Hunterdon 'tuning' to radio station

By JEAN BRANDES

Hunterdon County residents will be able to tune in the first county-based commercial radio station by next year if a communications firm receives the necessary local approvals.

Charles Hecht, vice president of Hunterdom Mercury Communications, said yesterday he hoped to file the required local applications as soon as possible" to construct the offices, studio and transmitter for WJHR in the Point Breeze section of Kingwood Township.

Hecht and his partner, Delane Lipka, obtained a permit last month from the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) to open the radio station, which will operate at 1040 on the AM dial, he said

The firm will apply for an FCC license once the estimated \$500,000 to \$1 million facility is

constructed, he said, but "we've cleared the largest hurdle."

He said the firm also needs a variance to construct the station on a 48-acre tract it owns in a planned industrial zone. The 5,000-watt station will have five 199-foot towers, he said.

Hecht said Hunterdon is "long overdue" to have its own commercial radio station. Hunterdon Central High School operates a nonprofit FM station at 90.5 on the dial. However, he said, Hunterdon and Hudson are the only counties in the state without commercial stations.

"There are so many things a radio station can do for the county," Hecht said, "for example, landfill hearings, snowstorm and flood warnings, community service announcements and live broadcasts of high school sports."

Hecht described the programming of the mostly music VIA JR FE ROSS

station as "adult contemporary," somewhere between rock 'n' roll and "elevator music."

The station would operate at 5,000 watts during the day and at 1,000 watts at night, he said. The reduction at night is to avoid interference with a Des Moines, Iowa, station, he said.

The station's primary market area will be Hunterdon and Somerset counties, as well as Warren and Mercer counties in New Jersey and Bucks and Northampton counties in Pennsylvania, he said.

The station's signal will reach as far as Philadelphia, Allentown and Mt. Pocono in Pennsylvania and eastward beyond Somerville.

Hecht's application for the construction permit had been on file with the FCC for two years. One radio station, WFAN operating in New York at 1050 AM, filed an objection, voicing concerns over possible interference, he said.

The last song played on the now-defunct WHN was during the final minutes of the Dan Taylor show. It was Ray Price's "For the Good Times." "The song said it all," said Taylor. "It's about two people who break up and it includes the lyric, 'Just be glad we had the time to spend together.'"

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Reagan administration is nudging the broadcast industry toward an AM radio system that transmits in stereo, a development that could help struggling stations survive.

The National Telecommunications and Information Administration said stereo broadcasting can help AM radio stations compete with more popular highfidelity FM stations.

But AM stations have been

slow in moving to stereo. Though the Federal Communications Commission authorized AM stereo in 1982, only about 525 of the nation's nearly 4,900 AM stations are broadcasting in stereo, according to the officials of the two major companies making AM stereo systems.

The problem, NTIA says, involves reluctance on many Broadcasters are cautious about entering the stereo market because they're unsure which of the competing transmission systems to buy. If the government chooses one system over another as an industry standard, a station could be stuck with an investment in the wrong system.

Manufacturers, meanwhile, don't want to make AM stereo receivers in large numbers because they see little consumer demand.



Radio Marti is tainted: ex-employe

Miami, Fla. — A former employe of Radio Marti, a branch of the Voice of America broadcasting exclusively to Cuba, has charged that the organization was using its staff to gather intelligence rather than convey infor-


Hilda Inclan, who said she resigned as the station's Miami bureau chief this month, said last week that she had been "forced to instruct my reporters to do intelligence gathering rather than being

simply reporters."

The \$12-million-a-year Radio
Marti is run by the US Information
Agency, which is the parent agency of the Voice of America. The Spanish-language station, a 24-hour service started by the Reagan adminis-tration in May 1985, directs its broadcasts at Cuba.

Michael McGuire, spokesman for the Voice of America, which under the law is responsible for Radio Marti's programing. "What Inclan says about Radio Marti's intelligence gathering is completely false," he said.

