Note that applications can be around for many years, especially if a number of returns and reapplications take place, or if the application is designated for a hearing before the FCC and the subsequent string of appeals and re-hearings that might takes place. A sure way to spot a "CP" that really isn't one is the fact that after several years there have been no calls assigned. Calls cannot even be applied for until AFTER a CP has been GRANTED. That is how we generated the above list, checking outstanding "CPs" which had never had call assignments.

LIST OF STANDARD ABBREVIATIONS USED IN AM SWITCH

This should probably become part of the New Member Packet but for those of you who may have joined in the past few years, here are the hidden, secret meanings of those mysterious and baffling abbreviations that have had you missing sleep and talking to inanimate objects:

- XR: abbreviation for transmitter, not the actual cabinet full of tubes and parts but, to the FCC, the geographic location of the transmitter/antenna
- CP: Construction Permit, granted to an applicant to construct a new station or to an existing station to make major changes (change of frequency, power increase, relocation of XR, etc)
- PSA: Pre Sunrise Authority: many stations are permitted to begin their broadcast day at 6:00 AM EST year-round, however, as daytimers, they must use a reduced power for the times that sunrise occurs later than that time they sign on. This power is run from their sign on until their local sunrise. Maximum power for PSA at any station is 500 watts
- PSSA: Post Sunset Authorization: newer than PSA, the PSSAs are the same thing at the other end of the day, certain stations are authorized to operate after sunset, even though they hold a daytime license. Depending on the station it may last from 15 minutes to 2 hours after local sunset with power levels of wide variations, from as much as 500 watts to as little as a few watts. Some stations have 3 or 4 different power levels for their PSSA which change either with time or month
- CH: Critical Hours, the first two hours after sunrise and the last two hours before sunset, a time period when signal propagation is still partially by skywave, an unsettled time for propagation when some stations must reduce power or, in a few cases, change antenna patterns to prevent interference to the dominant station on their frequency during these Critical Hours
- U1 and all the other antenna designations, these are modes of directional antenna use and are all explained in the preface to the NRC Log
- SH Specified hours, stations which operate at less than their licensed hours. There is a wide variety of reasons for Specified Hours, some involve stations which share a common frequency, others may be for a station that doesn't operate on Sunday for example (there are several of these) or a station that operates ONLY on Sunday (there is at least one of these). This does NOT apply to a station that is licensed fulltime but signs off from midnight to 6 or so. If however that same station operated from noon to 6PM, for example, it would require special permission from the FCC in the form of a license in which hours of operation were specified

AND A FEW TERMS USED FREQUENTLY IN AM SWITCH

Changes in antenna system: probably the most commonly granted technical change, it can involve something as simple as replacing a tower or adding some height to support an FM antenna to something as complicated as constructing an entirely new DA system or installing a new ground system. While it really doesn't have a major effect on DXing, we list antenna changes simply to tip off the DXer that this station will be doing some equipment testing required with antenna changes and these frequencies should be watched during the experimental period (midnight to 6 AM local time at station)

- RETURNED** Used in conjunction with the application procedure whether it be for a new station or for technical changes. When the FCC receives an application that is incomplete or with inappropriate lines left blank or whatever, that application is RETURNED so corrections can be made or additional information supplied. This does not in any way mean the application is dead. In fact, the MAJORITY of station applications are returned at least once due to the fact that NOBODY can understand government paperwork and do it right the first time.
- DISMISSED** After an application for new station or changes at existing station has gone through all the stages at the FCC it is either GRANTED or DISMISSED. Granted stations are given the permission to do whatever they requested while those DISMISSED are denied their request. Once an application is dismissed it is, in effect, dead although there certain types of court appeals for rehearing. These are rarely used since the costs of arguing an application before a Federal Court are astronomical. If an appeal fails, the application is said to be DENIED, a term we have to use very infrequently
- CANCELLED** After an application has been granted it can still be cancelled either by request of the grantee or by the FCC. Usually the FCC will cancel a CP after a certain time to complete has expired without the changes being made or the station being built. The grantee may have difficulty locating land for a XR site or may fall into financial troubles and, for whatever reason, decide not to make the change or build the station. He requests the FCC to cancel the CP and it goes to never-never land forever and is removed from the FCC's Radio Database
- LICENSE** Any permission granted by the FCC is in the form of a License to Operate. A CP is NOT a license. A CP is only the permission to begin building or making a major change. In the case of a new station, once the station is built the grantee must apply for and receive PROGRAM AUTHORITY before any programming, regular or test, may be transmitted. Once testing is completed the grantee then may apply for a LICENSE although it is common practice for the FCC to allow regular programming to begin on Program Authority until the actual licence is issued.

Radio station provides horse news

WINCHESTER, Ky. (AP) — Larry Trimmer doesn't expect "Horse Radio" to be in the running for all the listeners in the Bluegrass area. Trimmer and Bud Walters are co-owners of WHRS-AM, a 2,500-watt station that provides news and information aimed primarily at the horse industry.

"We went into this format with our eyes wide open," said Trimmer, the company's general manager and vice president.

"Obviously, we're confident. We know everyone is not going to listen. It's like a foreign language to some. But we have a definite target audience that we cater to and that is the horse industry."

