"La Voz de Salinas", mostly in SS; always pleasnt to have an SS reply from a U.S. SS station; first report from Hawaii; KFWB-980 Cal., KBRZ-1460 Tex., most distant, KYNG-1420, Ore., first from Hawaii & most distant on RS, though reported from N.Z. on ET, KCMS-1400 Cal., most distant, KSLY-1400 Cal. which appears to be making up its backlog of reports, probably since many have come since it went NSP, KGAL-920 Ore. whose v/s Terry A. Conboy is himself a DXer & quotes QSLs he has, CKDA-1220 B.C., nice v/1, WRR-1310, KFY0-790 Tex., KYNO-1300 Cal., KAWT-1450 Ariz., & a very strange one from KSOX-1240 Tex. At the bottom of my f/up reminder which was returned to me were written the mysterious words "We mailed it back. KSOX." What am I to make of that? I'm afraid I can't count it as a QSL. I got the instructions from IRCA when they tried to get me to join a few months back. I had no idea materials would run me so much, Wire alone will cost \$5! Since my five tube Sylvania is a little outdated I have decided to get a new one. Unless some fantastic suggestion otherwise is made, I'll get a Knight R-100 secondhand for \$59. I think FIT should be used in DX NEWS except in IDXD which should use either GMT or the 24-hour clock ELT. Everyone keep DXing cause the CX are bound to get better. 73s.

In between cathedrals castles & ancient village inns, I tuned the dials of my transistor & the car radio in England, Wales, Eire, North Ireland, & Scotland. Not since the years 1943 -4-5 Have I enjoyed TAs in my backyard! In SE England, daytimers besides the locals include BBC-1088-1457-692-1052-881; Belgium-620-926; Holland-746-1007; France -1403-1376-863. R. Nordsee-1232 is, as you know, severely jammed. Veronica-1562 good signal, isn't. BBC & France both heard on 1484, & Crowborough-1295 is local. NE of London more Dutch, Belgian & some German stations make it days. In the W. the continent is weak (days) but Athlone-566 makes it well, & in the North Wales area, & all the way to Dublin, Manx Radio-1295-1594 is good. Of course in Eire, there are only two frequencies: 566 which is good throughout the island, & in some parts, the only station heard days; & 1250 (Dublin & Cork) which is strong only in those areas. Midway between Dublin & Cork it is interesting to hear these synchronized XRs interfering w/each other. This same type of QRM was also noted in Dublin on 1052k, where low-powered Barnstaple was QRMing the more distant 100kw. Start Point. In North Ireland add BBC-1340, & 809, whose regional IDs are BBC-4 North Ireland, & RBC 4, Scotland. Glasgow/Edinburgh has four locals (1484 1214 809 647). Other daytimers there include Stavenger-1313 & Vigra-629, & several BBCers including 1151. June vacation trip didn't really materialize - we went to the Catskills, to Green Lake, in Athens, Greene County, otherwise known as WCKL-Land. I visited this new 560 direction daytimer & was treated very warmly by Frank Jolley, DJ ("The Round Mound of Sound") who told me their r/c is the Tuesday AM nearest the 15th @ 12:40-lam w/TT for five minutes & then c/w mx, but on RS, they're MoR - a nice station. They are highly directional protecting WFIL & WHYN-560, & WMCA & WSYR-570, beaming N & NE. They don't begin to come in on the car radio until Saugerties, about 12 miles S of them, but they cover well 50 miles to the N! REPORTEDLY IN OPERATION

CANAL ZONE. ACA20, Fort Clayton, is now using its full 10 kw after being on a 1 kw standby transmitter from May to December of 1969; signoff time for the 790 kHz outlet is given as 0458. (BDXC)

ANGOLA. Voz de Angola, Louanda, has replaced its three daily transmissions with a single broadcast from 0500-2300; this effective July 1st. (Editor)

KASHMIR. Jammu on 990 has increased power from 1 kw to 100 kw. (MWN)

