This and That

IT IS surprising that not more book-reviewing is done on the radio.

Publishers have been exceptionally slow to take advantage of a medium which is almost unrivalled for advertising, so those who have made use of radio for that purpose acknowledge.

In New York City ALEXANDER WOOLLCOTT occasionally made reference to a book during his series of CBS broadcasts. In Boston, I know of only two "book-talk" programs, that given over WEEI by Dr. MIRIAM FRANG SKIRBALL, and one over WBZ by E. F. EDGETT.

These series of talks were non-commercial.

The sales of two books in particular, to which WOOLLCOTT referred, HAMMETT'S "The Thin Man" and his own "While Rome Burns," were rather amazing. How much the radio "plug" had to do with the sales it would be difficult to determine as the written reviews were also laudatory. But I imagine the radio's influence was considerable.

Done in the right way, book reviewing on the air should appeal to a large audience.

The speaker should not attempt so much an estimate of the book at hand as giving an idea of what the book is about. There should be quotations from it and a great deal about the author.

Radio Conference At Madrid Makes Television Treaty

75 Colonies and Nations Signatories

Television is of sufficient importance to be provided for in an international radio treaty recently signed by 75 nations and colonies.

Television is described as a "visual broadcasting service: A service carrying on the broadcasting of visual images, either fixed or moving, primarily intended to be received by the general public."

This international treaty, which the United States Senate ratified May 1, provides for establishment of a central office, called the Bureau of International Telecommunication Union. It will prepare annual reports and will be at the disposal of the contracting governments to furnish information and opinions on questions concerning international telecommunication.

The regulations of the treaty were formulated at an International Conference in Madrid, to which the United States sent delegates and which had its opening session on December 9, 1933.

Under the treaty the United States is not obligated except for

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Congress In A Memorial Air Program

A special joint session of Congress, convened in the House Chamber of the Capitol for services commemorating the 100th anniversary of the death of the Marquis DE LAFAYETTE, will be broadcast over both NBC and CBS networks on Sunday, May 20, from noon to 1 P. M.

At that time President ROOSEVELT, introduced by Senator HARRY BYRD of Virginia, will deliver a special address.

ANDRE DE LABOULAYE, Ambassador from France, will read a message from President LEBRUN of France. The Ambassador will be introduced by Representative, MARY T. NORTON of New Jersey.

Representative SOL BLOOM of New York will read the resolution authorizing the joint session of Congress; and Vice President JOHN N. GARNER will preside.

The program includes solos by LAWRENCE TIBBETT, baritone, and LEON ROTHIER, bass, both of the Metropolitan Opera Company, and band selections by the United States Marine Band.

"Radio's Power Is Far-Reaching"

Fr. Ahern Sees School of the Air

Radio is one of the best means for helping a large number of people religiously and, though it will not take the place of the classroom, radio is a distinct aid in adult education.

This is the opinion of the Rev. MICHAEL J. AHERN, S. J., A. M., who for the past three years has conducted the Catholic Truth Hour over the Yankee Network at the request of Cardinal O'CONNELL.

FATHER AHERN spoke of his broadcasts and their purposes:

"These broadcasts are not directed particularly to Catholics, nor do they consist of sermons and music after the fashion of a church service.

"What we try to do is simply to acquaint people with the facts of the Catholic religion. We have talks on religion, which are purely explanatory and not exhortative and the music played on these programs is not restricted to the music of the Catholic Church."

Father AHERN continued his discussion of religion on the air:

"It has been our experience that these broadcasts do a large amount of good. Naturally radio reaches a good many more persons than practically any other medium. The audience comprises many more different

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Federal Trade Commission Investigates Radio Advertising Matter

Will Check For Fraud On the Air

The Federal Trade Commission is going to investigate advertising on all radio stations. According to an article printed in *Broadcasting* magazine, the Commission will, in June, ask all broadcasting stations, networks and transcription producers to send to it periodically copies of all commercial announcements relating to commodities sold in interstate commerce.

This investigation is not to be regarded as a check on the radio industry, but its object is to eliminate fraudulent claims broadcast by makers of products sold in interstate commerce.

A special board of investigation has been formed, composed of E. J. ADAMS, chairman; CLYDE M. HADLEY and W. F. DAVIDSON.

At a recent conference this board set the date of June 1 as the time when all radio stations will begin to send copies of their commercial announcements to the board. In a letter to radio stations the Federal Trade Commission said:

"The Federal Trade Commission, in checking advertising claims and assertions for their truthfulness, is reviewing the field of advertising through radio broadcast.

