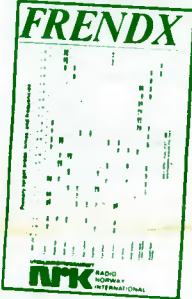
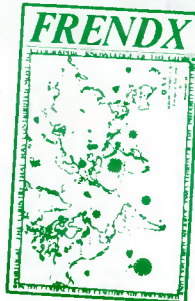
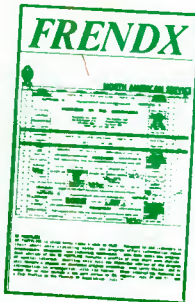

- 2). 7350 (40.8 metres) A.M. operating 24 hours daily. Alternative frequencies 7400 7420.
- 3). 9962 (30.1 metres) A.M. reduced carrier operating 24 hours daily.
- 4). 11480 (26.1 metres) A.M. operating 24 hours daily. Alternative frequency 11550, 26 metres.
- 5). 3905 (76.8 metres) SSB (LSB) operating from 00-00 to 06-00hrs.
This broadcast may not be available on some days.

Well, here we are at the last CONTACT of 1985. As usual, there are some interesting letters and some thought-provoking ideas to ponder. Let's get right to it...

From Duke Alexander (Houston, Texas) some disturbing news:

Today I am writing concerning a most urgent matter I think all SWLs need to act upon. "The Electronic Communications Privacy Act" of 1985, sponsored by Sen. Patrick Leahy (D-VT) and Rep. Robt. Kastenmeier (D-WIS) would, in effect, make SWLs liable to Government prosecution under wiretapping laws for just listening to mobile/cordless telephones that operate in the SW or VHF spectrum. I suppose the satellite TV people could be in on this as well. This is a good example of legislators trying to accommodate greedy commercial interests. If the telephone or satellite people feel it is too costly to put scramblers on their devices, they just lobby Congress to "criminalize" the innocent listener. SWLs that enjoy listening to unscrambled military communications could end up in Federal Prison for trying to QSL! If you overhear a drug deal or murder being planned, and call the Police, YOU go to the Federal Pen for "wiretapping"! There are quite adequate laws now on the books against espionage and fraudulent misuse of TV or radio signals. This measure would put the US in the same category as countries that do not allow free reception of radio signals. We must not sacrifice fundamental American rights! I would hope every SWL takes pen in hand and writes his or her Senator and Congressional Representative. Remember, these legislators (with the exception of Sen. Goldwater) know NOTHING of SWling; YOU are the ONLY one that can "set them straight" on this.

I am angered by this most recent attack on the freedom of speech (and listening), but I can't say that I am especially surprised. There is an increasing tendency to make consumers legally (and, by implication, morally) responsible for the faulty and penny-pinching engineering and planning on the part of manufacturers. There can be no shortage of people in the industry who are perfectly aware that the devices they market use frequencies that are commonly available on a large number and wide range of openly and legally obtainable receivers; they must also be aware that, without the use of scramblers, the communications carried by these devices cannot in any way be claimed to be secure. Yet the matter has not been addressed by manufacturers, and I can only assume that they have left the consumer to assume, in good faith, that their privacy is secure. Caveat emptor? That tired phrase has been used all too often in order to shift the blame from manufacturers to consumers: it is not the function of business merely to outwit the consumer, nor ought it to be assumed that blame must inevitably fall on the consumer so outwitted. One more point: we Americans are the envy of the world with respect to the freedom with which we can obtain, use, and disseminate information. And yet we Americans are often the first to try to tinker with and weaken that precious freedom. You and I, however, can speak out against this assault on that freedom. I will, and I hope that you will too.

An interesting development in the ICOM back-up battery problem is brought to your attention by Ken Cobb (Portland, Maine):

I hope to contribute a little bit of information today that I hope you can use. I have been following the ICOM R71A lithium battery controversy in your column with great interest and concern. You see I too am a proud father to one of ICOM's darlings! I really love that R71A and I was quite concerned to find out about that battery being so hard to replace. After getting the lowdown from the October FRENEX, I immediately wrote to ICOM to voice my concern and ask what should be done about the matter (very politely, too, I might add). Enclosed is a copy of the letter sent to me by ICOM. It does answer a few questions that I had, however I still am a little

bothered by the fact that neither ICOM nor the dealer (EEB) bother to mention the problem in their ads, or even in the manual. I mentioned this to ICOM also.

I still am taking the letter from ICOM with a grain of salt, but it does address the problem and offer a reasonable solution (for me anyway; I don't know how other ICOM R71A owners will react to it. Annoyance is certainly justified in this case!) I hope you can use this info to let other owners know what ICOM plans to do about the problem. Perhaps all the owners should write ICOM and let them know first hand. Then ICOM may be persuaded really to satisfy their customers, as in FREE battery replacement. I'm going to mention it in my next letter: it's their technical goof--right?!

Here, then, is ICOM's reply to Mr. Cobb; it was written by Scott Malcom (KA7MEF), Acting Service Manager:

Thank you for your purchase of the ICOM IC-R71A short wave receiver and for bringing your questions and concerns to our attention.

The ICOM IC-R71A does utilize a lithium memory back-up as most transceivers do these days to maintain memories. The life of the lithium battery is unknown at this time. The shelf life is five to seven years according to the manufacturer of the battery. Our engineers have assured us, due to the design of the radio and the way they have utilized this battery, it should in fact last closer to 15 or 20 years without any problems at all. Should at any time this battery fail to hold a charge, ICOM has a 24 hour service program to replace this battery. The battery is located on what is termed as a RAM card and this card may be simply unplugged from the radio and sent in by U.S. mail which means you may have the RAM card battery replaced and back to you within one week.

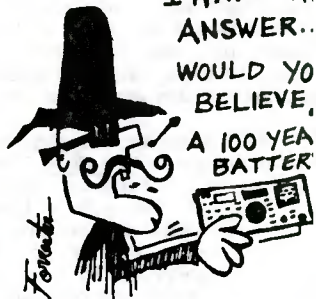
The only charge that would be applied to this would be \$25.00 which covers replacement of the battery and shipping and handling if the battery should ever fail.

