FEDERAL COMMUNICATIONS COMMISSION ACTION IN DOCKET CASE

REDUCTION IN LENGTH OF EBS "TWO-TONE" SIGNAL PROPOSED

The FCC has proposed amending its rules to reduce the length of the Emergency Broadcast System (EES) two-tone attention signal to a minimum of eight seconds and a maximum of 25 seconds.

The amendment would also reduce the time delay incorporated into the demuting process to a minimum three seconds and a maximum of four to 22 seconds. Additionally, the FCC has proposed adding a new rule section prohibiting broadcast stations from any transmission of the EBS attention signal tone, the broadcast of any recording of the attention signal, or the transmission of any other simulation

siting the Rush Lim-baugh Show is like returning to your sixthgrade class at the very moment the teacher has left the room and the class ham has taken over.

He wears a tie splashed with more color than a 24pack of Cravolas.

A typical Limbaugh minute unfolds: He croons along with the bluesy theme that opens the show, pounds the console four times to make a point, breaks into a squeaky voice, rattles newspaper clip pings at the microphone, and spins his hand in more directions than a bartender on a busy night. At 5-feet-11 and 310 pounds, looking more boyish than he sounds, the man springs in hundreds of directions

Including across the country - 440 affiliates partake of this news-talk chaos, Monday through Friday, 8 million listeners who love and hate Limbaugh tune in - nearly as many as the combined audience of radio legends Bruce Williams and Larry King (5 million and 3.5 million, respectively).

What exactly is: a Rush Limbaugh?

The name itself is no fabrication. He is the third Rush in a long line of Limbaughs.

Tune in locally to WABC, (770-AM), from noon till 3 p.m. and you'll hear the 40year-old right-winger bombard his favorite liberal targets. "Femi-Nazis" (militant NOW members), "commiepinko libs," "pencil-neck geeks" and "environmental wackos" (ecology activists) are among those he subjects to musical spoofs, biting sound effects, and news updates, all with a satirical conservative bent.

Limbaugh is unique among the right-wing talkers: Polite to those who lean to the left. he goes out of his way to show them how to escape their troubled existence. And he is imagine this — a conservative with a sense of humor. He tweaks the liberals: they call nim racist-sexist-insensi-

tive; ratings rise.
Unlike most radio talkers. he cruises along without guests, and, in fact, very few

callers. With news clips spread before him, Limbaugh takes off

"This is not a show where we care to find out what America thinks. This is a show about what I think, what I'm interested in," he says. Daily he'll remind listeners that he has talent "on loan from God "

Is this guy kidding? Well, yes. No. Maybe. Says Limbaugh, "I'm just

trying to provide spontaneous and unpredictable entertainment every day on the radio. Here's a show that skewers the liberal sacred cows and stands up for the traditions and institutions that have made this country great. This show is filling a political void."

As the radio program soars, Limbaugh has taken his show on the road on weekends and has created an industry unto himself. The "Rush to Excellence" tours, as they're called, are likewise a rush to the bank. With about 45 personal appearances this year in cities where his show is heard, Limbaugh earns an additional \$350,000 or so, not to mention the sums from Tshirts, mugs, bumper stick-

ers, caps and videotapes. Also in the works is a book for Simon and Schuster called "The Way Things Oughi to Be" and coming up in 1992 is a half-hour, late-night television talk show. Republican media mogul Roger Ailes is co-producer.


And tuning his pocket, too. Clearly, Limbaugh has come a long way since his first deejay job at 16 in his hometown, Cape Girardeau, Mo.

Limbaugh is many things to different people. Lynn Samuels, a liberal yakker at WABC says, "I think that everything he says is off the wall. But I love Rush. He's just very sweet. Though he's not going to like that I'm saying this, I think he's very insecure. (Perhaps so, considering that his staff insisted on screening

this reporter.) All in all, he's a character's character. And he knows how to make radio work.

B urdened with fossilized formats and overshadowed by FM's vibrancy, AM radio is struggling for a future.

iddled around the AM radio band late ly? There's a prayer ine, mucho Espano Ferrante & Teicher (remember them?) and Johnny Mathis (remember him?). And then there's Rush Limbaugh.

baseball games, tips for better azaleas, advice on defleaing Harold the hound, and seven ways

to season beef stew But wait, there's more.