PARAGUAY. ZP10, Radio Paraguay, has reportedly been heard this summer on 1305 kHz in Finland; anyone hear any traces of this? (SXDK)

WEST GERMANY. The longwave 1,000 kw transmitter of the VOA at Munich, which has not been in operation since 1963, is now back in regular use on 173 kHz from 1600 to 2200 in Russian. The frequency is the same as that used by Moscow Home Service. In 1963 an agreement was reached between the USA and the USSR. The USA agreed not to use the long wave transmitter at Munich in return for the Soviet Union not jamming the VOA Russian broadcasts. This agreement has apparently been revoked. (ARDXC)

PROJECTED OPERATIONS

SAO TOME. Radio Portugal confirms that a 100 kw transmitter is now being installed to replace the present 10 kw station of the Radio Clube de Sao Tome (now on 759V kHz); the new operation will be officially Emissora Regional de Sao Tome under the direct management of Radio Portugal. (Editor)

MALTA. The projected D. W. relay station will feature a 600 kw MW station; frequency not yet decided. (SCDX)

LIBERIA. Educational broadcasting will be intorduced in the Liberian schools during the second half of the 1970 school year; no further details. (Editor)

ANGOLA. Radio Clube do Huambo, based in Nova Lisboa, has received two new 10 kw transmitters from the U.S. and is scheduled to put them into operation August 1st; frequencies not known at this time. (Editor)

CONGO (KINSHASA). A new MW station is being built at Matadi and will be transmitting shortly. No further details. (Editor)

YUGOSLAVIA. A new 1,000 kw station is supposed to be under construction in Macedonia to carry Skopje Radio programming and will be in operation later in the year. (Editor)

CLANDESTINE / PIRATE STATIONS

INTERNATIONAL WATERS (HOLLAND). Radio Nordsee tested briefly on 1385 kHz but returned to 1232 on June 30th. The British jamming of Nordsee is costing \$1680 per week plus an additional \$1200 for security guards at the jamming stations to guard against possible violence by pirate radio supporters. One of the jamming stations is reportedly a 1,000 kw scatter transmitter formerly used by NATO and operating at much reduced power. Nordsee left the air on July 23rd and resumed operations on the evening of the 24th from a new position off the coast of Holland. The owner of the station admits that the jamming has been effective and that incoming advertising revenue has been substantially reduced since the jamming began. No sign of jamming as of noontime on 7/25. (Ken Brownless)

UNKNOWN LOCATION. Capital Radio began testing on 1115 kHz on July 19th; classical and operetta-type music; no pop music, obviously aimed at an older audience. Address given as P.O. Box 270, Bussum, Holland; asks for 2 IRC's and letters to be addressed to the Cheif Engineer. More tests on July 19-22; supposedly off the Dutch coast. (Ken Brownless)

IRAQ. Baghdad Radio has recently introduced a number of new programs with names such as "The Voice of the Masses", and the "Voice of the Arabian Gulf". The latter is not to be confused with the "Voice of the Gulf", the station Sharja station on 737 and 1250 kHz.

UNITED ARAB REPUBLIC. Press reports this week indicate that the quasiclandestine operations of the Palestine liberation organizations over Egyptian stations had been forced to close because of tension between the Egyptian government and the Liberation organizations over UAR acceptance of the U.S. peace plan.

U.S. to Up Cambo Radio Range

Saigon, July 13—The United States, in another behind-the-scenes move to bolster Cambodia, is preparing to install a powerful new radio transmitter in Phnom Penh to enable the shaky Lon Nol government to compete with Communist broadcasts for support of the people, reliable sources disclosed tonight.

They said the project, financed with U.S. funds, is intended to enable Pinom Penh's now feeble radio core to be heard in the countryside, which is being saturated by Communist transmissions. In addition to local Communist sations, both Peking and Handi have loosted their watinge and tream ney of broadcasts a med at Camoodia.

radio Carrousel, licensed to 660, is still on 655. Power in antenna, up until 7/6 was 1760 watts and is now 2028 watts. Reports can be sent to the above address (Box A-57, Quito) and will be answered by letter. Format is tropical music. 24 hours 7 days.

