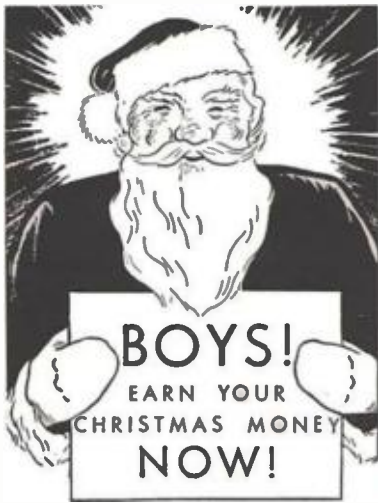
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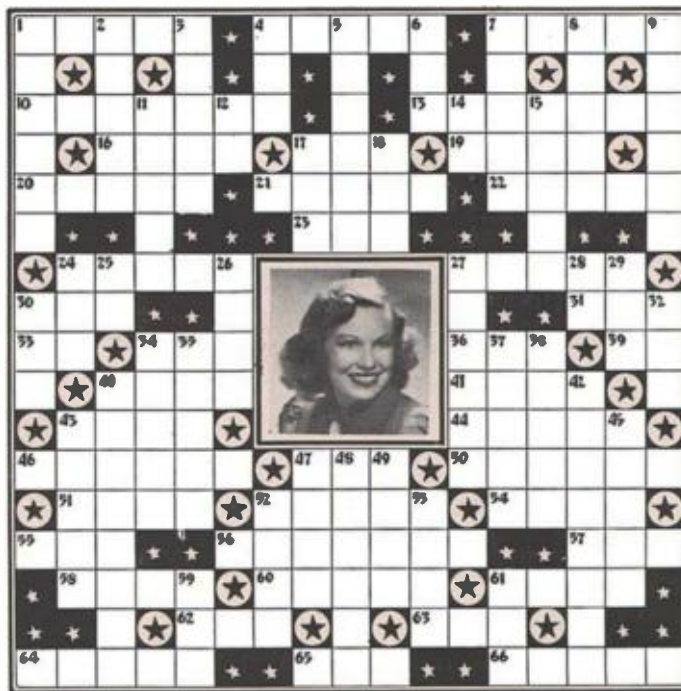

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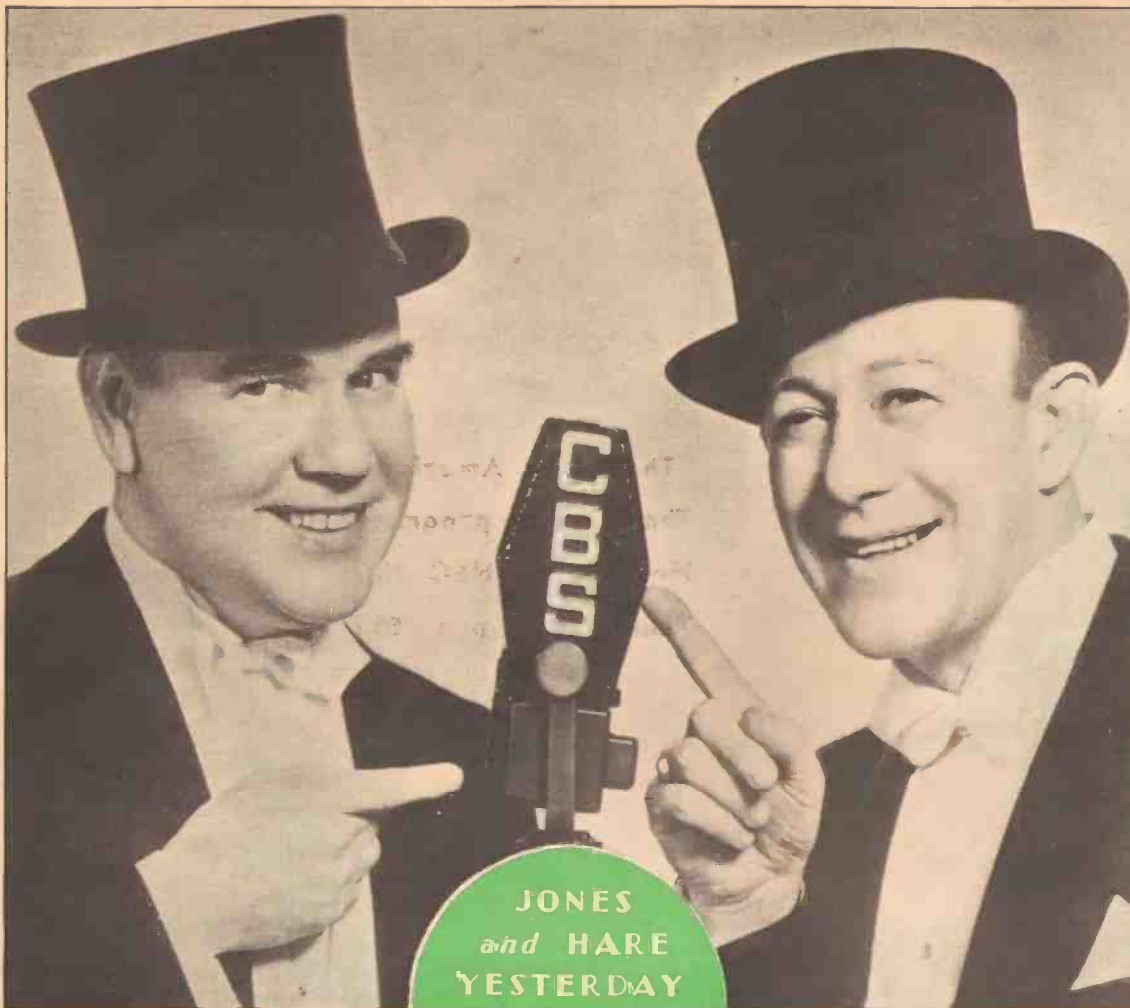
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PINCH-HITTING for HARE

Ernie's Marilyn sings on in the Hare tradition



IT WAS the hardest program Billy Jones had ever had to do. For twenty years, in vaudeville, on records, in radio, he had worked as a partner in the team of Jones and Hare—singing, comedy, patter. Then, suddenly, he was left to face the microphone alone. There was no genial Ernie Hare across from him, and he missed the friendly presence. It didn't help any to remember that, even as he went on with his patter and comedy, down in Norfolk, Va., they were burying his friend and partner of twenty years. Life had been unable to drive a wedge between them. They had watched other teams of their day split up for various reasons—money, jealousy, old age. Jones and Hare seemed to go on forever . . . until death struck.

Ernie should never have made his last two broadcasts. His face had been flushed with fever and he could hardly keep on his feet. "I'm probably walking around with pneumonia," he laughingly remarked, and it wasn't until Billy finally forced him to go to a doctor that he learned how true his laughing remark had been. He was walking around with pneumonia, and only the stern tradition in which he had been steeped—the show must go on—had kept him from falling over.

Of course you've heard Jones and Hare. Maybe you remember them from the highly popular recordings they used to make—their comic duets and sentimental ballads. Or, if you're of a later generation, you'll know them from radio. Perhaps you don't remember the names Jones and Hare but know them by one of the endless stream of names under which they sang and performed for the endless stream of sponsors who hired them from the early days of radio until the present. For different sponsors, they were variously known as "The Happiness Boys," "The Interwoven Pair," "The Best Foods Boys," "The Taystee Loafers," "The Gillette Gentlemen."

Jones and Hare broke into radio over WJZ, Newark, N. J., in October of 1921. Among the most popular recording artists in the country, they sang on radio for nothing because they felt it had a future. And they entered this new field in the face of bitter opposition on the part of the recording companies for whom they worked. Already well known, they played a large part in popularizing radio in that early day.

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THAT THANKSGIVING TANGLE

Here is a potent
remedy for your
holiday headache:
change the calendar

WHEN President Roosevelt suggested some months ago that we celebrate Thanksgiving November 23 instead of November 30, as scheduled, he tossed a bomb that exploded under the nose of every man, woman and child in the land. For the calendar is a homely, daily document, and anything that affects it affects everybody, be she ever so humble.