If I may be of any further service, please do not hesitate to write or call.

This is all very well as far as it goes, but a number of questions remain. 1) Simple? If you have ever looked inside the R71A you will know that is absolutely packed with components, wires, connectors, etc. Getting the RAM card out without disturbing anything else may very well not be so 'simple.' 2) Why isn't this procedure discussed in the manual? Mr. Cobb rightly points out this failure, and this, at least, ought to be rectified immediately. 3) 15 - 20 years? If the lifetime of the battery is not known, then it would seem difficult to hazard any kind of estimate at all. I discussed this with an engineer (Mr. Louis Nielsen) whose work requires that he be well informed about batteries. He told me that 'shelf life' is a kind of 'worst case' estimate of the life of the battery, and may, in practice, be very much longer than that figure might indicate. There is, however, just no way of knowing for sure until the batteries have been around for 15-20 years. By which time will ICOM still be able to be so accommodating? 4) Only...\$25.00? -- need I say more?

Continuing for a moment on the ICOM theme, come these thoughts from MSgt Robert L. Forrester (Eielson AFB, Alaska):

Can we really place total blame on ICOM? I'm sure ICOM will be around to change the battery and reprogram the receiver. If not, some greedy individuals will welcome the opportunity and make the repairs. I personally can't place total blame on ICOM. Sure they didn't mention the 5 year lithium battery or the reprogramming of the R71A in their ads but it is our responsibility as buyers to find out as much as we can about the product before purchase. The R71A is an excellent receiver and the fault is not in it but in the slick advertisements ICOM



uses to whet the appetites of the affluent North American market. Instead of careful comparing and investigating our products, we now buy on the basis of pretty pictures and catchy words put out by the manufacturers to get us to buy their products. I do not own an ICOM product. I did my homework and purchased as JRC-515. Perhaps there is something to the old saying "Let the buyer beware."

Thanks for the amusing cartoon, and thank you, too, for the timely reminder that we consumers must take a lively and active part in our buying. I think, however, that the present instance goes somewhat beyond what may be reasonably required of the consumer. I, for instance, read everything I could get my hands on about all of ICOM's products -- the R70, R71, and transceivers -- and got my information from as many sources as I could -- Larry Magne's reviews in WRTH, product reviews in QST, discussions with vendors, etc. And in this inquisitiveness I am not so vain as to think myself unique. This raises some interesting questions which some of you might want to consider and share your answers with us: What were your requirements when you set out to buy a receiver and how were those requirements altered (accommodated) by the market place? What questions did you ask, of whom? What sources did you consult? The answers to these and other question would go far in helping others to make sound and satisfying purchase decisions, so please share them with us!

A fascinating letter from Gerry Bishop (Clark AB, Rep. of the Philippines) gives some fascinating insights into non-North American DXing and comments upon several matters previously taken up:

Greetings from Asia! (☺) DXing from the rim is, as you might expect, quite different from DXing in the States. Not only am I about 12-15 hours "out" from NAm, but living in the Philippines is like being 30 years behind. (☹) Power brown-outs are common, and can last anywhere from 10 minutes to a two day black-out. However, a battery operated set can offset some of the inconvenience, but not all.

Chinese stations are the main powerhouses, with Australia and R. Moscow following closely. Indonesian stations, especially RRI's (Radio Republik Indonesia, the government broadcasting service--sgm), and Malaysians are there for the taking. Papua New Guinea stations are still tough but not quite the challenge presented from a Pennsylvania location. (☹) DX are West African stations and Latin Americans. 60mb Brazilians are easier from September to December than any other time of the year, especially around 0900UTC. An occasional Bolivian or Ecuadorian may surface around 1000UTC on 60mb. (☹) Best catch here, so far, has been R. Candip (Zaire) on 90mb. Azad Kashmir, 3665kHz [Pakistan; listed as 3670v, 1 kilowatt in DSWCI Tropical Bands Survey, 12th edition, but not mentioned in the 13th) is not common, but will show up once a week. Bhutan in still unheard -- the only active Asian country on my list that way. Comoros will make it here, though weak with "splash" on 3335kHz.

On the subject of contributing, I've always believed that anyone should contribute any time s/he had any relevant information, and the time to organize it for contribution [...] (☹) For my part, I can't quite seem to make the deadlines for Log Report or UPDATE, but I do send Glenn Hauser information on whatever I'm logging, especially when it differs from published schedules or frequencies. And when I've got half a dozen or so QSLs, I send off a letter to Sam Barto.

[...] The ICOM R71A lithium battery debacle certainly sold me on the Yaesu-8800, though I'm concerned about some similar flaw surfacing in this one, too. Side by side, in-store performances on the two proved inconclusive. However the 8800 has certainly passed any test I can give it for digging out the tough DX. In fact, as I write this, K0RL-650 [QTH?--sgm] is weak but readable from across the Pacific. [...]

It would be very interesting to hear from other non-Stateside SWLs about reception and conditions at their locations.

As I was finishing up this month's column, I received some interesting letters. One, from Duke Alexander provided some interesting news on Radio Earth (see below, CONTACT NOTES) and some further material on the "Electronic Communications Act of 1985" (This will be presented next month.) The other letter is from Bill McMillan, Superintendent in charge of broadcasting transmitter facilities at Tahiti Bay (Broadcasting Corporation of New Zealand) and gives some interesting information about the present state of broadcasting there. This too will appear next month.