Ecos de la Montaña is due to go on the air in the next few days, as of this writing (7/10) with 5 kw, on 660. Also 24 hours, 7 days.

Radio Musical in Cuenca on 1140 may also be reported to the above address. Likewise it is NSP with 1 kw.

835 in Quito is Radio Transito and operates 1100-0500 with 350 watts. 1145 here is now Radio Capital and operates irregularly, s/off generally 0400 Z. Power seems about 1 kw. 1545 in Quito is now Radio Aeropuerto with 300 watts through 0130 Z nightly (8.30pm) with instrumental mx.

In Cuenca: (splits only) 985 Radio América is rock with s/off wither 0400 or 0500 Z depending on the night it is. 1005 is Radio Visión with 1.5 kw thru 0400. 1235 is Radio Popular Independiente with 2 kw, and it may run as late as 0700 some nights. All national music on this one. One note: except for Radio Musical-1140, no Cuenca station has a tower...just an inverted "L" hung between a few poles made of wood. 1265 is Ondas Azuayas and runs generally through 0500.

Guayaquil: 540 Tropicana is 10 kw now. Radio Mambo-560 is 10 kw and NSP. Radio Agricultura-605 with 10 kw will soon go on the air. Radio Sucre-693 has been on irregularly of late, power 3 kw. Radio Espectaculo, HCDO2 - 905 on through 0600 nightly with Latin rock, 1 kw. Radio America-1115 is 1 kw and on through 0600 nightly.

Manabi: Radio Visión, Manta is on 650 with 10 kw into a 2 tower DA beamed N-S and is on thru 0400. This one has a great signal in Colombia, for example.

Again, Quito: Radio Cosmopolita has been on about 963 for several months. Power is 600 watts.

By the way...log all your split HC's while you can...they are all going to soon disappear with a new frequency allocation plan presently being studied.

A few other notes... La Voz del Rio Guayas-895 in Guayaquil has been silent for over a year. Cristal-870 is using a 20 kw rig, but running about 8 kw. Suceso-995 is in financial trouble and has had great technical problems lately so get it soon, if not logged. Radio Popular Rocafuerte-1027 is running till 0500 with some U.S. rock in mid-evening spots. Radio Atalaya-675 (this and 1027 are in Guayaquil) with about 4 kw runs till 0600 with tropical music. Radio Paz y Bien, Ambato-1335 is now 3 kw and an irregular sked, mostly with national mx. Canal Manabita-625 with 1 kw, Portoviejo, runs thru 0400 with a misture of all kinds of mx. Radio Noticias, Quito on 785 with 300 watts is on till 0400 with light mx. Quito licenses listed in WHTVH but now defunct are: Radio Colón-1005 (continues on 920), Radio Independiente-1045, Radio Armonicas-1530, Radio Corporacion-1360 and Radio Victoria-1335.

I am still operating: in Quito, Musical-570, Fails Fiesta-590, Canal Tropical on 810 and Ecos de la Montaña-660 - plus 2 FM's - along with Radio Musical, Cuenca-1140, Radio Carrousel, Guayaquil-655 and Radio Musical, Ambato-1480.

