Your First 25 Medium Wave Countries in English ... by Jim Renfrew

The following is a list of twenty five medium wave target countries with at least one widely heard English station that DXers can aim for with some chance of success. This article up-dates a previous NRC article that still appears in our New Member Booklet. The twenty five countries are located in North America, Central America and the Caribbean. Trans—Atlantic and Trans—Pacific stations are not considered here, although many of them broadcast in English as well.

Results will vary according to your location, with DXers on the Atlantic and Gulf Coasts having the best chance at most of these targets. The further north and west the receiver location, the more difficulty you will have. The author has heard only nineteen of the twenty five in 15 years from upstate New York, so be prepared for a lengthy challenge.

The stations listed are all English language, unless otherwise noted. All times are UTC (EST + 5).

The DX season normally lasts from September through April, but auroral conditions are the major factor in receiving broadcasts from the Caribbean and Central America, so do not be disappointed if you can not hear these stations on your first attempts. The easiest way to determine if auroral conditions are in effect is to listen to shortwave time station WWV (2500. 5000, 10000, 15000 and 20000 kHz at 18 minutes past every hour. If the announced "A index" is 15 or higher you should have a reasonable chance at hearing some of the stations listed here.

There were two information sources used in preparing this list: International DX Digest (IDXD) loggings in the National Radio Club's <u>DX News</u> (including excerpts from other clubs' newsletters) and the <u>1991 World Radio Television Handbook</u>. Your own loggings reported to IDXD help keep DXers current with frequency and schedule changes. Because of the constantly changing radio scene, the information presented here is always subject to change without notice.

NORTH AMERICA

(1) ALASKA Not easily heard in the lower 48, and nearly impossible away from the west coast. KYAK 650 (50 kW, 24 hrs), KFQD 750 (50 kW, 24 hrs) are high powered clear-channel stations that are occasionally reported. Unlike most of the other countries listed here, watch for good highlatitude, non-auroral conditions.

- (2) BERMUDA VSB-1 is heard on 1160 (1 kW, 24 hrs), with BBC World Service 1530-1000. Try around sunset.
- (3) CANADA Very easy on many frequencies, except for those living along the southern border of the USA. CFRB-900 (50 kW, 24 hrs), CBK-540/CBL-740/CBM-940/ CBW-970/ CBE-1550 (1000-0610), CKLW-800 (50 kW, 24 hrs), CKXY-1040 (50/25 kW, 24 hrs) and CKWX-1130 (50 kW, 24 hrs) get out especially well. There are many others, of course.

CARIBBEAN

- (4) ANGUILLA The Caribbean Beacon on 1610 (50 kW) and 690 (15 kW) are easily heard with US religious programming. Out of band clear-channel (for the time being) 1610 is easiest. Both may be operating 24 hours. Weaker R. Anguilla 1505 (1 kW, 0930-0210, Su 1600-0210) requires great auroral conditions.
- (5) ANIIGUA & BARBUDA The Voice of America Antiqua relay 1580 (50 kW, 0000-0200) is good at evening s/on with "Yankee Doddle", open carrier beginning around 2350. ZDK 1100 (10 kW, 0900-0504, Sa 0956-0504, Su 1426-0204) is usually heard during late afternoon and early evening, or at morning s/on. Caribbean R. Lighthouse 1165 (10 kW, 0925-0230) is a good "split" with religious programming.
- (6) BAHAMAS ZNS-3 810 (1 kW, 24 hrs) is frequently heard under WGY through-out the evening. ZNS-1 1540 (20 kW, 24 hrs) is higher-powered, but suffers from WPTR, KXEL and CHIN interference.
- (7) BARBADOS CBC 900 (10 kW, 0855-0500) and VD Barbados 790 (20 kW, 0900-0500) are both very difficult due to strong domestic and Mexican interference.
- (8) CAYMAN ISLANDS R. Cayman on 1555 (10 kW, 1100-0400) and weaker 1205 (1 kW, 1100-0400) are frequently heard from evening until sign-off. Sometimes on later than 0400.
- (9) <u>CUBA</u> R. Taino <u>1180</u> (300 kW, 1100-0600) is a powerhouse, with programs for tourists to Cuba. Some program segments are in English. R. Taino has also been heard, at times, on <u>830</u>, <u>1040</u> and 1100 kHz.
- (10) <u>DOMINICA</u> DBS <u>595</u> 10 kW (0930-0230, Su 0955-0230) is heard during auroral conditions. It has been announced that The Voice of

Life (religious) has shifted from 1060 to 740 (10 kW, 0900-0300) but this has not yet been heard in North America.