From Duke Alexander about Radio Earth:

In a Nov. 1 Press Release, Jeff White has announced that Radio Earth has purchased a transmitter, which after some engineering modifications will be installed on a site in Curacao, Netherlands Antilles. A station license has been applied for. A TMC (Technical Materiel Corp.) 50Kw SSB transmitter will be modified by Radio Earth engineer Jon Gorski to operate at 25Kw AM mode on the shortwave bands. If the ITU ever mandates a switch to SSB mode, the unit will be switchable to that mode at that time. An antenna has not been selected, but it will be a beam type, with North America and the Caribbean being the first target areas. An antenna directed to South America will also be constructed. There is a possibility that a Kahn stereo generation system may be employed--but this has not been decided yet. All staff stationed on Curacao will be island resident and citizens with the exception of Jeff White who may or may not choose to do programs there. But engineering, announcing, and administrative people on Curacao will be locals. Projected sign-on is June 1986.

I have just completed an analysis and re-working of the MINIMUF 3.5 computer program which originally appeared in the December 1982 QST and which was also given in a Commodore 64 version in the September 1985 FRENEX COMPUTER CORNER. In the process of extracting the equations from the program I was able to improve some of the computation procedures, tighten the structure of the algorithm, improve (I think) accuracy beyond 6000 miles, and provide more useful results for polar paths. Further, as all of the computations have been performed in degrees (as opposed to radians), these revised equations are more appropriate to a programmable hand-held calculator or suitable computer (such as the TI CC-40, HP-41, HP-70 or HP-75). I will finish the annotations in the next week or so. If you would like a copy, please send a SASE with 39c postage to me and I will send a copy of it to you as soon as the XEROX machine runs off the copies.

Finally, I want to thank all of you who have written. If this column has succeeded in bringing SWLs into CONTACT with one another, it has been because of your support and effort. To readers who have patiently followed the varied mix of topics covered here, also my deepest appreciation. I want to wish you all the joys and felicitations of the season, and my best wishes to one and all!

Easy Listening

NDAY

40-1200: "Listeners' Letterbox" (Radio Beijing). Answers questions from a worldwide audience (not exclusively North American) about a variety of subjects, including newspapers in China, circuses, rail service, earthquakes, and the Chinese computer industry. Usually answers three letters per program and does a pretty thorough job. (9820. Repeated at 1240 on 9820/11860 and test frequency 9535. Also repeated at 0040 on 9820/11970).

50-0110: "The Pope, the Church, and the World" (Vatican Radio). Program begins by summarizing the Pope's Sunday message, usually the Homilie. Plays tape of the Pope and translates. The last ten minutes of the program are devoted to Church issues and world issues that affect Catholics, like the Sixth Symposium of European Bishops, a Church conference in Milan on the issue of criminality, or how the recent Anglo-Irish agreement will affect Catholics in Ireland. (11845/9605/6015).

NDAY

15-1245: "Just a Minute" (BBC). A hilarious quiz program in which four participants (usually two or three regulars and one or two guests) are asked to speak for one minute on a given subject without digressing, hesitating, or repeating themselves. (Clement Freud, Sigmund Freud's grandson, is a regular, by the way). Subjects can be mundane ("magic" or "dressing in a hurry") or ridiculous ("stewed hippo" or "the last time my husband sawed me in half"). (11775/6195/5965).

55-2300: "Generation to Generation: Thirty Centuries of Jewish Life in the Land of Israel" (Kol Israel). A long title for what is basically a very short program detailing various periods of Jewish history in Israel. Recent episodes seem to have concentrated on the first century AD just before the Diaspora. (9435/9815/7410. Repeated at 0025 on 9435/7410/5885. Kol Israel is dropping 5915 in favor of 5885 to avoid QRM from Radio Moscow).

ESDAY

50-2250: "Culture and the Arts" (Radio Moscow). A program that is largely comprised of interviews with those engaged in some cultural pursuit. Most shows have a theme that ties them together in some way, such as theater productions about the end of militarism, painters who were Russian soldiers in World War II, or freedom of artistic creation in the Soviet Union (ahem!). Each show includes five minutes of "News from the Cultural Scene", brief news items of cultural interest. (7115 et. al.)

50-0300: "VOA Magazine" (VOA). A slick, well-packaged production with a lively, upbeat presentational style. Most items, usually three to five minutes in length, are of human interest rather than current affairs oriented. Some features have been the granite industry in Vermont, the NASA program to put a journalist in space (this reporter refuses to go), computer-automated buildings, the writers' workshop at Iowa, and an interview with Charles Kuralt, who in some ways is the spiritual father of this program. Quite entertaining and somehow very American (5995/6130/9455/9650/11580/11675). M--F.

WEDNESDAY

0030-0035: "News from Cuba" (Radio Havana Cuba). A brief summary of news items about Cuba, usually focusing on cultural events, symposiums, conventions, etc. taking place in Havana or elsewhere in Cuba. Frequently quotes from some address or other of Fidel Castro. (6100/6140/9740/11725). Repeated every half hour daily.

0015-0030: "Musical Spotlight" (Spanish Foreign Radio). A program that features traditional Spanish music. Some programs have featured the castinettes, bullfight music and songs, and tunas (Spanish collegiate signing groups, not fish). (11880/9630. Repeated at 0115 on the same frequencies and for West Coast at 0515 on 9630/6125).

THURSDAY

2210-2225: "The World Today" (BBC). An in-depth look at a single item of interest in the news. Past programs have covered the Greenpeace scandal (the sinking of The Rainbow Warrior), violence in Lebanon, and problems in South Africa. Program not only includes reports from correspondents but also interviews with a variety of experts in the area. About as thorough coverage of an issue as you can get in fifteen minutes. (5975/6175/7325/9590). M-F.

0135-0148: "Thursday Feature" (Deutsche Welle). Despite the rather unimaginative title, this is not a bad show that usually takes a subject of political, cultural, or historic interest and does a pretty thorough job of examining it. Past programs have included a feature on the notorious Nuremberg laws of Nazi Germany, the excavation of Troy by Von Schlieman, a study of the GI in Germany, and the impulse toward German re-unification. (6040/6085/9545/9565/11785. Repeated for West Coast at 0535 on 5960/6120/6130/9690/11705).

