Howdy folks, we'll soon be having our chance to show just what kind of DXers we weally are, this coming Saturday, Sunday and Monday mornings are those during which time the Radex Mystery DX Contest will take place. It is our hope that the National Radio club will have a large representation in this Contest. For the old timers, it will bring back the fond memories of what it was like to DX before the inception of the DX Clubs and their Courtesy Programs Committee, inasmuch as no one outside of the Sponsors of this contest have any idea which stations will participate in this series of broadcasts. We'd like to see some of our members among the prize winners, so let's all get back of this contest and see if we can't aid Radex in making this the most successful contest of this type that has ever been attempted. In the meanwhile those of you who have not as yet sent in your enterance fees, which are 25%, drop a letter immediately to Radex, Box 5284, Oak Lane Station, Philadelphia, Penna. and we're sure that they will make every effort to get your contest supplies to you on time.

We have received a letter from the Federal Communications Commission during the past week, in which they advised us that there is to be a revision of the Monitoring Schedules of those stations which are required to test monthly for them, and that just as soon as this revision was completed they would send us a list of the revised frequency checks, which we shall in turn pass along to all of our members. We noted the last few days of last week that already quite a few stations were heard on the air, at a time other than the one which had previously been assigned to them. So, just as soon as we receive this list we'll rush this information to you.

Here's some good news which we received during the past week from the Chairman of our Courtesy Programs Committee, Arthur H. Brackbill, he advises us that KGGM, 1230 kcs., Albuquerque, New Mexico has just recently completed the building of their new transmitter and that they are going to broadcast a continuous 52 hour program starting February 24th at 8 P.M., M.S.T. During the course of this broadcast they are going to dedicate to periods to the members of our club, the first will take Feb. 25 from 1:00 to 3:00 A.M., E.S.T. and the second on Feb. 26 from 3:00 to 5:00 A.M., E.S.T. KGGM will be very anxious to receive your reports on this broadcast, inasmuch as this will be their first test program using their new transmitter, so let's all of us, who are successful in hearing these programs be sure to send them a report on them.

Again we are pleased to announce that Bill Stone has secured another very fine DX program for the members of our club, which will take part in that series of broadcasts which he is running this month known as "Canada Promenades". This station is CHWK, 780 kes., Chilliwack, L. C., who will be on the air on Sunday morning, February 28 from 2:00 to 3:00 A.M., E.S.T. The management of this station advise us that they are contemplating running a monthly DX program and that just as soon as anything definite along these lines is reached, they'll notify us accordingly. Bill tells us that CMCD, 950 kcs., Havana, Cuba are on the air each Sunday morning with a DX program between 1:00 and 3:00 A.M. We want to take this opportunity to congratulate Bill on the fine representation of Canadian stations he has secured for this series of broadcasts, we believe this to be the finest line-up of Canadian stations that have

During the last week we experienced varying reception conditions in this particular locality. 20-meter reception has been fine during the evening hours, with South American "hams" pounding through; several noted were YVIAA, Maracaibo; YV5AZ and YV5ABE, Caracas; HK3JA, Bogota; HK4AG, Medellin; HK2RS; VP6YB, Barbados; and PYR-OOl (more about him later). From midnight to morning, 20-meters has been generally poor; on several occasions it was absolutely "dead". On the lower frequencies evening reception has been fair, while early morning reception was fine with Java, Australia, etc., coming through in fine style. Daytime reception between 10 and 22 meters has shown a marked imporvement; SUZ, IUG, GSH, YDC, VVY2, and the other European and South American stations have been heard with very fine signals.

HIX was heard testing on a new frequency of 11960 kc. afternoons around 4 P.M. In addition to sending music, they called CMU in Santiago de Cuba and asked him to report reception to HIX via HIA, a commercial CW station.

A station that caused considerable interest on the 20-meter band was an Amateur using the call PYR-ool "P-Y-R-Zero-Zero-One". He put in a good R9 signal and was in continual contact with one American after another. It developed that he was located at Para, Brazil, and that his peculiar call was a special call assigned to him for the Brazilian DX Contest in which he was participating; his regular call is PYSAD—QRA: P. O. Box 585, Para. Last heard of him he had 115 QSOs to his credit.
