MEMORY LANE

(from a WFAA, Dallas, Texas, verification of the year 1925, from Sid Rosenbaum:
"The Dallas News - The Dallas Journal was the first newspaper in the world to appreciate the possibilities of the radio and in co-operation with the City of Dallas Municipal Station WRR - the second broadcasting station to be established in America. The News became a pioneer in the dissemination of information and entertainment through the use of radio broadcasting.

"Shortly after the installation of WRR and its use by the Dallas News, Station WFAA was installed and brought up to Class B rating - the first Class B station south of St. Louis.

"The code letters WFAA were assigned by the government, but they have been translated by this station to mean "Working For A**DL** Alike." WFAA, 475.9 meters, 630 kilocycles, 750 watts."

"KLFY is currently operating on 1000 watts, 1420, daytime only. We just recently changed our frequency from 1390 to 1420 and our power from 500 to 1000 watts. We are presently installing & testing new equipment & shortly we will start broadcasting at night with 500 w. DA at 1420 kc/s. Present hours are 6AM by special permission of the FCC to sunset (3:45 in August)." He mentioned that his favorite vocalist is Doris Day & about his disk jockey show. She is mine too. This was on a personal letter & also enclosed was a form letter. Johnny Selbeck wrote the personal letter. He is PD of KLFY & form letter from Wm. H. Bland, Jr., CE. Box 367. CJOC Lethbridge, Alta. 1220-5000-cbc letter for 6/17. Here are answers to questions I asked him. 1- We operate with 2 antennas directional array. 2/ The height of our towers are 155'. Distance between the towers 269'. 3/ At night, we operate with phase angle to 58° which gives us a cutoff to the SE for about 15° on our pattern. 4- The antenna is fed by a 1 5/8" nitrogen-filled coaxial cable. 5- Our transmitter is a Canadian Marconi Type PB31 which uses a single 892 in the final amplifier at 9300 volts on our plate. FOREIGN DX DIGEST

Edited by Fred L. Vanvoorhees, Box 132, Lemoyne, Penna. D/L Wed. AM

Thanks again to all of you for the fine response to our first effort two weeks ago. If you keep it up, we will have the finest information on foreign DX in the business. I had hoped to have the contest rules ready this week, but some new thoughts have come up. I'll try to have them ready for next week. In the meantime I hope you are all verifying right and left. There is a lot to say for a lot of DX this week, so let's get right into it.

Most of our DX this week concerns North America, Central America in particular. Sully Sullivan comes up with the scoop of the week in YSEB, San Salvador, El Salvador. Sully hears them on 1070 every evening. Sign-off at 12:28 AM, slogan "La-Voz Central America". He says they identify frequently.

Following my tip last week, Lefty Cooper is also hearing TIFC in San Jose, COSTA RICA well on 995 evenings. He says no verie, but they did for me last season.

Now over to the islands. Lefty reports CMKV, Holguin, CUBA, 600 Kcs east 12:02-12:30 AM. Cadena Azul station. CMBZ is being heard by most of us all night. Lefty also reports the all-nighter on 1010 is CMBQ, Havana, formerly on 1150 Kcs. Hal Williams reports HI3T is good in the east between 10 PM and 1 AM on 1040 Kcs. overriding WHO. Can someone tell me how to get a verie from him.

We have heard from Steve Mann now, and he has much to tell us. In HAITI there will be a new station, 4VYM, 1000 watts, 1200 Kcs, in Port-au-Prince. Address 24 Ruelle Jeanty, Bois-Verna, Port-au-Prince. Owner Yvan Michel. Steve promises to let us know his starting date. In the VIRGIN ISLANDS, WSTA is still the only station on. WIVI has not started construction yet, may never come on. WSTA owner is planning a station at St. Croix to operate in net with WSTA. Will be a 250-watter. In PUERTO RICO two AFRS stations present a challenge. AHD, 790 Kcs., Ramey Field and ACE, 1470 Kcs., Fort Buchanan, San Juan, both sign on at 5 AM. There are three other 10 watters on 1470 which are synchronized with ACE part of the day. Elsewhere in Puerto Rico WKAQ has bought out WIAC and will move to 580-5 KW. Old WIAC owners bought WIBS and will go to 740 Kcs-10 KW. Net result is that WIBS will be deleted and 620 given up by Puerto Rico. WKVM with CB for 25 Kw on 1070 is still on 1230-250 watts but will move next month to new frequency and to San Juan. Note-Get YSEB right away before this move.

