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New Year Promises Better Times For American Radio Industry

All Business Is Reported On Upgrade

Better times face the radio industry as 1934 passes into history and the New Year dawns.

Optimism over the future is being exuded by leaders in virile infant art.

Reports to government bureaus indicate the doldrums have been passed; that business is on the upgrade in radio.

President ROOSEVELT will give a Christmas greeting to the Nation over the radio when at 4:30 o'clock on Christmas eve he lights the National Community Christmas tree in Lafayette Square across the street North of the White House.

Secretary of Commerce ROPER will participate in the ceremonies, which the two major broadcasting companies broadcast over a coast-to-coast network.

Created in this ageing year was the Federal Communications Commission, with its Broadcast Division. It has just begun to function. Groundwork has been laid for far-reaching decisions in the immediate future.

Soon a report will be filed with Congress giving recommendations on that bitter issue of whether non-profit organizations—educational, religious and fraternal groups—shall be allotted a specific proportion of the broadcasting channels.

Observers predicted the Commission would not recommend a radical change in the present setup, but instead offer a compromise course in which greater attention will be given to the requirements of educational forces.

Regardless of the Commission's recommendations the fight will be renewed by the educators for legislation by Congress.

In the Senate they will lay their case before Senator BURTON K. WHEELER (D) of Montana, for he is to be chairman of the Senate Interstate Commerce Committee, which has jurisdiction over radio legislation.

WHEELER will succeed Senator CLARENCE C. DILL (D) of Washington, as chairman. DILL was not a candidate for re-election.

Shortly after the New Year dawns there probably will be a new member of the Broadcast Division of the FCC. Rep. ANNING S. PRALL (D) of New York, is slated to succeed HAMPSON GARY.

A high spot in the 1934 record of radio was the steady drum-fire of Senator SCHALL (D) of Minnesota, against claimed efforts of "New Dealers" to establish a governmental radio system similar to the government-controlled stations in Germany, Soviet Russia and Italy.

Repeated assertions by President ROOSEVELT and other high administration officials that nothing of the kind was contemplated failed to still the barrage from SCHALL and other champions of free speech over the radio.

The Federal Trade Commission injected itself into the radio situation several times during 1934, when it conducted drives against fraudulent advertising over the ether. The result of the drives was that radio advertisers were found to be as truthful as any other advertisers.

Queer Instruments Are Used In Modern Jazz Orchestras

One Band Leader

Grows His Own Instruments

NOVELTY orchestral arrangements are the rage these days, and as a consequence musicians have been busy inventing instruments to give an extra flare to comic or exotic numbers.

It seems that GRACIE ALLEN isn't quite so dizzy as she sounded on a recent broadcast when she said:

"My brother invented a violin, but you blow it like a saxophone and it has a keyboard like a piano, but what really makes it play it when you squeeze it like an accordion, and pull it in and out like a trombone."

"Doesn't it have strings like a banjo?" demanded her partner, GEORGE.

"No, my brother didn't want to complicate it," retorted GRACIE.

Instruments are being invented every day which are just as complicated as her brother's new violin.

Young JOE HAYMES invented an instrument that inspired WAYNE KING's novelty number, "Goofus." And this contraption, which has an accordion-like quality in its twangy trumpeting, is known as the goofus horn.

The instrument looks as goofy as it sounds. The mouthpiece is attached to two feet of rubber tubing which in turn is attached to a two-foot cylindrical brass horn with 22 stops. It took JOE's first trumpet some three months of patient practice to learn to keep the strange blasts of the goofus horn under control.

Nowadays, no first-class flutist goes to rehearsal without a "sweet potato" in his pocket. The "sweet potato" or ocarina is made of clay. It sounds rather like a flute, but has a more warm or exotic quality.

ANDRE KOSTELANETZ, on his program Monday, Wednesday and Friday at 9 P.M., over CBS, writes in ocarina solos for special effects. So

does MARK WARNOW, on his "Forty-Five Minutes in Hollywood" scores.

There is an epidemic among musicians to raid the five and ten cent store and buy up toy instruments, trumpets, pianos and ukels, for novelty effects.