The result of the President's suggestion is a nation split evenly in two. Twenty-three states, including the stand-pat New England states, will celebrate the holiday on the last Thursday in November as per tradition. Twenty-three others will honor the day on the twenty-third. And two others will straddle, holding celebrations on both days.

Radio schedules woven around all-important Thanksgiving sports events have been knocked into a cocked hat, and moguls of the airwaves can be seen any day rending their hair and muttering cuss words in their beer. *When is Thanksgiving?* they want to know. Railroad time-tables, college-va-cation arrangements, and a thousand business and festive plans have been torpedoed by a mere shift of seven days in the calendar.

Which brings us to one of the important women of our time, a wisp of a lady named Elizabeth Achaelis, who for the past ten years has been fighting to change the calendar. Like a good housewife, she feels that a calendar should be a tidy, regular procession of dates. We shouldn't have to recite, "Thirty days hath September, April, June and November . . ." to find out the number of days in a month. She would also like to see all holidays fall on a Monday so that we-uns could get two to three days in a row and a

real binge or a real rest, whatever the temperament.

As to the pother about the new Thanksgiving date, she says, in effect, *What's the shooting about?* And she produces a few facts that I am setting down for your astonishment.

The first Thanksgiving, back in 1620, was held on December 9, 1620, and it

was a Saturday. The following year it took place on a Friday and the date was November 9. Once it was celebrated on July 30, another time in February. Moreover, it wasn't signalized every year. And what is more, there were folks among the Pilgrims who wanted the celebration to be a day of prayer and fasting. At Valley Forge,

George Washington proclaimed a day of Thanksgiving on May 7, 1778.

Well, the day was celebrated on and off on days in every calendar month, all through the seventeen-hundreds, and then people well-nigh forgot about it. And then a woman named Josepha Hale, editor of a fashion magazine named *Godey's Lady's Book*, began





proved by some sixteen countries, and but for Mr. Hitler and his war, plans would be under way right now for an international convention to put it into effect. It is an exceedingly simple plan and has many advantages.

In a word, it involves the shifting of seven days. February would have thirty days, March thirty, April thirty-one, May thirty, August thirty, and December thirty. A glance at the calendar as pictured here will give you the idea. Each quarter-year begins on a Sunday and ends on a Saturday. So too the year. And each quarter, moreover, has exactly ninety-one days.

This makes a year of 364 days. The 365th day is an intercalary day, which is one without a number or a weekday name. It is simply a twenty-four-hour period that is taken out of the parade of days because it makes the parade irregular. Miss Achaelis proposes that this be called Year-End Day and be celebrated throughout the world as Peace Day.

The great advantage of this last day of the year is that the calendar becomes fixed permanently. It cannot change. No one will have to buy a new calendar every year. It will be possible to memorize it, like a multiplication table. There will be no searching on the pad of dates to find out what day Christmas falls or what day baby's birthday comes. All anniversaries and holidays will be set once and for all time.

And while this is being done, the advocates of calendar reform, among them Miss Achaelis, propose that all holidays not linked sentimentally with a birth date be celebrated on a Monday. Election day on a Monday would give the citizens a respite from campaign addresses, except those that the radio would send into their homes, and so they would have time to consider issues and men in tranquillity. Memorial Day likewise would always be on a Monday. The same could be done for all state holidays. Thanksgiving would be the fourth Monday in November.

There are many other advantages. The quarterly tax payments now required on March 15, June 15, etc., would in the World Calendar fall always on a Friday. What better day for facing that painful business than the one on which most people collect wages or total up the week's receipts?

Women are profoundly interested in the subject. Last May, after two years of study, the General Federation of Women's Clubs adopted calendar reform as one of its four principal objectives. The fact that Christmas would always fall on a Monday impressed many of the voters.

The headaches that go with the irregularity of the present calendar would be entirely eliminated. School vacations will fall on the same days, year after year, sports schedules will be fixed once and for all. The planning of club programs much simplified. Week-ends will be longer.

Businessmen have long demanded a greater degree of stability in the calendar. The building industry has been particularly interested, and one of its leaders stated recently that our sloppy system of reckoning time costs builders and contractors millions of dollars each year.

Chambers of commerce, statistical and engineering groups, and most church organizations are definitely in

favor of the new calendar. The churches approve because it is a device which will, once and for all time, nail down the wandering Easter. The League of Nations was contemplating a call to an international convention on the subject shortly before war was declared.

We all look at the calendar daily at least once. How many of us know the reason back of it—how this conglomeration of days came into being?

Briefly, it is a record of the time it takes for the world to make a circuit of the sun, which requires exactly 365 days, five hours, forty-eight minutes, forty-six seconds. Our year—page Mr. Ripley—is off by twenty-nine seconds. But this isn't much of an error. It would take 3,323 years for this error to add up to a single day.

Our calendar was worked out by Pope Gregory back in 1582 and it wasn't adopted by Britain until 1751. Until that date, England and its American colonies went by the Julian calendar. George Washington was born under this old calendar, so his actual birthday is February 11 by our system of reckoning and not February 22, which we usually celebrate.

The world is full of peoples and countries who still count days by the moon. Right here in the United States the Jews, Mohammedans and a score of other peoples go along by moon calendars, which have a way of getting out of line. This is because the moon, as a means of reckoning time, is inaccurate and not too closely related to the march of the seasons.

MARK HAWLEY, MBS news commentator, in a jocular mood figured the other day that our present calendar, however much it has improved over the ancient calendars, costs the taxpayers \$607 an hour. Asked for an explanation, he said:

"Let me ask you a simple question: What day falls on the eighteenth of next month? How long has it taken you to arrive at the correct answer? Unless you have a calendar within reach or your wife's birthday happens to fall on that date, I defy you to give me immediate answer. Instead you say, 'This being the twelfth, let me see—thirty days has September, April, June, etc. That gives thirty-one days—hmmmm—this is Sunday—next Sunday would be the nineteenth—the following Sunday the twenty-sixth—hmm—the next falls on Tuesday—eighth—fifteenth—hmm—twenty-second minus four—oh yes, the eighteenth would be a Friday.'

"In terms of radio copy these lines would consume thirty seconds of air-time. Give the average person one minute to do the problem. Assume that half the population of New York alone worked at it once a day—\$8,333 hours daily, or 7,291 working days, or twenty-six years of work for one man. At twenty-five cents an hour he would receive \$14,583.25. This for one day's calendar mauling in one city of the U. S. A."

Now will you believe in calendar reform!

The editorial got to the eyes of Abraham Lincoln, and he, in 1864, proclaimed Thanksgiving Day as we now celebrate the occasion.

So you see there's nothing very traditional about the last Thursday of November as a day of giving thanks. Miss Achaelis, however, was pleased with the excitement Mr. Roosevelt's proclamation had caused in that it showed that the public was not indifferent to the calendar.

Listeners wonder why a comedian can be funny one season and flop the next. The answer is simple: a comedian is only as good as his script. His present writers apparently haven't discovered the O'Keefe personality . . . As a perfect example of expert writing for a definite personality you have only to listen to Bing Crosby's patter. The writer has Bing's gift of gab perfected to the letter. The same is true of Jack Benny's scribbles.

program, a movie short showing how Lucky Strike cigarettes are made was shown to the audience. After that was over, Prof. Kyser came out on the stage after an eloquent introduction by "Dean" Ben Grauer. Kay kept the audience laughing with his tomfoolery from the minute he came out. He kids people in the audience, the girl selected to pick the ticket stubs to select the contestants, and even the nervous contestants themselves. Kay admits he is superstitious and announces he is going to take off the tan shoes he is wearing and put on a pair of blacks, which are the shoes he wore on his first program and which he now wears every Wednesday night. After the broadcast there is a mob backstage waiting to see him, and he has to talk to them all so that nobody is slighted.