McGuire indicated that what Inclan called "intelligence gathering" was really research about conditions inside Cuba. He said that two of the most successful programs beamed to Cuba, one on AIDS and the other on housing conditions on the island, were the result of both research and MORE reporting.



Incian, who has been a journalist for 20 years, received a performance award from Radio Marti last Janu-

Speaking at a news conference, Inclan said, "Some of the most valuable sources of information available in this country are Cubans who have chosen to leave the island by boat or raft."

Traditionally, the news division of Radio Marti has interviewed these refugees in order to learn of conditions in Cuba. Now, however, this news is being suppressed by the Radio Marti program.

She said that after April she noted that interviews by her reporters with Cuban refugees were not put on the air. When she complained in a letter to Radio Marti's director, Ernesto Betancourt, he replied that some refugees have been shown to be Castro infilirators, she said.

In May, Betancourt, in a letter to Perry Rivind, district director of the

in May, betanours, in a letter to perry Rivkind, district director of the Immigration and Naturalization Ser-vice in Miami, said that "the only person authorized by Radio Marit to interview" newly arrived Cuban ref-ugees was Tony, Rivera, chief of the

station's research operations in Miami.


Jinclas said Rivera was "neither a reporter nor an editor" and that according to Radio Marti's guidelines its Department of Research and Policy, which she said was larger than its news component, was not authorized to conduct interviews for broadcast purposes. McGuire called that statement "irresponsible."



FCC outpost eavesdrops on world

ALLEGAN, Mich. (AP)

when radio pirates began broadcasting rock 'n' roll from a ship
off the East Coast, it wasn't the
Coast Guard but an obscure government monitoring station
hundreds of miles away that
stooped the music.

stopped the music.

The Federal Communications Commission intercepted the pirale radio signal with instruments stored in a building that looks more like a farmhouse in this rural, southwest Michigan town than a center for global eavesdropping.

The rural outpost is one of 13 monitoring stations nationwide where the FCC keeps its ears to the airwayes.

"We monitor the world," says FCC engineer Mike Rhine.

The stations are equipped to check compliance with FCC rules, scanning radio, television, short-wave, microwave and citizens' band frequencies.

The outposts respond to complaints of interference from private citizens, law enforcement officials, pilots, and marine radio operators, said Melvyn Hyman, engineer in charge at the Allegan Such complaints could range from a boater's monopoly of an emergency marine channel to aircraft interfering with some-

body's television signal.

Because of the huge numbers of frequencies and transmissions, the FCC rarely finds violators without first receiving a complaint, Hyman said.

But on the evening of July 23, FCC staffers in Allegan were randomly checking signals when voices turned up on a frequency reserved for teletype transmissions.

"We didn't know who it was, what it was, where it was or what it was doing there." Hyman said. "We took a bearing, asked the other stations to take a bearing and eventually pinpointed it" to a ship anchored off Long Island.

snap anchored off Long Island.

The signal originated from a group of rock 'n' roll aficionados who outfitted a former fishing vessel named Sarah to broadcast

on four different frequencies.

The seafaring station was shut down in a raid by Coast Guard vessels, but a Long Island radio station, WNYG-AM, has announced that it will bring the

airwave pirates to firmer ground and let Radio Newyork International use its facilities for 16

The Allegan eavesdroppers generally cover a 15-state region, but pick up broadcasts from around the world, Hyman said. The 13 FCC stations frequently work together to pinpoint a signal.

When a potentially illegal transmitter can't be located, trucks equipped with receivers are dispatched, often chasing it across several states, Hyman said.

The Allegan station is the national training center for engineers and technicians for the 12 other monitoring stations.

STATION PROFILE - WRTA TALKRADIO - 1240, in Altoona, PA.

When people in Altoona and Blair County want to know answers to questions such as "What are some of the best ways to invest my money?", "How do I go about adopting a child?", and "What are some of the best places to vacation in Florida?", or advice on legal or personal problems, or just interesting conversation, they turn to WRTA, 1240 Radio.