HOWARD NELSON HALL (better known as "JOE HORSE") in the Casa Loma band, created a sensation on a special arrangement for the "Caravan" by playing a toy piano. He tuned up its tinkling so that it would synchronize with the band, and it has become a permanent part of their bandstand equipment.

ANDRE KOSTELANETZ has discovered that a newspaper laid across a piano's insides gives the effect of a harpsichord, which husky vibrating comes in handy when playing an old-fashioned piece like "Crimoline Days."

LEON BELASCOS' drummer planted some maraca seeds in a flower pot and now boasts of growing his own instruments. The maraca is the large seed pod of a Cuban plant, and when it is dried the seeds rattle when it

is shaken to punctuate a rumba. Gourds also are used in tango and rumba, gourds which are scraped or beaten rhythmically by claves, small sticks.

JOHNNY GREEN invented one of the most convincing of musical sound effects. It is his tuned champagne popper which makes bass, alto and soprano-like pops. He invented it to make succulent explosions during the "Corks and Bottles" theme of his "Night Club Suite," and the implement has since been borrowed by other conductors to liven up such numbers as "Pop Goes My Heart."

JOHNNY also has in his possession two voodoo drums. They were brought to JOHNNY by a friend who returned from a visit to Haiti, and who also recorded the ceremonial drum beats and chants. JOHNNY plans to write an elaborate symphony around voodoo ceremonies.

Musical engineers of the instrument companies are constantly developing and putting on the market instruments with new tone quality. There is the octarimba, which is a combination marimba-xylophone-piano and which, when played by one person, sounds as if it were being played by two.

There is a new accordion which is played entirely like a piano, and has a new range. The recently developed clarosax looks like a toy clarinet and has a soprano saxophone tone quality. The tiple looks like a ukulele but has eight strings.

Broadcasts from South Are Clear

During the past few weeks, while evening trans-Atlantic reception on the short wave bands has been limited to the 49-meter German, English and Italian outlets, the waves from Central and South American regions have stepped up with supplementing programs.

HJ1ABB, Barranquilla, Colombia; YV3RC, Caracas, Venezuela, and PRF5, Rio de Janeiro, remain the outstanding and most reliable emanations from the southern countries, but quite a few other signals now are building up in volume and quality until they may soon at least rival the three favorites.

TIEP, "La Voz del Tropic," at San Jose, Costa Rica (6.71 mcs.) is one of the new stations gaining much popularity among American ether explorers.

Fascinating native music from the local cafes and not so fascinating American dance music from the same cafes make up TIEP's usual transmissions. The volume is generally very good and the programs are clear.

The Costa Rican doesn't announce any too much in English, but now and then, as a rule on the hour, drifts up the call:

"This is TIEP, La Voz del Tropic, the long and short wave station at San Jose, Costa Rica, Central America." And from not so many miles away comes another wave—this a new one that flashes out from the city of Panama.

The frequency is 49.84 meters, 6.03 megacycles, and the broadcasting hours have been approximately 8 to 10:30 P. M.

The Panama broadcaster carries both a Spanish and English announcer, who "sing" the location "Panama, Republic of Panama" after each selection. Although on the air an hour later, Panama has

CBS Issues A Yearly Manual for Teachers

The Columbia Broadcasting System, on behalf of the American School of the Air, has just published the 1934-1935 edition of its Teachers Manual and Classroom Guide as an aid in augmenting broadcast instruction.

The manual, issued for the sixth successive year, directs reference work and active participation in the subjects treated during the School of the Air programs on the nationwide CBS network.

The Teachers Manual is compiled by HELEN JACOBSON, broadcasting director of the American School of the Air.

The contents include synopses of each day's radio projection, footnoted with music references and visual aids, such as lantern slides, paintings and illustrated books; helpful publications, news bulletins, motion pictures and vocational guidance bibliography.

Consulting the daily schedule of the American School of the Air, teachers may turn to the manual for choice of broadcasts heard over the WABS-Columbia network from 2:30 to 3 P. M., EST, including Monday, History; Tuesday, Literature; Wednesday, Geography; Thursday, Music, and Friday, Vocational Guidance and current international events.