FRIDAY


1120a-1125a: "Profile" (Radio Beijing). This program features interviews with individual Chinese notable for their achievements, including a school teacher in one of the provinces, a noted Chinese scholar, and a Chinese graduate student who won an essay competition. (9820. Repeated at 1220a on 9820/11860 and test frequency 9535. Also repeated at 0020a on 9820/11970).

1400-1425: "Weekday Friday" (Radio Sweden International). The program always begins with a five minute bulletin of Swedish and other Nordic news, including the weather in major Swedish cities. The next part of the program is a current events magazine, and the program, at least on Fridays, concludes with a feature of more human interest. For the last several weeks they have been running a series called "The Scandies" about Scandinavian emigrants who settled in New Zealand. With minor variations, this is a daily program, only the day of the week changing in the title after "Weekday". (15345. Repeated at 0400 on 9695). M-F. (Tuesday's edition abbreviated for "Sweden Calling DXers" at 1415).

SATURDAY

2230-2300: "Audio Book Club" (Radio Moscow). A reading of short stories poetry, and extracts from novels by noted Russian authors, mostly modern Soviet authors like Maxim Gorky and Mikhail Sholokhov, but has occasionally included a nineteenth century figure like Tolstoy (an extract from Resurrection). Very well done with appropriate dramatic music that provides just the right backdrop without sounding melodramatic (7115 et. al.)

0210-0230: "American Viewpoints" (VOA). Each week an article on political economics, or current events is quoted from and summarized, and then two Americans who have appropriate credentials in the subject area are given an opportunity to respond to, criticize, agree with, or dissect the article. Good for those who have a high interest in current affairs; boring for those who don't. (5995/6130/9455/9650/11580/11675).



Soundwaves

Winter is upon us, and with it, the happy return of the DX season. Even though we're now reaching the sunspot minimum and end of Cycle 21, there should still be some good DXing to be done in the coming months. Just remember, conditions can only get better from here on in. I figure 1990-1991 to be the high point of Cycle 22. Until then, we have to hang in there and keep our ears open. This time last year, I was having some pretty good luck on 60 meters. This year I hope to do better, since I am no longer at school in Boston, and the local QRM in that city is frustrating, to put it mildly.

Here's a couple of Africans that I've been hearing lately:

NIGERIA: The best part of having earlier sunsets is that I am able to catch the two Nigerians on 60 meters before their sign-off time around 2300 GMT. Look for Kaduna on 4770 kHz and Lagos on 4990 kHz. The tunes are incredible, with lots of drums and percussion.

GABON: Africa No.1 comes in loud and clear on 4810 kHz. Listen for their upbeat format and fast talking French language DJs between 1800 and 2300 GMT, and again between 0500 and 0800 GMT. They can also be heard on a number of higher frequencies at other times of the day (try 15200 kHz in the morning).

In the November "Listeners Notebook", Glenn Hauser ran Maxfield Greenwood's list of 60 meter African stations. I refer all to this, as it is very complete and helpful. I went through it one evening, and found a few of the noted stations, although conditions were far from adequate for any kind of serious music listening. I hope things get better soon so I can listen once again to old favorites like Botswana and Cameroon.

Aside from these few loggings, I have little else to mention this month in terms of music broadcasts, due to the lack of contributions. As many other columnists have mentioned in the past, one person can't do it all by himself. I not only enjoy hearing from listeners, but also NEED to hear from them. THIS MEANS YOU! As it is, I barely have the time to gather up enough items to run this column every other month. I must receive more reader input in order to ensure its survival.

CAR SW CONVERTERS (PART II): I received two letters in response to my request for information dealing with car SW converters. The first is from Jerry Stuart in Lawton, OK. He uses an MFJ model 304 with his Dodge AM Stereo unit, along with the car's stock antenna, and seems to have good luck with it. He says some stations will kick in the stereo mode, and that you can hear the difference. He had also tried the

replacement antenna with a coil, but can't say whether or not it helped. Jerry has ordered the MFJ 308 converter to upgrade his car setup, and will move the 304 into his pickup. Let us know how it works, Jerry.

I tried to do some homework on the above converters, but there isn't much info on them in my radio magazine library. Both cost under \$100; all mounting hardware is included, but you have to pay extra for an owners manual. (?) The difference between the two models is that the 304 has four bands (19, 25, 31 & 49 meters), while the 308 has eight (as above, plus 13, 16, 41 & 60 meters). Both run on 12 VDC. For further info, write to MFJ Enterprises, Inc.; Box 494; Mississippi State, Mississippi, 39762.

The other letter I received was from Bill Harrington of Trenton, NJ. He passes along a copy of Radio Nederland Receiver Shopping List, which I believe is available free of charge by writing to the station (Box 222; 1200 JG Hilversum; The Netherlands). Here's what they say on SW in the car: "Several listeners have requested we give details of converters for car radios that cover...the SW bands. These are limited in both number and performance. Interference from car ignition systems rules out all but strong signals while driving, and antenna possibilities are limited...Converters that connect up to a conventional car radio, and are tuned on the ordinary set, mean you'll have to 'feel' your way around the dial. This can be difficult for someone with no experience. None have SSB." Included are reviews of two European-made converters, one by Becker, the other by Grundig, which operate on 13, 16, 19, 25, 31, 41, 49, 60, 75 & 90 meter bands; and the publication lists a few car stereo units that cover the 49 meter band, which "are generally sold in central Europe (Holland, Germany, Austria, Switzerland, Belgium) where holiday listening within a 1000 km radius is possible."

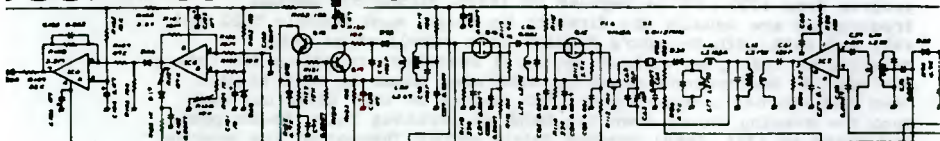
Bill goes on to say that he tried a few times to listen to a portable in the car, but seems to have little luck with that.

