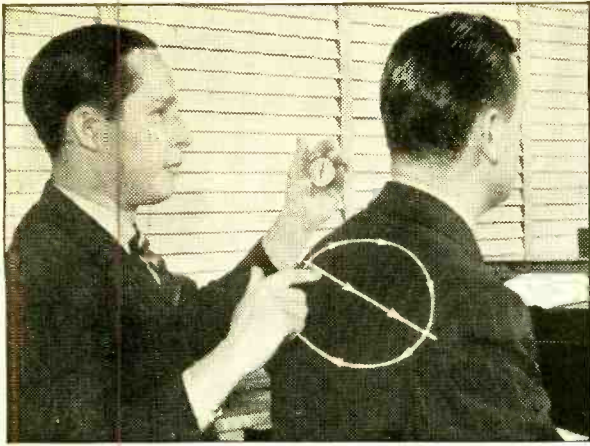

ALEC TEMPLETON—*BRAND-NEW AMERICAN*

This fun-loving blind musician likes us because we don't give a hang

Out of this summer's pinch-hit programs has emerged at least one radio sensation. That is Alec Templeton, blind Englishman who has entirely captivated American radio listeners with his music and mirth during past months. Tangible evidence of Templeton's success is his return to the air on September 25 in his own NBC program with a large and enthusiastic audience awaiting the opening broadcast. It is this Alec Templeton whom we present here.—Editor.

THE usual English visitor to our shores is a super-critic who finds everything wrong with our way of life. This is doubly true if the visitor happens to be a musician. So let's doff our hats to Alec Templeton, one English musician who not only likes us but likes us enough to become one of us. Mr. Templeton is well on the road to becoming a full-fledged American citizen—and but really!

The affection shown for us by this sterling entertainer-pianist is not entirely unreciprocated, for the American radio audience has taken Mr. Templeton to its hearts, too, as any popularity poll of recent months would show. And that Mr. Templeton will remain to fill our airwaves with sweet music, jests and swing is a foregone conclusion.

About four years ago, a young English pianist with few acquaintances in America—and blind, at that—called at the offices of the *Music News* in Chicago. He had a letter from that journal's London correspondent to a Stanley North, then associated in its publication. Mr. North and Alec Templeton—for the pianist was Alec—soon became fast friends, and so enthusiastic was North about Templeton's musical abilities that he mortgaged—literally—the family furniture to rent a concert hall for the Englishman's first appearance. The hall was jammed, the reception terrific. New York's Town Hall was the next stop, the results the same. Alec Templeton was being taken to America's heart. It remained for radio, which reaches into every home, to make Alec's captivation

of the New World complete. It was radio, incidentally, which first presented Alec's other side—the jester, mimic, clown—suppressed by the concert stage.

America loves his mimicry, his playing of classical and swing music, his ability to entertain. But what is it about America that Alec likes so much that he is foregoing the citizenship of his native land to become one of us?

"Americans are queer people," he says. "They don't give a hang. An envious world criticizes them, and they don't give a hang. Foreign visitors come and write them up, and they don't give a hang. They are told they have no art, no literature, no culture, no soul, and they never budge. Moralists cry over them, criminologists dissect them, writers shoot epigrams at them, prophets foretell their end and—they never move. Seventeen brilliant books analyze them every month. They don't even read 'em! The Americans don't give a hang, don't need to, never did need to. That is their greatness."

THAT'S Alec's thumbnail description of his adopted land. He seems fairly to exude a love for it, for its immensity. He has never gotten used to a land so large that there is a four-hour difference between time in the eastern and western ends of it. And of course, America has been his land of opportunity. In England, his income was but a fractional part of what he earns now, while his popularity here was never remotely approached in England. He has an answer to that, too. "Americans have the finest national sense of humor in the world," he'll tell you. He'll also tell you that American youngsters have the most perfect sense of rhythm in the world, and while he can't get over the energy expended by the jitterbugs, he thinks it's a good thing—better than playing war games.

He loves the delightful informality of radio here and the opportunity for experimentation on the air. He loves the graciousness and charm of such good

friends as Edgar Bergen, Bing Crosby, Dorothy Lamour (who never fails to plant a kiss on his brow when they meet). In fact, he likes everyone who has personality in his or her voice, because that, after all, is what a blind person must judge people by. He is amazed by the efficiency and split-hair precision of radio technicians and other American mechanics. But he is most amazed by the wholehearted reception America has given him.

HE LOVES to take motor trips across the American countryside with Stanley North at his side to describe it to him. North, incidentally, is giving full time to managing and serving as Alec's companion. Alec dresses himself, except for shaving and tying his neckties, eats without assistance. Those around him never think of him as being blind, which is as Alec wants it. Not that he's sensitive. Often, North ribs him good-naturedly about his affliction and Templeton wise-cracks right back. What he does resent is to be treated with that condescension so many people employ with the blind. And Alec does see as much, if not more, than most normal people.

A short time ago he was the guest of the famed Bohemian Grove, on the Russian River near San Francisco. During his stay there, he and North took many long walks through the redwoods. North would lead Alec around the base of the giant trees, let him feel the wood, the ground near by. He even pushed him into the cones on the ground until Alec yelled ouch. A few days later, Alec astounded a gathered company by his keen and accurate description of the redwoods and the moist, friendly shade of the Bohemian Grove retreat.

There are, of course, some things about America that Alec doesn't like. Although he recognizes that they are his bread and butter, he dislikes the long commercial announcements on radio. He resents, too, the "stuffed shirt" attitude of serious music-lovers towards swing, which he believes is a

vital part of American music.

He has met practically every celebrity in American except the President. "But," he says, "I can imitate Mr. Roosevelt's voice." And he can, too. Whenever he hears a voice he likes on radio, he wants to meet that person.

He works under a severe handicap in radio work. While other players read from script, Alec must memorize his lines. This he does by having North read the script to him twenty times. He usually has his lines tucked away by the fifteenth reading, but he is thorough enough to want to make sure. During broadcasts, North sits beside him on the piano-bench and gives him the producer's signals by a touch system they have worked out. So sensitive and high-keyed is Alec's system that he responds to the feel of North's fingers as others would to signals they see.

Sometimes, however, even a memory as strong as Alec's will falter, and for such an eventuality, when on the air, there is a standing cue. If he forgets his lines, he is supposed to ask Conrad Nagel, master of ceremonies, "What page am I on, Conrad?" This, of course, is good for a laugh as well as the useful purpose it serves.

Alec has never invoked this emergency cue, but a short time ago Nagel, losing his place in the script and sparing for time, said, "What page am I on, Alec?"

Without a moment's hesitation, Alec snapped back, "Page seven, Conrad." It was the page. He'd not only memorized his own lines, but the lines of other players as well. When the air show is over, Alec often entertains the cast with some informal music and mimicry. At a recent informal show following a broadcast, he recited the entire show, taking all of the parts in the script and mimicking them so perfectly that seasoned radio performers rolled in the aisles.

You see, Alec doesn't give a hang either, so long as everyone around him is happy and laughing. And that, he feels, really makes him American.

body from vocalist Edythe Wright to the brass section writes for its pages. And the mailing-list embraces the whole gamut of jitterbugdom from high-school youngsters in Texas to modern-minded oldsters in Maine.

The life of T. Dorsey has not always been in the groove. His biography displays the usual roller-coaster ups and downs of any successful artist, beginning with that day when his first band flopped like a sour note in Shenandoah, Pa., nearly two decades ago. Tommy was something of a hell-raiser in his earlier years, and almost as good on the trombone as he is now. It was only the scarcity of good trombonists, he admits, that kept him his job.

Picture yourself with a baton, trying to lead a band. Right in the middle of an important number your eye wanders over toward the trombonist. You find he has the curved slide removed from his instrument and is shooting paper wads at the audience through the straight part of the horn! That sort of thing is unnerving and, as Tommy tells now, "After a few ace trombonists began to appear on the musical scene, young Mr. Dorsey started to get the brush-off from the orchestra-leaders."