"You are requested to send to the Board of Investigation copies of all advertising continuities used in local programs broadcast through your facilities during the month of March, 1934."

The jurisdiction of the trade commission extends only to the false and misleading advertising which is broadcast, and it has no power to control the amount or frequency of the plugs.

The way the Board will act in cases where the advertising is fraudulent will be to call it to the attention of the station and the advertiser who will be invited voluntarily to correct it.

Should this be refused, the Federal Trade Board will take steps to force the offender legally to cease.

Radio has been unusually free from abusive advertising. Only half a dozen cases have come before the Federal Trade Commission since 1927, and these have been voluntarily settled by the radio stations.

According to the Commission, a substantial number of advertisers who have been forced out of magazines have resorted to radio. So radio will be checked.

"Radio Will Be Operated Like the Telephone", Says Joe Rines

Orchestra Leader is A Veteran Of the Air

JOE RINES, radio veteran and one of Boston's favorite dance orchestra leaders, has original ideas about the future of radio.

In an interview with *The Microphone*, Mr. RINES prophesied that in a number of years radio will be operated in much the same manner as the telephone is today.

"To get any program he wants from any country he wants," Mr. Rines said, "the listener will dial a number on the side of the radio, just as he dials a number on the telephone.

"The whole affair will be controlled by a central office which will send subscribers a bill for line charges at the end of each month."

RINES' association with radio goes back to 1920, when, he pointed out, it was conducted in a way that now seems absurd.

"Then," he said, "there was no set time to go on the air and whatever was said or done meant very little to the

station owners.

"If we received 10 or 15 letters a day from people telling us they had heard our station, we thought that was great!"

The station with which RINES first was connected was located on Medford Hillside. He told of one incident that

occurred there on a Summer evening as he and some friends were sitting on the porch of the station, listening to the program being broadcast inside.

"Suddenly the telephone rang," Rines reminisced. "A voice on the other end of the wire said, 'Would you mind shutting off your station? KDKA is broadcasting a championship prize fight and your station interferes with my hearing it.' 'Sure,' I said, and shut the station off."

It was over the station in Medford that "Big Brother" BOB EMERY started his famous radio club. At the outset the club increased at the rate of five to eight new members daily. Eventually it increased to the rate of 150 members a day.

A few years ago "Big Brother" had enrolled in the Boston section of his radio club a total of 50,000 children.

"That," said Rines, "is one instance of the tremendous growth of radio."

News From France For Broadcasts

According to an article in *EDITOR* and *PUBLISHER*, the world-wide news reports of L'Agence Havas in Paris are being sold to the Trans-Radio Press Service and the Radio News Service of America. The latter has just been granted permission to broadcast short wave news to radio stations of the country.

According to CAMILLE LEMERCIER, manager for North America for the French News Agency, both contracts are for short terms.

The world news from this agency is received in New York, where it is sent from France by short wave. L'Agence Havas have not yet attempted to sell this news service to American newspapers, although several Canadian papers have been taking it since March.

According to terms of the contract the radio news services do not have to give credit to L'Agence Havas for their news bulletins.

Heifetz Is Guest On 'Hall of Fame'

JASCHA HEIFETZ, world-famous violinist, will be guest of honor on the "Hall of Fame" program Sunday, May 13, at 10:30 P. M. over an NBC-WEAF network.

HEIFETZ, who has made only two previous radio appearances, is stopping off in New York City on his way from Europe to South America particularly for this broadcast.

It may be expected that the young violinist will follow his custom of announcing his own numbers.

"My Maryland" On Palmolive Program

"My Maryland," operetta by SIGMUND ROMBERG, is the presentation on the Palmolive Beauty Box Theatre program next Tuesday evening, beginning at 10.

The operetta, which will be broadcast over the NBC-WEAF network, tells the story of the love of the famous BARBARA FRIETCHEE for a Yankee soldier.

Leading roles will be sung by GLADYS SWARTHOUT, mezzo-soprano, and JOHN BARCLAY.

NBC Carries Programs From Oberammergau

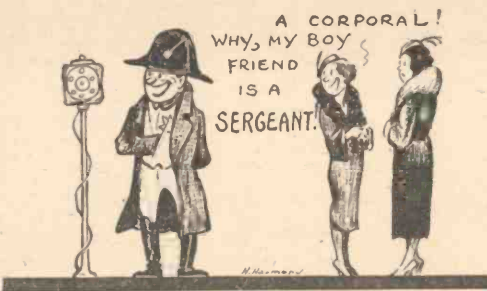

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A Losing Battle

THERE IS every virtue in waging a valiant battle for a lost cause where a worth-while principle is at stake; there is none in fighting a losing battle for dubious reasons. Everyone respects a man who knows when he is licked.