The audience for the NBC Symphony concerts conducted by Arturo Toscanini is the smartest and best dressed to attend any broadcast. Formal dress is worn by about three-fourths of the audience. If you're lucky enough to get a ticket, you are apt to sit next to a judge, an ambassador, a famous movie star or any well-known person. Last Saturday night during the short intermission I noticed the swell movie star, Luise Rainer. A few seats away sat Kitty Carlisle, Will Hays, czar of movieland, Max Gordon, the famous theatrical producer, and many others too numerous to mention. There isn't any doubt that this concert is the musical treat of the week, but what an

added treat it is to watch the famous maestro conduct that grand orchestra. When it's all over, the perspiration just pours down his face, which isn't hard to understand. Lovers of good music should hear the Victor recordings of the "William Tell" overture with Toscanini conducting the NBC orchestra—it's MARVELOUS.

Ezra Stone, the "Aldrich Family's" pride and joy, is certainly kept hopping. His weekly radio show is just one of the many things that have kept him busy every minute. Two weeks ago he joined the cast of "See My Lawyer," the Broadway show which he directed. He no sooner got his daily routine organized than he got a call to go to Hollywood to make a movie, and that is where his broadcasts will originate for the next few weeks while the picture is being made . . . Van Heflin, star of "Betty and Bob," will not be on the program the week prior to Christmas. Van's stage show, "Philadelphia Story," will lay off that week, and his request to be written out of the radio program during the same period was granted so that he is now able to take a real vacation.

At CBS one day last week, Paul Whiteman was rehearsing his part in the special broadcast honoring Juliette Gordon Low, the founder of the Girl Scouts. There were a number of boys and girls in the twenty-second-floor lounge, and when Paul came out of one of the studios a number of them wanted his autograph. Paul pulled out a little bank and extracted a dime from every one who asked for his signature. If they didn't have a dime, he contributed one of his own. That intrigued me, so I asked Paul about it. He told me he had started collecting ten cents for each autograph when he went on tour this fall. The autograph dimes were turned in to the Girl Scout fund.

LET'S BE PROUD OF AMERICANS

Dr. Sigmund Spaeth, famous humanizer and popularizer of music, explodes the old myth of European superiority in music

The author of this article is Dr. Sigmund Spaeth, internationally known as the "Tune Detective." Through radio, motion pictures and magazine articles, he has long been a leader in the movement to popularize good music in America. On this page, Dr. Spaeth brings the full authority of his position as president of the National Association of Composers and Conductors to a frank discussion of the fight American artists are waging against domination by European music racketeers.—Editor.

IT IS a matter of patriotic pride with us that our motor cars, our radios, our factories and theaters and stores are better and more efficient than those of any other country. We cry "Buy American!" with a fervor that arises not alone from patriotism but from the honest conviction that when we do buy American goods we are getting the best value for our money. Why, then, should we look down our noses at the American composer and musician and singer?

There was a time when no American musician dared appear before a native audience without a European bill of artistic health, and this in spite of the fact that every real musician and critic knew that European engagements and favorable notices could be bought for a definite price, and generally were. In many cases the Americans had to change their names to give them a foreign flavor. Edward Johnson, now manager of the Metropolitan Opera Company, was told in Italy that he would either have to become a citizen or call himself Edoardo di Giovanni, and he accepted the latter as the simpler course.

Dick Bunnell became Richard Bon-

elli; Richard Martin changed his first name to Riccardo; Lillian Norton had to be disguised as Nordica; Lucy Hickenlooper of Cincinnati could be pardoned for turning a rather unfortunate name into Olga Samaroff, with a grandmother as an excuse; but even today Joseph Bentonelli likes to be reminded that he is really Joe Benton of Oklahoma. These are all, incidentally, top-notch artists who should have been successful under any name.

Lawrence Tibbett is generally pointed out as an outstanding American singer who made good. He had been singing splendidly at the Metropolitan Opera House, but with little prospect of getting out of the low-salaried class in which most of the American singers were kept by Manager Gatti-Casazza.

Tibbett's sudden leap into fame was the result of an unparalleled demonstration from an American audience when he sang the minor part of Ford in Verdi's Falstaff. There have been sweet things said and written about the generosity of Antonio Scotti, in the leading role, who brought Tibbett before the curtain and insisted that he accept the ovation that was clearly his.

IT IS time that pleasant falsehood was corrected. Scotti, like most foreign artists, had not the slightest intention of giving credit to his American colleague. He hogged the stage and the bows until the audience became resentful and made it very clear that it was Tibbett they wanted and not the aging Italian baritone. The American had gone to his dressing-room, and came down only when Gatti-Casazza, with very bad grace, commanded him to take a bow. When Tibbett was finally allowed to appear before the curtain,

there was not the slightest doubt that he had stolen the show.

It is a mistake also to credit Gatti-Casazza with any sincere interest in American artists. He tolerated them as a necessary part of his business, just as he put on bad American operas in order to say that he had done his duty by the American public.

Today both American singers and instrumentalists are gradually making their way through sheer ability, although they still suffer from the tradition that a foreign accent, an unpronounceable name, "artistic temperament," and a hand-kissing manner are worth more at the box-office than great talent and thorough training. Albert Spalding demonstrated long ago that supreme violin-playing was not limited to the Russians, and he has remained a straightforward American gentleman in spite of his musical eminence. Richard Crooks, John Charles Thomas and Nelson Eddy have joined Tibbett in the select circle of he-man singers, "regular" in every way and still artists of the highest rank. Louise Homer, Geraldine Farrar and Mary Garden proved long ago that American girls could beat the European racket if they had the gifts and the courage combined, and today such younger singers as Grace Moore, Helen Jepson, Josephine Antoine and Gladys Swarthout are holding their own against all foreign competition.

It is the American composer, however, who faces the greatest problems in his own country. If he tries to write symphonies or operas or chamber-music, nobody will listen to him, so he is forced to find some other way of making a living, generally by teaching. His orchestral works get so few performances that neither the composer

nor the listener can find out how they really sound. When they are presented by one of the major orchestras, it is too often with insufficient rehearsal.

A noted composer summed up the situation when he had his players perform an American work practically at sight. Asked why he did not give the composition adequate rehearsal, he said, with simple candor, "My audience knows the classics that I conduct; therefore I must be sure that they are played well. This new piece they do not know; therefore it does not matter how many mistakes are made."

A SINGLE concert performance is little better than no performance at all. A fair appraisal is impossible, and critics write cautiously, without committing themselves. Even the greatest masters had to be played again and again before they became popular. Why should the unknown American composer be asked to pass a test that Beethoven himself might not have survived? Why, moreover, must he always be compared with the greatest of foreign composers instead of the average?

Our serious music-lovers could learn a practical lesson from Tin Pan Alley. There nobody worries too much about esthetic standards. The one and only question asked concerning a popular song is "Does it sell?" If it does, according to the Broadway music-publishers, it must be good.

Our native composers and interpreters are not inferior to the foreigners in ability or training or true personality. They merely know less about the intrigue and the politics that long ago became European habits.

knows, wrote four overtures for his opera "Fidelio." One bears the name of that work and the others are titled "Leonore" Nos. 1, 2 and 3. The reason for the various essays was Beethoven's fastidious sense of artistic correctness. He kept on trying in this case until he succeeded in making one of the overtures (No. 3) express the spirit of the libretto and its whole musical treatment, instead of merely stringing together some melodies from the score in the loose manner of many other operatic composers.

Leonore No. 1, least satisfactory of the quartet, was made for the revision of "Fidelio" when that unsuccessful opera had its second "premiere" at Vienna in 1807.

The Seventh Symphony has been so variously explained by the commentators



Favorite soprano of many radio programs in the past, Genevieve Rowe is currently soloist on the "Bach Cantata Series." This broadcast, a regular classical music feature of the MBS network, is heard on Sunday nights

Beethoven, as nearly every music-lover

(including Berlioz, Wagner, Rolland, d'Indy, etc.) that one gets dizzy trying to follow them. The best plan, it seems to me, is to heed Beethoven's own angry remark when he heard some of the "stories" his contemporaries attached to the Seventh: "If expositions were necessary, they should be confined to characterization of the composition in general terms, which could easily be done by any educated musician." My own acceptance is the thought of d'Indy: that the Seventh belongs to Beethoven's second period of his career (1801-15), when his soul seemed most impregnated with love of woman, of nature, of country.