One awful night still stands in his memory when, at the Capitol Theater in New York, he clunked a bad-tempered cello-player in the neck with a tinfoil

That Sentimental Gentleman

Mr. Dorsey woos the ladies with his wailing trombone

ONCE upon a time, when a young man named Tommy Dorsey was pushing a trombone in and out for a New York theater orchestra, a famous musician gave him some fatherly advice.

"Tommy," he warned, "you'd better settle down and do some serious studying of the classics. This jazz-music stuff has about two more years to run—then you and all the jazz-players will be left high and dry."

That was a little more than ten years ago. But the "sentimental gentleman of

swing," who just blew a couple of horse-laughs on his trombone at the time, is still going strong, dishing out what seems to be this nation's favorite brand of rhythm.

He's an unpretentious person of about 34—unpretentious when you consider that he plays Pied Piper for millions upon millions of the nation's most rabid band-worshippers. You'll find he has black hair, blue eyes, a friendly smile from the bandstand. And with these is coupled an uncanny capacity for probing all the ecstatic levels and in-

tricate mazes of that thing called swing.

He has a tremendous following, this man Tommy Dorsey. And if you're a swingcat worthy of the name you probably get his monthly tabloid called "The Bandstand," a neat little publication of twelve to sixteen pages which is devoted heart and soul to the vagaries of modern melody and its latest gossip. Tommy started it last January.

Wildfire-like in its appeal, the tiny "puff sheet" has now grown to 150,000 circulation, is the most important mouth-piece of the Dorsey aggregation. Every-

ball. And at the noisiest part of the "1812 Overture." There was a small riot backstage when the musicians finished their performance. "Only the size of the cello," says Dorsey, "kept that guy from breaking it over my head."

Anyhow, Tommy learned his lesson as the years went by. And as they went they wafted the Dorsey band higher and higher in the esteem of the American dancing public. Today, although usually characterized as a sweet-swing aggregation, the Tommy Dorsey

orchestra ranks tops in all-around popularity among the music-makers on the major networks.

There's romance in the wail of his trombone—a romanticism which won him that sobriquet of "the sentimental gentleman of swing." The feminine heart is particularly susceptible. Only last month an inquiring reporter on a big New York tabloid approached a young lady with the query: "How would you like your boy friend to propose to you?"

With clasped hands and closed eyes, she murmured in print for all the world to hear: "I wouldn't want him to say a word. While we're dancing to one of Tommy Dorsey's romantic numbers, I'd just want him to hold me tight and look intensely into my eyes. I'm sure I'd read the question, and then I would faint. That would be my answer."

The power of music knows no bounds.

Tommy, brother of the celebrated Jimmy Dorsey, with whom he takes decided issue on matters of melody, is what you might term a "musicians' musician." The boys behind the horns, the "woodpiles," the "saw-boxes," all have a deep respect for Tommy and his prowess as a top-flight artist. Even rival bandleaders speak with regard for his distinctive work.

He's a congenial person, for one thing. Everybody is Tommy's pal, right from the first time he meets them, and he can converse without a falter on almost any topic you may happen to like—be it baseball or amateur photog-

Korsakoff's "Song of India." And he's kept right on swinging the old-timers, including Strauss' "Blue Danube," the "Humoresque" and "Goin' Home" of Dvorak, Liszt's "Liebestraum," "Spring Song" by Mendelssohn, and Rubinstein's "Melody in F."

The repercussions echoed and rumbled across the musical world for quite a while. You could swing the nursery rhymes all you wanted. Most of the infants were jitterbugs anyway. But the sacrosanct classics were another matter and shocked listeners stormed broadcasting stations by phone and letter to protest. In fact, one Detroit broadcaster even clipped the Dorsey show off the air for swinging "Annie Laurie." However, the long-hairs were finally forced to give in, and many of today's best-sellers are adapted from old and time-tried favorites.

TOMMY DORSEY is quite positive about one point. "If the popular dance bands," he argues, "had not taken up the classics and put them in modern dress, there would be thousands and thousands of jitterbugs all over the country—kids who probably even resent symphony orchestras—who might never become familiar with these immortal themes. Swing has helped perpetuate such numbers rather than 'murder' them."

He points, and logically enough, to the stream-lined, modern-dress versions of Shakespeare and old Greek plays, to the modern twist which Norman Corwin has given poetry in his "Words

swimming-pool. They have handball, tennis, badminton courts near by, plus a barbecue pit and cool rock garden, flowers and fresh vegetables growing behind the house.

There are two Dorseyettes. The elder is seventeen-year-old daughter Patsy, the other a toddler named "Skipper," whose fame was recently blazoned across the land via a little number from the pen of Nick Kenny. The title—as you've already guessed—was "Little Skipper." Tommy himself likes to dance, incidentally, and is reputedly pretty good at it, following the free-and-easy collegiate style. He confesses to a mean shag also.

THE gentleman is something of an amateur kidnaper. Perennially on the go, he insists that friends come out to his estate, thirty-eight miles from Gotham, at Bernardsville, N. J., and generally takes along a carload with him every night. Anybody at all who strikes his fancy gets shanghaied—even a waiter once who asked him if he'd have his steak cooked "Good and Faithful" or "Day in June." (If you don't catch on—"well done" or "rare.")

He usually gets his way, and this was quite demonstrated by the episode of NBC and the goat. Naturally there are myriad Dorsey fan clubs all over the country, and one of these, recruited from sixty-eight Trenton High School students, recently asked Tommy for permission to visit the studios for a broadcast and bring their mascot—a goat. "Sure," said the easy-going Dor-

sey in to you, why, next week somebody else'll want to bring up a leopard or something. What then?"

Tommy Dorsey likes animals. In fact, he once played for the monkeys in the Philadelphia Zoo and found them super rug-cutters. So when the truck came over with the band's instruments from New Jersey, it brought the goat along too. The animal came up on an NBC freight elevator with the bass viols and drums, listened sagely to the broadcast from an adjoining room, and at last climaxed her day by munching the letter from an NBC official who had flatly denied her admission to the building.

The "sentimental gentleman" has a way of playing fair with his fans like that. There's only one thing he insists upon. Jitterbugs in the audience mustn't whistle. "Folks can stamp and shout and clap all they want," he declares, "but it sounds awful to listeners at home when that shrill whistling bursts out of the loudspeaker."

Tommy admits that there's very little you can do with a rug-cutting audience in the studio. His private formula is just hold tight and be thankful that the furniture belongs to a great corporation.

"I like the jitterbugs," he says. "They give the band a lift. They're enthusiastic in their appreciation of a performance. And they entertain us while we're entertaining them."

"Wild and uncontrollable? I doubt it. There's no reason to condemn these youngsters because they include a few crazy contortions in their dance steps. There's lots worse things sixteen- and

raphy. There's just one warning: Don't try to discuss concert or chamber-music with this maestro of modern rhythm. He doesn't care three hoots in cow-heaven about the long-hair stuff or the long-underwear gang that plays it.

Why? Well, Tommy has some pretty definite notions, and maybe that's the reason he was the first man to tackle the old classics and revamp them into the modern idiom of swing. His initial venture, glowered upon with horror by devotees of Brahms and the Bach boys, was the brazen swinging of Rimsky-

Without Music" program over CBS. "What harm," asks he, "in giving these old masters a coat of 1939 enamel?"

Switch from his professional to his personal world and you'll find Tommy Dorsey is a family man. Married at eighteen to a Detroit girl, he now has two children and a shiny home in the hills of New Jersey which looks like a slice of Hollywood whisked eastward. The twenty-room brick house stands in the midst of a twenty-two-acre estate, pleasantly landscaped and ultra-modern to the last inch. There's a sixty-foot

sey, "glad to have you."