In its effort to deprive the listening public of radio news flashes, the printing press has gone down to defeat. On the Atlantic coast and on the Pacific coast, news is being broadcast despite the printing press attempt at censorship.

Stale news commentaries over the air, culled from hours-old editions of daily newspapers, are not acceptable to the listening public. The public has demanded radio news and the public is getting radio news.

The printing press is licked, and doesn't know it. Ostrich-like, it destroys its own vision by hiding its head in the sand of ignorance, leaving a sensitive portion of its anatomy exposed to the scorn of an informed public. Because it omits from what paltry radio programs it still prints mention of radio news broadcasts, it convinces itself that the public cannot hear them because it will not know where to listen for them.

There are in this country many intelligent editors and publishers. They should take their erring brothers sharply in hand. They should point out the rather obvious fact; news means speed. If the printing press is slower than the radio (and it is) then the public will turn to the radio for its spot news, and consider newspapers only in connection with features and pictures. Development of television shortly will deprive the printing press of its picture appeal.

Progress is inexorable; in any long-drawn-out battle between radio and the printing press, the printing press must lose.

The printing press, if it would continue to be a vital force in American life, must make a willing ally rather than a bitter enemy out of the young giant, radio.

New 'Celebrity' Era In Offing On Air

RADIO lifts another page from vaudeville when MAX BAER, heavyweight championship challenger, comes to the air as the leading man in a radio series called "Taxi." For the radio series with BAER leads up to the actual broadcasting of the title fight in which BAER, as challenger, meets PRIMO CARNERA for the championship, June 14, in New York.

In other words, the fight broadcast will be "the flash finish" to the series—which may carry on even beyond the actual fight if the program clicks.

Acting on the radio is only a slight departure for the boastful BAER, who, by his own admission, could make ALEXANDER THE GREAT look like a panhandler asking for a night's lodging. He stepped from stardom in the prize ring into movie stardom and was so successful as an actor that he can go back into the films on his own right even if one of CARNERA's mighty fists convinces him that he is slightly wrong about being champion. The

films proved he could read lines and that his voice registers well.

Despite the amount of money paid him for his radio work, he regards it as a lot of fun and the rest of the cast, with him at his training camp, are kept in a constant state of hilarity.

The import of BAER's debut into radio as a full-fledged actor is deeper than it appears on the surface, for it indicates that it is possible to use a headline personality as something more than a "I'm glad to have this opportunity to speak to my radio friends" sort of personality capitalization in radio.

You may soon look for ex-statemens to be playing city councilmen and composers like GEORGE GERSHWIN playing themselves in actual dramatizations of their lives. Only one other such case is at hand: BABE RUTH, who is doubled aptly by the experienced actor, HOWARD SMITH.

BAER is cast, not as the contending champion, but as a taxi driver.

The next step will be to take important names in public life, stage and screen channels, and

by skillfully dramatizing their own careers, turn a channel of radio into the same type of human interest for which the American Magazine was once famous. In other words, to take the celebrity apart and see what makes him tick!

To go back to Mr. GERSHWIN, for instance. It would be interesting to people, if he should be cast in a drama of his own life, to know that when he was a youngster he had no apparent talent or appreciation for music. He even thought that there was something radically wrong with any boy who went in for music.

An echo of the World War is on display at Radio City. That may sound funny, but it's exactly that. They have a little cylinder there that is a record of some wireless messages sent by a German-owned station in Sayville, Long Island, in 1915. There is a story behind it.

In the early days of the war it was suspected that messages

transmitted to Europe via Sayville contained a secret code, in violation of this country's neutrality. Government stations at Arlington and Fire Island monitored the Sayville messages, without uncovering anything out of the way.

Finally a secret service man, who was an amateur radio operator, began recording Sayville dot-dash messages. He recorded them for two weeks. The government took them and on that evidence revoked the license of the Sayville station.

Now, after nine years, the cylinders can be played and the wireless messages sent 19 years ago can be heard distinctly.

A story comes to our ears about a radio angel cake. But it's not quite so queer as it sounds. MILDRED W. CARLSON, who conducts a radio cooking school over Station WBZ in Boston, did a broadcast one morning and it was relayed to Europe via short wave.

Music And Philosophy Blend On Tony Wons' CBS Broadcasts

Four Hands That Beat As One

Two Pianists Provide the Background

When two talented pianists and a mellow philosopher of the air get together for the purpose of blending music and philosophy into entertaining programs, the recipe for such a result is sometimes interesting.

