25 years ago ... from the October 26, 1964 DXN: For a number of reasons, the NRC and IRCA decided not to merge, including indecision amongst IRCA board members, a negative reaction from a large number of IRCA members, and a problem with prorating IRCA dues, which would have caused hardship to their members.

10 years ago ... from the October 24, 1983 DXN: Tony Fitzherbert started up his "Formats" column.

Welcome to DDXD-West. Where friends gather to exchange a story or two. Some of them
true. Belly up to the bar, boys. I'll buy the next round.

I've heard American Public Radio relaying the Voice of America (on KBSU-730) from 1700 to ???. So if you've heard VOA programming on medium wave, don't tweak your tubes thinking your tuner is out of kilter. Log that sucker!

Last week we posed a bit of trivia, asking what was the first licensed AM station in the U.S. to employ a directional antenna system. The answer is . . . The (then) combined facilities of WFLA and WSUN in Tampa, Florida. At the time, 1937, these stations were sharing 620 kc.

Took a quick, two-day tour to Seattle and Portland. Tried to call the Hardy's while going through Aberdeen, but their line was busy for over a half-hour! Must have a teenager, hi. Didn't have much of a chance to DX, as had to do all the driving. But did log a TIS, sigh. See the next page for details.

☐ This coming Saturday night/Sunday morning (October 30/31) we set our clocks back to standard time. Well, most of us do. Anyway, as we observe this twice-a-year ritual of clock adjustment, it's usually a good opportunity to catch a station or two either with nighttime facilities off too early (in the morning), or daytime facilities on too late (in the afternoon). MO St. Louis - 10/4 0300 - Excellent with Your station in Mid-America for CNN Headline News, 550 KSD-AM St. Louis ⇒ CNN headline News. Bx: KUSA. The reason for the reversion to the old KSD calls (which it held from 1922 to 1984 on 550 AM, and 93.7 FM) is the sale of KSD-AM/TV from Gannett Radio Division to KYKY-98.1's owners, EZ Communications. Gannett owns the exclusive rights to KUSA call (they own KUSA-TV 9 Denver), so a 3-letter call is back on AM! Not the first, though, as back in 1984, WNSY-1310 Newport News, VA returned to original call WGH. And a couple in NYC, as well. And as of 10/10 0100, station is | KSD-FM 93.7 and IDing as Classic Rock 93-7 KSD-FM and 550 KSD-AM. This makes

three simulcasters in the St. Louis market! Format change occurred only six days after call change! (EB-MO)

WHB MO Kansas City - 9/26 2100-9/28 1230+ - Began final program on OLD format with live DJ at 2100 requesting people to phone in memories of WHB, which had been one of the 1st rock stations, assuming that format in 1954.

Lots of genuinely touching stories including at least one listener who recalls back to the 1930s. Live swan song ended 9/27 0100 when new owners were to take over, but paperwork was late, so taped OLD complete with old jingles ran until 9/28 1230+, when they went to FRM/C&W as a partial satellite of KZMU 100.7 Carrolton, MO, but continues some local-content from KC. Now refers to itself as Missouri's Farm Voice. Not a dry eye here Sunday night. (JEL-MO)

KS Pittsburg - 9/29 (experimental) & 9/30 - Now operating as the first operation in the U.S. where three stations - including the 200 watter in Amoret, MO are running in synchronous transmission. FCC has granted permission for CNN's Voice of the Heartland to use fiber optics to get TLK/NWS programming from Kansas City, Kansas studios to Topeka, then up to a satellite and down to all three transmitters. General Manager Bill Johnson graciously took time to report that the three were exceeding FCC standards for accuracy on the channel, and goal of more-or-less solid and listenable signal from down here to Oklahoma may well be reached, with Amoret facility filling in the space between here and Pittsburgh at about the half-way point. Lots of coverage in business section of Kansas City Star. Well-deserved. (JEL-MO)