Need a low-interest real estate loan or the lowdown on rose hips? How about the untold secrets of troi fishing and medical advice on dealing with hemorrhoids, impotence and overactive sweat glands?

Today's AM radio, which was ves terday's sanctuary of Top 40 music, now delivers news and information, plus a few music formats that stubbornly refuse to go quietly into the onosphere

"The only formats that seem to make it on AM today are Spanish, news-talk and religious," said Jamie Clark, general manager of Christiantalk KFIA (710 AM) and Christianadult contemporary Q102 (KLIQ

The bad news for AM radio is that there's a generation of young listeners out there who have no intention of ever switching from their beloved FM stereo stations. Some of the walk-around radios don't even have suspicion that some younger listeners aren't aware that AM exists.

"Sometimes I wonder if my kids even know what their dad does," said Mike Cleary of KNBR's (680 AM) morning show.

There isn't much AM radio good news to report, except the occasional ratings boost that news-talk stations get during major news periods like the Persian Gulf War. In those cases the FM station program directors point to a "skewed" book and predict a rapid return to normalcy where listeners scurry back to superior sound quality.

"AM was reporting the news while the FM jocks were still playing 'Guns n' Roses,' " said Brent Paris, general manager for KPLA (770 AM), which has a "lifestyle" format and 50,000 watts licensed in Riverbank "That shows listeners still know where to go when something is happening."

FM radio has done to AM radio what the compact disc has done to vinyl albums. The FM stereo music formats have flourished since the late-1970s and steadily eroded the inferior-sounding music formats on the AM. Two developments in the 1960s - the Federal Communications Commission granting FM stereo capability and antenna rule changes that improved signals and allowed better car radio reception enabled FM to begin its push past

Before that, the FM band existed in relative anonymity for decades. In Sacramento, the old KFBK-FM (now KGBY 92.5 FM) went on the air in the mid-1940s and was a classi

cal music format for some 30 years. Today, it's the AM side's turn at anonymity. Aside from any real help from FCC regulations, it's up to AM the band turns into a police frequency or moves ahead with positive programming changes.

"In isolated areas, AM's future will get better, but as a whole. I don't think it will improve its lot much down the road," said KFBK (1530 AM) general manager Rick Eytcheson

ANY AM stations are owned by corporations that also own an FM signal in the same market. The FM stations with their superior sound and loval audiences bring in the bulk of the ad revenue, and the AM sides often are virtually ignored

"What you've got are a bunch of idiot radio operators who have done everything in their nower to kill AM," Paris said. "They treat the AM sides as a place to burn off spots (ads and public service announcements). The FCC needs to make rules to force operators to work the AM side."

KFBK, like San Francisco's KGO (810 AM), has enjoyed No. 1 status in its market with a news-talk format. Seldom, however, are there more than two or three AM stations in the top 10 of major markets. Besides KFBK, only country music KRAK (1140 AM) occasionally delivers top-10 ratings in Sacramento.

Both stations hinge some of their advertising dollars on personality endorsements. On KRAK it's Juey Mitchell and Big Jim Hall, while KFBK market's top-rated morning team in Bob Nath n and Dave Williams. The stations are owned by corporations, and both have FM sisterto help bolster their revenue-gathering

most telling numbers are in the Arbitron of Sacramento's two country stations Country 105 (KRAK 105.1 FM) triples the audience share of KRAK-AM.

"Research shows the erosion of AM nationwide, but in Sacramento I think we've seen the ratings slide stabilize the last two years," said Don Lang-ford, program director for both Country 105 and "Do I see a great resurgence of the AM hand? No

Paris had an even more dire warning. "If things don't start changing, there's going to be a whole lot of holes in the AM band," he said.

Elton M. Plant, pioneer voice on fledgling radio station WWJ

Elton M. Plant, a Detroit newspaperman who made local radio history in August 1920, died of heart failure Tuesday, Dec. 31, 1991, at Salvation Army Grace Hospital in Windsor. He

Because Mr. Plant's voice was the first heard over WWJ radio, he was credited with being its first announcer - at age 17.

Two years after joining The De-troit News as an office boy, he once recalled, the managing editor told him he had been heard singing around the conference room.

The newspaper owned the fledgling radio station and Mr. Plant, who wanted to be a sports writer, was told he was being transferred to help out on that radiophone gadget."