PEGGY KEENAN and SANDRA PHILLIPS are the pianists, TONY WONS the philosopher.

These two pianists provide the musical setting for TONY WONS' homespun philosophy over the CBS network on Tuesdays and Thursdays at 1.45 P. M., Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays at 11.30 A. M. and Sundays at 5.15 P. M.

PEGGY KEENAN and SANDRA PHILLIPS have much in common. They are both gifted musicians. They are both slender, sensitive, with much charm and definite ideas as to their unusual arrangements of popular and classical favorites.

PEGGY KEENAN, red-headed and animated, comes from a family of gifted musicians; she numbers five pianists among her close relatives.

At the age of six she began the study of the piano in Los Angeles, her birthplace, and continued her piano studies for 13 years under private tutors.

Entering the University of Southern California, she soon distinguished herself in composition and harmony, graduating with honors. After graduation she studied with two world-famous pianists, LEOPOLD GODOWSKY and SIGISMUND SROJOWSKY, before appearing in concert recitals in Paris, Berlin, and other European music centers. On her return to America, PEGGY revealed unsuspected dramatic talent by playing a straight dramatic role in a Chicago production of "Black Velvet," with minor roles in other plays.

The Meeting

Back in New York again, in 1931, PEGGY met SANDRA PHILLIPS and their similar and sympathetic ideas of music made them an ideal piano team. After theatre performances in the metropolitan area they entered radio in January, 1932, as regular sustaining features of the Columbia network.

SANDRA PHILLIPS, slim, darker, and very easy to look at, was born in Berwick, Pennsylvania, long the home of ex-Secretary WILLIAM H. WOODIN, who was a good friend of the PHILLIPS family.

When only four years of age SANDRA began to pick out tunes by ear on the piano and shortly after she began taking lessons she was improvising melodies of her own. After graduating from high school, SANDRA studied at New York's famous Institute of Musical Art.

In 1930 she made her vaudeville debut with HOWARD MARSH, noted tenor, in leading houses of the metropolitan area. The following year she joined PEGGY RIAT in a two-piano act at the Paramount Theatre and then she became the partner of MISS KEENAN.

In May, 1932, the titian-haired young pianists took part in the first successful broadcast of a musical program from the air. In a specially constructed studio aboard an 18-passenger CURTISS Condor plane, the girls presented their "Piano Pictures" program while flying at a height of two miles over Manhattan.

The two pianos, performers, and microphones were housed in the rear compartment of the plane, which was heavily draped to elimi-

nate motor-noise. The broadcast was Miss PHILLIPS' maiden voyage in the air. The program was picked up by short wave receivers on the roof of the Columbia Broadcasting System Building at 485 Madison avenue, New York, and rebroadcast over a coast-to-coast CBS network.

Child Prodigy

PEGGY KEENAN can't remember the time when she wasn't playing the piano, although even as a child the attractive red-haired PEGGY longed to be an actress. In her early teens, she appeared in leading roles of "Slim Princess," "Modern Cinderella," and other amateur theatrical productions.

At 17 she directed a large chorus of mixed voices and at the same age was organist in a San Diego moving picture house.

If she had her choice today, PEGGY would like to settle in the South of France and spend her Summers in Honolulu. She's an outdoor girl and is an expert at fishing.

SANDRA is a bit the more serious of the two girls. She's fond of Wagnerian operas; "Night and

Day" is her favorite popular melody, and she's fond of reading—TOLSTOY, DUMAS, HARDY and W. SOMERSET MAUGHAM.

There's one idiosyncrasy the two girls have that causes amusement in the studios. SANDRA can't play the piano unless her hands are warm—and PEGGY can't play the piano unless her hands are almost cold.

During this last cold Winter studio engineers were amused watching SANDRA warm her hands on the radiator for 10 or 15 minutes before rehearsing, while PEGGY had her hands out an open window to get them thoroughly chilled.

TONY WONS met these two popular pianists in a Columbia studio a year ago. About to embark on a series of theatre engagements, TONY was wandering about the reception room and listening to SANDRA and PEGGY playing their sustaining program.

He was impressed by their musicianship and the wide range of color and mood in their work, and in music he believed he had found another medium for extending the

meaning of his words. He suggested they join forces in planning novel programs of philosophy and music.

The experiment was a complete success. The talented trio inaugurated a series of joint programs, and enthusiasm for their programs recently won them a coast-to-coast network.

Building A Program

It is an intricate task, this building of convincing and colorful musical settings for the philosophy, poetry and readings of TONY WONS. A fortnight before the programs—say, a week's series—TONY, PEGGY and SANDRA get together with half a dozen scripts.