The same goes for the other shows that have been on the air for years, such as "Album of Familiar Music," "Waltz Time," "The Voice of Firestone," "Saturday Night Serenade," "Ford Hour," the excellent music of Andre Kostelanetz, Guy Lombardo, and others too numerous to mention. So again I say, in my opinion good music is the secret of a successful radio show. Do you readers agree?

NO Highbrow among quiz programs but tops in humor and general listener-appeal is NBC's "True or False." Dr. Harry Hagen sees to that. He runs his brand of quiz show in the spirit of the genial family doctor he might have been had not radio got him first, for Hagen is a real medico, who first went on the air to give health-talks and juvenile-exercise programs, then, in 1937, conducted one of the early radio spelling-bees, and later, in 1938, began his present "True or False" show. Following the usual formula of inviting two teams each week to pit their wits, one against the other, and awarding one big prize to the last contestant down, with smaller prizes to winner's team-mates, "True or False" is outwardly like other quiz programs. Hagen's brain-teasers, of course, are stated in declarative form, requiring contestants to answer only "true" or "false." Hence the name. More fun than the questions, though, are the ingenious, often amusing, combinations of teams the Doctor works out. Theological students meet chorus girls; actresses meet wrestlers; magazine-cover models meet young publishers—and don't think Dr. Harry doesn't make the most of their meeting! "True or False" was originally a Mutual program, but in the summer of 1938 switched to an NBC network for a larger audience. It is heard now over NBC on Monday nights.

WHILE Adolf Hitler marches on to new diplomatic and aggressive victories in foreign lands, a silent, almost imperceptible civil war is being waged within the Third Reich which threatens—the moment Nazi armed forces are engaged with a foreign foe—to flare forth into open revolt. For the moment, those who wage this war are content to use the radio and propaganda for armament, veiling their activities and whereabouts in the deepest secrecy. Let us see how the seeds of rebellion are sown.

"Hitler must die!"

This ringing declaration sweeps through the airwaves of the Reich, falling upon the ears of the faithful and the fearful alike—not once, but many times. Not from one radio station, but from many stations. Not from one lone, outspoken adversary of *der Fuehrer*, but from many adversaries speaking for those groups which oppose Nazidom and which now, for the first time, move to battle in a concerted front.

AT THIS stage, the Nazi Opposition wages a battle of words and propaganda designed to arouse the rank and file of the German people to action. In other days such a course would have been impossible. The Opposition orator, haranguing a crowd in a square, would have been arrested, beheaded and the crowd dispersed. Today, thanks to radio, such a speaker—with a certain measure of immunity—addresses all those Germans who own radios and dare to listen.

Still, the business of broadcasting anti-Nazi material is reaching a new high and, fearful that the blistering attacks on Chancellor Hitler and his regime will flare forth in open revolt, the Gestapo (German secret police) are exerting every effort to capture and destroy these dangerous, anti-Nazi operators, thus far with little success.

The first type of subversive broadcast to trouble the Gestapo was that of foreign governments spreading their political beliefs by short-wave radio, just as the Germans do. Russia was the gravest offender on this score. But the most recent—and disturbing—type of broadcast is that of the anti-Nazi within—or just outside—the German borders. Such an operator caught within the Reich is immediately beheaded.

Behind this new and feverish radio activity in Germany lies the united efforts of several outlawed groups, some of which had previously opposed one another but which have now forgotten their differences in facing a common enemy. Firmly united in the common cause are several shades of socialists, royalists, prominent Germans of the post-war era, the Black Steel Helmets (largely World War veterans), and the Black Front, directed by Dr. Otto Strasser.

In 1935 Dr. Strasser, visiting in Czechoslovakia, met an engineer named Formis, who was formerly stationed at the government station in Stuttgart but now an exile. He persuaded Formis to try to broadcast into the Reich.

Formis, with a long technical background in radio, carefully selected the Zahori Hotel on the outskirts of Prague, not far from the German border, as the site for his operations. At the time, Formis was the only guest at the hotel, which enjoyed a large Sunday business. So only on Sundays did his

Several days later his gay young guests arrived. They drank, dined, joked. Afterward, the girl accompanied Formis to his room. A shot startled the proprietor, who hastened to investigate. He found Formis dying, the girl assassin gone. Rushing downstairs, he found the two young men gone also. Investigation disclosed that the car bore a Kiel license and had already dis-

appeared across the German border.

Since the passing of Formis and especially now that a united opposition has been formed, radio broadcasting from within the Reich to the German people has become an ingenious business. The importance of these broadcasts cannot be underestimated. The listener, hearing a program from Russia or England, feels that he is listening to an outsider living far from the striking arm of the Gestapo. But he knows that those people who broadcast from within the Reich not only are familiar with their subject but are risking life and limb to bring what they feel is the truth to their neighbors. The broadcaster might be the man next door. He might be the man at the next desk or that fellow across the aisle on the street-car.

In the early days of this illegal broadcasting, transmitters were concealed in old windmills, barns, or in the wilderness. Wide use of the direction-finder, however, by the Gestapo made this impractical. Even with such a practical scientific ally, the Gestapo made few arrests, although they seized much equipment.

Today the stationary transmitter has given way to more mobile units. One unit consists of three automobiles, each equipped with a portable transmitter. The main transmitter is in the center, and less powerful ones are in two other cars about thirty feet to the rear. The main transmitter sends out the full power signal while the two others send out lesser power signals, each in a different direction, and listen carefully for radio signals by the police. When the Gestapo alarm is heard, the unit disperses. Only one or two of these cars have been captured and no operators have been caught.

The relay system of broadcasting, however, has proved most maddening to the radio authorities of the Gestapo. One car starts the broadcast and, after a few minutes, stops. Another car, at a great distance, then picks up the broadcast where the first left off; then another and another. The use of four or five machines, long distances apart, incites the Gestapo to impotent rage, but there is little they can do about it.

This united body of outlawed parties, operating under the name of the "German Freedom Transmitters," has outdone itself in protective inventiveness. They have produced, for example, a unit which weighs only a pound and which is capable of transmitting from thirty to sixty miles. This is used in addressing limited audiences in restricted areas, as in urging factory workers in industrial districts to cooperate on political and economic issues, and may be carried in the side pocket of a car.

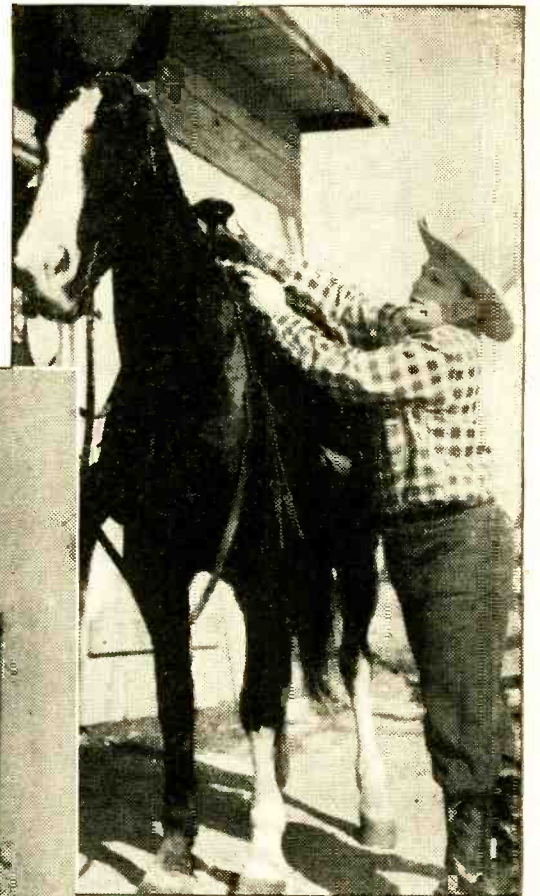
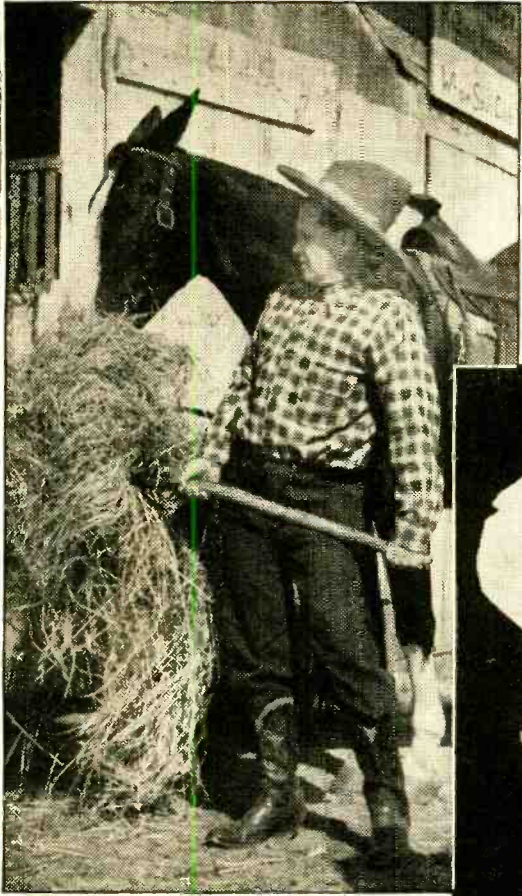
And stations which bombard the Reich with oral ammunition have sprung up like mushrooms—in Belgium, Sweden, the Netherlands, even in Mexico City. Nor is Germany alone subjected to it. Irish listeners in recently heard voices, said to belong to outlawed members of the Irish Republican Army, urging the Irish to lend England no aid if she should go to war.

