It's a Good Way to Hold Back Radio

The Federal Radio Commission is doing a first-class job of holding back radio. Admittedly, that is a serious charge. Nevertheless it stands when one considers how the Commission has been stalling off high power.

As far back as the summer of 1930 more than a score of cleared-channel stations, including WHAS and WSM, applied for permission to increase their power to 50,000 watts. If these increases had been granted promptly the new transmitters would be in operation now, giving listeners all over the country the benefits of greatly improved service. But the Commission has chosen simply to stall. Action on the applications is still as far away as it was when they were filed.

The reasons for such a policy are impossible to fathom. There is no longer a ghost of an argument against high power. The fine performance of WLW, WENZ and WTAM alone has taken the whole matter out of the debatable class.

Indeed, there is ample argument for increasing cleared-channel power considerably above 50,000 watts. Poland already has a 120,000-watt station, and several 75,000-watt stations are operating successfully in Europe. Yet the United States, which is supposed to lead the world in broadcasting, cannot have all the 50,000-watt stations it needs, because the Commission still thinks in terms of 1926-7 receivers.

It is as futile as any other attempt to halt the irresistible march of progress. Sooner or later, every cleared-channel station will use a minimum of 50,000 watts, through recourse to the courts if nothing else. But meantime, listeners are the real victims of the Commission's stalling, by being denied the service which broadcasters are eager to give them.

Here in the Ohio Valley, for example, WHAS and WSM even now could be providing the same sort of high-grade coverage which WLW is furnishing. Multiple this by a dozen similar instances the country over, and one begins to get an idea of the heavy price the radio audience is paying for the Commission's benighted notions.

It is not a flattering commentary on the body which is charged with administering radio in the public interest. But it is at least consistent, if that is a virtue.

Now Sunday at Seth Parker's is being heard locally (WSAI, at 9:45 p. m.). If that's not a fine break, the Dial-twister can't recognize one. This unique NBC feature has piled up a tremendous following all over the country, and after you hear it just once you know why. It's all so straight from the heart and rings so true, it simply gets you; that's all. WSAI deserves thanks for scheduling it, because that saves local listeners the trouble of dialing an out of town station.

Daddy and Rollo (WKRC, at 6:30 p. m., Sunday, Tuesday, and Thursday) keeps a tight hold on its old friends, besides adding new ones. Among other things, that punctures a radio tradition. Around the studios they'll tell you that nobody outside station staffs can stand the gaff of turning out the script for an act week after week. But J. P. McEvoy is doing it, and mighty well.

That Jack Frost program (WLW, Wednesday, at 7:30 p. m.) is getting itself known as an unusually good popular show. The orchestra knows what it's all about, and its tunes are about the cream of the current crop.

Another WSAI feature that's getting a hearty welcome these days is the Mid-week Federation Hour (Sunday at 6 p. m.). There's something about the familiar hymns that strikes home, whether you go to church or not. And they're sung splendidly in this program. It's especially welcome, too, because the many who want to hear something like this on the air have precious little chance except on Sunday or early in the morning.

Those Frigidarians (WLW, Wednesday, at 7 p. m.) aren't so hot. But probably they're not supposed to be. Eh, what?

As an exceptionally good dance band, the Chicago Knights (WKRC, Sunday at 6 p. m.) hereby get a vote. Their sax choir is smooth as velvet. And that piano quartet is just what this dialer has been wishing for these many years.

You Should Know --- Ray Perkins



Some sunny day this palpitating reporter plans to pop out from behind the piano Clarence and forthwith snatch a personal interview with Ray Perkins, Libby's Prince of Pineapples (if we must quote Mr. Ted Jewett, et al) and come flying back to Cincinnati to rush into print for RADIO DIAL readers.

Until that sunny day (and won't it be fun and a surprise for Mr. Perkins) our eager readers will have to content themselves with these vital statistics in answer to their excited clamoring to "know more about this Perkins who broadcasts at 9 on Thursday and Friday mornings through WLW."

Raymond Lamont Perkins, the Old Topper of NBC fame, is one of radio's most versatile entertainers. His talents run the gamut from song writing to filling a newspaper column.

Ray's a Bostonian by birth, and still reveals in unguarded moments a New England accent. But he went to school in New York and graduated from Columbia. While in college he became interested in the footlights and was a leading spirit in the varsity shows of 1916 and 1917 on Morningside Heights. Before he graduated he wrote and published his first song. It was written for a Shubert show at the Old Winter Garden and netted the author \$7.37. After he graduated the Shuberts offered him a job and he contributed many tunes and lyrics to their productions. His first big hit was "Bye-lo."

The war caught Ray and he managed to wriggle into the Military Intelligence Division. Then after the war he came back to song writing. George M. Cohan discovered him and he worked for Cohan for a year. Dance Magazine needed a music editor, and Ray got the job.

Finally, in 1926, he made his debut on the air over WJZ as "Judge, Junior." When that series came to an end he became "Old Topper." Soon after, he joined the NBC production staff and directed many important programs. Among the ideas he introduced as production man was one reminiscent of railroad engineering. When the program was running on time Perkins displayed a yellow flag. When the programs were lagging he ex-

As far as religious music is concerned, the Cathedral Hour (WKRC, Sunday, at 3 p. m.) can take its place with the best. It combines the atmosphere of worship with masterful performance, which makes the 60 minutes something truly fine. And there is ample time for works not often heard in complete form.

The R. F. D. Hour (WLW, Saturday, at 7:30 p. m.) continues to fill a unique niche in a satisfying way. Evening features for farmers are few and far between, and certainly farmers rate a break from radio. Boss Johnston knows his fields, and fences or what would you. In fact, he's just about the life of the program.

"The program that does more than entertain," says the announcer opening the Halsey-Stuart Hour (WSAI, Wednesday at 8 p. m.), and that's right. The Old Councilor's talk is always profitable. He's ideally cast for the part, too, by the way. But the program also entertains. Such a good orchestra can't be dismissed lightly.