Ray speaks: "TP conditions have been disappointing since 9/1 with carriers noted



every single morning, but very little audio. 774, 1512, and 1548 have produced a little weak audio down in the noise on accasion, but I had expected to have a few solid Aussie tapes by now. Maybe October will be the month. One surprise was the appearance of the first Japanese carrier I have ever heard in 47 years of DXing on the East Coast." (Very interesting detective work - Jim)

Ray speaks some more: "For the last few months I have been using the Model 105 spiral loop that my little company is developing. It has the sharpest and most accurate nulls I have ever experienced and I have been using loops since 1946. The other morning (9/21) I took two bearings on a station on 1017 at 1006 - they were 250 and 252 degrees - Tonga has a true bearing of 253 degrees from here. Another morning there was a strong carrier on 837, four bearings averaged 254 degrees, true bearing for 4RK is about 260 degrees. Also 1548 4QD average of 16 bearings 255 degrees, true about 260 degrees. 774 3LO 11 bearings average about 239 degrees, true 240 degrees."



60th Convention Returns to Enfield ... by John R. Malicky

"Bruiser" Bruce Allen, The Swat Team, fireworks, DXAS Travelogue, "WNRC -Your Convention & Oldies Station", Radio Trivia, transmitter tours of WPOP and WTIC, and the NRC Auction are just some of the events and people you would have seen, did, or listened to at NRC Enfield '93, if you were there! If you weren't, shame on you for 6 weeks! Anyway, for the 57 who were there, they enjoyed a most fun-filled and extremely socialable convention! Our thanks for all his work go to Membership Director and Host Ron Musco, even trudging through mud and glop to set up the NRC Beverage for the DX Tests Sunday morning and other DX that we won't get into! Anyway, thanks again Ron was has informed us this will be his last convention as host, as the others he hosted were '75 Windsor Locks and '83 Enfield, unless we bribe him for NRC 2003: Ron also wishes to thank those who helped him this year... Mike Collins of WSNG-610(for the convention booklet), John Bowker, Ken Chatterton, Tony Fitzherbert, Marc Connelly, Paul Swearingen, Jerry Starr, Ernest Wesolowski, Dave Schmidt, and last but not least... The Swat Team!

Now for those of you in the NRC and DXAS who couldn't make the convention, don't be disappointed, have no fear, we are here to the best of our cognizant abilities to present to you the highlights and recreations of NRC Enfield '93. So please pull up a nice easy chair, feed the dog and let him out, close the doors, turn off your radio or put some music on, and sit back and enjoy our story!

Act I Scene I... We begin on a clear warm Friday, September 3rd evening with the sun setting around 6:45 PM. After a lengthy and long 580 mile drive from Pittsburgh through northest Pennsylvania(with stops at WPPA-1360, WPAM-1450, and WMBT-1530), surviving Connecticut I-84 rush hour traffic at 70 mph, then back road traversing, member Chris Cuomo of Verona, PA and I finally arrived at NRC Enfield '93 and the Harley Hotel on route 5, 1 Bright Meadow Blvd. This soon becomes a familiar site as it was my second convention attended, NRC Enfield '83. Immediately we are spotted by several members, some who hide, while others greet us with, "..who are you?!" Such nice introductions! However, a familiar face last seen at NRC New Castle(DE) '86, is Tony Fitzherbert, Fairfield, CT native and Station Profile and Formats Editor, who offers to dine with him at Friendly's (the NRC Restaurant of Choice!) within walking distance of the hotel only if we pay for his meal! Nearly 8 PM, Tony must rush off from dinner, entrusting us with payment(we kept the change!), to set up his Station & Transmitter Tour Slide Show and Radio Trivia Contests to be held in the second floor Springfield/East Longmeadow(abbreviated SEL) meeting room.