WHRS, a dawn-to-dusk station, went on the air Jan. 6. Its signal pattern covers about 45 miles, blanketing countryside known for rows of white and black fences, fancy horse barns and stately mansions.

The idea for the horse-news format came about three months ago. "It's almost totally occupied my time since then," Trimmer said.

The station offers more than racing results.

"We not only want to give payoffs, but who owns the horses, the horses' records and the breeding," Trimmer said. "That's what the

professional horse person wants to know about a horse race."

Charlie Fox, a licensed trainer and owner, is the station's operations manager and thoroughbred assignment editor. Walt Rains, a harness-racing official at The Red Mile in Lexington, handles the standardbred news.

"Harness has always taken a backseat to thoroughbreds in this area," Rains said. "But the station is going to be half and half in coverage. That's super."

The station has contacts with several area race tracks, and hopes to expand to every track in the country.

A regular programming day at WHRS includes a summary of the previous day's racing along with news and sports in the morning. The afternoon is filled with race results, news and a recap.

"I hope somewhere down the line the station gets the credibility it deserves as being a leader in horse news," said Rains. "I hope people will realize we know what we're talking about."

Trimmer said the station has plans for live calls of races in the coming weeks, and a talk show that will present views from horsemen is also under development.

"That fits in with what we want

to do. The industry doesn't have a forum like that right now," Trimmer said.

Trimmer said that advertisers are "not beating down the door, but it's been positive. We're encouraged."

He said there has been no make-or-buy date set to determine if the station is a success.

"I don't have one in my mind," Trimmer said. "We did research with horse people. We're trying to provide them with what they want to hear."

For this issue of the Formats column, Les Carpenter, of El Toro, CA, has submitted an update for stations in the Wasatch Front area of Utah. For us on the east coast, the Wasatch Front is made up of the Salt Lake City area. Other stations which Les heard on his trip are also included. Of course, we on the East Coast will unfortunately not hear most of these stations (unless we get to Utah), but KSL is still audible. WJJD, plus 1160'ers WCCS and WTVN also show up. WCCS is almost a regular nightly visitor, even with its 250 watts. When the 5000 watt transmitter is installed, I would guess that its farewell to Utah on the Atlantic shoreline.

A new format, religion-influenced, but not necessarily religious programming, has surfaced. KXYC-1400, Provo, and KUTQ-860, Salt Lake City, identify their formats as LDS Music or LDS Contemporary. The programming is designed to appeal to Utahns who are members of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints". The Mormon Faith is the dominant religion in Utah. This programming does not fit the commonly accepted definition of religious or Christian programming - it is closer to adult contemporary programming, but the playlist is developed to appeal to those of the Mormon faith.

KHQN-1480 is a CHR station, which also runs a lot of religion. Owned by the Hare Krishna Sect, the station airs a lot of programming oriented to their beliefs. Here, thanks to Les Carpenter, is Utah radio (with a couple of others thrown in).....

Accepted industry names are given with the least known National Radio Club Domestic Log abbreviations in square brackets.

ALBUM ORIENTED ROCK (AOR) [AOR]: A music format that stresses the most popular cuts from current and past hit rock albums. True album cuts (songs never released on 45's) are rarely played on these stations. Not such hard news coverage. Instead there are features on things of interest to the station's listeners such as news of rock artists and lifestyle coverage. Music is usually played in sweeps with the titles and/or artists often announced at the end. A new emphasis is being placed on personality D.J.'s although most jocks still concentrate on the basics, adding little personal flair. Often visible and promotionally active, especially in major markets. Examples: WSHE 103.3 Fort Lauderdale, WLUP 97.9 Chicago, KBPI 105.9 Denver.

PROGRESSIVE ROCK [PRG]: A variant on AOR, progressive rock stations view their role as purveyors of "art for art's sake." The status of LP's on sales charts is not a criterion in deciding what LP's or cuts to play. Music selection is often left up to the announcer who also has control over the length of the music sets. Sets are often thematic. Progressive stations are usually small, low-powered college stations operated by unpaid volunteers. A few exceptions operate commercially and attract small but loyal audiences. Occasionally called "free form rock" or "acid rock." Example: WHFS 99.1 Annapolis MD, WLIR 92.7 Garden City NY.

CONTEMPORARY HIT RADIO (CHR) [T40]: Formerly called "Top 40" and based on the most popular music of the day regardless of type or style. Songs are selected for mass appeal. Current hits comprise at least 30% of the total music. There has been a recent trend toward CHR's which play 80 to 100% current recordings, i.e., no oldies. Jingles and sweepers are common. Presentation varies from automated-sounding to conversational to screaming extremes depending upon age of the listeners the station wants to attract. The most successful CHR's are promotionally active and highly visible. Examples: WHTZ 100.3 Newark NJ, WBBM-FM 93.1 Chicago, KNBD 97.3 Tacoma WA.

ROCK OLDIES [ROL]: Music which was once a popular hit but is no longer topping the charts dominates the rock oldies station. One school of thought says that 100% of the music played on oldies stations should be oldies, another says that some currents should be allowed. Presentation varies around CHR/AC styles. Examples: WFIL 560 Philadelphia, WCBS-FM 101.1 New York, KYA 93.3 San Francisco.