The girls listen first to the letters and comments that TONY will feature, jotting down a list of compositions which reflect the moods he wishes to capture.

From their repertoire of more than 500 classical, semi-classical, and popular numbers, the girls select a dozen songs in which they believe are reflected the impressions they wish to convey.

Then TONY reads his program slowly while PEGGY and SANDRA, in a sort of musical shorthand all their own, make notations covering every point of inflection, every climax of feeling, or emphasis of certain emotions. Gradually they weave a distinctive musical tapestry, a tone setting of words, which is winning them new hosts of admirers everywhere.

In their "Piano Pictures," the girls present interpretations of fine classical music. Both of them are fond of the music of DEBUSSY,

with PEGGY KEENAN favoring CHOPIN and STRAUSS, and Miss PHILLIPS partial to GRIEG and CHAIKOVSKY.

All three artists—WONS, KEENAN and PHILLIPS—find the music of RACHMANINOFF most striking of all for setting certain moods, and the music of this eminent Russian's melodies set to TONY's famous script on "Shylock" forms one of their best known programs.

So, too, the girls have provided a setting of Northern music for WONS' version of SERVICE's famous ballad, "The Spell of the Yukon," with portions of SIBELIUS' "Finlandia," of MACDOWELL's "Scotch" symphony, and passages from GRIEG's descriptive music of Norway.

Tony Is Enthusiastic

ANTHONY WONS—better known as TONY—is a great promoter of "music by KEENAN and PHILLIPS." He knows and enjoys music and always has had a keen sense of the musical values of words, and of their sympathetic reflections in musical tones.

TONY comes from the lakes and woods of northern Wisconsin and as a child enjoyed to the full the beauties of nature. In addition, he's an enthusiastic fisherman, which is a direct pathway to ripe meditation.

In the course of his youth TONY developed an ambition for many forms of human endeavor. First he wanted to be WILLIAM JENNINGS BRYAN. Then he wanted to be EUGENE V. DEBS.

In between times he compromised by tending furnaces, helping around a butcher shop, cow punching, clerking, playing in a dance band and working as a correspondent in a sales office.

TONY's first job was at the age of 13, soldering type on bars in a typewriter factory; salary \$3.60 a week.

TONY tried college a couple of years, studied stenography and accounting, directed Christmas plays and pageants in Green Bay, Wis., churches.

Finally, bored with all this inactivity, he joined the Army, went to France, and in an open field stopped a large piece of shrapnel which gave him a year and a half in a hospital with nothing to do but read.

This was a turning point in his career. For after those years of activity, rubbing elbows with people in every walk of life, TONY began to think and read and meditate in terms applicable to the problems of men and women. And he had the idea of providing music as a background for the expression of these thoughts.

In private life TONY is much as he is on the air. He is married to a daughter of the Wisconsin woods who shares his love for the country. They have a daughter almost 16.

In his manner of living, TONY expresses much of his philosophy. He built himself a cottage on the shore of a lake in the woods. He built his own boat. He built the wharf to which it is tied.

He likes to buy new clothes, but prefers to wear old ones.

Choir Of English Cathedral To Broadcast For First Time

The first broadcast from famous Ripon Minster, Yorkshire, England, will be heard over the WABC-Columbia network as a Whit-Sunday feature on May 20 at 3.45 P. M.

The broadcast will bring to listeners the ringing of the chimes and the first radio recital by the cathedral's choir and brief addresses by the Bishop and the Mayor of Ripon.

Ripon Minster, considered one of the loveliest cathedrals in England

was founded in 670 A. D. It was here that Archdeacon DODGSON, LEWIS CARROLL's father, was canon.

At the time of the broadcast it will be 9 P. M. in England and the chimes will ring out a curfew.

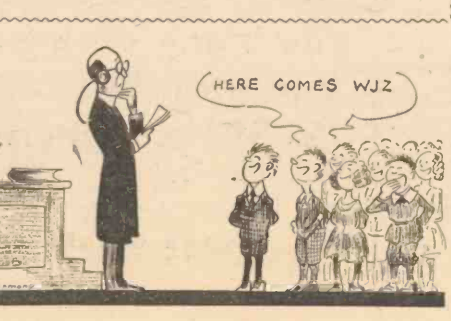

Bergman Heads Cast of Variety Program
Sponsored by Van Heusen

Teddy Bergman, a stumble-bum with words and front runner in the field of humor, is the head man on the new semi-weekly WEEL broadcast offerings sponsored by Phillips-Jones Corporation, makers of Van Heusen shirts and collars. The program is heard each Tuesday and Thursday evening at 7.30 P. M. and in a fortnight has established a substantial and enthusiastic following.