When he objected that the move

might interfere with his few sportswriting assignments he received more news: "For goodness sakes, no. This is after hours

This is 8MK (WWJ's original radio name) calling, this is 8MK calling," Plant shouted into a megaphone on the station's first broad-

"If you're hearing our voice, please telephone CHerry 2000."

Fewer than 30 Detroiters did.

Mr. Plant continued in radio while also working as a reporter and editor for the Windsor Star, having left The News in 1922. He helped put two pioneering radio stations on the air. In 1932, he hosted Breakfast Blarney, a morning talk show, which was the first program heard on CKLW radio.

After work as the Star's city editor and feature editor, he went into advertising and ran an agency bearing his name for 25 years before

He also operated sound and alarm mpanies in Windsor.

Mr. Plant was chairman of the Canadian National Institute for the Blind through his long membership in the Downtown Windsor Lions Club, was finance chairman for Lions Manor (an apartment complex for the blind and elderly) and worked in Windsor's Muscular Dystrophy campaign.

In addition, he produced and directed musical variety shows for the Goodfellows in the 1920s and 1930s.

Surviving are his wife, Leona; one son, W. Elton C.; and three grand-

"You can see it in TV where network television is becoming a dinosaur," said Eytcheson. "Cable and its narrow targeting is chewing the networks up. There's no such thing as a mass-appeal prod-

"There are formats out there not yet invented that will work on AM radio," said Eytcheson. WFAN in New York is an all-sports AM, and it's in the top 20 there."

Even with the occasional AM stereo sound, like that heard on classical music KSAC (1240 AM). music formats have mostly migrated to FM.

"I happened to be very involved in AM stereo in the early '80s, and even though there were several variations, it never seemed to catch on," said Gerry Cagle, program director for KWOD (106.5 FM) "You can clean up the fidelity of AM, and the dif-ference between it and the FM sound is so infinitesimal the human ear can barely pick it up. One of AM's biggest problems is that right now there's just no viable music format for it."

Musically, several FM stations, fearing the ravages of decreased ad dollars because of an aging audience, dumped easy listening and beautiful music formats onto the AM, where one can still hear "Exodus" and "Theme From Love Story, along with numerous Frank Sinatra selection Those formats are now called "nostalgia," and they're doing quite well both in Sacramento with its Sunny 1320 (KCTC 1320 AM) and San Francisco with Magic 61 (KFRC 610 AM)

There also are a half-dozen AM country music stations available to Sacramento listeners.

"Research shows that a lot of people who like country music just have AM radios in their cars." Cagle said. "Country listeners aren't interested in fidelity, but that is changing.

Sports contracts also are desirable programing to pair with whatever else the AM offers. Mike Oakes, Sunny 1320 program director, said his station adds as many listeners as it loses for its Oakland A's game broadcasts, but that the station's format is a better match with baseball than the old beautiful-music format. Nostalgia, according to Oakes, attracts about a 50-50 ratio of male to female listeners (much more male-oriented than the former format), while baseball appeals to a male-oriented audience.

"Baseball is a prestige contract which adds a feeling of localism to a station, plus provides revenue," Oakes said. "With Oakland only about 90 miles away, and the team's Bay Area signal (KSFO) so weak here, the localism becomes much stronger.

News and news-talk are the most successful AM formats because listeners don't seem to need the human voice in FM stereo. While talk formats have sprung up on FM in such cities as Philadelphia and Miami, station owners have kept it pri-marily on AMs to keep them financially afloat.

Because of California's growing Hispanic population, Spanish formats appear to be in good shape in Sacramento. In mid-April, the Fuller-Jefferyowned KMCE (650 AM) began broadcasting Spanish programming with a 25,000-watt signal. Until a sale can be consummated, the same programming can be heard on its former dial position KRCX (1110 AM).

"Judging by the census figures and the million and a half Hispanics in our listening area, the future of Spanish formats looks bright," said KMCE program director Jose Reynoso. "But ratings are deceiving when it comes to Spanish radio, and the ratings companies really don't service or research the area for diary keepers."

RBITRON COLLECTS its ratings information from diaries, which are filled in by listeners who record what stations they've listened to each day. The company sells the information to radio stations, and advertising rates are set with an eye on the ratings. However, ratings are not the only judge of how well a station is do-ing, especially for AMs, where ratings can be microscopic.

"AM operators have to be innovative and not live out of the ratings book," Paris said.

