed to 1005 and mx prgm afterwards.

Atlantida 3 poderosas ondas radiales de curben nitidamente, la mas gran region del Peru." After folklore mx prgm titled "El Madrugador" in Quechua and SP.

4910 **PERU** R. Libertad, Trujillo, on 4910.7, *0955-1015 f/p on 7-14. S/on w/ campo style mx and opening anncmt hrd as: "Estimados oyentes, tengan Uds., muy buenos dias desde la tierra turistica del Peru, transmite Radio Libertad de Trujillo operaba...de los 4910 kc onda corta banda de 60 metros...correspondiente al dia de hoy." Occasionally suffers from QRM from Em. Gran Colombia, Ecuador only 100 Hz above, which operates on SW irregularly. Prgm "Musica Nacional" including Huaynos and messages to listeners.

4945 **BOLIVIA** R. Illimani, La Paz, on 7-31 operated 24 hour service. ID: "Desde la cumbre de los anhelos nacionales, R. Illimani, La Voz de Bolivia 51 anos de permanente vocacion boliviana. Illimani, la radio que acompaña a todo un pais."

5025 **PERU** R. Quillabamba, Provincia de La Convencion, *1115-1130, fair 7-20. This stn has again changed its opening anncmt. I cannot understand the reason why again this stn annces MW which is now off air because of small audiences since 1981. Anyway, ID: "Desde

- la ciudad de Quillabamba, capital de La provincia de la Convencion, Deptamento de Cusco, Republica del Peru, transmite Radio Quillabamba, emisora perteneciente al centro de los medios comunicacion social CEMCOS, desde las 6 de la manana hasta las 10 de la noche. Estamos con Uds. en los 5025 kHz de su receptor banda internacional de 60 metros OAX7G y 1210 kHz banda de 250 metros onda media OAX7M. - 6098 COSTA RICA R. Universidad de Costa Rica, 6098.6, San Pedro de Montes, first noted as UNID on 7-2. Finally got ID 7-19 with poor signal because of QRM from Zinjiang PBS. ID: "Radio Universidad de Costa Rica en sus estudios..." by W. Tnx Mr. Saaki for tips.
- 6323 PERU Estacion C, Moyobamba on 6323.6. *0958-1120, fair w/ CW QRM. Better in LSB. Well heard if there is no QRM. Program "Amanecer Andino" after NA. Opening anncmt: "Senoras y senores en esta forma. Estacion C, la radio inicia su transmision correspondiente a la fecha. Transmitiendo desde Moyobamba, capital del Departamento de San Martin para todo el Peru. Estacion C la radio que apunta al futuro. Buenos dias en Estacion C la radio. Presentamos AMANECEER ANDINO, el programa despertador a los amigos y hombres de todo el Peru, bienvenidos a AMANECEER ANDINO, esta operando la frecuencia de mejor andino More from Takayuki in upcoming UDs.

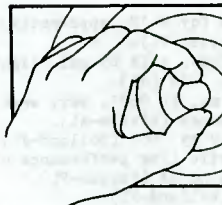

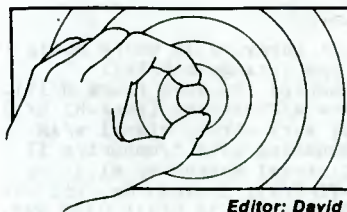

Quito, Ecuador-- International shortwave station HCJB, The Voice of the Andes, broadcast 4 live telephone call-in programs on August 17th and 18th. The programs were carried to all HCJB target areas during the time periods normally reserved for the PASSPORT magazine program.

The show received a total of 39 calls from 10 countries. Listeners were able to ask questions of Ken MacHarg, who hosted the program, or of DX Party Line host John Beck, news director Brian Seeley, or English Service director Glen Volkhardt. Most of the callers were regular HCJB listeners although a few people phoned who had never heard of The Voice of the Andes, having been intrigued with the idea of an international call-in show.

The program came off with a minimum of technical difficulties, according to English Service director, Glen Volkhardt. He said for a first attempt, the staff was very pleased with the outcome of the program. "We've always encouraged listeners to write to us and said that we are interested in what they have to say. This was a tangible way of proving that we mean it," Mr. Volkhardt said.

The English Service plans to do another call-in show in October, this time hosted by the Musical Mailbag team. Because the number of calls from North America more than equaled calls from both other target areas, the program will be aired once to North America and simulcast to Europe and the South Pacific. Broadcast times for the Musical Mailbag call-in are:

North America Friday, October 19th 2:30 UTC 15,155 9,745kHz
 Thursday evening the 18th for most listeners.

Europe Saturday, October 20th 7:00 UTC 11,835 9,635kHz

South Pacific Saturday, October 20th 7:00 UTC 11,925 9,745 6,130kHz

Both broadcasts will be an hour in length. To call the program, first dial your international access code, then 593 for Ecuador, 2 for Quito, and 241-560 for HCJB. To cut down on the cost of the calls, the producer will not answer the phone until just before it is to be put on the air, so let the phone ring.

Plans are also underway for a DX Partyline call-in program in November and a Christmas call-in for December.

The DX Newsline is based in a 24 hour automated voice storage and retrieval system in Washington, D.C., which allows serious DX'ers to exchange up-to-the-minute information and DX news.

The Newsline offers two levels of service. Anyone may call the Newsline (301-953-0777) and hear the "public" announcement and/or leave a 30 second contribution. The public announcement is updated daily and contains a summary of the latest DX log reports.

The second level of service provides a new and unique service to the DX'er; be they SWL, Utility, LW, MW, FM, or T.V. oriented. Use of a special access code provides access to the command mode. In the command mode a subscriber can access up to 30 of the latest DX tips (including any placed on the system up to the minute you call). Skip or repeat functions are also provided. This service allows people to hear DX tips within minutes without waiting for the "public" announcement to be updated. Callers can play unidentified transmissions down the line and have others I.D. them. Band openings can be known within minutes of the occurrence. Technical questions may be asked and replies received within hours. Hear news of frequency/schedule changes. Announce for sale items or items wanted. The system is great for catching pirates within minutes of sign on.

As you can see, the system is very versatile. The only equipment needed is a touch tone telephone (or tone converter). Many of the present subscribers have commented about how the DX Newsline has reduced the isolation felt by many DX'ers. The Newsline is a great supplement to club magazines and radio DX programs. Visually impaired DX'ers can make great use of this service. All DX'ers can participate in a closer and quicker form of communication with fellow hobbyists.

A small subscription fee of \$10.00 per year is charged for access to level two of the DX Newsline (level one is free). Reduced rates are available to those living in certain strategic DX locations. Subscription rates may be eliminated in return for donated labor. The Newsline is not for profit.