ADULT CONTEMPORARY (AC) [POP]: The catchall format for adults. Adult contemporary stations can vary more widely in their music selection than any other format and often play selections from country, soul and rock fields. Music is, however, carefully selected to avoid any "rough edges" which might alienate some segment of the audience so AC's tend to be "safe." Some AC's emphasize familiar songs (read oldies) and feature air personalities who are expected to do more than just announce song titles although there is wide variation here. News emphasis varies from heavy to very light. Main target audience is 25-49, secondarily anyone 18+. Examples: WASH 97.1 Washington, KLOK-FM 103.7 San Francisco, WFYR 103.5 Chicago.

Other adult contemporary stations minimize talk and emphasize music. At the most, they broadcast news headlines about once an hour. Example: WNGK 102.9 Philadelphia, KIXI-FM 95.7 Seattle.

Another strain of adult contemporary stations try to appeal to a slightly older audience, age 35 and older, by mixing the music of established adult appeal artists with contemporary music. Example: WKSZ 100.3 Media PA, KIQG 100.3 Los Angeles. The Transtar network's satellite-delivered "Format 41" is a good example.

ADULT STANDARDS [BBD]: Tries to appeal to all adults, generally does better with older listeners. For stations entering this field in the 80's, the currently popular style is to play music mostly from the pre-rock era and/or non-rock music from the rock era, with emphasis on the big bands, swing and ballads. Presentation in this big band style tends to be low

key, sometimes so much so that the station becomes "background." Some light jazz. Example: WAIT 820 Chicago, WNEW 1130 New York, KIXI 880 Seattle.

Another type of adult standards station uses the traditional style of the old-line middle-of-the-road stations. Air personalities have great leeway in deciding how to communicate with their audience and often use the telephone and prerecorded comedy material within their shows. News and information are of great importance. These stations often feature news blocks in drive times and at least five minutes of news every hour. Music selection cuts a wide swath and includes many songs which were never mass hits, soft cover versions of rock songs and occasional surprise songs from other formats which can seem quite out of place. Often called "full service," these stations may also have telephone talk, jazz and classical music programs. Example: WGN 720 Chicago, WMAL 630 Washington, KMPC 710 Los Angeles.

JAZZ [JAZ]: The only thing jazz stations have in common is that they play jazz. Music selection, foregroundedness and presentation style are all over the lot. May be formatically based on progressive rock, but with jazz recordings played instead or may lean toward an adult standards presentation. Examples: KKGO 105.9 Los Angeles, WBGO 88.3 Newark NJ.

EASY LISTENING [EZL, BFL]: Relaxing, unobtrusive, mostly instrumental music, virtually all of which is cover versions of recent pop tunes is the mainstay of the easy listening station. Minimal talk. News varies from zero to some. Formerly called "beautiful music" or "good music." (This is different from and never to be confused with Muzak or other commercial background music services. The background services' purpose is mood control. Easy listening's purpose is the same as that of all commercial radio stations: to get you to listen to the station so you can hear the commercials. There is no other purpose to commercial radio.) Examples: WEAZ 101.1 Philadelphia, WLOO 100.3 Chicago, KBIG 104.3 Los Angeles.

CLASSICAL [CLA]: Basically a fine-arts format based on play of recordings (of any age) of music written by what are often referred to as "the great masters" or those who compose and arrange in a similar style. Concentrates on symphonic or operatic works with many eclectic excursions into other artsy areas. Example: WQXR 1560 New York, WGKA 1190 Atlanta, KING-FM 98.1 Seattle.

URBAN CONTEMPORARY/BLACK [B:SO]: Whether the format (or format name) marketplace has quite straightened itself out on this one is anybody's guess: soul, black, disco and rhythm and blues are all still in some use. The common ground is service to the black community plus an attraction to the general audience. Presentation and music choices vary widely. Usually active in the community although total image may or may not be "full service." Examples: WBLS 107.5 New York, WBMX 102.7 Oak Park IL, KDIA 1310 Oakland CA.

COUNTRY [C&W, CWH]: Formatically based on other adult formats but playing country artists including general pop artists who may cross over into country and vice versa. Once again, presentation can vary from long uninterrupted music sweeps to full service. Sometimes divided up into "traditional country" or "bluegrass" and "modern" or "contemporary country" to fit the era and style of the majority of the music. "Soft country" or "easy country" variants occasionally show up. Examples: WHN 1050 New York, WMAQ 670 Chicago, KLAC 570 Los Angeles.

RELIGIOUS/GOSPEL [REL, GOS]: An adult based format playing some combination of the following: traditional gospel songs, contemporary pop-sounding Christian music and prerecorded preaching programs. The prerecorded programming is usually air time sold to evangelists in blocks and is rarely other than Protestant and usually fundamentalist. Examples: WZZD 990 Philadelphia, WCFL 1000 Chicago, KBLE 1050 Seattle.