Versatility is the keynote of Bergman's success as a radio entertainer. The creator of numerous "boob" roles, he also has a famous aptitude for dialect comedy, having masqueraded before the microphone as Swedish, Jewish and Dutch gentleman, an inhabitant of Mars and on a children's feature, as a talking horse.

Probably Teddy's most vapid and comic character role is that of "Blubber," the Van Heusen shirt salesman, in the present WEEL quarter-hour series. It is a far cry from managing a New York gymnasium, his workaday job before entering radio and after capturing the intercollegiate wrestling championship at Columbia University. Such is the background of this radio funny man who has been heard frequently on the Eddie Cantor programs, "March of Time" and other outstanding air shows.

"Van Heusen Time" also features Betty Queen, contralto, the Rondoliers, unusual male quartette that needs no introduction to radio listeners, and Ernest Chappell and Betty Garde, well-known Broadway dramatic stars. Although, the feature has unusual entertainment value.

Twice Weekly Edison Salute Is Unique Program Feature

A few bars from the overture "Die Meistersingers" by Wagner, and the Edison Salute is on the air. Heard twice weekly on Tuesdays at 6.45 P. M. and on Thursdays at 6.45 P. M. for more than eighteen months, it is consistently among local listeners' "best bets," replete with first quality musical entertainment, a smattering of dramatized effort and a minimum of advertising.

Its theme, past and present, is unique in many ways. For a period of ten months salutes were given to various communities and landmarks within the territory served by The Edison Company of Boston, program sponsors. Subsequently salutes were given to numerous long established manufacturing and mercantile establishments in New England and

since the first of the present year, the dominant theme has been contrasting scenes of New England life as lived before and since the introduction of electricity.

Old songs and new bear out the new formula, with the musical portion of the program interpreted by Del Castillo, organist, Willie Morris, soprano, and Russell Dor, baritone. Humorous sketches from the pen of Robert Burlin, vividly portray the old and modern New England home life in dramatized interludes.

Not infrequently, the miniature air dramas require additional character players to achieve a true historical setting or situation, although, ordinarily, the vocal duo and "Del" are the character play-actors in the

variety of roles assigned to them by Burlin, who is the program narrator, actor, author and production man.

For the duration of the May month, shades of Poe's "Goldbug," Stevenson's "Treasure Island" and other classics rich in pirate lore will register their influence on the "Salute" programs. Songs of the sea and buccaneer drama will serve to relate in an unusual and interesting way the theme of "treasure hunting" to tie in with a novel treasure hunt contest being conducted by the Edison merchandising department.

The programs are musically snappy, educational from the historical viewpoint and typically WEEL for presentation finesse.

Short Wave Speeds Rideout's Service
WEEL Again Pioneers

E. B. Rideout, WEEL meteorologist, is utilizing a new method of fact finding on which to base his forecasts, by taking via short wave the 9.05 A. M. and P. M. complete reports from station NAA, the U. S. Naval Observatory, at Arlington, Virginia. Thus, with a member of the WEEL operating staff taking the code reports which are much more complete than the telegraphed information now and heretofore utilized, Rideout, without journeying twice daily to the local weather bureau, has, at an earlier hour, strictly up-to-the-minute data.

The Arlington reports encompass such distant points as the Canal Zone and the Alaskan peninsula. While the time for the presentation of the WEEL weather service broadcasts remains at 8 A. M. and 11 P. M. with daylight saving, the new technique in gathering information not only furnishes substantially more data for Rideout to work with, but speeds up his specialized service to mercantile and other businesses which, in increasing numbers, are finding it profitable to take his "long range" (advance) forecasting dope sheets and last minute information on current conditions.

The short wave receiver which he will accomplish this new bit of pioneering in the field of radio weather forecasting will become a part of his office equipment with the numerous other pieces of meteorological apparatus installed at his WEEL headquarters.

The "Little Theatre Off Times Square" Is Actually In Chicago

Features A New Drama Each Friday

The Little Theatre off Times Square—people who never have been within hundreds of miles of New York crowd into its lobby each Friday evening, take their seats while ERIC SAGERQUIST's orchestra plays the overture, and await with excitement the rise of the curtain which will bring them another First Nighter drama.

As well known as some American theatres, attended by a nation-wide audience each week, the Little Theatre off Times Square is, of course, a myth. Rather, it is one of the National Broadcasting Company studios in Chicago, seating a visible audience of 200 persons as JUNE MEREDITH, DON AMECHE and the First Nighter cast enact their weekly drama.