BUT it is in Germany where widely scattered opposition has crystallized at last into a solid, united front against Hitler and Nazism; where minor differences have been forgotten in a mass radio attack upon a common enemy at the possible loss of life and limb—it is there that we marvel at the understatement of painful truth which serves as the introductory announcement to these illegal broadcasts:

"You are now hearing, in spite of the Gestapo, the German Freedom Transmitter . . ."

It is in Germany—almost alone—that such martyrdom is possible in this day and age, and it is upon the feverish causes of the martyrs that revolt is built. So revolt is building in Germany, and each passing day brings it closer to fruition. What event, what action of *der Fuehrer* will bring this civil war into the open? We can only wait and watch, for Hitler today is the same Hitler of Vienna and Munich and Prague, unpredictable and possessed of all the genius of a mad chess-player.

ASCAP Issue

Dear V. O. L.:

I wish to call your attention to a sentence on page five of your July 14 issue, wherein it is stated: "Watch for the fireworks. The National Association of Broadcasters is preparing to turn the heat on the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers monopoly!"

I feel sure that Radio Guide did not intend to convey a false impression to the minds of several hundred thousand readers by stating that ASCAP is a monopoly; and I am equally certain that in all fairness to the twelve hundred members of ASCAP—and I am speaking of the men whose brain-creations constitute a good deal of the entertainment that brightens the lives of millions of listeners—you will at least print this letter to show your readers that there is another side to the issue which prompted the above statement in Radio Guide.

Anyone in this country can create an invention, a play, a book, a cartoon, or even a slogan and be paid for its use. But it's darn funny, as soon as the song-writers ask payment for the use of their wares, we are accused of monopoly. The broadcasting stations are paying an average of only fifteen dollars per day per station to ASCAP, which in turn distributes this among 1,200 song-writers and publishers. Doesn't that seem like a trifling fee, compared to the thousands per hour that the radio titans collect from sponsors?

● Mr. Coslow is a member of ASCAP and should know whereof he speaks in the affairs of popular song-writers, for he is responsible for such hits as "Sing, You Sinners," "Was It a Dream" and

"At a Little Hot Dog Stand." Of course, no offense was intended in the statement mentioned by Mr. Coslow. We think this further explanation is needed to complete the picture of the controversy. The issue between broadcasters and ASCAP is not whether or not song-writers should be paid. The argument is about the method of payment and the amount. Broadcasters believe that the present system of payment is inequitable and object to the manner in which, they contend, the system was imposed upon them. We do appreciate Mr. Coslow's claim, and agree heartily, as do all broadcasters, that song-writers deserve credit and more than credit for their contribution to our entertainment.

Critics, Please Note

Dear V. O. L.:

I have seen a breakdown of the character of program service put out by NBC during 1938, and it spurs me to point out a few things to the critical listeners who continually cry that radio is crammed with tripe and that commercialization is killing the educational value of the broadcasting medium.

In the first place, more than one-fifth of NBC's programs last year were educational in character, over four thousand hours of broadcasting. While music, of course, accounted for more than half the total broadcasting time, it did suffer a decline. So also did comedy, believe it or not; and this is unbelievable—comedy consumed only about 3% altogether of the time!

Commercially sponsored programs monopolized only about thirty percent of the schedule, though it may seem like

much more than that to those sensitive to air advertising.

Frank Black's orchestral transcriptions of some of the Beethoven piano sonatas are models of their kind, faithfully reflecting the notes and spirit of the composer.

Opus No. 7, in A Flat, is an earlier sonata (1797), written a year before the composer has his first premonition of approaching deafness. The pages are amiable and even gay. In this clear-cut work it is easy to follow the similarity in construction between Beethoven's sonatas and his symphonies, the simple, contrasting themes and their ever-varied development. Also there are numerous episodes which in only slightly different form will be recognized by Beethoven followers as recurring in the music of his later years.

The opening section has agreeable flow, with moments of mild drama. The second movement is extended song, eloquent and warm. The third is the typical Beethoven scherzo, with moods joyous and serious. The finale, tenderly tuned, ripples along graciously, always returning to the chief

Fantasia for String Sextet (Byrd), *Minuet from "Le Bourgeois Gentilhomme"* (Lully), *Minuet* (Bolzoni), *The Quartet* and *Henrietta Schumann*; *Befreit* (Strauss), John Herrick, baritone; *Rondo Capriccioso* (Mendelssohn), Strings and Piano; *Stornellata Marinara* (Cimaro), *Sotto Il Ciel* (Sibella), John Herrick; *Verklaerte Nacht* (Schoenberg), String Sextet.

William Byrd (1542-1623) remains an outstanding ornament of England's most brilliant period in classical music. He was astonishingly modern for his time, both in harmony and workmanship. Put up with his lack of sensuousness—he was essentially a composer for the church—and you will love the pureness and dignity of his writing.

Lully set some of Moliere's plays to music, for the Versailles seances of Louis XIV. "Le Bourgeois Gentilhomme" (Moliere) is a comedy ballet in which Lully himself took the role of the Mufti. Richard Strauss used the same play for one of his operas.

Giovanni Bolzoni, Italian, died in 1919. Not well known outside of his native land, he nevertheless left much graceful and well-made music.

Schoenberg's "Transfigured Night" dates from his early period when he still did reverence to melody and euphony, and made Wagner his tonal god. This sextet was subsequent rewritten by him for orchestra.

American composers, ancient and contemporary, are accompanied here instructively, showing how they kept pace with time's progress and changes in the styles of music. Paine (1839-1906) wrote one of the first modern American operas (unperformed), named "Azara." He also created symphonic, chamber and church works. For many years he served as professor of music and organist at Harvard University, where he taught such eminent composers as Foote, Converse, Daniel G. Mason and John Alden Carpenter. "Oedipus Rex," incidental music (male voices and orchestra) for Sophocles' tragedy, had its premiere at Harvard in 1881.

George Chadwick (1854-1931), like Paine, added a teaching-career to his composing activities, and became the head of the New England Conservatory in Boston. He too taught Converse and Mason, as well as Sidney Homer, Henry Hadley, Horatio Parker, Edward B. Hill and William Grant Still. Operatic, symphonic, choral and chamber-music formed the Chadwick output.