Act I Scene II...Just after 8 PM, Tony began what will turn out to be a lengthy, but most interesting and fun slide show of station and transmitter sites he has visited during the past 6-7 years in such markets as Boston, Philadelphia, Detroit, Atlanta, Cincinnati, Baltimore, Tucson, Wilmington, DE and NRC 86, plus some New Englanders, and a few Canadians sprinkled in. His narration was both informative and energetic eliciting several knowledgable comments of radio information from the membership. Also, to keep everyone with "thinking caps" on, Tony created 20 hints coinciding with a blank screen for "Radio Trivia" such that he would read and receive correct responses to station slides, the winner to receive a collectable sticker such as a WJBX-1530 or KCEE-790! As with several of the slides, their appearances were easily recognizable as the stations were profiled in past DX News. They included WNOP-740, WSB-750, WTSJ-1050, WYNX-1550, and many others. Even for our DXAS members, like our "walking DX dictionary" Mike Lantz, the show and presentation was a "Tony" award winner!

As a sidelight and having started this on my own last year at NRC Omaha '92, I taped part of Tony's show, then interviewed him afterwards for a DXAS NRC Enfield '93 Convention Highlilghts package in conjunction with DXAS Director Fred Vobbe. That night and throughout the weekend, I would interview 40 members and record several events at our convention. So even though my health was not at its best, as an illness, colitus, had hit me in early August, my recovery was just good enough to give the tapings and interviews my very best effort thoroughly enjoying every minute of it! Next stop, CBS News! Soon this package will be sold through the NRC DXAS service and be produced by Fred Vobbe. However, Fred couldn't be with us this year because he and wife Debbie just became proud parents of a newborn son and we in the NRC say congrats to the Vobbes! Also, I want to thank Ron Musco for allowing me to do these interviews and to the members I spoke to, though unfortunately I missed 3 members, I hope DXAS will enjoy the tapes!

Act II Scene I... Now back to Enfield which wound down slowly Friday night, but picked up quickly with anticipating excitement on Saturday morning September 4 with upcoming transmitter tours of Hartford's WPOP-1410 and WTIC-1080 set to start at 10 AM: Arranged by Ron Musco and Tony Fitzherbert and led by Tony in the lead vehicle, with vet another infamous NRC Car Caravan (8 cars in all:), 22 members followed the "Yellow Brick Roads" of Hartford area highways on our adventurous search on a rain soaked morning to meet CF Frank Clifford of WPOP at their studios, then onto the transmitter site 3

miles away in Newington, CT. Here at the WPOP site, a 2 tower array stood behind us with a small brook winding around the towers. Inside, Mr. Clifford gave us a most informative tour of the cramped building, at least for 22 people, of the 3 transmitters, an out of operation Westinghouse 5kw from 1941, the backup Gates BC-5, and the current '88 SX5 Harris model. Frank also showed us the DAT and C-DAT modules WPOP uses and explained the EBS monitoring by WPOP of WTIC. Following the clicking of several shutters while trying to contain our excitement, as though we had just seen MaDonna(!), Mr. Clifford led us up Avon Mountain 40 minutes later to the home of the WTIC site in, of course, Avon, CT: This site, about 1,000 feet above sea level and 6.5 miles west of the downtown Hartford studios was something only most DXers could ever dream about! As rock star Prince would say, "imagine if you will..", the transmitter building, a fine 3 story almost Victorian-like construction, was built around the original 1929 RCA transmitter and sits on property WTIC has owned since the same year. Facing the front of the building and to our left was the 445' stick of TV 24 and WTIC-FM, behind the building was the 535' tower of TV 3, and to our right were the AM's 440' guyed square 2 tower array, built in 1934, with 8 foot bases! As WTIC CE Tom Ray described, the pattern is beamed northwest/southeast protecting KRLD in Dallas and set on local Dallas time. It helped that I could also show Mr. Ray and our group the WTIC pattern from our NRC Night Pattern Book! Tom said surprisingly that more DX reports come from Europe than from the U.S., though the WTIC talk shows receive many distant calls from Maine to Florida and in the past to the sportsline from a listener in Brazil! Moving inside, there were several TV 3 monitors and the 3 WTIC transmitters. They were an RCA no longer in use, a backup Gates BC-5, and 2 main alternating Harris 50kws. However, in and around the building, there was so much RF from TV 3, Mr. Ray conducted our DXAS interview from a safe distance outside. Of course both gentlemen gave extremely good station profiles to Tony for DX News: Act II Scene II... As some of the group returned to the Harley to nourish