As WRTA moved into the 1980's, station management realized the impact of talk radio in addition to its local news and information, in realizing the objective of being a full service information source to its listeners. Thus on November 28, 1983, WRTAbrought "Talkradio" to Altoona. And on August 10, 1986, the station added "Talknet" after local competitor WVAM dropped it in favor of a full time country music format.

Altoona, a city of 45,000 people, is located in the rolling Allegheny Mountains. It was founded in 1849 during construction of the Pennsylvania Railroad's east - west main line. The P.R.R.'s main maintenance facility, which employed over 6000 people in its heyday, provided the mainstay of the Altoona economy until Conrail moved maintenance operations elsewhere. WRTA served this railroad town for over 41 years.

WRTA began operations on June 12, 1946, through the efforts of its founder, Roy F. Thompson, from whom the call letters derive their meaning... Roy Thompson - Altoona. Mr. Thompson was previously the general manager for local WFBG. The first studios were located in the Penn Furniture Building, on the third floor. After business hours, station employees arrived in the studios via the freight elevator!.

Over the years, Mr. Thompson aired many locally produced programs, along with public affairs and religious programs. He affiliated WRTA with the Mutual Radio Network, and later added ABC and Pittsburgh Pirates Baseball., through the defunct Atlantic Network. In 1951, WRTA carried Paul Harvey's first broadcast. In the early 1950's, WRTA operated a satellite studio in nearby Tyrone, PA. Eventually, WRTA gave up this facility and Mutual to current National Radio Club member Cary Simpson, who put WTRN-1340 on the air on January 12, 1955.

In April, 1956, Mr. Thompson sold his station to three partners; Lou Murray, John Miller, and Martin Malarky. Mr. Murray had been an engineer for CBS radio in the '30's and '40's, engineering many Mercury Theatre broadcasts with Orson Wells, and had founded WPPA - 1360, in his hometown, Pottsville, PA. After he left WPPA, he by chance met Mr. Miller, who owned a dry cleaning business, and who wanted to invest in radio. Mr. Malarky, another Pottsville resident, also joined in the venture.

As the Penn Furniture Company raised the rent in their building, WRTA moved its studio and offices to the Penn Alto Hotel, and the tower from the roof of the structure, plus the transmitter to a site at 13th Avenue and 27th Street. The transmitter, a 1977 CCA, and the backup, a Bauer, are still located there.

The partnership attempted to expand its radio interests with the purchase of WBRE, in Wilkes-Barre, but the deal fell through when Mr. Miller died of a heart attack on the same day as President Kennedy was assassinated in 1963. Miller's estate kept an interest in WRTA, and the group put WMBT-1530 on the air in Shenandoah, PA, in 1964. This station was later sold to the Pottstown Republican.

In the late 1950's Rod Wolf of Ebansburg, present owner of WRTA came on the scene. He had been one of the top announcers for WJAC -850 and TV Channel 6 in Johnstown. He had taken courses in communications at Columbia University, and was in line for a job at WNEW - New York, when he returned home and did the TV choresat WJAC, including anchoring newscasts. He left WJAC to buy into the WRTA partnership, and, as each of the other partners retired, he purchased each of their shares., becoming the sole owner. He also purchase WBEM - 1350, Windbar-Johnstown, another talk-formated station.

In September, 1981, WRTA moved from the basement of the Penn Alto Hotel to new studios at 1417 12th Avenue. On the top of the building is the station's satellite dish, and inside is the control room, focusing on a Collins Rock 10 board with 7 Tapecaster RP 700 model cart machines and one ITC deck. In the two production rooms are an old RCA TV board and a Sparta unit. WRTA was one of the first stations in the country to usetape cartridge machines.

WRTA operates from 5:30 AM to 1:06AM, except on Christmas, New Years, and for any close local elections.

The talk is augmented by adult contemporary music. The station's philosophy is to be a "full service conservative radio station for adults". WRTA prides itself in its local news coverage, and uses a mobile news unit for local stories. WRTA was the first station to win a Sigma Delta Chi Award for Radio Editorials in 1963, and has earned many awards from the Pennsylvania Broadcasters association and the Associated Press.