He predicted the AM stations that will survive between now and the turn of the century will be the 50,000-watt stations in major markets and the 5,000-watt "mom and pop peanut whistle" stations in tiny markets.

"Ultimately, if you provide a good service, peonle will listen," said Paris.



Realistic DX-440 vs. Sony ICF-2010 (An MW DX Evaluation)

Two of the most popular portable receivers currently in production are the Sony ICF-2010 (a. k. a. ICF-2001D) and the Realistic DX-440 (a. k. a. Sangean ATS-803A). The intention of this article is to provide a performance comparison, from a medium-wave DX perspective, of these two receivers in notoverly-technical terms.

1. Price: The DX-440 wins here. U.S. Radio Shack stores normally sell this for about \$200, but sale prices of about \$150 occur fairly often. The ICF-2010 costs about twice as

2. "Stand-alone" sensitivity (using built-in antenna): The Sony receiver is superior in this regard. Neither receiver comes close to such older models as the GE Superadio, the Realistic 12-655 "TRF", or the Sony ICF-S5W when it comes to AM BCB reception with the built-in antenna. A loop, tuned active whip, tuned longwire system, or a passive booster (e. g. Radio West "Shotgun", Intensitronics "Select-a-Tenna") is mandatory to obtain sufficient sensitivity for real-life DXing with either receiver - but especially for the DX-440.

3. Sensitivity with external antenna: This is an important consideration for the reasons given above. The Realistic DX-440 gives far more gain than the Sony '2010 when a tuned external antenna (Radio West, Palomar, or Space Magnet loop, for instance) is used. Note that the concept of an untuned random wire is not addressed: neither receiver can reliably utilize such an antenna without the distinct possibility of in-band and out-of-band spurious signals. The use of an external antenna naturally leads to the next topic

4. Dynamic Range (Strong Signal Handling): The DX-440 wins in this category as well. Its RF gain pot, is more effective in reducing overload/"spurs" than the RF gain control on the Sony when an external antenna

5. Frequency Readout Accuracy: Both sets feature digital readout, of course, but digital readout is not necessarily an ironclad guarantee of accuracy. Some DX-440's are off by about 1 or 2 kHz; all ICF-2010's checked have been within 1 kHz. There may be a "tweak" procedure to correct DX-440 readout error, but I haven't read it yet. Check "your" DX-440 in the store on some local AM stations before you buy it. Use the narrow filter

6. Selectivity: On unmodified ("stock") receivers, there's not much difference between the Sony's wide filter position and the wide filter on the DX-440. Similarly, there isn't much difference between the narrow filters on the two receivers. The narrow filter is, of course, that of greatest interest to DXers. Splits of 4 to 5 kHz from an interfering station aren't usually hard to hear if within 20 dB of the interfering station. Obviously, this is all that's needed for casual shortwave-broadcast listening. And it suffices for much domestic and "easy" foreign MW DXing, as well. "Easy" test frequencies here include Senegal-765, St. Kitts-825, and Antigua-1165. Neither receiver does well with 1 or 2 kHz splits unless they are nearly equal to (or better than) the strength of the adjacent undesired station. In early evening, 890 (WHNC/WLS/LA's) often cannot be sliced from stronger Algeria-891; by mid-evening - with 890 and 891 comparable in strength-audio can be heard on both frequencies; and later at night - with WLS considerably stronger - 891 just registers a "het". On a "serious" receiver, audio on both 890 and 891 would have been easily obtained at all three listening times. An ICF-2010 I've used a lot has Gerry Thomas's narrow filter modification installed for improved selectivity. It slices splits better than both the stock ICF-2010 and DX-440. I'd suppose that the DX-440 could be similarly modified; perhaps an article about this would be a good

7. Tuning Ease: Both receivers can be tuned by keypad frequency entry. There's little difference in difficulty in that procedure between the two. Both receivers can also be tuned continuously with a knob, simulating the feel of older analog receivers. The Sony ICF-2010 does knob-tuning better: it is less likely to skip over groups of stations/chunks of frequencies when tuned at a moderate rate of speed. You've got to tune the DX-440 knob quite slowly to avoid such "lurching".