Away from the islands and into South America, Steve presents us a new country in BRITISH GUIANA with ZFY opening a BCB outlet with 500 watts on 1230 Kcs. Signs on at 4:45 AM daily including Sunday. His address is 30-32 New North Road, Bourda, Georgetown, British Guiana. Also in South America, Lefty reports good reception from OAX4X in Lima, Peru, on 784 Kcs, running past midnight Sunday mornings. He also says that HJKC, Bogota, COLOMBIA, "Emisora Nuevo Mundo" can be heard behind CMBZ most evenings, but hard to log.

That seems to bring us back to Mexico, where the only report this week is that XESM continues to bang away all night on 1470 Kcs. Len Kruse would like a recent verie signer for them. Anybody help?

And that brings us to the mystery station for the week. Lefty asks who is operating all night on 1150 Kcs. in Spanish. Gives the correct time every minute and plays music. Slogan is "Ondas del Tropico". Is it possibly CMCA, recently moved from 1560 Kcs.?

With this we have finished the DX for the past two weeks. I think we have some darned good stuff here, right up to the minute. Let's keep it up. Looking for possible specials from WXLS-Martinique-ZQI-HRSL- and one from Paraguay. Let us know any you particularly want.

RULES GOVERNING CONTEST

Contest Manager and Reports to him:

1. Carroll Seth, 228 West 22nd Street, Erie, Pennsylvania, will be contest manager and has full jurisdiction of the contest. All entry fees and lists of verifications submitted by contestants must be sent directly to him at the above address in the following form:

Entry Fee:

2. Anyone who is an NRC member in good standing can enter this contest provided an entry fee of 25 cents is paid at the time of entry or not later than Nov. 15th, 1951; with the exception of new members who may enter within 30 days of date of joining the Club.

Period of Contest

3. Verifications eligible for this contest must be for reports of reception of NRC DX Specials ONLY between 12:01 AM October 15, 1951 and 11:59 PM March 31, 1952. The above times will apply to the time zone in which the contestant resides. All loggings must be made from one specific location. The final entry containing the list of veries eligible must be sent to the contest manager bearing a postmark of not later than 11:59 PM April 30, 1952. Later entries cannot be accepted.

Eligible Stations:

4. Special Programs to be eligible for contest points must be of at least thirty (30) minutes duration. They must have been arranged by a member of the CPC of the NRC. A portion of a station's regular program dedicated to the Club shall not be eligible. A station dedicating a program more than once during the contest can be counted only once. All specials dedicated to the NRC, whether Domestic or Foreign, will be eligible.

Scoring:

5. (a) Three (3) points will be allowed for each special verified plus
 (b) Mileage points for Specials. Stations located
 500 to 1000 miles will receive one (1) point
 1001 to 1500 miles will receive two (2) points
 1501 to 2000 miles will receive three (3) points
 Over 2000 miles will receive four (4) points
 (c) Power Bonus Points on all Specials over 500 miles are:
 250 watts or less will receive four (4) points
 251 to 1000 watts will receive three (3) points
 1001 to 5000 watts will receive two (2) points
 All over 5000 watts will receive one (1) point.

Prizes:

6. Prizes will be awarded to the three highest scorers and will be announced at a later date. No one prize will be valued at over \$3. Anyone wishing to donate prizes may do so, if it is line with the Contest Rules.

Announcement of Contest Standings:

7. Standings in the contest will be published in DX News with the first issue of each month, starting with the December 1951 bulletin. The names of the winners will be shown in the June 1952 bulletin.