Even in these earlier days an American composer could not live alone from his works (MacDowell and Foote taught also), and the same seems to hold good in our own time, as most of the current creators instruct at universities and conservatories. Hanson heads the great Eastman Music School in Rochester, New York. The suite on this program is from his opera, "Merry Mount," premiered at the Metropolitan in 1933. The libretto derives from a tragic tale by Hawthorne dealing with characters in the Puritan period of New England.

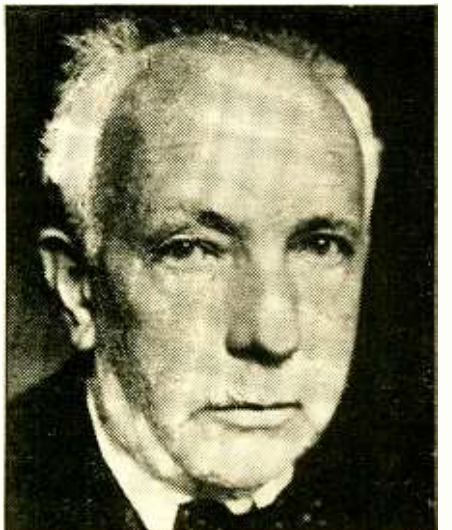

Richard Strauss subtitled his lengthy but inspired score, "Fantastic Variations on a Theme of Knightly Character." There are ten variations, an introduction and finale.

The subject is, of course, the eccentric and lovable knight-hero of the immortal novel by Cervantes, and Strauss' music depicts some of the adventures of the demented Don Quixote. The themes in the introduction are those of the Don himself and of the questionable Dulcinea, whom he idealizes into a great lady in distress. Solo cello sounds the theme of the Don and solo viola characterizes the comical Sancho Panza. Variation No. 1 describes the fight with the windmills. No. 2 is the encounter with the sheep, whose "Baa, baa" is heard in muted brass. No. 3 is conversation between the knight and his squire. In No. 4 they attack the band of pilgrims. Nos. 5 and 6 are devoted to Dulcinea. No. 7, the ride through the air. No. 8, voyage in the enchanted boat. No. 9, combat with the magician. No. 10 shows the Don beaten by the Knight of the White Moon and resolving to retire and become a shepherd. And then the finale, with the death of the Don, now sane and sorrowfully recalling his vain dreams and delusions. The passage is one of the most lovely and affecting in all music, and I, for one, never hear it without tear-filled eyes.

Aiming at Art

AS A rule sternly devoted to high art, this department very recently detoured into the subject of our native popular music. Resulting was the discovery that quite some merit must be credited to many of the pieces so generally sung and whistled by the average Mr. and Mrs. America and their young Americas. Always considering the clear line of demarcation between popular and art music, nevertheless the latter sometimes overlaps the other, both when the tunes and harmonies are original and when they derive or are lifted from the pages of the great masters.

Recently March of Music published that opinion. Now comes Meredith Willson (of the Concert Hall feature on "Good News of 1940") backing it up and undertaking to furnish practical proof. In a communication he points out that the universally beloved examples of art music are not the lengthy symphonies, tone poems, sonatas, etc., but the shorter minuets, preludes, serenades, caprices, barcarolles, vales, nocturnes, and the like. He cites Beethoven's and Paderewski's minuets, Schubert's Serenade, Chopin's Minute Waltz, Kreisler's Caprice Viennoise, Offenbach's Barcarolle, Rachmaninoff's C sharp minor Prelude, etc.

"There is no doubt," Mr. Willson goes on, "of the talent of our American composers of popular music, but (with the exception of Gershwin and his piano preludes) they never have written in the small art forms. Not because of lack of ability but because of lack of proper incentive and encouragement. Publishers keep on pushing them for the most salable product, and of course they are not averse to making as much money as possible. The public has permanently taken to its heart Rubinstein's Melody in F, Brahms' Lullaby and Mendelssohn's Spring Song, but it still buys more copies of Three Little Fishes, Deep Purple, and Begin the Beguine.

"I shall commission ten of the nation's most outstanding writers of popular music to compose ten original pieces in art form and content, and will premiere those works to a nation-wide audience during the Concert Hall part of 'Good News of 1940.' We can then see which of the gifted group are able

to adapt their melody-writing ability and rhythmic mastery to the small art forms that have endured so long. I feel confident that perhaps all the commissioners might come through the test with signal success."

The Willson plan starts soon after "Good News of 1940" resumes, when each week one of the ten composers will be asked to do an original piece in a specified standard form. The series is designed to bring forth an American minuet, American serenade, American barcarolle, caprice, lullaby and similar productions. "From among them," Mr. Willson hopes in conclusion, "may emerge at least one composition destined for immortality."

In his quest, Mr. Willson is aided by a committee including himself, Dr. Frank Black, Howard Barlow, the editor of The March of Music, and others. They are selecting the list of ten composers and have already chosen Ferdie Grofe, Peter de Rose, Dana Suesse, Vernon Duke, Morton Gould. Announcement of the other five is to follow shortly.

Speaking Up

THE March of Music correspondence has been lively lately, particularly in regard to musical hobbies. Readers of this column will remember that I told of the case of an Army veteran who compiled a log of all the composers and compositions he heard on the air. A pile of letters have come in, telling of others who are doing the same thing.

From Reading, Pa., a correspondent writes: "I have been doing the same thing for the last two years. My interest in music was started by my love for Nelson Eddy's singing and a consequent desire to know more about the songs he sang and the music he loved. With the slight knowledge of music I had, plus a growing love for it, Mr. Eddy's unconscious influence and the gift of a second-hand radio, I started to list all the music (real music) I heard on the radio. My list to date covers about 3,450 compositions and about 1,200 composers. I keep them in alphabetical order and in a loose-leaf binder."

A Chicago reader says: "The Army veteran has nothing on me. I just made a rough estimate of the compositions I have heard and they exceed 5,000." He goes on to illustrate his elaborate method of keeping his file, which is too complicated to reproduce here.

Not all the letters were about musical hobbies, however. One in particular bears quoting for its heartfelt, almost comic, sincerity and desperation. Helen Mutch, of Vancouver, British Columbia, writes: "You hit the nail on the head so well in your paragraph on music-jeerers. You see, I live with two jitterbugs whom I have the doubtful honor of calling my brothers. Now, as a result of this quirk of fate, I have to argue, battle and generally match wits against these two in order to hear any good music. The routine every night is, Is it to be Gorin or Goodman, Koussevitzky or Krupa? The classics usually win out, with no damage done . . . so far! If you print this, I hope you mention my name—for obvious reasons—one more for my side!" We're with you, Miss Mutch. Keep up the fight!

Men Behind the Music

This Week: ERNEST LA PRADE

EVERY Sunday morning a couple of years ago, in homes all over the United States, one or more members of the family settled themselves in front of the radio with a music-stand propped up before them. Some held fiddles, others flutes, clarinets, bassoons, oboes, tubas and double-basses. At precisely twelve noon the radio was turned on and the announcement came over the air, "This is the National Broadcasting Company presenting the NBC Home Symphony under the direction of Ernest La Prade." Then the voice of Mr. La Prade giving the number of beats to a bar; the A was sounded for

played only occasionally while acting as Dr. Walter Damrosch's assistant in the preparation and presentation of the "Music Appreciation Hour." Since becoming music-research director for NBC in 1937, La Prade never plays at all. Once in a long while a sudden spurt of energy makes him sit down and practise for hours. The next day he has sores on his fingers, and by the time they're healed the spurt has disappeared. So the violin goes back into its case for another six months.

Other things keep him busy. Continually on the hunt for new and exciting musical programs, La Prade has a

tuning; a metronome ticked out the time . . . and they were off. The studio orchestra, playing symphonies, tone poems, marches, overtures, was joined all over the land by the amateurs in shirt-sleeves. It was the biggest orchestra in the world, scattered over a whole country, most of whose members were unknown to one another, all playing in unison under a conductor they couldn't even see.