8. Features: The Sony ICF-2010 has its famous synchronous detector circuit. Use of this can really smooth out rough auroral flutter and cut down the audio garbling typically resulting from the beating ("subaudible heterodyning") caused when there are 3 or more channel occupants of comparable strength. But the sync-detector often reduces the audio-to-background noise ratio, so it's a very application-specific benefit. I would attribute only a fairly small number of (otherwise-unattainable) MW DX loggings to my use of the sync- detector. More often, it raises the entertainment-listening quality of a station already perfectly-readable by DXer standards.

9. Miscellaneous: On at least some DX-440's, a whining noise can be present if the LOCK OUT/IN switch is not set to the IN position. Setting the switch to IN locks out the receiver's controls; doing so must shut off some digital pulse train that gives rise to the whine. This whine varies considerably from one receiver to the next: on some it's barely noticeable, on others its quite annoying. The effect is noticed mostly on very weak signals near the noise floor. Garbling/intermodulation of the audio is the result. Of course, switching to LOCK IN during lowsignal work can be done, but this slows down operation, because you eventually have to go to LOCK OUT if you want to change frequency. I would not rate this problem disastrous, however. As in the case of frequency-accuracy unit-to-unit variation, testing a receiver in the store prior to purchase is advisable -- provided that the background noise from lighting, computers, etc. is not severe enough to mask the problem.

Overall value: The Realistic DX-440, especially if available for the \$150 sale price, is a better overall value for the DXer whose main interest is medium-wave. The minor drawbacks mentioned previously should be kept in mind. Balanced against these are the several advantages, most notably, better sensitivity with an external antenna and lower price. For either receiver to be up to the tasks of serious MW DX, a high-Q-tuned, good gain, external antenna is required and a tighter "narrow" filter is highly recommended.

"Show time": I've used my Sony ICF-2010 on many trips: it's been to Newfoundland, California, (El Paso) Texas, and on innumerable "quickie" beach DXpeditions in the Boston and Cape Cod areas. I'm thoroughly familiar with its strengths and weaknesses. I felt that a reasonable check-out of the DX-440 would have to include a real-life DX session at the beach similar to what I've done with the '2010 so many times.

On 14 DEC 1991, I took the DX-440 out on one of my "mini-DXpeditions" in place of the usual ICF-2010. Just before sunset, I parked at the waterfront in Scituate, MA in view of the old Hatherly Road WRUL/WNYW/WYFR shortwave transmitter site. (At this now-silent site, only a few tall wooden masts and the old brick transmitter building remain.) My DXpedition antenna set-upthis time was the homebrew RTL-1 (varactor-tuned) loop placed on the car roof and controlled by the MWT-2 Option 5 regenerative tuner-preamp.controller. (See my previous articles on these units.) Band conditions were in a continuing state of mediocrity with a lot of short-skip, but the DX-440 did fine in pulling outTA's on 693, 711, 765, 774, 836, 891, 981, 999, 1044, 1053, 1062, 1098, 1107, 1179, 1197, 1349, 1367, and 1566. Many of these had perfectly readable audio. I feel that only in a few cases would

the ICF-2010 have done better - and that's only because of the Gerry Thomas filter modification that was done to it. I don't think that a stock ICF-2010, even with its synchronous detector activated, would have resulted in any more loggings. Nothing short of the upper echelon receivers (such as the R390A, HQ-180A, NRD-525, R71A) would have garnered appreciably morereadable DX

Final note: A new Realistic model (DX-390) and a new Sony model (ICF-SW77) have been released in addition to the still-available DX-440 and ICF-2010. It is not known if the newer models will eventually replace the older ones or if they are just intended to be additionally-available units. Reviews of these newer models from a medium-wave DX perspective (complete with comparisons to their predecessors) could be of great value. The best analyses would come from a blend of laboratory testing of key parameters such as third-order intercept and of actual DXing under demanding conditions.

FCC's Hassinger: Broadcasters Responsible For Improving AM

Tougher FCC technical standards for signal changes will apply equally to all AM stations, Mass Media Bureau Asst. Chief/Engineering Bill Hassinger said at an engineers' funcheon last week (11/21) in Washington. But he also said it's the broadcasters' responsibility to clean up the cluttered band

"The government isn't going to save AM broadcanting. Ultimately, it comes down to the broadcasters themselves," Hassinger told the Association of Federal Communications Consulting Engineers, He also hailed the planned allotment system for the expended bend (1605-1705 kHz) as a demonstration of "what AM can sound like it it's done properly." Engineers attending the functi-

eon appeared to be less concerned with procedures for stations to migrate to the expanded band than with the impact new AM technical standards may have on their olients. They asked Hessinger and Commission engineer Larry Olson hypothetical questions about signal changes for stations with grandfathered situations country nighttime interference to other stations, particularly high-powered major market stations built years before the stations now receiving interfererice.