HUNTING THE LATINS BY MUSIC

by Ronald F. Schatz

Not too few North Americans, including many DXers, seem to hold the idea that all Latin-American music is the same. But try to find a Florida DXer who will agree; it's not an easy job. Confront him with a station playing a heavy "BOOM-bam-BOOM-bam-BOOM-bam-BOOM...", and he'll probably mention, "Must be a Colombian." All bongos and Spanish lyrics? Music is as much a clue to a country's identity as a verie is proof of reception at least. With relatively little experience a DXer can have a fairly good idea of a station's origin before any word is ever spoken - just by recognizing the "musica". Here is how to identify the principal Latin nations the rithmic way:

CUBA. Several types of music exist here. Some, like the "bolero" and "cha-cha-cha", are well known in North America; while the "decima" and "mozambique" remain obscure outside Cuba herself and, possibly, Miami. Typically Cuban is the orchestra consisting of a chorus of violins and piccolos, and the drummer's metallic "clank-clank-clank". In the gently-rolling sung "bolero" the orchestra fills in the gaps between lyrical phrases with movements of its own, a sure sign of Cuba.

The sound of a single guitar and a wailing "peasant" singing single lines out of tune with long pauses on said guitar between lines is the "decima". The singer thinks up his lines during the pauses. Very often the songs are politically orientated, and "companeroes..." is a popular beginning for the first of the ten (decima) lines.

The "mozambique" sounds like it belongs in Africa. No tune is involved; just the heavy, rapid beating of several drums with an occasional chant of "moh-sahm-BEE-keh". The "mozambique" is post-Castro, and Fidel would like to export it for that reason.

COLOMBIA. Colombian popular music has a heavy beat, like the "BOOM-bam-BOOM-bam-BOOM" of a mallet striking opposite surfaces. A soft "ti-ti-TAT...ti-ti-TAT...ti-ti-TAT" may accompany the main beat. The tune, generally a repetition of a single bar, is provided by brass and especially the clarinet. If the music sounds like a syncopated steam-driven pile driver plus echo, you're likely hearing Colombia.

ECUADOR. Similar to Colombian music, but more primitive and "Indian" in sound. The "si-si-SIT...si-si-SIT...si-si-SIT" of marracas is typical with a single woodwind providing the tune

DOMINICAN REPUBLIC. The "merengue" is the national music of the country. Recognize it by its typical rithm: "brrrrr-rrr 00 m -brrr..." Careful, tho; it's popular elsewhere in the Caribbean as well, especially in Central America.

GUATEMALA. It's the instrument to look for here - the xylophonelike "marimba". The music itself is southern Mexican, as per the popular song "Chiapanecas".

MEXICO. Little explanation is needed here as more North-Americans are familiar with Mexican music. The "ranchero" is often called "Mexican country" and is especially popular in the northern states. A guitar strums waltz-time to tunes like "Cielito Lindo", "Mariachi" is brass and violins with a solo singer; it's as Mexican as tacos. The "Mexican bolero" lacks a noticeable drum beat, and typically sounds like something like "Theme from a Summer Place". The singing is emotional and, at times, downright passionate!

ARGENTINA. There is the "tango", of course. But the more popular music is hard to describe. Let's say it sounds like Russian popular music, but livelier. There is much guitar picking involved. The guitar song "Carnaval" being heard in North America ("Give me another, give me another, give me another kiss...") is Argentine.

VENEZUELA. Angel Falls is in Venezuela, and so is the harp. "Tumbe" music also encompasses the Netherlands Antilles. It's a constant but irregular strumming of a Venezuelan harp with a tune to accompany, Heavenly Latin!

At least half of your L.A. listening will be music, which is not all the same. So if you have to "face the music", let it be the key, not the barrier, to identifying your DX catches.

THE SITUATION ON 1130

WNEW

WNEW was granted a license on 5/19/70 to operate from their new site. They moved to the new location because of highway construction projected by the New Jersey Turnpike Authority. The proposal for new night operation used four towers instead of the two used previously. Only one tower of the 4 is the full half-wave high, the other 3 are just over a quarter-wave tall. The half-wave one is used daytime non-directional, and all four are driven for the night pattern. The original proposal was made in 1966, but the night pattern did not meet the FCC's efficiency requirements. Nobody noticed, however, and it wasn't until the towers were up that it was realized that the system efficiency wasn't going to make it. WNEW appealed to the FCC for an efficiency waiver which was granted and under which they will be permanently operating. The new pattern is very much like the old one as far as coverage and nulls are concerned.

