

## Northwest Vintage Radio Society

The Northwest Vintage Radio Society is a non-profit historical society incorporated in the State of Oregon. Since 1974 the Society has been dedicated to the preservation and enjoyment of "vintage radio" and wireless equipment.

Membership in the Society is open to all who are actively interested in historic preservation. The dues are \$15.00 for domestic membership, due on January 1st of each year (prorated quarterly).

The Call Letter has been a monthly publication since 1974. It was originated with the first president and continues to be a publication that both informs members of the society's business and that supports the hobby of collecting, preserving, and restoring vintage radios.

## Whatsadyne

The Webster's New World Dictionary defines the noun dyne as French for power or Greek for dynamic. It is further defined as, "The amount of force that imparts to a mass of one gram, an acceleration of one centimeter per second, per second."

It is impossible to interested in radio without encountering the word dyne. Probably the best known example of this is it's use in the Superhetrodyne. Two types of radio circuits that were marketed in the early 1920's were the superhetrodyne and the neutrodyne. Both patented circuits were considered so special that they were carefully and vigilantly guarded by their developers. The results of infringement was generally in the form of a law suit and a fine.

This type of elitism apparently started a radio name fad. From the August 1925 issue of the *Radio Trade Directory* and the radio collector's guide (Published by Vintage Radio, (C) Morgan McMahon) I compiled these radio names incorporating the word, dyne.

## And, Last, but not least . . Dyne-O-Night!