their taste buds, also known as lunchtime(!), Tony and I plus the remaining members journeyed onward to the transmitter sites of WRDM-1550 licensed to Bloomfield, CT, a brokered ethnic station, and WKND-1480 licensed to Windsor, CT, a black/UC formatted station, both programming to the Hartford market. First at WRDM and being tipped off by Ron Musco, the 6 tower array sits on the property of a farmer with the setting as Tony described best as "almost Tabacco Row..a L'il Abner scene" complete with ducks, geese, and kittens off at the side of the house and a horse in the middle of the site! So with NRC-like diplomacy, Ambassador Fitzherbert persuaded a sometimes shotguntotting farmer to let us on the site to, what else, drool and take pictures to our hearts content! The horse even posed for us and "the cow jumped over the moon!" Later and in between was a drive-by and much tamer setting at WDRC-1360 with a 2 tower array at 869 Blue Hills Drive in Bloomfield, CT just down the road from the WRDM site. Finally as everyone else returned to the hotel, Tony and I headed for WLND's 3 tower array. With the only entry by a very rocky gravel road, the unlit short sticks were set in a wooded area behind a granite tombstone company. Meanwhile in all this logistical infortion to even find the 3 sites(maps provided by Musco Map Co.-"your one stop for directions in central Connecticut!"), Tony and I were completely unaware that at each of these sites and right under our noses were the clues to the (Musco) Find the NRC Sticker Contest! However lurking in the shadows, dark glasses, trenchcoat, and all was member Bruce "don't call me Inspector Cleausau" Conti sweating out our movements because if we had seen any of the clues in bags, we would have disrupted the chain and mostly likely claimed the first place prize for ourselves! Though as luck would be on Bruce's

side, we overlooked them and he found all 4 clues at these 3 sites plus a fourth where we didn't go which had the winning sticker! For his "blood, sweat, and tears" efforts the past 2 days, Bruce was awarded a 2 year free NRC membership on Sunday afternoon, but not the published 4 year prize in the convention map provided by Ron. It seems that while on his hunt for the fourth clue, the Swat Team slightly misted Bruce which he then asked for help from Ron, but was told he was on the right trail anyway! Error, deduct 2 points! Thus a most interesting story unfolded complete with all the humor captured on the DXAS tapes as Bruce did divuldge the first 3 clue sites to me on Saturday afternoon. Look for this story in your October Reader's Digest!

Act II Scene III...On a cool and overcast Saturday evening, the NRC Evening of Festivities was finally ready to commence! First at 7 PM was

the NRC Banquet Festival held outside on the hotel's patio, as it was 10 years ago, complete this time with barbeque ribs and chicken, dancing bears, clowns, and all the trimmings. Hey, first class all the way! Then at 8, our special NRC 60th Anniversary Cake was cut and out popped an NRC Rockette! You had to be there to belive it! Not! Finally to top off our special dinner and celebration, again like 10 years ago, was our very own fireworks display! Of course uninvited quests soon came, the police, but we didn't save them any cake! The rest of the evening's activities then moved to the second floor SEL meeting room. At 8:30 PM, Ron Musco passed out several nice NRC Door Prizes which was followed at 9 by the NRC Business Meeting conducted by NRC Pub Center Chairman/Board Officer Ken Chatterton. Briefly, these topics were discussed. They were that, like last year, the NRC is in good financial shape, the new AM Log Book(the 14th Edition selling for the same price as last year at \$16.95) is out as a new printer was found to cut costs and this log was consolidated with the extra white spaces taken out resulting in 50 fewer pages as "Krazy Ken" even sold out the few copies he had at the convention, and a new NRC Night Pattern Book being assembled by Fred Tankersley of Arizona will soon be available. Also, in Frank Sinatra's words, "..it was a very good year," as several members and helpers freely donated their time typing(using software) for various projects and their efforts were now recognized. Ken said all reprints will be available on the "NRC Archieve File" and Marc Connelly and Wayne Heinen will have some reprints on disc, then Ken asked for donations for NRC CPC Tests as the club hopes to have more and/or the same amount of tests as IRCA for '93-'94. Finally, bids for next year came from Miami and Nashville, but nothing was extended. However, as we were to find out tomorrow, though I actually knew ahead of time "evesdropping" for DXAS after the auction, then "bit my tongue!", Bruce Conti presented a nice package of ideas to persuade Ron and Ken to send NRC '94..drum roll please.. back to New England in Nashua, NH:

At 9:30 PM, the NRC DX Quiz took place, though please next time lock Frank Merrill in the bathroom, because yes who else but Frank won it again! To cap off the activities that evening at the late starting time of 10 PM, Ron and our Musings Editor Dave "Mr. Coffee" Schmidt hurriedly auctioned off "more assorted junk" that we called auction items for our annual NRC Auction. So besides the usual shirts, bags of stickers, hats, records-"bid them up, Merrill will buy anything!", tapes, and books including old DX News were a few different items. They included 2 phones with "direct lines to Rush!", seat cushions, a chrystal glass set won by Betty Lord, and a film to video transfer kit won by Dick Truax. I donated, actually cleaned house, several bags of items and shirts, one of which was a Pirate baseball shirt won by Roger Giannini, and good work gloves(at a radio club auction?!) won by Ray "what am I going to do with these" Arruda. What else Ray, use them to DX: Then into the NRC kitty was \$36 of my earnings to clean up on WDRC-FM items such as a shirt, hat, frisbee, and a "DRC 103" mug even outbidding Paul "I want that mug" Swearingen as Paul and I do like those mugs! Unfortunately, there weren't any receivers donated and our final tally was just over \$200. With the auction concluded, at 11:30 PM, the NRC went "live" on 7.435 shortwave on a program called "Spectrum" out of New Jersey. This program, coordinated by Ron Musco, interviewed him, John Bowker, and Marc Connelly, phone patched in their rooms, to discuss the club and convention, DXing, loop antennas and equipment. The program lasted one hour and at least 10 callers spoke to our panel of experts:

Act II Scene IV...Meanwhile back at the "ranch", the "Radio Ranch Room" of 421(Chris Cuomo's and mine), WNRC-87.9 in stero finally took to the airwaves with all of 1/10th of a watt! Still with members gathering for a look, our fine switchboard operator Laura McCusker even took a request from someone in their car outside the hotel! Anyway, WNRC, "Enfield's Convention & Oldies Station," operated with a Ramsey transmitter, a Realistic mixer and microphone, a Technics tapedeck, one turntable, and the antenna consisting of wire leading to a coathanger! Hey folks, it actually worked! WNRC's oldies music consisted of about 500 45s, some albums, and taped airchecks courtsey of Fred Vobbe. Amazingly, all this equipment and music survived our trip from home except for the second turntable as the arm broke. Fortunately, CE Chris Cuomo made do with the first turntable surviving a few seconds of dead air(opps!) and a few scratchy 45s to produce and coordinate

a fine, efficent, and even profitable operation as we passed the hat to buy a new turntable! Later for DXAS, Andy Rugg, late of Montreal, now residing in Cornwall, ON, came in and gave a surprise greeting to DXAS on tape in French, merci Andy! As the midnight hour approached and passed, 2 DXpiditions took place, one was near Rom Musco's home in Poquonock with a 1200' longwire, the second and much closer led by Ray "Lower Deck" Arruda of Acushnet, MA to the hotel's back parking lot for the non-existent CPC Tests, as we found out later, of WSEZ-1560 and WCEI-1460, nice try gang! Returning back to the "ranch" in the wee hours of Sunday morning, WNRC signed off the air for now so we could get some sleep!

