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THE 1939 WORLD SERIES

Baseball's classic begins October 4,
with MBS broadcasting to the nation

THE World Series of 1939 begins in New York's Yankee Stadium on Wednesday, October 4. The complete event will be broadcast by the Mutual Broadcasting System through stations all over the country. (See the program section for further details.)

Will there be a hero or a goat this year? Undoubtedly. There will also be spectacular thrills of a color such as only the baseball classic can paint. Will there be a Merkle pulling the colossal blunder of neglecting to touch a base in a crucial game? Will there be a Pepper Martin completely demoralizing the foe by running wild on the base paths? Will there be a pigeon holding up the game while players and umpires chase it all over the diamond?

The world series of the past have furnished countless examples of the heroic, the bizarre and the spectacular. Go back just to 1922, for instance, and find that the umpires called a series game because of darkness when it was still broad daylight! There was an immediate public uproar, the gate receipts were turned over to charity, and Will Rogers observed, "The umpires in my home town may not be up on all the fine points, but, by gum, they can tell day from night!"

In the 1923 series veteran Casey Stengel of the Giants hit a drive to the wall. As Casey rounded second he slowed down and started limping. After he finally beat the ball to the plate by an eyelash, his mates expressed concern over his injury. Casey said it was nothing, his shoe had simply come off—but both shoes were still on! Then he remembered—he had put a sponge in one shoe for his blistered heel, and the sponge had sailed out. Casey had seen it out of the corner of his eye and, convinced he was run-

ning with one shoe off, staggered the rest of the way home!

Baseball fans will never forget that crucial game in 1926 when the murderous Yankees were threatening to go on a spree. Tony Lazzeri was at bat with the bases full and two out, and Cardinal manager Hornsby sent into the box wise old Grover Cleveland Alexander. Alex, with five pitches, struck out the dangerous Poosh-em-up Tony, turned the tide, and gave the hot-stove league something to talk about forever.

In 1929 occurred one of the most astounding pieces of baseball strategy in any series. Foxy old Connie Mack surprised and confounded the whole sports world by starting the first game with pitcher Howard Ehmke, considered an old has-been. But Connie hadn't been keeping Ehmke around the club for nothing. The veteran went to the mound and beat the Cubs three to one.

THE most dramatic of all such hero acts was put on by Babe Ruth in 1932. The Cub players and fans had been giving the Babe a particularly juicy razzberry in this game. Babe was sore. Came the first pitch from Charlie Root. Strike one—and Ruth waved one finger defiantly at the crowd. Pitch two, strike two—and he waved two fingers. Then two balls. And then with a sweeping gesture that every eye in the park could see, the Babe pointed to the center-field bleachers. Nobody breathed at this colossal prediction. Pitch five—Babe swung and the ball sailed far out into the indicated spot in the bleachers for a tie-breaking homer.

Things like that make the World Series the most colorful sports spectacle in the world. You can bet there will be something this year, too. (Turn to Next Page)

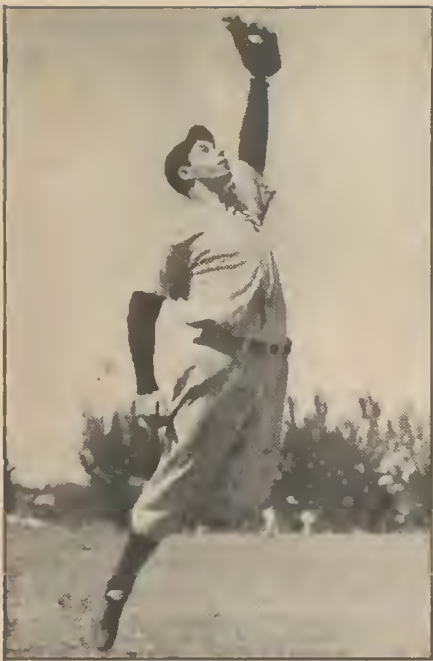

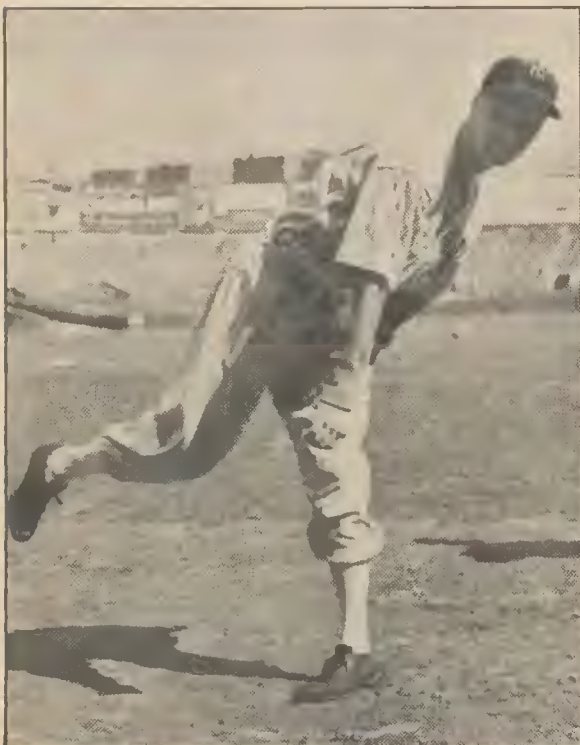

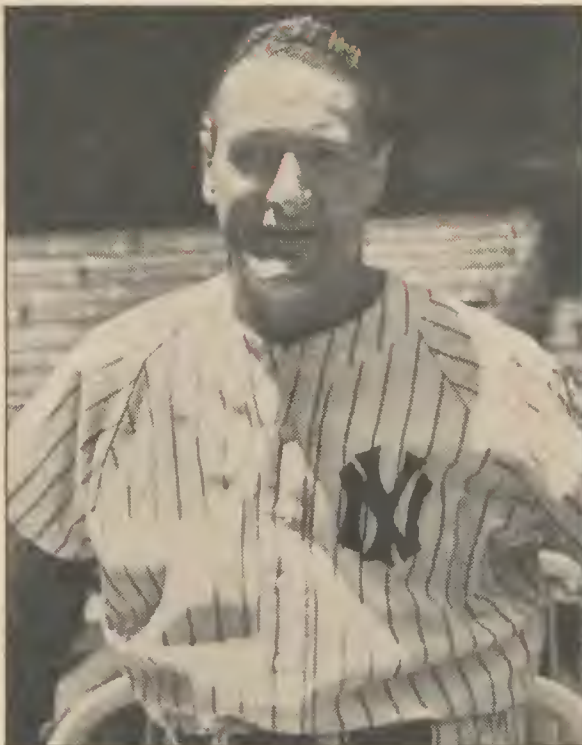

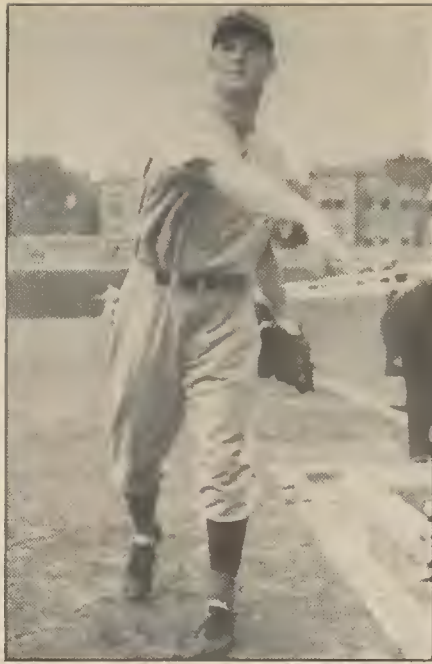
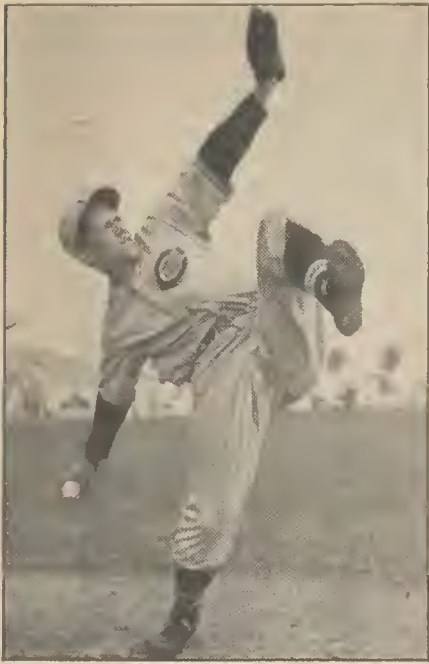