Each year, Columbia receives requests for approximately 50,000 copies of its Teachers Manual and Guide, which lists the year's programs in advance, gives suggestions for their use in the school room, and is distributed free to all educators requesting it.

The manuals, which often consist of more than a hundred pages, are intended primarily for free distribution to teachers only.

Another has had a news commentator, and he's wondering if people still like to have their current events analyzed for them.

There is in the radio industry a new disease. The lads who think up words like halitosis and so on might well define it in lengthy scientific terms, but, to an onlooker fairly close to the actual scene, it can be termed over-familiarity.

A sponsor buys a program and every time it goes on the he hears it. Today he may listen to another sponsor's program but tomorrow night he is going out to play bridge so he misses the third sponsor's program. But his own—never.

Tibbett Depicts Radio Christmas Without Advertising

why I should like to see everyone else have a vacation then. So my first idea would be a Christmas present that radio could give everyone. And it would be a Christmas present that only radio could give. And a personal gift like that is always the best.

"Suppose all radio advertisers got together and said: 'These people have been kind enough to listen to our advertising for a whole year. Why not give them one day with no advertising at all? Give them programs, the best programs, but have it all a jolly party between artists and listeners. For, after all, Christmas is a day of good will.'"

When LAWRENCE TIBBETT uses the word "vacation," he means it. He has a yacht on which he spends as many days as

he can in Summer. It is to this, and tuna fishing, that he turns after a long season with the Metropolitan, where he is called upon to work perhaps harder than any other artist.

For instance, last year during the opera's season in Boston, he sang in "I Pagliacci" and "Emperor Jones" in one evening, a notable task for any singer. Now he is on a concert tour and shortly will resume his place with the Metropolitan.

Speaking of the double performance in Boston, he said:

"I shall not do that again. It was really too hard work."

"But to get back to my Christmas program," he continued. "First, we'll abolish advertising. Next in order, I think, would be to avoid repeating the fine old Christmas music, that everyone knows and loves.

"It seems to me that if you

hear "Stille Nacht" sung or played six or seven times during Christmas Eve, it takes something away from the music. Whereas, if you hear it once or, at most, twice, you still retain your love for that hymn.

"But there is no need for such repetition. There is enough good Christmas music to last a whole day. Some of it may not be so familiar to many persons, but it could become familiar if radio would use more of it.

"I have songs in mind that are not necessarily hymns. But jolly, robust songs, Songs of hearty good cheer. I like to sing this type myself. Perhaps that is why I suggest them for this program."

Mr. TIBBETT paused and contemplated for a moment the lights of the city outside. He went on:

"Christmas is different from any other day in the year for people. It is a day that seems just a bit better than the rest of the year. Radio could help make it seem more so, help people to increase their sense that Christmas was not just a day when the afternoon sunshine looked a bit different.

"And that brings me to my third idea. Let's have nothing but the very best on the air for that one day, so that all listeners, no matter where they tune in, can get a program of more than usual value.

"I guess that's a pretty ideal radio Christmas," concluded LAWRENCE TIBBETT, "but it is not impossible. It would be a fine radio Christmas for me, and, I am sure, for the other millions of radio listeners."

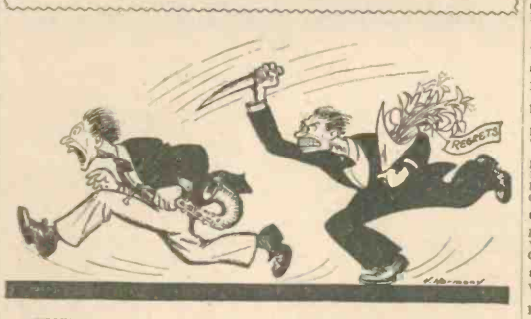

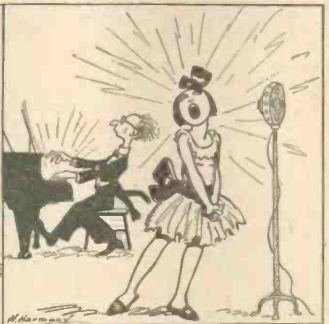

Bing Crosby and Boswell Sisters Form Mutual Admiration Society

Singer Was Editor and An Athlete

By ROSELLEN CALLAHAN

They travelled parallel roads for three years, and cast admiring glances at each other, until one sponsor decided to put them on the same program.