NEWS/TALK [NWS, TLK]: An information based format featuring program hosts who discuss particular areas of interest or expertise, sometimes with guests, sometimes with the audience by phone and sometimes with themselves. Often, day-parts are divided among general purpose talk in which the guests are of general interest and "service talk," in which the subjects are specialized and of narrow interest, i.e., gardening shows, vitamin and health shows, pet shows, home handyman shows, etc. Usually a heavy news

commitment, occasionally whole dayparts of nothing but news. Examples: WCAU 1210 Philadelphia, KGO 810 San Francisco.

A variant, all-news, is the quintessential information format. Nothing but the day's news, locally, regionally, nationally and worldwide. Very expensive to operate. Example: WCBS 880 New York, WBBM 780 Chicago, KFNB 980 Los Angeles.

ETHNIC (ETH): A non-format based usually on a combination of time-brokered block sales and local, live talent to serve those groups and/or languages in the coverage area which are too small to support a whole radio station of their own. Virtually always, a full service approach is taken to programming the individual language services. If one language group is big enough, the whole station may be programmed just to it. Examples: WTEL 860 Philadelphia, WCEV 1450 Cicero IL.

SPANISH (SS): An important subset of Ethnic, Spanish language radio stations are a major force in American broadcasting. Truly local, non-time-brokered, full service and profitable Spanish stations are common in major markets. The recent trend is for Spanish stations to break themselves out into separate formats (one format per station) appealing to separate demographics within the Hispanic community just like their English speaking brethren. Examples: WKDM 1380 New York, WIND 560 Chicago, KSKQ 1540 Los Angeles.

COMEDY: A unique full time format and possibly a passing fad, comedy made its debut in 1982. May be based formatically on a full service adult contemporary station with comedy cuts played rather than music. If some of the comedy cuts are music (Weird Al Yankovic springs to mind) all the better for overall entertainment value. Examples: KLAF 1230 Salt Lake City UT, KMDY 850 Los Angeles.

CHILDREN'S PROGRAMMING: Another oddity on AM stations of the eighties, consisting of stories, music, talk and other programming for children under 12, oddly enough the only age group which radio ratings services do not measure. Stations of this format often have service programming for adults as well, which may be on the subject of children. Example: WKOZ 1280 Jacksonville FL.

Radio voices honored

WASHINGTON—Mel Allen, once the Voice of the New York Yankees, and Earl Nightingale, the radio voice of Sky King and host of *Our Changing World*, will receive the 1986 Hall of Fame award from the National Association of Broadcasters.

Nightingale was the voice of flying rancher Sky King from 1950 to 1964 and created a talk show which grew from 15 to 90 minutes. Today, his daily five-minute *Our Changing World* is heard in all 50 states and at least a dozen foreign countries.

Allen did play-by-play broadcasts of the Yankees from 1940 to 1964 and now hosts a syndicated TV show, *This Week in Baseball*.

New AM station on Arlington site plans strong signal

A new AM radio station is tuning up to hit the airwaves from Arlington this year, but it will be more than a community station for the northeast Shelby County town.

WGSF, which will occupy frequency 1210, will cover all of Shelby County and probably spread its signal about 75 miles beyond Arlington, said Wayne Smith, general manager for Arlington Broadcasting Co., the station's license holder.

This week, crews were working on the station's studios along U.S. 70 near Collierville-Arlington Road, while another set of workers laid wire at the station's 190-foot towers about a mile outside the city. Smith said station officials hoped to be on the air by next month, but soft ground around the towers in the Loosa-hatchie River bottoms has prevented some work on that phase since Thanksgiving. Smith said he now hopes to be on the air by mid-April, or early May at the latest.

Memphian Fred Flinn, the broadcast company's owner and president, said the station will have 10,000 watts of power during the day. That will be equal to the daytime signal of WRVR-AM, an adult contemporary station, and stronger than stations such as WHBQ, WRBC and WMC. The power will be cut back to 250 watts at night.

"At night, we'll have to protect a station in Philadelphia, so to the northeast we'll be pulled back," Smith said. "But we'll cover Memphis without any problem."

The new station also will be stereo, only the second AM frequency channel in the county with that capability.

"AM stereo has not really hit the market," Flinn said. "We're hoping that it will take hold and give AM a little more comparability with FM."

Smith said the station will play music as compared to talk radio, and will have on-air personalities instead of being automated.

Asked whether disk jockeys will be hired from local stations or outside the Memphis market, Smith replied: "I've not even started interviewing. Some people have asked about it, and I've told them to send a resume. We'll be looking for experienced people whether from here or other places."

As for format, Smith, who has over 30 years of radio experience from California to northern Michigan, holds his cards close to his radio dial. He and Flinn said they will announce the type music the station will play about a month before they go on the air.

Flinn said station officials have looked at all formats. "AM people are in the mid-30s and up," he said, "and you have to say, 'How are they being underserved?' or 'Is somebody doing something that we could do better?'"

Flinn said paperwork for the station's license began in the 1970s, and the current license was granted by the Federal Communications Commission last February.

"It was just an investment opportunity that came up and looked like something that might do well in the Memphis area," said Flinn, who is a Certified Public Accountant.

Smith said the Arlington location was chosen "because the frequency was available there and Memphis is moving that way."