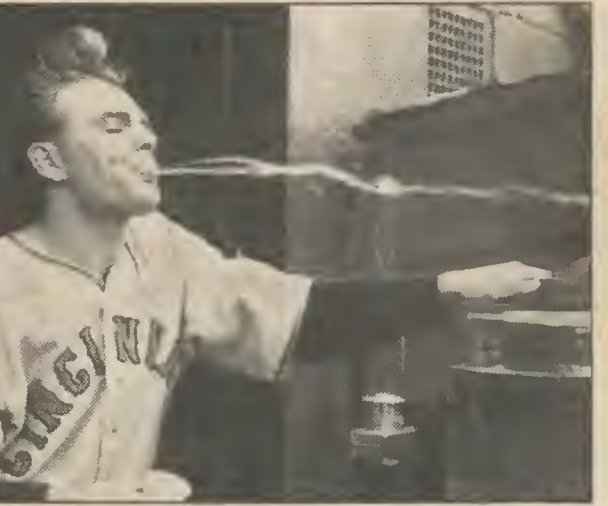

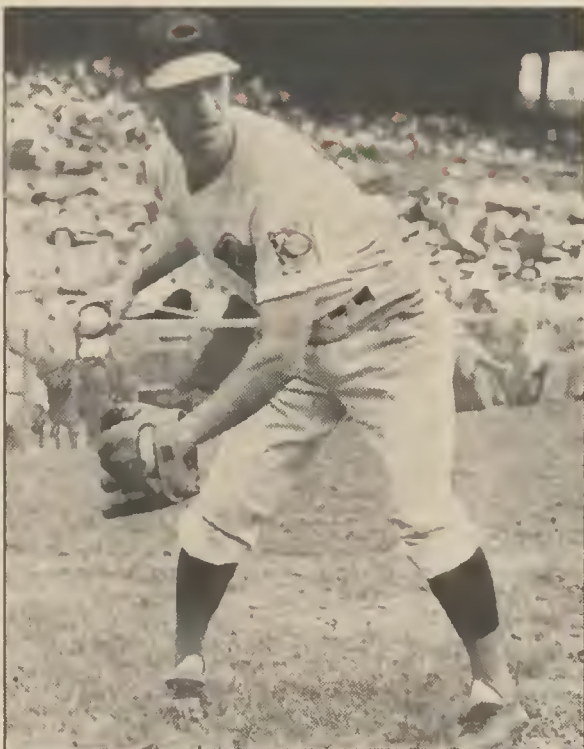
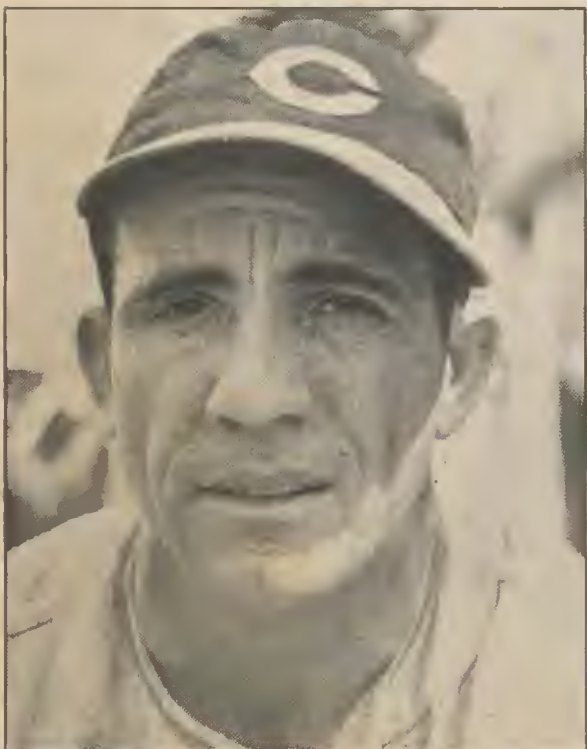

Slang Glossary

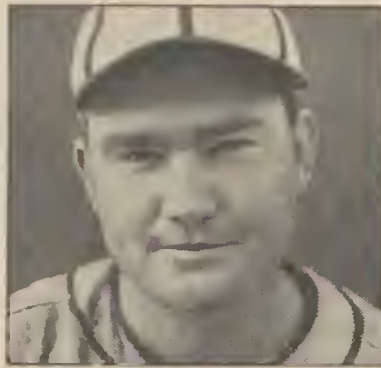

If you don't know all the words, to help you to be right at home with everything that's being said around you and on the air, here are some of the most common—and some of the most colorful—terms and their synonyms:

Apple, pill—baseball; meat hooks—hands; stick—bat; bag-puncher—talkative player; Jake Stahl—player who feigns injury; Jesse James—the umpire; nubber, Texas leaguer, dunker—weak hit just over heads of infielders; duster—ball thrown at batter; high and tight—pitch high inside; drag—ball pulled toward first by left-handed hitter; boot—error; cousin—a pitcher certain teams like to face; ducks on the pond—men on bases; twin killing—double play; cripple—the perfect pitch a pitcher must come through with after he has delivered three bad balls; hit-and-run—runner on first runs on the signal that the batter will try to hit and place the hit; down Broadway—beautiful pitch; round trip—home run; playing the string out—waiting the pitcher out to try to get a base on balls.

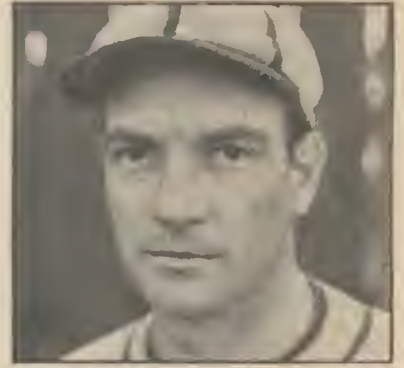

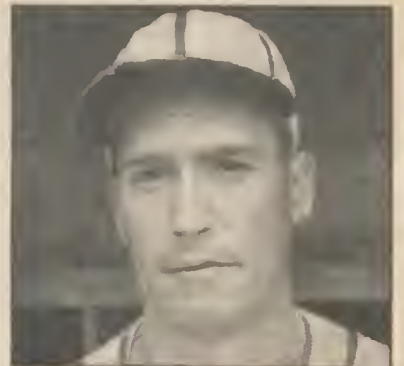

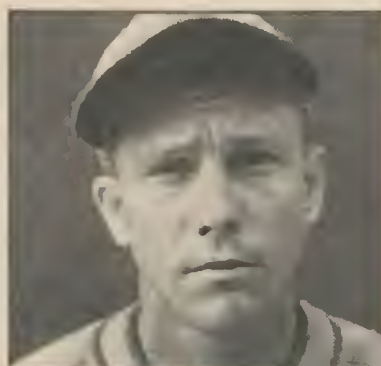

One thing is certain, he will not do radio work and make a picture at the same time—it's too tough doing both. Jack stated that he may make a movie with Fred Allen next summer.

Program Notes

"By Kathleen Norris" is the title of a new daytime serial to be heard over CBS Mondays through Fridays starting October 9. The novels of this distinguished writer will be dramatized, with "Women in Love" scheduled for the first program . . . "Billy and Betty" is another new script series soon to be heard over CBS. No date has been set for its debut . . . "Joyce Jordan, Girl Interne" will be heard three hours later than its present schedule starting Monday, October 9 . . . A petition with many signatures has been sent to this desk urging that "What's My Name?" with Arlene Francis and Budd Hulick, be kept on the air. I'm adding my name to it, and some sponsor looking for a program would be wise in grabbing this highly entertaining and amusing program.

Horace Heidt's "Pot of Gold" program, now heard on Tuesday nights, will make at least one person very happy every week. During the course of each broadcast a telephone number somewhere in the U. S. A. will be called. If it is answered, the party called will receive \$1,000 as a gift from the sponsor. If the phone is unanswered the party called will still receive a check for \$100 and the remaining \$900 will be added to the next week's jack-

pot, bringing it to \$1,900. If I thought it would help I'd put my telephone number down right here.