It seemed as if BING and the BOSWELLS were destined always just to miss each other.

The "California Melodies" program from KHJ in Los Angeles was the original stepping-off point for these stars.

Here it was that the BOSWELLS, a trio from Louisiana, made their network debut.

And over this same station, and on this same program at another date, BING CROSBY also made his network debut.

The BOSWELLS had concluded a vaudeville tour and settled down in California for radio and movie work.

BING was one-third of the Rhythm Boys, the male trio that was packing them in at the Coconut Grove, patronized by the screen luminaries.

Here the BOSWELLS would sit at a ringside table and enthusiastically applaud CROSBY's solo numbers.

Their guest appearance on "California Melodies" was the turning point in the careers of the BOSWELLS and BING CROSBY.

Both were rewarded with "big time" offers, and the program which had cradled many a star radio performer, sent East the future exponents of distinctive rhythms.

Bing Comes East

During the three-year interlude, from the time of their debuts to their joint appearance, they came close to working together—several times.

While CONNIE, VET and MARTHA were making a name for themselves with their distinctive BOSWELL rhythms on the air, BING CROSBY had decided to take an important step.

Having received many offers to go to New York, BING finally left California and came East to join the Columbia staff of air personalities.

Slated for a build-up, he sat all one afternoon in the publicity offices of the Columbia Broadcasting System while the publicity men shot questions at him.

To the queries of what color he liked best, what his favorite dessert might be, and what he

considered the best radio act on the air, he answered: Blue, lobster diavolo, and the BOSWELL Sisters.

Although the young crooner was engaged to appear on the same series as the BOSWELLS later on, he still couldn't count the BOSWELLS among his studio companions, for they had left the program to embark on a European tour.

The Meeting

The first vehicle that brought them together was the film, "The Big Broadcast," featuring the principal stars of the airwaves.

Although BING had appeared in films on the Coast, it was this picture that definitely revealed not only his ability as a singer, but a rare sense of humor and ease before the camera.

From the night of the film's premiere, CROSBY was slated for big things.

For the past two years he has been living on the Coast, turning out pictures that have stamped him one of the biggest box-office attractions in the industry.

Even when he had been off the air for the better part of a year, BING was chosen in a nationwide radio contest as the most popular male singer.

When the BOSWELLS returned

this year to the scene of their first triumphs, and assumed a prominent position in the film capital, the sponsors who presented CROSBY in his series last year saw an opportunity of snaring the reigning rhythm potentates for their Tuesday series of programs over the Columbia network.

Mutual Admiration

The hot harmonies of the sister trio are a contrast to the lilting melodies of BING's "boo boo boo booms."

The mutual admiration society of BING and the BOSWELLS is supported by GEORGIE STOLL and his orchestra, another product of the West Coast, and the maestro of CROSBY's present phonographic recordings.

BING and the BOSWELLS have something else in common besides the same sponsor.

"They had parents who encouraged them in their chosen careers from the start.

BING always wanted to be an actor. His nickname, in fact, came from the violent "bing, bang, booms" with which he imitated a blunderbuss in boyhood performances of "GUSTER'S Last Stand," in the park.

For he was born HARRY LILLIS CROSBY, Jr., in Tacoma, Washington.

At college he went in for athletics and edited the college paper. But those activities didn't make him neglect the dramatic and glee clubs, nor the debating society.

He knew what he wanted then, and he still does.

Hot Rhythms

CONNIE, VET and MARTHA studied violin, cello and piano

for 12 years before they decided to learn to play the sax and the banjo.

MARTHA kept her place at the piano but all three discarded classical music for the hottest rhythms.

It wasn't long after this that they began to sing—and discovered themselves to be specialists in vocal harmonies.