Number 8 is direct utterance mainly of light moods, some roughly humorous and even boisterous. For sheer beauty, hardly anything symphonic exceeds this score; thus the beatific allegretto, the graceful minuet with its lyrical trio, and the serene appeal of the second subject in the finale.

Of Several Things

AS READERS of this department are aware, **RADIO GUIDE** recently conducted a poll, sponsored by the interesting Sunday afternoon program "So You Think You Know Music," in order to determine which now-living composer might, in the estimation of the voters, still be performed one hundred years from now.

It is a pleasure to report that our clientele came through generously with votes, sent to **RADIO GUIDE**, CBS and the program's master of ceremonies, Ted Cott. The result of the poll put Sibelius on top, and in the order following, Richard Strauss, Rachmaninoff, Stravinsky, Paderewski, Deems Taylor, Shostakovich, Prokofieff, Kreisler, and Weinberger and Jerome Kern tied for tenth place. Then came Enesco, Vaughan-Williams, Grainger and a long list of others.

The result is not much of a surprise, except in the case of Paderewski, for while he wrote much lovely music (including a symphony and an opera) it has not been heard much in recent years—of course always excepting his pretty little minuet. Then, too, it is astonishing that only Jerome Kern and Deems Taylor were placed high of the American composers. Others further down the list were Hanson, Arthur Berg, Roy Harris, Copland, Ives, Still, Carpenter, Cadman, Kelley, Friml, Romberg, Damosch, Berlin, Oley Speaks. A few gallant voters included the ladies—Mrs. H. H. A. Beach, Mana-Zucca, Chamlnade, Carrie Jacobs Bond.

Three composers whose work I have never had the privilege of hearing or hearing about put themselves on the ballot slips. One wrote underneath, "I can afford to wait."

Humor crept in too when a voter remarked of one of his candidates: "I name Shostakovich for one hundred years more of immortality—if Stalin doesn't get him first." Another selected Harry Armstrong "for his 'Sweet Adeline'—with or without gurgling accompaniment."

The editor of the March of Music now serves as the permanent judge on "So You Think You Know Music."

RADIO GUIDE has had many letters of late months complaining that inland

communities are being deprived of good music on the air through the indifference of local stations and sponsors and the poor reception attendant on the best programs of the large networks. Speaking Up

THE other night, about eleven o'clock, I suddenly felt the need for a little soft music; nothing too intellectual, nothing I had to pay much attention to, but something to serve as a nice, sentimental, soothing background to my thoughts and my book. I switched on the radio, turned the dial from station to station. One after the other they greeted me with blasts of swing . . . good swing, I'll admit, but swing. And I didn't want swing just at that moment. I hunted around until I located just such a program as I wanted . . . and found that it came from a small local station. The networks had evidently entered into a conspiracy to broadcast as much dance music as they possibly could from eleven o'clock on.

With the latest **RADIO GUIDE** in front of me, I went into the subject a little more thoroughly. I patiently counted an average of eleven dance bands broadcasting every night after eleven on the three major networks . . . Columbia, Mutual and NBC. With the exception of brief breaks for news bulletins, they blared happily on until long after midnight.

Now, mind you, I haven't a thing against swing bands. I like to shake a leg myself now and again. But nobody can convince me that 120,000,000 Americans spend every night after eleven jitterbugging. It just isn't logical. We may be a little mad about some things, but we can't have reached that stage. Yet, according to the networks, we have. And so all the nice, quiet people like you and me and the Smiths down the street have eleven dance bands crammed down their ears every night of the year.

A few years ago, on NBC, there used to be a delightful program called the "Slumber Hour." It was just the thing to listen to while darning socks or smoking a pipe over the evening paper, or just sprawling contentedly on the sofa after a hard day. It went on late at night, never presented anything to tax the intellect, and prepared one nicely for bed. Most of the music was of the "semi-classical" type, the orchestra was first-rate, and the announcements relaxingly brief. The hour was eventually shortened to half an hour and finally taken off the air altogether. And the strange thing is that NBC still gets hundreds of letters protesting its withdrawal and begging for its return.

That surely proves something. Why can't the networks follow the example of local stations and devote half an hour late at night to the "Slumber Hour" type of program?

Men Behind the Music

This Week: MILTON CROSS

"WAKE up, America! Time to stomp the experts . . . This is Milton Cross speaking to you from Box 44 at the Metropolitan Opera House . . . It's RCA all the way . . ."

What radio listener hasn't heard at least one if not all of those now familiar slogans, delivered in a deep, throaty, compelling voice, with no nonsense about it? Whether he's extolling the manifold delights of ginger ale or wringing your heart with the sad tale of "Tristan," the outstanding qualities of Milton Cross' announcing are his obvious and convincing sincerity, his

cubby-hole in the Westinghouse plant near Newark. The station directors were so bowled over at having a real musician show some interest in radio that they snapped him up at once. He put on song recitals for a few months, and then when the station rose to the dignity of having two announcers he became the second one. They must have known they had a good thing in Cross, because they've hung on to him ever since. He became more and more interested in announcing and its possibilities, and finally made it his paramount work. One of the first to realize just what a fine art could be made of it,

enjoyment, and the belief he gives you of having a message of gravest importance to impart to you and you alone.

However, it's in his musical broadcasts that he really goes to town, although no announcer in the business has been on as many of them as Cross. His voice still takes on a tinge of reverence, almost of awe, as he solemnly introduces the Saturday opera broadcasts. One feels that each moment he spends in Box 44 is one of absolute satisfaction. His pride in the opera house and the artists is almost paternal.

To be able to broadcast opera to millions of people is still a very real privilege to him. Although in point of service the second oldest man in radio, he's probably the least hard-boiled in the profession. Radio is still the marvelous, miraculous invention it was the first time he put on a pair of tight ear-phones in 1920 and heard queer squeaks and splutters punctuated by brief gusts of music. Cross, a New Yorker, was studying at the Institute of Musical Art in New York to become a school music-supervisor and training a tenor voice at the same time. A friend persuaded him to try out for a singing job with the infant WJZ, then just a