Slim, short, sandy-haired Ernest La Prade, responsible for the miracle, was astonished at its success. Thousands of letters from amateurs who played along at home with the regular radio orchestras gave him the idea in 1932. It took four years to carry it through. He had no way of telling just how many people joined the orchestra. But it was known that participating study-groups in forty-six states, six provinces in Canada, several foreign countries and even ships at sea were following the program. On that basis he figured quite a few people felt the urge to play in an orchestra.

He could understand the urge himself. For almost ten years he was first violinist of the New York Symphony, after a career as solo violinist and quartetist in America and Europe. Later he

finger in practically every musical pie at NBC. His connection with radio dates back to the middle twenties, when he was still a performer. Later he became conductor for some of the earliest big commercial programs and directed the first variety hour, put on by *Collier's Magazine*. Its form was much like the Vallee hour today, except that the playlets were dramatizations of stories in the magazine. He still remembers supplying one of the Fu Manchu serials with sinister oriental music, punctuated by plenty of mysterious wails. However, La Prade's biggest interest in radio has always been music appreciation. His "Alice in Orchestralia" series ran several years. Taken from his book of the same name, it tells of a little girl's adventures in the land of orchestral instruments. Adults got as much fun and instruction from it as children.

At present La Prade is working in close collaboration with Dr. Norman Angell, NBC's education consultant in its public-service campaign. Their aim is to get a complete radio coverage of every kind of music for children as well as adults. La Prade attends several

On Short Waves

Times given are Eastern Daylight Time. For EST and CDT subtract 1 hour; CST, 2 hours; MST, 3 hours; PST, 4 hours

THESE are troubled times in the history of the world. Events are happening with such breath-taking rapidity that even before the ink can dry on your newspaper extra, new pacts have been made, frontiers have been revised or territories have changed hands. War clouds gather or are dissipated, crises develop in successive waves. Only short-wave radio, its messages flung to the far outposts of the world with the speed of light, can hope to meet the challenge of carrying today's kaleidoscopic headlines to peoples everywhere while the news is still news. Since what is happening abroad can not help but affect you and me, you will want to know where and when to tune in direct news accounts, in English, of what is happening over there.

For news from the democracies, tune in London, at 5:30 p.m. EDT (GSD or GSP), GSP will be best; at 8:30 p.m. EDT (GSB, GSD or GSF), GSD should be best, or at 12 midnight EDT (GSB, GSC or GSD), GSC should be best, or tune in Paris at 11 p.m. EDT, TPB11 will be best.

News from the dictator countries can be heard as follows: From Berlin at 7 p.m., 9:15 p.m. and 11:30 p.m. EDT, in each case over Zeesen stations DJB, DJD, DJZ or DJP, DJD is usually best; from Rome at 8:30 p.m. EDT, over 2RO3, 2RO4, 2RO6 or IRF, 2RO4 is usually best, or from Moscow at 8 p.m. EDT, over RKI, RV96 or RAN, RV96 is best.

Poland's transmission for North America is put on daily from 7 to 10 p.m. EDT, over stations SPW and SPD. When conditions are favorable, fair reception is afforded by SPW. The latest news in English is given over Budapest, Hungary, station HAT4 (9.125) nightly near 8:30 p.m. EDT. As a rule this station is not well received in North America. English news periods from Tokyo, Japan, are radiated daily at 1:05 a.m. EDT over station JZK, and at 9:05 p.m. EDT,

over station JZL. Due principally to a poor choice of frequencies, these transmissions are none too well heard at present.

In accordance with the changed status of short-wave broadcast stations in the United States, WIXAL of Boston, Mass., has received the new call WSLR.

In honor of Guatemala's Day of Independence, special transmissions have been arranged for broadcast over "The Voice of Guatemala" station TGWA. The first of these broadcasts will occur

Wednesday evening, September 13, at 11:15 p.m. EDT on a frequency of 9.685 megs. The program will feature a concert of popular and dance music with the Marimba "Maderas de mi Tierra" of the National Police Force of Guatemala. The transmission of the great parade and gymnastic celebrations on the Campo de Marte's Field will be made on Thursday, September 14, at 10 a.m. EDT, on a frequency of 15.17 megs. At 11 p.m.

EDT, on the same day, a great concert of the Orchestra Progresista, conducted by Gaston Pellegrini and featuring talented soprano Aida Dominelli, will be radiated on a frequency of 9.685 megs. The closing ceremonies of the celebrations will be on Friday, September 15, at 11 p.m. EDT, when a great concert of the First Military Band of Guatemala, and other military bands from the Parque Central of Guatemala City, will be transmitted on a frequency of 9.685 megs.

WLWO (formerly W8XAL) of Cincinnati, Ohio, one of the pioneer international stations of the world, will have its power boosted to 50,000 watts some time this fall. When the new transmitter goes on the air, it will broadcast on the following frequencies: 6.06, 9.59, 11.87, 15.27, 17.76 and 21.65 megs.

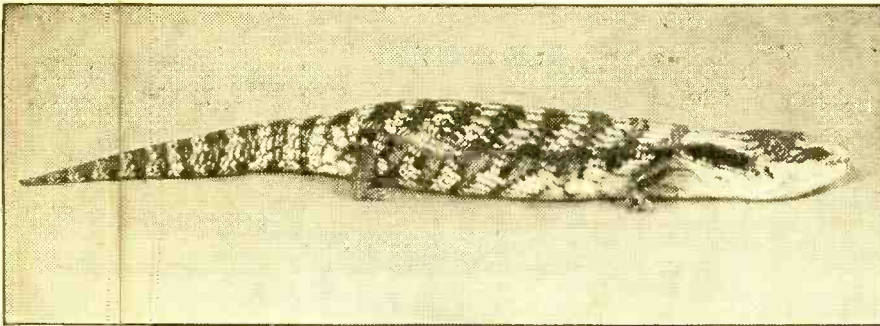

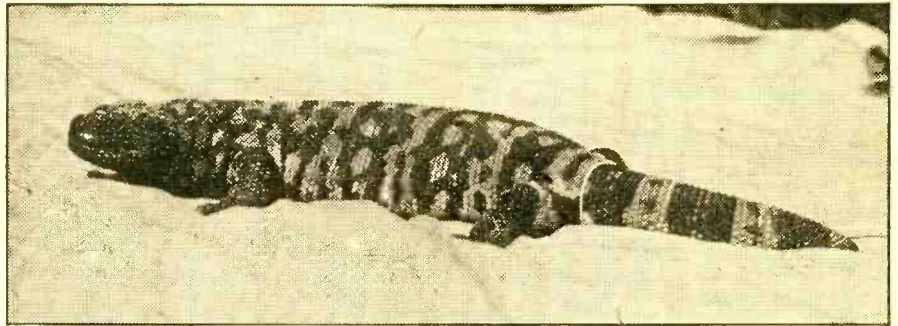

IS BABY SNOOKS A MENACE?