Behind the Scene

Dropped into CBS Theater No. 1 Friday night and caught Prof. Quiz in the act of stupilying five men and women with those eternally interesting quiz questions of his. Incidentally, I noted something that hadn't met the eye before. The rotund Prof. has an old, battered felt hat which serves as the receptacle for the slips of paper on which the questions are written. The fact that it obviously had seen much service was intriguing, so a little probing brought to light the fact that this selfsame hat has been with the Professor's show since its inception.

At CBS No. 3 Sunday night the S. R. O. sign had to be dusted off and hung out. Reason was because an exceptionally fine musical program, with Jane Froman and Erno Rapee's orchestra, was going off the air to be replaced by the "Screen Guild Show," which, according to the sponsor, will bring to the mike every star and near-star in the Hollywood firmament. Just before the show went on the air we saw announcer Harry von Zell and conductor Rapee deep in conversation. Sliding over to get an earful of what might be something big, what do you think they were discussing? Week-end experiences! Oh, well, people remain human no matter who they happen to be. Incidentally, if any of you had the idea that Erno was conducting that big symphony orchestra which plays at Radio City Music Hall, then you are mistaken.

It was only a peanut edition on the air, but Rapee's genius made it sound very effective. As a matter of fact, we were surprised ourselves to find out that it wasn't the Music Hall orchestra. Which goes to show that it does take a fine conductor to get really excellent music out of a group of players, large or small.

There was more than ordinary excitement at the "Tune-Up Time" rehearsal last week. They were all making plans about their impending trip to Hollywood, from where the program will originate next Monday. Kay (Rhythm Singers) Thompson says a trip to San Francisco is already scheduled. Lily Pons, Andre Kostelanetz' wife, is giving a concert there the latter part of October and they're all going up to hear her. Kay, incidentally, is getting her traveling trousseau gathered together in plenty of time. She left rehearsal, in fact, to have a fitting. Kay has her job cut out for her when she lands in Hollywood. In the short space of a few days she has to organize a new choir and teach them their songs.

I went to a rehearsal of the preview of Columbia's "Tuesday Night Party," starring Walter O'Keefe. Walter has Bobby Dolan's orchestra playing for him and he feels pretty swell about it. Dolan and O'Keefe are a sort of modern "Damon and Pythias." They got their start together about ten years ago at Barney Gallant's night-club in New York, with Dolan playing piano while O'Keefe sang. Walter has uncovered a new stooge in the person of Keenan Wynn, Ed Wynn's son. Keenan was

nervous, it being his very first radio appearance, but his father can be proud of him.

Had a chat with Ruth Carhart after she finished a "Story of the Song" broadcast at CBS last week. She told me she and Jane Froman were classmates at the University of Missouri, but that they haven't seen each other in over a year—even though Jane has been singing over CBS on the "Musical Playhouse." "I guess we'll have to go back to a class reunion," said Ruth, "if we're ever going to have that long talk we've promised each other."

Script-Notes

Here are a few sidelights on some script-shows I visited this week . . . Bennett Kilpack, who plays Doc Barclay in "Doc Barclay's Daughters," is a bachelor, but he says he's learning what it's like to be the father of four grown-up girls. They all call him "Pop" and make him go along whenever they go on shopping sprees or to the movies together. "As soon as they start picking out my shirts and ties," says Bennett, "I'm going to have to put my foot down" . . . Ray Collins, who as Doc Hackett runs a drug store in "County Seat," says he worked in a drug store during the summer months when he was a boy. He spent most of the time, he says, in the basement shaving ice for the soda-fountain. He developed a nice little racket, though. The two soda-clerks were both going with his sister on their alternate nights off, and both wanted to keep in good with Ray—so Ray never suffered a shortage of ice-cream sodas.

DeMille produces a ghost; Bob Hope lands Judy Garland despite movie ban

HOLLYWOOD.—Hot enough for you? Last week this town's high-temperature records were smashed three days in a row—and your reporter could be arrested for lack of covering if the law saw him pounding out this column. The heat casualties, reported by press-agents and itemized to date include: (1) Frances Langford noticed a discoloration on the ceiling of her guest room; investigation revealed that wild honey-bees had built a hive between the rafters and the heat had melted their honeycombs; (2) Jim (Fibber McGee) Jordan's walnut crop was toasted on the trees; (3) Ken Murray, napping to cure a case of flu, suddenly awakened to find a sleeve of his dressing-gown smoldering—a fish-bowl in the rays of the sun had focused them on his arm, and (4) Arthur (Dagwood Bumstead) Lake was driving down Hollywood Boulevard when he heard a series of pistol-shots right behind him; he jammed on his brakes to discover several of a half-dozen bottles of carbonated water had exploded from the heat! . . . Aside from that, there was an increased interest in the "weather report" program listings in RADIO GUIDE. They even put the war bulletins in the shade—what there was of it.

Making (Cold) Wind Talk

Most unusual sound-effects problem came to the front when Cecil B. DeMille staged "Wuthering Heights" for Lux Radio Theater. In the play the frigid, howling wind sweeps the moor and talks as the voice of Kathy's ghost. Charles Forsyth and Gilbert Wright, son of novelist Harold Bell Wright,

rigged the effect by having a man stand at a microphone wearing a set of earphones clamped to his cheeks. Through the phones flowed a constant howling sound. The man talked silently, making all the motions of speech but not uttering even a whisper, and the howling sound went through his lips and came out a ghastly voice—Kathy's voice!

Live Mikings . . .

Judy Garland's booking as a steady vocalist on Bob Hope's resumed Peppodent show is a victory for that program's producer. Judy's under contract to M-G-M, and just before that radio-fighting movie lot put a ban on its players broadcasting, the little lady was placed under option to Hope! . . . Earliest Sunday program rehearsal ever was that of the Gulf "Screen Guild Theater" September 24, which began at 7 a.m. Reason was the day was guest-star Mickey Rooney's twentieth birthday and a big party had been planned for him. Incidentally, the new "Screen Guild" series comes from the Earl Carroll Theater Restaurant, which was found acoustically the best large studio in Hollywood. Carroll is giving the rental fee back to the Motion Picture Relief Fund . . . Before Ona Munson premiered September 19 with Edward G. Robinson on "Big Town," she took her mother to numbers of Hollywood radio dramas just to study their technique, she confessed at the dinner party which followed the opening Rinso broadcast.

Standard Brands is having trouble getting the old cast back for "Those

We Love," which is slated to go to work for Royal Gelatin October 5. Nan Grey, Bob Cummings and Donald Wood have progressed far in pictures since last January, when the radio drama serial folded . . . Scoop: Ken Murray, the bachelor Texaco Theater comic, has his order in to adopt a baby boy. Ken's afraid he'll never get married—so he might as well start his family now . . . Grouch Club grouch-master Jack Lescoulie has a new grouch—amateur plane-pilots. He almost missed his September 17 broadcast by being passenger with a pilot friend whose ship made a forced landing half-way between San Francisco and Hollywood . . . Freeman ("Andy") Gosden has progressed so far with his hobby of color photography that the Saturday Evening Post is considering one of his subjects for a possible cover.

Edith Meiser, who wrote the very successful "Adventures of Sherlock Homes" radio adaptations for G. Washington's coffee, is again scripting the Conan Doyle works when they renew October 2 for Grove's Bromo Quinine, with Basil Rathbone as Holmes and Nigel Bruce as Dr. Watson. Incidentally, Los Angeles fans will have the unusual opportunity of hearing each Holmes adventure twice—on Mondays at 9 p.m. PST over KFI and Tuesdays at 5:30 p.m. over KECA . . . Sandra Burns, daughter of George Burns and Gracie Allen, was enrolled in kindergarten for the first time last Monday—and George had to leave the school before classes could be put in order. All the youngsters wanted the autograph of Sandra's daddy!

Bing "Two Times" Song

The mystery of Pat Friday's singing, two weeks in succession, of "A Man and His Dream" has been solved. While vacationing, Bing Crosby's auto radio went sour and he missed the first rendition. He told Pat he'd failed to hear it, so she repeated a week later. Bing heard it on his home radio . . . That young lady, by the way, is the most popular rush-committee chairman of any of the sororities on the campus of the University of California at Los Angeles. This year her sorority has first pick of all new girls. And despite several New York radio offers, Miss Friday intends to finish her college course—in domestic science—to fit herself to be an A-1 homemaker!