- (11) <u>GRENADA</u> R. Grenada <u>535</u> (20 kW, 0957-0400, Su 0957-0200) is on a good split, and is reported during auroral conditions.
- (12) HAITI R. 4VEH 1030 (10 kW, 0900~2330) is a US-based evangelical station that broadcasts programs in Spanish and English. The station can be heard at s/on and in the early svening during auroral conditions. Uses "Amazing Grace" as a signature tune. Schedule may be reduced due to high cost of generator fuel.
- (13) JAMAICA There are two networks that operate on multiple frequencies. JBC R. One 700/750 (10 kW, 24 hrs) and RJR 580/720/770 (5/10 kW, 24 hrs) are often heard throughout the night. Listen for reggae music and Caribbean accent English. These are commercial stations.
- (14) MONTSERRAT Stations on 740, 885, and 930 were hard hit by a hurricane a few years ago and have been off the air. Indications are that R. Antilles 930 is working up to 80 kW, and will transmit BBC, VOA, RCI, and Deutsche Welle programs.
- (15) NETHERLANDS ANTILLES Transworld Radio 800 (500 kW) is widely heard, even with strong stations CKLW, CJBQ and XEROK, with North American religious programs in Spanish, Portuguese and English, Daily schedule is 2159-0430, 0659-1258 (later on Sa and Su).
- (16) PUERTO RICO The NRC night pattern book shows that most station patterns are directional away from the continental US. A good prospect is WIAC 740 (10 kW), now that CBL has returned to its former nightly silent period. The WRTH says 0859-0400, til 0600 Fr and Sa. Programs are in Spanish, but full-data English IDs have been heard. WOSO 1030 (10 kW, 24 hrs) is at least partly English, but not often reported in North America. WIVV 1370 (1/5 kW, 0925-0300, Su 1000-0300) has at least some English religious programs, but is obviously very difficult.
- (17) ST. KIITS & NEVIS A good country for splits. Radio Paradise 825 (50 kW, 0900-0400, Sa 0500) is well heard with religious programs. Other possibilities during auroral conditions include Voice of Nevis (or VON) 895 (10 kW) on the island of Nevis and 21Z 555 (20 kW, 1000-0400).

- (18) ST. LUCIA SLBS 660 (10 kW, 0925-0300) has programs in English and Creole, but is not often reported. There is a 1 kW relay listed on 625. R. Caribbean International 840 (20 kW, 0500-1900) is also in English and Creole with pop music and is only possible at sunrise, due to limited schedule, but it may resume late night operations guite soon.
- (19) ST. VINCENT NBC 705 (10 kW, (0930-0300, FrSa 0930-0400, Su 1000-0200) usually requires good auroral conditions to make it through.
- (20) TRINIDAD AND TOBAGO The station is sometimes heard on 730 (20 kW, 24 hrs). Less likely on 610 with 50 kW (0845-0600), reported to have shifted to 620 as of 3/91.
- (21) TURKS AND CAICOS The Atlantic Beacon 1570 (50 kW, 24 hrs) has US-based religious programs, and has been heard on the west coast. Radio Turks and Caicos 1460 (2.5 kW, 1100-0400 0315 Su) is not heard well beyond the east coast.
- (22) <u>US VIRGIN ISLANDS</u> Your best, but very slim, chance is WVWI on 1000 (5/1 kW, 24 hrs, 1000-0400 SaSu). A Florida DXer reported it in 1991.
- (23) VIRGIN ISLANDS (British) ZBVI 780 (10 kW, 1000-0200, Su 1100-0100) is usually reported during early evening hours, before WBBM darkness. Canadian DXers have reported that this one is now on until 0400.