"Ten years ago, people might have said, 'Why Bartlett or Collierville?'" Smith said.

Smith said the station will seek advertising from throughout the area.

"Since Arlington is not that highly commercial, then the majority probably will come from places other than Arlington."

If there was one major radio story in 1985, it was changing ownership. Several Los Angeles and Orange County stations switched managements and sometimes formats.

Consider:
 Capital Cities Communications Inc. merger with American Broadcasting Companies Inc. for \$3.5 billion.

FCC rules prohibit owning more than one media property in any market, so Cap Cities had to divest itself of KLAC 570 AM and KZLA 93.9 FM, which it had acquired in 1984. ABC said KABC Channel 7 would be retained, so it would have to sell KABC 790 AM and KLOS 95.5 FM. The FCC has granted Cap Cities-ABC an 18-month waiver for KABC and KLOS radio, and there is speculation the waiver may become permanent for KABC.

Cleveland-based Malrite Communications Group's \$43 million purchase of KLAS 570 AM and KZLA 93.9 FM (both county formats) from Cap Cities-ABC.

The \$40 million purchase of Spanish-language stations KTNQ 1020 AM and KLVE 107.5 FM by Rep. Cecil Heftel, D-Hawaii.

Orange County Broadcasting received final FCC approval to construct and operate a new AM radio station in Orange County. When it goes on the air several months from now, it will feature a 24-hour Spanish-language format.

KIEV 870 AM discovered it could carve a successful niche in the talk market by brokering time to talk show hosts who cover such topics as travel, cooking or computers.

The PHASE ONE --
A Delay Line Phasing Unit

Gerry Thomas

In the past few years, I've built and used over a half dozen different phasing units (from Ron Schatz's LSCA to some of Mark Connelly's designs) and have come to appreciate what phasing can and cannot do in the pursuit of DX. If you have never used a phasing unit, I suggest you give one a try -- I can almost guarantee that you'll hear stations you've never heard before. But, this being the imperfect world that it is, phasing has its limitations; there will be times when you want to null an offending station, but you won't be able to. Nonetheless, in my opinion, every serious DX'er should have a phasing unit in his or her shack.

As I stated, I've built several phasers including some designs of my own (e.g., electronic FET schemes, etc.) and have almost always been satisfied but never totally happy. Phasing units based on a tuned L-C circuit have several potential advantages, foremost of which are inexpensive components and potentially improved signal-to-noise ratios. I, however, have usually been driven a little nuts by the array of control knobs to manipulate and by problems like hand capacitance causing phase shifts, etc. Also, to null the splattery sidebands (in addition to the carrier) of an undesired station, you have to spoil the Q of the tuned system, which reduces the signal-to-noise ratio. For the past year or so, I've been tinkering around with a somewhat different approach to phasing and would like to pass along a circuit that I'm not only satisfied with but also almost completely happy with.

Phasing Theory (in brief)

Phasing, in theory, is really very simple -- combine two equal amplitude, antiphase signals and you get...nothing, a null. With a loop and longwire set-up, because the two receiving (figure 8) lobes are 180 degrees out of phase, all you have to do is combine an appropriate signal from the second antenna so that it's antiphase with one of the loop's lobes and you have a cardioid receiving pattern. The tricky part of phasing comes in when you deal with the fact that the two antennas are displaced in space, resulting in a given wavefront arriving at the two antennas at different times. This time difference must be corrected to effect a null. Tuned L-C phasing units attack this problem by slightly de-tuning one of the antennas, causing it to lag behind the other. Because the phase relationship of the two antennas is so critical in obtaining optimal null depth (one degree of antiphase difference reduces null depth by almost 20 dB), things like hand capacitance in a less than optimally designed or constructed unit can make phasing somewhat touchy. But, on the whole, the tuned L-C approach works well.

A Different Approach

Ideally, we could deal with the time of arrival differences between the two antennas by using a continuously variable delay line. Continuously variable delay lines are available and are used in commercial and military applications but they cost big bucks. The circuit described in this article uses a series of fixed delays (to make a band of frequencies "appear" to arrive at two different antennas at the same time), a phase shifter (to continuously vary one of the signals through 360 degrees), a level control (to set the optimal amplitude), and two broadband amplifiers to offset the attenuation of the delay line/phaser. Several circuits/discussions of the use of delay lines to achieve RF phasing have appeared in the radio engineering/amateur radio literature over the years, but the circuit which follows is a modified version of one described by John Webb in the October, 1988 issue of QST (pp. 28-33) that was used to null military jamming signals on the HF frequencies.