But seriously, there are a number of folks in our esteemed hobby who I respect beyond the constraints of my own ego needs.

One such person is our man in Nairobi, DAN ROBINSON.

I was content that this column gave adequate coverage to Sony's new 2010. I even forced back my egotistical urge to go on about it after purchasing my very own 2010. Further, your humble editor even put more distance between himself and the typewriter as he learned all the neat things the 2010 could do. No there were other topics, other radios....

But then, enter one envelope from Kenya and remembering that I feel Dan Robinson can park his typewriter in my column any day of the week.

Dan has had his 2010 just about as long as anyone and his DX skills have subjected it to serious testing on several continents. In other words...This ain't no run of the mill receiver review sports fans!!!

So without further adieu I give you Dan Robinson VOA East Africa Bureau stationary and all.

A REPORT ON RECEPTION FROM EAST AFRICA

Listening to shortwave in a place like Kenya is like reliving 10 years of DXing from the United States. Stations that for years were nothing more than a crackle and fade from Pennsylvania, Washington or California here are on your doorstep. Super-DX actually becomes boring out here, if you can believe that!

In 1974 I had my first experience listening to shortwave from an African location, Swaziland. At the time, I used an SPR-4 to scan the airwaves and was astounded by the variety of stations and strength of signals. I remember marvelling at reception of Indonesian and Asian stations fading in by late afternoon. Such rarities as Ulan Bator in English and Turkey Police Radio (350 watts) also to boomed in down in southern Africa.

For the past two years I've been stationed in Nairobi, Kenya. Technology has changed since '74. The SPR-4 and HQ-180 are still with me, but a SONY 2010 gets the most use these days. Here is a brief survey of a typical afternoon of listening and additional remarks on the performance of SONY's 2010:

By 3 p.m. and often earlier, signals from Asia/Bangladesh/Pakistan gain strength in an East African listening location. Dakha's English program from 1230-1300 is regular on 15525. Strong Sri Lankan frequencies are usually the first to be heard, most notably 5020 and 4902 and 4870, with Colombo's English news excellent on 4940. Malaysia on 4845 goes without saying (I remember struggling for this one back in Washington!) Nepal, on 5005 also booms in, with English news and weather leading up to 1500. Madras on 4920 holds out well into the evening. Going down the band as darkness falls, Medan peaks and fades on 4764. Kabul remains fairly strong throughout the evening on 4740. Urumqi is strong on 4735. Ujung Pandang is strong, albeit of late plagued by RTTY, on 4719.

On 75 meters, AIR Delhi's English news booms in at 1530 on 3905 and 3925. On 4002.6 Padang has news at 1530 and peaks nicely at times. On 90 meters, I experience one of the drawbacks of the SONY's drawbacks -- overloading. Switching to low sensitivity is necessary to avoid mush, yet this also loses you a lot of good threshold sunset DX.

By 6:30 PM Nairobi time, just about nightfall, the regional Africans are booming away. Radio Candip is starting its climb in strength on 3390//5066 with the latter consistently the best. Radio Uganda's 5026, Burundi on 3300, Rwanda on 3330 and Madagascar's consistent 3287 and 5010 are the standouts. Sudan on 5039 is usually marginal, while Tanzania's 5050 and 4785 are local level, as is Djibouti on 4780. Always dominant on 4853, Yemen usually blocks out chances for Palembang on 4856, but sometimes the latter comes through. By 1600, Sarawak on 4835 has chants from the Koran. Just 5 kHz below, Bangkok holds forth. Azad Kashmir Radio/Islamabad on 4790.4 is noted of late. TWR Manzini is a familiar voice for me on 4760, and brings back memories of the day I helped erect the station's first antenna in 1974.

By 1615, 60 meter Indonesians and South Asian are fading. My attention turns to 90 meters. But the 2010 still has to be on low sensitivity, or on high with RF down to avoid overload. A good test of the SONY is Comoros, lately on 3330.7 battling it out with Kigali. Both the SYNC control and USB do fairly well in separating the two. Ultimately, however, Kigali is too strong and too close. Zambia enters at 1615 on 3346, as does Malawi on 3380 and Zimbabwe's 3396 outlet.

Back on 60 meters Chad, at 1615 on 4904 is winning the war with Colombo just 2 Khz. below. Mozambican channels are always strong in Nairobi, with 9618 and 11818 the standouts, along with 4735 and the usual 90 meter frequencies.

Perhaps the most frustrating thing about listening in East Africa is Angola. I recall in Swaziland ten years ago not being able to hear more than a few Angolan regionals (which at the time were using much lower power). Here in Nairobi, this trend continues with East African, Asian and Mideast stations virtually making Angolan reception impossible.

Anyway, if you ever have the opportunity to live overseas or travel for any length of time, a multitude of listening miracles awaits you!

So there you have it. And this comes from a man who actually walked out of our publishing headquarters totally uncorrupted in spite of all our efforts. The man who trusted me with maintaining his HQ180A whilst he was overseas. The man who promised me one of those neat African shirts he wears when he's in the states so people will know he's been to Africa. All kidding aside, Dan is more immersed in our hobby than any ten of us put together. His information on the 2010 feeds into my feeling that the Sony 2010 is one of the most important receivers produced in recent memory. With the holidays coming I am sure more than a few of these rigs are going to show up under the Christmas tree. With this in mind you can bet that down the road we will hear much more about this radio. Maybe even from other lands that we only reach through radio.

May the holiday season bring you joy and peace and good DX

ANARC BBS Update

The ANARC BBS has been on-line since September 1st. At this time there are over 50 registered users and the list contains familiar names such as George Wood and Jonathan Marks.