CENTRAL AMERICA

- (24) BELIZE Belize R. One 830 (10 kW, 1100-0600) can be heard with a good signal over MCCO during auroral conditions, often with popular dance music, requests and dedications in the evenings.

 Sometimes has Spanish, but English seems primary. There are Voice of America outlets on 1530 and 1580 (50 kW, 0030-0400, 1200-1430), but these have not been widely reported.
- (25) MEXICO XETRA 690 "Extra" (50 kW, 24 hrs) and XEKAM 750 "Sun Radio Network" (10 kW) broadcast to southern California in English with talk programs. XERF 1570 (250 kW, 24 hrs) has also broadcast rock or gospel in English over the years, and is widely heard coast to coast.

Some of the countries that have medium wave broadcasts in English are very rarely heard, and could not reasonably be a part of a list of English language target countries, but are presented here for completeness, and as a challenge to seasoned DXers!

- (26) COSTA RICA Adventist World Radio, well-known on SW, has a medium wave outlet on 1560 (1 kW, 1100-0400) with English programs 2300-2400, but this has not been reported in North America.
- (27) FALKLAND ISLANDS The most unlikely station you'll ever dream about. FIBS/BFBS 550 10 kW.
- (28) <u>GUANTANAMO BAY</u> US forces on the island of Cuba have an AFRTS station on <u>1340</u> (250 w, 24 hours).
- (29) <u>GUATEMALA</u> Radio Cultural is occasionally heard on <u>730</u> (10 kW (0955-0730 // 3300 and 5955 SW) in Spanish, except for 0300-0430 and Su 2345-0430 in English.
- (30) GUAYANA GBC National Service 560 (10 kW, 0730-0300) and Coastal Service 760 (10 kW, 0800-0200) are rarely reported.
- (31) HONDURAS La Voz Evangelica 1390 (10 kW, 1100-0500) has an English

- program on Monday 0300-0500, not reported in North America.
- (32) PANAMA US forces' Southern Command Network 790 (10 kW, 24 hrs) is obviously quite a challenge from the Canal Zone.
- (33) VENEZUELA R. Nacional has tested a 1000 kW External Service on 1240 during the past year. This transmission was supposed to eventually include English segments, but the tests resulted in many complaints of interference, so it is not certain if or when the station will return to the air.

At odd intervals, DXers have also reported English IDs over stations in Colombia, Brazil and other Latin American countries, but these are unpredictable and rare.

As you work on this list you will undoubtably become acquainted with the many Caribbean, Central and South American stations that broadcast in Spanish, French, Creole, Patois, Papiamento, and Portuguese. Some limited knowledge of these languages is helpful in identifying non-English stations, but not essential if you keep your ears open for geographical names and station slogans. The World Radio TV Handbook often supplies identification phrases in its listings.

What Counts as a Country? ... by Jim Renfrew

. In light of world events, I wrote to DX News Editor Paul Swearingen about the need to discuss the criteria used for Medium Wave "country counting" in DX News. What constitutes a DX "country"? What happens when the name of a country or its border changes? Paul suggested that I write a short piece for DX News on the subject.

Let me offer an important disclaimer at the outset. DXing is for fun and a a personal sense of accomplishment. If it becomes an overly competitive, legalistic venture then something very important is lost. My comments are to help each DXer determine a satisfying method for counting countries.

The only NRC determination on these questions that I can find is an old NRC mimeo reprint, dated December 1968, with these "Criteria for Definition of Valid Countries" at the head of a list of 241 countries:

- (A) Sovereign and independent countries,
- (B) Colonies and dependencies,
- (C) Loosely federated countries, e.g., Republics of the USSR and divisions of the United Kingdom,
- (D) Geographical divisions separated by more than 50 miles from the parent country, with the singular exception of Kauai Is. (Hawaii),
- (E) Continental boundaries also function as country boundaries,
- (F) Only countries which have operated MW stations are valid
- (G) Changes of political status or name do not produce new countries unless there is an alteration in boundary.

You will quickly conclude, as I have, that even a brief discussion of these criteria can turn into a debate over international sovereignty and law! The NRC's 1968 criteria are just one of several (or more) ways of determining what a "country" is for DX purposes.