Act III Scene I...On a beautiful blue sky Sunday, September 5th morning with fresh dew on the grass and trees, a few members were set to depart. Two such couples who enjoyed themselves were Bob and Rita LaVigne of Boston and Jack and Gaye Parks of Hamlet, NC. Those of us who know Jack are always glad to see him make another NRC convention and wish Jack the best of health. Jack, whose only local WKDM-1250 has gone silent, is a frequent contributor to DXN and the AM Log Book and keeps a meticulous log of all the changes and corrections. So to you Jack, good DX and health from the NRC: Later in the morning, Ernie Wesolowski, our NRC VideoExpert, informed me that he placed a call last night to New Zealand(4 PM Sunday their time) to Laurie Boyer extending NRC best wishes for Laurie's recent wedding. In turn Laurie offered congratulations and best wishes to NRC Enfield '93 and a "hello" to all attending members including myself, so for you Laurie, 73s and "good day down under mate!" Finally, before the start of last night's auction, Ernie videotaped time capsule greetings from all members by name and their home with the tape to be buried in Ron Musco's backyard!

Act III Scene II... In the late morning and afternoon, it's the John Bowker Show with a DX travelogue, seminars, charts, and quizes! You just do not get any better entertainment anywhere else folks! We began at 10:30 AM in the SEL Room as John presented an interesting DXAS Travelogue of 1100 khz complete with IDs, old and new, of 8 stations followed by a roundtable discussion with DXAS members Camille Petrecca, Tim Hendel, and Mike Lantz. There's even an audience of members including Harry Hayes, Jr. of Wilkes-Barre, PA who was very kind to send me a station location map of the WB/ Scranton market for visits of which I made 2 on Monday's return trip, WMXH-750 "Kids Radio" and WARM-590. In the back of the room I caught up with the NRC's "Bethel Boys", Pete "KZ1Z" Kemp from Bethel, CT and Hugh Montgomery of Bethel(Cincinnati), Ohio! Later past 2 PM, John returned with seminars of recent changes in radio, the DAB frequencies, charts, the 1610-1700 khz openings, a Select-A-Antenna demonstration, and a NY City tower site map. Much of this information was similiar to what John used last year at Omaha. All this was followed by 3 NRC DX Verbal Quizes with prizes awarded as John's wife Linda kept track of correct answers with little ribbons for each one: Two sample questions included naming the two 3 letter calls on 750 khz. answer was WSB and KXL and name the frequency of this triple letter call, WLLL, ..answer was 930 khz. Two other interesting presentations from other members took place before and after the quizes, also. One from new member Ron Bailey of Shelby, NC discussing his extensive beverage setup at home along with an Icom 760 to receive 760 new AM stations in roughly a 100 day period this past year! Ron, to be noted, also helped Ron Musco set up the NRC Beverage on Friday morning. The other, held in meeting room 404, was Marc Connelly's demonstration of his phasing unit. Finally, we all had to go back to school and work on Mike Hawk's Criss-Cross Quiz!

Act III Scene IV...As NRC Enfield '93 began to wind down, two final fun events took place for the remaining members. First at 6:30 PM, Ernie Wesolowski reserved a table in the Harley Hotel's restaurant for the unoffical NRC Last Supper of Enfield '93 as we even broke bread, but drank no wine! As for dessert, at least Ken Chatterton and Paul Swearingen got their cake and ate it, too! Then at 8:30, WNRC returned to the air! This was a special moment as all the NRC DJs did "their thing" entertaining(?!) their listening audience: Moved to the spacious second floor SEL Room, spinning the discs were "Bruiser" Bruce Allen(as I kept calling him "Buster" by mistake!)aka Bruce Conti, "Chad Stevens"aka Chris Cuomo, "Brother" Mike Lantz, Laura Mc-Cusker, and a tired "Dr. Johnny Fever"aka me: Why "The Big N"(who said nauseous?!) was even doin' it to "The Big D" WDRC: We even gave words of advice like, "..throw your radio out the window if you can't hear W-N-R-C!" Some people will say anything just to get on the air! I do know that "Bruiser Bruce" had the whole hotel "jumpin' and dancin' in the streets!" Even our DXAS members agreed! Just put a mike and a sticker in front of someone and they go crazy! However, even all good things come to an end, or at least put on hold, as in the early Monday morning hours, WNRC signed off with "See You In September", next September, NRC Nashua '94! (we think)