Delay Lines

Several companies manufacture encapsulated "lumped constant" delay lines that are used in military and industrial settings and which are suitable for QW/SW phasing. These lines range in price from about \$30 to \$65 on the low end. I purchased an LC3882858A from Allen Avionics (224 East Second St., Mineola, NY 11501) for around \$35. The LC3882858A is a 14 DIP packaged line with a maximum delay of 300 nSecs and an input/output impedance of 50 Ohms. A nice thing about this delay line is that it provides the 300-nSec delay required for optimal QW phasing as well as nine other taps (in 10% increments) to extend the usefulness of the circuit to around 12 MHz for use on the SW bands. Gouser Electronics (1433 Woodside Ave, Santee, CA 92071) recently al-

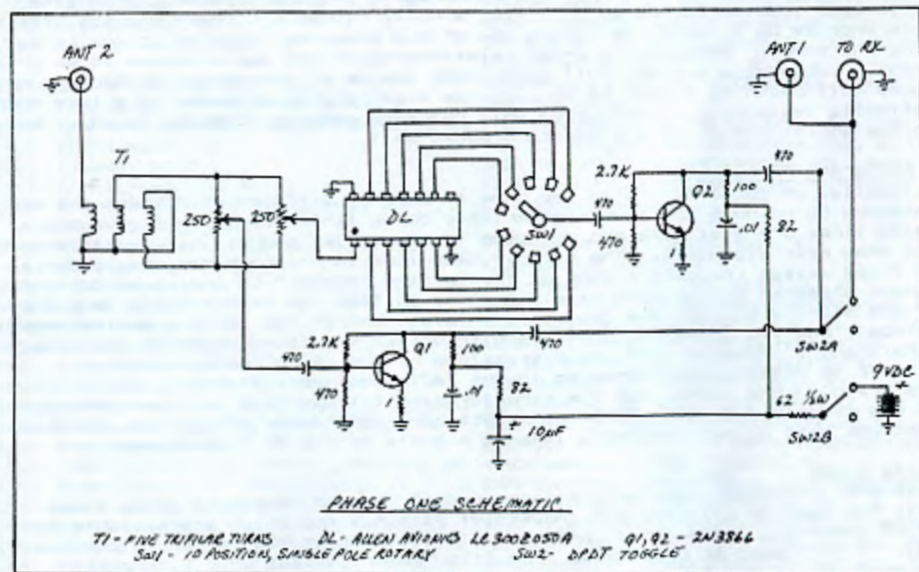
so began carrying delay lines at very attractive prices (about \$5) but the longest delay they offer is 200 nsecs and other specifications (e.g., input/output impedances, attenuation, etc.) are unknown (to me; a spec sheet has been ordered). Perhaps two of the 200-nsec Mouser lines could be cascaded in the described circuit (with suitable component value changes).

Phasing/Amplitude Controls

This portion of the circuit samples relative amounts of in-phase and out-of-phase signals to provide a resultant signal whose phase can be set anywhere between zero and 360 degrees. Relative amplitude is also controlled at this stage. To create this control, the signal from one of the antennas is passed through a broadband transformer with two secondaries -- one in phase, one 180 degrees out of phase. The broadband transformer is wound on an FT-37-67 toroid (Amidon Associates, 12033 Queswega St., No. Hollywood, CA 91607) with 28# wire in a five-turn, trifilar configuration. The outputs of both secondaries are paralleled to two, 250-Ohm linear taper, carbon composition potentiometers whose wipers serve as outputs to the next stage. Finding the required pots can be a problem (and expensive -- mine were \$5 each) but 250 Ohms allows fairly easy fine phasing adjustments. Easier to find 500 Ohm pots can be substituted but adjustment becomes a little touchier. Do not use wirewound pots.

Broadband Amplifiers

To offset the attenuation of the delay/phasing circuitry, two bipolar broadband amps are used. Special bipolar transistors were chosen (instead of FET's) for a couple of reasons. First, the low input impedance (less than 150 Ohms) of the bipolar transistors reduces the probability of amplifying stray RF and, secondly, the chosen transistors are used in CATV amps and have good dynamic range, linearity, and excellent noise figures (better than many FET's). The output of each amp at QW frequencies is 15-20 dB and they are very quiet. I originally used the LT1001A made by TAW but the circuit values listed here are for the easier-to-find 2N3866 (Radio Shack 275-2038). The 100-Ohm output impedances of the two amps are combined to produce an approximate 50-Ohm impedance to the receiver input.



Construction

The circuitry is assembled on a PC board and housed in a metal, shielded cabinet. Signals are inputted and outputted to the Phase One using UHF con-

nectors and RG-58U coax (leads are as short as possible). Power is supplied with 9 VDC wall transformer and a DPDT toggle switches the Phase One in and out of the signal line.

Step-by-step construction details are being foregone in this article for several reasons: (a) apparent displeasure on the part of some readers for lengthy technical articles; (b) experienced tinkerers should have no trouble working directly from the schematic; and (c) the Phase One in kit (with detailed instructions) and assembled form should be available from Radio Plus Electronics in 60-90 days.