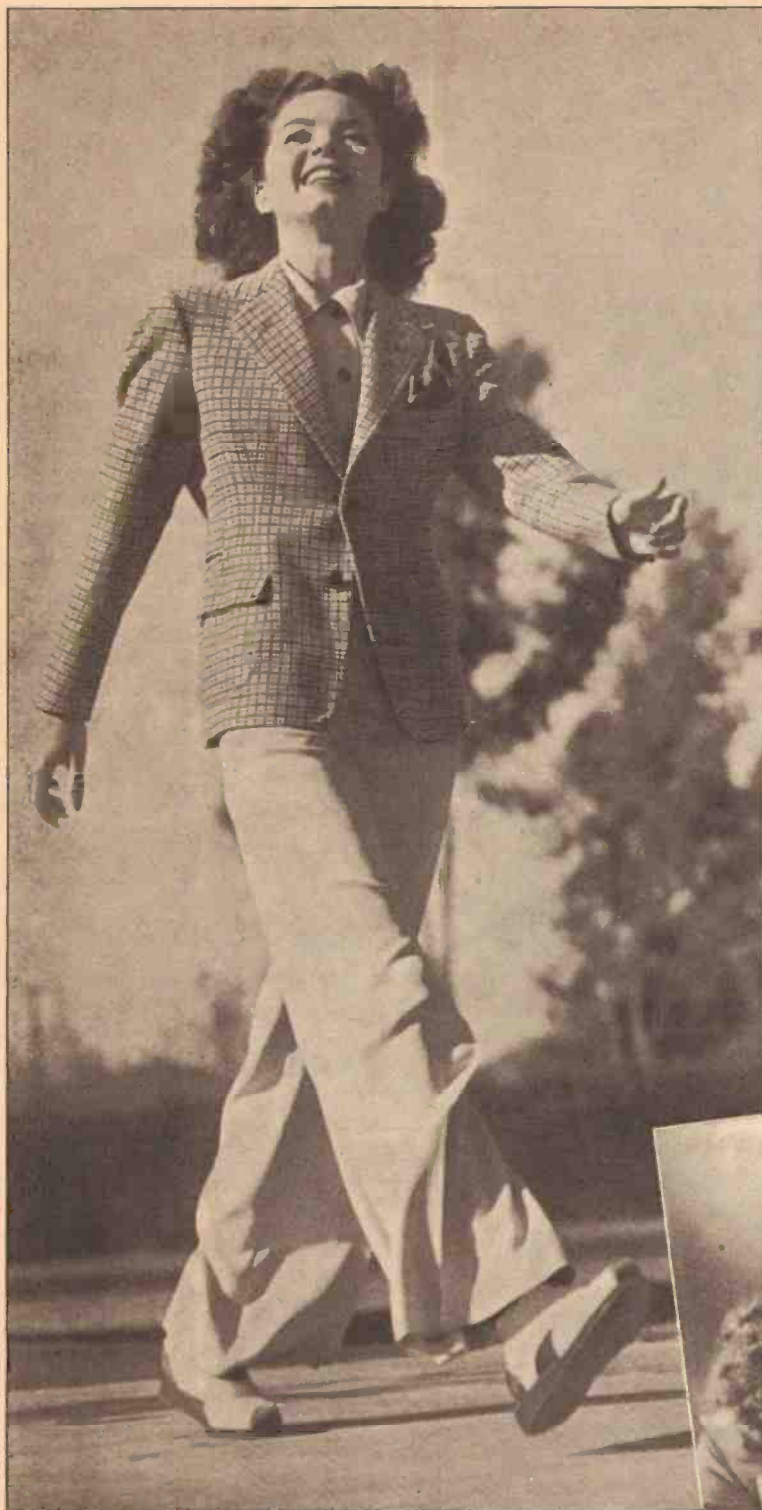
Cross developed as an announcer until in 1929 he was awarded the gold medal for diction by the American Academy of Arts and Letters.

Big, husky, over six feet tall, with kind eyes behind rimless glasses, nothing pleases him more than to talk about music in radio. He still sings for his own pleasure, accompanied by his wife, formerly assistant organist at the First Presbyterian Church in New York. They live a very retiring life, especially since the tragic death of their eight-year-old daughter several years ago.

He prepares most of the scripts for his music programs himself, and none more devotedly than those for the opera performances. He spends long hours of research in the library and makes it a point to know all the artists well, so he can talk about them with first-hand knowledge. As a result of his sincere interest and boundless enthusiasm, he has made himself practically synonymous with the opera broadcasts, and this writer, for one, could not imagine Saturday afternoons without the familiar "This Is Milton Cross speaking from Box 44 at the Metropolitan Opera House."

HOW TO BE POOR ON \$2,000 A WEEK



Frances Langford, high-salaried singing star of "Texaco Theater" (CBS, Wednesday night) could be the radio star whose case is presented in this story as that of Miss Sally Hi-Notes

Sally's salary is not \$1,750 a week, after all. At best, her contract will keep her working only thirty-nine weeks out of the year. For the program will undoubtedly be yanked off for the summer, leaving Sally to do her sun-bathing sans a pay-check. Therefore . . .

Enforced vacation brings Sally's salary to about \$1,310 a week.

Then Sally's agent nicks off ten percent every week she works. He got her the job. He rates it.

Item No. 1: Agent's commission, \$130. Income taxes, as now administered, actually discriminate against the stars in a manner unparalleled in any other group of wage-earners. The stars get nicked more, per thousand of earnings, than anybody else.

A star is a delicate, complicated piece of machinery. When a piece of machinery wears down and shows signs of deteriorating, it is taken apart and repaired. When a star wears down and shows signs of deteriorating, her "repair job" is in the form of a change of scenery—a long, relaxed vacation.

"Such a vacation is not a luxury," contends Ira Thomasen, business manager to Irene Rich, Nelson Eddy and other stars. "Once one of my clients wanted to buy a new car for \$1,600. I put my foot down. 'You can't afford it.' Then the next week I turned around and suggested to that same client, 'Here—here is \$3,500. Go to Europe or Hawaii or Alaska—but go somewhere and forget everything and rest.' Now here's the difference. The car was a luxury the star could have gone without. The vacation was a necessity. She was overworked. Her voice was tired. She needed an overhauling. But it was not deductible on her income-tax form!"

Which brings us to:

Item No. 2: Our heroine, not being in the uppermost bracket, had to give only twenty-three percent of her salary to Uncle Sam, which slices off about \$300 a week.

Item No. 3: Vacations, rest cures to get "rewound." Last year Sally went to Honolulu for ten days, spent several week-ends at Palm Springs. She was required by custom to stop at the best hotels and tip lavishly. It amounted to \$1,300 or \$25 a week.

The ubiquitous fellow who sold the Brooklyn Bridge to the farmer has nothing on the promoters whose sucker-lists are made up of stars. To protect herself against these fakers, the present-day celebrity hires a business agent. His fee is anywhere from \$200 a month and up—and he earns his money. Sally pays \$200 a month, so for—

Item No. 4: Business manager, \$50.

The same sucker-list makes a lawyer a necessary adjunct to Sally's menage. Let Sally look cross-eyed at a stranger

WAS that a groan? Was that you squawking about the unfairness of things that allows a radio star to earn \$2,000 a week while you try to keep your piggy bank from looking anemic on a brave \$30 per?

Well!!!!

There are two sides to that story.

Star salaries, like God's chilluns, have wings. Ask Bing Crosby. Bing Crosby gets \$3,500 each time he pushes Bob Burns around for Mr. Kraft, besides a hefty take—\$135,000—a picture. Yet:

"I had to borrow money to pay my

first quarter's income tax," wails Bing.

And Bing isn't in that fix because he lights his Coronas with five-spot notes, either. Ask Martha Raye. Ask Irene Rich. Ask Parkyakarkas. Ask even the frugal Fibber McGee.

There's the case of our heroine, Sally Hi-Notes. There is a Sally Hi-Notes, but that's not the name we know her by. The girl wants her privacy.

Sally sings on a major Coast-to-Coast air show which blows in from Hollywood. As co-star and chief audience draw, she rates \$1,750 a week. But—ah—here's the first catch:

and she will probably be slapped with an alienation-of-affections subpoena. Then Sally needs an attorney to take care of contracts and legal matters. She's let off easy with a \$100 monthly retainer's fee.

Item No. 5: Legal fees and expenses, \$25.

An amazing psychological reaction sets in on the family of a star. Papa has been digging ditches for thirty years and thinking nothing of it. But as soon as daughter strikes it rich, he develops a sore back and a passion for the Hollywood Turf Club. Mama needs a maid, brother Jack quits the office and lands on sister's pay-roll as third assistant business manager. Either through bullying and whining, or legitimate family pride, the star, as de luxe breadwinner, assumes responsibility. Martha Raye once said: "When I play in a theater, my brother, father, mother, stepfather and in-laws are all at the box-office watching the 'take'!"

Sally takes care of a father, mother, sister, and helps out a married brother who is having tough sledding, besides an occasional cousin or two. She is frugal and they don't take advantage of her, but even at that—

Item No. 6: Family and dependents, \$85.

And now we come to the most ambitious of all expenditures, that odd thing we call "keeping face."

"Keeping face" means riding in a \$3,000 car when you can get there in a Plymouth. It means going to premieres and knocking crowds for a loop in an ermine when your black velvet wrap would keep you just as warm.

It means, as a starter—



Item No. 7: \$35 a week for a press-agent.

It means, too, entertaining advertising representatives, potential sponsors, visitors and the press. It means keeping your liquor cellar well filled and your larder full. Irene Rich has charge accounts at the Cafe Lamaze, the Brown Derby and other smart restaurants as a check on her entertainment expenses. One month her "eating" bill ran to \$350. Miss Rich weighs 128 pounds and drinks grape juice!