But in cities, towns and hamlets from Maine to California millions find their way, in fancy, into this theatre each Friday night for another premiere. No old-time favorites "revived," no familiar stories dramatized for radio. A new play every week, presented for the first time anywhere. And with it comes to the vast invisible audience all the bustle and thrill, tension and glamour that mark the premiere of a real Broadway show.

Showman Hughes

Now in its fourth year over the networks of the NBC, First Nighter is the product of the showmanship of CHARLES P. HUGHES, the genial First Nighter himself, who weekly conducts the audience to the theatre. With the instinct of the true showman, HUGHES builds up the Broadway atmosphere in which his show is presented.

The roar of Broadway traffic, the suggestion of the theatre lobby, the mumble of the page boys, the chatter of the audience, then the first notes of the program's theme song and there is created a scene so vivid that those who know their Broadway say the program brings the thrills of a night on the Great White Way.

The idea for First Nighter came to Mr. HUGHES early in 1930, after he had devoted some eight years to radio, as advertising salesman, producer and actor.

One evening JUNE MEREDITH, a Chicago girl who had followed the traditional path to New York to begin her stage career, was induced to take part in a radio play over a Chicago station. HUGHES heard the program.

Next morning he telephoned her, arranged for a meeting, and a few weeks later First Nighter was on the air, with Miss MEREDITH as the star. In November, 1930, the program came to the National Broadcasting Company networks to commence a uninterrupted run.

In Fourth Year

During the three and a half years of its run over NBC networks, JUNE has missed only one performance, and that because of an appendicitis operation. HUGHES likewise has taken part in all but one performance, his absence that time being occasioned by illness.

The versatility of the leading characters of this program is as amazing as is the volume of plays which pours in to Mr. HUGHES from writers throughout North America. JUNE MEREDITH, a product of the New York Theatre Guild, is always the leading lady. DON AMECHE, still in his twenties, and CLIFF SOUBIER, a veteran of the

stage, are the other stand-bys of the show.

On successive weeks JUNE has played such widely diverse roles as those of a gangster's moll, a sweet Southern college girl, a nagging wife, a flapper, a wall-flower and a villainess.

Besides playing the Theatre Guild, JUNE acted in stock and appeared with RICHARD BENNETT in "He Who Gets Slapped." On the first anniversary of the First Nighter, some 32,000 listeners in all parts of the country showered her with letters and telegrams of congratulation.

Leading Man

DON AMECHE, leading man, meant to be a lawyer, and to that end studied at Marquette University, Georgetown and at the University of Wisconsin. But at Wisconsin DON got his first smell of grease paint and thereafter law was forgotten. He joined a stock company, moved to New York, and

played in vaudeville with the late TEXAS GUINAN.

AMECHE was married in November, 1932, to his college sweetheart. Now There's a DON AMECHE, Jr.

CLIFF SOUBIER has been in the show business since birth. He was born while his father and mother were trouping with a medicine show, and little CLIFF was cradled in the tray of a trunk. At the age of five he had to don a white gown and golden curls and go to heaven every night on a rope as Little Eva in "Uncle Tom's Cabin."

Since then CLIFF has played everything from Shakespeare to burlesque, on stages from Broadway to the outermost edge of the sticks.

He came to radio quite by accident, when he was dragged into the studio to fill the place of a missing actor. At the time CLIFF was sitting patiently in the reception room, waiting for his wife, an actress whom he met while playing in "Rain," to complete her program.

Since then, Mrs. SOUBIER has deserted radio and the stage to be simply Mrs. SOUBIER, leaving CLIFF to carry on the tradition.

Mother Of The President Speaks

Mrs. JAMES ROOSEVELT, mother of the President, will speak over the NBC-WEAF network on Sunday, May 13, during a special Mother's Day program.

She will be heard in a program to be presented at 3 P. M., under the auspices of the Golden Rule Foundation. Dr. JOHN H. FINLEY, associate editor of The New York Times, will be the other speaker.

J. Lhevinne Resumes His Air Recitals

JOSEF LHEVINNE, noted pianist, resumes his radio work on Thursday, May 17, when he makes the first of three appearances as soloist with the NBC Symphony Orchestra, under the direction of FRANK BLACK.

The concerts will be broadcast over an NBC-WJZ network, beginning at 10.30 P. M.

The pianist will play the first movement from CHAIKOVSKY's piano concerto with the orchestra on the initial program and as solo will offer RUBENSTEIN's "Staccato" Etude.

The orchestral portion of the program includes RACHMANINOV's "Humoresque."

radio as the American delegates did not sign the telephone and telegraph regulations of the agreement.