Applies To All

Does the tougher interference standard apply to the old glants? "It applies to everybody, it applies to Class I stations: it applies to stations built in 1935," Hassinger stated. But he also noted that waivers can be requested for sta-

fices forced to change transmitte sites through no fault of their own. In short, the new rules require a station changing facilities to reduce interference by 10% if it's causing rnajor interference to another sta tion. (That's determined through the FCC's complicated 50% exclusion calculation for Interference.) Moderate Interferers (25%-50%) could make changes as long as they clidn't increase interference. Other stations would be free to make changes as long as they didn't cross the 25% threshold.

The AM freeze, which has been in effect since March 1990, is expected to "unfreeze" in February. The new AM factifical rules will take effect 70 deys after publication in the Federal Register, that's expected next week. Only then will the FCC again accept applications for new AM stations and major changes to existing ones.

Once the order takes effect. Honoinger said the Commission. plans to move suickly on selecting the 300 or so stations which will receive regional, interference-free channels in the expanded band Stations seeking the 10kw day/1kw night licenses will be chosen on the basis of how much they reduce interferance by vacating their old frequencies.

Instead of "For Beginners", this column could easily be called "Foreign DX - a Central DX'ers Perspective". It is a list of the best bets for foreign DX reception, in the north-central United States. You may not be able to hear all of these stations, due to local interference or poor conditions. People on or near either coast will pick up trans-Atlantics (TAs) or trans-Pacifics (TPs). You do not have to be right at the coast to pick these up. Some have been heard in Ohio and other midwestern states, them gulf coast, and even land-locked Manitoba! There are reprints in the NRC Product Catalog on TA and TP DX, and also in the packet all of you received when you joined the NRC.

ANGUILLA - The Caribbean Beacon on 1610 is an easy catch all year. A problem might be a strong local on 1600. Also, try for a parallel broadcast on 690 during auroral conditions.

ANTIGUA & BARBUDA - The Caribbean Lighthouse is possible when aurora takes the sting out of 1160 and 1170.

ARGENTINA - Radio Nacional in Buenos Aires is worth a check if you notice good reception of Columbia and/or Venezuela. Don't get your hopes too high up though. BAHAMAS - Beacon ZLS-526, ZNS-3 on 810, and ZNS1 are occasionally reported. On \$10, WGY and KCMO need to be auroraled out, along with KXEL-1540.

BELIZE - Radio Belize is common when WCCO is knocked out by aurora. They are in

EE; thus easy to identify.

CAYMAN Islands - Radio Cayman on 1555 produces a hetrodyne much of the winter, and audio has been heard in Omaha. Auroral conditions will help, knocking out some interference from 1550 and 1560.

COLOMBIA-CARACOL on 750 and 810, HJAJ-760, along with HJSB-870. Check 770 for RCN and 890 for Radio Galeon.

COSTA RICA-TICAL on 530 in Cartago can be heard because there is so little interference. Listen for ballads and Radio Rumbo during auroral conditions. CUBA - Take your pick from Radio Reloj on 590, 760, 790, 960, and others. They have Morse code IDs so they are easily identified. Check IDXD for others, in-

cluding Radio Progreso, Radio Taino, and Radio REBELDE. ECUADOR-HCRS6 on 890 can be heard in the West, with KDXU the main cause of in-

EL SALVADOR-YSS on 655 is possible, but unlikely. Radio Universal-770 is worth a look for. Aurora is definitely needed.

HAITI-760, 840, and 1030 are best bets. This is a tough one!

HONDURAS-HRVW on 650 can be heard during auroral conditions. This one is a bit tougher than some of the others.

JAMAICA-JBC on 700 is relatively easy in auroral conditions. Check 750 and 720

MEXICO - Very easy, with many stations possible. XEROK on 800 is heard easily all year, and XEG-1050 in Monterrey is heard too. XERF-1570, XEW-900, XEWA-540 and XEJ-970 are all heard throughout the year. Check IDXD for other widelyheard stations.

NETHERLANDS ANTILLES-PJB-800 on the Island of Bonaire is common, even in Canada. Try late evening to a little after midnight local time.