Item No. 8: Sally figures her entertainment expenses at, modestly, \$35 a week.

Then, too, you can't deny human frailties. Girls and boys who earn big money easily develop greater ideas for living on the fat of the land. Sally H-Notes looks at her \$1,750 check every week, and in spite of her business agent's admonition that only a fraction of it represents her real salary, she begins to like nice things. You can't fight it.

Item No. 9 is a whopper: Clothes, beauty shop, occasional masseuse, furs and remodeling, sundry purchases, over \$5,000 a year, or about \$100 a week.

"Keeping face" also means maintaining a house in exclusive Beverly Hills, Brentwood or Bel-Air. Irene Rich likes the rural life, has a ranch home in San Fernando Valley. But to "keep face" she also maintains a modern white-and-blue apartment in the expensive Sunset Towers.

Sally has a modest seven-room home in Bel-Air. It hasn't a swimming-pool or a tennis-court, so it sets her back only \$200 a month. Utilities run it up another \$40.

Item No. 10: Rent and utilities, \$60.

She owns one car, a yellow Buick, but keeps a service car in the garage for the servants. Depreciation, gas and oil, parking, insurance, etc., make for—

Item No. 11: Cars, \$35.

Because homes are large and entertaining is lavish and privacy is precious, the servants are many, efficient—and discreet. Ergo! the best. Sally's cook and general housekeeper collects \$90 a month; her chauffeur who doubles as house man rates \$100; her personal maid, \$65, and part-time gardener, \$40. Her private secretary gets \$30 a week. So her—

Item No. 12 includes: Servants, \$73; secretary, \$30.

And that doesn't take in their food! Her home food-bill—aside from her large dinners and parties covered in

the entertainment expense—is—

Item No. 13: \$60.

When Community Chest time comes around, the Hollywood celebrities are not asked how much they will give. They are told. As a rule, though, the stars come across with a week's salary. Sally donated a flat \$1,000.

On top of everything are the various unions Sally must join before she is even allowed to work. She belongs to the American Federation of Radio Artists (\$100 a year—\$50 initiation), Screen Actors Guild (\$30 per annum—\$25 initiation) and AFA (\$18 a year).

So . . .
Item No. 14: Necessary charities and funds, union dues, etc., \$30 a week.

Then there is insurance. Sally takes out heavy liability insurance, also finds health and accident insurance a necessity. There is the compensation insurance for her staff, insurance on her car, her home, her jewels and her furs. This nicks the punch-drunk salary for \$750 a year.

Professional services usually represent a "padded" expense. Joan Blondell's appendectomy cost her \$1,500. Her sister, Gloria, had hers yanked for \$150. Joan shrugged off the discrepancy. "We earn more, so we pay more."

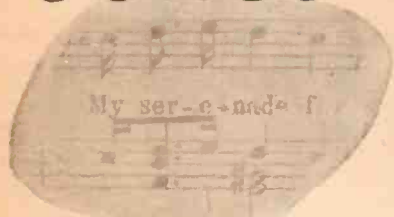

AMERICA SINGS HIS SONGS



**A Bronx bailiff pens
"Stardust" and "Deep
Purple"—radio's most
romantic song hits**



Tall, thin Mitchell Parish earns \$50,000 a year writing songs but shuns the bright lights where they are sung

AMERICA, being a nation that likes to sing, bought more than a million copies of Mitchell Parish's songs during 1939.

That's a higher mark than any other writer of popular lyrics has attained in half a decade. Among the numbers which go to make up that staggering total for the year are a few little ditties with titles like "Deep Purple," "Moonlight Serenade," "Lilacs in the Rain" and "The Lamp Is Low."

Maybe you've heard some of them? Maybe, unless you're totally deaf, you've heard all of them a thousand times—hummed, whistled, sung wherever you went. "Deep Purple" alone sold half a million copies, has probably been played two million times on the air.

What's more likely is that you never heard of Mitchell Parish, the tall, thin gentleman who penned the lyrics for these highly romantic numbers. His profits for the year will come close to \$50,000. That should make him an individual of considerable independence, probably living in a penthouse high above New York and surrounded by a bevy of Broadway's brightest personalities.

You think so?

Mitchell Parish travels to work every morning on the subway. He lives in a Bronx flat with his wife and two children. Mitchell Parish owns no pretentious office with a glass-topped desk and high-speed secretary. Instead, he wears a uniform and carries a gun.

The man who created such sheer beauty as "when the deep purple falls over sleepy garden walls" is a bailiff in a New York City courtroom. He tells people to rise and to sit down when

the judge enters the courtroom. This has been going on now for five years!

It's an amazing story of topsy-turvy success—success which "Mike" Parish refuses to believe is really his. Often he worries that his contract with the Robbins Music Corporation, which has published many of his hits, may not be renewed.

A glance down Tin Pan Alley, one of the most unpredictable thoroughfares to success in the universe, finds the handiwork of Parish in the consistent glow of popular favor. Take, for example, "Stardust," a selection whose longevity entitles it to the rank of a classic. Mike Parish wrote the words. The ethereal grace and silvery illusion of "Stardust" has made it a priceless possession in the memory of lovers without number. But always the name of Hoagy Carmichael has been associated with the song. The music is his, for he wrote "Stardust" as an instrumental selection in the late 1920's. It was two or three years before Parish undertook to add the lyrics. The revived version rocketed to international fame.

Mike Parish counts among his other ventures "Hands Across the Table," "Stairway to the Stars," "Organ Grinder's Swing," "The Moon Is a Silver Dollar" and "It's Wonderful." Actually, he has little flair for music, combining only a knowledge of its rudiments with deep poetic feeling. He plays no instrument, never intended to break into the song-writing game.

Despite journalistic ambitions, Mike drifted from the staff of a trade publication to a clerkship at a hospital. Here it was that he became acquainted with a famous music-publisher. Some of his

biggest hits were written while holding down a \$25-a-week job as publicity man and errand boy. He sold lyrics outright with no thought to future royalties. He let other composers put their names on his creations. Then, for three years, he sold no songs at all and finally took a job as court bailiff. Music-publishers who were too busy to see Mike Parish during that time would now give their back molars to have him under contract.

There has never been much romanticism in this song-writer's life, although his lyrics remain consistently the most romantic you'll hear on your loudspeaker. The feeling, the delicate pastel-like pictures which he draws—all come, say his friends, "from the heart." What they mean is that Mike Parish is a fiend for poetry. He devours Keats, Shelley, Tennyson and all the other masters who made music with words. Little phrases he finds in their verse get him started on lyric ideas. Mike has a note-book full of potential song notions.

"**MOONLIGHT SERENADE**" started out to be "The Wind in the Trees," based upon the soft sigh of a breeze he had heard rustling through summer tree-tops. The latest opus, which his publishers hope will pass 100,000 copies before 1939 ends, is called "The Starlit Hour" and of the same vintage as "Lilacs in the Rain." Parish wrote them both last summer. The music for another of his hits, "Stairway to the Stars," was originally known as "Park Avenue Fantasy." He didn't like that, so when the number appeared it was with the ecstatic suggestion, "Let's build a stairway to the stars."

Many of his numbers are written with composer Peter de Rose, who was re-

cently commissioned by Meredith Willson to prepare the "typical American waltz." There are no illusions about Parish as a starry-eyed dreamer. De Rose tells the story of a visit which he and music-publisher Jack Robbins once made with Parish to hear Glenn Miller at the Glen Island Casino. It was a gala evening, and Robbins had just traded exclusive rights for "The Starlit Hour" to Miller for permission to publish "Moonlight Serenade," then being used exclusively by this bandleader. They sat near the orchestra at one of the best tables in the house. The band blared out, wine flowed, everyone was feeling on top of the world. Finally somebody happened to glance at Parish. He'd fallen fast asleep.

That's the contradictory thing about this gentleman who wrote "Deep Purple." Out of his prosaic background and existence he weaves exquisite lines which capture a nation's romantic fancies. But he lives without dash, without flourish. He spurns the high tempo of New York's shinier society. You won't see him in the frenzy of the theatrical whirlpool nor idolized amid the suave sophistication of glamour girls and boys.