Summer Ramblings, Part I

As summer ends, it's time to look back on the trips which allowed me to visit some radio facilities, and photograph others. As a result of my annual railroad trip with my 13-year-old son, Kevin, you will be reading five station profiles this winter, including one about a 50 kW clear channel station broadcasting from a model of an anti-bellum mansion, another 50 kW station managed by some of the nicest people anywhere in radio, and the profile about the best-known station in the U.S.A., and two profiles on news-talk stations in Miami. Alas, I could get no information on WRHC-1550, operator of the most unusual antenna system in the country, a four-tower in-line array, a mile out in the coean from Key Biscayne. Both trips added lots of slides for, hopefully, the 1988 NRC Convention's slide show.

Trip I was through the Shenandoah mountains and Williamsburg. On Day 1, we stayed in Gaithersburg, MD, and while the family went to the pool, I discovered in a gulley, surrounded by two hills, the studio building and five towers of WMET-1150, ex-WMTG, WJOK, etc. The studio building is a colonial structure on a knoll overlooking the five towers, which are in a marsh. The station ID's for Washington-Gaithersburg, plays AC music, and talk, including a Saturday night program for singles. Also saw the three towers of WINX-1600, in Rockville, right next to the Metro. WINX is a 24-hour rock outlet, ID ing for Rockville-Washington. Next radio jaunt was to see WRAA-1320, Luray, VA, an automated country music station, with rock on its FM, and fire and brimstone preaching all day on Sunday. The studio and huge AM tower are a half-mile west of the beautiful Luray caverns. We stayed two nights in Harrisonburg, and I grabbed the camera for a mini-tour. WHBC-1360's small studio building and 300-foot tower are in South Harrisburg - the station mixed country and CHR music. Then up to WKCY-1300, in north Harrisonburg, located in an old farmhouse. Studios, a 300-foot tower, and a huge sign featuring the station's logo, a chicken, are all here. This is good country music station. Then to West Harrisonburg, as a thunderstorm started, to see WSVA (Shenandoan Valey)-550's facility, which is in WSVA-TV's building - the three towers are out back, along with the TV tower and satellite dishes. WSVA is the area's full-service station with talk, lots of news, and soft AC music. I have heard and verified all three stations in Fairfield. Next radio jaunt was in Waynesboro. I had a few minutes to go by both stations. First was WAYB-1490, a CHR operation, located in a stately brick building in a campus-like setting just outside of Waynesboro, with the tower in back. This station seems to be the full service outlet for Waynesboro. It broadcasts lots of local information and news, and top-40 music, all presented by lively announcers. Their competition is WANV-970, way out in a cornfield next to the Norfolk-Southern tracks, reached by a long road through the corn, a few miles west of town. WANN's four towers mark the location, but the "No trespassing" signs deter impromptu visits. The station airs satellite country music, SNN news, and its signal covers the Shenandoah Valley. WMBG-740, Williamsburg, is located on the way to the Jamestown Settlement. A small studio building and a very tall tower mark the locaion. The station offers CHR all day. Last station of interest was passed on I-95 near the USMC reservation in Quantico, where one can see the four towers of WFWC-1480, "Top Shot Radio" (honest!), an absolutely delightful country music station. Would love to visit this staion and do a profile - may do so some day. Next Muse will tour Atlanta and Miami. 73!

I listened to NPR over WTTF-Harrisburg, PA, and found it difficult to hear everything with so many voice overs by NPR staff and even the local WTTF when it would ID. NPR would reintroduce each name of the person doing the speaking - while that person was speaking. Does NPR still get government funds?

Dave Baum, who once worked for WIND, is now at WBBM-780 on Newsradio 78. His show airs from 9 pm-12 m M-F and 10 pm-1 am Sunday CLT. In addition to the news, he also does interviews and talk programs ... but no windows, hi.