NICARAGUA-YNACE on 720 in Managua occasionally makes it here. Again, auroras help to knock out WGN in Chicago. YNA-620 has been heard, along with Radio Sandino-750, also.

ST PIERRE ET MIQUELON-1375 is very tough.

VENEZUELA-Radio Corro on 780 is the best bet. Radio Rumbos-670 has been heard.

Other countries can be heard, but the above are the best bets. Some of them are rare, so do not count on hearing every one. Remember, IDXD always has the most up-to-date information, so check there for current information.

A note on loop antennas In case you overlooked them in the NRC Product Catalog, the NRC Antenna Reference Manuals contain some of the best of the loop antenna articles.

Feliciano plays DJ on radio

WESTPORT (AP) — It was just another day spinning oldies at WMMM radio last August when stands of the control of the got a call from someone who identified himself as Jose Feliciano.

"I said, 'Anybody can claim to be Jose Feliciano. Let's hear you sing a few bars of "Feliz Navidad." He started singing, and I said, 'OK, OK, I believe you.' Graham said.

Feliciano's impromptu rendition of "Feliz Navidad," the bestknown Spanish Christmas song, landed him a job as a disc jockey at the station.

Feliciano spends every Saturday morning chatting with callers, offering insider tidbits about Elvis, the Beatles, Bob Dylan and other favorite musicians. He even jokes about his blindness.

"When I go to a restaurant and the waitress says to me, 'Mr. Feliciano, would you like to see a menu?" and I tell her, 'Lady, I'd

like to see anything."

Interspersed with the jokes and stories are a few songs — some old, some new, some in Spanish, some in English. The show, "Speaking of Music," with co-host Russ Garrett, debuted Aug, 31.

Using only an acoustic guitar and two microphones, Feliciano sits in a corner of the cramped studio. On a recent Saturday morning, he sang Elton John's "Daniel" and Frank Sinatra's "All the Way."

"I'm having a great time. I love it all — the singing, the talking, the

performing," he says. "I think I have what you would call the gift of gab, so it's fun for me."

Although the role of disc jockey is new to him, Feliciano describes himself as a "radio junkie" and says he always wanted to give radio a try.

"I'm not the type of disc jockey who's going to give you the weather, but I can talk about certain things other people might not know about," he says.

Take, for example, this littleknown tidbit about Diana Ross: She had to sing her first lead with the Supremes in a bathroom because Motown Records did not have an echo chamber.

Or about how Feliciano wrote and performed the theme song to the popular '70s TV series 'Chico and the Man," and once had a guest appearance on the show.

With his long, shagged hair, gray jeans and jean jacket, Feliciano, 48, looks much the same as he did in 1968, when his version of The Doors' hit. "Light My Fire," made him a star.

Feliciano lives in nearby Weston, about five minutes from the station, in a converted 18th-century tavern with his wife Susan, daughter Melissa, 3, and son, Jonathan, 6 months. He moved here from California about 18 months ago at his wife's urging, he said.

He still spends a lot of time on the road doing shows, but no longer does long concert tours.

Even though his last big American hit — "Hi Heel Sneakers" — was 23 years ago, he still has a loyal following in Latin America and among Hispanies in the United States. He won his sixth Grammy Award this year when a song from his album "Nina" was named best Latin-pop performance.