WISN -- WDGY

WISN in Milwaukee proposed an increase to 25 KW night with a new pattern using 12 towers (they use 9 now with their 10 KW night). The FCC accepted WISN's proposal on 8/15/67. WDGY in Minneapolis proposed an increase to 50 KW night with a new pattern. using the same basic 9 tower array they use now with their nighttime 25 KW. The FCC accepted WDGY's proposal on 4/19/67. A. Earl Cullum, Jr. and Associates of Dallas is responsible for both proposals, and they are having problems with them. At last check, WISN's most recent extension was to expire 8/18/70, and WDGY's was to expire 6/17/70. Both patterns have extremely deep nulls, and surrounding structures such as water tanks. power line towers and power lines, etc., are re-radiating energy from the antennas, distorting the patterns. So far, 14 power transmission towers and 3 water tanks in the vicinity of WDGY have been detuned, and they still aren't within specifications. WDGY must have another extension by now, as no license grant has shown up in the Activity Reports from Cooper-Trent. It probably will be awhile before these are licensed for their new operation, and keeping them "in" will be a continuing problem.

Still another area of interest for DX'ers lately is that of "taned veries". This relates to the contention of many Divers, notably among them, your editor, Jerry Conrad, Frank Waldron, Page Taylor etc., that a tage of the reception of a DX station which contains some definite statement of the call or sloran is at least equal in value to a written confirmation from the station. In many cases we know of, stations tend to be automatic verifiers, thereby verifying rultitudes of incorrect reports. For these stations, a tape of reception might indeed be of greater value. Likewise in the case of non-verifiers, or LA's, where one never knows if the station has received his report or f/ups, a tape of the recpetion might well be most valuable. Finally, for the arm sent in favor of the acceptance of taped receptions as a legitimate form of verification is the fact that a tape report merely obtains (sometimes) written confirmation that some kind soul at such-and-such a station has heard the same thing from your tape that you did, which somehow is overwhelmingly impressive. Of course, we must likewise consider that many DX ers cannot afford time, expenses or both to sind for innumerable veries. It is claimed in some quarters that it is more easily possible for the LX'er to fake a tape, or to trade a tape (s) than /r

in the case of cards or I tters. This is, of course, a brules, but there is evilance of Calcified veries in some cases, only it is the ordain of set serious Effect that the individual who faces his veries of his logs is only burting him. If, anyway. Whit wise, way a moons are unable to take reco tions and keep naster tages thereof. For this reason, the advocates of taged veries morely request a recognition of their legitimacy as veries. I personally hope that we will soon reach a level where tages of reception and written veries of reports will be equal in status as veries.

On this subject, there is bound to be considerable discussion both pro and con, so please feel free to cand your own ominions, and we'll discuss them or print them in entirety as space and time parmit.

This leads to another area in finish there has been considerable discussion of late: the idea of a donestic supremacy ratings to supplement the existin; overall ratings. Although I have become comminced during the pratifew years that I am opposed to the entire concent of a "supremacy" listing which makes innumerable unjust comparisons, I do realize that this is the only way that DAM'ers may express in tabulated form, their achievements and process in the hobby.

Thus, I should like to propose that anyone who is sufficiently interested in the establishment of such a listing of domistic EX achievements to volunteer to tabulate such a list on a quarterly basis, should contact me about it. I would suggest a format with one column headed "Overall Logings O Veries", subheaded by "Logged", "Veried", "Taped" and "Total Confirmed" columns, then in alternate lists (thus each type of list would appear twice annually), the same sort of subhead arrangement with regard to "States" and "Provinces".

Analy, any discussion of the points herein expressed is welcomed.

S WE all know to our dismay. there has been a tendency during the past few years for a decided increase in the numbers of allnight stations.

With a few possible exceptions, these twenty-four hour schedules are to be traced to what we term the depression. Stations which had operated at a profit during boom times, or at least earned their investment, have been forced to seek additional revenue elsewhere to combat decreased earnings.