The Amateur Radio Relay League (ARRL) only counts "countries" that currently exist (although a large number of territories and islands are considered "countries" due to water separation of at least 225 miles from the

"parent" country; or because two national regions are at least 75 miles apart because of an intervening country's territory). If you heard Newfoundland as an independent country in the 1940s - too bad -- it only counts as Canada today. The ARRL list shows 324 countries, the large number explained by the amateur operations that are temporarily established on otherwise uninhabited islands (or low-tide coral reefs!).

The North American Shortwave Association (NASWA) counts countries that may no longer exist, but that did exist for even a short time since 1945. This method of determining a "country" allows a person who hears a station from the city of Enugu to count it as Biafra (a rebellious region that unsuccessfully sought independence from Nigeria), even though that country no longer exists, so as not to give a DXer who was around at that time an unfair advantage over a newcomer. Such an extended country list also gives a wider variety of targets to aim for. NASWA has 231 countries on its 1981 list, although at least several more have been added since then. No statement is made in the criteria concerning the exact distance of water separation necessary for determining a "country" although such water separation is clearly a factor.

What consitutes a sovereign nation (criteria "A") in a world that continues to feel the stress of regional, separatist, and nationalist tenderries? Is sovereignty self-determined, or does it require international recognition? And would that international recognition need to be widespread or would the recognition of just one other country suffice? Would a country need to be in correspondence with the ITU or are postage stamps and coinage an important factor? To accept United Nations membership as the sole criteria would leave out many colonies and dependencies.

Here are only a few complex sovereignty situations:

- Is the occupied West Bank considered to be Israel, Jordon, or Palestine?
- 2. Should Kuwait count as Iraq between August, 1990 and March, 1991?
- 3. Are the "homelands" established by South Africa truly independent states or a sham to bolster apartheid?
- Native reservations in the USA sometimes declare their sovereignty (citing signed treaties with the US Government) and issue license plates, passports, etc.

What consitutes a "loosely federated" country (criteria "C")? Soviet republics that have declared independence in recent weeks were considered autonomous enough to fit this criteria back in 1968! Two of the six Yugoslav republics have declared their independence, apparently fitting this criteria. Had the Meach Lake Accord met with approval in Canada, would Quebec be considered a separate DX country? Czechoslovakia, under its new government, allows for more autonomy to Slovakia – would this count as a "country" now? "Loosely federated" is a loose criteria indeed!

The NRC's 50 mile criteria is an arbitrary guideline (criteria "D"). It does, of course, allow for non-contiguous territories like Hawaii, Alaska, Crete, Sardinia, Sicily and Corsica to be considered as separate countries, but Nantucket, Vieques and Santa Catalina don't get counted. Why 50 miles? Why not 25 miles or 100 miles or 500 miles?

What about those contemporary situations involving changing borders (criteria "G")? Consider the changes with Germany: In 1990 the German Democratic Republic was absorbed into the Federal Republic of Germany. West Berlin was also a separate radio country, by the 50 mile rule. So, in one move, three DX countries have become one ... or have they?

- ARRL: According to a recent statement in <u>QST</u> (April, 1991), the German Democratic Republic no longer counts as a separate country, as of 10/3/90. The only countable country is now the Federal Republic of Germany. (West Berlin was within 75 miles of West Germany, so was not counted as a separate country).
- NASWA: Your receptions of West Germany, East Germany and West Berlin
 would continue to count as three countries. Future receptions of
 stations located in the former territory of the GDR or West Berlin
 would count as separate countries as well.
- 3. NRC: Criteria "G" is confusing. The new Germany goes by the old name of the Federal Republic of Germany, but has new borders. Does this mean NRCers can count 2 Federal Republics, one pre-1990 and the other post-1990?