I was a member back in the 70's when I first got interested in AM-BCB DX. A recent purchase of a Collins 651S-1 digital readout, solid state receiver circa 1972, has rekindled my interest in BCB DX. I have been quite active in FM/TV/SW/HAM DX over the last 15 years and I am a member of most major radio clubs, including the ON DX Association where I am London area rep. My BCB totals are 800 heard, 470 verified, 41 states & DC heard & verified, 8 provinces heard & verified, 27 countries heard, 18 verified and 6 pirates heard, 3 verified. Although I find the AM BCR quite different since I last soriously DX'ed it, I am having a riot tuning it on the Collins receiver. It is great in tersm of selectivity, sensitivity & the audio is exceptional! It is by far the best AM rig I have ever owned. Past receivers were DX160, RCA AR88, RCA AR77, National HRN 60, various amateur general coverage transceivers and a Sony 2010. I am currently trying to find any reviews that may have been written on the Collins 651S-I digital receiver. Any member having and reviews, critiques, opinions or general info on the receiver, please contact me. I will gladly reimburse those sending info for photo copying/postage expenses. Are there any members out there who have owned a Collins 651S-1 receiver? If so, I would be very interested in hearing from you. I have been checking into the NRC net on 80 meters lately so I would be happy to chat with any hams in the club. ARTHUR L. ROBB - 2108 N BROADWAY - PITTSBURG, KS 66762-2837 This MUSING is prompted by a remark on Pg. 7 of DX NEWS on 12/23. JIM RENFREW of Rochester, 'NY re KTOP-1490 in Topeka, KS, asked do we have any members in Topeka? Topeka was my place of birth and hometown until 56. My DXing began there in 1925 and for practical purposes ended in 1942 due to WW II and the demise of RADEX magazine. I discovered verifications in 1928. CKCL-Toronto was asking listeners for cards and letters so I sent them a report and received back an attractive card attesting that I was a member of their 'Worms Club' and the added sentence 'this verifies your reception'. 12 years later I was able to complete verification of the then 48 states w/WPRO in RI and the Canadian provinces w/CFCY in PEI. All postcard veries bear 1¢ postage; letter envelopes 2¢ at first then later 3¢, IRC's were a dime. Back then as now there were stations that utterly refused to answer verie requests. Now to KTOP. 42 years ago, I was employed by the US Gov't. in Topeka and periodically made personal delivery of PSA's to the 4 local radio stations; WREN, WIBW, KJAY & KTOP. I was calling on Jack Ostrode, PD & chief announcer at KTOP when I noticed a gold plated typewriter in his office. It really caught my fancy so I asked and he gladly told me how and where he bought it and a short time later, I became the proud owner (on 2/6/50) of a Royal Portable, Gold Plating, Quiet DeLuxe Typewriter at a cost of \$157.08. That is the same machine this MUSING is being typed, all because I happened to visit the office & studio of KTOP a long time ago. I hate to admit it, though, but I do remember a time when there were not only no DXers in Topeka, there was not even a radio station there!

GERRY THOMAS - 3635 CHASTAIN WAY - PENSACOLA, FL 32504 I'm sitting here reading the loggings of the NFD DXpedition of CONNELLY/KAZA-ROSS/BURNELL and am shell shocked! This is some truly fantastic DX! I wonder what would have been heard under non-auroral conditions. Anyway, congrats & thanks to Mark, Neil & Jean for sharing the experience. On other matters, I abandoned the idea of getting a Drake R8, at least until the dust of controversy settles a little. In the mean time, I picked up a used HO180A and spent a week or so getting it back into shape and, overall, am impressed. Sensitivity & selectivity are better than I expected, strong signal handling is somewhat less than I had hoped (it shows some overloading tendencies with an untuned 250 foot LW, works great with a loop & preselector). The warm glow and full sounding audio of this tube set provide a nice contrast to the cool blue/ green character and flat sounding audio of my solid state rigs & I find myself preferring the HO180A for general SWLing and domestic BCB DX (SW UTE DX & foreign BCB DXing still belong to the digital readout, solid state rigs). After having used many of the better RXs over the years, including the R390A, HQ180A, SPR4, R70/71A, etc., as well as a pile of "good to average" RXs (FRG7, R1000, ICF2010, etc.), I'm more convinced than ever that once adequate IF selectivity in a RX is attained (to reduce adjacent channel splash), more BCB DX is heard by investing in the antenna/tuner end of the system than upgrading the RX.

That is, once adjacent channel QRM is made manageable, the principal hurdle to BCB DX is co-channel QRM. A loop or phasing unit pays much greater dividends in overcoming this problem than do the convenience features (keypad entry, memories, etc.) of modern, high priced rigs. High dynamic range and a controllable Agc circuit are desirable but it can be made less important by using interference-reducing antenna like loops and phasers. Don't get me wrong, I'm just as enraptured as anyone by the bells, whistles & specs of the modern rigs and I, too, need new toys from time to time, but in terms of return for the dollar, it's been my experience that antennas and associated gadgets provide a better return. On a related topic, Chuck Harder of the 'For The People' network is coming out with a "Made in the USA" table-top SW radio for about \$100, I'm looking forward to trying it out! And, finally, to CHUCK in Montreal, yes, ex-WRBK-1090 is now simulcasting WKGT-105.1 and IDing as WJBW (nice catch, by the way). 73's