Portrait of a Busy Young Man

In addition to singing and acting on Hormel's "It Happened in Hollywood," John Conte is announcing the "Screen Guild Theater," "Big Town" and will also be heard introducing the "Sherlock Holmes" dramas. And while Kay Kyser, who has just been renewed for another thirteen weeks by Lucky Strike, stays in Hollywood, Conte shares microphone honors with Ken Niles on that series. Conte really ran into a few conflicts last week-end, however, when the CBS "It Happened in Hollywood" special car rolled eastward for broadcast and personal appearances in St. Louis, Chicago and Austin, Minn. Martha Mears and the troupe left by train September 22. Conte did the "Screen Guild Show" September 24 and then flew to St. Louis to rejoin the Hormel program staff. On Friday, September 29, he will again fly back to Hollywood to announce the "Screen Guild Theater" on Sunday. He had to be excused from his "Big Town" and Kyser show duties . . . These broken men with horror-haunted eyes—is it theirs?

IS IT possible to forget what war means? To forget the hideous actuality of man fighting man, of guns and gases wiping out humanity, destroying civilization? To forget the nameless horrors of war itself and the endless agonies of the grim aftermath of war?

I twisted the dial of my radio and the answer poured out on me from every corner of the globe . . .

Twenty years ago seething European hatreds caught up American men in a boiling cauldron of passions and desires and atrocities. Twenty years ago, a generation of American manhood marched blithely out to its destruction.

I share a world-wide horror at the Munich fiasco, at the pitiful fate of Czechoslovakia, at the dire straits in which Poland has been plunged by the wilful Tiger of Europe. I writhe at Chamberlain's vacillation in this tragic hour, at the futile exchange of ultimatums. And yet someone must speak the last, the decisive word. The fate of all the civilized world hangs in the balance.

I twist my dial again—and I know the world has gone mad. I listen to the hysterical tones, the frenetic words of the Tiger himself. I listen to the suave,

measured statements of the English King, of Chamberlain, of Churchill, of Daladier. I hear newspaper and radio commentators, groggy for lack of sleep, trying desperately to keep up with the news and interpret it even before it happens. I hear of gas-masks for babies and of the evacuation of small children from London's danger zone, and my arm goes out in protest around the shoulders of my young son, pressing him close.

Yesterday, during visiting hours, I was, as whenever possible, in the Veterans' Hospital with my husband. I thought—not for the first time, I assure you—of the tragic waste of war, as typified by these men, hundreds and thousands of useful citizens converted by bullets, by gas, by nervous exhaustion, into governmental charges.

WAS a schoolgirl during the last war. My husband, a few years older, exerted every effort to enlist until he was at last accepted in spite of extreme nearsightedness. War to him—then—was adventure, excitement. It meant dancing in the Palais Royal in hobnail boots, it meant plowing through the mud in Brest to keep a date with a black-eyed French girl—under the

eagle eye of her stalwart mother. But soon, too soon, it was to mean whining bullets not quite drowning out the screams of men . . .

What was he thinking of now, with rumors of new war crashing down upon a bewildered world? He took off his earphones, flung them wearily aside. He could listen no more. His eyes, often dull and apathetic, were bright now, glistening with excitement.

"WHEN the Armistice was declared," he said, "the kids in the streets of Paris went wild. Kids four—six—eleven years old—shouting, dancing, screaming with delight, crying 'Finis, la guerre—finis, la guerre!' Those are the kids," he said, "that are marching to war today."

He moved uneasily on his pillow and spoke again. "I'm going to get out of here—I'm going to write to Washington—I'm going to enlist. We, the veterans, should be the ones to go. One generation has already been destroyed—it isn't fair another should be ruined."

We, my husband and my son and I, are only three people, our small three-cornered tragedy only one out of a world of such tragedies. But we can see life only in terms of our own experi-

ence, and looking backward I remember with what eagerness we embarked on our marriage, how complacently we looked forward to years of happiness together. Not foreseeing how, belatedly, the war would catch up with us, would strike us down, would wrest from us the best years of our life.

Here on a narrow hospital cot he lies, one of many men whose life was ruined all those years ago, his nervous system shattered by this war of yesterday.

Beside him on the next cot lies a man who has lived all of these years in one Government hospital or another and who, bit by bit, has had what was left of the body he gave to "save democracy" whittled away by surgeons.

Each day as I go in and out of the hospital, I see these men, men who went to France to die but for whom the final agony has been long drawn out. Some came back, found no adjustment to normal living possible, found no jobs awaiting them, found illness and nervous breakdowns interrupting such hand-to-mouth existence as they were able to make for themselves. Others have known only a long procession of beds, of tedious hospital regime, of unremitting agony and pain, since the guns roared and the whistles blew that final

salute. Yesterday a man who had been eight years dying a slow, painful death at last was released. Others have been twenty years at it, twenty years of mortal agony, relieved only by hypodermics and dreams.

Each day I meet and chat briefly with the wives of such men. Many of them have no existence themselves outside of the hospital, but come early in the morning, stay late at night, leave only to get a needed night's rest and to hurry back, lest in the meantime, in spite of their loyalty and faithfulness, the one whose narrow life they share has slipped away alone into the dark.

Across the way is the cemetery, row upon row of white crosses, added to day by day.

Not far down the road is what is euphemistically called the neuropsychiatric wing. Within its high brick walls are only the bodies of men, bodies inhabited by tormented minds that know no peace. Bodies clad in ugly dungarees, queer shapeless socks tied over shuffling feet, and empty pockets—no tiny possession being allowed them lest in some weird unpredictable manner a man find his own way of escape. Watch these men and you will know what war is.

I twist the dial of my radio again impatiently and I think with renewed heartbreak of the ordinary, simple pattern of American life—a small home, a garden, a man coming home at night, a woman waiting, a wife, a mother. That is a child's birthright, isn't it? No matter how small or unpretentious, just a home, with two parents and enough love to make up for any other lack.

But my eleven-year-old son has carved out a life of his own, with mother at work and father in the hospital.

I deeply regret that I cannot stay home and be a housewife and mother. I regret beyond words the lost years that his father and I will never have together now. But though we two adults have paid dearly for the war that was to end wars, our son is already paying, too.

And what lies ahead for him? What can possibly lie ahead? And for all those sturdy, eager boys now in their twenties? They can't remember the last war. War to them is only adventure, excitement, glamour, glory . . .

In France now the age limit has been extended from sixteen to sixty. In Poland little boys no older than my son are digging trenches. In England mothers and fathers have voluntarily sent their children away, in hope of greater safety. In Germany mothers weep, too, over stalwart young sons marching off to war. What kind of world are we living in when children at play, children in school are no longer safe?

I remember past slogans: "Keep us out of war," "Make the world safe for democracy," "Peace at any price," "Back to normalcy." That is history. That men everywhere should forget what war means, forget the interim of horror between yesterday's war and today, is beyond belief.

I know a dark despair. I am, first and foremost, a mother. I have already learned by bitter experience what war can do. War has already, in the deeper sense, deprived me of my husband. Will it deprive me of my son, also?

I am drawn as by a powerful magnet to my radio again. England prepares to blockade the Baltic, North and Mediterranean seas. Gas bombs fall on Polish towns. Herr Hitler puts the blame for war on Britain. France and England devoutly believe their cause is the cause of justice. The last word has at last been spoken—it is no longer a matter of appeasing the Tiger. The War of Frightfulness has begun.

I hear marching feet and the whine of machine-gun bullets. I see white crosses—and rows upon rows of narrow beds where lie the living dead. My soul cries out for one more last word. And again the radio answers.

"Tonight," says a rich, vibrant voice, long familiar to radio listeners, "my single duty is to speak to the whole of America."

Hope leaps up in my heart and I listen intently to those smooth-flowing words: ". . . the influence of America should be consistent in seeking for humanity a final peace . . . I hate war—I say that again and again. I hope the United States will keep out of this war . . ."

And finally, "As long as it remains within my power to prevent it, there will be no black-out of peace in the United States." So speaks President Roosevelt.

BLACKBOARDS versus black-outs — children romping through the streets against children huddling in bomb-proof shelters underground . . .