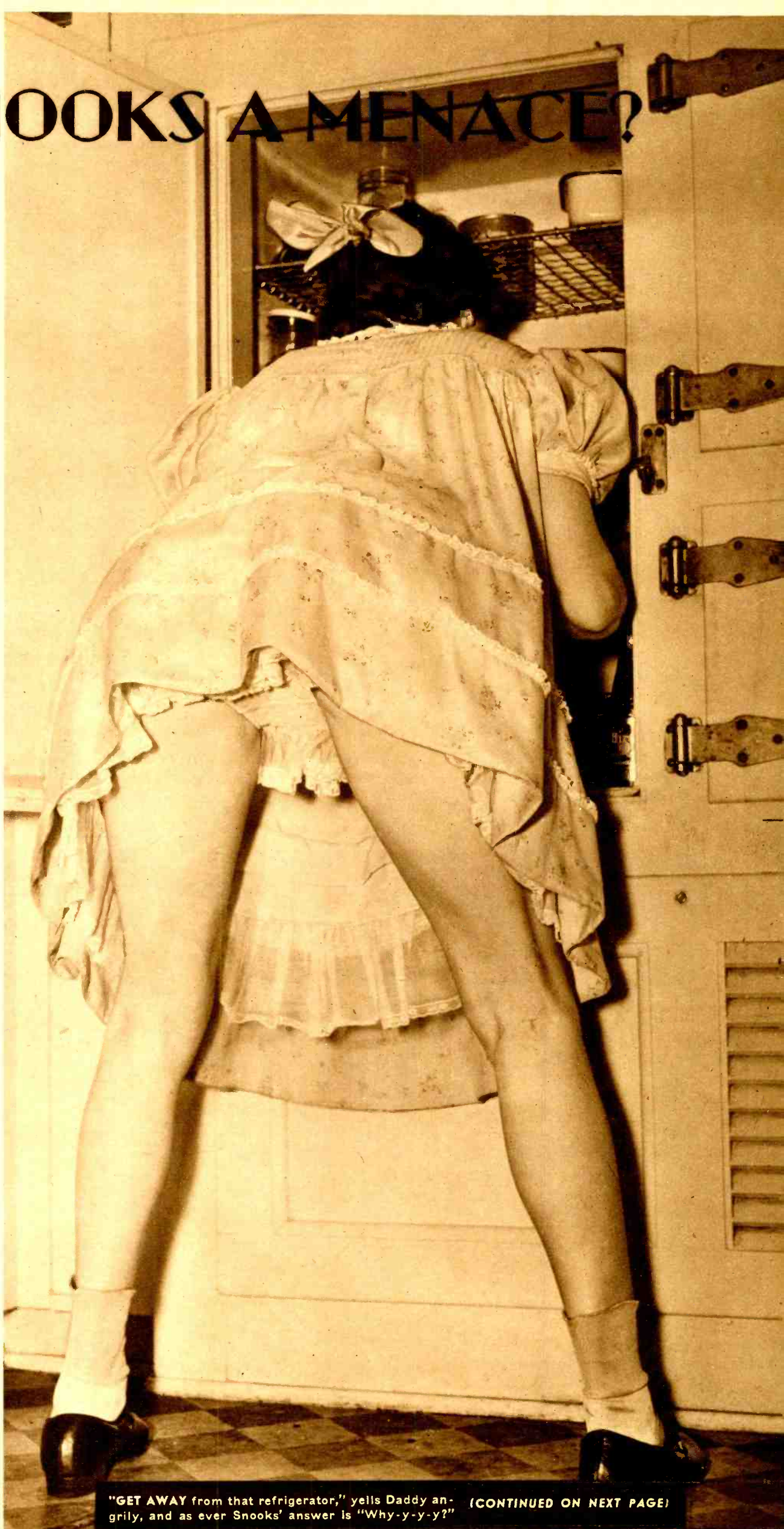

hear, but none are affected like impressionable juveniles. It was the kids who took up Eddie Cantor's idiotic lip-smacking and Joe Penner's "Wanna buy a duck?" And it is the kids who are supposed to be menaced by various crime programs. Psychiatrists have brashly pointed to such juvenile crimes as the murder of five-year-old Beverly Ann Page (seen above, left), of Windsor, Vermont, supposedly committed by a gang of boys, as a direct effect of programs like "Gang Busters" or "Big Town." The case of Hubert Nichols, Jr., 10 (below, left), who shot and killed Sheriff John Wormell, 72, at Asotin, Washington, to cash in on a promise of two dollars and a trip to Canada, is another instance in which psychiatrists pointed to radio thrillers as inciters to crime, obviously with no direct evidence or proof. Today, Fannie "Baby Snooks" Brice rivals the "Lone Ranger" and his "Hi-yo, Silver" for position of No. 1 influence on American children. Is Baby Snooks a menace? Do her antics encourage children to throw tantrums in order to extract favors from helpless parents? Are American parents being

enslaved by the radio brat who bawls her head off if "Daddy" Hanley Stafford ventures an innocent evening out occasionally? A number of psychiatrists are quick to say yes, again. Thoughtful parents, however, will analyze Baby Snooks' fun-making, give their children credit for some sense of humor, too. For a child's act held up to ridicule before his eyes should have as beneficial an effect on him as such procedure is known to have on adults. This is Fannie Brice's trump card: She makes kids laugh at their own kid-dishness; parents at their own blundering tactics. Fannie Brice, nearing fifty and proud of it, is the one radio comic who is equipped to handle this type of humor. Born on New York's East Side, Fannie hardly had time for education but learned plenty about people, especially children, on teeming Brooklyn streets. Her career began at an amateur show at Keeney's Theater, soared to starring roles in Ziegfeld's Follies, carries on in person of Baby Snooks, beloved brat of radio. During a life spent in show business, Fannie has run into all kinds of human beings, from Diamond Jim Brady to the poorest East Side ham down on his luck. 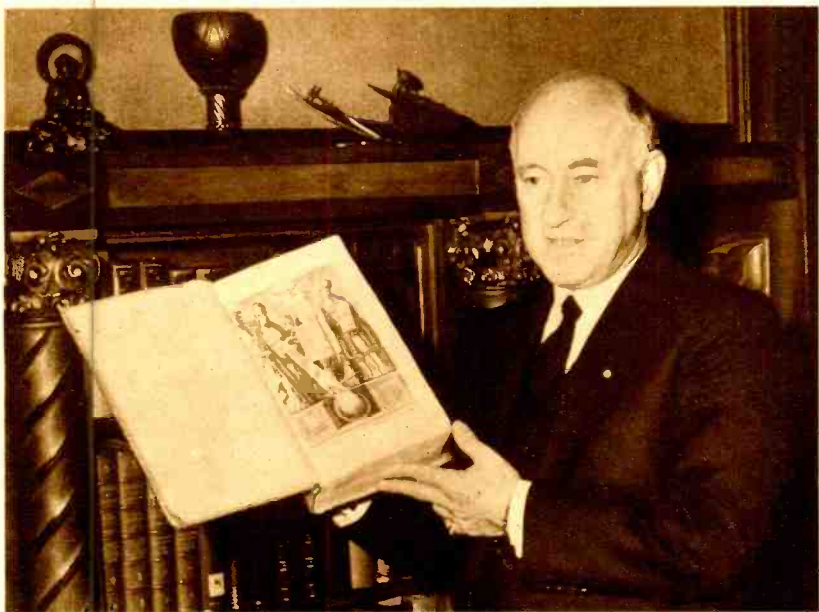

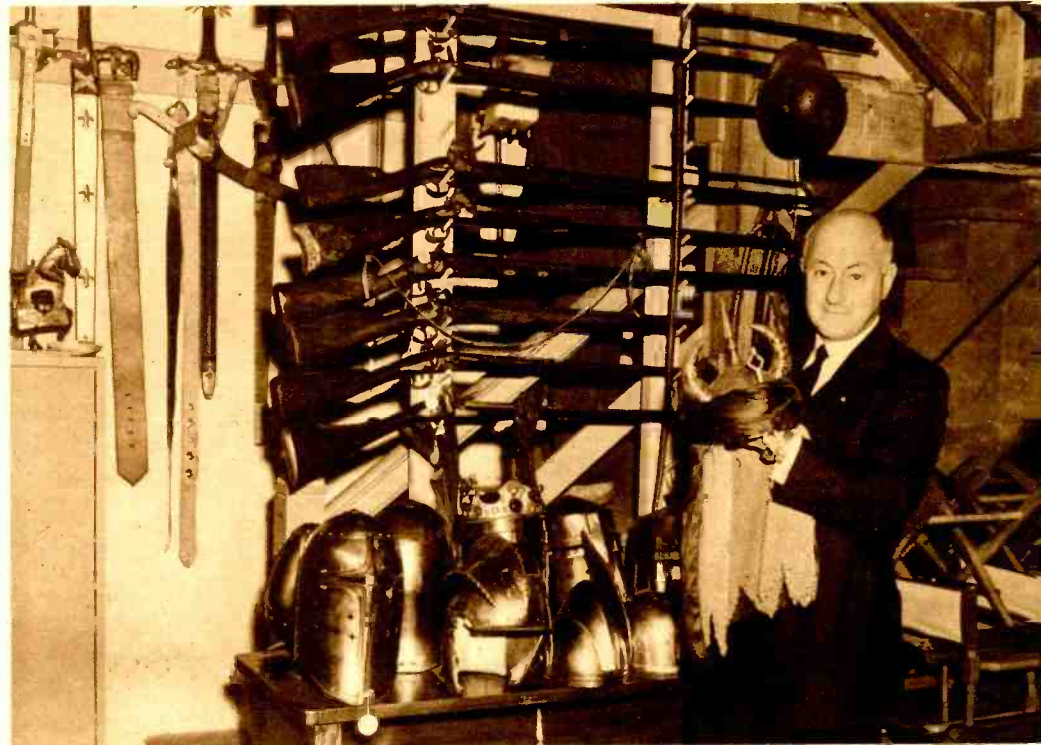

Scattered about his Hollywood estate are objects, ancient and beautiful, garnered from all the civilizations this world has known. These photos, from his secret house of treasures, will reveal a Cecil B. DeMille you didn't know.



