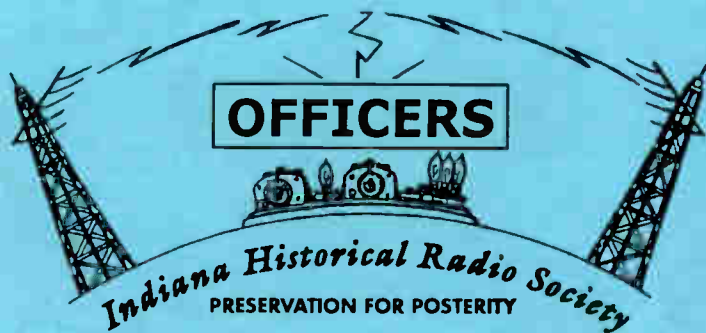

Message From The President

Greetings to the membership of the IHRS. Well, summer is almost over and fall is near. It's hard to believe that in less than a month, we'll have our "Fall Foliage" meeting in Greenfield along with the election of officers. I feel that I've only been IHRS president for around 3 months or so, instead of a year.....and that summer started around 2 weeks ago. Time does fly.

Short summers aside, to date we have had only about 1/3 of the IHRS membership vote on whether to move our May meeting to the first week of June. So far, the vote is tending heavily toward moving the meet to June. I'll be counting votes until the end of September, when the Signature Inn will be contacted to confirm the date of the event. IHRS business meetings have, in the past, gotten bogged down on one or more issues. This often made them too long and drawn out. I believe, as I have said before, that business meetings need to be short and to the point, so that more people will stay for them. The IHRS Constitution and Bylaws state that the IHRS President is entrusted with keeping a feeling of harmony between club members, and maintaining order. Keeping with this general idea, any one item of IHRS business now has a time limit of ten minutes on the floor. A timer will be set by the club secretary when a subject is introduced. After ten minutes, said item will either be brought to a vote, or tabled to the next meeting if it is not

ready for the vote. This new rule of order was enacted at the Elkhart business meeting on August 22, 1998. Your IHRS officers hope that this will allow for shorter, more efficient meetings. Also, due to less time being devoted to a single issue, more items may be introduced for consideration.

If you have an idea that you think can help the club, please don't hesitate to bring it up to an IHRS officer, or to the IHRS membership. When bringing it before the club, make sure to have your plan well organized and ready for presentation.

Remember, the IHRS is your club and it needs YOUR input.

Business aside, I would like to say thanks to all of those who had a hand in setting up and running the Elkhart meeting. This includes: Ross and Wava Smith, Ty Gregory, Terry Garl, Doug and Clo McIntosh, Bob and Carol O'Friel and several others. I thought this year's Elkhart Meet was the best one I had been to in my three years of attendance at this location. Weather was temperate, and some great pieces were exhibited. There also was a large amount of entries in the contests. We need to see more participation like this at all of our contests!

I hope to see you all at Riley Park on October 10 for our "Fall Foliage" meet.

IHRM Museum Update

Several items have been added to the museum since the last bulletin. Charlie Miller of Elkhart, In has brought back his baseball radio collection to be displayed through out the World Series. Several battery sets from Serge Krauss including a Radiola II with Brandes headphones and a spring microphone from Ross Smith.

A couple of remarks about articles in previous bulletins, in regards to the 1933 remote control Grunow, Charles Mancini was on the mark. The museum has the same set in excellent condition on display. Visitors are amazed to hear it play the old radio programs with such sound quality. On the passing of Julian Stark, his daughter has visited the museum several times and donated some items of Julians. A 1930 photo of Julian and a coworker in their radio repair shop on Fairfield Ave. in Fort Wayne, In was enlarged and now hangs on in the museum. Several battery sets are visible in the background including an Atwater Kent and a Neutrowound.

Alfred Grebes grandson, who lives in Michigan very generously donated 250.00 dollars to the museum matching fund drive. He has been to the museum several times.

On November 1st the museum will return to its winter hours of being open on Saturdays from 10-2pm.