Can there be a choice? I am reminded that the Tiger's people are not listening to the radio, that they have no choice. The radio, bringing the world and its problems to our doorstep, to our living-rooms, is one small evidence of our freedom, our essential integrity and poise. The radio, bringing its message of horror, bringing also its promise of the enduring power of intelligence, of the triumph of reason, is our hope in this time of travail.

The President's words, his cool sanity, are good to hear. Does all America hear them and understand their implications? We must not delude ourselves. In unity alone can there be peace.

I turn my radio off, in silent prayer that the last word has indeed been spoken—that the last word is Peace.

THE LIES BEGIN

Radio blares a
war of terror
and atrocities

SINCE the outbreak of the war the Nazis and Allies have been blasting away at each other on four fronts. Three of them are the air, the sea, the land. The fourth is short-wave radio.

While planes make power-dives and artillery captains figure out trajectories, the radio chiefs of the belligerent powers are moving their pins around on the map of etherland. Radio's bombs of propaganda spiels, its rat-tat-tat of atrocity stories, its whine of victory bulletins can be heard nearly all day long. And no Maginot Line nor Siegfried Line can stay their invasion.

Indeed, Adolf Hitler has already admitted the little out-foxers give him the jitters by passing a law that says it's illegal to listen to any and all foreign broadcasts. Just tuning in will fetch you a season pass to the local concentration camp. And if you pass it on to the fellow with whom you're quaffing a Wurzbürger it's the gallows.

And the ex-corporal—as well as the Allies—is going to have plenty of short waves coming his way. Alongside of these programs, the English bombardments of "I Accuse" pamphlets will seem like chicken-feed. For short waves do not need perfect flying conditions or smart pilots who know how to dodge murderous anti-aircraft fire. They can drop in for a chat at Fritz Schmidt's place in Dusseldorf or Sir Horace Twickenham's in Surrey 365 days of the year, day or night, winter or summer.

Persecution complexes to the side, just what has Hitler to fear from enemy programs? And what have the Allies to expect from him? Let's look at the Allies first:

John Bull Lets Fly: The biggest radio worry Hitler takes with him to his eagle's nest atop Berchtesgaden is probably the BBC output from England. The

British are concentrating on going above the heads of the Reich leaders in order to reach the man in the street. They constantly emphasize their peaceful feelings for the German people and deplore the need for waging war against them. Here, for example, is a BBC specimen:

"Your leaders have told you that you are not to listen to foreign broadcasts, because they are bad for your nerves. But it is your memory and thoughts that they fear. Never in all history has a government sentenced its people to death on a smaller pretext. We, the British people, also desire peace and wish to conclude it with any peaceful German government. We have no enmity against you, the German people."

ENGLISH musical programs mark another attempt at making friends with Hansel and Gretel. Instead of sticking to English music and prating endlessly about English culture, etc., BBC goes on the air with German music both classical and popular. Among the former are the three B's—Brahms, Beethoven and Bach. On the lighter side are medleys from German operettas and Reich song hits.

Not So Gay Paree: From an American listening-post it would seem that the French are emphasizing the western front much more than the short-wave front. The short-wave programs which do come through are comparatively infrequent and somewhat on the terse side. They generally consist of army communiques telling of French advances, short dramatic sketches in which Hitler is depicted as a villain, and an occasional musical program. One of the news events they have been headlining has been Dr. Benes' call to the Czechs in France and throughout the world to form a Czech legion.

From Beleaguered Warsaw: Polish

short wave consists in the main of communiques to the effect that Polish soldiers are standing their ground in the face of the Nazi onslaught. Unlike their British ally, the Poles have been going in a good deal for atrocity stories.

The other night children were warned not to pick up any candy, sausages, cigarettes or match-boxes which they might find in the streets. The candy, sausages and cigarettes, it was asserted, were poisoned and the match-boxes were supposed to explode immediately upon being opened. Another Polish broadcast told of how the German stations had used a Warsaw wave-length to broadcast a Catholic service. However, the German accent came through so thickly, according to Warsaw, that Polish Catholics were deeply offended at the thought that probably an ordinary radio announcer was trying to pass as a Catholic priest.

And from the Big, Booming Boche: Nazi broadcasting is geared to one objective: to prove that the invasion of Poland is justified. This job is tackled from two angles—the intellectual and the emotional.

On the intellectual side, long, detailed lectures are given to show that Danzig is historically German and that today, as ever, its place is once again within Reich borders. This theme is delivered in many languages and usually by pedants of university standing.

FOR emotional consumption, the chief dish served by the powerful set of DJ stations contains a large helping of atrocity stories. Occasionally an attempt at authenticity is made by having "eye-witnesses" broadcast.

A sample story tells of how the German army, on entering a German village in the Polish Corridor, discovered four German children, ranging in age from five to eight, with their tongues

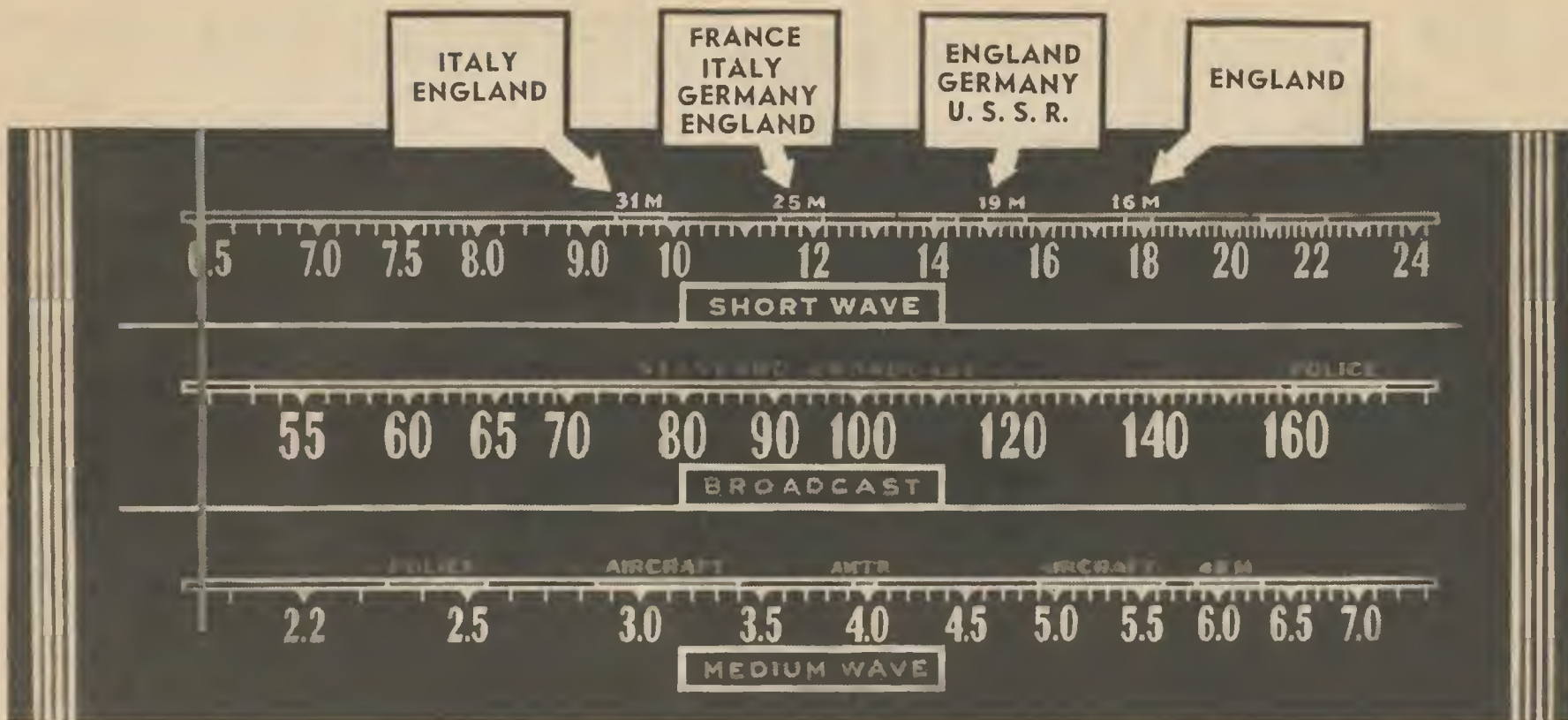
nailed to a table and otherwise mutilated. Another relates how a German sergeant, with his money in hand, entered a Polish cottage begging to buy a glass of milk—and was treacherously stabbed with a dagger.