All governments, including the American, maintain the right to hold up dispatches that are judged dangerous to the safety of the State or in violation of the laws.

It is made clear, however, that the sender of the offending dispatch must be notified immediately that his message is being held up.

The international conference also has insisted that the international code be revised so that the code words are reduced to a maximum of five letters from 10.

This system has been followed domestically in the United States for 30 years.

kinds of people than any other audience. And there is an endless category of people which radio alone can reach."

Father AHERN has, since 1926, been head of the department of geology at Weston College, Weston, Massachusetts. Previously he has been president of Canisius College in Buffalo, N. Y.

As an educator, Father AHERN commented on radio education:

"Education on the radio is best when it is directed to adults. Next year we are going to try an experiment in educational radio programs. The idea, as it is at present, is to publish an advance list of a series of programs by qualified speakers which will be put on the air throughout the Winter.

"One of the best ways to efficiently promote educational programs is to have the listening done in groups. In this way there is opportunity for discussion, which is one of the best aids to education.

"Eventually we intend to make this a radio correspondence school and standardize it so that educational institutions may accept certificates from students at the radio school."

The "we" referred to by Father AHERN is the National Committee on Radio in Education, of which Father AHERN is a member. It is convening in Washington to discuss the possibilities of radio education, with a view toward making approximately 15 per cent of all radio programs educational in nature.

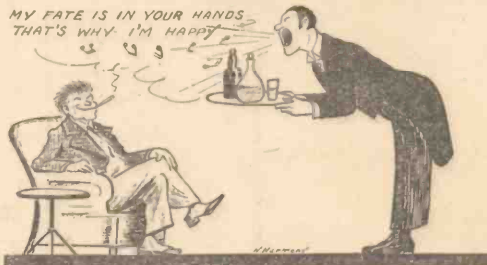

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Spanning the World

WITH A view to conveying to the listening audience the wonders of modern telephone, telegraph and cable systems, the Columbia Broadcasting System's Public Events and Special Features Department is now in the process of presenting a series of programs demonstrating the workings of world-wide communication devices.

The first program, presented in conjunction with the American Telephone and Telegraph Company, was devoted principally to demonstrating the overseas branch of telephonic communication.

Within four minutes, calls were put in to London, Buenos Aires and Honolulu.

In London Cesar Saerchinger, Columbia's European representative, outlined the plans for international broadcasts during the coming weeks, with special emphasis on the international sport plans.

In Honolulu and Buenos Aires, Paul Douglas talked with the telephone company officials.

While it takes your voice only 1-60th of a second to reach London, it is surprising what can happen to it in that time. If you talk in a normal tone it is amplified and sent to the transmitting station, which will amplify it some 75 million times and shoot it off the antenna.

At the British receiving station it again is amplified approximately a billion times, and finally reaches your friend at about the same volume as a local call. Some people when calling raise their voices to be sure they are heard across the Atlantic. If this is the case, it is amplified somewhat less and reaches the other side in a normal tone, though perhaps less intelligible, due to the fact that enunciation invariably suffers in shouting.

The second in the series was a demonstration of a record-breaking girdling of the globe by telegraph and cable. It's a long stride from the first trip round the

world made by Magellan's ships in 1,083 days, to the recent demonstration in which all records were shattered by encompassing the world in 3 minutes and 46 seconds.

The first dispatch to follow the route of this message was sent 31 years ago by President Theodore Roosevelt to Mr. Clarence Mackay and it took some 12 minutes. In

1932, celebrating the 100th anniversary of the telegraph, a message travelling the same route required four minutes and ten seconds.

This program which was worked out with the aid of the International Telephone and Telegraph Corporation, gave the route taken by the message as it was sent around the world. The words, "Greetings Around the World," were sent by Col. Sosthenes Bern, president of the I. T. & T. in New York, and received by William S. Paley, president of the Columbia Broadcasting System, also in New York.

The message went from New York to San Francisco by telegraph, across the Pacific along the giant cable which clings to the ocean floor, descending into vast submarine valleys and rising to scale the mountains of the sea.

When the message reached Shanghai, it had passed the international date line into "tomorrow." With only one manual operation, the greeting was sent from Shanghai to London, across Mongolia and Siberia, along the route Wiley Post flew his airplane, on to Finland where it proceeded under the North Sea to the British Isles.

Automatic relays placed at intervals along the line stepped up the message to carry it from point to point without a break. From London the message was sent by cable under the Atlantic, back to New York.

For the third in the series, Western Union joined forces with Columbia, dramatizing the sending of telegrams to four corners of the United States.