In response to user feedback some fine tuning has been done, new functions added and a major change is being contemplated. The Miscellaneous bulletin category has been replaced with Club News. In this message base, users can post bulletins about their radio club's activities, meeting schedules, etc. The ANARC BBS now carries Radio Nederland's bulletin, Programme News, which is not available to the general public. Ian McFarland of Radio Canada International has proposed that the ANARC BBS carry RCI's bulletin. This feature will soon be added.

The Up/Download library does not get much use and monopolizes one of the 1541 drives that support the system. In order to make better use of this storage, a major change is being considered. Instead of an Up/Download library, a database of English Language Stations broadcasting to North America is proposed. The database will provide information on: time, frequency, days heard, target area and station location. As a complement to the database, a propagation feature is to be included. This will provide propagation prediction (MUF & LUF), darkness path information, sunrise and sunset times, station bearing, distance and F-hops for stations in the database. An independent propagation feature will be accessible for the user to perform propagation predictions for stations not in the database. Your comments and suggestions on how to make the BBS more useful are solicited.

The ANARC BBS operates in a 300 baud, 8 bit, no parity, full duplex protocol and is accessible to computers with software using that protocol at 1-507-289-7903. Hours of operation are: 0500-2300 UTC weekdays and 0500-1400 UTC weekends. Even if you do not have a password, you can contact the BBS. At the prompt enter your name and instead of a password type 'NEW'. You will be allowed to leave your name, address, phone number and request a 6 character password. Your password will be verified within 48 hours giving full access to the board.

DX-PEDITION, MINNESOTA STYLE

by Ray Niekamp

It's easy to start asking yourself questions when you try to muscle 50 feet of antenna wire through a dense, brushy woods. Questions like, "What in the world am I doing here?" But at least the weatherman was wrong, and the rains never came. Conditions were actually reasonably good for this year's annual fall DX-pedition of the Minnesota DX Club.

Aside from the natural barriers to stringing a straight wire, our setup is one that might be envied by many other DXers who are prone to "rough it" during their excursions. MDXC president Bob Gundersen built a garage to store his sailboat on a lake about 45 miles south of Minneapolis, and when it's DX-pedition time, the boat moves out, and we move in. Bob saw the shortwave possibilities during construction, and as a result, the garage has a shelf along one wall to perch receivers, pass-throughs for antenna wires at convenient intervals along the walls, plenty of grounded electrical outlets, and a wood-burning stove. You can't ask for much more.

Eight members showed up for this year's outing, with a potpurri of equipment from a Panasonic RF-2200 to a Drake R-7, and various antenna tuners, audio filters and tape recorders. Some had definite targets that night, others were content to enjoy much quieter shortwave conditions than are possible in a big city.

There was some decent African DX in the first part of the evening. But while some DXers added new stations to their totals, no one was adding new countries. And things went downhill from there. Some were discouraged and left long before the dawn arrived. Others curled up in sleeping bags on the floor. All that good DX out there was left to me, who stayed at the dials through the night. All that good DX is still out there.

The morning saw the few who hung on pull down antennas and pack up cars in the chilly, foggy first light of day. I wound up sleeping most of the day, and accomplished none of the household chores planned by my wife, who by now was just a bit put out by this whole thing.

Looking back, the DX-pedition was still fun, but there were a few lessons learned. For instance, despite the dense woods, there should still be adequate time and planning to set up a proper antenna. There was enough daylight and a crude ladder to get an aerial high enough, and enough trees to support it in almost any direction on the compass. No excuse for tossing a random wire over the nearest branch. Definite targets would help, too. We stumbled across most of the good stuff, and I'm sure a lot of good listening was missed by not planning our listening time better. But just being out in a new location, enjoying the camaraderie of like-minded people, and hearing a few new ones, makes it all worthwhile. Sure, I'll do it again. Watch out, Burkina!

THE CALCULATING SWL -- III

A very useful SWL listening technique exploits the use of what has been called, somewhat ineptly, 'grey-line' reception. A happier terminological formulation would be either 'twilight' or 'terminator' reception. Whatever the name, it indicates the occurrence of enhanced reception in the band of twilight (which serves to separate night from day -- this is also called the terminator) that happens to extend from the transmitter to the receiver. The term 'grey-line' is unsatisfactory, in the first place, because the word 'grey', though somewhat suggestive, does not accurately indicate the physical phenomenon involved, which both 'twilight' and 'terminator' do very well. In the second place, the word 'line' is downright misleading because twilight is the gradual giving way of day to night, or night to day; the gradualness of this phenomenon is due to the scattering and refracting properties of the atmosphere.

To begin, we must have the following pieces of information: the latitude and longitude of the receiver (laR and loR respectively) and the declination of the sun for the day in question (DEC). By varying the target latitude or longitude we may derive the corresponding target longitude or latitude and so trace the terminator as it extends over the surface of the globe. We will also need laT and loT which are the latitude and longitude respectively of the target point. $Dlon$ is the longitude of the target point as measured from the receiver longitude. Latitudes north of the equator are positive, while southern latitudes are negative. Longitudes west of Greenwich are positive, while those to the east are negative. $Dlon$ is positive if measured to the west and negative if measured to the east. The declination of the sun can be obtained from an ephemeris (nautical or astronomical) or from a standard almanac (such as the 1985 edition of The World Almanac and Book of Facts in which this information, and much else besides, is found on pp. 736 - 747). With this information at our disposal we are ready to essay the first two equations:

$$\begin{aligned} 1) \quad & \cos(T1) = -\tan(laR)\tan(DEC) \\ 2) \quad & \cos(T2) = -\tan(laT)\tan(DEC) \end{aligned}$$

We are now ready to calculate $Dlon$:

$$3) \quad \pm Dlon = T1 \pm T2$$

' $Dlon$ ' is really two numbers found by the successive sum and difference of $T1$ and $T2$. The sign of $Dlon$ is left as is if the receiver is on an evening terminator, but reversed if on a dawn terminator. The intersection of $Dlon$ with laT will give the location of the terminator at that point. Likewise, if we are given laT and DEC , we can vary $Dlon$ to find successive laT -s:

$$4) \quad \tan(laT) = [\cos(\pm Dlon \pm T1)]/\tan(DEC)$$

Warning: when $DEC = 0$, equation 4 becomes undefined. For two reasons this should cause no concern. First, in the real world the declination will almost never happen to be zero unless you happen to have a local sunrise/sunset on an equinox. Even in this unlikely event, all this means is that $Dlon = 0$ and the terminator is coincident with loR and $180^\circ + loR$.