Despite its generally crude output, the German stations have come up with the up-to-now cleverest device of combining propaganda with entertainment. "For the next half-hour," says the announcer, "we shall listen to a group of beautiful German waltzes." And they are beautiful. The first three waltzes are played as so much music without any political embroidery between selections. It is only after the listener has settled down to a stretch of pure entertainment that the announcer quietly intersperses very brief comments that go this way:

"In the last three centuries France has engaged in eighty-nine wars, England in 444. Germany has engaged in but thirty-one—fourteen against Austria and sixteen against Bavaria, all for the sake of Reich unity." (*Orchestra: "Beautiful Blue Danube"*) . . . "The richest country with the poorest people (England) is fighting with the poorest country with the happiest people" (*Orchestra: "Zwei Herzen im Drei Viertel Takt"*) . . . etc.

Thus the war of words spins its shrill course. It is a contest dedicated to selling world opinion a special bill of goods. And as the countries of the world—including good old Uncle Sam—try desperately to stay out of the mess by clamping down on foreign propaganda, the men who run the belligerent short-wave stations will increase their short-wave hours to an unprecedented peak.

For they know one fact: No border guard ever shot down a short wave. You just can't keep the pesky little things out of the country.

EUROPE IS TALKING

Here are directions for tuning in war-torn Europe direct

DURING the past five years, most home radio receivers sold in America have been equipped for short-wave reception. Few purchasers of such sets have learned to use the short-wave band. But the war has changed that.

Today, as never before, listeners are struggling with their short-wave dials, trying to pick up news flashes from Germany, England, France, Russia. Hence our purpose here: To show listeners in simple terms the ins and outs of short wave—particularly as it operates under war-time conditions.

First, do this: Turn the button or switch on your set that brings in short waves. By doing so you leave swing bands, torch singers, and comedians behind and enter the red censored zone of radio. Most important spots in the zone are the sixteen-meter, nineteen-meter, twenty-five-meter, and thirty-one-meter bands. These should be plainly marked on your dial, probably with small thickened or colored lines indicated as 16 M or 19 M, as on the dial reproduced on this page. Some radio dials are straight, some are circular, but the principle remains the same. If there are no marks on your dial to indicate the short-wave bands, call in your service man or a short-wave amateur and have him designate the four bands clearly.

Having located them, the next problem is to choose which band to tune in. Each will bring in foreign stations, but at different hours, and under different atmospheric and seasonal conditions. At this time of the year tune to 16 M during daylight hours, 19 M from mid-afternoon through early evening, 25 M

Naturally there will be other stations, foreign and domestic, operating on same bands during periods given above, but keep the following distinguishing features in mind. Both Italy and U.S.S.R. use woman announcers. Prior to coming on the air, British stations given above usually use a constant tone signal to mark their frequency. German stations play a little music-box talk-tune over and over, while Italian stations have a twittering canary-bird signal. One of the easiest ways to locate these stations is to tune slowly across band at one of scheduled English news periods until you come to one of the above stations.

from late afternoon through the evening, 31 M for evening hours only.

Now consider the time of day. Assuming that you have chosen the appropriate band, you must now locate the country and station which will provide the best reception for that hour. Ordinarily, several stations will be audible on each band but only certain specific ones will be useful to the average listener. Always remember that only those stations which broadcast programs in English, beamed specifically on North America by means of directional antennae, will provide satisfactory reception on the standard receiver.

Many listeners have given up tuning short waves in disgust after one or two feeble attempts, mainly because they did not know exactly where and when to tune for foreign programs intended for their consumption. The recommended schedule outlined in the box on this page should do much to help such listeners. Without previous experience, they should be able to hear any of the stations listed four days out of five by using it and keeping in mind the tips given in this article. It may not be quite as easy to tune in London or Paris as it is to push a button for your favorite local station, but the knowledge of how to do it insures Americans of the right to hear both sides of the present conflict—and to decide for themselves. That is the American Way.

Warsaw Has Seen War

Dear V. O. L.:

By the time you can publish this letter Poland may be no more. It won't be the first time the country has succumbed to aggressors and come back again. Warsaw itself has had a hectic history and changed hands many times before Hitler took it upon himself to punish the Poles for saving their independence.

Charles Gustavus of Sweden conquered Warsaw back in 1655, but couldn't keep it long. Charles XII of Sweden also captured Warsaw and lost it again. The Russians seized the city in 1764 and 1794. Prussia got the city in 1795 in the Third Partition. Napoleon's troops occupied the city in 1806, and in 1807 it became the capital of the Duchy of Warsaw, a French protectorate. Austria held it for a brief period in 1809. The Russians got their turn again in 1813 when Warsaw passed to them in their slice of Poland.

Then in 1918 finally came the independence of Warsaw and Poland. It looks as if the time is at hand for another division of Polish territory. The chances are that Warsaw will have to hoist a Nazi flag this time, but there is an outside chance that Russia and Germany may fight over possession of the capital city and other Polish territory, as they have done before.

Whatever the outcome, Poland and Warsaw should be given credit for their "comebacks" to independence. Who knows? They may do it again. There was a Poland almost one thousand years before Hitler, and there probably will be long after he has ceased terrorizing the world.

Write a Song Hit!

ARTISTS and writers starving in garrets have nothing on song-writers. Almost everyone has a song in his or her heart which, put down on paper and published, may prove a hit, but you can count the successful song-writers on your fingers and toes. That's why they're so well paid—because so few of them are known and accepted. The trouble has been getting a hearing, getting your songs published, getting the public to accept your songs if they are published.

A Search for Unknown Song-Writers

Now, for the first time, the song doesn't have to seek out the publisher. The National Song Search is a new and a different kind of contest. Jaromir Weinberger, forty-three-year-old Czech composer, has a distinct standing in America. He taught at the Ithaca (N. Y.) Conservatory from 1922 to 1926. In 1931 his "Schwanda" had its first Metropolitan Opera performance. Since then the merry "Polka" from that work has become one of the most popular concert numbers in this country. Also propulsive and gay is his music on this program. "Puppenspiel" means "Dolls' Play."

The "Emperor" waltz, while not as well known as some of the other Johann Strauss dance classics, has lovely moments and at least one strain that equals his best.

It is good to see that Wallenstein has the courage to voice a Strauss waltz in the NBC series. Written in the '80's, it was dedicated to Emperor Franz Josef. The late Lawrence Gilman once wrote: "A great lady of Vienna, approaching her last hour, desired that a Strauss waltz be played at her funeral. It was conducted by that composer himself as the bright-hearted lady was lowered into her grave. If a Strauss waltz is not too light for the most solemn of all occasions, surely no one need regard it as insufficiently ponderable for a symphony concert."

Created one year after his first symphony, Brahms' second contains as profound a slow movement as he ever achieved, just as the allegretto (third movement) is perhaps his sunniest. So much so that the famous conductor, Felix Weingartner (in his book, "The Symphony Since Beethoven") called it "trivial." Commend us to such triviality!

"Stride la Vampa" (Fiercely the Flames Roll) is sung by the vindictive old gypsy, Azucena, just after the familiar "Anvil Chorus" in the second act of Verdi's opera. She has gazed long into the campfire and recalls the death of her mother, burned at the stake by a cruel nobleman, and renews her thoughts of vengeance against his son. The stressful aria was one of the greatest achievements of the late Schumann-Heink, therefore Gladys Swarthout has a good example to follow. Her other numbers are in English and need no detailed comment.

In 1837-38, Liszt put forth a set of studies called "Etudes d'Execution Transcendantes." In 1852 he published a revised and perfected edition consisting of twelve pieces, which a contemporary critic crowned as "an unparalleled, gigantic work of spiritual technic and the culmination of all piano studies." However, like Chopin's, Liszt's etudes really are fascinating concert pieces. "Feux Follets" (Will-o'-the-Wisps) is No. 5 of the Liszt bouquet, and it will be interesting to see how much of the composer's original lightness and poetical atmosphere Reiner has reflected.