Plenty of emergency activity over the air. On July 12, WCWO-1190 sounded the EBS tone alert and read a wire from NWS. The National Weather Service reported that a ham radio operator spotted flooding conditions and an alert for flash floods was given while peope in the affected areas were advised to move to higher ground. Just recently while monitoring the Chicago stations during their flood, I was surprised to hear WGN-720 providing almost constant coverage to the flood emergency. I thought WBBM-780 would be on top of it but their reporting was ony a token compared to WGN's.

Caught the simulcast of Radio Taino on both 1040 as well as the usual 1160 on July 20 and 21 in English and Spanish with its powerful 300,000 watts. KSL went off the air several times at the request of the FCC so frequency and power readings could be made of the Cuban stations. During such broadcasts at night, you might want to do a bit of DX'ing in the null of the Cuban at approx. five minutes prior to the hour as this is the time the FCC usually asks the U. S. stations to leave the air as they use RDF to measure the Cuban signals from the various FCC monitoring posts.

LANCASTER — Minutes from the August 12 Zoning Board of Adjustment meeting reveal two issues currently, one issue still awaiting review by town counsel and two requests denied for posting off-premises signs advertising Pinetree Motel in Northumberland

The issue deferred seeks permission for Peter Morton to erect a 90 (oot radio tower closer to the property line than 10 feet. The tower, to service a proposed AM radio station, would be behind the former Whitney Motors building off Main Street

The tower would be a triangular metal structure with a two foot base, tapering to approximately inches at the top. Mr. Morton told the board that the tower must be situated within a 1.2 mile radius from the center of town.

Chairman of the board Paul Thurston did not believe the variance could be granted. The issue will be decided at the August

24 meeting at 7 p.m.
The off-premises signs were requested by John Powell of Pinetree Motel for placement on Route 2 (Bridge Street) and at the Lan-caster Fairgrounds.

Building inspector Don Crane told the board he had denied the request, since he had no authority to grant it. He strongly suggested that the Zoning Board of Adjust-ment not approve the request, and await the new sign ordinance being drafted by a committee addressing the issue.

The motion was denied.

Zoning board of adjustment up in the air on radio tower to sign on air

LANCASTER — July Fourth
will have come and gone before
Peter Morton, the would be Lancaster radio station owner, gets on the air, but it won't be for lack of effort. Things are moving along." he told the Democrat by phone on Friday of last week.

Though he won't achieve his hoped-for early July broadcast date for the station, he is fervent in his desire to get the station on the air by early August. "The permit has passed out of the engi-neering office at the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) and into the legal depart-" he said, adding that it may be the latter part of July before the permit completes the cycle of reviews by the FCC.

"I can't really holler and scream or apply pressure be-cause they can just slip the re-quest in a drawer and lose it for a matter of week," said the Rupert, Vt., resident. "I really can't turn a

screw on construction until I get the license. It just isn't legal." While he is waiting for the permit, Ron Robert of North Country Management is seeing to the necessary planning and zoning board permits for the erection of the transmitting tower. Mr. Morton is planning to occupy space in the former Whit-ney Motors building. The 1,000 watt station would require, at minimum, an 80 foot tower to beam its signal over the 1490 megahertz band into the surrounding communities, with blanket coverage of the towns of Lancaster, Groyeton and Whitefield (thus the call letters

His permit, once approved, will allow for 24-hour operation, though Mr. Morton said he would likely sign off at 10 or 10:30 p.m. He can, however, foresee picking up a satellite feed to offer some programming from normal sign-off time to the early hours.

To strengthen the project, Mr. Morton has signed a partnership agreement with an experienced radio sales person who, he says, would handle the business end of things while he handles the pro-

things while he handles the pro-gramming and radio operations.

So if the combined bureau-cracies don't snarl the permit process residents in the area towns of Lancaster, Groveton and Whitefield may soon awake to the sounds of "Good morning, It's 73 degrees and by a hear in down. degrees and hazy here in down-town Lancaster," on their very own radio station.
