

D-Day 50 years ago

Everyone has heard and is set to honor the fiftieth anniversary of the Normandy Invasion. Hundreds of thousands of fighting men; Thousands who died there on the beach and in the fighting. I don't want to second guess the historians who know so much more than I do. I might however remind you of what it was here on the home front.

We cheered the introduction of synthetic quinine to help treat malaria in our troops overseas. We elected FDR as the president of the United States for an unprecedented fourth term. The national speed limit was 45 mile per hour to conserve gasoline rations and to help prevent dangerous accidents from the retreaded retreads that civilians were allowed to drive (all new rubber products went into the war effort).

We mourned the death of big band leader Glen Miller, whose plane was lost over the English Channel. We laughed at comic strips bearing the war cartoons of Bill Mauldin, like Willie and Joe or George Baker's Sad Sack. We were saddened to hear reports of the V-2, the first ballistic missile to be used in warfare. We were appalled when the Canvas "big top" tent of the Barnum & Bailey Circus caught fire in Hartford Connecticut. The ensuing panic took over 160 lives.

On the musical side of life, we were tapping our toes to songs like "Ac-cent-tu-ate the Positive," Don't Fence Me In," "Swinging On A Star," "Long Ago and Far Away," and "Rum and Coka-Cola." These were the events that influence the home front in 1944. Fifty years ago.

The Membership Survey

Nearly a third of the Society's members completed the membership survey which was circulated around the first of the year. In that survey, we asked for your opinion of what was important to you and what suggestions you might have.

Almost half of the respondents ranked the public swap meets and the newsletter as some of the most important parts of the society. Let's look at how the meetings were rated. Technical presentations at meetings, on the scale of 1 to 6 were evenly distributed between the range of 2 and 6. When you analyze this, it can be said that slightly more than half of those who filled out the survey thought technical presentations were important. Slightly less than half were ambivalent toward that particular type of meeting. Business meetings were regarded with "love and hate." Over half of those responding felt that the business meetings were important, yet a significant portion of the other half felt that they were very unimportant. Auctions, meeting displays, and contests were fairly popular, but did not receive a clear mandate for increased scheduling. Clearly people felt that meeting refreshments were unimportant.

Looking at the Call Letter, the importance of photographs in the Call Letter was pretty evenly distributed between 2 and 6, with the majority rating them between 2 and 4. Technical articles, on the other hand, ranked well above photographs in importance. It should be noted (and not unexpected) that out- of-town members ranked the Call Letter (their only routine connection with the society) as the only thing of importance in the survey.

Lastly, those responding ranked Tailgate swap meets as more important than public shows, technical meetings, or business meetings.

Here are some of the "freeform" suggestions from members. We would like to see more: more new volunteers; a permanent repair bench set up in the museum basement; more swap meets; seminars dedicated to woodworking, & restoration; color centerfolds; more monthly speakers; attention to meetings (less social gab during business); video tours of member's collections; Hi-Fi technical presentations; Public museum hours; meetings outside the metro area; volunteer recognition; and more auctions.

(When the data summary is available, it will be given to the board of directors to act upon as they see fit.)



The Northwest Vintage Radio Society

The Northwest Vintage Radio Society is a non-profit historical society incorporated in the State of Oregon. Since 1974 the Society has been dedicated to the preservation and enjoyment of "vintage radio" and wireless equipment.

Membership in the Society is open to all who are actively interested in historic preservation. The dues are \$15.00 for domestic membership, due on January 1st of each year.

The Call Letter has been a monthly publication since 1974. It was founded by our first president Harley Perkins. Through several editors and with the assistance of numerous members the Call Letter has continued to be a publication that both informs members of the society's business and that has supported the hobby of collecting, preserving, and restoring vintage radios.

Society meetings are held monthly (except July and August) at the Northwest Vintage Radio Museum, 7675 SW Capitol Highway (at 32nd street) in Portland Oregon. They generally convene at or about 10 AM and for the purpose of displaying radios, conducting Society business, and exchanging information. Guests are welcome at all Society meetings and functions (except board meetings)

Other Society functions include radio sales, auctions, and "swap meets" which are advertised in the Call Letter and are held at various facilities in and around Portland.