Finally, we might wish to determine if and when a connecting terminator is possible between two locations. The following equation comes to the rescue:

$$\begin{aligned} 5) \quad & \tan(DEC') = [\sin(\pm Dlon)]/[\tan^2(laR) + \tan^2(laT) - 2\tan(laR)\tan(laT)\cos(Dlon)]^{1/2} \\ Sa) \quad & \tan(DEC) = \tan(DEC')\text{sign}(laR - laT) \end{aligned}$$

' DEC ' must not be more than $+23.5^\circ$ nor less than -23.5° for a connecting terminator to exist.

Interestingly, there will be four occasions during a given year on which a terminator will connect a receiver with a possible target point: this is due to symmetry. All declinations occur twice a year, thus producing the same terminator orientation twice a year. Further, a dawn terminator connection at a given declination will be an identical evening terminator at the same declination but of opposite sign; likewise, an evening terminator connection at a given declination will be an identical dawn terminator at the same declination but of opposite sign.

As a longtime listener to the Asians on the lower frequencies in the early morning hours, my notes over the last few months have indicated unusual transmission times for Indonesian stations. The following is a list of the stations most likely to be heard either in the early evenings or mornings NZ Time. Note that Radio Republik Indonesia now 24 hours service.

My observations over recent weeks tend to show that many of the stations shown to signoff at 1600/1700 sometimes extend hours also on Fridays/Saturdays with "Wayang" type programs.

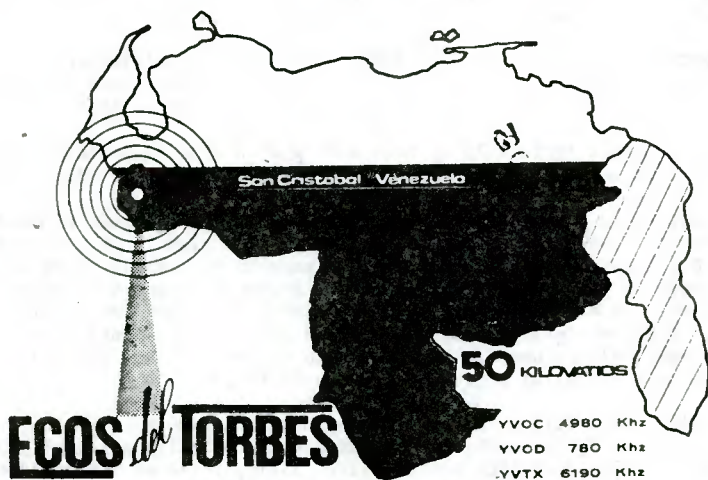

Min-jung-ui Me-ari Bangsong or Echo of the Masses (not Echo of the People as in Oct FRENEX Update). Just a few comments on their pgming: at 1055 s/on w/ Korean folk song "Ari-rang" (not a march tho may sound like one to uninitiated ear). IS is interrupted for ID by M ancr as "Min-jung-ui Me-ari Bangsong Immi-da." 1100 anmt by same ancr saying bc'ing from Seoul on 5885; and "as a voice for the conscience of the people Echo of the Masses is making their best effort to bring together the hope of the people and to disseminate the truth of saving the nation." (xlt'd into EG). Then a song is played, title unk. This is followed by pgm pwv by F ancr, nx by M. Format is actually closer to the South's Korean BC'ing System than the Echo of Hope (or Hui-mang-ui Me-ari). The intonation and delivery of the nx is virtually the same as the KBS anc's. They speak in Korean that is very close to that which is used in SK. S/on anmt is also v'y similar to KBS s/on anmt. Remainder of pgm hrd, before f/out was pre-Korean folk mx and cmtry. Radio Kanak It has taken several months for the Nat'l Libn Front in New Caledonia to counter R Nouméa's bc, but on 24/9 a revly radio commenced opn. Bcs are on FM 96 MHz and the stn is located in the centre of Nouméa on a hill. There is some doubt as to how long stn can remain operating. BCs are from pro-independence Melanesian group, and as stn is in centre of urban area which voted against indep for NC, stn is certain for a troubled future. Stn has been funded by Au Teachers Federation, from NZ church groups and the W German "Green" environmentalists party. R Kanak's future is doubtful as the European owner of the house from which the bcs originate, has had death threats and he wants to sell the house to the NLF for \$70,000, as he is no longer prepared to rent it out to them. Police have been called in following a threat to use dynamite to blow up stn as there is not much sympathy for the Kanak cause. There is constant police surveillance of the house while the militants themselves have a 24h guard on the stn. R Kanak began bc'ing on 24/9, inaugurated by pres of FNLS. Date is significant because 24/9 is the anniv of the day in 1853 when New Caledonia was formally annexed as French territory. First nx on 6325 hrd 0500 6/11, indicating possible start to regular bcng on that channel (WBI 14/11)

Our Radio Ancd in TK 1100 8/11 changes in fqs from 11/11: 05 06 09 10 13 14 17 & 18 on 9585, 21 & 22 on 6200; 1315 & 1745 still on 5915--all Turkish time of UTC+2; experience has shown a similar change is to be expected for companion stn V of the Turkish Communist Party (WBI 14/11)

Radio SPLA Ethiopia, 9600, 17/11 1200-1228: intro anthem, "This is Radio SPLA broadcasting in the 25, 31, and 49 m bands on fqs of 11765, 9600, 9540 and 5945; into nx on summit conf, ended w/"Goodbye everybody" at 1228 (Bob Wilkner & Steve Reinstein, DXSF) Checked 26/11 1200 on 9600 & 5945 and hrd Radio Tashkent on two of its usual fqs, as are, I think the other two. Forced to conclude you have mis-IDed this; R SPLA you previously reported w/EG at 13 on 9600 (gh)