Act IV The Final Scene...Monday morning, September 6 Labor Day and another beautiful and cool day as Chris and I are packed, with WNRC in the back, and bound for home. Though not before leaving our marks at the Harley Enfield lightpole with 2 well placed stickers of Italian radio "in honor of NRCer Dario Monferini" surrounding a KBZR "K-Rock" one over the NRC '83 stickers. Thus, with a 21 gun salute and taps, NRC Enfield '93 is history!

Again, thanks to Ron Musco for a most enjoyable convention and to all the members I met and interviewed. Also, thanks to my NRC friend Chris Cuomo for sharing our trip and for setting up WNRC. "Bruiser Bruce" says thanks for "The Big N", too! 73s to all!

Changes in programming status; reported by listeners

Welcome to another edition of Formats. I recently had a very interesting telephone conversation with NRC Member Bob Bittner. Bob has turned WJIB-740, Cambridge, MA into a beautiful music station, airing instrumental selections of the type which were once heard over WPAT, KIXI, KHAR, and KABL, as well as on stations all over the FM dial. Bob has bought the long silent WKBR-1250, Manchester, NH over which he will air his delightful format. For years, WKBR was Manchester's rock station. By the way, Bob sells GE Superadios to his listeners (so that they can hear WJIB better, particularly the 5 watt night signal!) via a very comprehensive brochure mailed to homes in his station's service area.

Also in Beantown, WSSH's owners have leased the 50,000 watt outlet on 1510 khz to Talk America, which will air brokered talk and sports over this very directional (out to sea!) powerhouse.

From the oddities in our hobby division, WADS-690 will perhaps be sold to the Second Star of Jacob Church in New Haven. Holding up the sale is a complaint to the FCC from a former CE who alleges that the present owners (who brokered Portuguese) were operating in excess of the 30 watts allowed at night, and left a 14 year old boy in charge of the board at the transmitter on at least one occasion. The aspiring owners plan to air Spanish Christian programming to the Bridgeport and Hew Haven Hispanic communities, and the station will be tended by volunteers.

And WLIR-1300, Spring Valley, NY remains "America's first and New York's only all Jewish radio station". The station broadcasts traditional Yiddish music during drive times and Jewish - oriented talk at other hours. On the Sabbath (Saturdey), adult standards are carried.

CUOMO - 670 THIRD AVENUE - VERONA, PA 15147-1349 ---- Rtaher than bemoan the sorry status of radio, I wish to revise and hopefully revive, a proposition that I put forth in DX NEWS in 1989 when the AM band expansion was first enacted. I had proposed issueing license to low powered (10-250 watts) commercial & non-commercial stations on 2 or 3 of the new AM frequencies. I referred to these as 'Local 2' stations rather than Local 1, the current 'graveyard' stations. The idea is really nothing new, radio in its infancy in the 20's featured many stations with powers as low as 5 watts. These stations wre driven off the air over the years with the enactment of power laws by the FCC. My hometown and several similar nearby suburbs have a total population of 30,000 and hundreds of small businesses that can't afford advertising rates on the Pittsburgh stations. A Loacl 2 station could be the centerpiece of a community if it is operated in that community by that community. Naturally, there would be requirements for the operators similar to methods used in amateur radio licensing. These stations could be highly entertaining and a profitable method of getting people to turn off the TV & turn on the radio again. Next week, my convention report and the doings of WNRC!