Our museum restoration tip this time was an idea from of my wife Gladys. Masking over something you want to paint can be a messy job. Next time try using facial mask that can be purchased at the beauty section of any drug or department store. I brush it on screw heads and escutcheons. It will dry to a rubbery seal. Paint or stain right over it. The mask can then be removed with the push of the thumb nail. I have found it to work over Magnavox speaker decals also and besides protecting the decals it cleans it slightly. I would not recommend its use on flaky lose decals as it might damage them. With a little practice I have found it to work wonders.

IHRS HONORED

Seventy-five years ago on April 21st, Purdue University's WBAA took to broadcasting. It was the first licensed broad-casting station in Indiana. It can be found at 920 on the radio dial as an AM station. It begins the day at 6 AM with local news and weather reports, then continues the programming with National Public Radio news. Earlier in the year, it sponsored a program for raising enough money through public donations to continue the programs provided by National Public Radio. I called in and pledged \$75.00 as a gift in honor of our Indiana Historical Radio Society. This gift represented one dollar a year for the seventy-five years that WBAA has been on the air.

Our organization was then mentioned on the air. I felt, as a charter member of IHRS, I should do this to support WBAA and honor our society as one of the first of its kind in the nation. At my age of 96, I am not able to take an active part any more, but I still keep up my interest hearing about collectors of old time wireless and radio equipment.

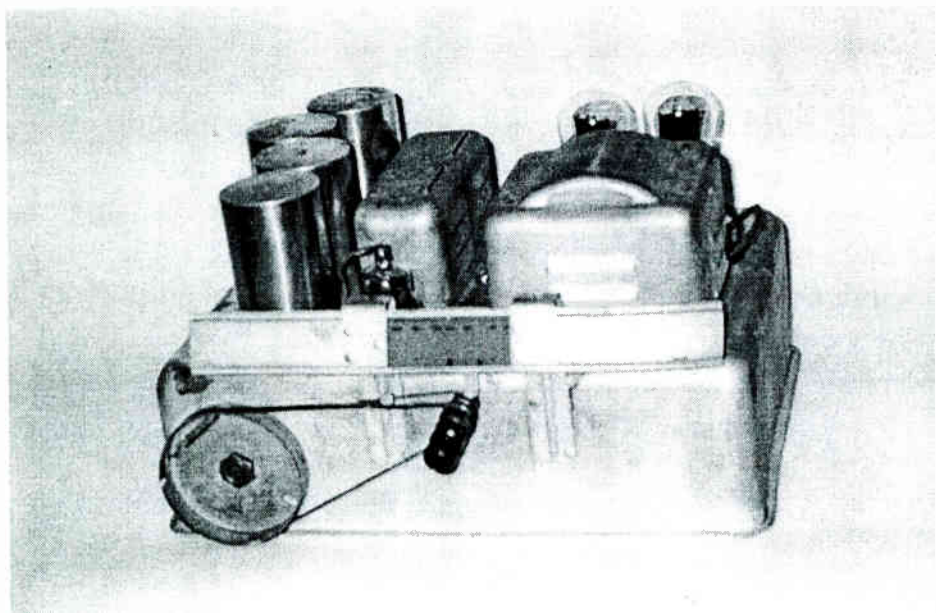

The Unusual Brunswick Uni-Selector Panatropo George Hausske



The picture of this set's chassis gives a clue as to how unusual it is. Rider's #1, pg. 34 shows the diagram for Models 15, 22, 32, and 42, which uses 3 #24RF, 1 #24 detector., with 2 #45s in the output stage with a #80 rectifier. The diagram covers 60 cycle, 25 cycle, phono and non-phono sets. I don't know what model mine is, except that due to having 2 phono on off switches, (AC and audio), operated by levers on the extension of the tuning condenser shaft when tuned to minimum capacity and that it works

nicely on 60 cycles should tell me something. (Ed. note, sets built for 25 cycle operation will perform as well on 60 cycle but going the other direction can be a disaster.) Tuning the set is done by a single 2 part dial, the larger part for frequency control, requiring a knob to accommodate a 1" diameter shaft with a keyway and I don't have one but, I can still tune it easily. The volume control, at just under 1 inch diameter, is in the front, when pulled out is the local-distance switch. I can't find the tone control shown in Rider's, (probably an option on the more expensive models). The dial plastic moves horizontally, driven by a sturdier belt than on any AK.