While the BOSWELL String Trio, of whose fame Mr. and Mrs. BOSWELL had dreamed, never came into being, the girls could not be said to be a disappointment to their parents.

They are, in fact, carrying on the musical endeavors of their father, mother, aunt and uncle who were known as the BOSWELL Quartet, and whose combined voices attracted attention at amateur musicales in New Orleans.

The younger BOSWELLS are just a year apart in age.

MARTHA is the eldest, CONNIE next, and then VET.

When they are not singing and playing, each one likes to pursue her favorite hobby.

CONNIE writes—plays, poems and short stories, but only for her own amusement.

She never has submitted any for publication, and refuses to show them.

VET spends her spare time painting, while MARTHA's fun is really work. She develops their musical arrangements.

been closing at the same time as TIEP.

Another of the new Spanish signals reaches us on 6:39 megs. (47 meters) and emanates out of the Venezuelan city, Caracas. This mountain city already can boast of two well-established short wave broadcasters in 2RC and 3RC.

Although the call letters of the newcomer are hard to catch, they seem to be YV4RC, a transmitter that previously worked on the 51-meter spectrum with not-too-much success.

Reception from Caracas is all right now on 6:39 megs, but it varies in signal strength consider-

ably. At times it has tremendous volume, only to fade off a few minutes later.

The Mexican XEBT on 6:01 megacycles also is drifting up to local areas well the past few weeks. It is on practically the same spot as the Cuban COC. The latter signs off at 6 P. M.

XEBT then comes on and remains with enjoyable programs until 11 P. M. or midnight—sometimes even later. It is easily found just off the low frequency side of DJC, Zeesen, Germany.

Even during the mornings, probably for the first time, we are receiving Spanish programs

The station responsible is COH, Havana, Cuba.

It has been on between 10 and 11 A. M. and hitting here in splendid fashion. The broadcasts are sponsored by the lottery firms and other local organizations. Tune them in on 31.91 meters or 9:42 megs.

COH also operates in the evenings, coming on at 5 o'clock. However, it does the most good during the morning, when the globe-trotting fans sometimes globe-trot. When German DJB cut its morning broadcasts to America, something was needed to take its place.

THE WRAPPING of Christmas presents is more important than many of us realize. Attractive wrapping undoubtedly enhances one's gift—no matter what it is!

The exterior of a parcel may, and in our mind should, express something of the donor's personality. If it is stereotyped and uninteresting, it shows either a lack of imagination or a feeling that it was not worth bothering about—certainly an unfortunate sentiment to convey with a gift. Conversely, a package wrapped with taste and individuality implies that you have taken particular pains to please a certain person, and hence adds immeasurably to your gift.

WITH the large variety of inexpensive colored cellophane ribbons and papers, there is no excuse for those of us who still stick to red or white tissue paper and gold string. "Not only will this hurt the actor, but think of the tremendous harm it will do to the theatres.

"I believe the actors should organize!" BAKER said, as he slapped his fist against his open palm. "They should organize to safeguard their box office rights."

"Every time there is a free performance given, it means so many less tickets sold at the theatre. If the sponsor's new scheme of exhibition performances becomes popular, Heaven alone knows where the theatres and their people will wind up."

Twenty years ago, PHIL BAKER competed for a prize in an amateur show at the old Bowdoin Square Theatre. He won the prize—50 cents.

The prize bought him a meal. A few weeks ago he returned to Boston and looked upon the scene of his struggle for a meal. He chuckled the chuckle of one of the highest paid comedians in the country.

La Guardia Is Keeping 810 For WNYC

Decision of Mayor LAGUARDIA of New York to continue WNYC, municipal station there, has frustrated, temporarily at least, plans by other stations.

WVL of New Orleans, operated by Loyola University, and WLWL of New York, operated by the Paulist Fathers, were reported negotiating to obtain 810 kilocycles, which are now used by WNYC.

They wanted to share time on that wave band, but LAGUARDIA seems to like WNYC.

WVL now operates on 850 kilocycles, while WLWL broadcasts on 1400 kilocycles.