TREASURE IN FAMILY TRADITION is this tracing of the earliest-known DeMille (originally DeMil) family seal, which the producer studies here. Professor Louis Pier de Boer of Los Angeles discovered the original on an old document when tracing DeMille geneology in France. The seal is 650 years old

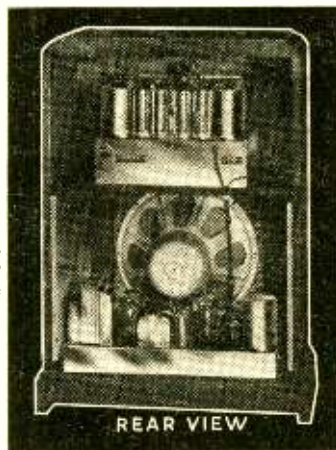

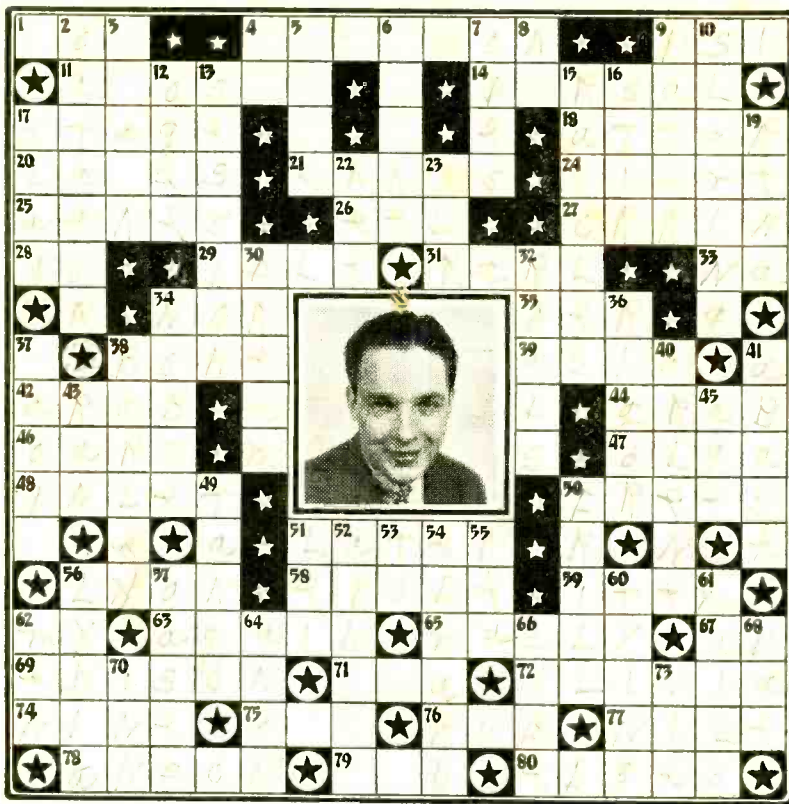

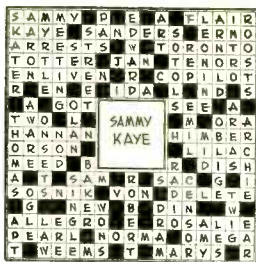

MEN BEHIND THE MUSIC

This Week: ERNEST LA PRADE

(Continued from Page 15)

auditions a week, judges scripts and program ideas, sometimes even writes scripts himself. If an orchestral series is decided on, La Prade is consulted as to its worth, the standing of the orchestra, whether or not the programs will be good and, if not, what alternative orchestra to use. In addition, he keeps his eyes and ears open for novelties. His Scotch-French ancestry keeps him well balanced, Scotch caution restraining French daring, so that most of his suggestions are practical as well as original. If he hears of something good he's apt to pack up at a moment's notice and go after it. A suggested American folk-music series took him to the heart of the blue-grass country. A harrowing train journey on a freight train in the small hours of the morning found La Prade gloomily wondering why he ever chose music as a profession. But a stay among those quiet, queerly dignified people rewarded him for his trouble. He collected a treasury of folk-tunes, later presented them on the air.

La Prade's search for talent does not, as a rule, take him quite so far afield. One trip, however, he hasn't missed in three years—since 1936 he conducts annually at the National Music Camp in Interlochen, Michigan. He has had charge of their broadcasts since 1930. He likes to conduct, "as," he said, "who doesn't?" But he also likes to fish. Interlochen gives him a chance to do both. His dry-fly technique is improv-

ing with the passing of each year.

A French flare for originality chose his living-quarters in New York. With his wife (nonprofessional) and his eleven-year-old daughter (nonmusical) he lives in what is probably the only country estate in New York City. Situated in the Garth (Close) of St. Mark's in the Bouwerie, it was formerly the old Delmonico restaurant, then a men's residential club, and has now been turned into apartments, surrounded by spacious lawns and gardens. La Prade's apartment was once the Delmonico kitchen. He lives quietly, entertaining little. He likes to go off on golfing or fishing trips with his family. His work keeps him too busy to do much besides listen to the radio!

Just now his hobby is the electronic orchestra, a result of his interest in the technical side of radio. He has made an intensive study of microphone placement, and his various papers on the subject have been accepted as standard texts by the NBC engineering department. He put the electronic orchestra on the air for one broadcast, and the response was so enthusiastic a series was started. La Prade is a roofer for electric instruments, thinks they have a big future.

He's still, however, faithful to his first love, the "Home Symphony," and hopes to see it back on the air this winter. Nothing, he confesses, gives him a greater sense of satisfaction than conducting an orchestra of several million people.

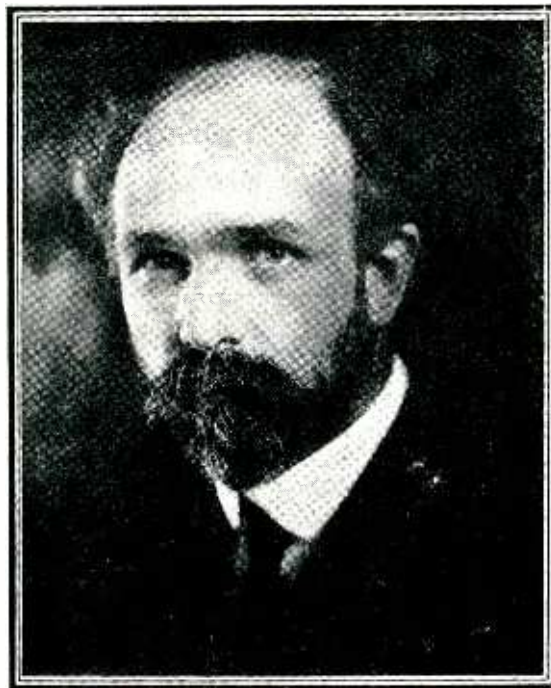