Antonin Dvorak came to his first real prominence when he was thirty-three (1874) and won the Austrian State Prize for composition. On the jury of award was Brahms, and two years later he recommended Dvorak to the publisher Simrock, who purchased some vocal duets ("Moravian") from the composer. In 1878 Simrock acquired the "Slavonic Dances," world-famous as soon as they became known. Dvorak sold them outright for the munificent sum of \$75. (Simrock made a fortune from the pieces.)

The "Serenade" in E Major, for strings, written about twelve months after Dvorak's winning of the State Prize, is amiable and even joyous, for the young man was in the second year of his happy marriage. Also, he had already scored striking success with his cantata, "Hymnus."

By the time Dvorak penned his "Serenade" he had shaken off somewhat the influence of Wagner, which beset the young man overwhelmingly in his earlier creativeness. In his final style, Dvorak found an original utterance of his own,

more *Overture No. 3*, the Orchestra; *Florestan's Aria* from "Fidelio," Jan Peerce and Orchestra; *Symphony No. 5*, the Orchestra.

The musical world is still debating the intrinsic merits of Beethoven's only opera, "Fidelio." Some idolize the entire work, others admire it in spots, and the remainder (a small minority) respect the composer's sincerity but do not believe that he showed any operatic inspiration or skill whatever. As proof, they point to the sketchy and limping libretto, the constant halting of action, and the symphonic treatment of the vocal parts. However, the fact remains that while "Fidelio" is not an even relatively perfect opera, it nevertheless has some of the noblest music ever composed. Like the overture we are hearing this morning, the dramatic soprano aria, "Wicked One," and the Prisoners' Chorus and other ensembles.

Beethoven's painstaking thoroughness made him write as many as four overtures for his opera, no two exactly alike. Three are named "Leonore" after the heroine of the story. The fourth and last one is known simply as the "Fidelio" and now is generally played as a prelude before Act I. The grandiose "Leonore No. 3" serves as an interpolation, or so-called "Entr'acte," between the two acts.

True to Type

OFTEN American symphonic composers complain about the few chances they get to have their works heard; and having them heard, fail to impress the public and critics. Recently I heard the familiar plaint again from a well-known creator in regard to his newest opus. I asked him which orchestra had performed it and who had been the conductor. He named one of the chief American symphonic organizations and its batonist, born in Europe but now a naturalized citizen of the United States.

"Was the performance as good a one as possible?" I inquired, "and did the conductor interpret exactly as you wished?"

"Well—er—oh, it was all right. Of course, one never gets an absolutely perfect hearing." I understood. The composer was afraid to express his honest opinion for fear of exile from those concerts if his remarks got back to the conductor. Gentlemen of the stick are frequently that way. If a new orchestral score fails to register strongly, they have the pleasant habit of ascribing the flop to lack of merit but never, it would seem, to their own lack of proper understanding and interpretation.

It seems to me that some of our best American music is so slow to win wide acclaim here because foreign or foreign-born conductors mostly lead it, for they head practically all our major symphony orchestras. One has to rack one's memory to discover where any native American is directing an outstanding orchestra in this, our musically timid land.

Why is it so? Why aren't more Americans occupying the platform at symphony concerts? Are they incompetent? If so, why? Don't our great music schools teach conducting? Is an orchestral score a sort of Sanskrit hieroglyphic whose key is known only to Europeans? Aren't the scores printed for everyone to read? Are our young American musicians blind? Brainless? Frightened? Unambitious? Would they rather be just passable performers than try to be first-rate conductors? Would they rather play in an orchestra than lead it?

It is my contention that our creators would be winning far more attention

and adherents if more American conductors could rehearse and present the music. During the past few years American orchestral scores have taken on more and more native character. Much of it has been adapted from the popular field and given art treatment. Foreigners have never been able to write our style of popular music nor to interpret it correctly, because they do not feel it. The same limitation applies to the best American symphonic music. To give it proper voice and suggestion and to inspire response, conductors and players must, before all things, be moved by conviction.

A word to the estimable ladies and gentlemen who form the boards supplying and raising money to finance our leading orchestras: These are not days to carry on the fetish that only men born in Europe are masterful orchestral conductors. It looks at this time (and will for apparently a long period) as if America and Americans are more concerned with culture and things of the spirit generally than all the countries of Europe put together, and you can also throw in China and Japan for good measure.

Speaking Up

The New York Philharmonic, John Barbirolli, conductor, opens its radio series on Sunday, October 15. The first program includes a new work by Jaromir Weinberger, composer of "Schwanda." Other conductors to be heard this winter are Serge Prokofieff and Georges Enesco.

Chamber-music addicts shouldn't miss the "New Friends of Music" programs, beginning October 29, NBC, and presenting ensembles like the Pro-Arte, Griller, Gordon, Budapest and Kolisch Quartets. There will be sixteen concerts in all.

Alfred Wallenstein's Bach cantatas resume October 15. He has already started the season impressively with the Mozart Piano Concerto series.

The foregoing are just a few of the things to be heard this winter. The March of Music will continue to publish the programs every week with as much accuracy as possible.

Men Behind the Music

This Week: TAYLOR, FASSETT, ZACHARY

ONE started out to be a preacher. Another had strong urges to become an instructor of philosophy. And the last thought teaching English and dramatics was his chosen career. Not one is a professional musician. To their mutual surprise, all three landed at CBS and found themselves in charge of the music department.

They all have impressive titles, to which they pay little attention. Davidson Taylor is Assistant to the Vice-President in charge of Broadcasting. George Zachary is Acting Head of the Music Department. James Fassett is

why not try for a big station?" He did. And was taken on immediately by the most important station in Louisville.

At about the same time, James Fassett, Dartmouth graduate, was discovering that his funds were not sufficient to continue his post-graduate studies in philosophy at Harvard. His musical background included an ability to play the piano and regular attendance at the Boston Symphony concerts, almost obligatory to a native of Massachusetts. He also wanted to be a music critic, and walked into the office of the late Philip Haleone, one of America's most brilliant and acidulous critics.

Assistant Head of the Music Department. Among them they have a thorough knowledge of all the problems presented by music on the radio and work together in perfect harmony.

Oldest in experience is Davidson Taylor—although none of them are old. Taylor and Fassett are in their early thirties, Zachary is twenty-eight. Taylor started life in a small Mississippi town. His father was a Baptist minister. His mother had been a brilliant kindergarten teacher. Both parents wanted their son to be a minister. He obliged to the extent of attending the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in Louisville. He wasn't there long before he realized that the ministry was not for him. But he stayed on and supplemented his religious training with improvement of his musical talents, consisting of a tenor voice, a bowing acquaintance with the banjo, ukulele, flute and baritone horn, and a great liking for directing choral groups.

Finally, one day a bass-fiddler pal suggested he try out as an announcer at a local radio station. Taylor liked the idea, applied for the job and got it. "How long," he wondered, "has this been going on? And if it's that easy,

"Mr. Hale," blurted Fassett. "I want to be a music critic."

"All right," answered Hale, without lifting his head from the article he was writing. "I'll send you some tickets."

Fassett murmured a startled "Thanks." He was half-way out of the door when he turned and said, "But you don't even know my name and address." Hale laughed, looked up and said, "I like your courage." Fassett was hired. The next few years he eked out a living writing criticism, playing in stock, writing radio scripts and taking a flier in the piano-roll business as a salesman. He then became an announcer at NBC's Boston station, announcing the Boston Symphony programs. The Boston Symphony represents, for Bostonians (and some others), the epitome of culture in America. Fassett was fired for the strangest reason on record. He sounded too cultured.

Zachary, a New Yorker, was in the meantime teaching English and dramatics at a high school after graduating from New York University. He was a pretty good amateur violinist, but his chief hobbies were building radio sets and dreaming about radio production.