What to do? How shall we count DX countries? Here are some options:

- (1) Keep the 1968 list and criteria as is (with the addition of countries with newly established MW operations). Rationale: it's what we've been
- (2) Adopt another club's criteria, e.g., NASWA, ARRL, or some other list. Rationals: We want to be open to the development of a "hobby-wide" country-counting standard. The Ontario DX Association, for example, uses the NASWA list as its own. As a matter of fact, I have chosen to use the NASWA list for MW and SW so as to be able to compare my totals.
 - (a) One list might result in the counting of countries that no longer exist. Rationale: Shouldn't a current DXer have a chance at former countries that she or he missed by not being alive at the time? Isn't a longer list of countries more enjoyable to the DXer?
 - (b) Another list might only count countries as currently constituted (country totals would change as political boundaries change). Rationale: we don't want to count non-existant or fictional countries.

We might appoint an NRC committee to review these questions towards determination of an up-to-date policy. At the very least, we could review the status of countries on the NRC list. Yet, after giving it some thought, I'm not sure that we should take the time and effort to rewrite the criteria. It's always been hard for the club to achieve concensus on questions about call letter and frequency changes, tapes vs. QSLs, transmitter site vs. city of license, etc. And even if the NRC adopts an official list, each one of us will probably go on doing what we've been doing anyhow! Why not let each DXer determine her or his own method? There are no trophies to be won, or honors bestowed in the NRC: The point is to have fun with some personally challenging goals.

One final question: What range of frequencies are allowed for MW country counters? I believ≡ that 530 - 1610 kilohertz is the usual standard, but this may need to change with the planned expansion up to 1700 kHz. Do aeronautical and marine beacons, pirate operations, or TIS/TAS stations within this range count toward country totals? If they do, would they count as of the date of band expansion, or retroactively?

Tight credit, ad slump mean stations go for bargain prices

Five years ago, a Pennsylvania publishing company surprised Toledo radio circles when it plunked down \$15 million to acquire WSPD-AM and sister station WLQR-FM.

Reality arrived late last month and hit Commonwealth Communications Services, Inc., of Harrisburg, right in the pocket book.

The company agreed to sell the two stations for \$4 million to Toledo-based Stratford Research. The deal must be approved by the Federal Communications Commission.

What appears to be quite a bargain for Stratford - it's shelling out slightly more than what the stations sold for 12 years ago - is actually part of a national sales trend. Tight credit and slumping ad revenues mean radio stations aren't fetching the prices they once did.

In this case, the price dive can be partly attributed to Commonwealth's ill-conceived acquisition in

1986. "We took a bath," acknowledged David Detweller, president of the family-owned Commonwealth, who came on board after the deal. "We paid too much for it when we bought it and we're selling it at a bargain."
His words are the slogan of com-

panies that jumped into the station-buying frenzy of the late 1980s, only to have values burst as credit tightened and revenue forecasts soured

In 1990, total dollar volume of station sales - including television - slumped 39 per cent, plunging

from \$3.24 billion in 1989 to \$1.98 billion, according to Broadcasting magazine

Average sale prices also nose-dived. Although FM stations posted a slight 2 per cent average increase, AM stations plummeted 52 per cent, and AM-FM combos - when two stations in the same market were sold together - slipped 21 per cent, according to the magazine.

The collapse of station values followed boom years in the mid- and late-'80s, when prices jumped as investors scrambled to buy up broadcasting outlets - which were widely thought to be undervalued in highly leveraged deals.

Amid the frenzy, Commonwealth bought WSPD (1370 AM) and WLOR (101.5 FM) in 1986. Two years later, another big-money deal was struck involving a Toledo station when

was sold to San Diego-based Noble Broadcasting Group for a

whopping \$19 million.

Noble remains one of two national chains with deep pockets in Tole-do radio. The other is Booth American Co., which owns WTOD-AM (1560) and WKKO-FM (99.9).

Other station owners are regionally based, such as Reams Broadcasting, which owns WIOT-FM (104.7) and WCWA-AM (1230) in To-

"Too many broadcasters took the easy way out," said Lew Dickey, Jr., president of Stratford Research, a

Although broadcasting is struggling, Mr. Dickey - as a prospective radio station owner - remains predictably upbeat about prospects for the local market.

He believes Toledo is "under-radioed," and that there's room for about an additional \$5 million in Broadcasting inqustry veterans gross market revenue from Toledo's