Operation

The Phase One has only three principal controls -- delay range, amplitude, and phase. A single setting of the delay range control covers a large range of frequencies (about 1 MHz at QW frequencies), so it is not routinely adjusted while DX'ing the BCN. The amplitude and phase controls interact so alternately adjusting each is required for the deepest null. I've found that simultaneously rotating each locates the general null settings quickly then alternately adjusting each for deepest null works best for me. With practice, optimal nulls rarely take more than 10 - 15 seconds to attain. Once a null has been established, it can be "steered" throughout 360 degrees using the phase control and with only minor adjustments to the amplitude pot. Because the bandwidth of the null in this broadband design is also quite large (depending on the spacing of the antennas, etc.), it is often possible to change receiver frequencies several tens of kHz and retain the same nulling effect. As an example, using the Phase One with a dipole and a longwire, I was trying to receive WUGG-600 (a regular receiver sensitivity/selectivity test station of mine). WUGG-600 is located about 150 miles to the west of me and radiates 1 kW. Reception of WUGG is usually bothered by both WHYD-610, a local splasher, and WOLP-550, a messy rocker. Luckily, because both WHYD and WOLP lay roughly in a straight line to the east of me, a single setting of the Phase One was able to simultaneously null both the 550 and 610 pests, and, at the same time, double the signal from WUGG to the west (due to the summing of the in-phase signals on the opposite side of the null). This was my best ever reception of WUGG. This example represents phasing in general, and broadband phasing in particular, at its best. Phasing has its limitations though. In fact, phasing is definitely not guaranteed to null all undesired stations. It can do very well with single mode, one hop signals but if an offending station is "beating" or fading, this usually indicates either a combination groundwave/skywave arrival or a multi-hop skip. In these cases, a single null will remove one signal but the other will remain. (On the drawing board, incidentally, is a two-stage phaser (the Phase Two) to attempt to deal with this situation... we'll see how it works.)

So far I've used the Phase One with two longwires, a loop and longwire, a loop and dipole, and a longwire and dipole and have had no trouble nulling all of my locals (the strongest is 5 kW WCGA-1370 at six miles) to the noise level. From what I've read, two verticals are the best to phase but I haven't given those a try. Neither have I spent a great deal of time testing the Phase One at frequencies above 1.6 MHz other than to confirm that at least partial nulls (due to the multi-skip nature of SW signals) can be obtained up to about 12 MHz. Much more testing needs to be done at HF frequencies and perhaps some design changes.

A serious Muse (for once) from this pen. It concerns S. 1667/H. R. 3378, the Electronics Communications Privacy Act of 1985, now pending in the U. S. Congress, which would make mobile telephones (primarily) and - perhaps - some other non-broadcast radio communications safe from monitoring by making such monitoring illegal and subject to anti-wiretapping prohibitions. The act does not affect the MW broadcast band, but it may affect aficionados of Craig Healy's "Top End" column, since utilities could conceivably become "forbidden" under the bill, and since some cordless telephone bases still operate up there. I oppose this bill strongly - even though I do not DX the "top end" - on the grounds that it dilutes the concept of the radio spectrum as public property and that it may affect the radio hobby as a whole. Even if the radio hobby community - through clubs or ANARC - manages to keep the damage to a minimum, the door will be open a crack if this bill passes, and I believe that door will widen in the future. After all, once you say that some radio services have a higher standard of privacy than others, the others will certainly clamor for that same higher standard. There is even loose talk of making certain foreign broadcasters off-limits to U. S. ears (think about that one, IDXD fans). I think anyone involved in this hobby ought to be concerned. I sure am. I am taking time (and money) to write to my congressmen, the 7 clubs I belong to, and ANARC regarding this issue. I urge all NRC'ers to consider this bill long and hard and, once you've thought about it, to take appropriate action. I only hope I'm not David taking on Goliath. 73's. (Quoting from your letter in RCMA's Newsletter, "The ends appear to be economic, not constitutional rights-oriented." I think we're going to see more attempts to erode the concepts of the Communications Act of 1934, which designated the airwaves as public property, and I would urge all DX'ers to become familiar with the Act and then to write to their congressmen to urge them to repel any more attempts to take away the our rights guaranteed by the First Amendment -pls)

Bayamo, on 12-14 at 0605. #753, KCGS-AR on 960, the first log on them since coming from 1600. The 500 watts was about as good as the 5 kw on 1600. This was 0650 the same morning. #754 was the KFJM test from 0004-0047c, a fine signal with TT and three ID's, each slightly different. Quick verie return, 8 days, and a good test. #755, WQWY-1000, Robertsdale, AL. On late with day power by 30 minutes, or I probably wouldn't have them in the log. Date 12-19 from 1710 to 1717 power cut. Tuned in on Baldwin Co. News. A call put me in contact with part owner and DJ Gordon Coley. He admitted being late with the power change, which was supposed to be at 1645 C/P. Gordon said WQWY signs off at 1800 CST, but was not sure about the pssa power. Sent report, no reply yet. #756 came on Christmas Eve at 1736c on 810, KBHB, Sturgis, SD. Lulled to think it was WSJC, and it was in at a good level until about 1806c with a lot of Xmas music, KBHB-KRCS ID's. This was a good catch as I had relatives listening as I nulled KQMC, which isn't easy some times. I think the equipment proved itself that evening. Report sent, no reply yet. #757, WHEO-FL, 1040, on 12-26 at 0520c with an oldies format almost identical to KQTO-1050, in Tulsa. Heard them until 0700 fadeout with oldies, 1040 HEO ID's, and Sun Coast and Bay Area weather. Report sent, no reply yet. #758, WISN, on 12-27 at 1611c for about 4 minutes with mentions of Milwaukee, 2 good ID's, into music by Phil Collins, and faded out during the music at 1615. Not enough for a report. #759 was on the same evening at 2050c on 12 v. XEAW, Monterrey, with an ID after music, "equis eh ah doublecoch". My 40th Mexican; I wish my Spanish was up to par. I'm going to get recording capability into this shack this

summer. Also an active whip outdoors on shortwave. #760 came in as the last new catch of 1985 on 12-30 at 0649c on 1040. WJCR 2500 watts, rd, is only about 140 miles from Des Moines; how do they protect them? Per call, KRND-1040, in Perry, OK, will now begin testing after the first of March and to be on regular schedule by the first of April. Pattern to the northwest with a null to the east. This will be a 4-tower array. More next week. 73's, John. (I don't know about WJCR; WHO is a daytime regular in SE Kansas -pls)