Negotiations had been on for several months for WCCO at Minneapolis to switch from 810 to 850 as a part of the move to have Loyola University and the Paulist Fathers take over 810.

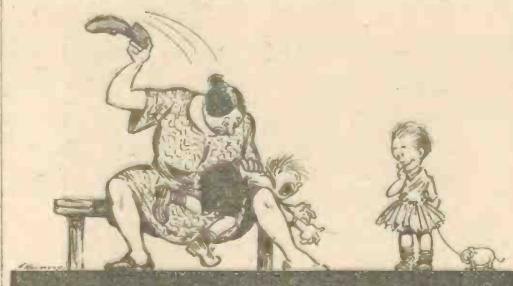

All he did was march at the end of a parade that he wanted to follow for a while, and was lost for two days.

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One Jump Ahead

ANDRE KOSTELANETZ is the "Little Man, What Now?" of the Columbia Broadcasting System.

His orchestral presentations and accompaniment arrangements for stars Rosa Ponselle, Nino Martini and Grete Stueckgold have an original and distinguished flavor.

"In radio, particularly, you must keep a jump ahead of any musical trend," says Maestro Kostelanetz.

"You must never stay the same. I am satisfied in my efforts if I discover that people are wondering 'what is he going to do next?'" And what is Andre doing this season?

He is abandoning the more complicated and intricate of orchestral arrangements and specializing in tone quality.

He has spent hours in the control room during rehearsal getting the finest band balance out of his 40 musicians.

Andre discovered, for instance, that having his brass section "play into the floor" gave a quality on the air of being almost in another plane.

He spent long hours in the early morning, the very early morning after midnight, in smoky Harlem dance halls, learning some of the secrets of muting brasses and trick effects which colored bands have a genius for discovering.

Andre spent three months this Summer in Europe, accumulating a portfolio and a mind full of interesting ideas for the American airwaves after musical research in London and Paris, and travels in Scotland, Belgium, Switzerland and Italy.

Now his watchword, during rehearsals of his programs is simply a constant query:

"Is it pleasant to the ear—is it charming?"

A simple, poignant arrangement of a tune is his favorite presentation. But he likes arresting touches in his melody, he seeks for the unexpected—a tinkle of the celeste and a mournful twang from the bass fiddle—all in the same measure.

Andre is thinking of instruments as possessing definite characteristics, comic or exotic. He likes to cast his specialty tunes as one would cast a play, with contrasting emotions and impressions expressed by his instruments.

He encourages each of his 40 musicians to make suggestions for arrangements, or to submit orchestrations

and distinguished Russian family. When he was four years old, he was practicing scales on the piano. He progressed rapidly, and soon was able to play four-handed symphonies with his teacher.

When Andre was five and a half, he and his teacher gave a concert before the Czar. Today, he can hardly remember the occasion, but he remembers delivering a formal bow, and also a tremendous gilt-framed portrait of the Czar in full regalia which stared down upon the piano as he played.

The Kostelanetz children all were educated by tutors and though Andre's forte was music, he was not allowed to escape from the long hours of study from 9 in the morning until 9 at night.

He was taught to speak German, French, English, Italian, Polish, Spanish and Finnish.

The Kostelanetz family spent each Summer in Finland. Andre recalls the "white nights" and the quiet lakes where they went boating.

Occasionally, too, they visited Germany.

Andre remembers being impressed by the tooting of a German band which played in a park in Berlin.

He hung wistfully around the bandstand, and one day the conductor handed Andre the baton and allowed him to conduct a number.

It was a great occasion.

The year 1918 found the young Andre in his first important musical position as conductor of a St. Petersburg opera house. Came the year 1922, and Andre became assistant conductor of the Petrograd Grand Opera. It was a famous old institution, but in those days of poverty and struggle, the managers were unable to collect enough money to pay for fuel to warm its magnificent gilt interior.

In 1929 he joined the staff of the Columbia Broadcasting System and spent several years in comparative obscurity during which he studied the radio business.

He blossomed out as a showman and radio conductor with his first big program "Andre Kostelanetz Presents," during which he started a new trend of blending vocal choruses with special orchestral presentations.