V of Resistance; the Sunday Nation, Nairobi reported in EG 17/11: Mr Kigongo said the NRA [National Resistance Army] stn V of Resistance in Kasese was now opl and people in the 'liberated' zones were now getting info of all kinds. "It is a vehicle of informing and educating the masses of their rights and obligations," he added. Ed note: Mr Kigongo was described earlier in the report as the Chairman of the Nat'l Resistance Council and chief administrator of the area controlled by the Nat'l Resistance Movement. This stn began bcng in March 1983 in EG & various Zimb & Moz natl langs (WBI 31/10)

R Camilo Cienfuegos, 6305, hrd every morn 0845-f/out. Many IDs w/addr in Venez & Spain, pop mx, comtry in SP by M & W (Trummel, FRG, late Oct?)

R Caimán [Cf Nov LN-27] My earlier comments should be clarified: I agree w/gh that R Caimán 9960 & LV del CID 9940 are usually on at the same time; however on one or two occasions CID went off the air a few minutes before Caiman opened and returned after Caiman s/off, which may indicate that one xmtr was disabled & they shared the other one. Up here both stns are usually at equal strength, tho CID often has lower mod. 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NDXE GLOBAL RADIO WILL BROADCAST
TO THE WORLD IN STEREO

OPELIKA, Ala. -- Opelika may not be Alabama's best-known city, but if H. D. Norman, Jr., has his way, it soon will be one of the news and entertainment capitals of the world.

The 34-year-old Alabama native is launching a new worldwide high frequency (H.F.) stereo radio station, NDXE Global Radio, that he hopes will capture listeners from Australia to Zaire, and all countries in between.

NDXE (pronounced "In Dixie") has been several years in the making. Norman, who started as a radio station record librarian at age 8, conceived the idea with his mentor, the late John Herbert Orr, who produced the first U.S.-manufactured magnetic recording tape and the Orrox CMX Video Editor.

As the world's first privately-owned H.F. stereo station, NDXE will offer programming that is totally different from the Voice of America, BBC, Radio Moscow and other government-run shortwave stations. Instead of political rhetoric, NDXE's programs will feature live concerts and sporting events, worldwide phone-in shows, news, international weather, and music by the world's most popular recording artists.

World's First Stereo H.F. Station

"A station like NDXE would have been inconceivable a few years ago because H.F. radio was not nearly as accessible as it is now," Norman said. "With today's inexpensive but sophisticated digital shortwave receivers, you can dial in a station like NDXE as easy as dialing a pushbutton phone, and once we sign-on, we expect many millions of people to be tuning in."

Although H. F. transmissions have not been considered a viable medium for broadcasting "concert hall" quality music, NDXE's super-power 100 kW stereo shortwave transmitter and 100-foot rotatable log periodic antenna will deliver over 3 million watts of power. Broadcasts will be beamed to Europe, the Pacific and the Americas.

International Mass Appeal Format Planned

"We'll be appealing to youngsters and adults with an international mass appeal format," Norman said. "People overseas have the buying power and are eager for the American sound. We're going to try and present American radio in its best form so that the world can learn more about this country."

To appeal to this vast audience, Norman has enlisted the aid of such blue-chip radio professionals as Herb Neu, formerly of Turner broadcasting's CNN Radio Network, and Gene Taylor, former program director and vice-president/general manager at ABC-owned WLS-Radio in Chicago.

Taylor, who programmed WLS' original Top 40 format, is excited at the prospect of designing a format for the world's 735 million English speaking shortwave listeners.

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"There is a tremendous potential audience out there," Taylor said. "Here in the States, millions of shortwave sets are sold. But, that's just the tip of the iceberg. In many countries, short-wave radio is the only game in town. We want to reach that diverse audience with programs that are available nowhere else."

In addition to its exciting sound, NDXE will be one of the few worldwide H. F. stations that accepts paid advertising. Major international advertisers are being sought. The NDXE Sales Department has even invented a new measure of advertising -- the Global Advertising Unit -- which advertisers can use to blanket their message across all continents or target to a specific region. NDXE's research department maintains a detailed database of global demographics to assist advertisers.

"We are now accepting reservations from charter advertisers," Norman said. "From the interest already indicated, it looks like NDXE will be sold out for its sign-on next year."

Station Will Offer Mail Order Service

In addition to international advertisers, NDXE will also operate a massive mail order business (similar to Sears, Roebuck, original owners of WLS Radio, whose call letters stood for "World's Largest Store"). Listeners will be able to write the station or call direct to order the goods they wish -- from blue jeans to refrigerators. The goods will be shipped out through the Port of Mobile, and Norman is looking to acquire or joint venture with an established trading company.

Norman is brimming with hundreds of ideas to attract listeners. Already, NDXE is offering bumper stickers, license plates, coffee

-more-

mugs and other items. Special listener contests and promotions with cash and merchandise prize packages will also be offered. For instance, since shortwave listeners collect colorful postcards (also called "QSL cards") from different stations, NDXE will also offer one. But, its card will be the world's first 3-D holographic QSL. It was designed in conjunction with Mr. Ed Weitzen, Chairman of the International Bank Note Company of New York, and will be available as one of a series of cards.

"There's never been a radio station like NDXE," Norman said. "Since the 1930s, the H. F. spectrum has really not been used as a mass entertainment medium. We think it's a sleeping giant, and we want to provide the spark that revitalizes it. After all, H. F. is the only universal mass entertainment system in place today. TV and print do not have the global capabilities of radio...or the cost effectiveness."

NDXE's transmitters and studios will be located in Opelika, with sales offices in Atlanta and New York City. The projected sign-on date is July 4, 1986, coinciding with the rededication of the Statue of Liberty, and Norman is hoping President Reagan will throw the first switch.