The circuit is unusual in this set using coupling condensers between the RF stages 1 and 2 for volume control. The plates of the RF stages are fed DC via RF chokes and coupled to succeeding stages by condensers. The audio system also has its 2 #45s in parallel and uses the speaker field as an audio output choke. The 45's are coupled to an output transformer by a condenser.

The chassis, tube and transformer cover, and the slide-on base are all heavy gauge steel, made by Bremer-Tulley for Brunswick.

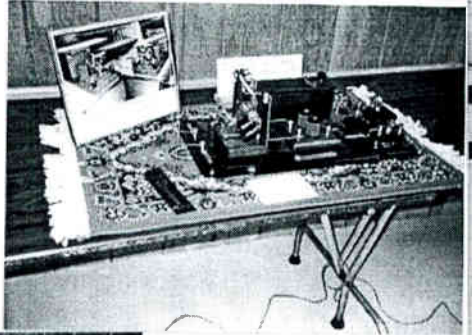
If we ever have a contest for radios made most like a Battleship, I'm sure this one would win easily..

RESTORATION TIPS

Ross Smith

A 1931 Gloritone 5 tube TRF, model 26 came in last month for restoration that had an original finish cathedral cabinet in almost perfect condition. Johnson's paste wax with a 0000 steel wool pad lightly brushed over the surface cleaned the 67 years of dust accumulation and brought the beautiful hand-rubbed finish back to life.

Unfortunately, the chassis was not clean. Animal deposits left severe bands of rust on the chassis at the power transformer end. With light oil and fine sandpaper cleaning, it looked much better. In this situation, I usually de-grease and paint over the bad spots with steel color paint from a hobby shop. I do not use silver or chrome paint.

Following my point-to-point list for chassis restoration, the power transformer was checked first. Always pull the rectifier tube, a type 80 in this case, before proceeding to build up the 117 volt AC slowly by means of a Variac or a 100 watt light bulb in series with the power cord. Before reaching the full line voltage, smoke and fumes came from the rectifier socket. It was shorting to ground from the socket pins. The AC plug was removed and a leakage check was made from the tube socket pins to ground on the type 80 and the type 45 output sockets.

Fortunately, the animal did not deposit on the power transformer itself, or on any of the three type 24A tube sockets.

Leakage from the tube sockets to ground were checked with a Heathkit Capacity Checker model IT-11. DC voltage was increased by steps until breakdown to chassis occurred at only 25 volts! No wonder the rectifier socket sparked and fumed with high AC voltage. Surface cleaning of the two sockets did not correct the leakage problem, so both were replaced with molded bakelite sockets resulting in infinite leakage reading at 600 volts from the capacitor checker.

The next point on the check list was grid return resistance checks. Automatic Volume control circuits were not yet standard in 1931 and this set had grid returns directly to ground through the RF coil secondaries. The two RF coils checked 6 ohms to ground and the detector return was open. After removing the four terminal wires, the coil was removed from the chassis. An open return usually indicates an open coil. Surprisingly, the two windings of the coil were checked and found OK!

Tracing the circuit with an ohm meter having a 1 1/2 volt potential, the detector grid cap to the top terminal of the three-gang variable tuning capacitor showed good continuity. However, the bottom terminal connecting the variable capacitor to the coil was open. This connection could not be reached without removing the variable capacitor from the chassis. The open circuit, caused by corrosion between the 8/32 NP steel screw and the tapped section of the aluminum stator frame of the variable capacitor, was corrected by cleaning the aluminum threads and installing a new brass bolt. Continuity was restored!

which brought the set back to “Good as New”. However, without AVC, the volume of strong local stations could not be controlled, even with the installation of a new volume control. At this day and time, it was the practice to install a “local-distance switch” to solve this problem. A toggle switch was installed near the antenna terminal on the back of the chassis to “open” the approximately 40 ft. antenna used for testing. In the “off” position, the internal capacity of the switch fed enough signal into the set for full volume on local stations. Turning the switch “on” provided adequate signal for distant stations. Problem Solved!