The only solution, they deduced, was to increase their hours of operation. As a result of DX programs and transmitter tests, they realized that a vast audience - motorists, lunch wagons and all-night restaurants, taxidrivers, night clubs, etc.-welcomed music from local and semi-distant stations. After receiving FCC sanction to operate from 18 to 24 hours daily, these stations immediately saw that the early-morning programs could be commercialized.

As a result, we find KTM, XERA, WHN, XEFL, KGFJ, WEDC, WNEW. KFAC, WEXL, FRE, KGGC WJBK and others maintaining schedules most of the night. Forerunners of this aggregation were KTM, KGFJ and WEXL. It is unlikely that there is a DXer in this or adjoining countries who is not seriously affected by at least one of these stations when dialing for distant stations.

This condition is especially hard on the new DNer, since many comparatively easy stations are blocked. Even so, the old-timers who have these stations "in their baskets" are trying to log the new broadcasters and find the respective channels affected by the allnighters.

It is unfortunate that this situation should reach its crest at the very

time when inter-club cooperation has brought DXing to a new era. Consequently, it behooves DNers to make a concentrated move to combat the problem and the National Radio Club has gone on record as urging its members to bring the matter to the attention of the Federal Communications Commission explaining their reaction to blocked channels and asking help in eliminating this condition by a possible segregation of all-night stations on special frequencies.

To complicate matters, there is much to be said in defense of most all-nighters. Mexicans excepted.

Several years ago, I visited a number of small mid-Western stations, one of which was the forerunner of this allnight movement. I asked the manager if it paid to broadcast after midnight, day after day, and he replied, "Definitely, yes!" He went on to point out that a staff of ten persons was existing by virtue of these late programs. If this broadcasting period were taken away from the station, competition

from larger near-by stations would The All-Night put his organization out of business.

A glance at a list of all-night stations will show that all of them are Station Menace in zones, or areas, where competition from larger stations is very keen.

An example of early-morning operation at a profit is that of WHN, which broadcasts from 11:30 PM to 4:30 AM daily. Just to keep this program on the air, it requires twenty-four employees: five clerks, twelve telephone operators, two alternating night managers, two engineers, an account service executive, a master of ceremonies and an all-night elevator operator. Add to this the weekly purchase of 200 new recordings, thirty telephone trunk lines used, and see a total of 182 telegrams and 20,252 phone calls received after midnight during November-and it looks as though these programs may be worth-while after all.

Concentrated complaints by the petition method may force the discontinuance of such a program, but how many listeners would care to be responsible for the loss of employment of all these people, merely because we want to hear another station on the 1010 keys channel?

My personal experience and observations have shown that a number of DXers are inclined to be unreasonable in their demands from stations. They DEMAND verifications, without even enclosing return postage; they DE-MAND that stations sign off for a period so that they can hear another program; they DEMAND the end of all-night broadcasting; in fact, they DEMAND the elimination of anything which interferes with their DXing

If requests were written in a more diplomatic vein, I believe that listeners would find that a majority of the stations would be willing to cooperate in anything within reason. It is my belief that the only solution to the matter lies in a concentrated appeal by the entire DXing fraternity-under the guidance of their radio clubs-to the

all-night stations, requesting that a certain period each week, or each month, be set aside for interferencefree reception of stations on the same channels.

Already several stations have proven their willingness to cooperate in such a manner. WEDC, Chicago, stands by every Tuesday morning; WEXL. Royal Oak, Mich., has stood by for a number of specials, is silent on Sunday mornings and signs off at 04:00 EST weekdays; and WJBK, Detroit, has promised the NNRC to stand by for important specials on 1500 keys. WSMK, Dayton, Ohio, left the air during its former all-night programs for a special NRC dedication, although they stated that they could not be expected to do this regularly, since they were losing revenue while they were off the air.