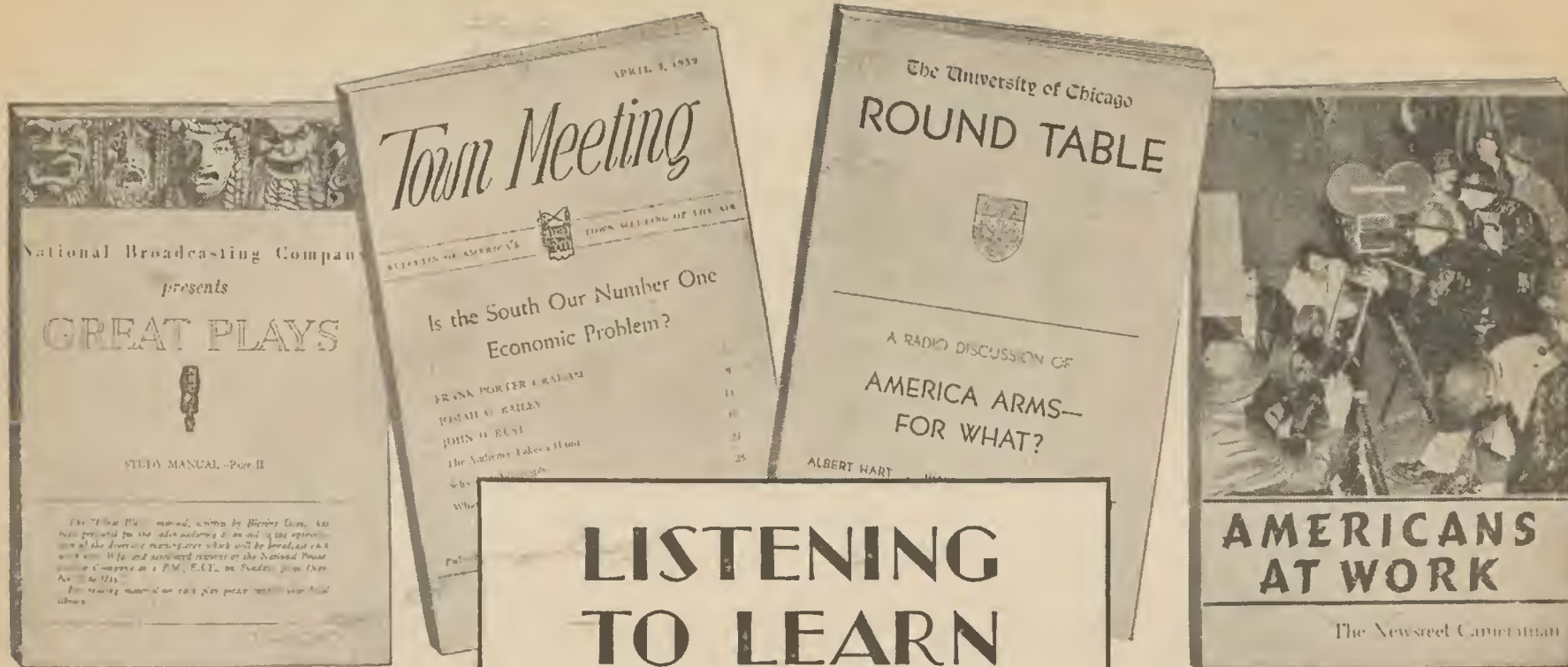

BACKGROUND FOR WAR

POLAND'S history is typical of the mess which is modern Europe. For nearly 250 years, after the expanding empires of Russia, Prussia, and Austria jointly grabbed Poland in 1772, the Poles were a people but not a nation. Doggedly holding to their language and customs in spite of constant repression, they were rewarded in 1918 when the Versailles Treaty restored the Polish state, taking from Germany 6,973 square miles, from Russia 101,196, from Austria 30,914. Thus did Germany return her original grab—and on this return does Adolf Hitler base his claims in World War No. 2. Renouncing his ten-year non-aggression pact with Poles last winter after they refused to hand over Danzig and Corridor passage at his behest, he set his crisis machine to work, this fall found himself at war.



He decided to see if his dreams were practical and applied for a position at CBS. He was taken on as an apprentice and allowed to try out some of his ideas. His chief feeling was that musical programs did not explore a broad enough field. He discovered, however, that radio has certain limitations, and acquired a healthy respect for a budget. Fassett arrived in New York about the same time and became announcer and then producer of the Philharmonic broadcasts. He followed Taylor, who had already been at Columbia for some years. Zachary was made nominal music-department head and Fassett his assistant when Taylor moved up to assist in general broadcasting. But all three continued to work together.

Taylor is tall, lean, slow-spoken, with a homespun sense of humor and an earnest enthusiasm for everything connected with radio. He is one of the best-liked men in radio and one of the easiest and most agreeable to work with. He is married to an Associated Press reporter.

Fassett is the quietest, most reserved of the three. His face is thoughtful, meditative, his manner deliberate. His approach to his work is scholarly and thoroughly conscientious.

Zachary is doing less and less musical work and more dramatic production. Two of his shows were the "Elery Queen" broadcasts and "Men Against Death." Zachary is dark, wiry. Accent on youth is a dominant note at CBS. In the case of Taylor, Zachary and Fassett, the results have been entirely successful. They are one of the main reasons why Columbia is a leader in new and daring ways to present music on the radio.

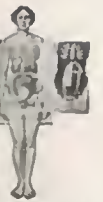

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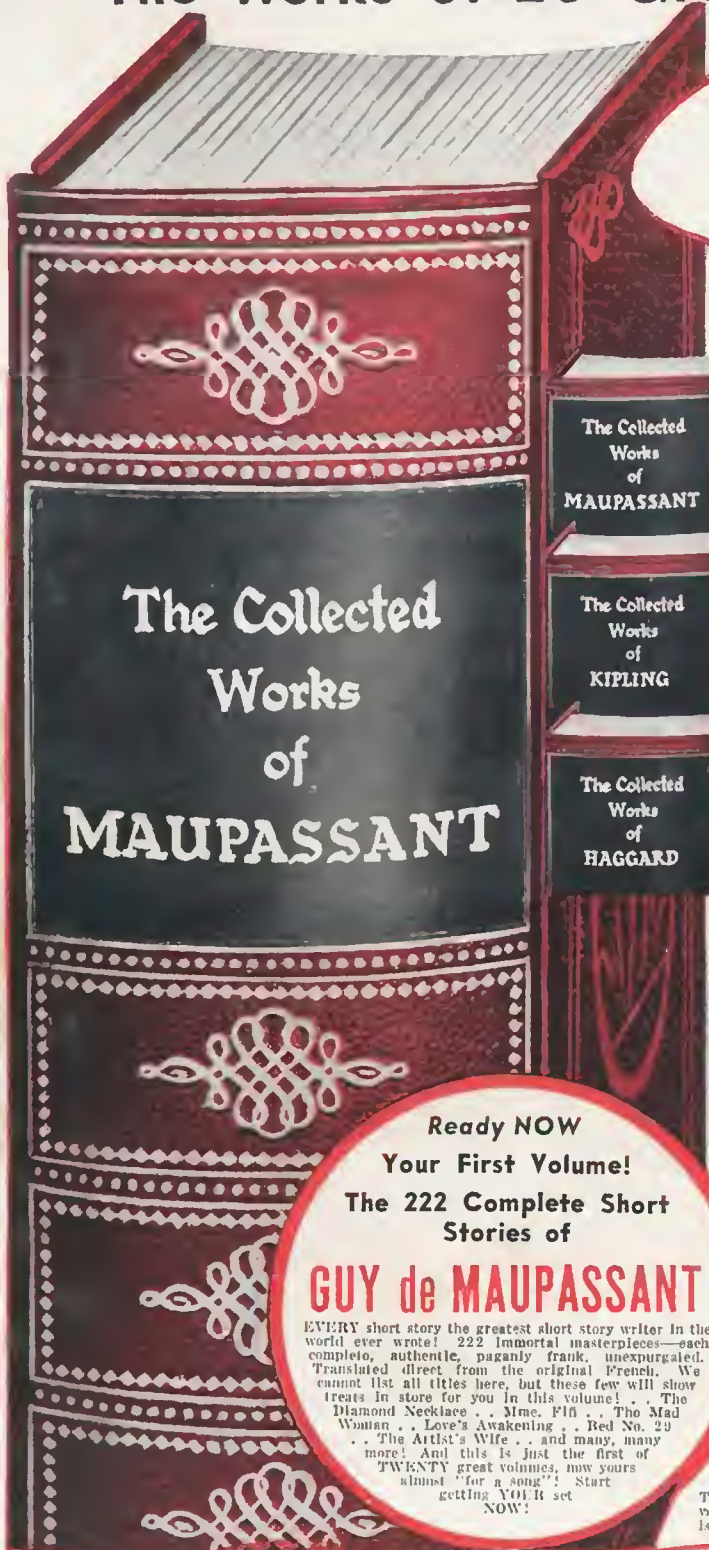
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