Maybe that's the answer to his success. When Mitchell Parish writes songs they're not aimed at the applause of cafe society. Instead, he dips down into his own poetic heart and blends the fundamental elements of romance, tenderness and pure beauty with no stigma of affectation. It's a universal language from El Paso to Bangor.

And America, being a nation that likes to sing, sings his songs with sincere enthusiasm. —Dick Dorrance.

You Can Tune In China

FAR-EASTERN stations are best received from sunrise to about 8:00 or 9:00 a.m. EST. Almost all trans-Pacific stations suffer from a peculiar "flutter" type of fading, which makes identification comparatively simple. Once tuned in properly, Asiatic stations will often build up amazingly in volume.

China's most interesting station has two calls, XGOY and XGOX. XGOY can be found on a frequency of 11.9 megacycles in the 25-meter band (the 25-meter band is probably a small thick line or dot identified as 25 M on your dial). Start tuning from the high-frequency side (nearest 12 megs) of the 25-meter band and XGOY should be the first station you run onto. It operates from 5:30 to 7:20 a.m. for northeastern China and Siberia; from 7:20 to 7:35 a.m. for Japan; from 7:40 to 11:00 a.m. for south China and the South Seas; from 11:10 to 11:30 a.m. for the U.S.S.R.; from 2:00 to 4:20 p.m. for the Chinese press, and from 4:30 to 6:20 p.m. EST for listeners in Europe. XGOY is best received in the United States from sunrise to about

9:00 a.m. Latest war-news bulletins in English are read by a charming young woman announcer at 6:15 and 9:00 a.m., the latter period preceded by the sounding of a series of soft chimes. A topical talk in English, given by a man, is often heard at 9:10 a.m. EST . . . XGOX (15.20), in the 19-meter band, operates nightly from 9:00 to 10:40 p.m. EST, with antenna directed toward North America. The news bulletin in English is read at 9:50 p.m. EST. This transmission is heard fairly well in the West but poorly elsewhere. Each broadcast over XGOX-XGOY opens with the Chinese national anthem and closes down after the playing of the song in memory of Dr. Sun Yat-sen.

One other station broadcasts the Chinese national programs, namely, XPSA, a 10,000-watt located at Kwelyang in Kwelchow Province. XPSA, on an announced frequency of 6.976 but actually found nearer to 7.01 megs on your dial, operates daily from 5:30 to 11:10 a.m. and from 5:00 to 6:00 p.m. EST. The news in English is read at 9:00 a.m. EST.

FROM THE EUROPEAN ARENA: The London short-wave stations are now shifting to winter frequencies. All changes are announced over the air several days in advance. Variety, musical and dramatic features are again being heard on the London programs. On Sundays at 7:00 a.m. and 8:00 and 10:00 p.m. EST, the highlights of the following week's programs are broadcast . . . DXB, one of the stations that broadcasts the nightly Berlin program for United States listeners, may be heard on either 9.61 or 9.71 megs . . . Desmond Callan of Readville, Mass., writes that TAQ (15.195), Ankara, Turkey, is off the air. TAP (9.465) now operates weekdays from 5:30 to 7:00 a.m., Saturdays from 6:30 to 8:30 a.m., Sundays from 5:30 to 7:30 a.m. and daily from 11 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. EST . . . A new 45,000-watt short-wave station under construction at Ruysselede, Belgium, will operate on a frequency of 11.85 megs, using the call ORY when completed . . . Rome's program directed to the middle and near East, daily from 10:00 to 11:10 a.m. EST, is being heard with strong signals over 2R06 (15.30). News in English is given at 10:55 a.m. . . . Berne, Switzerland's weekly program for the Orient, is now being radiated Fridays from 8:45 to 10:45 a.m. EST, over H80 (11.402). . . In addition to its night broadcasts, RNE (12.00), Moscow, U.S.S.R., is now radiating afternoons from 3 to 6 p.m. EST.

YOU SHOULD HEAR THESE: Early Sunday morning, November 19, from 1 to 2 a.m. EST, an unusual program sponsored by the Spatari Radio Language League will be broadcast over T62 (6.195) of Guatemala City. Two commem-

orative verification cards printed especially for the event and ten Spatari seals will be sent to each listener reporting the broadcast. In addition, as special prizes, sixty packages of Guatemala coffee and postage stamps will be awarded. The Alma India Marimba Band will furnish the music. Baron Franz Gall will make announcements in Spatari, English, Spanish, German, Italian and French . . . In celebration of the opening of the 1939 National Fair of Guatemala, three special programs will be broadcast direct from La Aurora Park in Guatemala City, on Sunday, November 19: At 10:00 a.m., the football game for the National Championship; at 3:15 p.m., an eyewitness account of the horse-races, and at 7:15 p.m. EST, a band concert by the First Military Band of Guatemala. Background for Listening

Here are a few of the outstanding public-service programs on the air this week, with helpful annotations regarding the specific subject to be treated in each:

Art For Your Sake, NBC. Dramatizations of the lives and works of great painters. Artist: Francois Boucher.

Francois Boucher (1703-1770) was a French artist of much ability and equally facile in the production of figure or landscape pictures. The number of his drawings is said to have exceeded 10,000. His style and graceful voluptuousness gave him the title of "the Anacreon of painting." In 1765 he became court painter for Louis XV, and was employed by Mme. de Pompadour both to paint her portrait and to execute various decorative landscapes. His "Mme. de Pompadour," a portrait of his patroness, is a characteristic French painting of the eighteenth century, reflecting the tenor of the period.

Sunday, November 19

A complete edition of "Leaves of Grass," a book of epoch-making originality in thought and style, and his prose book may be held to embrace his life-work as a writer. Whitman was ever bold and determined to face and grapple with life's saddest and sternest realities, to put the full strength of his shoulder to the burden of his fellows. All the auspices seem in favor of his immortality: The neglect of his own countrymen, tempered only by ridicule, abuse and even persecution; the recog-

nition by a few of the leading minds of Europe and the United States; and his slow emergence into acceptance and appreciation, if not into popularity.

The program is to be produced against a musical score written by Frank Black.

Person-to-Person . . .

Radio-education attention is now being focused upon the biggest utilization conference of the year. That is the Third School Broadcast Conference to be held at the Congress Hotel on December 6, 7 and 8. This meeting started out as a purely local venture sponsored by the Radio Council of the Chicago Board of Education, but Council Director Harold W. Kent and his capable advisers found the need for such a meeting so pronounced that it was organized on a national scale as a yearly event. This year's conference promises to be the best yet by far. The tentative list of active participants includes representatives of practically every important unit at work in the field. This annual event has had an interesting growth, following and reflecting the increased interest and activity that has taken place in radio-education within the last two years. Every educator in the United States who can possibly squeeze into the budget a trip to Chicago for these three days should not fail to do so, for the benefits that teachers and school administrators will be able to derive from the comprehensive program that has been scheduled are many-fold. Harold Kent, his Radio Council staff and competent advisers are to be congratulated for this telling attack on one of the biggest radio-education problems of the day. After all, excellent research, production and reception of programs for school use may be lost on the intended audience if teachers are not acquainted with effective ways to use radio in the classroom.

For the next ten years they were on the air continuously, and their clean-cut comedy and blended voices were welcomed in every home that boasted a receiving set. In 1933 they left the air to make a personal-appearance tour, and returning found their engagements largely confined to guest appearances with such shows as the "Rudy Vallee Hour," the "Maxwell House Show Boat," the "RADIO GUIDE COURT of Honor." Radio seemed to have forgotten them in the interval they were away, but then, in 1937, the Gillette Razor Company rediscovered them, put them on a show over the Yankee Network and later moved them into New York to appear with Milton Berle over CBS on "The Community Sing" program. When that series was over, the team went to WMCA, where they did a show for Sachs Furniture Company. It was here pneumonia caught up with Ernie.