Aloha. This season got off to a late start, with Europe heard only in December rather than October for the 1984-5 season. Now, welcome but again late, comes a January opening to the extreme tip of West Africa. Only one identified was unneeded Conakry, Guinea 1404, but unidentified but likely were Dakar-765, Ad-Dakhlah in the former Spanish Sahara, now identified in the WRTM as "Disputed Territory", but the station is operated by Morocco, the occupying power; that's on 999; and Ziguinchor, Senegal, in the Casamance strip where there is (another) separatist movement; the last-named on 1223. All these on 1-14 in the local evening. Conditions to eastern North America are finally looking up, with CKLM-1570 PQ heard on 1-13 for what I consider my best Canadian catch and equal for best North American with WRVA-1140 VA. This on 1-13, and the next night always welcome relog CFRB-1010 and new, much-wanted CHUM-1050 both on. All the East Coast powerhouses like WBZ and WHAM were loud then. A slew of 2nd harmonics of AM'ers from Mexico, Colombia, and points between has been heard in the 2 MHz range, including some simultaneous with the fundamental, e. g., XEJ on both 970 and 1940. XEHL has implemented its change from 1010 to 990, leaving 1010 clear for XEEX Ensenada, whose listed power of 1/0.25 kW seems far too low; more like 10 kW fulltime (I'd guess 5 kW from their signal strength here -pls). The WSJC-810 MA Xmas DX special was a resounding success and verified promptly with a plain but detailed QSL card; I hope the stn will release a full list of reporters, as it could easily have made it to NZ, Alaska, Newfoundland, etc., if DX'ers were listening. Let's have lots more of very carefully selected, planned, and publicized tests like this, and kudos to arranger Chris Baskind. With more tests like this I think that all 50 states, while against the odds, might just be slimly possible here in HI. Weather has been superb here for the past five months, with far less rain than in the same period in 1984-5. Very few rainy days, just some sharp nighttime downpours to keep my water catchment tank, if not full, at least half-filled. There have been few storms; just an annoying week of offshore thunderstorms bringing high static levels in early December. At night I can gaze over the ocean from my lanai and watch the flashing beam of the Cape Kumukahi lighthouse at the most easterly point of HI. Word from the British DX'ers is that they have caught beverage and DXpedition fever and are planning a second DXpedition to Cape Wrath, extreme northwest Scotland, in October. Having logged many Alaskans in 1985, they'll be shooting for Hawaii this year. In spring, a DXpedition to Cornwall, extreme southwest England, and later, one to the Orkney Islands, off northeast Scotland. Having lagged for many years behind Finland, Sweden, and New Zealand, the British DX'ers are now showing what can be done. Aloha.

CKOY IS NOW CIMM, AND BECOMES A WHOLE NEW RADIO STATION.

Many radio listeners trying to tune in to station CKOY at 1310 on the AM Radio dial in the last couple of weeks have been dumbfounded to discover it wasn't there. In its place is something calling itself "W-1310", and it's belting out "Solid Gold" Hits of the Past thirty years instead of CKOY's middle of the road music, sports, and talk shows. CKOY announced it's new format and name change on the air right at the end of 1985, and the station is now officially known as CIMM, and W-1310 unofficially. "It's a whole new radio station. We buried CKOY at 10 to Midnight on New Years Eve," says Gary Aube', the station's new program director. CKOY's former program director, John Ross, is now on the air as the morning news anchor. Aube' says Key Radio Ltd, a division of Maclean-Hunter, owner of CKOY and CIMM and sister station CKBY, has been working on the transition for months, but decided to keep it secret. The station polled Ottawa area residents, aged 25 to 54, to see what they wanted in a radio station. The conclusion was that there's a huge hole in the market for a solid gold format. According to CIMM's program director, they rejected two other options for formats, a traditional country format to compliment CKBY FM's contemporary country, or moving the CKBY country format to the 1310 AM signal and setting up a pop format on FM. The format will feature only songs from 1955 to the present that have been in the top ten or top fifteen on Billboards charts. The station doesn't feel that there's any chance of taking over CFRA and CHEZ FM, the two leading stations. Larry Kelly, CFRA sales manager, said that he's not worried about losing many listeners. According to Kelly, "Their track record at CKOY is inconsistent. They've changed formats a lot. I'm not shaking in my boots." One Ottawa AM station, CJSB, soared in the ratings after radically changing its format in 1984.