MESSAGE: I am in the process of putting together a large article with illustrations on a radio called the “Showers Consola” and “Future”. These two radios were manufactured by the Showers Brothers Company of Bloomington, Indiana during the late 1920's. MINUTES OF IHRS ELKHART MEETING, August 22, 1998

Meeting called to order precisely at 1:00 PM by IHRS President Alex Whitaker. Fred Schultz announced the winners of the radio contests. (See Ross Smith's article about this meet in this "Bulletin"). Pres. Alex Whitaker informed attendees that the son of Lou Moses was killed in a plane crash and Lou was understandingly absent from this meeting. Pres. Alex called for the Treasurers Report: The response was.... "We have money", exact details not available due to some expenses that were being paid but balance on hand was adequate. Pres. Whitaker called on Museum Curator, Fred Schultz for the Museum up-date. Fred informed the membership that a new 4' by 10' sign had been erected on HWY-5 and there is the intent to erect others. (See the cover of the last "Bulletin"). The museum is attracting over 5000 visitors per year, from most states and 7 or 8 countries. Nobel County Foundation has granted the museum \$1000.00 for the purchase of a Van-de-Graff generator and Jacob's Ladder...these to be used to capture the attention of the younger visitors. The help of several people over the Labor Day holiday was needed to keep the museum open during the Annual "Marshmallow Festival" weekend. Fred reiterated the fact that the Noble County Foundation has agreed to *match* up to \$3,000.00 of museum donations. About \$2,500.00 has been raised by this time and we have until January 1st, 1999 to obtain the additional \$500.00 from what ever source. Donations to this cause are encouraged.

Pres. Alex Whitaker announced that the "Bulletin" was in the mail, delayed for various reasons. Purchase of the "ZIP" drive that was

authorized at the February meeting was not required because a drive was given to Mike Feldt by his employer.

Alex proposed that Old Business be closed...seconded by Mike Clark. Pres. Whitaker called for New Business. There was none immediately offered from the floor. Alex pointed out that a very important ballot was enclosed in the Bulletin and went on to propose that the May (Spring Fling) meet be changed to the first weekend in June to avoid the foul weather that has dampened the occasion the past 4 or 5 years. Rain tended to severely limit attendance each year, (it was up from the previous year). The ballot was for membership approval or disapproval, as the case may be. Another new business item was brought up by Pres. Whitaker. He pointed out that it was the duty of the president, in accordance with the By-Laws of the Society, (Section 1, Article IV, para.F.1), to..... "keep the society harmonious and progressive". Accordingly, he has initiated a measure to limit discussion on any one subject to 10 minutes during our business meetings. The discussion will be timed by the secretary with a suitable timing device such as a sand "egg" timer, (or an oven timer which has the advantage of giving a signal at the end of the timing interval). If the subject cannot be resolved in the initial 10 minutes, it will be tabled and discussed further at subsequent meetings, (for 10 minutes). The intent is not to stifle ideas or discussion on any one subject, but, to keep meetings moving at a good pace and to allow all business to be conducted in the hour allocated for most IHRS meetings. There was no dissent from the floor but several nods of approval.

Ross Smith announced that 80 members/families had registered for this meet and that 75 people were in attendance for lunch.

Alex Whitaker thanked all those who worked on the meet to make it so successful. Applause from the floor, especially for the ladies who helped set up the lunch!!!

Pres. Whitaker announced that Glenn Fitch had everything ready for the October meet in Greenfield. We need a slate of officer candi-

dates for the election which takes place yearly at that meet, (at this time, we have all the candidate posts identified for these roles but we also seek volunteers). Alex alluded to “things” to be discussed at the Fall meeting that would probably a Public Relations committee and “other things in the works”.

Bob O’Friel announced that the deadline for input to the next “Bulletin”, such as articles and Radio Ads is September 15th.

Pres. Alex Whitaker moved to close the “New Business” and meeting. Seconded by Terry Garl. Respectively submitted, Herman Gross, (for Lou Moses).