The first week that Ernie missed, a substitute act was put in the team's place. Then the doctor told him that it would be a long time—if at all—before he would be able to take his regular place in the team. It was then that he hit upon his big idea, an idea that Billy Jones heartily approved. His daughter, Marilyn, would take his place.

On that first broadcast Marilyn sang "Deep in a Dream."

The next week she sang another request number for her father—"Deep Purple"—and, hurrying home that day after the program, arrived just as they were taking Ernie away in an ambulance. The doctor had ordered him removed to a hospital hours earlier, but he refused to go until he had heard Marilyn. That was the last time he heard her sing. Ten days later he died.

So now, even at the hour they were burying Ernie, Billy carried on alone. He had wanted to go down to Norfolk to be with his friend on this last occasion, but they had a contract to fulfill and Ernie had contracted his fatal illness in striving to fulfill it. The least Billy could do was to carry on alone. There were no substitutes for Ernie this day. It was a memorial program, and in the middle of it Billy broke down in spite of himself. The next day "We, the People" contacted him. They wanted him to come on their program and tell the story of this famous team that had pioneered the airways. They wanted Marilyn, too. As Jones and Hare, they pattered back and forth in Jones and Hare style, sang their famous theme song, "How Do You Do, Everybody, How Do You Do."

The mail response to this program was overwhelming. And almost every letter begged this new team of Jones and Hare to stick together. There was nothing else to do. The public wanted it, WMCA wanted it, the sponsor wanted it. But most important, both Billy Jones and Marilyn knew that Ernie Hare would have wanted it that way.

Now Billy and Marilyn—the new Jones and Hare—are broadcasting locally over station WMCA in New York, confidently awaiting an opportunity to stage a big-time radio comeback.

THE story of the girl who left her home town to find fame and fortune in Hollywood has been told so often that it's part of American folk-lore. But once there was a girl who left Hollywood to find fame and fortune in Chicago.

Small wonder that Chicago radio circles were agog at the news of the arrival of Barbara Luddy. This fascinating feminine paradox has been a never-ending source of surprise to her associates and fans. From the very beginning the local radio people have found the girl from Hollywood a friendly human being, full of fun. Her friends love to tell stories of her deep interest in people, great and small, such as the one of a fellow actor who came across her last week sitting on a curbstone in back of the studios with a little bootblack, discussing the possibilities of the Notre Dame team. The actor said that Barbara glowed with pride when the urchin re-

marked, "Gee, lady, you're the first dame I ever met that knew a forward pass wasn't a free ticket in the first row."

Just three years ago, in the shortest telegram that ever came out of Hollywood, Barbara announced, "Arriving for rehearsal Thursday." Exactly on the tone-beat, the diminutive Barbara scampered into the studio, introduced herself and asked for a script.

That rehearsal of "Streamlined Death," their first co-starring vehicle, was an auspicious start for the long association of Barbara Luddy and Lester Tremayne. They have clicked with each other and with their audiences ever since their initial broadcast.

Listening to Barbara and Les on the air, you would think they had always shared the same can of grease-paint. They are a perfect team, but poles apart in their approach to acting. To Barbara, it is a business; to Les, a tradition.

Necessity was truly the mother of Barbara's career. At the age of eight, because of the illness of both her parents, she was faced with the problem of earning a living. Possessed of a singing voice of remarkable range and quality, she found little difficulty in securing work. Three years later, when her singing voice disappeared suddenly in the middle of a performance, this resourceful little girl found extra work in Hollywood. Thus Barbara started her acting career as a business, and she's found it a pleasant way to earn a living ever since.

Barbara's modern apartment is a small but very livable place. Because she is so small herself, the brown-haired Barbara measures less than five feet, she dislikes large things, says they make her feel insignificant. Her living-room is simply decorated and is notable for its very comfortable chairs. Her most-prized possession and one of her few luxuries is her magnificent radio. Besides being a radio actress, she is a radio fan.

This simplicity which is so important to Barbara is of no interest to Lester Tremayne. The English-born, American-raised actor looks for the dramatic in every situation. Tall, slender, Les is as handsome as his greatest fans imagine him. How completely his sense of theater extends into his private life was demonstrated early this fall when he smashed his specially built automobile. Knowing how much he depended on his car, Barbara offered him the use of her inexpensive one, which usually sits unused in its garage. Les refused graciously and explained that while he seldom exceeds the speed limit in his own high-powered car, he always carries an airplane crash-belt. The thrill of knowing that he can outspeed and outdistance almost every car on the road makes driving a potentially dramatic experience.

Les is the first to admit that he likes excitement and the element of surprise. Last week, after his "First Nighter" broadcast, he jumped into his car and drove to Paris, Tenn., to visit one of his fans, a charming old lady who's been listening to his broadcasts as long as he's been on the radio. His surprise visits are one of this bedridden woman's greatest joys, but, fan that she is, she's always telling him that such a nice young man should have his feet on the ground.

It's only natural, however, that Les should be all wrapped up in things theatrical. His family tree reads like a theater program. It includes actors, singers, musicians. His mother is Dolly Tremayne, veteran of British stage and screen. Les began his career in a movie starring his mother and directed by his uncle.

At seventeen he left home and joined a stock company. He started as prop-boy and ended up as leading man, touring the corn belt. And his satisfaction was as great playing Tarkington to the farmer folk as it would have been

playing Shakespeare in the big-time.

Radio is young, and its intimates lean over backward to avoid any mention of it as an art, but anyone who listens to Les on the air realizes that he brings to each one of his broadcasts all the tradition of the stage. Today Les is a veteran of radio, well schooled in its technique, but it is his feeling for the stage that makes the illusion of sitting in a theater as a "First Nighter" a reality.

This boy with his head in the clouds meets the girl with her feet on the ground every Friday night—fifty-two times a year.

At rehearsals Barbara and Les discuss the entire script before they read a line, to properly attune themselves to the new play. When they have their parts well in mind, real work begins. Their rehearsals are long and painstaking affairs, but they are not without their lighter side. "This isn't Shakespeare, you know" is Barbara's favorite taunt when Les overemphasizes a small point. "Ham on rye" Les calls out when he feels that any member of the cast is overacting. Temperament has no part in their get-togethers.

WATCHING a rehearsal recently, I was amazed at the amount of time and energy they put into each line. Barbara was playing the part of a frivolous wife whose hobby was collecting boy friends, the latest acquisition being a prize-fighter. Her lawyer husband turned prize-fighter, is matched against her boy friend in an effort to bring her back to her senses. After the first few readings, Barbara was still dissatisfied with her portrayal of the wife. The cast adjourned for lunch and Barbara disappeared from the group. After lunch she arrived at the studio wearing the silliest hat any of them had ever seen. "I just bought it," she explained. "It makes me feel silly and frivolous; now I ought to be able to act silly and frivolous."

As Les approaches a dramatic highlight, he begins to run his fingers through his hair; Barbara stands on her toes, a reaction to her small stature. She laughingly says, "The only height I'll ever reach is a dramatic one, and I have to stand on my tiptoes to do that."

Of each other they have this to say: "Les is a real dyed-in-the-wool actor; I leave the subtle nuances to him." Les counters with: "It's Barbara's spontaneity and warmth that sets the pace."

Boy meets girl. The curtain rises on "First Nighter." The man in the worn carpet slippers puts down his paper; the Manhattan matron sets aside her needlepoint. America sits back in its easy chair, content with the knowledge that good theater is as close as the family radio. —Alice Green.

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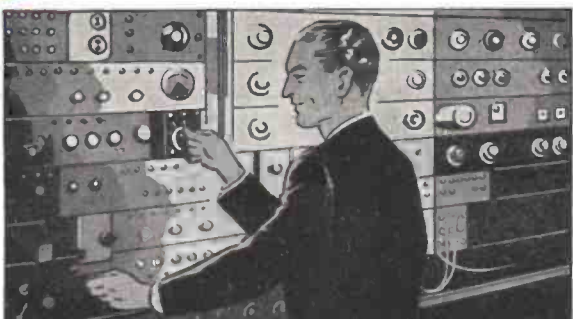
